The County, Town & Minister's Taxes) in specie Lawfull Money of said State. And you are hereby further required to pay into the Treasury of said County of Rockingham. The sum of Eight Pounds, Eight Shillings ~~and~~ like money of the Tax in your said List entitled "County Tax" - at the following times Vizt. The one half thereof on or before the first day of September next - and the remainder, on or before the first day of January next (it being Newington's proportion of the County Tax for S. year 1792) And the residue or remainder to Ballance the said County List, or Rate Roll, and the full amount & Sum Total of the other two Taxes in the two last Columns of Taxes. Substant to the Title "Town Tax - Minister's Tax"

Being and meaning the whole of the foregoing Taxes. - except the Eight Pounds Eight Shillings aforesaid - on, or before the first Tuesday of January next, unless you are to pay to the Selectmen of Newington aforesaid for the time being or their Successors in said Office. And if any Person, or Persons refuse, or neglect to pay his Her- or Their Tax, or Taxes - being by you thereto Legally required - Then you are to take them by Distraint - as the Laws of this State direct for the purpose of collecting Rates and Taxes, made and provided in Which Laws you are to observe for the direction of your Proceedings relative Hereto.

Hereof Fail not - and for your doing all which this shall be your Sufficient Warrant.

SELECTMEN'S LETTER

Construction was started on two plants this year which, when completed, will greatly increase our taxable inventory. The new Public Service Company generating station on Gosling Road will be in operation in 1974 and the P. F. Avery Company plant being built on the former Heavner property is scheduled for completion this fall.

Beginning with a conference with Senator Thomas McIntyre last spring, we have had many meetings with Air Force representatives in an effort to obtain an easement through Pease Air Force Base so that we can construct a road connecting the north and south sections of town which have been separated ever since the air base was built.

Dealing with a Federal Government agency such as the Air Force can be agonizingly slow and an exercise in frustration. However, we have reached the point where there is no serious objection to the easement by the Air Force and the principal job remaining is to route the road so that it will not interfere with the present or future mission of the base.

Over the years the town has attempted on several occasions to get permission for a connecting road with no success and without being able to generate much sympathy for our problem. The greatly improved spirit of cooperation shown recently by the Air Force can only be attributed to the continued efforts of Senator McIntyre and his staff and to the frequent editorial comment of the Portsmouth Herald which have served to remind the government that the reunion of the town is long overdue. We have high hopes that the road can be built sometime this year.

We were unable to complete the library addition this year because the bids received were all too high by more than \$10,000. However, by modifying the plans and

specifications we feel that we can construct the addition for the amount of money appropriated last year plus an additional \$3,000 which is provided for in the budget.

The reproductions inside the front cover and on the rear foldout are taken from the Selectmen's Journal of 1792 to 1803. We thought you would be interested in seeing this sample from one of the first town reports which we plan to have on display in the Civic Center at a future date.

ACTION TAKEN ON WARRANT ARTICLES TOWN MEETING, MARCH 10-11, 1970

Article 1. Election of Town Officials.

Article 2. Voted to leave care and maintenance of town lands and buildings to discretion of selectmen.

Article 3. Voted to authorize selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired or to be acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

Article 4. Voted to authorize the selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes at a rate not to exceed the current bank rate.

Article 5. Authorized treasurer, with approval of selectmen, to appoint a deputy treasurer.

Article 6. Voted to exclude from OASI Social Security Agreement services of election workers.

Article 7. Voted to establish a town Conservation Commission and appropriate \$1,000 which sum or part thereof may be placed in a conservation fund and allowed to accumulate from year to year or be expended by the commission for conservation purposes.

Article 8. Voted to authorize the selectmen to appoint a Highway Safety Committee.

Article 9. Amendment to budget — voted that money appropriated for aluminum sash for Meeting House be used instead for wooden sash replacement. Budget then approved.

Article 10. Town Clerk report on election of town officers.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

During the past year the Planning Board met each month at either a regular or work meeting, and in some cases more often. In addition, several public hearings were on the agenda and the attendance at and participation in, these meetings by so many interested townspeople is acknowledged with appreciation.

This year has seen several new additions to our Industrial Zone; namely, C-E Avery Co., Public Service Co., and the First National Bank of Portsmouth.

Also, by your vote, two parcels of land were transferred from the Industrial Zone to the Business and Commercial Zone.

