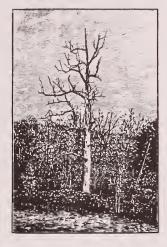
# SPECIAL RECOGNITION

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF WEARE IN THE COUNTY OF HILLSBOROUGH, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Center Woods Elementary School in said Weare on Tuesday, March 10, 1998 at seven o'clock in the forenoon, to elect officers of the Town by official ballot, to vote on questions required by law to be inserted on said official ballot and to vote on all Warrant Articles from the First Session.

To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year. (By Official Ballot)

#### **ARTICLE 2**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to the Zoning Ordinance, Article 19.1.3 as follows: To eliminate the words "Motor Sports", and add the following sentence: "Motor Sport and Race Track Facilities are not permitted in the Residential, Village, and Rural Agricultural Districts." (Recommended by the Planning Board)

## **ARTICLE 3**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to the Zoning Ordinance, Article 4.1, <u>Definitions</u> as follows:

To add the following definition: "Motor Sport and Race Track Facility; shall mean any permanent recreation facility where motorized vehicles of any kind are raced".

To add the following paragraph to <u>Lot</u>: "Newly created lots shall be four sided and rectangular in shape unless extenuating circumstances such as existing lot lines or similar conditions require it to be different."

To add the following paragraph to <u>Lot Line</u>: "For all intent and purposes, newly created lot lines shall have lines as perpendicular as possible to the roadway, right-of-way, unless existing stone walls or other extenuating circumstances warrant the lines to be different."

To add the following definition: "<u>Dwelling, Accessory Attached Apartment</u>": An Accessory Dwelling Unit, consisting of not more than six hundred fifty square feet constructed within or attached to a single detached residence. Accessory Attached Apartments may be granted by a special exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment." (Recommended by the Planning Board)

#### **ARTICLE 4**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to the Zoning Ordinance, Article 14.1 as follows: "The minimum lot size shall be based upon the percentage of property included in each soils/slope type shown in Table 1-1. When determining lot size, the entire area used to calculate size must be non-wetland soils. For definition of wetland soil, see Article 28." (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to the Zoning Ordinance, Article 16.2.7, change the first sentence to read: "A subdivision under this section shall be required to meet 200 ft. road frontage requirements on a Class V Town Road." (Recommended by the Planning Board)

#### **ARTICLE 6**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 to the Zoning Ordinance, to add Article 17.1.1 as follows: "No building permits shall be issued for new buildings, or for the expansion of existing buildings which increases the occupancy of those buildings, on any Class VI or private road until such road is upgraded to the current Class V road construction standards as defined in the subdivision regulations, and a warranty bond is retained by the Town of Weare, and the land in which the right-of-way exists is deeded to the Town of Weare." (Recommended by the Planning Board)

#### **ARTICLE 7**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 to the Zoning Ordinance, to add the following articles:

"31.3.1 <u>Area of Shallow Flooding</u> means a designated AO, AH, of VO Zone on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) with a one percent or greater annual possibility of flooding to an average depth of one to three feet where a clearly defined channel does not exist, where the path of flooding is unpredictable and where velocity flow may be evident. Such flooding is characterized by ponding or sheet-flow."

"31.10.2.4.4 Proposed structures to be located on slopes in special flood areas, zones AH, AO shall include adequate drainage paths to guide flood waters around and away from the proposed structures."

"31.11.3 The Zoning Board of Adjustment shall notify the applicant in writing that: (1) The issuance of a variance to construct below the base flood level will result in increased premium rates for insurance up to amounts as high as \$25 for \$100 of insurance coverage and (11) Such construction below the base flood level increases risks to life and property. Such notification shall be maintained with a record of all variance actions." (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 to the Zoning Ordinance as follows: Remove the word "Condominium" from Section 19.1.2. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

#### **ARTICLE 9**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 to the Zoning Ordinance as follows: To add the following paragraph to Article 19 as Section 19.1.10. "One Accessory Attached Apartment shall be permitted to single dwelling residences in the Residential Zone and the Rural Agricultural Zone by special exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment and with these further stipulations:

- 19.1.10 (1) An Accessory Apartment shall be clearly incidental to the primary use of the property for a Single Dwelling, and such accessory living space shall not exceed six hundred and fifty square feet.
- 19.1.10 (2) An Accessory Apartment shall either be constructed within or attached to a single dwelling.
- 19.1.10 (3) At least one interior connecting door or other access for persons to pass between the primary residence and the Accessory Apartment shall be provided.
- 19.1.10 (4) Septic System design/capacity shall be approved by the NH Department of Environmental Services.
- 19.1.10 (5) No new entrance or exit to an Accessory Apartment shall be constructed facing the front of the single dwelling.
- 19.1.10 (6) One parking space shall be provided for an Accessory Apartment and no new curb cut from the street shall be constructed.
- 19.1.10 (7) Exterior construction and materials shall be uniform with the single dwelling. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 to the Zoning Ordinance as follows: To change 100 feet to read 75 feet in Articles 18.2.4 and 18.2.5. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

#### **ARTICLE 11**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 10 to the Zoning Ordinance: To add Article 18.2.6 as follows: Distance from well water supply to septic system, surface water, or wetlands to be 75 feet. This shall apply to all replacement wells as well. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

#### **ARTICLE 12**

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 22,965.00 for the purpose of hiring one additional full-time Police Officer. Of the sum of \$ 22,965.00, the sum of \$ 12,585.00 shall be received in the form of an approved COPS Grant for one new full-time Police Officer, with the balance of \$ 10,380.00 to be raise by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto. ( Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

#### **ARTICLE 13**

Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$2,901,768.00? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$2,764,964.00 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13,X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee)

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 216,054.00 for road reconstruction and resurfacing of roads. Of the \$ 216,054.00, the sum of \$ 163,908.57 would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire (pursuant to RSA 235); with \$ 14,350.00 to be withdrawn from the Old Town Road offsite improvement fund, and the balance of \$ 37,795.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto. ( Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

## **ARTICLE 15**

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 15,000.00 for cemetery improvements. This sum to be withdrawn from Cemetery Trust Funds as provided by RSA 31:22a (cy pres); and to designate the Board of Cemetery Trustees as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

#### **ARTICLE 16**

Shall the Town discontinue the Capital Reserve Fund known as the Reservoir Drive Bridge Capital Reserve Fund established in 1987 for the purpose of the replacement of two bridges on Reservoir Drive leading to Horace Lake. Of the balance of \$116,976.73 (as of June 30, 1997) the amount of \$82,500.00 shall be appropriated and added to the following previously established Capital Reserve Funds, with the balance of \$34,296.00 plus all accrued interest to date of transfer to be transferred to the Town's General Fund, to be a revenue in the current year.

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be added to the previously established Capital Reserve Fund known as the Recreational Field Development Capital Reserve Fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee).

#### **ARTICLE 18**

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 2,000.00 to be added to the Computer Equipment Maintenance Trust Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto. ( Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

#### **ARTICLE 19**

Shall the Town establish a Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35:1, to be known as the Geographic Information System (GIS) Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 10,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

#### **ARTICLE 20**

Shall the Town establish a Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35:1, to be known as the Highway Truck and Equipment Replacement Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 to be placed in the fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee).

#### **ARTICLE 21**

Shall the town establish a Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35:1, to be known as the Salt Storage Shed Fund, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 15,000.00 to be placed in the fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee).

