THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges and make appropriations of the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid to be expended on the Robie Road, so called, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,379.00 for the same, the State contributing \$2,379.00, or if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$719.91, the State contributing \$2,879.65 for construction of Class V highways.

5. To see how much money the Town will raise for Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.

6. To see how much money the Town will raise for Old Home Day and make appropriation for the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the Laconia Hospital to be used for the care of needy residents of the Town.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of old cemeteries.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deeds

12. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to maintain the new calcium chloride topped roads built last fall.

14. By request. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other Towns in the Lakes Region.

15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to building an addition in the Town House for a stage and kitchen and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

school board's budget for the ensuing year and raise and
appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the district will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

11. To act upon any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of New Hampton:—

For several years, New Hampton has maintained six schools scattered from the Bristol to Ashland town lines. Three of these schools have had from eight to 12 pupils. In September, because of the small number of pupils to attend, the Sanborn school was closed for the present year, the pupils being entered in the Bristol schools. None of these pupils have to be transported so the town is saved about \$500.00.

The two other small schools, "Plaisted and Hannaford," at the present time have larger enrollments than last year. The "Old Institution School" is much overcrowded. This school building is not a large one, but it has the largest enrollment of any school in town. All available seating space is taken and there are about one third more pupils in the room than should be.

The "Fiske" and "Village" schools maintain about the same number of pupils from year to year—from 20 to 25. The school buildings are kept in good repair. Each school is fairly well equipped with school books and necessary supplies, but not with reference books. The modern methods of teaching require much reading reference material, for schools are teaching today, not only what is found in the few pages of their school text book, but much more from newspapers, magazines, encyclopædias, and sets of reference books, like "The Book of Knowledge," "Comptons," and the "World Book," each set having from ten to twenty volumes, is too expensive a proposition for the average town to consider. The library cooperates with the schools splendidly in sending out its selection of reference books to each school. This service is much appreciated and a

great help to teachers and pupils. Of much greater help, however, would be the more extensive reference books similar to those mentioned above.

The per pupil cost for education in the six schools in New Hampton last year was \$103.65, not including tuition costs for elementary pupils in out-of-town schools. This seems high as the median cost for the whole state was \$81.07. There are 39 towns in the state paying more than New Hampton. The highest per pupil cost in any town is \$313.10; the lowest \$49.76.

New Hampton is paying for its public school education \$7.64 for every \$1,000 of its equalized valuation. There are only 32 towns in the state paying less; 208 towns paying more.

Because of the extended illness of the former school nurse, Miss Nelson, it became necessary for the district to engage another. Miss Ruth Allen has been acting as school nurse since September last. Her work is very satisfactory and her very pleasing way of dealing with the children is especially worthy of praise.

The only change in teachers this year is at the "Fiske School." Mrs. Ellen Pillsbury of Sutton succeeded Mrs. Jennie Bartlett who resigned to accept a position in Sanbornton.

The graduating exercises of the 8th grade pupils last June was a very successful and pleasing affair. Much credit is due our music supervisor, Mrs. Adams, and the teachers and pupils who so faithfully worked together for its success.

May I call attention of parents intending to send their children to some high school, that they should notify the School Board before doing so. It is embarrassing to the Board to estimate in the budget, the amount of high school tuition needed for a certain number and then afterwards learn of pupils attending a high school of whom they had no knowledge.

Parents should also remember that a town is liable for tuition only to the amount of the average tuition paid in the state: any amount above that the parent is liable for. Also the parent is liable for the full amount of tuition in a high school out of state, as it is illegal for the town to pay such tuition. If these facts are remembered, it will relieve the Board from much unwarranted criticism.

The work done in the schools the past year has been quite satisfactory. Very few children had to repeat their year's work. The teachers have worked faithfully and conscientiously and I trust their work is appreciated in the community.

I desire to express my appreciation for the consideration given me by the School Board in the early part of the school year when my health did not permit of the weekly service I had previously been able to give to the schools.

I also appreciate the continuation of the very pleasant relations existing between school board, teachers and superintendent.
