Executive Summary





Town Manager Christopher Rose

In looking back over the last year the economy will be the big story, as it has been for the last several years. Raymond has great potential for growth and is just waiting for things to happen.

It is possible to see what could happen by looking at the growth we did have here despite the state and national economy. We have had new businesses, and more housing, but the big project that the town approved several years ago, the development at Exit 4 (Granite Meadows) is still on hold. Unfortunately this development was the key to having the town begin construction of our wastewater treatment plant and so that is also on hold.

Even with the Exit 4 development at a standstill the town continued to move forward to complete all the work that we could that is tied to this project. This included completing the cleanup of the former Rex Tannery site and setting up finalizing agreements on other parcels that are involved in the overall project. While we wait for the development we made sure we had everything in place so that it could move forward quickly when it was ready.

Over the past year the town worked with a group of business people to see what could be done to better promote and develop the Exit 5 area. This was a very exciting project because it was promoted and led by a group of local businesspeople. The public/private cooperation on this project was very good to see and allowed for a great exchange of ideas and proposals. The committee looked at all aspects of the area around the Exit 5 exchange off of Route 101. They examined such things as how to address the need for sewers, and possible ways roadway and zoning changes could help the area.

Another project that took a good deal of time this year had to do with providing water to the homes around the Mottolo superfund site off of Blueberry Hill Road. A number of years ago the federal Environmental Protection Agency identified the former Mottolo farm as a hazardous waste site and worked to clean it up. Since then they have monitored the site and in late 2008 they discovered that there were still some problems with the groundwater in that area.

The town has been working with the EPA and the state Department of Environmental Services to find a solution to this problem. All along we have said that that the best solution for the homeowners in that area would be to extend the town's water line to serve them. Late last summer the EPA finally agreed with us. We are now working to finalize the project which we hope can be completed in 2011. Because this is an EPA superfund site the federal government will be paying for the cost of this line.

With the addition of this water line down Route 102 to Blueberry Hill Road area there are many other things that will be considered. As an example the Planning Board has already begun to review the zoning for the land in that area to see if it should changed now that a town waterline is available to it.

For our water system the town is also looking into the possibility of adding additional wells to the system. In July of 2010 we had an unexpected drop in the level in our water towers. This was not a result of lack of water in our wells but a combination of several events that drew a great deal of water from the system in a very short time. This had not happened before in town and was not repeated the rest of the year.

While the wells we have were never a problem the possibility of adding additional wells that could serve the system could prevent this from happening again. The water department had started the search for possible well sites several years ago, and we are moving forward with those studies. I expect that the town will hear more about this next year.

As I mentioned, the overall economy was a major topic this past year. And I want to be sure that everyone knows that this is always a part of the discussions we have on projects and purchases here at the town. It is a consideration by the selectmen, the department heads, and the employees as we look into what we need to do the work that needs to be done. We are always looking for better and less expensive ways to accomplish the work.

This can be seen in part by looking at the overall budget for the town over the last five years. We have had a number of very 'tough' years, with the town's General Fund budget only increasing from \$6,224,222 in 2005 to \$6,271,674 for this past year.

This shows that the budget for 2010 is up only about 1% in the five years since the 2005 budget. Every year we look at the budget and see what can be tightened or shaved or cut. Since there are a number of areas where the town does not have good control over the expenses, such as electric costs, this shows that the town's department heads are very good at watching their budgets and living within the limits they are given. They all deserve a thank you for their efforts.

Another big change for 2010 was in two very important positions:

Dennis McCarthy left the town in July after serving for over 18 years as the town's Public Works Director. His long history with the town and his steady leadership will be missed. He was replaced by Pat Bower who brings a strong background to the position.

Also, we hired Amey Cole as the new Finance Director. For the previous 16 months we had been working with Mike O'Neill as a contracted Finance Director. He did an excellent job but did not want to work here full time. I am sure Amey will do well in the position as well.

As you may know, I have notified the Selectmen that I would be leaving the position of Town Manager this summer. I have been working in local government management positions for around 35 years and my leaving is because of my desire to spend more time with my family.

I wish the Town of Raymond and the wonderful town employees all the best in the future.

TOWN OF RAYMOND FIRST SESSION FEBRUARY 6, 2010

FIRST SESSION: To the inhabitants of the Town of Raymond, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Raymond High School said Raymond on Saturday, the Sixth (6th) of February, 2010 at Ten of the Clock (10:00 a.m.) in the forenoon. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the warrant articles numbered 1 through 35. The warrant articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) warrant articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) warrant articles that are amended shall be placed on official ballot for a final vote on the main motion as amended.

The Town of Raymond first (deliberative session) was called to order at 10:00 a.m. in the Raymond High School Dining Room by Moderator, Kathleen Hoelzel. Moderator Hoelzel led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance. Moderator Hoelzel verified the posting of the deliberative session warrant and budget as well as the posting of the default budget.

Moderator Hoelzel announced that Wayne Welch would act as Assistant Moderator for today's session, and she introduced Sharon Walls, Deputy Town Clerk. Moderator Hoelzel called upon Frank Bourque, Board of Selectmen Chairman to introduce the Selectmen, administrators, and legal counsel; Town Manager Chris Rose, Attorney Rob Ciandella, of Donahue, Tucker, & Ciandella, Acting Finance Director Mike O'Neill, and Selectmen: Vice Chairman Jack Barnes, Joyce Wood, Cheryl Killam, and Bill Hoitt. Chairman Bourque called the Board of Selectmen to order. Moderator Hoelzel called upon Ed French, Budget Committee Chairman, to introduce the Budget Committee; Vice Chairman Nick Longo, Sandy Ellis, School Board Rep. Dee Naoum, Ted Janusz, Michael Totri, and Lee Weldy. Chairman French called the Budget Committee to order. Moderator Hoelzel introduced the Supervisors of the Checklist; Marilyn Semple, Gayle McMullen, and Kathleen Blaisdell. Moderator Hoelzel announced that for this session the Police Officer on Duty is Sergeant Scott Payne, and the Ballot Clerks are Frances Clevette and Lori O'Connnor.

Moderator Hoelzel announced that a yellow colored voting card with the letter "D" would be used for voting and identification at this session. Moderator Hoelzel announced Housekeeping Issues that included; No materials that could or would influence the voters may be passed out within the building, subject to the moderator's approval, and the material must contain verification as to the producer of such material. Moderator Hoelzel announced the Process that the Moderator will follow and the Rules of Order for this deliberative session. At times thoughout the session the Moderator recessed an article to get clarification, completed the next article(s), then resumed the previous article.

Article 1

To choose the following:

Two (2) Selectmen for 3-year terms;

One (1) Town Moderator for a 2-year term;

One (1) Town Clerk/Tax Collector for a 1-year term;

One (1) Budget Committee Member for a 2-year term;

Two (2) Budget Committee Members for 3-year terms;

One (1) Ethics Committee Member for a 1-year term;

One (1) Ethics Committee Member for a 3-year term;

One (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for a 3-year term;

One (1) Library Trustee for a 3-year term;

One (1) Planning Board Member for a 1-year term;

Two (2) Planning Board Members for 3-year terms;

One (1) Supervisor of the Checklist Member for a 6-year term.

Moderator Hoelzel declared that Article #1 would appear on the official ballot with candidates as read and printed.

Moderator Hoelzel announced that Article #2 though Article #9 are zoning amendments and they cannot be amended at this session. Any questions on those articles may be addressed at the Planning Office and speak with Ernest M. Cartier Creveling, Tell#895-4735 Ext. 117. Moderator Hoelzel declared that zoning Article #2 through Article #9 would appear on the official ballot as printed on the warrant.

Article 2

Zoning Amendment #1

To amend Article III - Zones to add Section 3.100, Overlays, Zone FEH - Fluvial Erosion Hazard District; FURTHER to amend Article III, Section 3.300, Overlay Zones, Districts and Applications, by adding Section 3.330 through 3.332, Zone FEH - Fluvial Erosion Hazard District, which creates an overlay district, the boundaries of said district being delineated on plans kept on file with the Town of Raymond and the process for delineation, making changes to the delineation, and challenges to the delineation by the property owner are all described in the ordinance, the purpose of the ordinance includes the protection of public and private property within the zone and to prevent risk within the zone by limiting new development; FURTHER to amend Article IV, Uses and Standards, to add Section 4.900 through 4.912, Fluvial Erosion Hazard District to create a series of definitions of relevant terms including Fluvial Erosion Hazard and certified plot plan, to regulate such new development by defining exempt uses, prohibited purposes, allowed uses, or, alternatively, to require a conditional use permit from the Planning Board where certain requirements are met including but not limited to the possible need for professional studies and the circumstances under which applicants must pay; FURTHER to provide a system whereby the delineation of the zone can be reviewed by the Zoning Board of Adjustment; FURTHER to provide a system where variances can be requested from the Zoning Board of Adjustment and a description of the variance requirements for same; FURTHER to provide a system whereby applicants may appeal decisions of the Planning Board, on conditional use permits. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 3

Zoning Amendment #2

To amend Article V, Section 5.100 to add a section which indicates that the potential installation of a water line to the area adjacent to the Mottolo Superfund Site will not result in the connected lots being subject to the less restrictive dimensional requirements of "Zone A with Town Water" and that the connected lots will continue to be subject to the lot size, frontage and setback requirements of the zones in which they are located. The purpose of the amendment is to allow the Planning Board time to develop a plan for the orderly development of municipal services needed to accommodate the potential growth of such connected lots. The ordinance will terminate within eighteen months of enactment. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 4

Zoning Amendment #3

To amend Article VII, Section 7.504 (01) by adding a new section, 7.504(01)(a), which indicates the categories of development potentially subject to impact fees and which provides authority for the Planning Board to select which categories of development will be subject to the impact fee in accordance with the assessment methodology to be adopted by the Planning Board, such methodology to be adopted prior to making any assessments. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 5

Zoning Amendment #4

To amend Article VIII, Section 8.110, Paragraph 2, to require sprinkler systems be installed in all newly constructed and substantially renovated commercial and institutional buildings, and all forms of residential dwellings. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 6