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,857.00 for the purpose of general maintenance and upkeep of the Town Forests, and to authorize the Board of Selectman to withdraw the amount of \$1,857.00 for this purpose from the Town Forest Account, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

#### **ARTICLE 23**

Shall the provisions for voting by official ballot on all issues before the Town of Weare under RSA 40:13 be limited to election of officers and certain other questions? (By Petition) 3/5 Vote Required

#### **ARTICLE 24**

Shall the Town approve the designation of the office of Overseer of Public Welfare as an appointed position, subject to the Annual appointment by the Board of Selectmen in accordance with RSA 41:56. If approved, this article would take effect in March 9, 1999; such authority shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

#### **ARTICLE 25**

Shall the Town approve the abolishment of the Board of Fire Wards in accordance with RSA 669:17-b and authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint the Fire Chief in accordance with RSA 154:1(a)? If approved, this article would be effective March 9, 1999; such authority shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. (By Petition)

#### **ARTICLE 26**

Shall the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey property acquired by Tax Collector's deed located at 330 Craney Hill Road, Tax Map 401, Lot 68,(43.9 Acres) and Tax Map 401 Lot 70 (5 Acres) located on Chipmunk Falls Road either at Public Auction or by Advertised Sealed Bids on terms and conditions established by the Board of Selectmen, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

To see if the Town will vote to advise the Selectmen that no pay raises or salary increases of any sort are to be granted to any Town Official or any Town Employee except by separate Warrant Article. (By petition)

#### **ARTICLE 28**

To see if the Town will vote to designate as a Scenic Road the entire length of Tiffany Hill Road from Shady Hill Road to Quaker Street, pursuant to RSA 231:157, Scenic Roads; Designation. (By petition)

#### **ARTICLE 29**

To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

#### **BOARD OF SELECTMEN'S REPORT**

To the Citizens of Weare, NH

It is with a great sense of pride in accomplishment that your Board of Selectmen presents the Town's Annual Report of our municipal condition for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1997.

The Annual Report contains an enormous amount of information on how Town Government was managed during this past fiscal year, based upon the general direction provided by the voting public during our 1997 municipal balloting. We hope each of our citizens makes an effort to review the information compiled herein, to better understand how Town Government performed in 1997 and consequently prepare oneself for the continuing debate on how Town Government should work during the 1998 Fiscal Year and beyond.

The 1996 Annual Report contained the Board's pledge to insure the delivery of essential governmental services economically, efficiently and expeditiously. To honor this promise the Board has monitored our municipal spending practices weekly and together with our Town Treasurer, initiated several new reports and measures to manage our cash resources more effectively and profitably. The Board has encouraged our Department Heads and employees to improve their performance levels through attendance at relevant continuing education programs and mastering the latest technological aids for enhanced job performance. Also along these lines, the Board is pleased to report that a job performance evaluation program has been implemented, to assure that all of our employees approach their job responsibilities with seriousness born of an understanding that service excellence will be the only acceptable form of job conduct.

During our last report we extended an invitation to all of our residents to become more active in following the work of this Board as well as that of other boards, committees and commissions whose volunteers serve this community with outstanding dedication and sacrifice. We are pleased to report that the level of understanding of the work of many of these agencies and town government has risen dramatically with the live broadcasts of this Board's public meetings, as well as those of most of our other volunteer boards on Weare CATV Channel 46. Scheduling difficulties sometimes preclude the live broadcast of a particular board's public sessions, but every effort is being made to either tape the session for later broadcast, or rearrange meeting schedules to accommodate broadcast requirements. Please be sure to let the members of this Board of Selectmen and members of the other board's whose broadcasts you've found useful, know of your interest in following their work. And if you have a special interest in the work of any board whose meetings has not been broadcast, please call or write one of us or a member of that board to ask that a special effort be made to broadcast those meetings on Channel 46.

The Board is pleased to report that from a financial perspective, Weare is a very healthy community. Care and prudent spending in past years, coupled with this Board's aggressive work to manage the growth of municipal spending, has placed Weare in the enviable position of

having very modest long-term debt service responsibilities. As a consequence this Board will be able to turn more of it's attention to strategic, long term planning for development of your community's infrastructure, particularly our network of roads and system of bridges. Your advice and counsel in how to proceed in improving these valuable community assets is very important to us and we ask that you take an active role in the discussions to accompany the planning process. Also, as we speak of planning, we ask that as the year progresses, you offer your support and volunteer assistance to our Planning Board, as that agency attends to the work of updating our Town's Master Plan, an indispensable guide for our Town's future.

We believe civic pride is an essential ingredient in community stability and development, and we're particularly pleased with the outward signs that civic pride is alive and well and growing in Weare. Witness the wonderful expression of appreciation delivered to our Police Department this past Fall, and the impressive "Welcome to Weare" sign depicted on the cover of this Town Report as two modest examples of our pride in who we are and what we are about. Or spend a few minutes - or hours - viewing Channel 46 and the wide range of offerings provided there by the volunteers who make up the Weare Cable Committee - again, manifestations of civic pride and a sense of sharing, of talents and knowledge. This Board will continue to foster civic pride by encouraging all who strive to improve our community, and it's economic and natural environment.

One strength of a community is it's ability to identify critical needs and formulate solutions to meet these needs, through lively civil discussion and debate. Thoughtful debate requires knowledge of the facts which are relevant to an issue and an understanding of the points of view concerning such facts. This Board is committed to open government, where the facts and points of view on an issue are exposed to close and critical public scrutiny. Accordingly, we invite all to attend our meetings (or watch us on Channel 46) as well as the meetings of the other boards, committees and commissions which serve the Town, to learn the facts, understand the issues, and participate actively in the governance of your community.

# LONG-TERM RECOMMENDATIONS FOR WEARE TOWN GOVERNMENT FACILITIES

October 15, 1997

Report to the Board of Selectmen:

At the outset of 1996, the Board of Selectmen established a Town Facilities Committee for the purpose of identifying the space needs of our Town government and determining the most reasonable long-term answer to adequately address those needs.

Since April, 1996, the Committee has met formally 12 times with dozens of additional hours provided by individual members in various research and information gathering efforts and property site walks. The Committee came to the conclusion early on that a realistic, long-term answer to these space needs is likely to be five to ten years away from being a reality.

Considering the very practical and valuable input of Town departments and the support of the Board of Selectmen, the Committee identified short-term solutions to current needs in the Town Office Building in June, 1996. With a tremendous amount of volunteer labor and donated materials, these improvements were implemented before the end of 1996 throughout the current facility in order to accommodate the necessary functions of our Town government as efficiently and economically as possible for at least the next five years.

The short-term improvements were accomplished during the summer and fall months, and were achieved well-under the total \$17,000 identified for this purpose in the fiscal year 1996 Town Operating Budget.

Despite the success and acceptance of the short-term improvements by Town employees and the general public alike, these accomplishments were intended and are clearly only short-term in nature. Committee members, lead by the Town Administrator, have expressed the opinion that the Town cannot wait even five years to contract a new long-term facility. The Facilities Committee unanimously agreed to focus its attention on long-term solutions for the space needs of our Town government. As a result of its initial discussions, the Facilities Committee made the following determinations:

Generally, the facilities for the Highway Department and the General Services Department (landfill, sewer system and animal control) are reasonably adequate for the foreseeable future. That's not to say that some modifications won't be needed (such as possibly a lift at the Highway Department garage) in the future.

