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This year's Troy Town Report is dedicated to the men and women of the Town of Troy who serve and have served the United States selflessly in our Armed Services since the end of the French & Indian War.

To that effect we list the United States Constitution's Bill of Right as exemplary of the freedoms for which they have sacrificed.

Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution

## Amendment I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

## Amendment II

A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed.

## Amendment III

No soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

## Amendment IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

## Amendment V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

## Amendment VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

## Amendment VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise reexamined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

## Amendment VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

## Amendment IX

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

## Amendment X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.

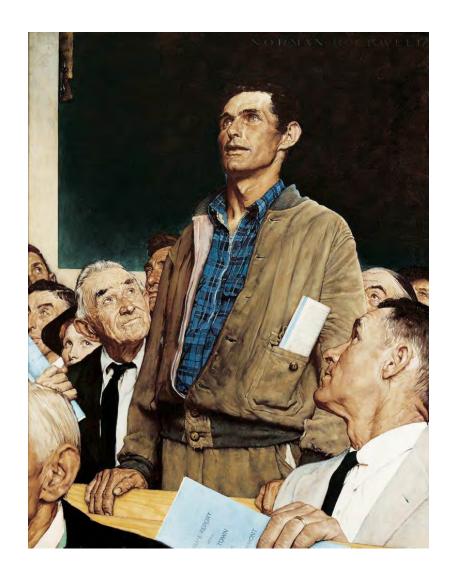

## TOWN TREASURER REPORT

The Town of Troy ended 2018 with a low cash flow. The town ended 2018 with an 8% surplus retention. (This is not cash-on-hand) We have three long-term debts. The Town receives 20% back each year on the landfill long-term debt, 30% on the Sewer Upgrade and 30% on the Water upgrade.

We have three outstanding bonds, Landfill until 2020, Sewer Upgrade until 2027 and Water Upgrade until 2029.

The town funded the Capital Reserve Funds for Revaluation, Fire Department. Highway & Streets, Highway Department, and Police Department. Also funding the Expendable Trust Fund for the Samuel E Paul War Memorial.

We have a Special Revenue Fund for the Troy Transfer Station/Recycling which is funded by the sale of bags, CD dumpster fees and the sale of recyclables. The Transfer Station does not have a Capital Reserve or Expendable Trust, so this fund has to be maintained to purchases the bags, equipment needed and doing any renovation. Also, a portion is used against the landfill long-term debt.

We also have Special Revenue Funds for Recreation, which supplements what the town has to appropriate each year. Revenues that come into this fund are rental of the center, volunteers doing fund raisers earning money from community breakfasts, roller skating, movie nights and other activities in the year.

The Town borrowed \$100,000,000 TAN note in November of 2018 to pay for expenditures because of the tax bills not done on time.

The Monadnock Regional School District portion of the tax rate increased this year.

The Cheshire County net appropriation came in 16.1% higher than last year.

We had a decrease in the town portion of the tax rate due to an increase of revenues and the new valuation of property.

The 2004 HME Engine and the 2002 Ford Ambulance was fluid filmed to help prolong the life of the truck.

### Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

This past year we were fortunate enough to have favorable weather conditions in the spring and summer which limited the amount of wildland fire activity throughout the state. September and October saw fire conditions change, and the state was faced with some difficult fires. The Dilly Cliff fire in North Woodstock was one of the most challenging fires we have seen in New Hampshire. Steep terrain and extreme fire behavior made this fire difficult to fight. It lasted for over 3 weeks and the final hotspots in inaccessible terrain were extinguished by heavy rains. Your local fire departments and the Division of Forests & Lands worked throughout the year to protect homes and the forests. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on high fire danger days. Our fire lookouts are credited with keeping many fires small due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire detection efforts were supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high.

Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2017 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at <a href="https://www.firewise.org">www.firewise.org</a>. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

As we prepare for the 2018 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting <a href="https://www.NHfirepermit.com">www.NHfirepermit.com</a>. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services (DES). You are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-3503 or <a href="www.des.nh.gov">www.des.nh.gov</a> for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. Thank you for helping us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. ### **Highway Department 2018**

2018 brought big changes to the Town of Troy. Selectboard members left, some stayed, new members brought new ideas. The Highway Department also went through a serious change. Jim Dicey, who was a well liked, reliable cornerstone within the Town of Troy, decided that after 30 years with the Highway Department and 40 + with the Fire Department enough was enough and retired. A well- deserved retirement but it left the Town with a search for a new Public Works Director, nervousness and uncertainty was to be expected.

I was hired in June and given about 2 % months to learn, from Jim, what he had acquired over 30 years. Not an easy task.

One of the first things that was needed after I took over was to evaluate the road conditions in town and come up with a rating system. They were rated by immediate, short term, and long term.

Immediate - if attention to these roads is not given a.s.a.p damage to the roads, subgrade or ditches may occur. Damage of these sorts are often costly and time consuming. Property damage may occur as well resulting from inattention to these problem areas. Some examples of these problem areas are full ditch lines that push water onto and under roadways, dead/dying trees which may fall across roadways or people and plugged culverts or drains which will not allow water to drain appropriately.

I.E... Bigelow Hill, Gap Mt. have culvert failures, potholes in the Russell Ave., Brook St. area. Low hanging branches/ dead trees on West Hill and Tolman Rd., as well as ditches over run on Bigelow Hill, Prospect Hill, Mackey Rd.

Short term – these roads may not require immediate attention but could possibly due to weather, or expected failure etc. Failure to address these at the earliest possible time may push these roads to the Immediate rating.

I.E... Gap Mt., Bigelow Hill, Mackey Rd. have ditches that are over run but may hold up to normal rainfall. Heavy rains may undermine the shoulders causing pavement failure. Roads throughout Town have culvert drainage ditches which need to be dugout to be more effective flowing water. These won't take much to back up the pipe causing the water to find an easier route(erosion).

Long term – these are less numerous than the others. Drainage should hold up for awhile, trees and brush aren't encroaching the roads too bad, and road surfaces aren't broken or patched too badly.

I.E... South Main St., South St. have pretty decent ditch lines, West Hill has brand new pavement, on Memorial and Longmeadow Drives, the tree and brush work required isn't as urgent as other places in Town.

\*\* As a side note, if your road wasn't mentioned it doesn't mean its overlooked. These were just examples listed above. Gary and I have spent hours (usually rainy days) looking at and evaluating Troy roads. This will be the first full year without Jim and we're constantly revamping our maintenance plan for 2019. \*\*

Some of the projects we've worked on since I've joined Troy Highway are as follows: Installed 80' of culvert on Quarry Rd. to help with the drainage from the new development. Installed 240' of culvert pipe on Thayer Ave. to ease the flooding problem (the neighbors referred to this area as "Lake Thayer" for years) with the generous drainage easements from the Sendrowski and Greenwood families. We spent a lot of time and effort working on Old Whitcomb Rd. trying to keep the rainwater off the road and in the ditches. Every time it rained, the road would be covered in gravel. Problem has been fixed. We've opened up quite a few culverts and ditches in areas prone to plugging.

One challenge we encountered right off was one of our large 6 wheeled dump trucks failed state inspection. The frame is bad on it rendering it unusable for the Town of Troy. There wasn't time to outfit another plow truck before the onset of winter, so it was decided to purchase a smaller (3 yard) spreader for the F550 plow truck. This new spreader has worked far better than even I imagined and should help keep maintenance and repair costs down as it is cheaper (and safer) to operate than the larger 6-wheeler. I am hoping the Town of Troy will allow me to sell the "bad" truck via bid process (there is still value in this truck in parts) and put the money received back into the equipment fund in order to purchase another smaller spreader for the other small plow truck.