Zoning Amendment #5

To amend Article VIII, Section 8.100 to clarify that wheelchair ramps and similar disability access structures shall be considered nonpermanent, for the purpose of providing a certified plot plan only, when applying for the required building permit; FURTHER to amend Article VI, Special Provisions, to add Section 6.900 entitled Disability Access Structures, which enables the Code Enforcement Officer to grant building permits for Disability Access Structures as referenced in Article VIII, Section 8.100 (03)(d) notwithstanding that such Disability Access Structures may not comply with area dimension or setback requirements, provided that the applicant meets the specific criteria set forth in the ordinance. The building permit is valid only during the time when there is a need for the use of disability access structures by disabled persons as referenced in the ordinance. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 7

Zoning Amendment #6

To amend Article IX by adding a new Section, Section 9.500 to place reasonable time limitations on relief granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and to provide a provision allowing applicants to seek extension of approvals which would otherwise lapse. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 8

Zoning Amendment #7

To amend Article II, Section 2.100 to add a definition for the term Variance consistent with the provisions of the proposed amendment of Article IX; FURTHER to amend Article IX generally to make the Ordinance consistent with applicable RSAs concerning the powers of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the criteria for variance, special exception and equitable waiver relief. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 9

Zoning Amendment #8

To amend Article II, Section 2.100, Definitions, #80 – Use, Residential Low Density by adding "(in accordance with Article V, Section 5.104)" to the end of the existing text; FURTHER to amend Article IV, Section 4.302, Definitions, subparagraph 02, Yield Calculation, by deleting the entire section and replacing it with language clarifying that the maximum number of single-family lots permitted within a Conservation Development is to be determined by the underlying zoning as outlined in Article V; FURTHER to amend

Article IV, Section 4.305, Density, by deleting this section in its entirety; FURTHER to amend Article IV, Section 4.500, Manufactured Home Parks, by deleting subsection 05 in its entirety and renumbering the subsequent subparagraphs within this section; FURTHER to amend Article IV, Section 4.600, Multifamily Housing, subparagraph 03 by clarifying that in no case shall density exceed eight (8) bedrooms per non-Zone G acre; FURTHER to amend Article IV, Section 4.700, Dwelling Two-family Unit, subparagraph 02 to clarify that Zone G land shall not be used to satisfy lot size requirements; FURTHER to amend Article V, to add Note 9 clarifying that Zones A, B & E, including all residential overlay zones, shall not include the use of Zone G land in determining the maximum number of units or lots being developed; FURTHER to amend Article V, Section 5.104, Special Requirements in Zone G, subparagraph 01 by changing the existing wording that reads "all lots in Zone G..." to read "All lots containing Zone G...," and to delete the dimensional requirements table within this subparagraph; FURTHER to amend Article V, Section 5.104, Special Requirements in Zone G, subparagraph 02 to clarify that minimum usable area calculations shall require a minimum of 20,000 contiguous square feet of non-Zone G land in Zone A, and a minimum of 40,000 contiguous square feet of non-Zone G land in Zone B, and to clarify that frontage and setback requirements under Article V, Sections 5.102 and 5.103 shall remain in effect and that a minimum wetland setback shall remain in effect, and to delete the table labeled "Minimum Lot Requirements for Zone B" within this subparagraph; FURTHER to amend Article V, Section 5.104, Special Requirements in Zone G, subparagraph 03, "Minimum Lot Requirements for Zone A" by deleting this subparagraph and also deleting subsection (a) within this same subparagraph, in their entirety. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

(3/5 ballot vote required.). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Budget Committee. This is a special warrant article.

Bill Hoitt spoke on this article including a brief history of the water contamination in this area and the bond tax impact. Joyce Wood spoke on this article regarding the results of the water testing. The DES website for information on the Mottolo site is: www.des.nh.gov.

Moderator Hoelzel declared that Article #10 would appear on the official ballot as printed and read.

Article 11

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) for the purpose of installing, testing and permitting a series of new wells for future development of the town's water system; Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) of such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act,

Joyce Wood spoke on this article including the reason why it is necessary for this article to go onto the ballot now. Discussion ensued.

Moderator Hoelzel declared that Article #11 would appear on the official ballot as printed and read.

A motion to restrict reconsideration on Article #10 and #11 was made by Cheryl Killam and seconded by Jonathan Wood. The vote on the motion to restrict reconsideration on Article #10 was in the affirmative.

A motion was made by Kevin Pratt and seconded by Paul Hammond to see if the voters will approve, as a sense of the meeting, that any warrant articles that refer to map, lot, or area to be placed on a map highlighting the areas of concern readily available for the voters on March 9, 2010 and on the Town of Raymond website. The motion was voted in the affirmative.

Lee Weldy addressed the Budget Committee's budget proposal in the amount of \$6,849,980. Discussion ensued.

On behalf of the Board of Selectmen, a motion to amend Article #12 was made by Joyce Wood and seconded by Cheryl Killam; Shall the Town of Raymond vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Six Million Nine Hundred Twenty-Four Thousand Five

Hundred One Dollars (\$6,924,501)? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be Six Million Nine Hundred Six Thousand Nine Hundred Three Dollars (\$6,906,903), which is the same as last year with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Raymond or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. **NOTE**: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. **Recommended by the Budget Committee**. **This is a special warrant article**.

Lisa DiCioccio stated she would like to change the amendment from: "with exclusion of two-cycle engine wheeled vehicles (dirt bikes)" to be, "with the exclusion of trail bikes". Mike O'Donnell agreed to the change.

The vote on Amendment #3 of Article #21 was in the affirmative. Amendment #3 passed.

Jack Barnes spoke to this article.

The first expendable trust will receive one half of the plot fee for the purpose of maintenance and upkeep of the Raymond cemeteries. The second expendable trust will be for the expansion of the Raymond cemeteries and will receive the second half of the plot fee. The Raymond selectmen will be the agents to expend these funds.

Discussion ensued.

The vote on the Amendment to Article #23 was in the affirmative. The Amendment to Article #23 passed.

Moderator Hoelzel declared Article #23 would appear on the official ballot as amended.

A motion to restrict reconsideration of Article #23 was made by Frank Bourque and seconded by Tim Louis. The vote on the motion to restrict reconsideration of Article #23 was in the affirmative.

The Budget Committee recessed to have a meeting at 3:20 p.m. The Budget Committee meeting adjourned at 3:40 p.m.

A motion was made to come out of session by Jack Barnes and seconded by Bill Hoitt. The vote was unanimous. The Board of Selectmen adjourned their meeting at this point of the Deliberative Session.

This petition of registered Raymond voters, submitted to the Raymond Board of Selectmen in accordance with RSA 41:14-a, seeks to have the proposed acquisition of a property interest of the aforementioned property placed before the voters as an article in the warrant for the 2010 town deliberative session and vote in lieu of a selectman's vote. This is a petition warrant article.

A motion to amend Article #25 was made by Jonathan Wood and seconded by Michael O'Donnell; In accordance with RSA 411:14-a The Town of Raymond Board of Selectmen called a Public Hearing on Monday, June 15, 2009 and a second Public Hearing on Monday, June 29, 2009 to take public comment on the acquisition of a property interest in the form of a perpetual conservation easement in Tax Map 5, Lot 87 (50.84 +/- acres), otherwise known as the Mottollo Superfund Site. This petition of registered Raymond voters, submitted to the Raymond Board of Selectmen in accordance with RSA 41:14-a, asks whether the Town should acquire a property interest of the aforementioned property in the form of a conservation easement. (3/5 ballot vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Budget Committee. This is a special warrant article.

YES 825

NO 568 *Needed 836 votes to pass.

The Town Moderator Kathleen Hoelzel opened the meeting at 6:00 p.m. She stated that this meeting was duly posted at the Raymond Town Hall, Old Fire Station, and the Iber Holmes Gove Middle School. The Moderator led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance. The Moderator swore in the ballot counters and the Board of Recount. She announced that all counters for the recount are Raymond registered voters.

All ballots cast in the election were separated into piles according to the page number by the counters and the Board of Recount. The two pages where the warrant articles occurred were separated into piles of 50 and banded with elastics. The Moderator explained the rules of procedure for this recount, and the instructions to counters and observers.

There were no challenged ballots throughout the recount process. The tally sheets were calculated and verified by the Board of Recount.

On behalf of the Board of Recount, the Moderator announced the results of the recount, and the ballots were sealed.

The results of the recount were:

Article 11 as recounted, number of votes cast were 1404. There were also 64 blank ballots.

YES 829 **NO 575**

Article 11 needed a 60% majority of the votes cast to pass, which would be 842 YES votes. Therefore, the Board of Recount declared that Article #11 was voted in the negative (failed).

Article 4 as recounted, number of votes cast were 1336. There were also 132 blank ballots.

YES 664 NO 672

Therefore, the Board of Recount declared that Article #4 was voted in the negative (failed).

Motion to adjourn the session of the Board of Recount was made by Linda Hoelzel and seconded by Timothy Auclair. The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

Building & Health Division Report

Richard J. Mailhot, Code Enforcement/Health Officer, Plans Examiner, Building Inspector

The Office of the Building Inspector / Code Enforcement Officer is a division of the Community Development Department. The office is regularly staffed by 1 full time, (40 hours per week), Building Inspector/Plans Reviewer/Zoning Administrator. Additionally there is one Assistant part time, Building / Field Inspector (as needed, usually scheduled two days per week during peak building seasons and on call other times). I have continually made adjustments throughout the year to better correlate that work schedule, with the then current inspection work load. This effort has proved to be cost efficient for the Community, while not severely effecting contractor relationships due to our reduced availability for permitting and inspections. I will continue to utilize this "just in time Inspector scheduling", as long as the constructions inspection request levels and building climate in general, allows.

2010 has turned out to be a year that saw a slow down remain entrenched with all building trades, across most types of construction, with few exceptions.

With that said the 2010 year end statistics for the Building Division are as follows:

- 37 Single family homes replaced, constructed or totally renovated.
- 4 Replacement homes (fire, age, or other damage).
- 147General building permits (all other than new dwelling)
- 211 Electrical permits
- 80 Plumbing permits
- 61 Septic system (new and replacement)
- 53 Fire permits
 - = 589 Total permits issued.
 - = in excess of 1,100 scheduled inspections performed

We are seeing the beginning of a construction turn around with the restart of construction of several elderly housing units and a medium volume of varied remodeling, addition and expansions of Commercial, Industrial and Residential projects.