There is a need to address the current and future facilities needs of the Town Offices (Selectmen's Office; Town Clerk; Tax Collector; Building Inspector/Code Enforcement Office; Planning Board; Zoning Board of Adjustment; Conservation Commission; Welfare Officer; General Meeting Rooms and Record Storage and Retention); Police Department and Fire Department.

The Facilities Committee conducted a review of all Town-owned properties including land that is currently included in the Felch Farm Town Forest. If it were determined a current piece of Town-owned property had to be utilized for this purpose, the Committee felt the site most suitable at this point for the long-term facilities needs of the Town of Weare would be the remainder of the former Romanos property off Route 114 North of the center of Weare.

Of all current Town-owned properties, it was felt this site would be the most appropriate for a number of reasons, not the least of which include:

- A major portion of the site is currently being developed for three municipal-owned and maintained athletic fields.
- 2. The Town will be working with the State of New Hampshire to develop access to this property from Route 114 instead of utilizing the current Quaker Street access. This access becomes more justified economically for access to both the athletic fields and the Town's municipal offices and facilities, instead of just the athletic fields by themselves.
- The acres remaining on this property not already designated for athletic fields are suitable for development for this purpose, and provide for future needs of the community.
- 4. The site provides more than adequate space for one large facility that could house all Town departments under one roof, or the development of two separate facilities including a municipal office building and a public safety building (police and fire).

5. There would be an efficiency and economy of scale in the overall maintenance of one municipal site instead of having numerous facilities in different locations. The Facilities Committee has agreed that, generally, a building or buildings designed to meet the long-term needs of the Town should be conceptually designed in order to adequately determine the total space needs of such a facility in addition to being able to locate a site that could most easily support such a facility. It was the consensus of the Facilities Committee members that a specific site should not be selected until determinations about the physical facility(ies) are made.

With this report, we would seek:

- (a) The Board of Selectmen's renewed support and endorsement for the planning activities the Facilities Committee was charged with performing in 1996.
- (b) The Board of Selectmen's renewed endorsement of the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund in 1998 as a first significant step for the design and development of a future Town of Weare municipal facility.
- (c) A Warrant Article on the March, 1998 Town Warrant for an initial deposit of \$10,000 into the Capital Reserve Fund in 1998.
- (d) The Board of Selectmen's authorization for the Facilities Committee to continue its planning efforts in 1998 in order to develop conceptual layouts and design of a Town of Weare municipal facility; to establish a realistic budget and time frame for implementation of this project; and to identify possible outside sources of funds to the Town in implementing the project.

#### RECORD OF FIRST DELIBERATIVE SESSION CENTER WOODS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL MARCH 15, 1997

The First Meeting or Deliberative Session of the Town Meeting under RSA 40:13 was called to order by our Town Moderator, Neal Kurk, on March 15, 1997 at 10:05 AM in the Center Woods Elementary School. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Paul Bourget and Greg Wilson both Cub Scouts members of Pack 24.

The meeting was asked to rise and remain standing to hear the reading of the Town residents who have died during the past year. The reading was followed by a moment of silence in their memory.

The Moderator, Neal Kurk, informed the meeting that they would not be breaking for lunch and that Cub Scout pack #24 was in the back of the room to sell coffee and baked goods and Girl Scout Troop 456 was in the lobby selling cookies.

The Moderator then went over the procedures for this meeting relating to SB2. A voter asked if there was a rule requiring that voters be out of the voting booth in ten minutes. The Moderator explained that this was a State Statute and in a discussion with the Secretary of State he was told that the time limit should be at the discretion of the moderator. Mr. Kurk stated he would be very lenient with the voters and allow them all the time needed. He also explained that we would set up a reading area with sample ballots for the voters.

Moderator stated the rules for today's meeting would be Garfield Jones' Parliamentary Procedures at a Glance as interpreted by the Chair. The Moderator then read eleven additional rules to be followed at this meeting.

The Moderator introduced the people at the front of the room starting with Doug Clegg: Audio Technician, Ed Barrett: Town Administrator, Linda Connell: Town Attorney, Leon Methot: Selectman, Craig Slattum: Selectmen, Douglas Hatch: Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Evelyn Connor: Town Clerk, Supervisors of the Checklist: Margo McLeod, Carol Finch, Pat Kovacs.

The Moderator recognized Frank Campana to speak for the Finance Committee in the absence of the committee chairman Douglas Cook. Mr. Campana introduced the members of the Finance Committee.

Mr. Campana spoke of the process the Finance Committee worked with, he stated they have worked closely with the Board of Selectmen to present a fair budget to the Town.

The Moderator requested any individual that would be interested in serving on the Finance Committee or any other board to please make themselves known to him at the end of the meeting.

At this time, in accordance with the sense of Article 38, 1994 Meeting, the Chair offers the privilege of addressing the meeting, when called upon to do so, to two non-residents - Ed Barrett, Town Administrator and Linda Connell, Town Council. Unless there is a motion to deny them the privilege.

No motion to deny was made. Mr. Barrett and Ms. Connell were granted the privilege of addressing the meeting.

Douglas Hatch, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, was recognized to give the State of the Town Address.

Mr. Hatch announced the dedication of the 1996 Town Report in honor of Gerald Hadley Hight. Mr. Hight, known to most as "Jed", died on September 29, 1996. Jed served our community in many capacities but is most remembered as having been the Fire Chief and later as the Chief of Police.

Mr. Hatch made a presentation to Margo McLeod, for being selected the recipient of the 1996 Ninth Annual Municipal Volunteer of the Year. Margo was honored at a luncheon at the New Hampshire Municipal Association Annual Meeting in November.

The Moderator asked if no objection that the reading of the Warrant in its entirety, at this time, be waived and that each Article be read as it is taken up. There being no objection, the chair ruled in the affirmative.

Articles one through six being set by statute are not subject to discussion.

#### **ARTICLE 7**

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$37,421.00 for the purpose of hiring two additional full-time Police Officers, and reducing the part-time roster to six part-time positions. Of the sum of \$37,421.00, the sum of \$14,033.00 shall be received in the form of a newly approved COPS Grant for one new full-time Police Officer, with the balance of \$23,388.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chief Tuthill moved to adopt Article 7 as read. The motion was seconded. Chief Tuthill spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 7. There was much discussion on this article.

The Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 7 will appear on the ballot as read.

#### **ARTICLE 8**

Shall the Town of Weare raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$2,870,204.00. Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$2,835,625.00, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Weare or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Chairman Douglas Hatch moved Article 8 as read. The motion was seconded. Mr. Hatch was recognized to speak to his motion.

Mr. Hatch explained the selectmen has opted to have each department develop their own budget. This would give a truer picture of the department expenses. Comparing last years budget breakdown to this years would be difficult so they will go through each line item and explain what happened.

Each of the three selectmen read the following list for the breakdown of the budget monies requested and gave explanations. Mr. Hatch read first.

The Finance Committee recommends Article 8.

David Erickson move to amend Article 8 and reduce (FF) Patriotic Purposes by \$575.00 making it \$12,200.00. This would result in a bottom line of \$2,869,629.00. The amendment was seconded. Mr. Erickson spoke to his motion.

The Moderator called for a vote and his motion failed.

The Moderator asked if there be any further amendments. Terry Knowles inquired if there were any Town employee raises, how much, and where the money is located in the budget. Mr. Hatch stated that the funds were in the Selectmen's Office Line and the amount was \$33,000.00. He also explained this was the first year the Merit Program would be in implemented along with some salary adjustments as decided by the Salary Review Committee.

