Article 2. To bring in your votes for amendments on the Zoning and Building regulations.

The results of the balloting was as follows:

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment no. 1 to the Zoning and Building Regulations of the Town of Westmoreland N.H. as recommended by the Planing Board.

- E. (a) All dwelling units used for permanent human occupancy must be supplied with running hot and cold water properly connected with the following fixtures: kitchen sink, lavatory sink, tub or shower, water closet. These fixtures must be connected with a septic tank and leach field which has been approved by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. The required septic tank and leach field must be of sufficient size to accomodate a water closet.
 - (b) A family sized commercial dry composting toilet may be allowed in lieu of a water closet. Such a system must first be approved in writing by the local Board of Health based on the determination that said system will not endager the health of any person or cause a nuisance and that the end product will be disposed of in a sanitary manner. All other requirements in Paragraph E (a) must be met.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to the Zoning and Building Regulations of the Town of Westmoreland N.H. as recommended by the Planning Board.

- H. (a) Mobile homes, mobile home subdivisions, multiple family dwellings or conversions of a single to a multiple family dwelling shall not be permitted in town until approval has been granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment, after a public hearing.
 - (b) Travel trailers and campers will be permitted on private property for no longer than four weeks during any one year. A written permit will be required from the Board of Selectmen

for a longer period of time.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to the Zoning and Building Regulations of the Town of Westmoreland N.H as recommended by the Planning Board.

- J. (a) In Zones A and B all building lots for a single family dwelling shall contain a minimum of two (2) acres with a minimum of three hundred feet (300) frontage on a town approved and maintained road. This also applies to lots for trailers and mobile homes.
 - (b) In Zone C all building lots for a single family dwelling shall contain a minimum of five (5) acres, with a minimum of five hundred (500) feet frontage on a town approved and maintained road. This also applies to lots for trailers and mobile homes.
 - (c) Churches and schools are permitted in all zones.

Yes - 255 No - 82

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to the Zoning and Building Regulations of the Town of Westmoreland N.H. as recommended by the Planning Board.

- M. (a) Business, industry and professions may be permitted in Zones B and C by Special Exception only, in accordance with the following requirements:
 - The proposed use is in an appropriate location for such a use.
 - Such approval would not reduce the value of any property within the district, nor otherwise be injurious, obnoxious or offensive to the neighborhood.
 - There will be no nuisance or serious hazard to vehicles or pedestrians.
 - 4. Adequate and appropriate facilities will be provided for the proper operation of the proposed use.
 - (b) A Special Exception is valid only for the business or location for which it is issued. It shall expire upon termination of the enterprise to which it is assigned.

- (c) Any addition, expansion or alteration of an existing use for which a Special Exception has been granted must receive a new Special Exception.
- (d) The cost of advertising and costs of mailing the notices of hearings shall be payable by the person making the appeal prior to the hearing.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WESTMORELAND PUBLIC LIBRARY FOR 1979

The newly formed Friends of the Library have been invaluable to improving the services offered by the library. The Children's Program Committee has presented at least one and sometimes two activities per month throughout the year. A puppet show, sing-along, egg hunt, nature hike, flower arranging workshop, and Christmas craft workshop were only a few of the numerous and varied programs offered during the year. An excellent slide presentation by Ben Mellinger and a talk by Ernie Hebert, author of "Dogs of March" were given by the Adults' Program Committee. Volunteer labor has also been furnished by the Friends to clean the Library and help bring the card catalogue up to date. A doll raffle and bake sale were quite successful fund raising events as were the several open houses to acquaint residents with the Library and the services offered there. They have donated two much needed reference books to the Library, and are also responsible for the new sit-upons in the children's section. We want to thank each individual who has contributed so much time and energy to the Library. Their enthusiasm, interest, and hard work are most gratefully appreciated by the Librarian and Trustees.

The Library personnel underwent several changes this year. Jan Hurley was appointed Trustee to fill the vacancy created by Carol Andrews' resignation, and Carolyn Meehan began her duties as Librarian on July 24th, following Pat Leinster's resignation. Mrs. Meehan has an M.L.A. degree from the Johns Hopkins University, and is presently enrolled in the Public Library Techniques course offered by the New Hampshire State Library.

In October the Librarian and Trustees sponsored a slide lecture on Haunted Houses in New Hampshire which was very well attended. In November, in conjunction with the Right To Read Group, the Librarian and Trustees sponsored

a Library Appreciation Week, featuring a Coffee Hour/New Book Preview, and an "Energy Saving Ideas" display by Len and Nancy Meserve which also was quite well received.