There is a lot more to talk about, but space is limited. I enjoy what I do, I've done this type of work my whole life, and look forward to serving the Town of Troy and its residents. Please contact me with ANY concerns or questions at 242-3649 or through the Town Hall 242-7722 and I will get back to you. Or, even better, stop and talk to us.

Lastly, I wanted to thank the Selectboard and the Town of Troy for giving me the opportunity to serve them. Chrissi, for being the "go to" person at Town Hall, and lastly Gary LeBlanc for making it easier for me to take up where Jim left off. He has gone above and beyond to help me.

Sorry about the length but I felt most of you don't know me and should have some insight on what you can expect in the future.

### TRANSFER STATION/RECYCLING CENTER

In 2018 the markets for sale of recyclables was up slightly. The cost for running the recycling center is going up. Mixed paper (mixed loose fibers) no longer bring in money, instead we had to pay NRRA to truck it away. Mixed loose fibers consist of magazines, glossy print outs, chipboard that are not corrugated cardboard, colored sections of the newspaper, mail, etc. The cost for mixed fibers a load is \$225.00 handling charge, \$397.50 transportation charge and \$75.00 a ton.

Only clear/colored glass bottles & jars can now be sent to the City of Keene. The recycling center has to pay for this expense at \$35.00 a ton. The CD dumpster and the garbage dumpster costs are a \$100.00 a ton and \$125.00 trucking fee each time a dumpster is removed by MDS.

The Town of Troy pays the City of Keene for Hazardous waste collection. The spring collection dates are March 23. 27, 30, April 13, 17, 27, May 11, 15, 25. and June 8, 19.29. between the hours of 8am to 1pm at 55 Old Summit Road, Keene, and the fall collection dates will be advertised in the Troy Town News once we receive them. There is no charge for Troy residents to use this service. Last years cost to the town was \$2,600.00. This year it will cost \$3.528.00.

From the beginning of the bond to current, the transfer station special fund has applied \$488,500 toward the closing of the landfill.

I would like to thank Rod Page for his many years of dedicated service. He has done an excellent job as Superintendent of the Transfer Station and wish him well on his retirement this March.

I would also like to thank the staff, Susan, Dan, Stephen and Mike for their dedicated service.

Mill fabric samples were donated by Kent Royce who was a long-time employee of Troy Mills. We would like to thank those who donated items to the museum. These donations are beneficial in "Preserving the Past for Tomorrow."

In October we celebrated the first year of the Troy Historical Museum in its new location-downstairs in Kimball Hall. The museum occupies the whole downstairs. The kitchen area has many items one might find in a home from the 1930s or 40s. The first room contains the "Country Store" with items for sale, artifacts on display, and the old piano. The middle room contains reference materials and the main room houses many, many donated historical items retelling the history of Troy.

Also, in October, we provided a tour of some of Troy's historic buildings for the Jaffrey Historical Society. Speakers at each site spoke about the role their building played in the development of Troy.

December brought our biggest attended event, the Currier & Ives Cookie Tour. More people visited the museum on the Cookie Tour than visited all year. It was a great day spent reminiscing, meeting families, sharing recipes, and cookies. A really positive way to close out 2018.

### **Troy Planning Board**

The Planning Board's regulatory duties, based on NH RSA 673, include the review and approval of subdivisions, lot line adjustments, and site plan review applications. The Board is also charged with maintaining a Master Plan (last revised in 2007) and other ordinances and policies that purposefully guide land use in Town.

2018 accomplishments included public hearings on three subdivision applications, a Site Plan Review Regulations update (which now includes Site and Design Standards), letters of intent/applications to the New Hampshire Department of Transportation Transportation Alternative Program and the Monadnock Alliance for Sustainable Transportation Complete Streets Implementation Grant, and more.