Mrs. Knowles asked where the Contoocook Valley money was located in the Warrant and how much was requested. Mr. Hatch said it was in the Town budget and the amount of the request was the same for the last two years \$4,972.00. Mrs. Knowles asked if it were appropriate for a non-profit organization's monies to be under the Town instead of a separate warrant article. Ms. Connell, Legal Council, said she knew of no statute to restrict this.

After much discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 8 will appear on the ballot as read.

Chief Tuthill moved restriction of both Articles 7 and 8. The motion was seconded. The moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Reconsideration restricted.

Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Weare based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$30,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$40,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$50,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$18,400 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$26,400, and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence.

Howard Ineson moved Article 9 as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee has no recommendation on this Article.

The Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 9 will appear on the ballot as read.

#### **ARTICLE 10**

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a financing agreement for the purpose of lease purchasing a new Six Wheel Dump Truck and related equipment for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,283.00 for the first years payment for that purpose.

Lloyd Bailey moved Article 10 as read in the form of a question. The motion was seconded. Mr. Bailey spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 10.

The Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 10 will appear on the ballot as read in the form of a question.

#### **ARTICLE 11**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$170,905.00 for road reconstruction and resurfacing of roads. Of the sum of \$170,905.00, the sum of \$160,018.00, would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire (pursuant to RSA 235); with the balance of \$10,887.00 to be raised by taxation.

Mr. Bailey moved Article 11 in the form of a question. The motion was seconded. Mr. Bailey spoke to his motion and explained the areas he will be handling with this money. The Finance Committee recommends Article 11.

The Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 11 will appear on the ballot as read in the form of a question.

The motion was made to restrict reconsideration. The motion was seconded. The moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Reconsideration restricted.

#### **ARTICLE 12**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 to cover the costs of the Town's participation in a local Household Hazardous Waste Collection in 1997: Of the sum of \$5,500.00, the sum of \$1,548.25 would be provided by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, Waste Management Division, on a per capita basis of 25 cents, as an after the completion offset to the costs of the project.

Mr. Martin moved Article 12 in the form of a question. The motion was seconded. Mr. Martin spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 12.

The question was asked if Mr. Martin was sure that this was enough money to complete the day of collection so that no one would be turned away this year. Mr. Martin assured them he felt confident this dollar amount would be sufficient.

The Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 12 will appear on the ballot in the form of a question.

The motion was made to restrict reconsideration. The motion was seconded. The vote in the affirmative. Reconsideration restricted.

#### **ARTICLE 13**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,200.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new Automated Ballot Counting Machine.

Evelyn Connor moved Article 13 in the form of a question. The motion was seconded. Evelyn spoke to her motion explaining the function of the machine and how to use it. The Finance Committee recommends Article 13.

The Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 13 will appear on the ballot as read in the form of a question.

The motion was made to restrict reconsideration. The motion was seconded. The vote in the affirmative. Reconsideration restricted.

Shall the Town establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1, to be known as the Master Plan Update Fund; to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend.

Mr. James Donison moved Article 14. The motion was seconded. Mr. Donison spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 14.

The Moderator called for a voice vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 14 will appear on the ballot as read.

The motion was made to restrict reconsideration. The motion was seconded. The vote in the affirmative. Reconsideration restricted.

#### **ARTICLE 15**

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$51,000.00 to be added to various Capital Reserve Funds previously established, including the following:

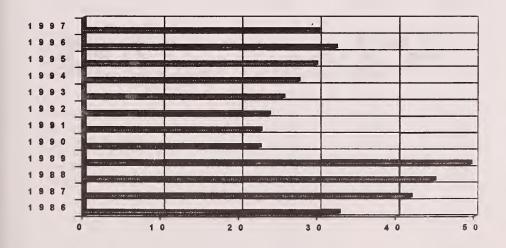

#### TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

December 21, 1997 begins my sixth year working for you, the town's people. We've come a long way with the services offered for motor vehicles. 1997 was a year of change for our office. Early in the spring we started issuing motor cycle, trailer and passenger plates. Then, in September, the first renewal notices went out offering you the opportunity to process your registration by mail. This has been very successful and we have received notes applauding our excellent service. We have some limitations, vehicles weighing over 8,000 pounds and lease transfers still must be completed at the Registry of Motor Vehicles.

These increased services have also increased our revenue. We collected \$17,705.00 in \$2.50 fees. That has increased by \$4,685.00 over last year. The vehicle registration revenue has also increased \$83,875.00. There were many new vehicles registered.

Dog fines and penalties are down by \$1,206.00. We have licensed 1,653 individual dogs and 175 in the form of group licenses.

We held our Rabies Clinic with Dr. Dutton administering the shots and several volunteers working at the tables. The Rabies Clinic is an annual event and we expect to hold another in April. All dogs need to be licensed by April 30th. We will try to have our dog tags here by the first of March. You will be able to purchase them as soon as we receive them.

## WEARE ANIMAL CONTROL 1997 REPORT

It was an eventful year for the Animal Control Office. During 1997 1,200 calls were handled and more than 300 hours of administrative time, court appearances, etc. were logged. Nuisance Complaints, such as stray dogs and animals running at large were handled as well as a large increase in loose farm animals such as horses, cows, pigs, etc.

Weare Animal Control successfully, with the help of the Town Prosecutor and Weare Police Department, charged a Weare resident with Animal Cruelty and was awarded custody of sixteen puppies by the Court. There was also an habitual nuisance and running at large dog owner who was taken to court resulting in the owners being charged fines by the Court and the dog was turned over to the Town.

Another case worth mention, was that of a neglected, truant horse which, with the help of the New Hampshire Equine Humane Association, was resolved by Weare Animal Control.

Animal Control Officers respond to various calls throughout the Town on a 24 hour per day, 7 days per week on-call basis. Please remember to call Weare Animal Control at 529-2323 if your pet is lost. We may have already located it.

We would like to thank the residents of Weare for their continued support in our efforts.

#### WEARE COMMUNITY ACCESS TELEVISION COMMITTEE

The purpose of Weare Community Access Television, Channel 46, is to provide a forum by which individuals and organizations in the Town of Weare can display their talent, knowledge or other information, thereby enhancing the quality of life in our community. It provides broadcast time and access equipment free of charge to qualified community members for the production and presentation of non-commercial programs of community interest. This service also provides an invaluable means of conveying information to townspeople wishing to keep informed about local issues, particularly in light of passage of Senate Bill 2.

In reading over last year's annual report, it was apparent how much progress the CATV Committee has made since its reorganization in the Town Office Building in the fall of 1995 and how much it has been able to fulfill its statement of purpose quoted above. All budget hearings - both town and school districts - and all town and school district meetings in 1997 were taped and broadcast over Channel 46. A studio-produced, round-table discussion with Town Officials on the implications of Senate Bill 2 was also an accomplishment of last spring's endeavors. Since September, the Selectmen's weekly Monday meetings, the Weare School District bi-monthly meetings, and the John Stark District monthly meeting have been taped and aired. The Middle School Graduation tape was edited and has shown regularly throughout the fall as has Concord Hospital's Healthline, which airs every weekend. The Committee has also produced it's first local program, a monthly news magazine entitled, "October in Weare".

