



TOWN OF MEREDITH

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Meredith, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, 1949, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Collector of Taxes, Treasurer for one year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and two Library Trustees for three years.

2. To see if the Town will vote to revoke the Town Manager Plan as provided in Chapter 55 of the revised Laws as amended. (By Petition)

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of 1947 Public Acts and Joint Resolutions, Chapter 236, known as "An Act relative to Transference of the Powers and Duties of the Collector of Taxes to the Town Manager in certain cases." (By Petition)

4. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

6. To hear the report of the Budget and act thereon.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise toward defraying the expenses of the Town Library.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Meredith Village Cemetery Association for care and betterment of the cemetery. (By request Meredith Village Cemetery Association)

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise toward the support of the Public Health Nurse.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Laconia Hospital. (By request Laconia Hospital Association)

11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the purchase of two new trucks.

12. To raise such sums of money as will be necessary for repairs of Highways and Bridges—summer maintenance.

13. To raise such sums of money as will be necessary for snow removal and sanding—winter maintenance.

14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Highway Expenses.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$931.22 for Town Road Aid for construction, maintenance, and reconstruction of rural post roads and Class V highways provided the State will set aside \$3,725.28 for this purpose.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for construction of Pease Parade Road to Laconia Line, provided the State will set aside \$16,000.00 for this purpose.

17. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Police Protection.

18. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward the support of the Fire Department.

19. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise toward the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust. (By request State Forester)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$427.00 which is 1/100 of one percent of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. (By request Lakes Region Assn.)

21. To see what action the Town will take relative to the leasing of the Town Hall.

22. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the payment of Old Age Assistance and for the benefit of indigent persons chargeable to the Town of Meredith.

23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward defraying the expenses of Band Concerts for the season of 1949.

24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward the improvement of road on East side of Lake Winnisquam.

25. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve Jenness Hill Road.

26. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve Eaton Avenue in the Village.

27. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve the Moulton Road on Meredith Neck. (By Request)

28. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve Pinnacle Park Road.

29. To see if the Town will vote to take over, maintain and operate the Information Booth; and to see if the Town will vote to raise Seven hundred dollars (\$700) for such maintenance and operation. (By Request)

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to issue bonds in the amount of \$75,000.00 in addition to amount raised on March 8, 1948, to defray the cost of the proposed sewage system.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the account of the Town of Meredith for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer and Tustees of Tust Funds.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets—

Dec. 31, 1947—Dec. 31, 1948:(Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1947 and December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$10,067.25 during the year.

Reconciliation of Change in Financial Condition:

(Exhibit A-1)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-1, with the factors which caused the increase in Net Debt indicated therein.

Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits B and C)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibits B and C. As indicatd by the budget summary (Exhibit C), a net revenue surplus of \$2,364.44, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,394.00, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$970.44.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1948, showing annual maturities of principal and interest, is contained in Exhibit J.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit D)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit D. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1948, is indicated in Exhibit D-1.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all Town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of records. Receipts were checked by source insofar as

possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depositary banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the collector's records.

General Comments

The accounts and records of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual Town Report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Meredith for their assistance during the course of the audit.

MANAGER'S REPORT

It is the desire of the manager to give you in a few words a resume of what has been carried on by the Town during the past year.

This is the first year under the manager plan. The Town has only operated for seven and one half months under the plan in 1948. The manager took office on May 17th. The first several months of course were spent in getting familiar with Meredith, town employees, officials and problems facing the town. With four and one half months already gone by, of necessity certain sums of money had already been spent or allocated.

During the year the Town reconstructed several miles of roads, which were authorized by Town Meeting in 1948. The Pease Road was completed to the intersection of the Parade Road. The Parking Area at Lovejoy Sands was completed except for the surfacing which will be done this spring. The Wharf at Lovejoy Sands was under construction at the end of the year and will probably be finished by the time this report has been printed. During the fall months some work was carried on at Leavitt Park. Several hundred feet of beach was made available by the use of a bulldozer and the town grader. This park is being used more each year and this additional beach space will help a great deal. There is adequate parking space available now for at least fifty cars. Further plans are being made to enlarge the park and offer more to the people.

On the administrative side of the picture, certain changes have been made in keeping the Town financial records. This was done to give a more accurate picture of the Town finances and a clearer breakdown of the cost. It will allow for a closer control over expenditures. At the present time other town records are being revised so we may have a complete picture of all town activities.

