

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TOWN OF SEABROOK
PROPOSED AMENDMENTS ZONING ORDINANCE
(Final)

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Section IV B (Area and Height Regulations) so that said Section read as follows:

1. "B. AREA AND FRONTAGE: No building shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located on a lot containing less than Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet in area, or less than One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of frontage on an existing road, or less than One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of depth and has an average width of One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet unless such lot is a lot of record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the enactment of this Ordinance. No dwelling building shall contain more than two(2) living units per One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of frontage on an existing road or more than two (2) living units per Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet of land area. Provided, that except in those areas of Zone 2 to the East of Black Water River, an additional dwelling building containing no more than one living unit may be placed on a lot in Zone 2, in addition to such buildings as are otherwise herein permitted on a lot, provided that said lot contains Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet of land area per dwelling building."

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Section IV C as follows:

"C. SET BACK AND SIDE LINE: No building or structure shall be placed within

1. Twenty (20) feet for a residential use or
2. Thirty (30) feet for a commercial use, or
3. Fifty (50) for an industrial use from the sidelines of the right-of-way of any road There shall be a side yard having a minimum width of ten(10) feet for all residential buildings and structures and fifteen (15) feet for all commercial and industrial buildings and structures."

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To add to Section VII, a new Sub-Section F, so that said Section reads as follows:

F. CONTROLLED GROWTH:

To guide the growth of the Town in a manner not to exceed its present and future ability to provide expanded facilities to support such growth, and specifically to protect public health standards such as water quality and quantity and sewage treatments requirements.

The following restrictions are set:

1. the issuance of building permits for dwellings in any subdivision shall be limited in any one calendar year to fifteen (15%) per cent of the number of undeveloped lots existing in said subdivision as of January 1, 1978, or if approved after January 1, 1978, on the date of said Town approval until said subdivision is filled.
2. In all cases where the computation of the percentage under subparagraph 1 above is a fraction, that fraction shall be rounded to the nearest whole number, and in no case shall be less than one.
3. For the purposes of sub-paragraph 1 above, a subdivision shall mean the division of a lot, tract or parcel of land into two or more lots, plats, sites or other division of land for the purpose of sale or building development including mobile home parks.
4. Building permits for non-dwelling construction and for the expansion, alteration or replacement of existing buildings shall not be subject to this Section.

If any provision of this Ordinance or any portion of such provision or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance and the remainder of such provision and the application thereof to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 27 - read by the Moderator: "see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$250,000) Dollars for the purpose of acquiring suitable property, and for making such improvements as maybe required to provide office space for the Board of Selectmen, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and such other administrative offices."

Motion by Bruce G. Brown, second by Robert Brown to accept as read.

A 2/3 vote required to pass.

Voting time one hour. Voting started 8:46PM ended 9:46PM.

ARTICLE 59 - read by the Moderator: "see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration."

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by Clyde O. Brown to accept as read.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 60 - read by the Moderator: "see if the Town will adopt the resolution pursuant to application to the Federal Insurance Administration."

Motion by Charles H. Felch, second by Basil Savanelli.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 61 - read by the Moderator: "see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulation pursuant to RSA 156 in conjunction with the National Flood Insurance Program as follows:

1. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (50% or more of the market value of structure) including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure. (ii) use construction Materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.
2. The Building Inspector shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize any base flood elevation data available from a Federal State, or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the base flood level and (ii) all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or floodproofed to or above the base flood level.
3. The Building Inspector shall require that all mobile homes to be placed within Zone A on the community's Flood Hazard Boundary Map shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (i) over-the-top ties

be provided at each of the four corners of the mobile home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring on additional tie per side, (ii) frame ties be provided at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side, (iii) all components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds; and (iv) any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored."

ACCEPTED AS READ.

4. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood prone areas new and replacement water supply systems to be designed to minimize and eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems.
5. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood prone areas (i) new and replacement sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and (ii) on-site waste disposal systems to be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.

ARTICLE 6 - read by the Moderator: "vote to reaffirm the vote of the Town granting the Planning Board power to review and approve site plans for non-residential uses in accordance with RSA 36:19a."

ARTICLE 7 - read by the Moderator: "appropriate the sum of (\$3,288) Dollars to join the Southeastern N.H. Regional Planning Comm. and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for membership."

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Eric N. Small to accept as read.

MOTION DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 25 - read by the Moderator: "appropriate the sum of (\$4,000) Dollars to obtain appraisals and cost studies as maybe recommended by the Town Office Study Committee or the Selectmen toward the purchase of property for a Town Office facility and to recess the Town Meeting to reconvene at the call of the Selectmen for the purpose of determining a specific location for the Town Office facility."

Motion to accept as amended by Eric N. Small, second by Robert Brown.

MOTION ACCEPTED AS AMENDED.

ARTICLE 26 - read by the Moderator: "authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to withdraw the total balance of the monies from the Capital Reserve Fund known as the Municipal Building Fund, which is approximately (\$86,893) Dollars plus interest, to acquire property and for making such improvements as maybe required to provide a town office facility, and to authorize the Selectmen to acquire said property and make said improvement."

Motion by Bruce G. Brown, second by James Champoux to accept as read.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 8 - read by the Moderator: "appropriate the sum of (\$2,000) Dollars as the Town's 20% local match toward a Coastal Energy Impact

Program (CEIP) Planning Grant, and authorize the Selectmen to take such action as may be required to obtain said Grant. The purpose of this grant is to plan for the impact of Seabrook Station on the facilities and services of the Town. "

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 9 - read by the Moderator: "authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund Town notes.:

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 10 - read by the Moderator: "authorize the Selectmen to accept Federal and/or State and/or other funds to be applied to the salaries of Town employees."

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by Clyde O. Brown.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 11 - read by the Moderator: "vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated below."

ARTICLE 12 - read by the Moderator: "authorize the Selectmen to appoint such permanent police officers, fireman and employees for all other departments of the Town as they deem necessary."

ARTICLE 14 - read by the Moderator: "vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire an Administrative Assistant to assist the Selectmen in their duties; and raise and appropriate the sum of (\$13,500) Dollars as a salary for said position."

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Eric N. Small to accept as read.

Amendment to Article 14 - The Administrative Assistant cannot hold any other Town Office or job, elected or appointed.

Motion by Dennis Costa, second by Robie Beckman to accept as Amended.

Amendment to Article 14 - the Administrative Assistant be hired for one year only.

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown to accept as amended.

ARTICLE 15 - read by the Moderator: "vote to appropriate the sum of (\$13,500) for the purpose of paying the salary of one full time Selectmen."

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by Clyde O. Brown, to postpone Article 15 indefinitely,

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by James C. Falconer to reconvene Friday, March 17, 1978 at 7:30 PM.

ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING MARCH 17, 1978

ARTICLE 19 - read by the Moderator: "vote to expend a part of the unexpended portion of the Bonds issued for the improvement of the municipal water system, as provided in Article 3 of the 1974 Town Warrant in the amount of (\$30,000) Dollars towards the expansion of a water main from Smithtown to Collins Street."

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by Clyde O. Brown to accept as read.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 20 - read by the Moderator: "authorize the Selectmen to negotiate into a agreement for the exchange of Town-owned land and land owned by Robert Bartlett and Edmund Battlett or others, located off of the Old New Boston Road and off of the Ledge Road, for the purpose of protecting the Town well fields."

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by Clyde O. Brown to accept as read.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 21 - read by the Moderator: "vote to appropriate the sum of (\$18,660) Dollars for the purpose of paying for the sewage treatment study."

Amendment by Eric N. Small, second by James C. Falconer to amend figure to read (\$19,920) Dollars.

AMENDMENT ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 22 - read by the Moderator: "petition of Robie M. Beckman and 12 other voters of the Town: vote to establish a three member board of sewer commissioners, as provided for in RSA 252."

Motion by Robie M. Beckman, second by Clyde O. Brown to accept as read.

MOTION DEFEATED

ARTICLE 28 - read by the Moderator: "see what action the Town will take regarding the following proposal for dealing with the Town solid waste disposal:

The Town shall enter into a two year contract with RESCO for the transportation and disposal of the Town's solid waste at a per ton cost of (\$25.00) with a price escalation to be calculated at the end of the first year based on standard cost of living and property tax factors.

Motion by Arthur Wicklund, second by Eric N. Small to table this article.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 29 - read by the Moderator: "see what action the Town will take regarding the following alternate proposal for dealing with town solid waste disposal:

This article was amended three times to read as follows:

"The Town shall enter into a two year contract with RESCO, or any other Waste Disposal Co. and to advertize and accept bids. This cost is determined and conditioned upon the town installing and operating appropriate weigh scales and compaction equipment. The Selectmen shall be authorized to negotiate all other terms of the contract.

These three amendments were made by Eric N. Small, second by James C. Falconer.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 30 - read by the Moderator: "see if the Town will vote to recess the Town Meeting to reconvene at the call of the Selectmen for the purpose of taking whatever action is necessary or indicated by the Rockingham County Solid Waste Study to enable the Town to meet its solid waste disposal needs in conformity with existing laws and regulations."

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by James C. Falconer to accept as read.

Amendment to motion by Eric N. Small, second by James C. Falconer to eliminate (or indicated by the Rockingham County Solid Waste Study) of main motion.

MOTION ACCEPTED AS AMENDED

ARTICLE 31 - read by the Moderator: "authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the operator of solid waste disposal facilities to be established in the Town of North Andover for the disposal of refuse, garbage and waste and for the use of by-products resulting from the operation of such facilities, which contract will

1. be for a term of twenty years, more or less;
2. include provisions for the delivery of minimum amounts of refuse garbage and waste and payments for the use of the facilities to be based thereon;
3. provide for unit prices that will be graduated and for adjustments thereof and for the use of steam, electricity and other byproducts resulting from the use of the facilities and for credits or payments of the Town resulting therefrom;
4. the use by the Town of other municipalities of the uncommitted capacity of such facilities;
5. contain other provisions incidental and related to the foregoing general matters; and
6. be generally in the form of proposed contract negotiated by representatives of the member communities of the Northeast Solid Waste Committee (NESWC) with such changes therein as maybe approved by said Board of Selectmen.

Motion by Daniel Gretsches, second by Alice Gretsches.

MOTION ACCEPTED.

ARTICLE 32 - read by the Moderator: "various Commercial and Industrial businesses within said Town pay a very significant part of the taxes in the Town; and whereas said businesses provide jobs for many of our townspeople; and whereas said businesses do not place any burden upon the school system of the town and only get police and fire protection from said town; and whereas said businesses have no pickup by the Town of its rubbish and waste; although its

taxes are figured in part upon this service: To see if the Town will vote to allow the various Commercial and Industrial businesses in the town to dispose of their rubbish and waste at the Town Dump facility without charge."