While equipping and wiring the Selectmen's Conference Room for live, automated shoots has been a long, sometimes tedious, process, as of this writing, the Committee sees that becoming a reality by December 1, 1997. This will allow the Selectmen, or any other Committee meeting in that room, to throw a switch and have its meeting broadcast live over Channel 46. Additional equipment has been purchased in this budget year and will be purchased in the next budget year to enable the Committee to edit the tape in the field as a shoot is being made. This will eliminate any lag time in the airing of a meeting since the tape will be ready to show at meeting's end. The studio room on the second floor of the Town Office Building is slowly being furnished for studio shoots and was the site of a four-week training program offered by Media One in October and November. Sixteen citizens of the town participated in that training. The Studio is open and staffed Monday evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. and at other times by appointment.

The Committee strives always to fulfill its main responsibility of keeping the townspeople of Weare informed. It extends its thanks and appreciation to all those individuals who have helped in these growing months with their encouragement and support.

We are happy to report to all member communities that 1997 marked the eighth complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The 1998 budget reflects a reduction in the tipping fee to \$38 per ton. This is the fourth consecutive year the Cooperative has been able to either lower or maintain the tipping fee.

The waste delivered to the Wheelabrator Facility this year was 119,942 tons. That represents an increase of 718 tons over 1996, or an 0.6% increase. The amount of trash delivered continues to rise as predicted.

A total of 65,505 tons of ash were disposed of at the Franklin Ash Monofill. Things continue to operate well at the ashfill. Phase III Stage I is being filled at this time. The most recent expansion (1996) will provide disposal capacity for the next eight years.

Currently the Cooperative is in the process of negotiating the costs of an emissions retrofit at the Wheelabrator Facility. This retrofit must be in place by January 2001 to meet EPA and DES regulations.

## CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (CRVNA) continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Weare: Home Care, Hospice and Community Health Services.

<u>Home Care services</u> respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and paraprofessional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

<u>Hospice services</u> provide professional and paraprofessional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping him/her remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

In April of 1997 Hospice expanded its services to provide residential care with the opening of New Hampshire's first Hospice House. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 248 terminally ill residents.

<u>Community Health services</u> includes health education, health maintenance and preventive health services. The program includes preventive care, adult and senior health, child health, Baby's First Homecoming, immunizations for all ages, school linked clinics, parent education and support, health education and nutritional counseling.

Community Health services includes health promotion services which focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, adult screening, and immunizations. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provide at congregate housing sites.

Professional and paraprofessional hourly home services are provided on a private feefor-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.. A nurse is on call for hospice and home care patients: (224-4093) 4:30 p.m. - 7:30 a.m. daily.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or where no fee is collectible.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE 1997 REPORT

The Committee focused its efforts in 1997 on carrying out several action plans it identified in its "Economic Development Strategy for Weare" document developed in 1996. By way of review, that document identified the following goals for economic development:

- 1. To promote additional services within Weare.
- 2. To support a diversified and growing tax base.
- To maintain the rural character of Weare.
- 4. To encourage the creation of a variety of business activities that provide the residents of Weare with quality employment.

The plan also contemplated two major strategies to accomplish those goals, mainly expanding the existing business base and promoting tourism.

The action items worked on by the Committee in 1997 were designed to help execute these two strategies and included the following:

- We are continuing to get the word out about Weare by distribution of a town brochure at the Manchester Airport, which will hopefully find its way into the hands of a prospective business seeking a new location.
- We are augmenting an existing Weare home page with creation of a "Virtual Tour" of Weare that incorporates several "tour stops" that highlight the attractiveness of Weare for retail growth, business expansion and various tourist related activities. Similar to the brochure, the aim is to publicize the many strengths of our community in hopes of attracting new business, expanding existing business and getting more money into the local economy by promoting tourism.
- We have installed a sign on Rte. 114 South that displays to passers' by the pride we have in our community and a business friendly attitude. The sign incorporates the slogan "Welcome to Weare, A part of yesterday in touch with tomorrow" which the committee selected through a contest run last year. The winner was Bud Gannon who not only won the contest but also graciously donated his labor to construct the paint the sign. Two more signs will be installed this spring.

- We are also planning to install decorative banners in the center of town that will publicize our community spirit, help create more of a town center and a focus of activities.
- We have also performed a survey of every business in town seeking to identify ways we can help that business grow and prosper. The results should be tabulated by the end of 1997 and distributed to all businesses. A major effort of the Committee in 1998 will be to follow up on the business needs identified in the survey, sponsoring for example, seminars on particular business issues such as how to better market their product.
- In addition to these activities, the Committee also looked into various grants that may
  be available, worked with a local entrepreneur who hopes to establish a zoological
  park in town, sought assistance from various academic institutions in our efforts and
  worked on establishing a set of by-laws for our Committee.

A key to the success of any committee is its membership and I wish to thank our members for their efforts during the past year and to welcome members of the public to attend and participate in helping to improve the economic climate of the town.

During the 1997 year, the Fire Department/Rescue Squad responded to 485 emergency calls. This figure represents and approximate increase of 11.5% over 1996 figures.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE: A new oil tank was installed at the East Weare Station inside the building and the furnace was moved to accommodate same. Some broken windows and a new entry door were also replaced at this station.

VEHICLE MAINTENANCE: All vehicles received bi-yearly inspections and oil changes. However, due to unanticipated mechanical problems with the ambulance and one fire truck, expenditures far exceeded budgeted amounts for repairs to these vehicles.

TRAINING: In-house training consisted of Ice/Water rescue, breathing apparatus, portable pumps, vehicle extrication's, live burns and building searches. EMS personnel trained for cardiac rhythm, pulse oximeter, medical examiner information and practical

skills. Outside training consisted of bomb threats/searches, portable foam pack, power outages and electrical dangers and HazMat.

NEW FIREFIGHTER/EMTS: Four new members joined the Department this year. They are Firefighter Garth Hoff, Firefighter Gilbert Robinson, Firefighter Victor Thibeault and EMT Sandy Flanders.

COMMUNITY SERVICE: Members again assisted with traffic control and parking for John Stark graduation in June and also with the Open House sponsored by Knoxland Farms. A manned truck was sent to the American Legion for the annual flag burning.

#### **WEARE TOWN FOREST 1997 ANNUAL REPORT**

We postponed our intended selective cut in the Felch Farm Forest this year in hopes of an improved market. The demand for fair grade lumber is steady entering into the winter. The revised plan is to mark the stand before the New Year and negotiate the sale terms in early 1998.

The lot line adjustment along Rte. 77 was completed this fall. This will enable us to create a permanent access point into the seventy-five acres of forest between Peaslee Brook Meadow and Rte. 77.

The Poor Farm trails were open and well used during the warmer months. The 2 mile trails are opened all year round; they are well marked. More work is planned for next summer clearing around the old fountains. The Weare Poor Farm foundations are excellent examples of New England's 'continuous architecture', the connecting of buildings over time, as need determines. With no photographs or precise descriptions, the rectangular stone patterns challenge an explanation and wonder.

We completed the acquisition of forty-eight additional acres to Ferrin Pond Forest. The money for these projects is generated by selective harvests in the Town Forest, and does not affect tax rates. Projects are decided by town vote. The trail system around Ferrin Pond is now marked, wandering around the pond over the forested glacial till surrounding it. This remote pond is beautiful. The map and spur trails are still in the development stages.

Bartlett Brook Forest now extends to Rte. 149, right on the Deering/Weare Town Line. A parcel of land on the 'town owned inventory' was added to this Town Forest property providing access to the one hundred ten acre forest property, finally making it accessible with roadside frontage. We will be proposing creation of a small parking lot and development of a hiking trail system. The grand hope is to someday join this trail to the Ferrin Pond Forest trails; there is only one landowner between the two properties.

