## TOWN WARRANT

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Union Hall, said Lempster, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, at ten of the clock, in the forenoon, to open the polls for voting for candidates, and at one o'clock in the afternoon for the discussion of the Articles of Warrant.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and to vote on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing Beano be adopted in the Town."

Article 2. To receive all reports and act thereon.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to permit the construction of a flood control dam by the United States at Site D-1, Sugar River Small Watershed Project on Giles Brook.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of no more than SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$75,000.00), or such part thereof as the Board of Selectmen deem may be necessary for the purpose of building a recreation area in and around the dam site designated as Site D-1, and for that purpose to borrow the sum of no more than Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) or such part thereof as the Board of Selectmen deem necessary, and to issue obligations of Town in the form of serial notes and/or bonds; and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any and all offers made by any agency of the State, and/or United States to apply in the financing of any such building hereinbefore mentioned.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

**"An Ordinance Regulating The Location Of  
Septic Tanks and/or Drainage Fields"**

**Section 1.** No person shall construct or locate any septic tank and/or drainage field within seventy-five feet of the high water mark of any natural or artificial pond located, or to be located in the Town.

**Section 2.** Any person violating the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance shall be fined One Dollar (\$1.00) for every day that said person is found to be in violation of this ordinance.

**Section 3.** Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 2 of this ordinance, the Board of Selectmen, are hereby empowered to institute any appropriate action or proceedings to prevent, restrain, correct or abate such violation.

**Section 4.** This ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will vote to continue the Town Forest Committee and to take any necessary action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$751.24 for T.R.A.; the State will contribute \$5,008.25.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,100.00 to pay on note for the truck.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote \$200.00 to keep the Information Booth open from June 26th to Sept. 30th.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote \$100.00 to continue the Town History Fund established in 1955.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the Fire Department's annual expenses.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase Liability Insurance for the Town and raise \$1,000.00 to cover expense thereof.



Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$350.00 for the Town's share of Social Security for its employees.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for the Library.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for the Bicentennial, said money to be repaid in proportion to receipts.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to paint Town Hall.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$32.00 for the D.L.S.R. Association.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$77.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for interest on notes.

Article 23. To see if the Town wishes to supply the Town Officers with office space, and to appropriate money to pay for the same.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$200.00 to help maintain and support the Newport Hospital.

Article 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to allow 3% discount on taxes, if paid on or before Sept. 1 based on 80% of last year's taxes, and 2% discount on taxes if paid on or before Oct. 1 using the same base.

