# WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING TOWN OF MADBURY March 14, 1950

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday the 14th day of March A. D., 1950 at 11 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles.

- ART. 1. To choose the following town officers:
  - A Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
  - A Selectman for the ensuing three years.
  - A Treasurer for the ensuing year.
  - A Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
  - Two Auditors for the ensuing year.
  - A Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 2. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- ART. 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate for economic advancement of the town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in cooperation with other communities, a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one per cent of assessed valuation, namely \$50.00.

- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$284.60 for Class V Highway to match the sum of \$1,138.38 to be contributed by the State.
- ART. 6. To see what action the Town will take relative to the playing of Beano in the town of Madbury.
- ART. 7. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ART. 8. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

#### RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1949

ARTICLE 1. Balloting for town officers:

For Town Clerk: Edna P. Twombly received 49 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Selectman: Nelson W. Bolstridge received 33 votes; E. E. Dugan, 2; Richard G. Hale, 2; John Fernald, 1; and Daniel W. Hoyt, having received 47 votes was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

For Town Treasurer: Dorothy W. Rogers received 38 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Collector of Taxes: Jess Gangwer received 1 vote, and Fred E. Gerrish having received 37 votes, was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Auditors: Frank Wiggin received 1 vote; Richard G. Hale, 32; and Joseph Cole, 31. Richard G. Hale and Joseph Cole having received a plurality of votes were declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Trustee of Trust Funds: Ernest Colprit received 4 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

Personally appeared the above named officers and in open meeting took the oath of office as prescribed by law.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint all other necessary town officers.

ARTICLE 3. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow up to 50% of the total amount to be raised by taxes this year up to the March meeting in 1950.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to appropriate \$43.00 for the use of the Seacoast Regional Development Association.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to raise \$284.15 for Class V Highways to match the sum of \$1,136.61 to be contributed by the State.

ARTICLE 6. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to set aside space in the southwest section of the Madbury Center School for the Madbury Volunteer Fire Department, adequate to house the fire truck and other fire fighting equipment, now owned or acquired in the future by said department; to permit such alterations in the structure of the building necessary to accomplish this purpose; all expenses incidental thereto to be paid by the Fire Department. Also voted to allow the North School to remain in its present condition for the current year.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to accept the proposed budget and raise the required amount of money. Town budget of \$11,168.15 in addition to \$9,700.73 for the school district voted at school meeting.

ARTICLE 8. The report of the Planning Board was read and approved with a vote of thanks.

E. A. Adams was given a rising vote of thanks in appreciation for his 28 years of service to the town in the office of Selectman.

# REPORT of SUPERINTENDENT of SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

This, my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Madbury, will deal with the following subjects: numbers of Madbury children attending elementary and high schools, school census, transportation, and finances.

Although Madbury operates no schools, there are continual problems of pupil and financial accounting and of attendance and transportation that require considerable time on the part of the School Board and Superintendent.

Madbury children attending public schools in September, 1949 were as follows:

#### TRANSPORTATION

Your School Board has spent considerable time considering ways of rearranging transportation routes or "doubling up" with those of surrounding towns in order to get the most efficient service. The only change that has been made since the last school year was in transporting ten Durham Road children to Dover on the buses that transport Durham high school pupils to Dover; this arrangement, at a rate of fifty cents per pupil per week, eliminates the necessity of an extra vehicle over that area and therefore a decrease in expense to Madbury. It is doubtful if this can be done next year because of an expected increase in the numbers of Durham children. Other routes are covered, as in the past two years, by the Wentworth Bus Lines of Dover.

#### FINANCES

As the Madbury tax payers are well aware, the total school expenses from local sources have increased. This increase is caused largely by the following factors: (1) Loss of state aid for many local school districts including Madbury (2) An increase in the numbers of Madbury children of school age and (3) an increase in high school tuition rates. It seems that tuition rates at Dover High School have kept pace with such rates throughout the state. It is anticipated that there will be an increase of approximately twenty dollars per pupil for next year in the High School and an increase of twenty-five dollars each in the elementary.

As is probably known, the last legislature decreased the amount of State Aid to local school districts from approximately \$2,000,000. to approximately \$400,000. The formula that was specified by the legislature for use in apportioning the comparatively small amount of money throughout the state this year was of 1918 vintage; local

conditions in Madbury have changed as well as have amounts of equalized valuation, number of pupils, etc. elsewhere throughout the state and Madbury therefore got absolutely nothing from the state this year as compared to \$2,755.33 during each of the past two years when the state was distributing \$2,000,000. and to approximately \$500.00 previous to 1947.

As a result of action by the 1949 Legislature, receipts from dog licenses will remain in the town finances rather than be transferred to the school district from now on.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the School Board and other District Officers who have cooperated to make our work effective.

The people of Madbury are to be complimented on their fire record of 1949. Such a record is possible only by extreme care in the elimination of fire hazards around buildings, and full cooperation with the fire department in obtaining permits and careful use of fire in the open.