Motion by Bruce G. Brown, second by Gary Fowler to accept as read.
MOTION DEFEATED.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL BUILDING COMMITTEE FOR THE
NOVEMBER 16, 1978 SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

ARTICLE #1 is to purchase the Parkman Clinic at the traffic circle for a town office facility. This property consists of 1.7 acres with 394 feet of frontage on Lafayette Road, 302 feet of frontage on Main Street and 345 feet of frontage on the circle. It is bounded north-erly by the Trinity United Church and the boundary line is about five (5) feet from the church building.

Mr. George Dow, a local contractor, was engaged by the Committee to give his opinion on the condition of the building on this property. He reported that it is one of the best built buildings in town. It is about 40 years of age and in very good condition and well kept. The timbers and floor beams are strong as the building was made for commercial use. The wiring is up to date with a 200 amp. service and the heating is almost new and adequate. He is also of the opinion that it could be easily and quickly converted to use by the town.

The building has approximately 3500 square feet of space on the ground floor; with a large usable upstairs; a fairly large cellar, large restrooms and a good septic system. If needed, there is plenty of area for a addition especially to the west. There are adequate areas for parking on the sides and to the north. The over-grown area between the parking lot and the church could be made into a town common type area with walkways and park benches. This property is very accessible to all areas of town and traffic would not be a problem here for anyone.

The Town War Memorials are here at the circle, the old cemeteries are here and are being beautified; the church is at one end and with the town office building at the other end, this area could well rank with the other beautiful Town Commons throughout New England and would be something we could be very proud of.

The price is \$295,000.00 with \$37,500.00 being available from the Federal Government if the town wished to set aside the area between the parking lot and the church for recreation. The cost to the town would then be \$257,500.00.

Article #2 is to purchase the Chase Homestead on the west side of Lafayette Road or to take an option thereon.

This property consists of about 11.8 acres with 475 foot front-age on Lafayette Road and runs back for a considerable distance over a brook to higher land.

Mr. Dow also was engaged to give his opinion on the condition of the building on this lot. He reported that the building is old (the south part being Colonial) and in poor condition. Some corner posts and sills are gone, but timbers are sound. There is no central heat, the wiring is not good, septic system is questionable. The building needs a lot of repair and in his opinion is not suitable for use as a town office facility.

He dose however feel that the Colonial or south part with repairs could be used as a museum type building.

The Committee feels that several buildings about town, of a historical nature, could be moved onto this property and that the land to the west of the brook, approximately 7.4 acres, could be used for many recreational purposes which the Federal Government would pay one half of.

It is also a possibility that a completely new town office building could be constructed on the front part of this parcel, however, there is a growing need in Seabrook for some type of housing for the elderly for our Senior Citizens which might be a better use for this parcel, one reason being its closeness to the shopping centers and Post Office and Bank.

It must be pointed out however, that a severe traffic problem exists in this area; especially during the summer months.

The price is \$216,850.00 with \$15,000.00 being available from the government if the area west of the brook is set aside as a recreational area. Also, the Chase Homestead Trustees might give \$16,850.00 as a gift to the town to perpetuate the "Chase Homestead".

The cost to the town would be \$201,850.00 for the Chase Homestead parcel.

In summary, the committee recommends that the town purchase the Parkman Clinic for use as a Town Office Facility at a net cost of \$257,500.00. Also, that the town purchase the Chase Homestead for use as a historical and recreational area and any other use it finds suitable at a net cost of \$201,850.00.

Total cost of both parcels would be \$459,350.00. There is presently available \$250,000.00; raised at the March Town Meeting and included in this years tax rate, and over \$90,000.00 in the Municipal Building Trust Fund being a total of \$340,000.00, meaning that if we buy both parcels, only \$119,350.00 would have to be raised at the 1979 Town Meeting.

We urge you to vote YES on Articles 1,2, and 3.

Our community has witnessed perhaps more activity in the year 1978 than in any year since its founding two hundred ten years ago. It has been a year of change, a year of chaos and, above all, a year of controversy.

There was the proposed mall and the traffic tie-ups on the main road, the blizzard, the water ban, the late night construction noise, the apartment building fire, the so-called combat zone with its drugs and vandalism, the countless burglaries, the cooperative high school bond issue.

Demonstrations, occupations, parade permits, special town meetings, demands on town water for construction use, rumors of a religious cult moving into town, the Ku Klux Klan--Seabrook has become a household word across America.

In spite of these difficulties, our town government has made much progress in meeting the challenges of these times in countless ways.

Town Meeting '78 supported our efforts to control growth by adopting a minimum lot size of 30,000 square feet and by passing the controlled growth ordinance. It voted to retain our appraiser, to hire an administrative assistant to the Board of Selectmen and to support our efforts to limit the demands on our water by enacting the 1974 moratorium on building.

The meeting gave the Board two options from which to select a long term solution for our solid waste disposal. It passed the \$250,000 bond issue to purchase a town office building, and in November, the voters chose the Parkman Clinic for our new town office and approved an option on the Chase Homestead for future development.

The old way of selecting a police chief by ballot was rescinded, a youth study committee was established and regulations were adopted, allowing those living in flood-pron areas to acquire national flood insurance.

In turn, the Board has pressured its engineering firm to locate a source of water, has forced the large businesses to correct their faulty sewage systems, and has taken steps to contract with a new engineering firm.

An equitable and non-political method for hiring town employees has been adopted by the Board, with the State Department of Personnel administering written and oral examinations for applicants of the police and fire departments.

The Board adopted a personnel policy for all town employees and it re-appointed a conservation commission to protect the town's natural areas.

We have met with our state legislators and senator, requesting them to resolve problems such as dredging the harbor, state taxation of Seabrook Station, establishing a district court in town, erecting traffic lights at the intersection of Rte 1 and Railroad Ave., and demolishing the Railroad Ave. bridge.

The Board has devoted hours handling problems concerning water. Extensive well explorations have resulted in a potential well of small yield on the Lower Collins Road. Iron bacteria was found in Well #4, causing discoloration in many water services. When it was shut down for purging, the water levels in the holding tanks began to fall, which could have created a serious problem had a major fire occurred during this period.

The Board has been negotiating with a landowner to the north of the Crovetti well field. Plans have been registered for a nineteen lot subdivision, which may create problems for our wells in the future. Also, the road agent has been directed not to salt on a section of True Road and of Riley Road. Wells # 1 and #3 are within 400 feet of these roads and could become contaminated over a long period of time.

The dogs have been removed from the Fogg-Pineo wells, which have been re-activated for testing purposes only. The wells were discontinued for some unknown reason in 1973. They could provide a valuable source to the water system.

An agreement was reached with Public Service Company concerning its use of town water, after much deliberation! No more than 55,000 gpd can be used by the utility for domestic purposes; however, the town "will make additional water available for construction purposes as water is reasonably available."

The commercial-industrial rate for town water was increased from 30¢ to 55¢ per thousand gallons. The USM, Bailey Division, installed a recycling unit which conserves an additional 40,000 to 100,000 gpd. Ornstein Chemical drove its own well and set up a recirculation system.

Town water has been used by the residents of the Hampton side of Seabrook Beach since September 1976. The American Water Works was put on notice that our town water would be cut off to them unless their line across the Hampton River was repaired. An agreement was reached whereby the Salisbury Water Company supplied twice the water to our system than was consumed by the Hampton residents. Service to Hampton was terminated in September.

All overdue water bills were paid in full. Likewise, action was taken to collect all unpaid water installation bills, including a 4% interest charge, and it was voted to bill private contractors for damages to the system.

The Board directed the water foreman to survey all water services and to update all individual water service record cards. With the resignation of our water clerk Barbara Richardson, the position was filled by Judi Melansen, who also takes the minutes of our weekly meetings.

To guard against vandalism to our new stand pipe, two large sodium flood lights have been installed to the rear of the fire station. The graffiti on the tower was repainted.

With the aid of the health officer, the Board corrected many faulty sewage systems of the big businesses and industries. In several cases, the assistance of the attorney general was called upon.

Applications are being sought for a study of the cluster system method for handling municipal sewage problems. Fourteen deficiencies were spotted by the state regarding our \$30,000 sewage study. It did not assess the effect of such a system on our water supply nor the need of such a plant. The Board denied a request for \$20,000 to complete the study.

Our solid waste is still hauled to the RESCO facility in Saugus. The Board is negotiating with Public Service Company and with USM, Bailey Division, for the purchase of the land at the transfer station off the Rocks Road. Landfill rights must be secured for USM. Scales were installed at the site in December.

The North East Solid Waste Committee conducted a study of our transfer station. It recommended remaining with our present program for at least two years, rather than replacing the open hauling method with a compaction station. The Solid Waste Committee, however, recommends the town purchase such a facility. It looks toward the county for a long-term solution.

The fire chief is developing guidelines for the use of the ambulance. Vernon R. Small was appointed superintendent of the fire alarm system, and he is training the men to install the lines. The 1977 police station wagon was purchased by the fire department for official use by the chief and two permanent positions were filled in the department.

An ordinance was adopted prohibiting parking of motor vehicles on any fire lanes, as requested by the police and fire chiefs. The Board coordinated the handling of arson cases by the police and fire departments by resolving the communication gap and by giving two firemen special police appointments for arson investigations.

Three permanent positions were filled on the police department. Each new officer must sign a two year agreement with the Selectmen, pledging to stay with the town for this minimum time.

With the high rate of motor vehicle accidents within the department, the Board has attempted to have the officers engage in a driver training program. An additional officer was allowed to assist the lieutenant-detective on investigative cases involving burglaries.

The Board will appoint a police chief in March by having the New Hampshire Municipal Association advertise the position and screen the applicants. The final selection will be made through a joint interview of the applicants by the Selectmen and by five members of the Association of New Hampshire Police Chiefs.

Two permanent men were appointed to the highway department. The Road Agent keeps a maintenance chart for town vehicles at our urging, and a no parking ordinance was promulgated--no cars can park on town roads during snow storms. The Board has requested the road Agent to create a plan for 1979 re drainage, street signs, tree cutting, hot topping and solid lines for town roads.

We propose to survey the entire Hillside Cemetery in Smithtown. The stone wall was extended, with only a small section needing to be reconstructed. The fee

for a grave site increased from \$25 to \$100, revenues to be deposited with the Trustees of the Trust Fund for maintenance purposes. Many complaints were made about mini-bikes and snowmobiles damaging grave stones. The Board hopes to purchase a chain link fence to enclose the Elmwood and Wildwood graveyards.

The dog officer was allowed the use of an old $\frac{1}{2}$ ton pickup, and he was directed to dispose of animals by cremation. An ordinance prohibiting the drinking of alcoholic beverages at town parks was passed, and the town's mosquito program will be handled by the Rockingham County Mosquito Control program in 1979.

The Civil Defense director has met several times with us regarding precautions in the event of another storm, and the Street Light Committee has been before the Board concerning its plans for meeting the town's lighting needs.

The Board will soon be adopting guidelines for the distribution of aid to the needy. In 1977, \$22,500 was appropriated for the town poor account, total funds dispersed in this budget was \$12,815. In 1978, \$17,000 was appropriated and approximately \$9,000 was spent.