In giving our citizens this annual report on library activities in our 78th year, it is with sorrow that we record the death of two members of our board of trustees:

On *July 22, 1970* — Trustee Treasurer *Mrs. Margaret Pickering*, who served the best interests of Langdon Library so faithfully and ably for many years as its trustee and treasurer, giving freely of herself, her time and her talents.

On *January 2, 1971* — Trustee *Mrs. Jane C. Gemler*, who served faithfully and well during the short period of time allotted her since her election to office in March, 1970. Always willing to do all she could and to give ideas for future planning.

The trustees hope you will make note of the changes in Library Hours. You will notice that we have extended Winter hours to 6 p.m. (instead of the present 5 p.m. closing) on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.

There is more of a change in the 12 weeks Summer hours schedule, as we have also added Monday — 1 to 5 p.m. (not a library day previously during the summer). Due to many requests we have also added an opening *Evening Hours* on *Wednesday* from 6 to 9 p.m. (*June 14 to Sept. 8*).

The trustees are grateful for the notes and petition received in answer to their appeal to the townspeople for

their ideas and wishes regarding Library hours for 1971. We welcomed their interest and thank them for it. We hope the Students will find that extra hour to 6 p.m. helpful to them, and that it will prove a convenience to others for a quick visit after work or on the way home from work. We will be watching with interest to see how well these hours work out.

As the townspeople have seen, our plans for building Phase 1 of the Library Addition during 1970 were not fulfilled. To our disappointment it took much longer for blueprints to reach Town Office than we expected, and to our dismay when the bids were opened they were all at least \$10,000 over the Town-approved money for Library Construction.

Members of the old building committee met with Architect Mr. T. Eagle to discuss the blueprints. Nothing could be eliminated, so the additional funds would have to be requested at the Budget Committee Meeting and then for approval by townspeople at the Town Meeting. Plan remains the same as in last year's Annual Report.

The Children's room experienced problems from ice on roof and water leakage after our heavy snowfall.

This year saw the completion of our much-needed cataloging by our librarian, Mrs. Marjorie Pickering.

The many and varied library and branch services were again used by all ages from preschool to adult. Grade and High School students made good use of our librarians' willingness and ability to help them when seeking reference materials for school work from our large selection of books and magazines. The trustees appreciate the excellent and efficient work of Librarian Mrs. Marjorie Pickering and her Asst. Librarian Mrs. Margherita Mazeau and we commend them for another year of close cooperation.

Our librarian has tried to give our patrons the desired reading material in books purchased for the library; books

borrowed from the Bookmobile and individually borrowed books from the State Library.

There was a good, well-rounded selection of records for our patrons; a fine film program; many new books — reference, nonfiction and fiction; a good variety of periodicals; and those greatly appreciated Bookmobile books.

For Children's Book Week, Nov. 15-21, Trustee Mrs. Barbara Myers placed on display in library a very interesting collection of her dolls, representing characters in children's books. A gift of bookmarks was received for the children explaining care of books and outline of Dewey Decimal System.

This year's Memory book for Mrs. Florence C. Watson from her Memory Book Fund is "Pictorial History of the Smithsonian Institution" by Robert B. Widder.

Memory book for Mrs. Margaret Pickering is "Eastern Frontier: Settlement of Northern New England" by Charles Clark from Tom & Frances Heavner. Memory book for Mrs. Jane C. Gemler from the City College Club of Portsmouth is still to be selected.

Our thanks to the generous donors of many gift books, paperbacks, papers, magazines and records: Doris Beane, Dorothy Brooks, Maisee Burpee, the City College Club of Portsmouth, N.H., O. OLD PARSONAGE

The Newington Historical Society has moved ahead this year into a seven month schedule with meetings held in October, November, March, April, May as well as keeping the Old Parsonage open to visitors on Saturday afternoons during July and August. It has been found that there is considerable interest in the Parsonage among people living out of town; and even with very limited publicity last summer, there were visitors every day the building was opened. The "Children's Corner" and the "What-Is-It?" cabinet in the museum room have been very popular, and the Society is anxious to add to both Collections.

TOWN WARRANT
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newington in the County of Rockingham and Said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Newington Civic Center in said Town on Tuesday the Ninth Day of March next, 1971, to act upon Articles 1 and 2.