This report has been brief of necessity, but together with the balance of the Town Report, will give a complete picture of what has been carried on throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year has been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these mancaused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 4th day of March, 1949, at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

3 (a) To choose another member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred five dollars (\$105.00) for liability insurance on the school buildings and school employees.

10. To see how much the District will vote to raise and appropriate for resurfacing the playground at the Lang street school.

11. To see if the District will elect to approve of the inclusion of its employees (other than teachers) in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by chapter 27-A of the Revised laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF MEREDITH ANNUAL

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING - MARCH 5, 1948

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p. m. by Moderator Arthur F. Pottle. Following prayer by Rev. John A. Morrison, the call to the meeting was read by the Moderator.

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year. Dr. Arthur F. Pottle was nominated as Moderator and Clerk cast one ballot for same. Dr. Pottle was then sworn in by the Clerk.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year. The motion was made and seconded that the Moderator cast one ballot for Herberta T. Stark as Clerk. The ballot was cast and the Clerk assumed office.
- Article 3. To choose two Members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Bradbury Sprague, Jesse Allen and Jane Ambrose were nominated to fill two offices on the School Board for three years. After considerable discussion as to proper balloting it was voted to ballot separately on the two offices. This was declared illegal and it was then voted that the ballots be cast bearing two of the three candidates' names. Tellers appointed were Earle Welch, Donald Weeks and Amy Gordon. 92 ballots were cast with Jane Ambrose receiving 75, Bradbury Sprague 70 and Jesse Allen 36.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year. Cordelia Berquest and Marion Chase were nominated for the post of Treasurer. Nominations closed. Mrs. Berquest asked to have her name withdrawn. Upon vote of the assembly the Clerk cast one ballot for Marion Chase. Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Moved and seconded that all salaries be the same as in former years. Voted.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Robert Prescott read the report of the State Auditors. The question was raised if Mr. Prescott's report was the same as that appearing in the printed School Report. He replied that the totals were the same but the Auditors' report was not broken into such detail as that in the printed report, and noted that an error was evidenced. Sedley Bartlett questioned the reports. Mr. Welch pointed out several errors on almost every item printed. Mrs. True Godfrey also spoke on the several errors. Various members of the School Board attempted to explain. It was moved and seconded that the published report not be accepted and that the School Board make a correct report within 30 days to the voters of the District and publish same. An amendment motion that the corrected report be posted in several public places and printed in the Meredith News was voted down. The motion was then voted.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

Laid on the table.

Article 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.

Mr. Nedeau explained the budget item by item. It was moved that the District should raise the amount recommended in the 1948-49 budget but that the budget (next year) should be reduced by any excess amount received by the School Board. Voted.

- Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred sixty-five dollars (\$765.00) to obtain additional insurance coverage on buildings owned by the school district. Voted to raise \$765. for additional insurance coverage on school property.
- Article 10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-nine hundred dollars (\$2900.) to employ an additional teacher in the primary grades at the Lang street school and to provide suitable temporary quarters for one class from this school.

Moved and seconded that the sum of \$2900. be raised for an additional teacher in the primary grades and to provide temporary quarters for one class, the decision as to such be left to the discretion of the School Board to provide the best and cheapest quarters available to take care of the situation. Voted.

Article 11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to sell or otherwise dispose of the building adjoining the Lang Street School playground and formerly used for a nursery school.

Voted to authorize School Board to sell or dispose of building adjoining the Lang Street School playground.

Article 12. (By request). To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to sell the Meredith Neck School house.

Voted that the Meredith Neck School house be sold at auction to the highest bidder by the Board.

Article 13. To see if the District will authorize the appointment of a special committee consisting of two members of the School Board appointed by the Board; one member of the Board of Selectmen, appointed by them, and two other legal voters of the District appointed by the Moderator to consider the feasibility of forming a cooperative secondary school district and to report to the District at its next annual meeting its findings, including building requirements, program of studies, capital investment, operational costs of such a district and such other matter as may be deemed material.

Moved that a committee be appointed to study cooperative school district, to report at next annual meeting. Mr. Nedeau explained briefly about this. Voted.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Moved that the 1948-49 Auditors certificate be included in the report to be given by the School Board. And that a committe's or the State auditor's report be given. Voted.

Moved that budget next year be shown in comparative form and that this method be followed thereafter. Voted.