Twelve cease and desist orders were issued for zoning violations, with two court cases pending, involving two mobile home parks. Two joint meetings were held with Town Counsel, the Building Inspector, the Planning Board and the Board of Adjustment to discuss zoning violations and to clarify interpretations of the ordinance. The Selectmen now review all building permits with the building inspector, and applications for federal funds have been made for designing a master plan for Seabrook.

Our most helpful aid has been the administrative assistant--Steven Coes. Correspondence, office management and research have never been handled more efficiently at the office. The Board is able to transact twofold its business by delegating the more time-consuming work to the assistant.

We adopted a much-needed personnel policy. A one-write accounting system was set up for the selectmen's clerk, and the town ordinance book was updated with the help of the town clerk. In August, Margaret Nedeau resigned; she was replaced by Nona Griggs.

The Board meets twice weekly--Tuesday evening and Thursday morning. The 7 am to 12 noon meeting permits the Selectmen to see through much more work and enables the Board to transact business with the town employees more conveniently.

A new building committee was appointed after the November meeting; it consists of Stanley A. Hamel, Bruce G. Brown and Bessie S. Hamel. A short term note has been issued for the purchase of the Parkman property.

A tax map for all land west of the marshes was completed, and six cases were approved for non-conforming use assessment on Lafayette Road. By state law, all tax inventories not returned by the set deadline receive an automatic fine.

The Board has had the town's insurance policies thoroughly updated, with some substantial savings made. George Castleton was appointed the town's insurance broker. It was found that premiums were being paid mistakenly on two individuals. To date, the town has been credited for one and has applied for reimbursement on the other.

An inventory of all town vehicles was conducted with photos of each one placed on file, and a plan for a house numbering system has been drafted with a map containing the house lot numbers.

In regards to the beach, the proposed ramp at the harbor should be constructed in 1979. An archeological review of the site was required before federal funds could be released. A sodium flood light was placed at the town pier for the fishermen.

On the advise of the fire chief, the no parking ordinance was made more restrictive. The south side of each east-west street was prohibited from parking during the summer for emergency reasons. The Board will conduct a program to remove all obstacles on the town-owned right of ways extending to the ocean front.

We extend our sincere thanks to the town officials, employees, committeemen and individuals who have made possible the progress we have worked for during the year 1978.

ASSESSING DEPARTMENT

LEGISLATIVE:

There have been no major Legislative changes this year regarding assessment procedure other than the area of State Assessment Ration studies. The State Department of Revenue Administration will be conducting the study annually instead of Bi-Annually as in the past. Our new ratio of Assessment value to market value is 84%.

PENDING LEGISLATION

Significant Legislation is being introduced in the House this year that would alter the method of taxing and the distribution of taxes from Public Utility Power Plants. Seabrook has no intention of sitting idly by while others decide how to "spread" its taxable Real Estate. Both of our Representatives, as well as our special legal counsel and our Assessor, are concentrating on the Defeat of such Legislation. At this writing, our research and efforts make us optimistic of a favorable outcome for the Town.

NUCLEAR PLANT

The Atomic Power Plant being constructed here in Seabrook will continue to be appraised on "partial construction" basis this coming year. The Assessing Department has a program of continuing research which involves both Law and Appraisal Theory, in order to conduct fair and equitable assessment with regard to this property.

TOWN MAPPING

On December 29th. "Parker Survey" delivered the final working set of Tax Maps to the Town of Seabrook. This coming year the Town plans to hold hearings and viewings for the General Public. At that time, corrections and adjustments will be made as the need arises.

We are now in compliance with State Law for 1980

MAP MAINTENANCE

The Assessing Department will now take over the Lot Line changes and corrections on a Yearly basis. This information will come from approved Plot Plan changes and Registry Deeds.

OFFICE FACILITIES

We have found many advantages to our new layout of Offices, Centralization of Facilities being the foremost. The citizen can now conduct all of his business in one building, and information can be exchanged between departments with ease. In addition, we have considerably better records control and storage facilities.

SEACOAST REGIONAL COUNSELING CENTER

Over the past 15 years the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center has developed into a viable, established fixture in the network of health care services throughout the region. Our goal throughout the years has been to provide a comprehensive range of "community" mental health services at an easily accessible location for the residents of the region.

From a six room outpatient clinic within the Portsmouth Hospital in 1963, we have grown to be a multifaceted mental health center offering a variety of services for children ages 3-12, youth ages 13-18, and adults.

Over the past year the center provided Direct Treatment to a total of 1,281 clients. This figure does not include persons serviced through consultative, educational and activity programs.

As I reflect on this year, I feel that the center has experienced a year of change, growth and planning for the future to enable us to continue to provide high quality mental health care.

In terms of major changes, one important change has been the restructuring of all services for adults. In July of 1977 the Rehabilitation Day Treatment Program, Emergency Services, Adult Outpatients Services, and Follow-Up Care merged under one program - Adult Services.

Our youth program, The Junction Youth Resource Center, has made changes in terms of it's services for the outlying communities. The Junction has taken considerable steps towards providing a solid outreach program, which brings youth services out into our borderline towns. The Junction has also expanded it's range of alternative youth programs to include a Poetry Workshop, which has been an extremely successful program.

In regards to planning for the future, this year we have devoted a substantial amount of time to the planning and preparation of a Comprehensive Community Mental Health Plan for region eight. The major components of the plan include proposals calling for a 10 bed Psychiatric Inpatient Unit within Portsmouth Hospital, an Elderly Services Program, and a Community Services Program to provide consultative, educational, training and evaluation services. We feel that with these additions the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center will be able to truly provide a comprehensive range of mental health services.

The Plan, which includes a detailed needs assessment, description of each program, budget breakdown, and proposed programs and services was submitted to state planning officials April 30, 1978 and to the National Institute of Mental Health May 30, 1978. We anticipate a review of the Plan in mid-June.

We have been able to expand and enhance our services through the cooperative efforts of the residents of the Seacoast region. I would like to take this opportunity to Thank-you for your continued support.

Of these calls 402 were made free of charge or at a reduced fee. It remains the policy of the agency that no one is refused service because of inability to pay. Fees are scaled or care is provided on a no charge basis when necessary.

Currently 169 children from Seabrook are enrolled in our Well Child Clinic. Clinics are held twice a month and children from birth to 6 years of age are seen on a regular schedule for physical examinations, immunizations, blood tests, counseling, developmental testing, vision and hearing screenings, urine tests and lead screening. In addition, children between the age of 3 and 6 are seen twice a year at our Dental Clinic and are referred to local dentists for treatment when necessary, at no cost to the families.

On the first Tuesday of each month we have nurses at the Trinity United Church Parish House at the Senior Citizens "Drop-in" meeting to hold a blood pressure monitoring and screening clinic. Also, anyone may come to our office at anytime between the hours of 8 AM and 4 PM for a free blood pressure check.

Our staff consists of 6 full time R.N.s, 2 part time R.N.s, 2 part time Physical Therapists and 1 Secretary/Bookkeeper. In addition we contract with Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center so that Speech Therapy and Occupational Therapy can be offered to our homebound patients. Our contract with the Area Homemaker/Home Health Aide Agency enables us to provide aides and homemakers to local residents when needed.

In spite of the increase in our budget, the Board of Directors voted not to ask the local towns to increase their appropriation based on updated population figures this year. Thus we are asking the Town of Seabrook for \$5,400.00.

Rockingham Child and Family Services

1979 Fact Sheet For the Town of Seabrook

Rockingham Child and Family Services is a private, non-profit agency. It is the only social work counseling agency in the area administering counseling services specifically to families, individuals, and groups, concerning family problems. No other agency in Rockingham County can match the quality of counseling expertise which we offer. Presently, we have two full-time social workers and one part-time social worker. They have Masters degrees, and/or are accredited by the Academy of Certified Social Workers, and have working experience from ten to twenty years. Because we are a private agency, we are able to maintain a confidentiality of records. We receive support from the Exeter Clinic, doctors in private practice, and the Social Service Department of the Exeter Hospital. Additionally, Dr. Rowen Hochstedler, a practicing psychiatrist from Newburyport, Massachusetts, is a consultant to our staff.

Our purpose is to promote and conserve wholesome family life by means of meaningful social service programs. We offer help with difficulties when a member of the family is affected with problems which impair use of emotional, cultural, educational, social and physical development and functioning, or where there is conflict between children and parents or their peers, or between adult members of the family. The Agency offers couples who are in conflict services that enable them to work toward resolving their conflicts. We work towards preventing further deterioration and helping the family establish stability. The object of these services is to strengthen family life and enable individuals and families to develop capacities for handling their problems with greater understanding and effectiveness. We strive not only to relieve personal and social stresses, but to try and help prevent securing and utilizing resources not available in the agency, such as medical and/or psychological evaluation, appropriate school facilities, and job or residential placement, is provided. A noted local psychiatrist once described our agency as providing services for the "worried well".

The following information should be clearly understood as these facts are specific to this year's request for funds:

(1) We are asking minimum support from 24 towns, based on the actual number of service hours given to the residents of each individual town.

(2) This year, our request is based on a twelve month period, July 1, 1977 through June 30, 1978 inclusive. (Last year's request was based on a nine month period from October 1, 1976 through June 30, 1977.) Thus, we are now basing our yearly requests on a twelve month period in conjunction with our fiscal year, July 1st through June 30th.

(3) During fiscal year 1977-1978, our sliding fee scale ranged from \$4.00 to \$30.00 an hour, per unit of counseling service. We do serve anyone in the County

who requests help, regardless of their ability to pay. Note: It is the difference between what your residents had ability to pay and the actual cost of services used, that is the basis of our request to you.

(4) We are not approximating what services some needy residents of your town may use in the future. But rather, we are asking your contribution of a designated amount resulting from services already rendered. These funds will then be used to enable us to continue to provide our services.

(5) We have appealed to the County for funds to the extent of \$7,000. This sum is to be applied as a match towards a contract of \$27,182 with the N.H. Welfare Department for services rendered to them. No one served under this program is included in the request to the Town.

(6) We are asking you to help with the cost of services provided to lower and middle income groups who have all contributed something, but who have been unable to pay their full fee according to our scale. We are not asking you to contribute to Welfare clients or those in higher income brackets.

(7) Finally, it should be recognized that many of these residents who have or are receiving our services, without the services would have experienced broken home situations and other unfavorable trauma which no doubt would be costing your town more through Welfare and other areas of town responsibility. The dollars given to our agency provide that needed place for a local family to turn in their moment of crisis.

SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1978

For the past two years the Solid Waste Committee has made it known that they are in favor of installing a transfer station and taking advantage of the savings offered. At the 1978 Town Meeting voters overwhelmingly approved the installation of a station to take advantage of the price savings per ton offered by RESCO. We are now hauling to RESCO at \$23.00 per ton for an annual cost of approximately \$151,500. The savings on their particular offer would have been about \$5.00 per ton for a total savings of \$30,000 per year, but the plan has not yet been put into effect.