We always need assistance and energy from volunteers to help with trail development, trail maintenance, habitat improvement projects, and generation of new ideas. Weare is extraordinarily lucky to have this natural resource.

Traditionally, expenses run between \$15,000 and \$18,000, not including the Fireworks Display which is funded entirely by the Town. The Committee earns money throughout the year through vendor booths, 50/50 raffle and various fund-raisers. The Committee decided not to sell Christmas Trees this year due to the busy schedules of our volunteers. #### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Thanks to the continued support of the citizens of Weare, our Highway Department had another successful year. Although all of our goals and projects were not realized, the following is a brief synopsis of the achievements by our department as well as anticipated projects for 1998...

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS OF 1997:**

- Reconstructed the intersection of Reservoir Drive and Thorndike Road and also reconstructed approximately 2000' of road on Reservoir Drive.
- Reclaimed 1.1 miles of Flanders Memorial Road and put 2" of new base on.
- Replaced River Road Bridge between Rockland Road and Buzzell Hill Road.
- Carl Knapp and Gary Thompson, Ron Renaudette and Mike Potvin competed at the Annual Plow Rally sponsored by the New Hampshire Municipal Association/Property Liability Trust Insurance. Carl and Gary finished first in the Wing Slalom. Congratulations to all.
- Winter came in like a bang in November dropping several inches of wet heavy snow.
   The storms have kept the department busy continuously plowing or sanding.
- The Walker Hill Road upgrade between the two tar sections is now completed.
- Replaced pipes under John Connor Road, Peacock Hill Road and Shady Hill Road because of damage caused from the flood in October, 1996.

#### **ANTICIPATED PROJECTS FOR 1998:**

- We received State approvals on Perkins Pond Bridge and Twin Bridge, we anticipate
  putting these both out to bid in the Spring of 1998.
- We have applied for State approval for Abijah Bridge over Dudley Brook, we are in the process of getting preliminary design done.

- We want to reclaim the second half of Flanders Memorial Road, from the top of Slacks Hill to Route 114, pave it with 2" of base and go back and do the top in the entire 2.3 miles of road to complete the project.
- We have other projects in mind under Road Reconstruction, but at this time nothing is finalized.

#### **ROAD MAINTENANCE:**

- Spring and Fall road grading
- "Pothole" patching
- Culvert cleaning and replacement
- Extensive truck and equipment maintenance due to increased winter woes
- Winter sand screening and salt preparations
- Street signs
- Truck and equipment preparation for 1997-98 winter maintenance
- Shimmed several roads

With the support of the Town's people and hard work, we have demonstrated what can be achieved. When provided with the necessary and proper equipment, staff and funding, a significant amount of work an be accomplished at a substantial savings to the Town. We look forward to your continued support in 1998. As you can see much has been accomplished but a great deal remains to be done.

#### WEARE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

This year has been a memorable one for the Weare Historical Society. The highlight of the year was the restoration of the rotunda in the Stone Memorial Building in Weare Center. Upon the recommendation of Dr. James Garvin of the N.H. Department of Historic Preservation, Mr. Nicholas Isaacs, who is considered tops in his field, was engaged to do the work. We were very fortunate to obtain his services. The Sawyer Trust also funded the construction of a folding stairway in the north room of the building making access to storage much easier.

The One Hundredth Anniversary of the Stone Building was celebrated on June 27, 1997 with a program featuring its history, a buffet supper on the lawn, and dancing to the music of Neal Martin, pianist.

A few hardy souls braved the cold to join in the Christmas Tree lighting and carol singing at the gazebo in Weare Center in November. Mother Nature did not cooperate to give us good ice for the skating party in February so it had to be canceled.

Programs featuring Old Inns of Weare, Egg Farms, and the Railroad in Weare were held in March, April, and May respectively.

The Society sponsored the Town Wide Yard Sale again this year. For a modest fee vendors may have their name and location put on a map of the town which is sold at the Stone Building on the day of the sale. This has proven to be a lot of fun as well as a good fund raiser for the Society.

Members of the Society have worked with Boy Scout Troop 99 on two projects this year. One is an oral history of East Weare and the other The Great Flood of 1938 Walking Trail. A printed guide for the trail has been made and will be published soon.

A video of historic sites with a description of each was presented at the annual meeting in October.

The Museum Committee is working hard to keep the accession records up to date and prepare items for display. Carol Fryer has devoted countless hours to this task. We hope to open the Museum more often during the coming year.

Pictorial Histories III and IV are still available as well as excellent quality T- shirts featuring the great blue heron, bronze and pewter bicentennial coins and 1888 maps of Weare. This map is an invaluable aid for using the 1888 Town History.

The Society welcomes inquiries about the history of the Town, suggestions for programs, projects and, of course, new members. As of November 30, 1997 our membership list includes 80 households of which many are new members. Some households from the previous year's membership list have not, as yet, renewed. *Please Do!* We welcome you, your ideas, questions and participation.

### **WEARE PUBLIC LIBRARY**

This year considerable maintenance work was performed at the Weare Public Library. The Library Board of Trustees, after consulting with various people, decided on a plan to solve the flooding problem in the lower level of the old part of the Library. After receiving bids, B-Dry Company was hired to do the job. The perimeter of the floor was dug up, crushed stone and pipes were put in, and a larger sump hole and pump were installed. The work is guaranteed to be successful.

The Library's programs presented to the public continue to be well received. The Writers Group, Story Times and Summer Reading Club offer Weare residents a variety of learning and entertaining activities.

The Friends of the Weare Public Library along with the New Hampshire Humanities Council provide funding for book discussion programs which are lead by professionals from various colleges and universities in the area.

The number of Library materials checked out of the upper and lower levels of the Library during 1997 was 35,825.

Workshops for staff continue to provide education on the latest technology so that patrons are better served.

At a recent conference the following information was released to the library community through the New Hampshire State Library: "Bell Atlantic, along with Cabletron and Project WINGS have announced a plan to use the Bell Atlantic network and Cabletron network access hardware to link all New Hampshire public and private schools (K-12) and public libraries in the Bell Atlantic operating area to the Internet. During the two-year period from March 1, 1998, until February 28, 2000, Bell Atlantic offers each School and Library either a new flat-rate business line or a 56KB Frame Relay data circuit with no installation or monthly charge. After the two year period has concluded Schools and Libraries can request discounts for this service through the Universal Service Fund." The Granite State Telephone Company has agreed to work with Bell Atlantic to make it possible for the Library to take advantage of this offer. We are at the preliminary stages of this project which will be of great benefit to the Town if implemented in the Library.

I wish to express my thanks to all volunteers and donors, to the Library Board of Trustees and Library staff for their diligent work to provide good service to the community.

## OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE 1997 ANNUAL REPORT

Many changes are taking place in the structure of various forms of government welfare to the poor which impact local budgets. Regardless of changes in state and federal programs, the Town remains responsible for providing relief to those unable to provide the basic necessities of life for themselves. Great care is exercised to insure that the needy poor are relieved in a manner consistent with the law and fiscal responsibility to the Town. During 1997, the Town of Weare expended \$60,762.56 to provide relief to the poor.

The funds were used to aid fifty-one families in the following ways:

50% To provide shelter.

12.7% To provide food.

16.5% To provide heat and electricity.

1.6% To provide medical assistance.