Article 7 deemed to require no action.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The Little Folks Are Coming

A year ago we reported that there were 39 pupils in the first grade at the Lang street school. This year's report shows 44. Through the cooperation and support of the Parent-Teacher Association, the money for an extra teacher was voted at the 1948 district meeting and with this help we have been able to eliminate the over-crowding in the first and second grades. Mrs. Margaret Upham of Plymouth was engaged to teach a class consisting of some from the first grade and some from grade two. Thus the first two grades are divided into three groups of about 25 pupils each, which makes it possible for each pupil to get more of the teacher's time for individual help so much needed by young children.

The problem which faced us at the beginning of last summer's vacation was how to accommodate seven teachers and their classes in six classrooms. After careful consideration of the possible locations in town, it was decided to put the sixth grade class into a basement room at the Lang street school where lunches have heretofore been served. For a lunch room, we are making use of the assembly and activity room which hitherto was used as a library and for band rehearsals as well as an indoor playroom on rainy days. The band and other music classes seemed to be crowded out entirely, until finally we were able to secure the use of the Baptist vestry on High street two days each week for music classes.

We are not proud of the arrangements made. Our basement classroom used by the sixth grade is too small, ventilation is unsatisfactory, and it has only four small windows. The one advantage is a larger and more convenient dining room, making it possible to serve meals to all who desire them.

If the present trend toward increased enrollment continues, as seems very likely, we may find it necessary by September, 1950, to employ eight teachers for the Lang street school instead of seven. Where to put another class and teacher is the "\$64." question. It would be a mistake to build another addition on the present school, because our playground there is adequate for only about one-fifth of our present enrollment.

Some consideration has been given to the use of the Bixby house adjoining the Lang street school, but we find it is not suitable for school use. It has no basement and any plan for its remodeling and heating would cost more than it is worth, and still we would have the same playground problem.

Elementary School Program

During the past year the teachers and principal of Lang street school have continued to work on the assumption that a school is for the benefit of the children. Therefore everything that takes place should in some measure further the following purposes of elementary education: (a) to establish normal attitudes of mind and control emotions, and to develop a sound body; (b) to develop an understanding of social relationships and ability to get along with others; (c) to develop individual talents and abilities as completely as possible; (d) to cultivate habits of accurate thinking, and a thorough knowledge of the "three R's", and (e) to develop appreciation for and desire to seek beauty in its many forms.

The program of testing and individual pupil-teacherparent-principal conferences has been continued with good results in many cases. Increased attention has been given to selection of the proper textbook for the individual regardless of the grade of the child. Reading books have been chosen which follow one another without bringing in too many new words at a time. Much stress has been placed on the study of the sounds of the letters. Mr. Bragg, the principal, has continued work with special groups and in the development of a physical education program.

A new avenue of learning, the radio, has been undertaken by grade six. Three times a week they listen to programs of news, world neighbors and music, all of which are prepared for schools. For this, a new RCA radio-phonograph has been purchased with money earned by the pupils and teachers. This will be used also for music appreciation as soon as the course can be set up.

New equipment of special note is a Rex-ograph liquid process duplicator for the office facilitating school paper work greatly. Also a new Compton's Picture Encyclopedia has been recently added to the library. As there were no reference books in the library, this is a needed piece of equipment.

Our greatest need at Lang street school is the improvement and enlargement of the playground. Making it larger seems a possibility, and has been suggested before; but even the little space we have can be improved by resurfacing to eliminate the dust and mud.

School Marks

One of the commonest complaints that people bring to the superintendent and school board is that their children are not getting good marks, and they often blame the teacher. It would seem that any teacher who is willing to give pupils A's and B's, whether they have earned them or not, is considered a good teacher. On the other hand, most of us older persons can remember some one teacher who was really a severe marker but who taught us more than many others who were more lenient. The really important question for parents is—Are my children learning and gaining more power? Instead of,—Do they get A's and B's?

Some educational writers advocate dispensing with school marks altogether. Perhaps this would be a good thing. But parents seem to expect them and pupils will work hard to get better marks. I do feel strongly that a teacher should not be blamed if a pupil's marks are low. The chances are she is really teaching more than some teachers who take the easy road to give Johnny and Marie an A just because they tried hard, whether they understood the work or not.