Once again I would like to thank the residents of Raymond for the opportunity to head the Building, Health and Code Enforcement Division of the Community Development Department.

Conservation Commission

Cheryl Killam, Chair

The Raymond Conservation Commission was established in 1979 for "the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and watershed resources in our town." The conservation commission is the only local advisory committee charged with protecting natural resources. The commission reviews Wetland Dredge and Fill permit applications, Timber Permits, Alteration of Terrain permits, and developers' plans for the impacts to wetlands, vernal pools, surface waters and ground water according to our town ordinances and the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services Wetlands Bureau and Comprehensive Shoreline Protection Act rules.

The commission is a seven-member board of volunteers of Raymond residents who are acting on the community's behalf to preserve open space and educate the public on conservation issues. The commission is appointed by the Board of Selectmen under the provisions of NH RSA 36. The commission members are: Cheryl Killam – chairman; Jan Kent - vice chairman; Leslie O'Donnell - secretary; Cody Cramer - treasurer; Mike Kappler, Barbara Edgar, Marilyn Semple and June Dickerson. We welcomed new member John Beauvilliers as an Alternate.

Accomplishments in 2010:

- 1. Held "Clean Up Town Property" events on 5/22 for Flint Hill attended by 10 volunteers and on 6/19 for the Lillian Cassier Memorial Forest attended by 5 volunteers.
- 2. Reviewed 2 wetland dredge and fill applications.
- 3. Provided a table at the town's Earth Day celebration in April at Riverside Park.
- 4. Held site walks at Bald Hill, Dearborn Forest, Flint Hill, Lillian Cassier Memorial Forest and Robinson Hill.
- 5. Held two community workshops to build bird houses and bird feeders attended by 10 families.
- 6. Worked with Eagle Scout Jake Leavitt on his project of clearing trails and building a Kiosk to hold trail maps, at the Jama Drive bridge entrance to the Dearborn forest property.
- 7. Established a "Friends of Conservation" group to partner with the Elementary and Middle School teachers and students, to hold nature based workshops; to encourage town property trail maintenance and other projects.
- 8. Worked with Southern NH Planning Commission to write the 2010 Open Space Plan and the Riparian Buffer study to protect rivers, streams and wetlands from pollution in the Lamprey watershed.
- 9. Completed the survey of Flint Hill's 145 acre conservation land.
- 10. Established a Facebook page for the Raymond Conservation Commission.
- 11. Completed the 370 acre Lillian Cassier Memorial Forest conservation easement. The town currently has 452 acres of town-owned land protected in perpetuity for future enjoyment by town residents
- 12. Received and followed-up on complaints about ATV damage and forts with beer can piles on town properties; residents' neighbors filling wetlands; and new buildings too close to streams.
- 13. Attended many Selectmen, Planning board and RBEDC meetings to keep the community informed.
- 14. Attended meetings and workshops with the Lamprey River Watershed Association, the Lamprey River Nominating Committee, the Bear-Paw Regional Greenways and NH Association of Conservation Commissions.

Ongoing Goals:

- Partner with the local educators to encourage environmental awareness and community services.
- Complete the conservation easement on Dearborn's 304 acres per Article 17 of March 2006.
- Complete the conservation easement on Flint Hill's 145 acres per Article 28 of March 2008.
- Work with Planning Board to promote conservation subdivisions with contiguously conserved land.
- Update the Conservation Commission website page with current activities and town property information.
- Continue assisting private landowners with conservation easements on their family's land.
- Continue protecting valuable town-owned open space and watershed properties from pollution.
- Continue to educate the public on conservation issues; provide information about the importance of preserving open space lands that contain high quality forests, streams, wetlands, aquifers, agriculture soils, plant life, endangered animals and wildlife habitats.

Dudley-Tucker Library Sherry Brox, Director

I moved to Raymond with my family 34 years ago. We are all avid readers so the Dudley-Tucker Library became a home-away-from-home for us. Janet Brown, director, encouraged me to take some library courses...and that was how it all began.

While I vacationed in Wyoming in 1986, Janet called to tell me she had accepted a position in Merrimack and would I be willing to step in until a new director could be hired. I said "of course", but just for a few months. Here I sit (after many more courses) saying goodbye after 25 years.

I wrote about my exceptional staff in an earlier town report, but now I want to publicly thank them for their support and many years of service. A director is only as effective as his/her staff, and mine has allowed us to accomplish much. We've gone from a 2-room space, packed floor to ceiling, to a 3-floor handicap accessible library that meets the needs of most of our residents. We've joined the digital age with public access computers, yet still offer the wonderful programs that make you think "library" when you hear of them. Children's story-time and evening programs are ever-evolving happenings. I doubt that there will ever be a summer when there isn't a line of young readers waiting to have their pictures taken to kick off the summer reading program.

I don't have to introduce you to new staff members since the existing staff has accepted new titles and responsibilities. Linda Hoelzel will be the new director. She has spent 25 years as assistant director and, after 6 months of training, will seamlessly take over my chair. Pat Currier has been the creative force in the children's room. Aides Cathy Fancher and Betty Wynne will be sharing the duties of children's librarian. The first three months of the year was very busy for structure fires, trees down and motor vehicle accidents. Most of the structure fires were in the first half of the year. This year we had 42 responses during the three days of the storm in March. That many calls are usually done in 20 days. We responded to four fire fatalities in the towns of Chester, Auburn and Candia

Again this year FFs volunteered over thousands of hours in Training and meetings. All this time has made us better prepared. We are members of the Interstate Emergency Fire mutual aid association and over the years we have done a lot of training at the Brentwood facility. Seabrook Power has built us a new concrete building for live fire training. We also burned a building for training on Langford Road

We now have six Firefighters with associate degree and one master's degree in the Fire field. This year three more from our explorer post have enrolled in college. We thank all of our members for putting their lives on hold to complete these demanding classes. Raymond Fire Explorers raised their own money at the Town Fair for their week long fire training classes at the NH Fire Academy.

In 1892 Raymond had no fire department and most of the businesses in the center burned down. In 1894 the Raymond Fire Department started mostly by men that lost their businesses and homes in the early fires. The first two pieces of equipment were a hose wagon and a ladder wagon. The ladder wagon was made from the old town hearse by the Fire fighters. A hundred years later the fire fighters are still building forestry trucks and rescue trucks.

In 2000 Wal-Mart moved to Raymond and helped the town purchase the 1983 FMC 100 foot Arial ladder truck. This has been very instrumental in saving buildings and businesses as well as helping to lower taxpayer's fire insurance costs. This year we have replaced Tower 1 with a new-used truck from Canada by way of a firm in Alabama. The truck is a 1999 Peirce Dash 105 foot with a 1750 gallon per minute fire

pump and will be called Tower 2. This is possible because of the forward thinking taxpayers, Select Persons, Town Manager and the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) that has been in affect over the last several years. Without the CIP this project would have required bonding, costing taxpayers more.

The 2007 Engine 4 replaced the 1957 Engine 2 and is our first 'on scene' engine. The Freightliner vehicle that Raymond Firefighters worked nights and weekends to make in to a rescue truck is working out as we had hoped. This was a major savings over buying a custom vehicle and responds to all vehicle accidents, structure fires and special rescues. All these trucks have played an important part in Raymond's past and will again this year.

This year we have put in service a 4 wheel drive ATV donated by Argo cycle. The Firefighter's Association bought a 4x4 trailer to go with it to carry people out of the woods. This was accomplished with no tax dollars. We also purchased a 13.5 Zodiac boat has been put in service after Firefighters received the training needed to use it. A special Thanks to the Town Manager for his assistance and guidance on these projects.

All of this happens best if we are working as a team. Many thanks to Raymond's Public Works, Police, Water Department, Ambulance, Dispatch, VFW, Rotary, Wal-Mart, Masonic Tucker Lodge and the Town Office. I would like to thank all that have helped to save life and property in Raymond and their families for their continued commitment.

Forest Fire

Kevin Pratt, Fire Chief

The state of NH started their lookout tower program in 1909 when they added phones and lines to five lookout stations. In 1910 the Timber Owners of NH were asked for support. The timbermen contributed \$4100 on the spot and organized into the New Hampshire Timberland Owners Association (NHTOA). This group later assessed themselves a penny per acre per year for fire detection, on a total acreage of about a million acres.

In 1912 the state added our own lookout tower in Pawtuckaway, this tower is located off route 107 in Deerfield and looks into Raymond. By 1913 there were 19 stations owned by the state and another seven by NHTOA, and by 1917 the state was operating 29 stations. These towers play a crucial roll in protecting forest and even urban homes with early fire detection. Any of these towers can be hiked for free during the summer, they have a great view.

Please help, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise <u>www.firewise.org</u> and fire safe! DRED Division of Forests and Lands provided us with this forest fire information.

This year the Selectmen funded a mosquito-control program aimed at reducing the risk of mosquito-borne illnesses such as Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) and West Nile virus, both have been found in town. Using bug repellent, wearing protective clothing, eliminating standing water, the use of mosquito magnets, putting up bird and bat houses are preventative steps anyone should take.

If an extinguished fire containing burnt trash is found, the owner will be warned on the first offense and fined \$100 for subsequent offenses. Any subsequent offenses of burning trash are punishable with a fine of up to \$1,000. The state law defines combustible domestic waste as household trash, packaging material, plastics, coated or laminated papers, rubber, painted or treated wood, treated cardboard, oily rags, and animal, vegetable and kitchen waste.

The decrease of illegal burning of domestic waste is lowering dioxins and other lethal toxins in Raymond's air. Please watch the Smokey Bear Fire permit sign at the safety complex to see the fire dangers for each day. A written permit is needed for all open outside burning after 5 PM up to 9AM. An adult must remain with the fire till extinguished. All trees to be burnt are to be smaller than five inches in diameter.

The only exception to the permit rule is if the ground is totally covered with one inch of snow or if it is raining steadily. A call to 895-3321 will put you on a list of people burning. This prevents us from sending the whole department for a report of fire. Our Forest Fire Wardens are at the safety complex from 4:00 to 5:00 PM every day including Weekends. Our Forest Fire Ranger Neil Bilodeau is in town often helping with lumbering operations and commercial burn permits. The following Firefighters responded in 2010.