Since the Town Meeting new laws are in effect which allow the transportation of rubbish across state lines without restriction. Because of this change there are several companies that will make bids for handling the removal of Seabrook's trash. It has been indicated that the bids will be in the \$16 to \$18 per ton range for a two to five year contract. Savings from such a contract would total \$33,000 to \$45,000 per year.

Last year the Solid Waste Committee recommended that the Town lease-purchase a transfer station payable monthly for five years. The Town would then own the station outright. Since last year interest rates have risen and it now appears that a large savings could be realized by purchasing the station with cash. On a five year payment plan a \$50,000 station would cost approximately \$75,000 before payments are completed.

A transfer station more than large enough to handle Seabrook's 6,500 tons of trash can be installed for less than \$55,000 plus \$10,000 for a simple roof and sides to protect it from the elements. The installation of the scale, which is almost completed, is another asset to the Town. Most haulers will only haul on a tonnage basis and dumping areas are not always equipped with weighing facilities.

The annual anticipated savings on the rubbish removal contract made possible by the transfer station and the scale should pay for the compactor in less than two years. The compactor and scale would also allow the Town to take advantage of low bids in the future. At present, no other company is interested in handling the loose pack we have now because it is an expensive transportation problem.

Major changes in our solid waste disposal methods are anticipated in the coming year. It is hoped that by year's end we will see a substantial reduction in our per ton costs for solid waste disposal.

BROWN LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

A steady increase in circulation has been noted from the time the town first granted support to Brown Library. In 1975 the circulation was 2039 volumes, in 1977 it was 2852 and in 1978 it was 3453. This may be due in part to a system of paper backs purchased in July called RECI. These smaller books are very popular and have proved to be a good investment.

Other purchases were books on New Hampshire and some new biographies including the stories of Eisenhower, Agatha Christie, Billy Graham and Diana Nyad. Another good investment has been a sturdy, locking bookcase in which to keep rare books and other valuable papers. Also kept in the case are the newly purchased volumes of New Hampshire Revised Statutes, Annotated.

On a sour note, it may be noted here that over the last three years it has cost the library \$749. for books which have not been returned by the borrowers. Not only is this an expense to us, but other people are denied the opportunity to use these volumes. A continuing effort is being made to recover them.

Some gifts and donations this year were; From Charlotte Dow, Book of the Month; from Seabrook Bank and Trust Co., Time-Life Encyclopedia of Gardening by James Crockett; from Karl J.E. Gove, "The Gove Book" a geneology; from Spherex, Inc., The Thomas Register of American Manufacturers and Catalog File for 1977; a subscription to New Hampshire Times and other miscellaneous subscriptions; and a gift of a number of large, healthy houseplants from Sheridan Dodge. The gifts of plants and several pieces of good furniture have combined with the new carpeting to contribute to a comfortable home-like atmosphere in the library reading room.

Recent displays include art work by the fourth, fifth and sixth grades from the Art Department of the Elementary School and a very interesting map of the Smithtown area along with old pictures. This is the work of Eric Small, president of the Seabrook Historical Society.

Helen Skinner, our assistant librarian, has completed four out of eight free courses offered at the University of New Hampshire on Public Library Techniques. This is an on-going program by the University to help update efficiency of personnel in the State's Libraries.

MOSQUITO CONTROL

Mosquito Control in Seabrook has now been in operation for Three Years, one in Survey and two in active mosquito control. It has over all been highly effective and has greatly changed the local life-style, making the evening meal a backyard cookout and affording the luxury of large outdoor gatherings. All outdoor activities have been relatively free of the discomfort of the mosquito's presence.

The Program has never been without it's problems and it is doubtful whether it can continue without some outside help and direction. Under State regulation Mosquito Control personnel must be licensed, and in order to do so must have attained a required educational level. This, plus the short season, unusual hours, and unpleasant nature of the work, produces few applicants. The long range prospects are less encouraging.

Rockingham County now has a Mosquito Control operation which, with some assistance, could take over the mosquito control. If given a term contract, this operation could become effective, could produce worthy personnel and could coordinate the operation into an area effort which would far surpass our operation in any long term consideration.

It is recommended that the Town proceed in this direction under the leadership of a new Mosquito Control Committee chairman.

The possibility of joining the Essex County Mosquito Control Project on a regional basis should also be fully investigated.

Seabrook should continue the Mosquito Control Program for the welfare and comfort of its people.

Youth Study Committee

Appointed as a new committee in 1978, the Youth Study Committee was commissioned by the Board of Selectmen to begin analyzing youth problems and programs in the community. The ultimate goal is that members of the committee will make recommendations to the Selectmen which may help solve some present youth problems.

Areas of concern to the group this year included a discussion of a curfew, such as one enacted in Hudson, New Hampshire. If one were used, it might be needed only in certain times of the year, such as at Halloween, which has traditionally been a difficult time for local property owners.

One recommendation forwarded to the Selectmen was that Seabrook participate in an area Big Brother/Big Sister program. This has been quite successful in other towns, and may help develop children in families which lack one parent, or are too large to provide each child with healthy recreation or entertainment opportunities.

During 1979 a list of all organizations presently serving youth in our area will be assembled. From the representatives of these, students in the local schools could learn what each group has to offer. Thereby, children could be exposed to new activities, clubs, or athletic organizations. It may be determined, by this project, that there are some services needed which are not presently being offered, but should be. This could aid in planning and fostering new projects.

SEABROOK CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Town of Seabrook re-established a Conservation Commission this year. Committee members include Robert Quayle, Chairman, Catherine Silver, Secretary, Rev. Elizabeth Walton, Harry R. Knowles, Warren Crawford, Daniel Gretch and Madalene Castleton.

On June 22, 1978 the Board of Selectmen met with them to discuss the goals and objectives, as set forth in the New Hampshire statutes. The Commission would be, ideally, non-political, unbiased, citizens united by a common interest in the proper utilization and protection of Seabrook's natural resources.

We meet regularly each month to clarify these goals. We have started keeping a file and a index of other agencies and projects to avoid costly duplications and conflicting projects.

As individuals we have spent many hours reading, sifting, sorting and discussing several years accumulations of printed information.

We have consulted other conservation Commissions and related agencies to build a firm foundation for our future work. It is a slow process.

Seabrook's valuable and irreplaceable marshland and seashore seemed to be the prime area of concern so we have directed this years efforts in that direction.

We hope that our approach toward a solution to current problems, through a zoning amendment, meets with the approval of the residents.

A balance sheet disclosing the financial condition of the general fund at December 31, 1977 is presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current surplus amounted to \$278,106 at December 31, 1977. An analysis of the change in fund balance is shown in Exhibit A-2.

Statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenue are included in Exhibits A-3 and A-4, respectively. As indicated by the budget summary, Exhibit A-4, a revenue surplus of \$112,007, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$174, resulted in a budget surplus of \$112,181 for 1977.

Further, you are hereby notified that the moderator will process the absentee ballots at 3 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day pursuant to RSA 60:8.

ARTICLE 1. To elect by Non-Partisan ballot: One Tax Collector for a term of three (3) years; One Selectmen and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; One Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years; One Road Agent for a term of one (1) year; One Fire Chief for a term of one (1) year; Three (3) Constables for a term of one (1) year; Two (2) members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years: One (1) member of the Planning Board for a term of one (1) year; Two (2) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years; One Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years; and any other officers for the ensuing year.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section VII - Administration
and Enforcement to add the following sections under Subsection C:

9. The Building Inspector shall obtain or the applicant for building permit must furnish information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest habitable flood (including basement if habitable) of all new or substantially improved structures, located within all areas having special flood hazards identified on the Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been floodproofed the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed.
10. The Building Inspector shall review proposed development to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or State law.
11. The Building Inspector shall notify, in riverine situations, adjacent communities and the State Coordinating Office prior to any alteration or relocation of water course, and submit copies of such notification to the Federal Insurance Administration.

12. The Building Inspector shall assure that the Flood carrying capacity within the altered or relocated portion of any water course is maintained.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section X - Definitions so that the definition of "Structure" is amended to read as follows:

Structure: Any structure constructed or erected by human means, whether on land or water, the use of which requires location on the ground or bed of water, or which requires attachment to something having location on the ground or water. Fences, stone walls, retaining walls and driveways are not to be construed as structures for purposes of side-line and setback requirements.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Conservation Commission for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section III D and E - Zone 5, so that both Subsections are combined into one Subsection entitled D Zone 4 so that said new section reads as follows:

D - Zone 4: Conservation Area

In Zone 4 - there is allowed any use that does not involve the erection of any structure, including fences, walls, driveways or signs, or alter the surface configuration in any manner by the addition of fill or dredging or by bulldozing or otherwise moving and shifting the natural surface, unless such action is otherwise permitted and licensed by the appropriate State and Federal authorities. The following are permitted uses:

1. Non-Commercial Recreation such as hunting, clamming, fishing and picnicking.
2. Agriculture and Aqualculture
3. Natural trails and wildlife refuge.

(Not Recommended by the Planning Board)

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by Conservation Commission for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section II (entitled Establishment of Use Districts) to combine Zone 4 and Zone 5 into one zone entitled Zone 4 and to amend the official zoning map of the Town of Seabrook to reflect this change.

(Not Recommended by the Planning Board)

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section 6:E - Motor Vehicle and Machinery Junk Yards, to include the following Subsection:

E. Regulations effective with the enactment of this Ordinance:

- (a) No person, corporation, or association shall locate or maintain a motor vehicle junk yard or a machinery junk yard within a distance of One Hundred and Fifty (150) feet from the surface of any public highway unless such yard is fenced or screened so as to be completely hidden from view of the highway.
- (b) Yards currently in operation shall be permitted a period of sixty (60) days of grace in which to complete the actions necessary for compliance with these regulations before violators may be prosecuted.

F. Nuisance Abatement:

- (a) Any motor vehicle junk yard or machinery junk yard located or maintained in violation of the provisions of this subdivision is hereby declared a nuisance and the same may be abated on complaint of any prosecuting officer.

G. Penalty for Violation:

- (a) Whoever violates any of the provisions of these regulations governing junk yard shall be fined not more than One Hundred (\$100) Dollars or imprisoned for not more than six months, or both.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the Building Code Ordinance as proposed by the Board of Selectmen; said Ordinance having relevance to compliance with the Federal Flood Insurance Program.

1. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvement to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (50% or more of the market value of structure) including prefabricated and mobile homes must (i) be designated (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.
2. The Building Inspector shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize any base flood elevation data available from a Federal, State or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the base flood level and (ii) all new construction and substantial improvements of nonresidential structures have the lowest flood (including basement) elevated or floodproofed to or above the base flood level.

