To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at ten of the Clock in the forenoon, to Act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; also to choose one Selectman for three years; one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; one Library Trustee for three years; one Cemetery Commissioner for three years.
- Article 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.
- Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance purposes.
- Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.
- Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of Inventory Blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed.

- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State Aid for the construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$619.96 for that purpose.
- Article 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.
- Article 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- Article 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Control of Pine Blister Rust and care of trees.
- Article 18. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be paid over to the Federal Airport Project.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money to fence West Cemetery.
- Article 20. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for increased Police Protection.
- Article 21. To see what action the town will take in regard to allowing Trailer Parks to be established in this Town.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Bi-Partisan Ballot of electing Town Officials.
- Article 23. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The following is a report of the Health Activities conducted in the Town of Orford, by the N. H. Division of Public Health - Division of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1965.

In cooperation with the Orford School Nurse five immunization clinics were held. These included babies through school age children with physicians in attendance.

Physical examinations were given by a physician to 13 children (babies and preschool age)

On September 20, 1965 a Sterneedle Tuberculin Testing Program was carried out in the schools, with the cooperation of the School Nurse. Family follow-ups were done as necessary.

Total tests given: 215 Reactors to the test: 8. Reactors and family contacts were advised to follow through with tests and chest x-rays as necessary, either at their family physician's or at the Chest X-ray Clinics.

Several from Orford attended the Chest X-ray Clinics - sponsored by the N. H. TB & Health Association in cooperation with the N. H. Division of Public Health - which were held at Plymouth and Lebanon in May and October of 1965. Written reports were sent to all parties concerned.

A survey was made of the community for the Home-Service Care Program of the Medicare and the town officials were alerted to the upcoming program. They will be kept informed as additional information becomes available.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE (continued)

Home visits have been made, in the town, on babies and preschool children and referrals have been made to clinics as necessary. The handicapped children are cared for through clinical services of Cripple Children's Services.

All other reported cases from the State Department have been in-

vestigated and referrals made as necessary.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 p.m.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands, yours never to enjoy.

CEMETERY REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1965

The Cemetery Commission having completed its first year, reports as follows: We have under our jurisdiction three cemeteries: Orford West Cemetery, Dame Hill and the East Cemetery. Despite an unusually dry summer, the lawns have been kept mowed, brush clipped and grading done where needed. Many monuments have been straightened and repaired. Benches have been constructed and placed under shade trees for the comfort of visitors.

The old cemetery records are being checked and corrected and a complete card file is being organized for reliable reference. In this connection it would be appreciated if those in charge of lots would communicate with the Commission concerning future interments.

Regulations have been established and approved by the Selectmen. Copies of these rules have been given to all sextons, funeral directors and monument firms.

Cemetery lots are still available free of cost to all local residents. Perpetual care has been established for all new graves at the rate of \$50.00 per grave. No monument shall be put in place until Perpetual Care of the lot has been paid. Not cutting the grass before Memorial Day, on those lots for which there has been no provision, has been considered. The Town is presently paying for the upkeep of these. In fairness to those who have seen to the care of their family lots a drive is now being put on to see that all lots in the cemeteries are provided with Perpetual Care. This amount, added to the already existing Trust Funds, will help reduce the amount required from the tax money appropriated at Town Meeting.

The Commission is pleased to report the erection of a granite and rail fence on the south side of the addition to the Orford West Cemetery. If the necessary funds are allocated, this fence will be extended this summer along the west boundary in compliance with New Hampshire laws requiring fences around all cemeteries. Preliminary plans are being drawn, for the new section, for driveways and eventual land-

scaping.

The Commission is mindful of still more work to be done. With your continued cooperation it is hoped that your cemeteries will be maintained as a fitting memorial of peace and beauty.

Gentlemen:

Presently your Board and Budget Committee will be preparing the 1966 Town and Warrant and Budget. I wish to recommend that the sum of \$125.00 be included in both documents for your town White Pine Blister Rust Control Program in cooperation with this Division.

In 1965, 142 towns and cities appropriated \$18,000.00 to advance the control program in their communities. This sum, combined with state and federal cooperative funds, enabled us to cover 197,083 acres of control area. This splendid cooperation, an indication of the towns continued confidence in the statewide control program, is most heartening.

Recognizing the towns fiscal problems, the Division's appropriation requests have been kept to minimum amounts necessary to maintain

the present status of control.