Emergency Management Kevin Pratt, Fire Chief

The EOC in Raymond opened for the prolonged wind event with high water and power outages again this year. The three day storm kept our emergency responders busy with a prolonged boating accident and recovery, trees down and a double fatal structure fire in Candia. Our Thanks to the Raymond Middle School staff and citizen volunteers that ran the shelter during the prolonged power outage.

During an emergency the first information released will be for the protection of life and property. More general information will follow. Raymond residences may get "Official" information from the following sources. The type of emergency situation and the utilities affected will determine what means of communication are to be used:

Primary Location: Iber Holms Gove Middle School Steven K. Batchalder Parkway (off of Epping Street)

Bring enough medications for several days and clearly marked with name, dosage, type of medication, and prescribing physician. For your comfort bring a change of clothes including flip flops, bedding such as blankets, pillow. Also bring a bath kit of soap, tooth brush, toothpaste, shampoo and other hygiene products. A cell phone your contact list and your identification would also be very helpful.

Pets may not be in the shelter area or allowed to run free. Most importantly, you need to plan in advance for the care of your animals, practice your plan and keep it updated. For horses, cattle and other live stock, identify and secure "well in advance" several possible boarding locations locally and out-of-state. Be sure to have a trailer reserved for emergency use, if you do not have one, or yours is not in good repair. NO FIRE ARMS or WEAPONS of any kind. NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES and NO SMOKING.

Police & Communications Department David T. Salois, Chief

This past year, we noted that many individuals have endured events that were brought on by the poor economic times that we are all facing. Here at the police department we see this every day in our work. We see the increased thefts and burglaries that have occurred in all areas of the community. We have responded to the increased number of domestic disputes, some fueled by the difficult economic situations that families have been forced to cope with, and others stemmed from similar dealings of a social, personal, and/or health related nature.

In many areas our statistics have hit new levels. One particular area is in the number of burglaries / thefts that we responded to in 2010. We had areas in the community where houses / cars had been entered and valuables removed. These types of thefts are some of the most troubling for residents. Many residents lost valuables that were not easily replaced – such as company laptops, wallets and briefcases. In addition, our detectives spent countless hours tracking down information and suspects that led to a number of arrests.

We also brought new initiatives forward this past summer. We applied for, and received, a number of grants for DWI Saturation Patrols, and two grants for DWI Checkpoints. We hope that these initiatives reduced accidents and will serve as a preventive measure as we continue to use these patrols and checkpoints in the future. We also partnered with the RCFY and Hannaford Supermarket to sponsor the first ever 'Drug Take Back Event', which was very successful.

Over the years, the community and the police department have adapted and changed to keep pace with the times. Many very good employees have worked for the community and the department. Some have either retired, after serving many dedicated years for us, or they have moved along to other employment opportunities. Our historical society's building is filled with pictures and memorabilia documenting much of this town's past history. It showcases the individuals who helped establish and preserve this town's foundation, government, society, future planning, and community spirit. In this year's report, I have included a snapshot into our own past police history. One of the officers depicted in the photo, retired last year after devoting many years to our police force. He is still a valuable active community member and lives in the area.

As in every year's report, I would like to thank each and every employee for his or her dedication and professionalism, which they continually display, day in and day out. Without their support and commitment, reaching the department's goals would not be possible. I also offer our sincere appreciation to the residents, elected officials, and other town departments for their cooperation and assistance over the past year in helping us make Raymond a safer place to live.

Public Works

Patrick L. Bower, P.E., Director

The Public Works Department experienced a fairly normal year except for the departure of long-term Public Works Director, Dennis McCarthy. I accepted the position in late July, taking over the reins from the acting Public Works Director and Town Manager Chris Rose. It was a hectic start. The Town was in the midst of a water use restriction that had the phones ringing and kept the water division busy. Fortunately, the water use restriction was the result of a spike in demand and not the result of a problem with the water treatment plan or the distribution system.

Also on the water front, we continued our efforts to find a location for a new source of water. A number of residents granted permission to our consultants to visit their properties and conduct geophysical investigations for productive sources of quality water. These efforts are on-going, though we have narrowed our search significantly. The Water Division continued with the leak detection program in 2010. Largely because of our leak detection program we have improved our 'accounted for' water percentage to 92% in 2010.

The Highway Division continued to provide excellent snow removal and winter maintenance services to the Town. 2010 turned out to be a moderate year for snow with only 17 call-outs for snow removal and roadway treatments. The highway division used approximately 1,625 tons of salt in their efforts to keep our roadways safe.

The Highway Division continued with the rehabilitation of the roads throughout town with the shim and overlay of a number of roads in town. The reconstruction of Epping Street began this year. A portion of Epping Street from the intersection at Route 27 to the bridge over the Lamprey River was reconstructed with upgrades to street drainage, the addition of granite curbing, construction of a new sidewalk and placement of new street trees. The reconstruction will continue in future years.

The Grounds Division continued its 'green' turf maintenance program that utilizes organic, environmentally friendly products to fertilize our parks and fields. The program continues to be an effective means to keep our fields healthy and safe and, maybe more importantly, doesn't contribute any harmful substances to our groundwater, rivers or lakes.

The Fleet Maintenance Division continued doing a superb job servicing the Highway Division equipment as well as vehicles and equipment from all other public works divisions and town departments. This Division has done an excellent job efficiently keeping the Public Works Department up and running while struggling with the ever-increasing costs of steel, fuel, salt and petroleum products.

I wish to thank the people of Raymond, the Town Manager, the Board of Selectmen, and my staff for their support over these last few months. I am thankful for the graciousness and courtesy extended to me by everyone in Town as I have worked to establish my position in the Public Works Department and I look forward to working hard to deliver a superior level of service to the residents of Raymond.

The Raymond Business and Economic Development Council (RBEDC) had a very active year in 2010. We were fortunate that Fisher Auto Parts moved into Raymond in the former Rehrig Pacific building on Center Street.

The approval of a water line extension along Route 102 to the Blueberry Hill neighborhood by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services will provide relief to those homes affected by the Mottolo Superfund site. It will also enhance Route 102 for potential economic development.

The RBEDC was successful in establishing five Economic Revitalization Zones in Raymond. Thanks go to the Raymond Board of Selectmen for acting on the RBEDC's recommendation to establish these zones and sending the appropriate paperwork to the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development for final approval. Businesses meeting certain development criteria that increase commercial/industrial tax base and create jobs will qualify for credits toward their business profits tax burden.

During the summer of 2010, we instituted a town-wide yard sale during the weekend of the Town Fair, in hopes of bringing additional visitors into Raymond to attend the fair and to help individual families dispose of their unwanted items. The proceeds from the yard sale were used for recreation grants to qualifying children.

This winter the RBEDC coordinated and sponsored the first ever series of Winter Farmers' Market in Raymond. The first was held on December 11, 2010, which was a huge success, especially given that it was an inaugural event. As of this writing, a second Farmers' Market was held on January 22, 2011, which was even better attended than the first. It is our intention to establish a summer farmers' market, as well. However, we need additional volunteers to help us, so please contact Community Development Director Ernest Cartier-Creveling if you have an interest in helping out with these fantastic events.

The Exit 5 Special Advisory Council is moving along in its efforts to encourage further development in the Exit 5 area. Through grants and funding from local businesses, \$30,000 was raised to complete a feasibility study to determine the practicality of developing wastewater treatment for the Exit 5 area to spur expansion of existing businesses and the creation of new businesses. The Exit 5 Special Advisory Council comprises the following individuals: Chairman Craig Jewett, Vice Chair Timothy Peloquin, George Vernet, J.R. I would like to dedicate this year's annual report to Mr. Ron Edgar. In a loss that has not been felt since the days of Mark Prescott; Volunteer and Committee Vice Chair, Ron Edgar departed Raymond for the opportunity of full time work in Pittsburg, Pa. Ron was a true leader at RCTV. He was instrumental in researching new ideas and equipment, maintaining our PEG download server, sewing and installing our backdrop curtains, covering government meetings, helping access producers bring their ideas to fruition, and even producing his own programs. Without Ron, programs such as the Bourque Review, All around Raymond call in shows, Mr. Raymond, Backstage in Raymond, Walk, and MANY others would never have seen the light of day. There is no way we can say enough THANKS for everything Ron contributed to RCTV and our town.

RCTV continues to grow as it brings new programs and features to cable subscribers in town. Streaming files are now available to download to personal computers. New programs from PEG media are on the schedule. Older VHS tape style camcorders have been replaced with digital units that record in High Definition and just recently a Teleprompter was added to the studio to help residents record their programs.

On the operations side, after many years of covering Board & Committee meetings strictly with volunteers, RCTV began hiring "Government Access Media Operators". This was done to ensure that very important meetings such as the School Board, Selectmen, Planning, Budget, Conservation Commission, Zoning, Business & Economic Development, are recorded and broadcast. While these operators are town employees there are no benefits and ALL funding comes strictly from the franchise revenue paid ONLY by cable subscribers.

In addition to government meetings and its community events Bulletin Board, RCTV also brings programs such as school graduations, music concerts, local church services (New Life Assembly of God, Raymond Baptist, St. Joseph, Bethany Church), deliberative sessions, candidate's nights and others to its viewers. All local events! Regional programs such as Granite State Outdoors produced by NH Fish & Game, Book Swap Café from Concord, Army Newswatch, Expedition New England and The Chef's Plate are just a few of the programs shown on Channel 13.

What's coming in the future? The cable committee is looking at two important contracts coming to an end in 2012. The first is the franchise agreement with Comcast. This was a 12 year contract and the Cable Committee will be surveying subscribers to see what they want in a new contract. The fees that subscribers pay is what totally funds RCTV operations and facilities. The Cable Committee works very hard to manage those fees and ensure that subscribers get the most for their money. We have lots of ideas for the next 10 years, but it is the subscribers that must support them.

The 2nd contract is between the town and the school district for the spaces that RCTV uses for office, meeting control room, studio control room; and shares with the JAG program for a part time studio. The school itself is strapped for space and could potentially need to take back the space RCTV occupies. The cable committee is working with the School Facilities committee to look at what the options are and also

investigating ideas such as an addition to the school or a building of its own. Again ALL costs for this would come from the cable revenues and nothing passed on to the taxpayers.