The Polls will open at Ten O'Clock A.M. and unless extended by vote at the meeting will close at Six O'Clock P.M. The Town Meeting will resume at 7:30 P.M. to act upon ensuing articles.

Article 1. To choose in the manner provided by law: 1 selectman for a term of 3 years; 1 trustee of trust funds for a term of 3 years; 3 library trustees for terms of 1 year, two years and three years respectively; 1 member of cemetery committee for 3 years; a town clerk, collector of taxes, town treasurer, highway agent, auditors, chief of police, building inspector; to choose measurers of wood, surveyors of lumber, fence viewers, pound keeper and any other officials required by law to be chosen by vote.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to adopt the changes to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to leave the care and maintenance of town lands and buildings to the discretion of the selectmen.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired or to be acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes at a rate not to exceed the current bank rate.

Article 6. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$500 as provided in the budget to extend the services of the Portsmouth District Nursing Association to the Town of Newington.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a special unpaid committee to be known as the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee, such committee to meet with representatives of the City of Portsmouth and other

nearby towns to study the advisability of establishing a Regional Refuse Disposal District and perform such further duties as may be authorized by statute.

Article 8. To see if the town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1000 as provided in the budget for the expenses of the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee.

Article 9. (By recommendation of Highway Safety Committee). To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken at the March 1951 Annual Town Meeting providing for the election of the Chief of Police by ballot with the other town officials, and return to the prior method of selecting the Chief of Police through appointment by the Board of Selectmen as provided by Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 105, Section 1.

Article 10. To hear the report of the budget committee and to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for all town expenditures in the year ensuing as included in the budget.

Article 11. To hear the report of the town clerk on the election of town officers.

Article 12. To transact such other business as may legally come before the meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEWINGTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During the past year representatives of the Conservation Commission and Planning Board attended the Annual Congress of New England Conservation Commissions at Bedford, New Hampshire. During the two-day Congress, it was noted that border towns of Rockingham County have undergone more rapid population growth, with resultant new housing developments, than any other county in the northeastern states. In the affected areas there has been an increasing degree of land transfers by large land owners to Conservation Easements. This trend has been brought about by political re-alignments in the border town governments when new-comers have caused higher property reassessments, which have brought financial hardships on long-time and elderly owners of farm and forest lands who have been unable to meet sudden increases in property tax burdens. The Conservation Easement transfers ownership to the town Conservation Commission in perpetuity for conservation, wild life propagation and local recreational purposes. It removes the land from the property tax rolls and keeps it from being forced on the real estate market.

As a result of these and other pressures, conservation and environmental commissions have sprung to life throughout the state. There are now 110 city and town Conservation Commissions. A state-wide association of such commissions was formed at the Bedford Congress and your representatives recommended that Newington join the organization to facilitate the exchange of information concerning the multiplicity of federal, state and regional programs and legislation that may affect our town and its environment.

There is a growing trend and awareness throughout the New England states of the need for close liaison between Conservation Commissions, Recreation Committees and Planning Boards for frequent exchange of information and cooperative effort where matters of soil, water and

air pollution, population density and other matters concerning the ecology and environment are concerned.

The request for funds in the Conservation Commission budget this year covers membership in the state association, attendance at regional meetings and for continuing the cumulative trust fund for future land, marsh land and possible island purchases for open space conservation, recreation, and fish and wild life propagation. Such lands, once acquired by the town Conservation Commission within the provisions of RSA 36-A, Section 5, would be held in perpetuity so that future generations may enjoy the natural environment benefits that have been ours. Matching federal funds, administered by the State Department of Resources and Economic Development, the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development and Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, are available for such land purchases providing the town is willing to share such recreational developments with the general public. The town may also decide to do the entire funding and to retain such lands for purely resident use. The Commission is also authorized to accept gifts of funds and lands from private donors.

In other action the Conservation Commission has recommended to the town Planning Board deletion of that section of the present zoning law which allows the establishment of residential mobile home trailer parks within the commercial zone and that no further residential trailer mobile homes be allowed within the areas zoned for farm and residential use.