The importance of the blister rust control program is evidenced by the prominent place white pine holds in our state economy - (1) approximately 70% of all lumber cut in New Hampshire is white pine; (2) 17% of our New Hampshire labor force is sustained by revenue derived from white pine timber sales, woods operations and the manufacture and sale of hundreds of white pine products. All of this was endangered by the advent of the white pine blister rust disease.

New Hampshire faced a big job in marshalling forces to combat the blister rust. It had the largest control area in the United States - 2,500,000 acres. However, town, city, state and federal forces combined in a unique team effort to combat it. The state was given the job of directing the field work. The combined effort was successful. Control of the disease has been established on 98% of the entire control area. Our problem now is to hold the line and maintain our hard earned control by periodic examination of control areas to determine the recurrence of currant and gooseberry bushes and, when found, destroy them. Continued cooperation on the part of towns and cities is essential to the achievement of this goal.

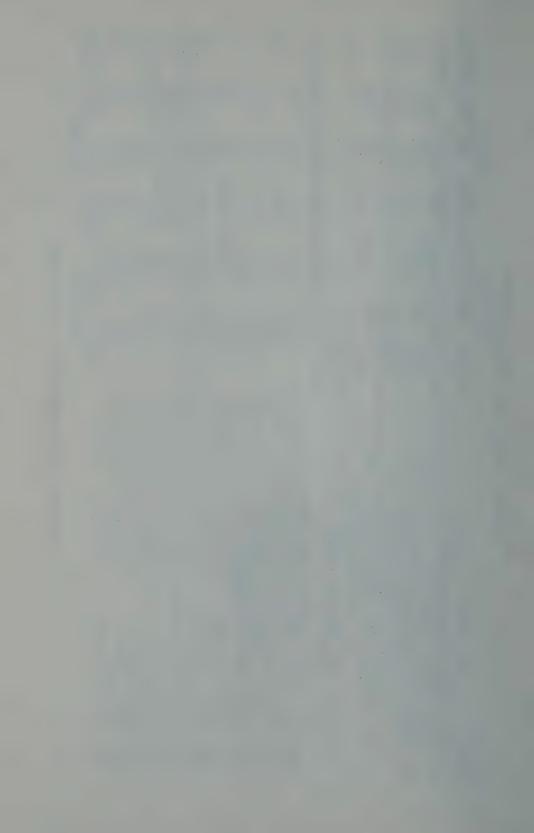

You are hereby notified to meet at Memorial Hall in said District, on Tuesday, March 1, 1966, at 8:00 P.M. to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To chose a Moderator for the coming year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose two members of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.
 - Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- Article 8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1965-66, a sum of money in the amount of Ten Thousand One Hundred Forty-Eight Dollars (\$10,148.00) to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1966, in order to meet obligations due primarily to unanticipated expenditures of \$8,848.00 and loss of the Area Vocational Program reimbursements which were not off-set by a sufficient surplus in receipts, leaving a net deficit in receipts of \$1,300.00.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I hereby present my annual report for 1965.

STAFFING

Thirteen new teachers joined the Orford staff this year to complement the five teachers returning from the previous year. In terms of preparation, background, and ability, the additions to our staff have been most satisfactory. Qualified teachers alone, however, are by no means a guarantee of excellence. Serious space problems and equipment shortages still exist. These shortages will become more acute when the upper elementary grades return to the High School building. It was extremely difficult, time-consuming, and demanding task to recruit the new staff members for Orford. It would appear that these efforts have paid dividends in the good quality of the teachers we were able to secure and this is, perhaps, one of the best staffs we have ever had in Orford.

CURRICULUM

Elementary. - We have introduced the Greater Cleveland Mathematics Program ("new math") into grades 1 - 8. This will result in an unsettled state of affairs for a year or so but in the long run will help to provide our students with an updated mathematics program. We will have to make the necessary provisions for extending this to the high school but this will prove difficult because many of our tuition students will not have had the necessary background.

We have replaced our former hodge-podge and outdated approach to reading with a complete new reading series, the American Book Company Reading Series, in grades 1 - 8. This should go a long way toward strengthening our reading program.

We should project our long range goals toward providing for one teacher for each of the elementary grades. We have added an extra teacher for 1966-67 in the Intermediate Unit (grades 5-8) and this should alleviate part of the problem at those grade levels,

Secondary. - We have strengthened, greatly, our secondary curriculum in several areas by providing for two instructional levels in English, Mathematics, and Social Studies. A major curriculum improvement involved the hiring of a science teacher. We have tried to upgrade our supplies and materials in all subject areas. A major addition to the program was the securing of a part-time guidance counselor.