11 years ago Marc Vadeboncoeur our cable coordinator and I would never have guessed how far RCTV has come. We now have two channels, two meeting rooms, a part time three camera studio, streaming video and equipment that subscribers can be very proud of.

I want to thank everyone who has supported RCTV throughout the year. Lisa Chapman, Monica Keefe, Amey Cole at the town office; Jennifer Gillespie and Todd Ledoux at the school district; all provide awesome help whenever we ask. I want to thank the Board of Selectmen & the Town Manager for trusting the Cable Committee with the operation and oversight of RCTV, the management of its funds, and for encouraging us to negotiate the next franchise agreement. Finally I want to thank all the volunteers who make RCTV run. Some can help more often, some come when they can, but they do come and it is their hard work that allows us to bring these programs and facilities to you the subscribers.

Town Clerk/Tax Collector Sharon E. Walls, Town Clerk/Tax Collector

The year 2010 brought changes with the retirement of Doris Gagnon and my being elected to the position of Town Clerk/Tax Collector. I appointed Kathy Cramer as Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector and hired Kerri Philibert as Account Clerk. This transition went smoothly while conducting business and adhering to the State of New Hampshire Laws and Town of Raymond Regulations.

Property Taxes - Pursuant to RSA: 80:76, regarding tax collector deeds. I presented to the Board of Selectmen the list of properties with delinquent taxes for the years of 1998 through 2007. In some cases, the Board of Selectmen directed me to pursue tax collection instead of executing tax collector deeds. This procedure has continued to result in an increase in revenues. In the year of 2010, five tax collector's deeds were issued to the Town of Raymond.

The Town of Raymond issues tax bills twice a year to cover the tax year of April 1 to March 31. The first bill is mailed by June 1st and is due July 1st. The amount due for the first bill is an estimate using the previous year's tax rate. The second bill is mailed by November 1st and is due December 1st. The amount due for the second bill has the new tax rate applied to the current assessed value, which is based on the status of the property as of April 1st. The tax rate is set in the fall of each year by the State of New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration. Once your property tax bill is mailed, partial payments are acceptable, however, interest at 12% per annum is charged on any unpaid balance of the tax bills not paid by the due date.

Voting - In the year of 2010, there was a town deliberative session, town elections, a state primary election, and a state general election. In the year 2011, the town deliberative session is on February 5th and the town election is on March 9th. You may register to vote at the Town Clerk's Office during regular business hours, when the Supervisors of the Checklist meet, and on the election days. Proof of residency and identification is required to be presented when registering to vote.

Registering Vehicles and Registering Dogs - This year the Town Clerk's Office will be offering the ability to register vehicles and dogs online at the Town of Raymond's web- site, www.raymondnh.gov. There will be a minimal convenience fee. Please check the Town of Raymond's website and Cable Channel 22 for the availability of this service.

Information regarding all of the functions of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Office can be found on the Town of Raymond's website.

I would like to thank everyone for their patience and support during the changes in this past year and as we go forward to try to make life a little easier with the convenience of online services. I would especially like to thank Kathy and Kerri for their hard work and assistance as they continue to do their best to uphold the duties in the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Office.

FIRST SESSION:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Raymond, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Raymond High School in said Raymond on Saturday, the Fifth (5th) of February, 2011 at Ten of the clock (10:00 a.m.) in the forenoon. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the warrant articles numbered 1 through 19. The warrant articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) warrant articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) warrant articles that are amended shall be placed on official ballot for a final vote on the main motion as amended.

SECOND SESSION:

Voting Session to act on all Warrant Articles as amended, including the proposed budget, as a result of the action of the "FIRST SESSION" will be held **Tuesday**, **March 8**, **2011**, at the **Iber Holmes Gove Middle School**. Polls will be open from 7:00 AM – 7:00 PM.

Article 1. To choose the following:

Two (2) Selectmen for 3-year terms;

One (1) Town Clerk/Tax Collector for a 3-year term;

One (1) Town Treasurer for a 3-year term;

One (1) Budget Committee Member for a 1-year term;

Three (3) Budget Committee Members for 3-year terms;

Two (2) Ethics Committee Members for 3-year terms;

One (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for 3-year term;

One (1) Library Trustee for a 2-year term;

One (1) Library Trustee for a 3-year term;

Two (2) Planning Board Members for 3-year terms;

Article 2. Zoning Amendment 1 - Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: To amend Article V- Area and Dimensional Requirements, Section 5.100 (b) to allow the emergency water line zoning amendment passed at the March 2010 Town Meeting to continue until December 31, 2011, instead of terminating "...within 18 months of enactment" as is currently stated. The purpose of the amendment is to allow the Planning Board additional time to continue to develop a plan for the orderly development of municipal services needed to accommodate the potential growth of lots which are connected to the water line adjacent to the Motollo Superfund site. The ordinance will terminate on December 31, 2011.

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 3. Zoning Amendment 2 - Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: To amend Article III, Section 3.320, to indicate that the purpose is to encourage preservation of the Shoreland Protection Area and to discourage certain activities within the Shoreland Protection Area, to amend Article II, Section 2.100 by adding a term "Natural Vegetated Shoreland Buffer". This language is advisory language only and adds no compliance provisions to the Ordinance.

Zoning Amendment 3 - Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as Article 4. proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: To amend Article III, Section 3.340 (01) and 3.341 to reflect updated stratified drift aquifer mapping, to add to Article IV, Uses and Standards, Section 4.241, a definition of gasoline station, petroleum bulk plant terminal, and source water, to amend Article IV, Section 4.242 and 4.243 to clarify application to Groundwater Conservation District, to update performance standards to reflect current best management practices for source water protection including those pertaining to regulated substances, and adding a conditional use permit from the Planning Board for certain uses within the Groundwater Conservation District, to add Article IV, Section 4.244 to add a spill prevention requirement, to add Section 4.245 to require a Report of Resolution to be filed, to revise Section 4.247 by revising the list of prohibited uses and by deleting the outside storage of salt or other deicing chemical in bulk and by deleting the storage of commercial fertilizers, to revise Article IV, Section 4.248 paragraph B regarding the requirement of a conditional use permit when the use creates a certain level of impervious surface, to amend Article IV, Section 4.250 (02) regarding certain storage of regulated substances as exempt from performance standards, and to add to Article IV, Section 4.251 revisions to the town's existing wellhead protection area boundaries, and to amend Section 4.253 to specify that regulated substances over a certain amount will be subject to inspection, to add Section 4.255, entitled "Saving Clause" and to add Section 2.456 entitled "Effective Date"; and various revisions were made throughout the text to identify updated reference documents or sections. A map entitled "Combined Aquifer, Surficial Geology and Wellhead Protection Areas" dated February 2009, will be presented as part of this amendment.

Article 5. They would be compensated by stipend during their year of service.

This would result in the immediate savings in salaries of approximately: in 266,989 dollars in salaries for the first year. Since the district office is now vacant it can be used to deal with most of the district's special education students within the district thus saving a minimum of approximately about 642,142 dollars PER YEAR.

This is a Petitioned Warrant Article.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to rescind both Article 26 of the 2007 Town Meeting and Article 19 of the 2008 Town Meeting which provided for a lease-purchase agreement between the Town and the United Veterans Club of Raymond (UVCR), a non-profit Club established to operate and own property for establishing a meeting place for all veteran organizations in the Town pursuant to UVCR by-laws, for a three (3) acre parcel of Town land fronting on Route 27 shown on Tax Map No 38 as Lot No. 4-1 on the Raymond Tax Map and to transfer said parcel to the United Veterans Club of Raymond at no cost. The three acre parcel has been subdivided from Tax Map 38 Lot No. 4 with that cost borne by the UVCR and any further costs to transfer the property to the UVCR would also be borne by them.

This is a Petitioned Warrant Article.

Article 19. Shall the Raymond voters agree that there will be no contracts given to an individual employee that obligates the Raymond taxpayers to more than \$125,000 (one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars) annually in total compensation, including benefits and retirement without the approval of the legislative body. This will be accomplished by an individual/special warrant article which will take effect immediately.

This is a Petitioned Warrant Article.

FIRST SESSION

This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the warrant articles numbered 2 through 8. The warrant articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) warrant articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) warrant articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for a final vote on the main motion as amended.

SECOND SESSION

Voting Session to act on all Warrant Articles as amended, including the proposed budget, as a result of the action of the "FIRST SESSION" will be held Tuesday, March 8, 2011, at the Iber Holmes Gove Middle School Gymnasium. Polls will be open from 7:00 AM - 7:00 PM.

1) Article 1, Election of Officers

To choose the following School District Officers:

- a.) To choose one School Board Member for the ensuing three years.
- 2) Shall the School District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$21,771,803 (Twenty One Million, Seven Hundred Seventy One Thousand, Eight Hundred Three Dollars)? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$22,144,189 (Twenty Two Million, One Hundred Forty Four Thousand, One Hundred Eighty Nine Dollars) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Raymond School District or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (This article does not include appropriations proposed under any other warrant article.)
- 3) Shall the School District vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Raymond School Board and the Raymond Education Association, which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits at the current staffing levels:

7) Citizens Petition Warrant Article: To see if the voters of the Town of Raymond will direct their school board to reorganize the administration of the Raymond School District also known as School Administrative Unit #33 from fulltime to part time to begin in school year 2012-2013; that is the elimination of the offices of: Superintendent of Schools, Special Education Director, Technology Director, Human Resources Director, superintendent's administrative assistant, special education director's administrative assistant and possibly finance manager.

The management would be comprised of three school principals on a rotating basis acting as associate superintendents and three building special education directors acting as special as associate special education directors on a rotating basis (the assoc. super and director to be from different school in any given year). They would be compensated by stipend during their year of service.

This would result in the immediate savings in salaries of approximately: in 266,989 dollars in salaries for the first year. Since the district office is now vacant it can be used to deal with most of the district's special education students within the district thus saving a minimum of approximately about 642,142 dollars PER YEAR.