Cooperative School Districts

The problem of over-crowded schools is not confined to Meredith. The committee created by vote of the district last year to investigate the possibility of cooperative districts in this area has invited school board members from nearby towns to meet and discuss the problem with them. From all directions the same report was heard. The little ones keep coming in and we have not room to teach them.

One solution to the problems of all these districts might be the formation of a cooperative district for high school purposes and the construction of a central high school which would take care of all secondary pupils in this area. This would mean that Meredith High School as a separate institution would no longer exist but it would be merged into a larger regional high school along with one or two other small schools in this section of the state. The building facilities now used for high school purposes in all these towns might then become available for the increased number of grade children so they could be adequately housed for some years to come.

This is a very radical proposal and it may not turrn out to be the right or reasonable thing to do. The only alternative, however, that I can see is the construction of additional elementary buildings in the various towns that they may provide room for the little ones who keep coming in. Then, if we in Meredith do have to build a new primary school in 1950 or 1951, how will we care for the larger group that will be ready for high school six or eight years later?

New Hampshire Legislative Program

Several fundamental changes in our school laws for New Hampshire are under consideration in the 1949 legislature. Among these are (a) continued state aid, with some increase for certain towns so good schools can be maintained without excessive tax rate; (b) a law permitting higher rates for tuition so high schools will not be forced to continue to accept tuition pupils at less than cost; (c) state aid for transportation of high school pupils; (d) some state aid for new school buildings, and (e) encouragement for formation of cooperative school districts in various areas of the state.

It seems likely that a program of Federal aid to help pay for new construction, as well as current expenses of schools, may be voted by the present Congress. The uncertainty as to what changes will be made in school laws at this time makes it advisable to postpone plans for new construction or forming of larger cooperative districts for another year at least. Let us find out where we are going before we start—and let us try to plan a long-range program as far as possible, facing the increased enrollments that are expected in Meredith as well as in the state and nation as a whole.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

I present herewith my third annual report as Headmaster of Meredith High School for the year ending December 31, 1948

Comparative Standing of High Schools

Inquiries are frequently made regarding the standing of Meredith High School in comparison with those of other towns and cities. Statements are sometimes made that Meredith High School ranks so and so in respect to other high schools in New Hampshire.

There never have been any available facts upon which any reliable opinion can be based as to the relative standing of the various high schools in cities and towns. Success or failure of a school, as well as an individual, may be a matter of personal opinion and cannot be measured with any mathematical precision. Real and valid comparison of Meredith High School with other high schools has never been possible, except in the matter of per capita costs.

School systems may be particularly judged by their success in preparing pupils for higher education, by results in achievement tests, from per capita expenditures for textbooks, supplies and teachers' salaries, by the professional training of its teaching staff, and per capita value of school plants.

Meredith High School has the privilege of certifying its pupils to any college which grants the certification privilege. The school is rated "A" by the State Department of Education and is classified as an approved high school. The sound preparation of our graduates is shown by their success in college and other institutions of higher learning.

The real test of any organization is the quality of its product. So, at Meredith High School, the real test is the quality of the child which the school produces. This type of outcome is largely intangible. It consists of such qualities as cooperation, courtesy, neatness, effort, self-control, promptness, respect for property, emotional stability, and proper health habits. Yet their development does have an important place at Meredith High School. Visitors at the school often comment favorably on the attitude of our pupils. We feel justified in believing that the school is doing commendable work, that it is returning full value for the investment made to it, and that it deserves the confidence of the community.

Report of Progress

I wish to bring to your attention some of the major changes that have taken place during the past year.

SCHEDULE: With the opening of school in September a revised time schedule was placed in operation which provides among other things six class recitation periods, four of 60 minute duration and two of 50 minutes, and an activities period on Wednesday and Thursday of each week. The six-period day with 50 or 60 minute periods solves many scheduling difficulties and increases learning efficiency. With the coperation of students, teachers and parents it was possible to shorten the lunch period from 60 to 45 minutes and the school day from 3:35 p. m. to 3:10 p. m. This schedule has proven beneficial to all concerned; it allows pupils to work after school hours; it provides more time for athletics and more time for pupils to take part in outside activities.

The activities which meet on Wednesday and Thursday of each week are Band, Glee Club, Girls' Shop, Bachelors' Club (Boys Cooking Class), Ski Club, Pinnacle Commercial Club, Personal Typing, Hi-Y Club, Intramural basketball for boys and girls, and Driver Training. During this time set aside for these activities, the pupils do not have any formal classes but may, if they wish, join any of the above activities.