During the coming year the Conservation Commission will attempt to interest other area commissions in the formation of a Piscataqua Basin Watershed Association. There are about 10 such regional associations formed around the Connecticut and Merrimack River drainage basins and most of the larger inland lakes. The Piscataqua River, Little and Great Bay basins and their several tributary rivers and streams comprise one of the largest such basins in the state, with many unique tidal and estuarine features and many related problems.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture—to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help," and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE REPORT 1970

In this, the first report of the Town History Committee, we wish to record the steps taken to date in obtaining information about Newington. The committee has reviewed the known sources of information and has developed a plan for sifting through these old records and coordinating the information.

Mr. George Newick, of our committee, has for some time been working on a geographical map of Newington, and has a good start on locating the ancient landmarks. The committee feels that Mr. Newick might make maps showing the changes of roads, boundaries, and important buildings for approximately the periods of 1750, 1850, 1950, and one of the 1970's which would indicate the great change brought about by the construction of Pease Air Force Base. We have on hand information of the 1700's, a map circa 1851 another map circa 1885. Any other old maps of the town would be useful to this project.

The Newington Historical Society will provide information on all of the homes in town and turn over all of the records so obtained to the History Committee. Both the Historical Society and this Committee are requesting the cooperation of townspeople in this project.

Presently the History Committee is working on notes of the town compiled by the late Frederick Pickering and now in the possession of the Alfred Pickering family. The Committee is also gathering information on the early garri-sons, taverns, churches, schools and roads. Any old diaries, letters, papers or notes now in private hands would be of great value to the committee and greatly appreciated by them. All such material can be reviewed in your own home if so desired, or if loaned will be carefully handled and returned promptly.

4. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

6. NEWINGTON SCHOOL DISTRICT Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the school board and citizens of Newington:

The students of Newington are especially fortunate to live in a community that values the quality of education as indicated by the continued support of the board of education in its efforts to provide Newington with the best educational opportunities possible.

As in the past, our school experienced a great change in personnel. This is not a problem indicative of Newington but rather a reflection of the high degree of mobility within our society today. Mr. Michaels' experience in your school system was a stabilizing influence in this situation and provided the continuity necessary during this change of staff.

The school curriculum continues to work towards serving the individual needs of each child by providing an expanded program. This year, the art program was increased in scope to include the entire school instead of Grades 5 and 6. For this purpose, a part-time teacher was added to the staff. In an effort to use the physical plant and educational materials for the greater advantage of the students, the children were placed in multi-age groups. The intermediate room (Grades 3 and 4) became an instructional material center available to all students and teachers at any time. Work was begun on a unique program involving community resources. Its intent is to introduce the intermediate grade students to the many skills possessed by the citizens of Newington and to foster a deeper appreciation of the community and its people. At this time, the program is underway and appears to have been well received.

During the year, a concern for the present system of grading was expressed and a committee has been appointed to study the alternatives. The work of this committee will be undertaken shortly.

A major goal of the Supervisory Union was realized

this year through the planning and construction of a new central office located off Route 16 in Somersworth. This facility accommodates the administrative staff and, in the future, will house the psychological services for the Union. In addition, the speech therapist was hired by the Union replacing the contractual arrangement by each district with the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center. The intent of such an arrangement is to centralize student services under direct control of the Supervisory Union. The Area School Concept with Portsmouth continues to be under discussion with expectations of including Grades 7-8. The second stage of our coding and updating all board policies is progressing with changes being made as they apply to each individual district.

As there is no school system that we can operate in a vacuum, we owe a great deal to many people. We acknowledge the gift of the playground equipment from the PTA; the assistance of mothers and other town officials who have contributed to our endeavors for the students in our school. To the school board, I should like to extend my personal thanks for your co-operation with me and with each other as well as with the administrator of your school in the interests of quality education for the children who are your first charge.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent, School Board and Citizens of Newington;

It is again my pleasure to submit the following report of the school health program from September, 1969 to June, 1970.

The first grade pupils again had the Tuberculin skin tests by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association. It is to be remembered that this is a service that is given as a result of the sale of T B Christmas Seals.

The dental clinic held at the school was a real success with over 50% of the pupils having their teeth cleaned and flourde applied. This was a substantial increase over past years.

A Rubella clinic (German measles) was held at the school and all but three eligible children had the vaccine. This was sponsored by the P.T.A. and members assisted. New Hampshire is one of the leading states in the country in the percentage of school children inoculated against this disease.

My thanks to our Superintendent, School Board, Principal, teachers, P. T. A. members and parents for their assistance and cooperation.