By moving the library to a standard size classroom, we have more than doubled the space available. Books and library equipment have been increased sizably and much of the credit for library improvement belongs to those who offered their voluntary assistance in the program and to the Equity Publishing Corporation for purchasing books at a discount rate. These physical improvements have brought us much closer to the established minimum library standards. A major drawback is that the library is also used as a study hall throughout the school day. Book circulation, unfortunately, is at a minimum with an average of nine to twelve books per week.

Despite all of these efforts, it has been impossible, so far, for us to meet minimum comprehensive standards. And, to make matters worse, our area vocational agriculture program approval was withdrawn in September and we have been warned that approval will be withdrawn next year in home economics unless nearly-unattainable minimum physical plant and program standards are met.

THE APPROVED PROGRAM FOR 1966-67

The School Board, after conferring with the people in a "round table discussion", has voted to discontinue attempts to meet minimum "comprehensive" standards but rather to operate an "approved" secondary school until such time as a cooperative school district is formed or until it becomes financially impossible to continue to do so.

In order to put this program into operation, we will offer a basic two-track program of studies in 1966-67 as follows:

The home economics and vocational agriculture courses will be dropped. The general students will take a basic core of academic subjects and then "major" in either business education or vocational education, the latter consisting of basic woodworking, auto mechanics, metal work, and electricity.

This type of program will still allow our reduced teaching staff to concentrate in their teaching fields with but a few minor exceptions. This is the essence of a curricular program and teaching assignments predicated upon the academic background of the teacher is vital. Projected staff assignments are as follows:

With respect to curriculum, I wish to point out that sound curriculum development is an ongoing process, one that is evolutionary and not revolutionary. Constant surveillance of the changes in the disciplines and the needs of the students as they go on to further education or take their place in society should lead to a continual process of revising and upgrading of the curriculum. This process of modernizing and updating the curriculum is based upon sound school district organization and is virtually impossible in small single school districts. This factor had contributed heavily toward the general movement to establish cooperative school districts throughout the nation and, more recently, in New Hampshire and Vermont wherein several small school districts with limited resources can pool their efforts and provide their students with an enlarged and improved school program. This type of program will better enable them to meet the present-day demands of higher education or vocational employment.

COOPERATIVE SCHOOL DISTRICT

It should be stressed that curriculum developments during the past decade have accelerated so rapidly as to render the existence of the small high school indefensible from both the standpoint of program and

costs. Nearly every educational authority in the nation has pointed out the need for grouping the secondary program in such a manner as to assure comprehensive and modern curriculum opportunities for all of the students. In general, all recommendations point to the need for enrollments in grades 9 - 12 of between 500 - 600 students, minimum, with a graduating class of at least 100 students. State standards and national standards (Evaluative Criteria New England Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges) underlie these research findings.

I know that there have been many ill feelings generated during the past few years because of the Orford school problems. I am convinced that both the educational and financial problems will come to a grinding halt upon the formation of a cooperative school district. I sincerely urge that everyone in Orford vote favorably upon the question of forming the proposed Moosilauke Cooperative School District involving the school districts of Bath, Benton, Orford, Piermont, Haverhill, and Woodsville when it is put to a vote.

It is inevitable that reorganization will come to these districts and it seems advisable for us to study this problem while we have alternatives rather than to wait until reorganization is prescribed. The reorganization of school districts in this area is sure to come within the next few years and it would be much to our advantage to form a cooperative now and not wait until we are forced into what may be a less satisfactory arrangement. Moreover, the longer we wait the more we run the danger of higher costs of construction and other escalating costs relative to the cost of living index. I feel that the strengthening of the educational experiences for the boys and girls of our communities is the prime reason for acting now, however, and would urge that the people of Orford apprise themselves of the educational and financial advantages of the proposed cooperative school district and vote favorably to organize it.

SCHOOL CALENDAR

During the 1965-66 school year we are operating under an experimental academic year calendar. We have a one-week vacation which coincides with the Dartmouth College Spring Recess in March and two long weekends (Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday), one in late January and one in early May. The decision to try this type of calendar for a trial period of one year was made after several months of study precipitated by some feelings that such a calendar would be desirable. The effects of this calendar on the students, the program, and the staff will be evaluated thoroughly at the close of the academic year. Hence, the school calendar for 1966-67 will not be prepared until this summer.