1% For funeral expenses.

10% Distributed to community service agencies.

8.2% For administrative costs.

Special thanks go to the Community Churches, Businesses, Service Organizations, and private citizens who gave of their time and money to aid the needy and ease the pressures on our Town Budget.

## PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION 1997 ANNUAL REPORT

### **CHASE PARK**

A petition was received May 5, 1997 to open Chase Park facility earlier. This would have been before the spring cleanup for the for Memorial Day weekend opening. The State of New Hampshire regulates the water draw down after October 12th and the raising of the water level between May 15th and 30th giving shoreline property owners a chance to repair docks and cleanup after the winter shut down. This schedule is governed by how much spring run off nature has provided. The water level must be high enough and time allowed to connect plumbing facilities. The Commission voted in the affirmative to retain the present schedule already in place. Having a few days of above normal temperatures, people are eager to test the chilly waters. The Commission has and will accommodate the public by opening the main gate on a day to day basis, when temperatures reach 80° F and higher. A new boat dock was constructed, replacing damages by storm "Lillian" in October 1996. During most of the summer, the weather was very hot with a drought like climate due to the lack of rain.

On Memorial Day and Labor Day weekends, the average temperature was 80.1° F. There were eight days below 70° F; fifteen days of 90° F and above; five days of showery and four rain-out days. There were ten requests to use Chase Park by families, groups and organizations. There were 224 participants in the Red Cross Swimming program for levels 1 through 7, Basic Water Safety and Emergency Instructional Aid. This was an increase over previous years. Two pre-registration dates were held at the Park in May and June to determine the numbers for the program and hours needed for instruction to provide a manageable and safe program. A \$5.00 fee per student, with a \$20.00 cap per family, will remain in effect. We are sorry to announce that the Commission is in the process of locating an instructor replacement for the 1998 program.

There was one major accident reported in 1997. Water testing in July for E-Coli was well below safety count units of 100 ML; factors are 9-7-23. The count of 23 was in the cove area. There was no report for August. Statistics taken from the daily sales receipts revealed the following information:

#### **GAZEBO & CENTER PARK**

Weare Garden Club members continue to maintain and beautify the floral surroundings around the Gazebo and hold Spring and Fall plant sales to raise funds towards additions and replacements. There were only two requests besides the 4th of July Celebration to use the Gazebo & Center Park in 1997.

#### HOOD MEMORIAL TENNIS COURTS

Courts have been used extensively by local patrons as well as John Stark Regional High School. There appears to be no interest in or support of any instructional program at this time. The courts' ground base is starting to show cracks and deterioration beyond general maintenance and a replacement is foreseen in the very near future. Vandals have cut one net to a point of needing replacement along with the tie lacings cut to short lengths.

#### PURINGTON MEMORIAL FIELD

Located on Salmon Road off Concord Stage Road - East Route 77, this multi-purpose field is still used extensively by Little League and Soccer Programs sponsored by the Weare Athletic Club, a non-profit group. The field is also requested by adult make up teams. Opening Quaker Street facility in 1998 will alleviate much of the over usage at this site.

#### QUAKER STREET BALLFIELD

Recreational Field Development is requested under the Capital Improvement Plan (C.I.P.) and appropriations have previously been established in a Capital Reserve Fund (C.R.F.) for the purpose of completing the necessary phases for this complex. On September 16, 1996, having completed necessary steps to insure the best results; analysis of soil; to the right requirements to top dressing to the correct seed mixture. Three days after the completed applications, torrential rains came which washed away and rotted much of the seed. October 17-19, 1996 was another set back with Tropical Storm "Lillian". Our intentions to use the fields in 1997 were dampened. A decision was made not to use the facility this year until results were better and to allow the roots a chance to set in. Graveling of the roadways and parking area has been completed. Field equipment has been ordered and will be assembled in the place. Electrical service was installed on the facility and the shelters and sign has been built but the dugouts remain to be done. A feasibility study and necessary permits for he roadway access to Route 114 were completed. Requested amounts for total access construction were cut in half during the budget process and then zeroed out and removed for the warrant at the deliberation session of Town Meeting. The next priority is the water supply for drinking and irrigation.

Outside of minor details, the facility is ready to use. Not having received any application(s) for Federal-Bureau of Outdoor Recreation matching grants, the Commission assumes that no funds are available as in previous years, prior to 1994.

The Commission again wishes to thank those for their interest, support and efforts in the completion of Phase I.

#### **PLANNING BOARD**

The Planning Board would like to thank all of it's members: Jim Donison, Chairman; Debra Cote, Vice-Chairman; David Erikson, Secretary; Douglas Hatch, Ex-Officio; and Kory Dionne, Full Time Member; as well as other members who have served on the Board throughout 1997, for volunteering their time and effort to serve the community. The Planning Board met two times per month in 1997. The first meeting of the month was to review applications, the second meeting served as a work session. The Planning Board has approved thirteen subdivision plans; eleven lot line adjustments; four site plan reviews and two voluntary mergers.

During the work sessions, the Planning Board has accomplished a number of tasks. The Site Plan Regulations were updated and a significant number of changes have been proposed for the Zoning Ordinance.

The Planning Board would like to thank all Department Heads for their cooperation in completing the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). The meetings ran smoothly and the CIP was completed before schedule.

The Board has not yet started on the revisions for the Town Master Plan. It is expected that a Master Plan Committee will work on this in 1998. The Planning Board is currently looking into applying development fees for new lots. These fees are expected to help maintain the rural small town feel of Weare. The Planning Board is looking forward to hearing input from other departments as well as the citizens of Weare regarding these issues. It is expected that 1998 will be another productive year for the Planning Board.

# POLICE DEPARTMENT YEAR END REPORT 1997

The Department's mission for 1997 was to initiate the first stages of our Community Policing projects. Our primary objective was to maintain an active patrol force, to get uniformed police officers into the neighborhoods, to get the people of our community to know their police officers and to deal immediately and effectively with their individual needs.

From those efforts came programs such as:

PRIDE, a drug awareness program designed for parents on how to effectively deal with their kids should they learn that their child have become involved with drugs.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH, a crime prevention program where neighbors watch neighbors homes, reporting any strange activity so it can be checked out before something bad happens.

OFFICER FRIENDLY, a program which places a police officer within the Elementary School, talking directly to the children of grades I - 4 about child safety issues such as seat belts, stranger danger, bicycle safety and more. This also allows the kids to see that the Police Officer is their friend and they should not be afraid of them.

BICYCLE RODEO, where children are encouraged to participate in safety courses designed to test their skills and abilities, to get their bicycles inspected and to get their bikes registered, in the event their bike is lost or stolen.

OPERATION PHOTO ID, a program where the Police Department photographs and fingerprints children from the age of 3 years and up. The parents retain these items and would make them available to the Police should their child become lost or missing. This program has also been taken directly to many of the Day Care Centers here in Town.

Future projects include programs such as Mountain Bike Patrols, Citizens On Patrol, and a Citizens Police Academy.

We want to thank everyone for their continued support of our efforts to bring quality police service to the Town. A special thanks goes out to Brian McDonald and all the people that made Weare Police Officer Appreciation Day such a smashing success.

From their efforts, they were able to donate to the Department a Bullet Resistant Vest and a new Mountain Bike. 1997 was a very trying time for law enforcement as a whole with the tragic deaths of three officers within the State. Brian and his people helped make sense of it all through their efforts and we again want to thank them for everything they did.