3. The Building Inspector shall require that all mobile homes to be placed within Zone A on the community's Flood Hazard Boundary Map shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (i) over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four corners of the mobile home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring some additional tie per side, (ii) frame ties be provided at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side, (iii) all components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds; and (iv) any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored.
4. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood prone areas new and replacement water supply systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems.
5. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood prone areas (i) new and replacement sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and (ii) on-site waste disposal systems to be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund Town notes.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to accept Federal and/or State and/or other funds to be applied to the salaries of Town employees.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend up to TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOLLARS in Municipal Coastal Planning Grants as authorized and approved under the New Hampshire Coastal Resources Management Programs.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO THOUSAND (\$2,000.00) DOLLARS as the Town's 20% Local match toward a Coastal Energy Impact Program (CEIP) Planning Grant. ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY FIVE THOUSAND (\$225,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of purchasing land of E. N. Dixon Co., Inc. located on the corner of True Road and Old New Boston Road and consisting of approximately 13.9 acres for the purpose of protecting the Town Well Fields and providing open space for the Town.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of EIGHTY THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED FIFTY (\$80,650.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of acquiring land surrounding the new well field being developed off of Lower Collins Street sufficient to comply with all state regulations for the protection of municipal water supplies and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to enter into negotiations with the owners of said land for purchase or to take any other action required for the taking of said land for municipal use.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of THIRTY THOUSAND (\$30,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of upgrading and improving the Town fire alarm system.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of NINETY THOUSAND (\$90,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of purchasing a new pumper fire truck.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWENTY FIVE THOUSAND (\$25,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of purchasing a new ambulance.

for the installation of sprinkler systems), NFPA National Fire Codes, Vol.6, Chapter 8 (Underground Pipes and Fittings) and Chapter 9 (rules for laving pipes).

2. All sprinkler alarms shall be connected to the municipal fire alarm system.
3. This ordinance shall take effect upon approval of Town Meeting and shall apply to all new construction.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to accept a road to be known as "Chase Way" insofar as said road is paved and as identified as the road to D.G. O'Brien, Inc. and located on "Subdivision Plan for Chase Enterprises Inc., Seabrook, New Hampshire, K.F. Moore & B.G. Sta-les land surveyors, Dover, N.H., Scale 1"=100' ". May 1977 and recorded in Rockingham Records 0195.

ARTICLE 52. On Petition of William E. Felch and Seventeen (17) other voters in the Town to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWENTY-TWO HUNDRED (\$2,200.00) DOLLARS for a yard and one half sander and salter for the Highway Department.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of constructing a four bay addition onto the Town garage on Railroad Avenue

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expand the Highway Subsidy provided by the State of New Hampshire pursuant to the provisions of RSA 241:14 and if, as amended, for the purpose defined in said Statute.

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of hot topping town roads.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 56. On Petition of Thelma P. Kendrick and Forty-One (41) other voters of the Town to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of FOUR THOUSAND (\$4,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of installing a drain on Collins Street near the residence of Thelma Kendrick.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 57. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of improving the docking facility on the end of Farm Lane.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 58. On Petition of John L Randall and Twenty-Six (26) other voters of the Town, to see if the Town will vote to make the Town boat launching ramp located on River Street available for the use of residents of the Town of Seabrook only?

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 59. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ONE THOUSAND (\$1,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of planting trees and shrubbery for the beautification of the Town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 60. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED (\$2,200.00) DOLLARS for the construction of an approved concrete dog pound.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 61. To see what action the Town will take to ratify the Personnel policies as adopted by the Board of Selectmen on December 7, 1978.

ARTICLE 62. On Petitions of John Crandall and twenty-three (23) other voters of the Town to see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance pursuant to the powers granted in said Town's Corporate Charter and the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire as amended which would protect the health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town and conserve property values and reads as follows:

All electric power transmission lines, to be constructed in or through the Town, having a rated potential capacity of 69,000 volts or more, shall be buried underground.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 63. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expense of the General Government, for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the Town Poor and for all necessary expenditures for the ensuing year.



PERSONNEL POLICY

TOWN OF SEABROOK

The following Personnel Policy has been adopted and approved by the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Seabrook to guide the administration of personnel activities. Guidelines set forth in this policy statement shall apply to all permanent employees and Department Heads. Presentation of this information to all employees will serve to instruct them in their rights as well as their responsibilities while in the employment of the Town.

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SECTION I.

PROVISIONS OF EMPLOYMENT

Appointments shall be made in consideration of the recommendations of the Department Head involved and such applications and tests as may be required for the position.

A. Employment The Town shall employ, without discrimination as to race, sex, creed, or political affiliation, the best qualified persons who are available at the salary level established for town employment. Within the limits of time during which a position must be filled, there shall be as wide a search for qualified candidates as is practicable.

Information concerning job openings shall be posted in at least two public places and advertised in at least one local newspaper in a manner designed to give all eligible persons adequate opportunity to make applications and demonstrate their fitness for the particular vacancy involved. The announcement will be made at least ten (10) working days before the last date for filing applications, and will set forth essential facts with reference to the duties and responsibilities, required minimum qualifications, prescribed salary range and hours of work. Should there be any limitations of eligibility to either sex, age, or physical characteristics, each hiring announcement shall so state.

B. Applications An application form, which may be obtained from the Selectmen's Office, will be filled out by all applicants. Applications will be accepted no later than 4:00 P.M. on the last date designated for filing applications. All of the persons whose applications have been rejected will be notified in writing and all other applicants will be notified of times and dates of testing or interviews.

The Selectmen may reject applications for any of the following reasons:

1. The applicant is found to lack any of the established qualification requirements for the position.
2. The applicant is physically unfit to perform the duties of the position to which he/she has applied.

3. The applicant is addicted to the habitual or excessive use of drugs or intoxicating beverages.
4. The applicant has been convicted of a felony or misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or misconduct.
5. The applicant has been dismissed from employment for delinquency, insubordination, or misconduct.
6. The applicant has resigned under charges of delinquency or misconduct.
7. The applicant has intentionally made a false statement in his/her application with regard to any material facts.
8. The applicant has practiced or attempted to practice any deception or fraud in his/her application, testing, or in securing eligibility for appointment.
9. The applicant does not meet any limitations of eligibility with regards to sex, age, or physical characteristics.

C. Testing In the case of police or firefighter hiring, an examination will be held for the particular class of position. Such competitive examinations will be administered in a manner that will fairly test the fitness of all applicants. In order to avoid the possibility of discrimination, the identity of applicants will be concealed in all examinations. Applicants may be required to submit proof of their age, citizenship, driving record, and military record, and a permanent record of this data will be kept.

D. Ranking In any examination the minimum score through which eligibility may be earned shall be determined by the Selectmen. All applicants for any position will be notified of their standing, but actual test scores shall not be open to public inspection. The top three candidates will be interviewed by the Selectmen prior to final selection. Applications and test scores will be kept on file for one year, and may be used in any subsequent hiring procedures during that year.

E. Probation All appointments will be made for a probationary period of six months, during which time an employee's performance is subject to close review as to his/her competency to carry out work orders. The Selectmen may, upon request of the Department Head, extend this probationary period to a maximum of an additional six months if, in their opinion, it is necessary. This period supplements the formal hiring procedure and is the final determination of

whether the employee should be given permanent status. An employee serving the probationary period may be released at any time without the right of appeal, provided the Department Head submits a written report to the Selectmen setting forth the reasons for the release and provided said report is approved by the Selectmen. Permanent appointment shall be subject to passing a complete physical exam given by a physician designated by the Selectmen. The Town shall bear the expense of said examination.

F. Provisional Appointments When a position becomes vacant and the Department Head or Selectmen believe that said position should be filled without delay, a provisional appointment may be made. After reviewing the applications for the position on file, a person may be selected who meets the minimum entrance requirements and is qualified to perform the duties of such position. Such appointments shall be made in consideration of the recommendations of the Department Head involved. A provisional appointment may not exceed sixty (60) days. No employee benefits shall accrue to employees with provisional appointments. A person receiving a provisional appointment may be considered for permanent employment provided he/she meets the same qualifying requirements as other applicants for the position.

G. Training Both the Town and its employees benefit from the provisions of educational training opportunities at reasonable expense to the Town. Training programs shall be designed to improve the quality of performance and bring about more efficient and economical operation.

H. Compensation It is intended that Town employees be paid on a basis that is commensurate with salaries and wages for comparable public work within the area, subject to negotiations with employee representatives from the various departments and approval by the Board of Selectmen. It is intended that these salaries and wages be set so as to attract and retain well qualified employees. Compensation shall be based on merit, fitness, and training.

SECTION II. ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE REGULATIONS

A. General To insure that each employee receives equal consideration in the matter of hours of work and leaves of absence, including an adequate vacation and a reasonable amount of leave with pay in the event of sickness, standard rules governing attendance and leaves of absence will be observed as follows:

- 1. Individual hourly attendance and leave records will be maintained by the Department Head and will be forwarded to the Selectmen's Clerk on or before Friday morning.
- 2. Requests for annual or sick leave shall be filled out, approved by the Department Head, and forwarded to the Selectmen's Clerk with the payroll. No payment for leave shall be made until the Selectmen's Clerk has determined said leave is due the employee. In no case shall an employee be paid for leave above and beyond that which he/she is entitled to at the time of the request.
- 3. Vacation schedules for employees in all departments shall be developed by the Department Head. It shall be the policy of each Department Head to schedule vacations over as wide a period as possible in order to provide an adequate number of personnel on-hand at all times.

B. Annual Leave Each employee of permanent standing shall be allotted annual vacation time with pay in accordance with his/her current term of continuous employment, and in accordance with the following guidelines:

- 1. Employees rate of earned vacation shall be computed from the time of probationary appointment as follows:
 After 1 through 5 years continuous service - 11 days
 After 5 years continuous service - 16½ days
 No more than 33 days annual leave may be carried over to the next year.
- 2. Vacations will be extended to compensate for holidays falling within the vacation period unless other specific arrangements are authorized by the Selectmen.

3. Any absence from duty for which sick leave is paid, or for official leaves of absence, shall not constitute a break in the service record.
4. No employee shall be entitled to work his/her vacation with pay unless special authorization is granted by the Board of Selectmen.
5. Time lost by reason of leave of absence without pay, time off for which Workmen's Comp benefits are paid, or time otherwise not worked or paid for shall not be considered in computing earned allowances of leave.
6. Earned annual leave shall be allotted at the end of each quarter according to the following schedule:
 After 1 through 5 years continuous service - 22 hours
 After 5 years continuous service - 33 hours
 Eight hours shall be subtracted from an employee's earned annual leave for each day taken off.
 Total hours paid out of annual leave shall be subtracted from an employee's earned annual leave for partial days taken off.
7. Employees will not be allowed to utilize annual leave until permanent status has been obtained.

Upon retirement or resignation, an employee shall receive payment for the number of days of annual leave to his/her credit. Employees removed for cause or submitting resignations without sufficient notice (2 weeks for permanent employees and 30 days for Department Heads) will lose any vacation benefits previously earned.

C. Holidays Employees of permanent standing shall be entitled to the following paid holidays:

New Years	Fourth of July
Washington's Birthday	Labor Day
Veteran's Day	Thanksgiving
Memorial Day	Christmas

Employees of permanent standing who must work on a holiday will receive their regular pay plus payment for the holiday.