8) Citizens Petition Warrant Article: Shall the Raymond voters agree that there will be no contracts given to an individual employee that obligates the Raymond taxpayers to more than \$150,000 (one hundred fifty thousand dollars) annually in total compensation, including benefits and retirement, without the approval of the legislative body. This will be accomplished by an individual/special warrant article which will take effect immediately.

Please Note: All of the above articles as amended, will be inserted on the "Official Ballot" to be voted on Tuesday, March 8th, 2011, at the so-called "Second Session."

The moderator read the warrant.

ARTICLE 1

Election of Officers

To choose the following School District Officers:

To choose two School Board Members for the ensuing three years.

Over the year, the District has had many reasons to celebrate. The Iber Holmes Gove Middle School was Runner-Up for 2010 Middle School of the Year and Fifth Grade teacher Jen Datilio was a semi-finalist for 2010 Teacher of the Year. Currently, Iber Holmes Gove Middle School is a semi-finalist for the 2011 Middle School of the Year. Dr Jean Richards was recently named 2011 Runner-Up for Superintendent of the Year and Ellen Small, Iber Holmes Gove Middle School Principal, was recently named 2011 Runner-Up for Principal of the Year. Congratulations to these individuals and the IHGMS staff!

When I think back to the last time I wrote this (2008), we had just exited being a District In Need In Improvement (DINI) and the District continues to see tremendous growth. One example of this tremendous growth is in grade 3 reading. In 2005, grade 3 NECAP reading test results showed 61% of the students being proficient or better. In 2009, (the latest information available) grade 3 NECAP tests results showed 78% the students being proficient or better. Another example of the tremendous growth is in grade 7 math. In 2005, grade 7 NECAP scores showed that 56% of the students being proficient or better and compare that to 2009 grade 7 NECAP tests results of 71% the students being proficient or better. As this data indicates, the District is continuing to show great academic improvement.

The District-Wide Facilities Committee completed a report regarding the inadequacies of the district athletic fields. The committee determined that the District needs to build two soccer/football fields and a baseball field. A track would also be built around one of the soccer/football fields. In addition, a cross country course would be constructed. All these new athletic facilities are planned at Raymond High School. Currently, the District-Wide Facilities Committee is preparing a report on the Raymond High School.

In the summer, the School Board introduced the first annual District Report Card. This report card has many indicators that reflect on the District's status, such as student assessment data and financial data.

As part of the District's Capital Improvement Plan, the District completed the installation of Fiber Optics. This project connected all four buildings together to create a much faster computer network. Raymond is one of the few districts in the state with fiber optics connecting all its buildings.

With our focus in improving instruction and student achievement, we are always actively involved with assessing our work with students.

The Raymond School District has much to brag about. We recognize and celebrate our improvements and accomplishments. We have supportive parents and businesses. Our schools work together for our students and many are involved in activities. Enrichment opportunities are being created and our dropout rate is low. Our communication with the community builds daily. Our student achievements continue to improve. We share skills and talents within our community, logging over 15,000 hours of town and volunteer services to our schools and logging over 12,700 hours of service given by our schools in the past two years. We are also now publishing an Annual District Report Card for the community. Copies are available at all schools and the SAU Office.

Our Independent Financial Auditor Report is in this publication. It is their opinion that our financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial activities of each major fund. They also report that the Raymond School District has complied with the requirements of each of our major federal programs. An area we must always check in our internal controls is to assure that we verify that our federal funds vendors are not suspended from doing business with the federal government. All of our vendors of goods and services over \$25,000 are approved vendors. We thank our Business Administrator, Ron Brickett, for his thorough and diligent work.

Our commitment encourages each student to grow intellectually, socially, physically, and creatively.

The Raymond High School community strives for continuous school-wide improvement to support and implement best practices in teaching and learning. We are committed to preparing our students to assume their roles as productive, responsible citizens."

Everyone at Raymond High School is proud of our work to continuously improve our school, our courses and our co-curricular activities in the name of student achievement. In October, 2010 we submitted our two year Progress Report to New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). The visiting team in 2008 had 53 recommendations for Raymond High School centered on curriculum, instruction, and assessment. Thirteen of the recommendations have been completed, 38 of the recommendations are in progress, and two of the recommendations will be addressed in the future. Many of the recommendations have been addressed through professional development time that teachers have used to update curriculum and develop content assessments. Teachers in all the core area departments are working together to develop assessments for their common classes. The results are used to inform instructional practices in all courses. We thank our staff for their hard work to create a quality learning environment for all.

Many of our staff members have participated in professional development that supports student learning. Tom Koch, Randy Lacasse, Pat Nardone, Kim Moyer, Mary Ann Zaino, Liz Koch, John Adams, Shelley Tudisco, Bill Hayes and Jayme Rodriguez have trained in Professional Learning Communities (PLC's) this year. PLC's are groups of teachers and staff members working together to improve student learning. These groups are currently set up departmentally at Raymond High School and staff members are working on curriculum instruction and assessment. Department members are meeting twice weekly to develop common assessments, review student assessment results, and make adjustments to curriculum. A number of teachers have also attended Differentiated Assessment and/or Standards Based Grading professional development opportunities this year. Bill McGurren, Mackenzie Krzesicki, Shelley Tudisco, Sandra Gilbert, Kim Moyer, Liz Koch, Randy Lacasse, Pat Nardone, Mary Ann Ziano, Tom Koch, Jayme Rodriguez, Georgine Williams, Kristin Ozana-Doyle, Jim Maloney, and Fiona Cooney have all attended professional development sessions. As a staff we continue to have conversations about assessing what students have learned and ask questions about students demonstrating their learning.

The Olweus Bully Prevention Program began this year at Raymond High School. Our lead team — Bill Hayes, Linda Auclair, Steve Wallerstein, Shelley Tudisco, Bryan Lister, Grethel Strzepek, Linda Perrot, Pam Baker, Marlene Michaud, and Jayme Rodriguez - has been training staff and working to develop the student training roll-out. The new state law regarding bullying requires the school to train staff members and we have started to do this as a district in a methodical way. We are making staff and students more aware of bullying and providing them with the tools to help prevent bullying at school.

The Raymond High School Special Education Department has continued to develop the <u>Behavioral Academic Support for Independent Control</u> (BASIC) program throughout this year. This program is designed specifically for students that have an emotional handicap. The program helps students deescalate their emotions and refocus so they can do their academic work. Teachers and instructional aides work with students in the Behavioral Academic Support for Independent Control program, implementing a social curriculum that helps students learn how to interact appropriately and collaborate with peers and adults. Students receive support from teachers in their academic courses in the classroom and the BASIC classroom. This program will be reviewed by the New Hampshire Department of Education during the spring of 2011 and we expect full program approval.

Raymond High School has been approved to be involved in a grant to personalize education and improve student performance over the next five years. The New England Network for Personalization and Performance (NENPP) grant links Raymond High School with twelve other high schools in New England. Raymond High School will be working on developing inquiry-based learning experiences that are tied to performance assessments for our students. RHS teachers will collaborate with each other and with teachers throughout the network to develop and share assessments and learning experiences. The goal of the project is for every student to participate in at least two inquiry-based learning experiences and demonstrate mastery through performance assessment.

The Raymond High School band and chorus traveled to Tennessee last spring to participate in a national festival. The band and chorus were both recognized for their performances and their overall combined festival scores. These students represented the Town of Raymond and Raymond High School in a professional and positive manner, receiving compliments from judges and other school representatives. Everyone at RHS is very proud of the band and chorus program.

The class of 2010 graduated 107 students on June 18, 2010. Three students chose to enter the military after graduation. We had 24 students from the class of 2010 accepted into a one- or two-year program for the 2010-2011 school year. Thirty-eight students from the class of 2010 were accepted into four-year programs for the 2010-2011 school year. The University of New Hampshire system is a favorite destination for many RHS graduates. Other student choices are colleges such as Emerson, Wheaton, Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI), Boston University and the University of Connecticut, among others.

Raymond High School staff continues to strive to prepare our students to be productive members of society in conjunction with the Raymond community. Parent and community involvement is an important part as the Raymond High School community continues to improve. Thank you for all your support.

Iber Holmes Gove Middle School

We are very pleased to comment on the status of the Iber Holmes Gove Middle School and the progress we have made over the last year. We are enthusiastic in our work to create a middle school of excellence in all that we do: academic rigor, after school activities, field trip experiences and an extensive array of unified arts classes.

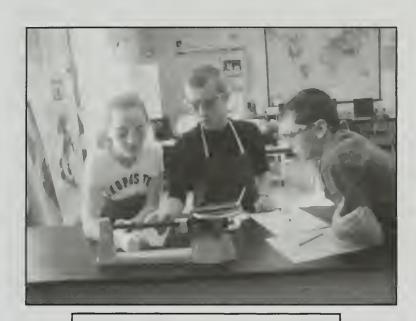
Academically, we continue to train teachers and help them stay current in both their subject matter and the best practices at middle schools. During the spring of 2010, a team of teachers attended training on Professional Learning Communities. We continue our efforts to be a true learning community that takes into account how students learn with teams of teachers working together to educate the whole child. Nine teachers attended training in Moodle and Mahara that continues through this year. This program will enable students to create student portfolios of their work that will follow them throughout their school career. The summer of 2010, six teachers attended training in Compass Learning: a remedial math and language arts program. This fall we sent six teachers to a workshop on Differentiated Instruction and seven teachers to a conference on Curriculum Mapping. Six teachers also attended a workshop on Reading in the Content Areas. In addition, we continue to train staff in CRISS (Creating Independence through Student-Owned Strategies), a program to help our students read, write and learn more effectively.

Currently, the middle school continues with reading and mathematics initiatives. Our teachers have had training in the new literature series for grades 5-8 and are implementing our new math series in grades 6-8. This year we have a new interactive science program for our 5th and 6th grade students that will afford them more opportunities for hands-on science. This past year, the middle school successfully made AYP (Annual Yearly Progress). Our continued improvement is due, in part, to these initiatives: after school Title 1 tutoring in the areas of math and reading; using the NECAP (New England Common Assessment program) tests to target instruction; and using goal setting sheets with students based on the NWEA (Northwest Educational Assessments) test results. Each year our scores have improved in all areas with credit to the hard work and efforts of our staff, parents, and students.