The gradual but definite development of the idea that high school is more than preparation for college and that good secondary school training means infi-

nitely more than a mastery of the content of textbooks, has put emphasis upon many forms of activity in the school which are not taught in organized classes. To a great extent the primary difference between these out-of-class activities and the regular class work is in the breaking down of specific subject matter patterns and in providing for the uniting of freshman and sophomores, junion and confors in groups controlled by similarity of interests rather than academic classification. These activities may supplement the home, prepare for life's work, develop special talents, train in cooperation, develop personality, and train for citizenship.

The aims of these activilies are (1) to secure general participation of the pupils in the form of social life suited to their interests and capacities (2) to develop social ideals and habits of conduct in conformity with the highest standards (3) to discover and develop capacities for leadership (4) to develop in all habits of responsibility either as leaders or as members of a group.

REPORT CARD: Another important development has occurred in the field of school's report to the home. The teachers working through a committee, have, after much study, adopted a revised report card which they feel will enable the school to provide the parent with a more complete picture of the individual's progress in his school work. The new card, larger than that formerly in use, is of the folded type and attractive in appearance. In addition to reporting the pupil's standing in his several subjects the revised card makes provision for reporting his attitude towards his work in the subject. This we feel is an important factor to success in school. A separate portion of the card is set aside in which to report the pupil's attendance and tardiness record for each marking period. This six week report is being supplemented between report card periods by a special report to the parents in the form of a warning letter. This warning letter serves to inform the parent of the pupil's unsatisfactory progress in the subject and urges a conference with the teacher in an effort to improve the condition. As of

this writing, the warning letter has been most gratifying. As we continue to use it, I hope that it will not only serve to raise the quality of individual performance, but be instrumental in bringing the home and school closer together.

In keeping with current practice a five division letter scale is employed. Attitude marks are reported by means of a four point number scale. The final page of the new card contains a message to parents from the teachers. All parents should read this message carefully for it indicates ways in which the home and the school can work together to secure the fullest development possible, of the pupil.

A unique feature has been the preparation of a Special Teacher Report which the subject teacher may use to supplement the mark itself, especially, in those cases where the work has been of a failing quality. This report was devised and made a part of the home report in the belief that this added comment from the teacher would be of value to the parents in discussing with his boy or girl reasons for the failing or unsatisfactory work. The new card, incorporating as it does, the best in current practice in the matter of home reports at the public secondary level, is an achievement in which teachers and patrons of the school may well take considerable pride.

Student Activities

STUDENT COUNCIL: Once again the Student Council has been organized. It is composed of two representatives from each of the four upper classes. They have been instrumental in planning and putting into operation, rules, and regulations for the use of the gymnasium and also the arrangement of classes at assemblies. It serves as a means for securing student opinion on matters of school interest and it is hoped that it will continue to play an increasingly important role in the life of the school.

ASSEMBLIES: One of the major decisions to be made by all young people is that of choosing a vocation or career. In the past young people have received from their high school little vocational information and guidance. The selection of a life's work was left largely to chance with the result that many individuals went through life doing a job for which they had no aptitude or liking.

Today it is agreed that one of the major objectives of secondary education is that of guiding youth into the vocation to which they are best adapted. Success in the fulfilment of this objective can contribute greatly to the future happiness and prosperity of the in dividuals.

In order to more completely acquaint Meredith High School students with opportunities and qualifications needed for success in various careers, career assemblies have been scheduled during the school year. Some of these assemblies will be on Law, Salesmanship, Art, Science, Medicine, Home Economics, Agriculture, Fashion Modeling, Radio, Aviation, Secretaral Work, Engineering, Nursing and Journalism.

Each speaker will present to the student the facts about a career including the general information, the training, the nature of the job, and the rewards availble.

If these "Career Assemblies" prove to be successful, they will become an annual event at Meredith High, and thus make it possible for a student to learn a great deal about many careers in his four years of high school. Information gained from these talks on various careers will, it is believed, greatly aid in a more intelligent selection of a life's work.

ATHLETICS: Athletics continue to be the major extra-curricula activity of the school. Having lost several strong players through graduation, our boy's basketball team is now in the process of building for years to come. We may expect a fair season for next year but should look forward to banner years in the years that follow.