D. Sick Leave Sick leave is earned by all permanent employees at a rate of five (5) sick days per year, with said leave to be allotted on January 1st of each year. No more than 33 sick days may be carried over to the next year. Persons leaving employment with the Town will lose any sick leave previously earned.

Persons entering employment during the course of a year shall be granted sick days in accordance with the following chart:

Date of Employment	Jan 1 to April 30	May 1 to June 30	July 1 to Aug 31	Sept 1 to Oct 31	Nov 1 to Dec 31
Sick Days Granted	5	4	3	2	1

Employees shall be entitled to sick leave from the date of probationary appointment. Sick leave is to be considered an emergency fringe benefit to be used only as needed. The Selectmen shall, as a condition precedent to the continuance of sick pay for a period of greater than three days, require a certificate from a qualified physician certifying the condition of the employee to be such as to justify the absence from employment. Illness for which sick leave may be granted is defined as actual personal illness or bodily injury.

E. Special Leave Special leave with pay shall be granted when death occurs in a permanent employee's immediate family (spouse, parents, children, brothers, sisters, mother-in-law, father-in-law, or a blood relative or ward residing in the same house.) Special leave within the work week will be granted up to a period of three consecutive work days.

F. Leave of Absence An employee of permanent standing may be granted a leave of absence without pay by the Selectmen upon recommendation of the Department Head concerned. No leave of absence shall be granted until all of the employee's accumulated annual leave has been exhausted. An employee taking a leave of absence shall lose any accumulated sick leave. Such leave of absence without pay shall not exceed one year in length and shall only be granted when it appears, because of the past record of the employee, or because of the purpose for which the leave is requested, that it is in the best interest of the Town to grant the leave. No leave shall be granted for the purpose of running a summer business.

G. Military Leave Any employee who is a member of the military or naval forces of the state or nation in an active or reserve status, shall be entitled to all the benefits and privileges granted by existing and future laws. No annual leave or sick leave which the employee may have accumulated shall be lost because of military leave, provided, however, that upon entrance or extended active duty an

employee shall be paid, if requested, for all days of accumulated annual leave remaining to his/her credit. Should the employee not return to the Town's service, all accumulated sick leave shall lapse.

H. Civil Leave An employee shall be given time off without loss of pay or annual leave when performing jury duty, or when subpoenaed to appear before a court, public body, or commission. Any compensation received from jury duty or other such appearances shall be reimbursed to the Town.

I. Workmen's Compensation The Town of Seabrook provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance to cover all employees. Any employee who sustains a personal injury or compensable illness arising out of and in the course of employment shall be paid allowable Workmen's Comp for each week of total incapacity to work resulting from the injury or illness. No payments shall be made in any instance when, in the opinion of the Department Head and the Selectmen, the accident occurred as a result of intoxication, willful intent or violation of rules and regulations.

Employee and Department Head shall report jointly to the Selectmen's Clerk no more than 48 hours after any injury. In case the employee is unable to report, it shall be the responsibility of the Department Head to report to the Selectmen's Clerk. Report form 8aWCA shall be filled out by the employee and signed by the employee and the Department Head. The employee shall retain his/her copy of form 8aWCA. The employee and/or Department Head shall remain while form 8-WC is completed, and shall help the Selectmen's Clerk with any information needed on this form. This form shall be signed by the Selectmen's Clerk and mailed immediately.

SECTION III

SEPARATION AND DEMOTION

A. Suspension When in the judgement of the Selectmen, or in the judgement of the Department Head as subject to the approval of the Selectmen, an employee's work performance or conduct justifies disciplinary action short of dismissal, the employee may be suspended without pay for such time as may be determined by the Board of Selectmen.

B. Dismissals and Demotions A permanent employee may be dismissed or demoted when, in the judgement of the appointing authority, the employee's work or conduct so warrants. When the appointing authority decides to take such action against a permanent employee, the authority shall file with the employee, no later than one week prior to the effective date of the action, a written statement containing the substantial reasons for the action. Any employee facing dismissal, demotion, or suspension may request a prompt hearing to air the charges and to allow the appointing authority to determine the appropriate action. An employee may be temporarily suspended by a regular or acting Department Head until the Board of Selectmen makes a determination on the proper action to be taken.

Cause for dismissal, demotion, or suspension may include but is not limited to: inefficiency or incapacity, insubordination, misconduct, immoral conduct, intoxication, offenses against the law, destroying or stealing of public property, abuse of sick leave policy, or falsifying any reports.

SECTION IV.

INTERACTION

A. Employee Communication Every employee of the Town has a right to seek out the Selectmen, in order to discuss any matter of concern to them or to the Town. Whether the discussion of a particular matter with a particular employee at a particular time or place is appropriate is, of course, up to the judgement and discretion of the Selectman involved. It should be understood that Selectmen will not discuss a grievance unless the employee involved has first discussed the matter with his/her supervisor.

No disciplinary action shall be taken against any employee for any conversation in good faith with a Selectman, and no supervisor shall make any effort whatever to inhibit or discourage such meetings.

B. Departmental Communication Normal operation of any department shall be left to the discretion of the Department Head. Department policy shall be set by the Selectmen. Any Department Head may request a meeting to discuss the policies and proper operation of a department at any time. No work policies, priorities, or requirements shall be discussed, established, or changed without first having a meeting of the Selectmen and the Department Head. As a result of such meeting, the Selectmen shall determine the need for any policy or work priority changes, and shall issue the proper instructions and directives.

C. Severability If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance shall be held to be inoperative, void, or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

D. Adoption The adoption of this personnel policy will supercede any similar agreements and policies previously made between the Town of Seabrook and its employees.

This Personnel Policy was reviewed and approved by the Board of Selectmen on December 7, 1978.



The Tax Collector should take immediate steps to enforce collection or issue tax deeds to the Town for these outstanding tax liens if possible. We have reserved \$26,914 on the General Fund Balance Sheet as questionable to be collected.

Implementation of a Mechanical Accounting System

We recommend that the Town consider the implementation of a mechanical accounting system that would perform multiple accounting functions in a single operation, thereby eliminating duplicate record keeping and facilitate monthly and year-end reporting.

Payroll Account

In the 1976 audit report issued by the State of New Hampshire, a comment was made regarding custody of the payroll account being in the hands of the payroll clerk instead of the Town Treasurer. The transfer of this account to the Town Treasurer was being initiated at the time of this audit.

Water Department

Also in the 1976 audit report issued by the State, and dated January 24, 1978, it was mentioned that the posted budget of the Town of Seabrook did not contain the Water Department appropriation and revenues as required by the Municipal Budget Law which has been adopted by the Town of Seabrook. Our examination disclosed that the same situation existed in 1977 but has been corrected for 1978.

We would like to thank the officials of the Town of Seabrook for their cooperation in providing us with the documents necessary for completion of the audit.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Funds

Under governmental accounting, self-balancing financial statements are prepared for each fund. A fund is defined as an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts; recording cash and other resources together with all related liabilities, obligations, reserves and equities which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations or limitations. Please refer to the exhibits enumerated in the table of contents for the funds included in this report.

Accounting Method

The general accounting system of the Town of Seabrook is on the cash basis except for the accountability of taxes and substantial accounts receivable. It is the practice of the Town to carry forward unexpended capital expenditure appropriations, representing those expenses which are committed or actually incurred. General operating expenses are budgeted on a twelve-month basis. Routine bills received after December 31 are included in the subsequent year's budget. This practice is consistent with that of the preceding fiscal years.

General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain a record of fixed assets. Accordingly, a report of this type fund was not included within the scope of this audit.



REPORT OF THE WATER DEPARTMENT

381,636,800 gallons of water were pumped during 1978, an increase of 18,732,425 gallons over the previous year.

Industrial and commercial use increased from 135,790,721 gallons in 1977 to 136,808,530 gallons in 1978. Recycling of water was done by U.S.M. Corp.-Bailey Division, and they decreased their use over last year's by over 12,500,000 gallons. Spherex also used over 4,000,000 gallons less than the previous year because of the use of their own well. Welpro Shoe, Inc. and Yankee Greyhound both increased their use by about 1,000,000 gallons each. A 10,000,000 gallon increase was reflected by Public Service Co. in 1978.

We picked up 8 new commercial users (metered). These users were previously on our fixed rate. Additional revenue also was picked up by additions to motels, small businesses and small apartments.

45 new services were installed in 1978.

Two large projects were completed by this department. The first one was the installation and insulating of a pipe across the bridge on Causeway Street. This bridge crossing was necessary to replace the broken water main under the stream. Breaking of the water main several years ago caused two dead end lines; one at Causeway Street and the other at Walton Road. Because of the dead end at Walton Road, the fire flow at the Elementary School fire hydrant was 690 gallons per minute. After completion of the bridge crossing, the flow at the same hydrant was 1,400 gallons per minute, and also the dead end water mains were eliminated.

The second project was the installation of water mains on Page's Lane and Stard Road. A pipe crossing under Rte. I-95 was necessary to connect the two streets. This project eliminated two dead ends and increased the fire flow on Stard Road, Page's Lane, and the north end of Rte. 1.

A new well sight was located in 1978. Hopefully a station will be built and a pump installed this year. Although the quality of the water was excellent, the yield wasn't what we would like to have seen.

This spring, we will resume well testing in search of still needed new well(s).

We want to thank you for the co-operation shown during the summer months for limiting outside use of water.

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ZONING ORDINANCE
OF THE
TOWN OF SEABROOK, NEW HAMPSHIRE

SECTION I: TITLE AND PURPOSE

1. This ordinance shall be known as the "Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire",

2. The purposes of this ordinance are to promote the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook, to protect and conserve the value of property, to promote economic development of the Town's resources and to encourage the most appropriate use of land throughout the Town of Seabrook.

SECTION II: ESTABLISHMENT OF USE DISTRICTS

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Seabrook is hereby divided into five use districts:

ZONE 1

ZONE 2

ZONE 3

ZONE 4

ZONE 5

These districts and the boundaries of such districts are shown on the official Zoning Map of the Town of Seabrook, which Map, is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof, and which is on file in the Office of the Town Clerk of the Town of Seabrook. This official Zoning Map shall be the final authority as the current zoning status of land in the Town.

1. No building shall be erected, reconstructed or structurally altered nor shall any building or land be used for any purpose other than is permitted in the district in which such building or land is located,

2. No building shall be erected, reconstructed, or structurally altered to exceed the height herein established for the districts in which such building is located.

3. No lot shall be so reduced or diminished that the yards or other open spaces shall be smaller than prescribed by this ordinance nor shall the density of population be increased in any manner except in conformity with the area regulations as hereinafter provided.

4. No yard or other open space provided around any building for the purpose of complying with the provisions of these regulations shall be considered as providing a yard or open space for any other building.

5. Every building hereinafter erected shall be located on a lot herein defined, and in no case shall there be more than one building on one lot, except as hereinafter provided.