We have much to celebrate at the middle school. This year we welcomed new teachers and recognized those who have been in the district for benchmark years. Our new teachers are Alyssa Roe, 8th Grade Mathematics; Sharmila Shendye, Reading; Michelle Smeltz, Reading; Kelly Allinson, Autism Specialist; Jessica Hastings, Special Education; and Samantha Brown, 6th Grade. Those staff members who have reached 5 years in the district are: Linda Hardman, Ann Holt, Jodie Gibbons, Robert Oldfield, Alyssa Roe, and James White. Ten year pins were given to Marilyn Gibson, Mary Lessard and Linda Skelton. Thirty year pins (yes, 30 years!) were awarded to Mary Fosher and John Fulton. We are so lucky to have consistency in our staff in all areas: academics, housekeeping and our lunch ladies!

Middle school students have many opportunities to learn outside our school walls through field trips, technology, club activities and guest speakers. This past year, 80 of our 8th grade students traveled to Washington, D.C. Some highlights of their trip were the Lincoln Memorial, a play at Ford's Theater, and the Smithsonian Museum. Our chaperones reported that everywhere they visited, they heard wonderful comments about our students! The 8th grade learned about acceptance of others during a trip to a corn maze and take part in weekly team building activities. The 6th grade students attended Nature's Classroom this past October for a week of environmental and science studies. Teachers

and students alike were happy to have this chance to bond with their classmates while taking part in skits, an underground railroad, hiking and many science activities. The 6th grade students also took part in a program on economics called "Exchange City" this past April. Our 5th grade students took a spring walking tour of the Freedom Trail in Boston. This follows a month long study of this time in history and includes a Duck Tour. They also presented a science fair on Fantasy Animals, and completed the DARE program. The 7th grade attended two plays, held Tolerance Day, participated in

Project Safeguard and welcomed two visiting authors. One of them Doug Wilhelm, wrote a book read in 7th grade: <u>The Revealers</u>. Our 7th and 8th grade students also took part in "Career Day" with wonderful participation from many local businesses. The staff and students held a very successful "Math Night" both this past spring and this fall. This fall also saw the introduction of "Poetry Night" and 'Poebot' created by Marie Bell. Our students also chose a school motto this fall: "Learners Today, Leaders Tomorrow".

We have some awards to mention that make us very proud here at the middle school. James White has received a fellowship from NASA that will give him opportunities to explore

science courses for use in the classroom. Jennifer Datilio received an award from Hannaford Stores as a semi-finalist for the NH Teacher of the Year. Tracey Shea received an award as the NH Custodian of the Year, and Mary Fosher was a finalist for the English Teacher of the Year. Angela Gospodarek was chosen as the National Science Teacher of the Year. And Iber Holmes Gove Middle School received an award for being a finalist for NH Middle School of the Year- certainly a testament to all the hard work done by our staff and students to create a quality learning experience for everyone.

This past summer we created the first ever partnership between the Iber Holmes Gove Middle School and the Phillips Exeter Academy. Two staff members from the academy offered summer enrichment for twenty-one of our 7th and 8th grade students in language arts and mathematics. The students met with the instructors three times a week during the month of July. We recently committed to another summer of this wonderful program.

Our students and staff are wonderful! Each year they give back to their community in so many ways: canned goods collections, penny drives, collections for our service men and women, donations for the Exeter Chamber, recycling collections, and volunteer work. We continue our "Caught Being Good" program with outstanding results each month. You can not find a better group of caring people anywhere.

In closing, we could not do all that we do without the wonderful support we receive from the people of Raymond. It is a pleasure to work with the Parent Core Group, the Raymond Coalition for Youth and our many volunteers who help us with the NECAP tests, Rafflemania, Math Night, and even change our sign - they make it possible for us to be a Blue Ribbon School. We receive fantastic support from areas businesses that are always willing to help our students and our staff. Thank you for the opportunity to be principal of the Iber Holmes Gove Middle School- it is a wonderful, and humbling, experience.

Lamprey River Elementary School Daniel LeGallo, Principal Lisa Desruisseaux, Assistant Principal

The Lamprey River Elementary School community continues to make great strides in being the best that it can be. We were recognized by the New Hampshire Department of Education during the school year 2009-2010 as one of the top 10% most improved schools in math and top 25% most improved schools for reading!!!! In addition, our students continue to score higher than the national average on our computerized *NWEA* end-of-year test in math and reading. This trend has grown and continued over the last few years. This is due to the wonderful work of our faculty, staff, and students. Go Bullfrogs!

In our quest to continue to improve student achievement at the school, LRES implemented extended day kindergarten in 2009-2010 using federal dollars from the stimulus bill. We were able to support 20 students with a full day experience with our extended day kindergarten teacher and paraprofessional. Our end-of-year testing showed that this class of kindergarteners outscored all of the previous groups of kindergarten students by an average of 6 points per student. We are thrilled with the results and will continue to monitor our student achievement results to measure the effectiveness of the program.

We ended the school year in June with our wonderful 'End of Year Celebration' at the Brentwood Recreational area. 550 students, 90 staff, and over 200 parents enjoyed a wonderful day of field events, food, and sun to recognize all of the hard work of our students and staff throughout the year.

Over the summer, the LRES community continued to upgrade the facility by renovating the media center and putting new tiles in the interior hallways of the building. Thank you to our dedicated custodial staff, Richard Gorman, Fred Hunt, Chuck North, Evelyn Shea, Shauna Bolton, Mindy Bolton, Ann Franco, Dorothy McMullin, Phil Ernst, Ronnie Page, and Ryan Larney, for doing an outstanding job of cleaning and preparing the school for the opening of the school year.

In August, our staff and incoming 586 students were welcomed to a wonderful opening day of school. We also welcomed some new members to our school community. Our new staff members include Abigail Karwacki (Grade 1 teacher), Meghan McGraw (Grade 1 teacher), Courtney Wilkins (Grade 2 teacher), Kerissa Page (Grade 4 teacher), Michele Woltering (Nurse Assistant), Patricia Moynihan (Preschool Aide), Marie Zahler (Secretary), and Heather McCarthy (Special Education Aide).

Although we recognize student academic growth as our primary objective, we also value meeting our students' social, behavioral and emotional growth. To enhance this, our focus for the 2010-2011 school year is community! We are proud to be LRES Bullfrogs and began the year with celebration assemblies recognizing our many talents. During our celebration assemblies, we take the time to thank Bullfrogs for making decisions to help each other out by taking care of our school, holding doors open for each other and saying kind words to one another. Bullfrogs that are recognized for their positive choices stand for a round of applause!

Another Bullfrog community highlight is our attention to positive behaviors. Students and staff have been taking some time to discuss behavioral expectations in the hallways. When students are observed making choices like: 'walking quietly in the hallways' and 'waiting patiently in the hallways' they receive Bullfrog rewards. These recognition stickers of Freddie the Bullfrog are kept by the students or given to classroom collections for future whole class rewards.

Beginning in the fall of 2010, our faculty and staff began their intense training in the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program. We believe that all students can and should treat each other with respect and kindness. We also understand that students need to receive consistent communication from many areas regarding bullying. Our focus is to change our school culture so that bullying is less likely to occur in any area and at any time of the day. Our Olweus Coordinating Committee, made up of faculty, staff and community members, has been busy setting the stages for this transformation. We are looking forward to our 'Kick off' assembly in February, 2011 when we will begin the process of strengthening our school community even more.

Along with the devices, teachers have had the opportunities to receive valuable training and other professional development that help bring our professional practices into the 21st century.

In addition to the Title IID grant opportunities, our faculty members continue to participate in important professional development that focuses on research-based initiatives such as Curriculum Mapping, Differentiated Instruction and Assessment, CRISS, Standards-Based Grading, and Peer Coaching.

We would like to continue to thank the community of Raymond for the wonderful support of the programs and initiatives at Lamprey River Elementary School. We wouldn't be where we are today without you.

Special Education Report Mary Ellen Pantazis, Special Education Director

The past year has been very busy for the Raymond School District Special Education Department. We have served approximately 275 students district-wide. The special education staff is truly a dedicated group of people.

We began the year with the opening of our new Connections Program at the middle school. This program was designed to provide services to students on the autism spectrum in grades 4-9. This program has been an exceptional addition to our menu of special education resources. We welcomed Kelly Allinson to the district as our autism specialist and teacher for the Connections Program. We have developed a parent series on autism spectrum disorders and we are meeting four times this year to discuss topics related to autism and to share resources.

This school year brought a number of new staff members to the special education department. Janet Wilson is our new Special Education Coordinator at the Raymond High School. Terry Littlefield is our new case manager and teacher of the BASIC program at the Raymond High School. Betsy Murphy is a new case manager at Raymond High School. Jessica Hastings is a new case manager at the middle school. Welcome to all of you!

This year the stimulus funds in the district allowed us to maintain a school psychologist position at the Raymond High School. We are pleased to have Linda Perrott in that position this year. This has been a tremendous addition to our special education programming. Our school psychologists assist teachers in understanding student behaviors and how to redirect their management and improved behavior.

The stimulus funds have afforded us the opportunity to purchase Red Cat Amplification Systems to be used in the classrooms, and laptops to be used at the elementary school. In addition we will soon have available Number Worlds Math intervention program and members of our staff will be receiving training in Picture Object Communication systems. E-readers have been purchased for the resource rooms. We plan to download the books used in district for Language Arts and English classes to develop an electronic library for our students to use in the resource rooms. Our work in this area has been used as models for the state.

This year we have 11 students participating in the New Hampshire Alternative Assessment for the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) testing. New Hampshire is piloting a new system for alt assessments and Raymond special education teams at the high school and the middle school were chosen to be participants in the pilot. The pilot was held through the month of October. This was an excellent learning opportunity for our staff.

This past summer our special education staff once again hosted Camp Can Do. This camp was designed specifically for students who use Alternative Augmentative Communication devices. Camp Can Do is growing and we had many students attend camp from all over the state. It remains a tremendous program for our students and our staff.

I would like to thank the entire community for allowing me the privilege of being your special education director. Raymond School District is a wonderful place!