As I have observed our athletic program, the thing that has impressed me most has been the number of boys and girls who go out for this sport. Over 22 boys are now engaged in basketball and this is a school that has but 43 boys in grades 9 - 12! The picture is even more impressive in girls' basketball, with 30 of the 61 girls in the school engaging in this activity.

While it is gratifyng to have so many turn out for athletics, it nevertheless taxes our available facilities to the utmost and presents somewhat of a problem in providing adequate time for instruction and practice for all, especially since this is an activity that is carried on after school. With the cooperation of the two coaches, an afternoon practice schedule has been drawn up which insures an equitable sharing of the gymnasium by both boys and girls and thus avoids evening practice.

Meredith High School is classified as a "Class C" school by the N. H. State Athletic Association. This means that the school has less than 51 boys enrolled. If the school had more than 51 boys enrolled we would be classified as a "Class B" school. This athletic classification, which appears in many newspapers, should not be confused with the "Class A" rating that is awarded to us by the State Department of Education.

DRIVER EDUCATION: Meredith High School is again fortunate to have a course in Driver Training. This course is intensive and thorough. Two periods a week of classroom work precede and follow actual driver instruction. The student knows what makes the car "tick" before he is allowed to operate it. In actual driving, four students are taken out at a time, each driving a 15 minute turn at the wheel while others sit back and listen to instructions.

The car is loaned by Pynn's Garage and is returned at the end of the course. The School District pays for only gas, oil and insurance.

RADIO BROADCASTS: Every Tuesday from 4:00 to 4:05 p. m. and 5:00 to 5:15 p. m. students from Meredith High School take part in a radio program from Station WLNH in Laconia.

A radio program is hard work, but it is a lot of fun, and there is a great deal of satisfaction in it. The students are very enthusiastic and really work hard;

these students are willing to stay after school hours to work on a script. The radio program brings about growth, ingenuity, interest and cooperation of the boys and girls. Their self-forgetfulness and teamwork in the interest of a perfect production is really amazing.

Adult Education

Education begins with birth and continues to the grave. Every good school system should give some consideration to educational possibilities beyond the elementary and high school levels.

Adults should have an opportunity for education. This has been provided during this school year by offering such courses as typewriting and stenography, dressmaking and woodworking. The adults who have participated in these adventures have been enthusiastic about these classes. We hope that we will be able to continue these worthwhile services to the community.

Cheerleader Tournament

One of the major events of the year to be held at Meredith was the first cheerleading tournament in the State of New Hampshire. This tournament brought together eleven Central New Hampshire high school cheerleader teams. This affair was an outstanding success. We hope that this will become an annual event but the only disappointing note about the tournament was accommodation. The high school gym cannot and will not be able to accommodate an audience of 300 persons.

Probably the town should reconsider the building of an extension to the high school gym. If our basketball team has a banner year later on and we continue this cheerleading tournament, attendance might become so large that we will not be able to accommodate. The publicity received from such affairs would pay, in a few years, for such an extension to the gym.

Conclusion

The teachers and pupils of Meredith High School join me in appreciation of your constant support, your enthusiastic interest in our activities, and the generosity you display when we call upon you, collectively and individually for assistance.

SCHOOL NURSE'S ANNUAL REPORT

One child was taken to Laconia Hospital for a T & A and brought home the next day.

Seven children were taken to Dr. Oliver in Laconia for eye examinations.

One child was taken to Mr. Hammond in Laconia for glasses.

Three children were taken to the Hitchcock Clinic in Hanover for eye examinations.

One child was taken to Laconia Hospital for a chest X-ray and blood count.

A Child Health Conference was held for pre-school children. Complete physical examinations were given by Dr. Turley. Thirty-six children attended and 27 were innoculated.

Eyes were tested in the first six grades and part of the high school.

All the pupils in school were weighed and measured.

A dental clinic was held for the first and second grades by Dr. Deneault. Work was completed on thirteen children.

A dental clinic was held for the fourth grade by Dr. Pottle. Work was completed on seventeen children.

Hearing tests were done on all of the pupils. Five pupils were found to have defective hearing.

One pupil was taken to the T. B. Clinic in Laconia.

Physical examinations were completed on the children of the first three grades, forty-three pupils at the High School, and the children at Meredith Center.

The children in the first eight grades have taken codliver oil tablets daily. There are still many cases of pediculosis in the schools.

The cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, the teachers and the parents has been much appreciated.