CONCLUSION

I wish to express my appreciation for the fine work and the exemplary professional performance of the high school principal, the guidance department, and the teaching staff. The clerical and custodial staff of the school district have acquitted themselves well and the cleanliness and maintenance of the buildings should not go unnoticed. I am grateful, indeed, and wish to commend publicly my own staff in the Superintendent's office for their loyalty and support given me in meeting the heavy demands placed upon this office by local, state, and federal agencies. Special commendation for interest in and support of the school should go to the Orford P. T. A. and the hard-working members of the Cooperative Planning Committee.

I am sure that the people of this community are aware of the demanding and time-consuming work done by the Orford School Board and I hope that their work will be recognized and appreciated.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the people of Orford who have manifested an understanding of our school problems and who have cooperated with the school in trying to resolve as many of the problems as possible.

ORFORD SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

We feel that a brief report to the voters on the status of the Orford school system would be appropriate. We wish to report on our stewardship as your school trustees and to make several recommendations as follows:

The 1966-67 Budget

The budget we shall submit to the voters at the annual meeting calls for a total appropriation of \$162,868 with an estimated sum of \$114,946 to be raised by taxes. The amount to be raised by taxes in 1966-67 is \$368 higher than in 1965-66. It includes a deficit of \$10,148.

The budget would provide for eight high school teachers, seven elementary teachers and a principal. There would be two less high school teachers and one more elementary teacher than last year. It would include a new roof for the Ville school. In preparing the budget, the Board considered the three following alternatives:

1. Close the high school and tuition our students.

A budget that would provide for tuition for Orford's 52 high school students at \$450 each (the lowest tuition rate in the area which is Thetford Academy) and for extra bus transportation, and that would also close the Ville school with the resultant savings in operation costs which that would effect, would call for raising about \$110,000 in taxes. Tuition at Bradford this year will be \$560.00 and will be \$767.00 at Hanover. The state average in New Hampshire for next year is \$521.00.

2. Operate a comprehensive high school.

We asked our superintendent, Dr. Zimmerman, to prepare a comprehensive budget for our study. This came to about \$215,000, or approximately \$50,000 higher than our current budget. Appropriating this large sum of money would not in itself guarantee a comprehensive rating. Officials of the Department of Education have indicated to your Board on several occasions that they frown upon small high schools. In fact, our state laws work against their very existence. In view of their open hostility to the small high school concept, we doubt that any sum of money could regain our former comprehensive rating.

3. Operate an approved high school.

The budget we suggest for your approval would provide us with an approved high school. Under it we could be competitive for teachers with a minimum starting salary for a four year degree of \$4,900. This is \$100 higher than the Vermont minimum established by state law. We would offer a two-track program - one for college-bound students and one for general students for whom the high school diploma would probably be the terminal point of their schooling. We would eliminate home economics and vocational-agriculture and concentrate on business and shop courses for general students.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT (continued)

The Deficit

Our deficit of \$10,148 was due to several factors. We overspent our teachers' salary account in order to get the full complement of teachers with necessary qualifications to help regain our comprehensive rating. For the same reason we spent more than appropriated for textbooks and equipment. These deficit items totaled \$4,929. The sweepstakes fell about \$2,000 short of what we had budgeted. Also, we lost about \$3,000 in federal aid when we were deprived of our voag rating and another \$1,000 when two Orford students matriculated in Hanover.

The Vo-Ag Loss

In September, 1965 our approval as an area vocational agriculture high school was withdrawn by the State Department of Education, the major reasons cited being:

- 1. Expansion of physical facilities.
- 2. Purchase of new tools and equipment.
- 3. Curriculum improvement.

The necessity of increasing the size of the shop was the big stumbling block. Several alternatives relative to providing adequate shop space were examined but were rejected because of cost factors. Consequently, the decision to rent the church and renovate rather than enlarge the shop was not made until August. This did not leave sufficient time for developing a curriculum and equipment could not be purchased until these other matters could be resolved.

The Board feels that while our school officials have been cooperative, efficient and helpful in other areas, they were, in our opinion, remiss in carrying out the Board's wishes regarding the vo-ag program. When the class space was reduced the state officials reacted by cutting off our vo-ag rating.

The Cooperative School

Last March the District authorized a study group to work with other districts to suggest a cooperative school district. A proposed district consisting of Orford, Piermont, Haverhill, Woodsville, Bath and Benton will be submitted to a vote in the several school districts soon after your annual meeting.