SECTION III: USE REGULATIONS

A. ZONE 1

In Zone 1, no building, structure or portion thereof shall be erected, altered, moved or used and no land or building or part thereof shall be used, arranged or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses:

1. Any use permitted in Zone 4.
2. Single and two-family dwellings.
3. Professional offices which are incidental to a residence and which conform in design to the structures in the area. There shall be no more than one office per single family house and no such office shall have more than three employees.
4. Municipal buildings.
5. Churches, schools and libraries.
6. Parks and non-commercial recreation.
7. Guest houses in which the owner is prime occupant and which is located in a building in existence at the time this ordinance is enacted which has not been expanded after the enactment of this ordinance.
8. Dead storage of travel trailers not more than 27 feet in length and boats used by the residents or tenants.

9. Swimming pools for use of occupants and guests.
10. Accessory buildings not for human habitation which are incidental to the prime uses.
11. Accessory uses by owner or tenants incidental to the above permitted uses and not detrimental to a residential neighborhood, except tents erected for the purpose of human habitation.

B. ZONE 2

In Zone 2, no buildings, structure or portion thereof shall be erected, altered, moved or used and no land or building or part thereof shall be used, arranged or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses:

1. Any use permitted in Zone 1, subject to all limitations there applicable.
2. Home occupations including agriculture.
3. Cemeteries.
4. Nursing or convalescent homes for not more than twenty patients.
5. Farm buildings for the operation of farms.
6. Retail businesses and wholesale businesses incidental to principal retail business.
7. Gasoline stations, but not including the outdoor storage or inoperative and unregistered automobiles, provided that no new gasoline station shall be located within 1,000 foot radius of an existing gasoline station.
8. Banks and offices.
9. Commercial recreation, amusements and entertainment which is conducted within the confines of a building, except in those areas in Zone 2 to the East of the Blackwater River.
10. Travel trailer parks, except in those areas in Zone 2 to the East of the Blackwater River.
11. Restaurants and lounges.
12. Hotels and motels.

13. Public utility buildings (non-manufacturing).
14. Theatres and halls.
15. Manufacturing clearly subordinate and incidental to the permitted business conducted on the premises.
16. Accessory uses of structures and of land normally incidental to the permitted principal use of the premises.

C. ZONE 3

In Zone 3, no buildings, structure or portion thereof shall be erected, altered, moved or used and no land or building or part thereof shall be used, arranged or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses:

1. Any uses permitted in Zone 1 and Zone 2, subject to limitations there applicable.
2. Warehousing, storage or wholesaling establishment.
3. Manufacturing of such a nature that the use is not obnoxious or injurious to the health and safety of the community.
4. Accessory uses of structures and open spaces normally incidental to the permitted principal use of the premises.

D. ZONE 4

In Zone 4, no buildings, structure or other improvements shall be erected or altered herein and no land or building or part thereof shall be used or designed to be used except for recreation purposes.

E. ZONE 5

In Zone 5, there shall be no restrictions on uses.

F. Mobile Home Parks.

No Mobile Home Park or House Trailer Park shall be established or be allowed to expand if already established, within the confines of the Town. Mobile Home Park and House Trailer Park means any parcel of land under single or common ownership or control which contains, or is designed, laid out or adapted to accommodate two or more Mobile Homes. Mobile Home or House Trailer means a prefabricated dwelling unit which:
(a) is designed for long term and continuous residential occupancy;
(b) is designed to be moved on wheels, as a whole or in sections;
(c) on arrival on the site, is complete and ready for occupancy, except for incidental unpacking, assembly, connection with utilities, and placing on supports or a permanent structure.

SECTION IV:

AREA AND HEIGHT REGULATIONS

A. HEIGHT: No structure may exceed the maximum height of two and one-half stories or thirty-five (35) feet except Public Utility or Municipal structures.

B. AREA AND FRONTAGE: No building shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located on a lot containing less than Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet in area, or less than One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of frontage on an existing road or less than One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of depth and has an average width of One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet unless such lot is a lot of record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the enactment of this Ordinance. No dwelling building shall contain more than two (2) living units per One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of frontage on an existing road or more than two (2) living units per Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet of land area. Provided, that except in those areas of Zone 2 to the East of Black Water River, an additional dwelling building containing no more than one living unit may be placed on a lot in Zone 2, in addition to such buildings as are otherwise herein permitted on a lot, provided that said lot contains Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet of land area per dwelling building.

C. SET BACK AND SIDE LINE: No building or structure shall be placed within

1. Twenty (20) feet for a residential use, or
2. Thirty (30) feet for a commercial use, or
3. Fifty (50) feet for an industrial use

from the sidelines of the right-of-way of any road. There shall be a side yard having a minimum width of ten (10) feet for all residential buildings and structures and fifteen (15) feet for all commercial and industrial buildings and structures. Steps shall not be considered a part of the structure, but porches, piazzas and other similar elements shall be considered a part of the structure.

SECTION V:

BOUNDARIES OF DISTRICTS

In the event that uncertainty exists with respect to the boundaries of the various districts as shown on the official Zoning Map, the following rules of interpretation shall be applied:

A. Where a boundary is indicated as a highway, railroad or such other landmarks, it shall be construed to be the center line thereof unless otherwise indicated on the Zoning Map.

B. Where a boundary is indicated as approximately parallel to a highway, railroad or such other landmark, it shall be construed as parallel thereof and at such distance from as shown on the Zoning Map.

C. If no dimension is given on the Zoning Map, the location of any boundary shall be determined by use of the scale shown on the Zoning Map.

D. Where a boundary coincides approximately by lot

lines, such lot lines shall be construed to be the boundary where such interpretation is practical. However when a boundary between two districts divides a lot the Board of Adjustment may upon application by the lot owner allow those uses for the lot which are least restrictive as between the two districts.

E. Where not otherwise provided for, or a question exists, the Planning Board shall determine the exact boundary line.

SECTION VI:

GENERAL PROVISIONS:

A. SANITARY AND SAFETY PROTECTIONS:

The Building Inspector shall maintain a complete record of all building permits granted under the terms of this Zoning ordinance and shall send a monthly report to the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, with a copy to the Planning Board, of all permits which have been granted during the previous month which in the judgement of the Building Inspector involves construction falling within the jurisdiction of review of said Commission.

B. NUISANCE CONTROL:

The occurrence of activities that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or the emission of odor, dust, smoke, fumes, refuse matter, noise, vibration, or similar conditions, or that are dangerous to the health, safety or value of property of the community, or that lends otherwise to the annoyance or disturbance of a neighborhood, shall be prohibited.

C. THE DUMPING OR DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND OTHER REFUSE:

Promiscuous dumping; no land in any District shall be used for a dumping place for garbage and refuse from either private or from commercial or from industrial sources except the public dump as provided by the Town and except with the approval in writing of the Public Health Officer or the Board of Adjustment upon such conditions as they may require.

D. SAND, TOPSOIL, AND GRAVEL REMOVAL:

It shall be unlawful to excavate and remove from any premises, sand, topsoils, gravel or rock, excepting such surpluses of topsoil, sand, gravel or rock, as may result from excavations when constructing basements or foundations for buildings or when excavating for driveways, parking lots and streets except in accordance with the following conditions:

A. A permit has first been obtained from the Board of Adjustment following written application therefor, and said Board has held a public hearing thereon.

B. The Board of Adjustment must first find that such use is not detrimental, injurious or dangerous to public health and the welfare of the district or town, and shall not constitute a nuisance due to noise, vibration, smoke, odor or other objectionable features, nor adversely affect the economic status of the district or town. The Board shall consult the Planning Board of the Town as a resource for making these findings.

C. Both existing and proposed uses must have a permit to operate. A permit so issued shall be issued for an initial period of not more than one year and to be subject to renewal

upon application to and at the option of the Board of Adjustment for successive periods of not more than one year provided, that a bond is posted in the name of the Town assuring satisfaction of any requirements of the Board of Adjustment which it may require to safeguard the interest of the Town.

E. MOTOR VEHICLE AND MACHINERY JUNK YARDS:

A. No new junk yards as hereinafter defined shall be established, opened, or operated within the Town.

B. No existing junk yard within the Town shall be expanded or in any way enlarged unless a Variance is granted by the Board of Adjustment.

C. The term "Motor Vehicle junk yard" as used herein shall include any business and any place or storage or deposit, whether conducted in connection with any other business (such as garage, auto repairs, new or second-hand auto sales, service station, etc.), or not, which has stored, deposited or abandoned:

(a) two (2) or more unregistered motor vehicles which are no longer intended or in a condition conforming with legal requirements for use on the public highways, or

(b) used parts of motor vehicles, or such pieces of iron, bronze, or other metals, glass, paper, rubber, or other discarded or second-hand material as has been a part, or intended to be a part of any motor vehicle, the sum of which parts or materials shall be the equivalent in bulk of two (2) or more passenger car motor vehicles.

(c) The term "motor vehicle junk yard" shall also include any place of business or storage or deposit of motor vehicles purchased or acquired otherwise for the purpose of dismantling the vehicles for their parts or for use of the metals for sale as scrap materials as well as those places where scrap metals are salvaged by burning the motor vehicles or where motor vehicle parts are cut up for the salvage of metals in more convenient sizes.

D. The term "Machinery Junk Yard" as used herein shall mean any place of storage in which there is displayed to public view junk machinery of any kind or scrap metals, wood, glass, fabric or other materials commonly called junk.

A. AUTHORIZATION FOR ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT:

1. This ordinance together with the Building Code of Seabrook, New Hampshire shall be administered and enforced by the Board of Selectmen.

2. The Board of Selectmen is hereby given the power and the authority to appoint a Building Inspector and a Deputy Building Inspector, who shall act in the absence, disability or unavailability of the Building Inspector, and to delegate to such Building Inspector the power and authority to administer the provisions of this Ordinance that require use of the Building Permit.

B. BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT:

A Board of Adjustment as established, is hereby continued as such, and its membership and duties shall conform to the provisions of Chapter 31, Sections 66 to 89 inclusive of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated or any amendments or additions made thereto.

C. ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES PERTAINING TO USE OF THE BUILDING PERMIT:

1. No person or entity shall undertake any construction, development or alteration of any building structure or use of land without a written building permit issued by the Building Inspector unless such undertaking is for normal maintenance or for emergency repairs.

2. No building permit shall be issued by the Building Inspector until all applicable provisions of this ordinance have been complied with.

3. There shall be a fee for the review of an application, inspection of the premises (if required) and the issuance of a building permit of five (\$5.00) dollars, plus the sum of two (\$2.00) dollars per thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars (or any fraction thereof) of the estimated cost of the building or project over (\$500.00) dollars. Such estimated cost shall be submitted by the applicant, subject to the approval of the Building Inspector who may revise such cost estimate if it appears too high or too low, but if the applicant is not satisfied, the Selectmen shall make a final determination on behalf of the Town of Seabrook, and he shall account and pay over all such fees to the Town. In addition, a fee of twenty (\$20.00) dollars shall be required if a public hearing is deemed necessary by the Planning Board, which fee shall be payable upon application. The building permit fees may be increased, if circumstances warrant, by unanimous consent of the Board of Selectmen.