Curriculum Coordinator's Report Jon Hall, Curriculum Coordinator

During the past year, we have made much progress and enjoyed many successes, including curriculum mapping, updating certain curricular areas, studying standards-based grading, developing competencies (learning goals) for each subject at each grade level, integrating technology, analyzing the new Common Core State Standards (CCSS). In addition, as a district, we made Adequate Yearly Progress, as measured by NECAP testing.

We were able to update several of the core curriculum maps that were completed over the past few years. We were also able to create several of these core maps for grades 9-12. All of the mapping work was done during a summer workshop in 2010. We will continue to monitor and update these maps and add core maps for new courses. Our Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Council has begun the work of analyzing the new CCSS to determine what changes to our current curriculum will be needed to meet the new standards by 2014. The new mathematics and English/language arts standards that are being addressed are more focused and more challenging than the current NH standards. It will take us at least a year to review all of these documents and develop a plan for implementation at all levels of instruction.

Our Achievement Grading Study Team has worked hard to learn as much as possible about standards-based grading over the past year. We are now developing a plan for beginning the integration of standards-based grading in our schools within the next two years. Teachers, with the assistance of our consultant, Rose Colby, and our administrative team, have started to develop the competencies, also known as learning goals, for each subject at each grade level. Our teams of teachers have been very busy doing all of the development work for this prerequisite need for standards-based grading. The work includes identifying power standards, developing performance indicators, creating assessments with grading rubrics, and differentiating the assessments according to Webb's depths of knowledge levels.

In 4th, 5th and 6th grades we have been able to provide a new hands-on, inquiry-based science curriculum. This allows a continuation of the inquiry-based science that we already had in place in grades 1-3. What this means for us is a more valid and interesting experience for our students in our science classes. We believe that students learn best by conducting experiments, communicating with each other and with their teacher about procedures, results and conclusions. They can begin to visualize themselves as scientific investigators as they work in this real-world, applied way.

In the area of technology integration for curriculum improvement, we have been able to train many teachers in the uses of interactive white boards, LCD projectors, digital video cameras, netbooks and other digital tools. At this time we are in the last stages of our Title IID ARRA grant at LRES, where many of our 3rd and 4th grade students and their teachers are using instructional technology on a daily basis.

Raymond School District Technology Kevin Lemoi, Technology Director

Over this last year the Raymond IT Department has completed a number of large projects and we have begun to look towards the future of what the 21st century classroom in Raymond will look like. Much of the infrastructure upgrades for the district are now in place and all schools have begun to enjoy the increased Internet speeds, shared resources, and servers which run quickly and have increased storage space. The new Raymond unified network is now interconnected by state of the art fiber optical cables that run from each school to the administration office. This unified network allows us to combine servers from all schools into one server array. This combined array has eliminated the waste of extra servers at each school while still giving us the redundancy we need for emergency and security purposes. With our new unified network staff can share files from one building to another without the need for email, all securely on our closed network.

Our efforts this year have been helped greatly by the addition of an IT technician. With this addition, we have achieved our goal in the technology plan to have one technician for each school. Raymond IT technicians perform services district-wide and have begun the process of moving towards becoming technology integrators - a clear step towards the 21st century classroom. Our goal over the year is to directly assist teachers to integrate technology in their classrooms and help maximize student achievement.

The district Moodle server is fully operational with all teachers and students loaded into this new system. Moodle is a classroom management system (CMS) that allows teachers and students to post and view educational material in a secure online environment. Teachers can post homework assignments, course outlines and list online resources for student to access from any computer in or out of the district. Many of the staff have taken extra training to learn how to use this new 21st century collaborative software. Over the next year we will continue to develop Moodle by training teachers on how best to utilize it in the classroom.

Over the last year the district has begun exploring the use of new technology including the Apple iPad and iTouch. These devices have much potential for all students. These devices are fast finding their way into classrooms all across the United States. Raymond will be looking very hard over the next year at the benefits of these devices to ensure that our students have access to the latest educational technology. Web 2.0 devices can help students break away from the limitations of a single computer space and introduces true mobile computing. We will continue to expand our building wireless networks to better accommodate the use of mobile devices. The 21st century student is no longer bound by location to access their work. One of our goals over the coming year will be to explore the use of Google Applications to give teachers and students access to their information from any location and on a variety of computing devices.

In 2007 the Raymond School district began an experiment with video conference technology to help bring home-based students into the classroom using Skype, a free online video conference technology. Three years later the use of video technology has helped transform the educational opportunities for special needs students. With our fiber optic network in place we are well positioned to expand the use of this "distance education" and bring the world to all our students in an immersive experience that will have a major impact on students.

Through a federal grant for the Lamprey River Elementary School, new technology instructional tools were installed in all 3rd and 4th grade classrooms and teachers have begun to use these new technologies. With this new media, students can interact with projected lessons and achieve a level of collaboration and interaction that traditional methods cannot duplicate. Smart technologies help create a sense of "fun" to learning and as a result can boost student achievement and fire the imagination of our students. We have been placing Smartboards in the district and the strong impact of this technology is clear. We will continue to work towards our goal of making this resource universally accessible throughout the district.

Instructional technology helps our students succeed but without the proper implementation its impact would be significantly diminished. This year the district has launched the 21st Century Technology committee to look beyond just the hardware and software aspects of technology and explore the methodology behind how all this technology can best be applied. This committee, comprised of teachers and administrators, has the task of looking towards the future and how we might reshape and improve the application of technology in the classroom. We are building a bridge between theory, application and implementation, the effects of which will be felt well into the 21st Century.

We are pleased to report that we have fully entered a new phase of educational technology application in Raymond. With an up-to-date network in place, we can now turn much more of our time and efforts towards developing new educational resources and experiences. We will focus our attention onto the 21st century classroom and decide how to best use our resources and talents here within Raymond to give all our students the best possible education in this new digital world.



Raymond School District Maintenance Todd Ledoux, Facilities Director

2010 has proven to be a successful year for the Facilities Department. There have been many improvements as well as the day to day upkeep to keep the buildings operational. Some of the accomplishments we have seen over the past year are as follows.

The Lamprey River Elementary School received new VCT flooring in the hallways of the main section of the building. The old carpeting was removed and the new floors really brighten up the appearance of the school. The media center carpet was also removed and replaced, giving it a nice look to match the surrounding hallways. The playground extension also took place, adding a fenced in grass area to the rear of the playground. We plan to open this to students in the coming year.

The Iber Holmes Gove Middle received some smaller improvements over the past year such as new paint in the hallways and classrooms. This building continues to maintain its new appearance.

The Raymond High School also saw some improvements over the past year. The rear entrance off of the student parking lot was modified to encourage after-hours users to enter and exit through that area. We also began the process of upgrading the student bathrooms throughout the building.

District wide over the past year we have put a lot of effort into reducing our energy consumption. We are continuously making improvements or alterations to increase our energy efficiency. It is important for everyone who uses the buildings to understand this and know that they, too, play a part in reducing our energy consumption. Through education and understanding, we hope to develop a culture of people who fully understand and participate in our energy saving measures.

Our dedication to energy savings has earned us the Energy Star Award for both the Iber Holmes Gove Middle School and the Raymond High School. The process for earning this award began with a review of our utility invoices and building data, such as square footage, number of occupants, hours of operation, etc, by a company which is part of NH Energy Smart Schools Program. The data is then compiled and processed, turning it into an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) score for each building. The average score for New Hampshire Schools is a 50. The Lamprey River Elementary School received a score of 66, the Middle School received a score of 90 and the High School received a score of 96, thus giving the district an average of 88. Once we received the scores we were able to use the high marks at the middle and high school to submit our application for the Energy Star Award for each of those schools. After a tour of and some testing at each of the schools, we received notification that both schools would be receiving the Energy Star Award. Plaques with the Energy Star designation are mounted in each of the buildings.

In closing we would like to thank all of the maintenance and custodial staff for their efforts to make the accomplishments of the past year a reality. We would also like to thank the town employees for all of their help over the past year. The custodial staff works diligently to ensure a clean, healthy environment for everyone using the buildings and to ensure that our schools last for many years to come. Through teamwork and devotion we will continue to provide a learning environment that is healthy, safe, and efficient.

We have had an exciting and productive year in the Raymond School Food Service Department. Many wonderful changes have occurred with our program and we foresee more significant changes in our future. Wellness and nutrition are our main foci and we continue to provide healthy meals for our students. We follow the USDA dietary guidelines when choosing food items for our menus and continue to offer fresh fruits and vegetables and whole grain breads.

In support of local farmers and healthy eating, we are now involved in the "Farm to School" program. NH Farm to School (NHFTS) is a statewide program working to connect NH farms and schools to enable schools to serve healthy, locally grown foods in their cafeterias.

Our cafeteria workers have and will continue to attend classes and seminars offered by the School Nutrition Association of New Hampshire. The full-time staff is working toward their Nutrition Certification and will have earned enough credits next year to receive their SNA Level 1 certification. The kitchen staff is periodically offered on-site training in food safety, sanitation and HACCP procedures.

We are pleased with our involvement with the New Hampshire Cooperative Buying Group. Through this group, we combine our buying power with 22 other schools throughout the state to purchase food and paper products at the best price possible. Our new supplier is Favorite Foods, Inc. out of Somersworth. They are the only independently owned New Hampshire food distributer.

During 2009-2010, Raymond School Food Service provided meals for approximately 460 students at Raymond High School, 450 students at Iber Holmes Gove Middle School and 455 students at Lamprey River Elementary School. An estimated number of the amount of reimbursable meals served in the 2009-2010 school year is as follows:

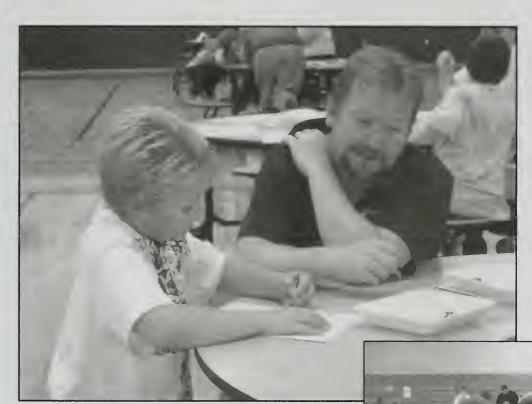

To the Members of the School Board Raymond School District Raymond, New Hampshire

The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.