Article 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

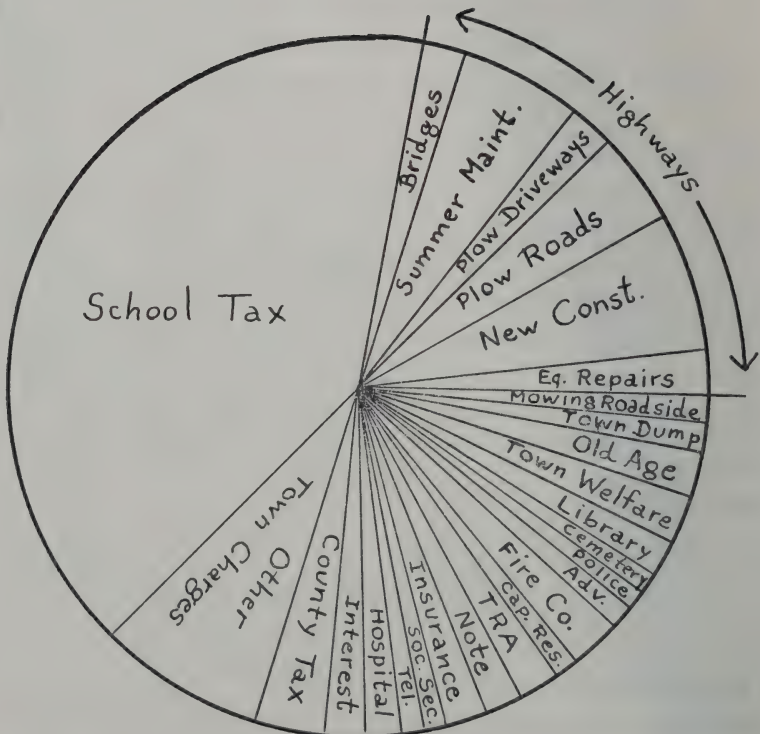

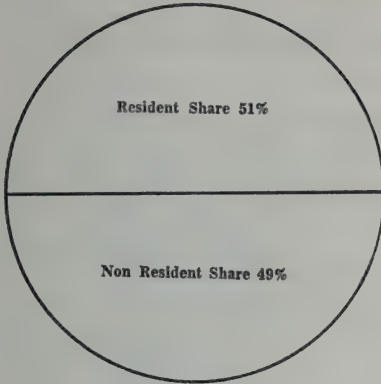

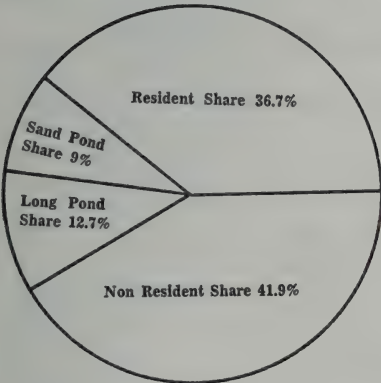
# YOUR TAX DOLLAR, WHERE IT COMES FROM

1957



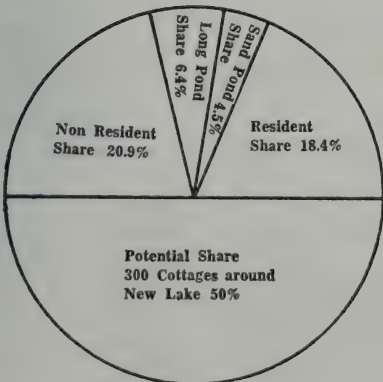
Taxes raised by Town \$22,671.53

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Fire records are made by people — those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966).

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.

2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres — a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.

2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.

3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.

4. Most important — instruct your children that matches are not play things.

## **AN ACT RELATIVE TO WATERSHED AND FLOOD PREVENTION PROJECT**

The New Hampshire Water Resources Board is hereby authorized to cooperate with Cities and Towns in the development of Small Watershed Projects as planned by the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Local Sponsoring Organizations, under the provisions of Public Law 566, as amended, and New Hampshire Laws, Chapter 481:25 and 481:10.

Financial aid for recreational purposes at said projects from the State of New Hampshire is contingent upon approval by the State Soil Conservation Committee of a land use plan for proposed public development at each site under consideration. The State Soil Conservation shall review each site and shall assist the municipalities, Local Sponsoring Organizations and land-owners in preparing a general land use plan for each site. The Committee shall also assist the municipalities in the preparation of mutually acceptable applicable ordinances to which said general land use plan shall conform.

There is authorized an appropriation of \$112,800.00 to be expended by the New Hampshire Water Resources Board for one-half of the Local Sponsors' additional land, rights of way and construction cost for recreation to be included in the structure and appurtenances designated as Site D-1 in Lempster, New Hampshire, and Site D-2 in Goshen, New Hampshire, as per Sugar River Flood Plans.

The above appropriation to be used if the Town of Lempster makes available the sum of \$92,300.00 for one-half of the Local Sponsors' additional land, rights of way and construction cost for recreation on Site D-1, and/or the Town of Goshen makes available the sum of \$20,500.00 for one-half of the Local Sponsors' additional land, rights of way and construction cost for recreation on Site D-2.

The above appropriation shall remain available unless sooner expended until June 30, 1970.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School District:

### ENROLLMENT

The number of students totals 120, broken down as follows:

Grade 1	13
Grade 2	21
Grade 3	12
Grade 4	15
Grade 5	16
Grade 6	14
Grade 7	14
Grade 8	15

This represents an overall decrease of 15 students. The reduction is caused by the operation of the High View Church Farm School in East Lempster.

Forty-seven students are attending area high schools: 2 at Sunapee, 4 at Claremont, and 41 at Newport.

### NEW ADDITION

The additional appropriation of \$3,000 voted at the 1966 Annual Meeting made it possible to complete the new facilities, purchase some new classroom furniture and folding chairs, install an electric water cooler, and obtain tackboards for all five classrooms.

It was possible to use Title I funds to convert the old kitchen area to a Health Room and to construct bookcases in the former Activity Room to establish a Library facility.

The effectiveness of the overall school program has been greatly improved by the new construction and the renovations.

### PERSONNEL

Arthur Randall was appointed to serve in place of Horace Cragin who was elected as a School Board member but resigned the position.

John Hopkins replaced Francese Newton as School Clerk.

Mrs. Agnes MacKenzie of Croydon is handling the School Lunch Program and Warren Heiser is serving as janitor. Mrs. Alice Bruno is at the school on Friday afternoons for music activities.

### TEACHING STAFF

We were fortunate to fill two teacher vacancies with capable replacements. Miss Jan Bradeen, a graduate of Whitworth College, Spokane, Washington, with previous teaching experience, replaced Mrs. Martha Motes at the Grade 2 and 3 level.

Miss Nancy Hamilton, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, succeeded David Callum in the Social Studies-Science areas in Grades 6, 7, 8.

We are pleased with the performance of the teaching staff and hope the citizens will join with us in urging them to remain.

### TITLE I READING PROJECT

A Reading Improvement Program is in operation. This is financed with federal Title I fund and is being conducted on a 3-day per week basis by Mrs. Elizabeth Barrett, an elementary teacher with considerable experience.

The opportunity for small groups of students to participate in this specialized instruction is bound to improve their overall achievement.

## GOSHEN-LEMPSTER SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The new addition was still in the process of being finished when we moved the eighth grade into the new classroom on April 15, 1966.

Graduation ceremonies for the eighth grade were held in the new activities room. Mr. A. J. Soucy was the featured speaker. Mrs. Nethersole, Chairman of the School Board, presented the diplomas. Mrs. Bruno directed the musical selections, and refreshments were served by the Parent's Club.