4. No application for a building permit shall be accepted or approved unless it is (1) filed in writing on a form prescribed by the Selectmen, (2) accompanied by the required permit fee, (3) accompanied by a drawing or plat, in duplicate showing the lot plan, the location of the building, or use on the lot, accurate dimensions of the lot and building or use, and where for human habitation or use, showing location and specifications, and means of waste and sewage disposal, means of access to such lot or use, and such other information as the Building Inspector may deem necessary to provide for the observance of the provisions of this ordinance. No building permit for any work or project estimated to cost more than \$10,000.00 shall be issued until the Building

Inspector has inspected the premises and has satisfied himself that all lot, building, structure and land use stakes or markers are in place and comply with the provisions of this ordinance.

5. No application for a building permit shall be approved until stakes or markers shall be fixed on the lot to indicate the location of lot lines and all corners of building(s), structure(s) and alterations proposed, and where the Building Inspector deems it necessary or desirable, of the means of access thereto. Where the application is for land use not involving excavations, grading, or other development or use of the ground or landscape concerned, stakes or markers shall be fixed on the lot to indicate the location of lot lines and bounds of all such excavations, grading or land development(s) proposed.

6. A building permit whether for a building, structure, material alteration or proposed land use, or otherwise, under the authority of which no work has been commenced within one year after issuance shall expire and become void upon such anniversary.

7. No land shall hereafter be used for building or development and no building or structure hereafter erected, enlarged, materially altered, or moved, in whole or in part for any purpose until a building permit shall have been issued by the Building Inspector showing that the use and development of the land. building or structure complies with the provisions of this ordinance.

8. A building permit may be issued upon such conditions as the Building Inspector, or when applicable, as the Board of Adjustment may deem necessary to assure the observance of the provisions of this ordinance. Any building permit issued shall authorize only such work or project as the application and the permit, taken together, reasonably allow. The Building Inspector or the Selectmen may suspend or revoke any building permit upon determining that the work or project in process is not in conformity with the permit as granted, or is otherwise in violation of the terms of this ordinance. In event of such suspension or revocation of a building permit, the work or project concerned shall immediately cease, or legal action to enforce such cessation shall forthwith be taken by the Selectmen.

D. DUTIES OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR:

1. The Building Inspector shall assist the prospective builder to conform with the provisions of this ordinance.

2. To determine at the site of work operations whether these follow the plans and specifications as proposed in the Application for a Building Permit and the extent of compliance with the Building Code ordinance of the Town.

3. To maintain a complete and accurate record of the work performed by the Building Inspector, keeping such records as are required for this purpose in files at the Office of the Board of Selectmen.

4. To assist the Selectmen in the enforcement of this ordinance.

E. ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE:

1. Upon receipt of information from any source that any provision of this Ordinance is being violated, the Building Inspector, Health Officer, or Police Chief shall promptly investigate the alleged violation at its site and, through the Board of Selectmen, shall undertake the following actions to enforce the provisions of this ordinance:

- a. Notify the owner or his agent in writing of the nature of the violation and ordering immediate correction of it, and
 - b. When satisfactory compliance has not been obtained following such notification, the Selectmen shall have a complaint prepared against the offending party who shall be summoned to appear in Court to answer such complaint, or the Selectmen may take any other action that may be appropriate or in accordance with the advice of Town Counsel.
2. Penalties: Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation, punishable by a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, upon conviction, for each day such violation may exist or continue. Any such violation, once commenced, shall constitute a continuing violation until it is terminated, and such a continuing violation may be prosecuted as a single violation, or as a series of separate violations.

F. CONTROLLED GROWTH:

To guide the growth of the Town in a manner not to exceed its present and future ability to provide expanded facilities to support such growth, and specifically to protect public health standards such as water quality and quantity and sewage treatments requirements.

The following restrictions are set:

1. The issuance of building permits for dwellings in any subdivision shall be limited in any one calendar year to fifteen (15%) per cent of the number of undeveloped lots existing in said subdivision as of January 1, 1978, or if approved after January 1, 1978, on the date of said Town approval until said subdivision is filled.
2. In all cases where the computation of the percentage under subparagraph 1 above is a fraction, that fraction shall be rounded to the nearest whole number, and in no case shall be less than one.
3. For the purposes of sub-paragraph 1 above, a sub-

division shall mean the division of a lot, tract or parcel of land into two or more lots, plats, sites or other division of land for the purpose of sale or building development including mobile home parks.

SECTION VIII:

NONCONFORMING USE:

A. At the time this ordinance takes effect, all lawful buildings, structures, and land then devoted to uses which would not be otherwise allowed in the district where the same is located by the terms of this ordinance are declared to be non-conforming uses.

B. A non-conforming use, except for the use authorized under Section III, C - 2, 3 and 4, may not be changed subsequently to another non-conforming use of the same premises nor may the non-conforming use be expanded beyond that which existed upon the adoption of this ordinance, nor resumed after the lapse of one year unless a special exception has been granted by the Board of Adjustment.

C. Land and buildings that are idle or not put to any specific use shall be considered to be in a conforming status.

D. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent substantial restoration within one year and continued non-conforming use of a building that has been damaged by fire, water or other casualty. Authorization must be obtained from the Board of Adjustment before restoration of non-conforming property may be undertaken when such restoration involves (1) structural or architectural changes in the building, or (2) changes in the use of the property.

E. Any buildings or structures for uses as authorized in Section III, C - 2, 3 and 4, whether or not in Zone III, for which building permits have been issued prior to the enactment of this ordinance, shall be considered as existing for purposes of this Section only.

SECTION IX: AMENDMENT, SEVERABILITY, AND WHEN EFFECTIVE:

A. When provisions of this ordinance, or any part thereof, may be amended, supplemented or repealed in the manner set forth by Chapter 31 of Revised Statutes Annotated as amended.

B. Whenever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance or other regulation, that provision which imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall prevail.

C. Should any section or provision of this ordinance be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent authority and jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other provision of this ordinance, and to such end all sections and provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

D. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and shall thereupon supersede all prior zoning ordinances of the Town of Seabrook. No provision of this ordinance however shall limit or affect the power of the Planning Board as authorized by the Town under Chapter 36 Section 19 of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, on March 7, 1972.

SECTION X: DEFINITIONS:

Accessory building: A building whose purpose is subordinate to that of the main building. It may be separate from or attached to the main building. For the purpose of this ordinance a breezeway, a garage or a carport that is attached directly to, or by means of another structure to the main building, shall be regarded as an integral part of the main building.

Accessory use: Any subordinate use of premises which customarily is accepted as a reasonable corollary to the principal use thereof, and which is neither injurious nor detrimental to the neighborhood.

Alteration: Of a building or a fabricated structure means a change, rearrangement, or addition involving the original structural parts, or significant changes, or additions to the plumbing, gas piping, electrical wiring, ventilation, or heating installations. Such alterations are not to be confused with replacements or repairs.

Building height: The height of a building is the vertical distance from the grade to the highest point of the coping of a flat roof, or to the decline of a mansard roof, or to the main mean height between the plate and the ridge of a pitched or a hip roof.

DISTRICT: A division of the total area of the Town including all of the land, water, streets, and buildings within the designated boundaries.

Dwelling: Single-family - A detached building for or occupied exclusively by one family.

Dwelling: Two-family - a detached building designed for or occupied by two families exclusively, living independently and separately of each other therein.

Foundation: The structural materials supporting a building.

Frontage: Line separating private property from a public right of way or street.

Home occupations: Any work involving mechanical production, crafts, domestic arts, or services that are produced for a profit on the premises and incidental to the occupancy of a dwelling and its accessory building by a family unit and employing not more than three (3) persons outside of the immediate family. Examples: radio repair, hairdressing, dressmaking, shoe repairs.

House, guest, rooming: A building in which bedrooms are rented to semi-permanent guests whose meals, when consumed on the premises, are prepared only by the proprietor or his employees.

Hotel, motel: A building designed for or used commercially as more or less temporary living quarters for persons who are lodged with or without meals, in which are ten or more sleeping rooms usually occupied by transients.

Land: For the purposes of this ordinance, the word "land", wherever used, shall mean and include all the surface of the earth within the limits of the Town of Seabrook, including all land, ground and subsurface deposits, all the air space above the land to the limits of the Town's jurisdiction thereof, and all waters, tide waters, marshes, flats and underwater lands to the limits of the Town's jurisdiction thereof. Provided, however, that as to a lot and its area and bounds as defined herein, the term "land" shall not include water or underwater lands, whether tidal or otherwise, unless otherwise provided herein.

Lot: One parcel of land set off as a unit and either occupied by or intended to be occupied by a building or fabricated structure, and including the open spaces required by law.

Lot Area: Means the extent in square feet of the surface of a lot. The lot area shall not include any part of the street upon which the lot fronts or abuts.

Lot depth: The mean distance from the frontage line to the rear lot line when measured on a line halfway between the two side lot lines.

Lot lines: The lines bounding a lot, and dividing the lot from other lots, streets, land or water.

Lot of record: A lot which has its principal frontage upon a street and is described in a deed which has been lawfully recorded in the Registry of Deeds for the County of Rockingham, or which, if not so deeded, is a lot which is part of a subdivision, the plan of which has been lawfully recorded in such Registry of Deeds.

Lot width: The mean distance between the lot side lines measured on a line which is the mean direction of the front and rear lot lines.

Neighborhood: An area of land local to the use concerned, generally lying within a radius of 1000 feet of such use for the purposes of this ordinance, but including all areas farther away from such use whenever the use creates a condition which by reason of noise, smoke, vibration, lighting or other cause creates a detriment, hazard or injury to an area more extensive in size.

Non-conforming use: A building, structure or use of premises that does not conform to the provisions of this ordinance in the district in which it is situated, and which is permitted solely because it was in lawful existence as such a use prior to, or at the time this ordinance took effect. Only the principal use of the premises concerned may be continued if it is non-conforming; a subsidiary, secondary, subordinate or part-time use of premises may not be deemed non-conforming.

Repair: Replacement or mending of parts already existing but in a state of deterioration with equivalent materials and for the purpose of maintaining their quality.

Story: Means that part of a building or structure comprised between a floor and the floor or roof next above it.

Structure: Anything constructed or erected by human means, whether on land or water, the use of which requires location on the ground or bed of the water, or which requires attachment to something having location on the ground or water.

Trailer, travel trailer type: A fabricated structure mounted on wheels and especially designed: (1) for hauling it on highways with a motor vehicle, and (2) to provide temporary living quarters during travel, camping, recreational or vacation trips (synonymous with "Trailer Coach").

Variance: Means a variation from the terms of this ordinance, not otherwise permitted within the district concerned, which may be granted by the Board of Adjustment pursuant to its discretionary power, where the Board finds that the grant of such variance will do substantial justice and the intent of the ordinance will be still observed. The Board of Adjustment may in such case waive the literal enforcement of the applicable provision(s) of this ordinance and grant a variance only where such literal enforcement would result in unnecessary hardship to the applicant.