The Patrol Division is looking forward to the return of Officer Scott Plumer in April of 1998. Scott and his entire Army Reserve Unit were called to active duty as part of the peace keeping mission in Bosnia back in July of 1997. We were not able to fill his slot on a permanent basis, but thanks to the unselfish dedication of the entire Patrol Force, Part Timers included, we were able to maintain and suffered no loss in service to the community. Be safe Scotty.

The Police Department is looking forward to yet another year of "Working Together to Build a Better Community".

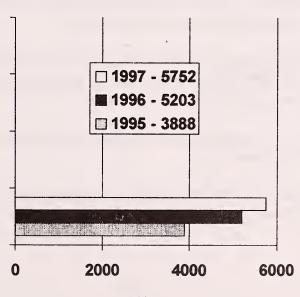

## SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help the dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants who are selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of your appointed representatives, the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance that are mandated under New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local or site-specific projects which would pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of your Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps your officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation, and offers training workshops for Planning and Zoning Board members on an annual basis.

Services that were performed for the Town of Weare during the past year are as follows:

- Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series. These meetings were attended by Weare officials.
- 2. Conducted traffic counts at several locations in the Town of Weare. Copies of the traffic counts were forwarded to the Road Agent.
- The Regional Transportation Plan and the draft Transportation Improvement Program FY 1999-2001 have been prepared. Included were some bridge improvement projects for the Town of Weare.
- 4. The Town was furnished with the "Suggested Schedule" for the March 1998 Annual Town Meeting.
- 5. Provided a video entitled "Community Growth Management" for the use of the Planning Board.

- 6. Assisted the NHDOT in the preparation of an application for the construction of a bikeway along NH Route 114 in Weare.
- 7. Provided the Town with RSMS (Road Surface Management System) data for its use by the Road Agent.

## TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

In addition to the usual distributions of trust fund income to churches, school and library and the establishment of new cemetery trusts, the Trustees continued overseeing the investment of capital reserves and trust funds and making the additions to and withdrawals from capital reserves and trust fund income as authorized by school district and town meetings. We continued our administration of the Emma Sawyer Trust Fund in the following ways:

- ----- Supplied granite posts for Eagle Scout Center Woods sign project.
- ---- Continued to fund the development and maintenance of Town property foundation and specimen plantings.
- ----- Funded a folding staircase for access to overhead space in the Stone Building.
- ---- Completed payment for restoration work on Stone Building Rotunda and replacement of stained glass in dome.
- ----- Purchased folding chairs and chair caddies for the Town Hall and had piano tuned.
- ----- Committed funds for professional exterior and interior window-washing at Town Hall, Town Office Building, Library and Stone Building.

For those of you unfamiliar with Emma Sawyer, she and her husband Allen, were natives of Weare who farmed at their homestead in Tavern Village. Each practiced the nursing profession, raised children and still had time and talent to be active Grangers. Allen served the Town as Treasurer, Trustee of Trust Funds, School Board Member and Checklist Supervisor. Emma died in 1946, two years after Allen. Her will established a trust to care for her two children, with estate going to Trustees of Trust Funds upon the death of the last surviving child.

To date, nearly two dozen projects have been funded from the Trust with many more under consideration. The policy under which the Trust is administered restricts the Trustees to funding only such projects as are not the legal or traditional responsibility of the Town.

## **FINANCE COMMITTEE**

The Finance Committee is comprised of a group of 13 community volunteers appointed by the Town Moderator. First established in 1929 by vote of Town Meeting, the Finance committee has changed over the years but it's primary role remains the same. Committee members work closely with the Board of Selectmen and the Weare School Board evaluating and making suggestions throughout the budget process so as to make informed responsible recommendations to the community on the budgets to be presented.

It is the committee's goal to work with the respective Boards in an effort to present budgets to the voters of Weare which are in line with the outside economic climate, do not place an excessive financial burden on the people, provide the services the community demands, and do so in a fiscally sound manner.

In 1997 the Finance Committee worked closely with the Boards throughout the entire budgetary process in an effort to present "Zero Tax Impact" budgets to the community which were both fiscally and operationally responsible. As a result of the diligent efforts of the members of the Board of Selectmen, the Weare School Board, the Finance Committee, and the voters of the Town of Weare, for the first time in several years the town will experience a decrease in the overall tax rate. The 1997 tax rate has dropped \$2.28 to \$29.72 per thousand.

As you may know, 1997 brought the start of a fundamental change in the budget process with the implementation of 'Senate Bill 2' allowing for ballot voting of budgetary items. In response to this change, the committee thought to devise a new and better method of communicating their recommendations and associated tax impact. As a result the 'Finance Committee Report' was modified to include the warrant articles of all budgets and expanded to incorporate the recommendations of the respective boards as well as the Finance Committee.

For the first time ever, prior to voting day, each member of the community was mailed a comprehensive document including all of the budgets to be voted on which contribute to our tax rate, Weare School District, John Stark School District, and the Town of Weare. Based on input received from the community, the 'Finance Committee Report' was a valuable source of information and analysis tool for the voters of Weare. As a result of its success and with the continued support of the Boards, it is our goal to provide a similar publication this year.

The committee would like to extend a special thank you to the girls of Junior Girl Scout Troop 2005 and the many other volunteers who helped fold, tape and sort the 26,000 pieces of paper for the 2600+ committee reports mailed to the community. Without their generous help and enthusiasm the report would not have been ready for distribution prior to the voting session - Thank You!

Inspired by the participation of the 1699 individuals who voted in the 1997 budgets, this year the Finance Committee is eager to move forward and pledges to do our very best to provide the people of Weare with the information they need to make informed decisions at the ballot box.

# REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2,400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each Town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1997 fire season was a safe period for wildland firefighters with no major injuries reported. The drought conditions experienced during the early summer months was a significant factor resulting in the total number of fires reported during the season.

The State of New Hampshire operates fifteen fire towers, two mobile patrols and three aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

## **GENERAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT**

An approximate 21/2% increase in all materials for disposal at the Transfer Station and Recycling Center occurred in 1997. Rubbish going to the incinerator at Penacook increased by 54 tons to 2,944 tons. The disposal fee for this material for the 1998 year decreased by \$1.00 per ton to \$38.00. Construction/demolition material disposed of at a cost increased by 10%, in large part because we no longer burn painted or finished wood, plywood, flakeboard, etc. Fortunately by changing disposal sites (twice) per ton cost savings of \$28.00 have been realized compared to January 1997. Also the current receiver (started in August) processes the materials they take in for reuse. About four tons of textiles have been recycled for which we receive income. Prices received for baled cardboard have averaged \$53.00 per ton; they fluctuate considerably. Despite changes in haulers and terms, progress is being made on accelerated removal of tires.

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection was held on June 7, 1997. Laidlaw Environmental Services packed and removed 1,065 gallons of filled containers from 124 households. The N.H. Department of Environmental Services provided \$1,548.25 toward the cost of the project.

Improvements to the alarm system at the sewer station are being made to improve communications if a problem or power outage occurs. Some aged deteriorated fixtures are being replaced. A line extension on East Road and a line to the Middle School for connection in 1998 were constructed by the Highway Department. To meet new state requirements a certified back-up operator will be obtained and trained; it is planned that this will be a current Town employee.

During the dry period in the summer the Town well by the Fire Station maintained a high level of water. This well serves the Fire Station, Gazebo, Library, Stone Building, Town Hall and one residence.