For Orford the proposed cooperative would mean less taxation, at least initially, more educational opportunities for our students, and one voice on the proposed nine member board. If we voted for the new cooperative school, and it was created, we would retain our grades 1 through 8 in Orford. Our high school students would go to a new high school, probably located in Haverhill.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT (continued)

Federal Aid

On December 15 at a Special School District meeting the voters rejected \$7,222 of available Federal funds under Title 1 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. All of the Board members except Mrs. Patricia Mack felt that (1) the funds (which could not be used to reduce our taxes) were unnecessary for the remedial reading project suggested, and (2) that they would bring certain federal controls into your school system. This same majority felt that the reasons for rejecting Federal funds are now even more persuasive since it was proved after our vote that in at least one district the voters will have to raise additional tax money for the salary of one of the project administrators.

Supervisory Union

Last March the district voters instructed the Board to ask for a transfer from Supervisory Union #22 (Hanover) to Supervisory Union #23 (Woodsville). The Board worked through channels and twice asked the State Board of Education to transfer Orford to the Woodsville District. At present the matter is tabled pending the outcome of the cooperative school vote.

School Treasurer

The Board has included in the prepared budget an increase in the pay for the school treasurer. We would like to establish an accounting system for monies collected at school functions, lunch programs, etc. Also, we would like the treasurer to have more time to work with the superintendent's office and the Board in helping to keep close check on all school monies.

Church

This year we rented classroom space at the Congregational Church for grades five through eight. This was a temporary measure made in an effort to meet space requirements for a comprehensive high school rating. The extra space will not be needed for an approved high school. Thus, these classes will be moved back to the high school building next fall.

To the church officials, teachers who conducted classes at the church, and our superintendent and principal, we extend our grateful appreciation for their patience, understanding and cooperation in operating the classes at the church.

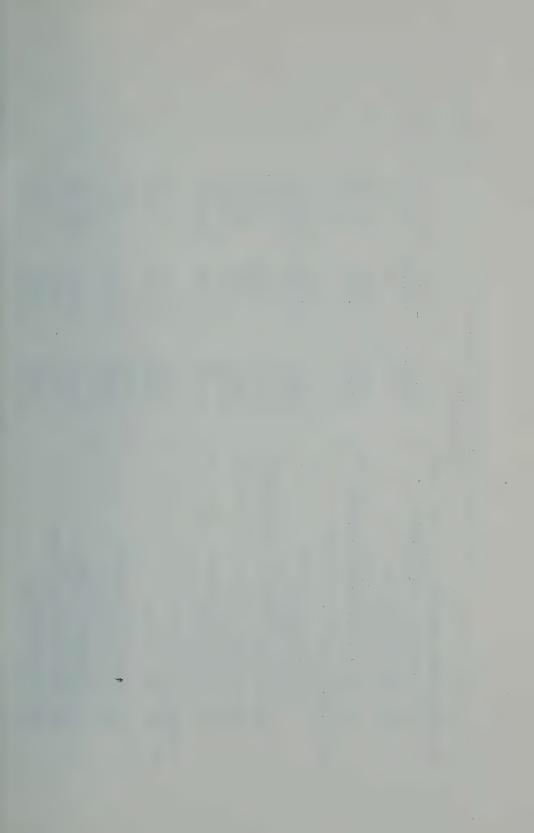

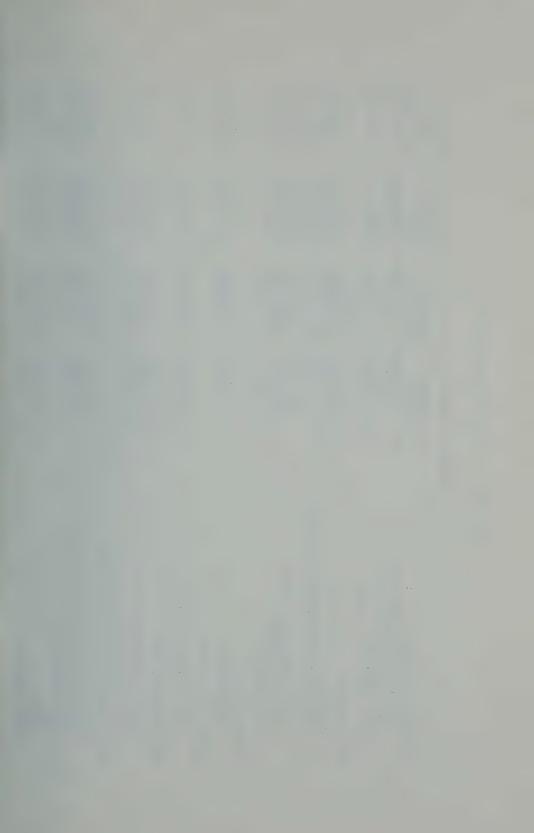