Membership of the Planning Board during 2018 included Robert Luopa (Chair). His unique leadership style, sense of humor, knowledge of our community, and commitment to service is sorely missed. Other members included Steven Sawyer (Vice Chair), Henry Underwood (Secretary), Curtis Hopkins (Selectmen's Representative), Jon Collins, Tom Matson, and Kyle Smith.

In the year 2018 the Troy Water and Sewer Department stayed busy with day to day operations.

On the water side we replaced 3, 3/4-inch services with a 2 inch line on Monadnock St. We also have been keeping a close eye on our pH levels so we can keep our copper levels down coming into the wastewater treatment plant as we have an extremely low copper limit issued by EPA. Also, as part of the EPA T3s rule that requires lead testing to be done in schools and child care facilities the Troy Elementary School was tested for lead at all drinking fountains, Nurse office and kitchen and the results came below the MCL limit of 15 PPB (parts per billion).

On the wastewater side we are continuing to try and find out ways to reduce our energy cost. Also, our assistant superintendent Nicholas Huntoon received his Grade I wastewater treatment license.

The Water and Sewer Commissioner's Meet on the second Wednesday of each month at 5:00 P.M. unless otherwise posted. If you have any concerns, problems or questions, you are welcome to attend any meeting, and we will try to accommodate you in any way we can. To see if the town will authorize the Select Board to establish a schedule of fees for building permits, inspections, and certificates of occupancy. The Board of Selectmen recommends this article.

### PASSED AS PRESENTED

### Article 24 - Building Permit Revolving Account

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict 100% of revenues from building permits and demolition permits to expenditures for the purpose of building inspections? Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Building Permit Special Revenue Fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall accumulate from year to year and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of the revenue. The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.

### Article 25 - Building Inspector

To see if the town will authorize the Select Board to contract the services of a building inspector. The Board of Selectmen recommends this article.

### Article 26 - Gay-Kimball Library Lighting

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to install energy-saving LED lighting in the ground floor of the Gay-Kimball Library. The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

AMENDED TO SAY AND TO AUTHORIZE THE WITHDRAWAL OF \$6,000 FROM THE TOWN BUILDING AND REPAIRS EXPENDABLE TRUST TO OFFSET THIS EXPENSE.

### PASSED AS AMENDED

### Article 27 - Town Manager / Town Administrator Study

To see if the town will vote to direct the Select Board to establish a Town Manager or Administrator Study Committee for the purpose of exploring the pros and cons of the Town of Troy hiring a full-time Town Manager or Administrator. The Town Manager or Administrator Committee shall consist of no less than five members to be appointed by the Select Board. The committee shall present its findings at a public hearing before the end of the year, and, if deemed appropriate, shall place a warrant article on the 2019 Town Warrant that would create the position, adopt the provisions of RSA 37 if necessary, and appropriate funding for the purposes of hiring a Town Manager or Administrator. The Select Board recommends this article.

### PASSSED AS PRESENTED

### Article 28 - Capital Improvements Program

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to reestablish a Capital Improvements Program to review, annually, projected capital improvements. At the March 14, 1995 town meeting, voters approved Article 27: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to prepare a recommended program annually. The sole purpose of the Capital Improvements Program is to aid the Budget Committee in its consideration of the annual budget. The Select Board recommends this article.

AMENDED TO SAY: TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTBOARD (PERSUANT TO RSA 674:5) TO APPOINT A CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS PROGRAM COMMITTEE TO PREPARE A PROGRAM OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS. THE SOLE PURPOSE OF THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM TO AID THE SELECTBOARD AND BUDGET COMMITTEE IN ITS CONSIDERATION OF THE ANNUAL BUDGET.

### PASSED AS AMENDED

### Article 29 - Highway Department John Deere Loader

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$115,500) for the replacement of the 1998 Caterpillar Loader to be replaced with a 2018 John Deere Model 444K Loader and to authorize the withdrawal of \$85,000 from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund to offset this expense \$30,500 to be raised by taxation. The Board of Selectmen recommends

this appropriation. The Budget Committee does not recommend this appropriation.