Last June examinations and registration of potential first grade pupils were held under the direction of Mr. A. J. Soucy assisted by Mrs. Myrtie Starkey and Mrs. Irene Cain. This also included preliminary registration for those eligible to enroll in the Sullivan County Head Start Summer Program.

By special arrangements with Mr. Soucy, Coordinator for the 1966 Newport Summer School Program in Reading and Mathematics, a number of our students were able to take advantage of these offerings to improve reading and mathematics skills. Mrs. Myrtie Starkey was one of the reading instructors in this summer program.

Fall found us with two new teachers. Miss Jan Bradeen was hired for the 2nd and 3rd grades in place of Mrs. Martha Motes who resigned to take a teaching position nearer her home in Bellows Falls. Mr. David Callum resigned to take a position with the Conservation Department in Vermont, and was replaced by Miss Nancy Hamilton. She is the social studies and science teacher in the departmentalized 6th, 7th, and 8th grades. Mrs. Irene Cain teaches English and mathematics in those grades. We are fortunate in being able to retain the services of Mrs. Hester Morrissey in the 4th and 5th grades and of Mrs. Myrtie Starkey in the vital 1st grade assignment.

Again this year, Superintendent Gordon B. Flint was able to secure Federal money to enable us to hire a part-time reading teacher. Mrs. Elizabeth Barrett with her sympathetic understanding and experience is doing a fine job.

Our Hot Lunch Program is being administered by Mrs. Agnes MacKenzie, assisted by Mrs. Ruth Faulkner. The State Department has written us a very favorable evaluation of her work.

Mrs. Bruno directs the musical activities on Friday afternoons. She directed a Christmas Pantomime featuring songs by soloists and the school chorus. This Christmas program was enjoyed by a capacity audience of parents and friends in our activities room.

Our School Nurse, Mrs. Buck, has been giving eye examinations to our pupils. She arranged for a dental health talk and demonstration by Miss Theodore for the pupils in the whole school.



The Parent's Club sponsored a Dental Health Clinic again this year with Mrs. Newton and Mrs. Wright as Chairmen, and Mrs. Myrtie Starkey as teacher-coordinator. Dr. Houlihan of Claremont is the dentist who cooperates in this effort. Forty-two pupil appointments were made for nine visits to his office. Interested parents furnished transportation.

Late in the summer a Dental Clinic for pre-school children was sponsored by the Parent's Club with the arrangements made by Mrs. Buck, Mrs. Wright, and Mrs. Starkey.

In October we were honored by the visit of three educators from Thailand and their interpreter. They spent part of a morning observing our school facilities and classes, ate at our cafeteria, then at a school-wide assembly, told our children interesting facts about their country, sang their national anthem to us, and answered pupils' questions.

In December, Dr. Harold Pierson of Meredith gave two illustrated talks to the pupils of Grades 4 through 8. His first talk was about the people of Mexico, the second about the Indians of Guatemala. These two school assemblies were arranged by Miss Nancy Hamilton, our social studies teacher.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilber Campbell are again doing an excellent job of safely getting the children to school and back home on time. Mr. Warren Heiser is in charge of keeping our school comfortable and clean.

All of us teachers wish to express our appreciation for the efforts and interest of the members of the School Board, the Parent's Club, Mr. Gordon B. Flint, Mr. A. J. Soucy, Mrs. Buck, and the others who have worked so whole-heartedly for our school.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

---

To the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School Board and the Citizens of Goshen and Lempster, I herewith submit my annual report as School Nurse.

During the school year 1965-66 one hundred and thirty-six vision tests were done. Six children were found to be in need of further eye examination and were checked by family eye specialists. Corrections were made as necessary.

One hundred and thirty-five hearing tests were done. A full scale audiogram was done on seven children. Three were reported to family physicians and no serious loss was found.

One hundred and thirty-five children were weighed, measured, and checked for noticeable health problems by the School Nurse.

Dr. Houlihan of Claremont came to the school and made dental examinations on one hundred and thirty-four children. Twenty-three children attended the Dental Clinics at Dr. Houlihan's office and received treatment. Dr. Houlihan has done a beautiful job with the Dental Clinics for the past several years. We are very grateful to him and to the Goshen-Lempster Parents Club who sponsor this program.

Two children attended the Child Guidance Clinic.

Tuberculin testing was done on children in grades one and four and seven as well as school personnel desiring the test. Three persons reacted to the test and chest X-rays were done. Results were negative.

A series of three Immunization Clinics were held during the year. They were fairly well attended. Immunizations against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, small pox, and poliomyelitis were available. Members of the Parents Club assisted with the record work and the transportation.

The Hot Lunch Program was well patronized by students and school personnel. It is an excellent program.

There were many cases of measles during the early spring of 1966 and also many cases of upper respiratory illness.

On the whole it was a good school year healthwise.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the communities of Goshen and Lempster for the wholehearted support they have always given the School Health Program, the School Board for their interest and support, and the school personnel with whom it has been a pleasure to work.