The Library was certified by the State Library Commission, and continues to enjoy books from the Bookmobile. There were 20 State Library books requested and circulated for school reports, and 25 State films requested for local organizations.

With the help of several volunteers we have continued to supply books and films to Maplewood. The Kindergarten is making their bi-weekly trips and we continue to be members of the Nubanusit Co-op which is successfully helping to combat the rising cost of books and supplies.

The task of weeding our book collection, being done by the District Consultant, Sue Palmatier, has been completed, creating more shelf space for more up-to-date books.

We gratefully acknowledge all those generous people, too numerous to mention individually, who have donated books, paperbacks, records, and a new rug to the Library.

Total books and records added to the Library this year - 701.

Purchased: Juvenile - 31 non-fiction, 88 fiction. Adult - 132 non-fiction, 47 fiction.

Donated: 22 memorial books, 30 used records, 150 used paperbacks, 87 used books and 14 new books.

There were 76 new Library cards issued, making the total number of borrowers 376. A total of 7,177 books and 262 records were circulated in 1979.

Agreeable to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the moderator, Carlson D. Barrett at 2:00 P.M. Article 1 was then read by the moderator and after declaring the polls open for voting, the business meeting was adjourned until 7:30 P.M. The polls, as noted under Article 1, will remain open until 9:00 P.M.

At 7:30 P.M. the business meeting was called to order by the moderator. Mr. Barrett then reviewed his rules of procedure.

The warrant was then read.

Article 2: Motion was made and seconded. Moved to hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. A motion was then made and seconded. Motion passed.

Article 3: Motion was made and seconded. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, Grants-In-Aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. A motion was then made and seconded. Motion passed.

Article 4: Carol Austin made the motion which was seconded by Bob Mitchell - Moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$406,839 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Discussion followed. Bob Moore asked for an amendment, inserting \$399,804, the figure recommended by the budget committee. This amendment was seconded by Jim Ashworth. Discussion. Salaries were discussed, a physical education teacher and curriculum qualifications and expenses. Contracted services, i.e., items 235, 635 and 735 were also requested and answered. A vote on the amendment was then requested and taken. Prior to the vote the moderator advised a YES vote constituted approval of the budget committee figure and a NO vote defeat. Total votes cast: 91. 39 yes and 52 no votes with 1 blank ballot. Motion defeated. Article 4 was then read again by the moderator. Further discussion followed covering account 100; items 135 and 190 which were answered by

Carol Austin. Bob Moore then requested the question be moved. This was seconded and a ballot vote was requested. The moderator advised that a YES vote qualified for the school board approved budget of \$406,839. The outcome of the ballot vote was 54 yes and 37 no, motion passed with 91 ballots cast.

Article 5: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,975.00 for the purchase of and installation of storm windows, repair of present windows and repointing of the exterior of the Westmoreland Elementary School. Tal Hood then made a motion that this article be passed over as the item was already in Article 4, above. Motion passed.

Article 6: Motion was made and seconded. Moved to see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to appoint a seven-member Building Committee. Said committee shall study the design, construction and cost of an addition to the Westmoreland Elementary School. Said committee shall report its findings to a special school district meeting to be called by the Westmoreland School Board. Discussion. Rod Tatnall requested an amendment to the motion, adding to the motion that the committee bring in their report on or before June 30, Motion seconded and discussed. A vote was then taken on the amendment and the motion was rejected. Article 6 was then read by the moderator and further discussion followed. A motion was then made requesting they bring in their report with figures with and without a gym. The motion was seconded and passed.

Article 7: Len Meserve requested we pass over this article; motion seconded and passed.

Article 8: Motion made and seconded - Moved to transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. Ann Louise Ray, School Board Member, read the following motion which she wished to become a part of the minutes:

"Whereas, Carol H. Austin has served as School Board Member for the Town of Westmoreland, New Hampshire since March 6, 1975 and is now retiring; and Whereas she has always conducted her duties as Board Member diligently and in a manner truly reflecting her genuine interest in her position; Be It Hereby Resolved that this resolution be recorded as part of the minutes of this meeting as a permanent tribute to Mrs. Austin from the people of the Town of Westmoreland to express their sincere appreciation for her outstanding service to our community; Be It Further resolved that a copy of this resolution be presented to Mrs. Austin.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

The current trend in American education today is to ensure that the students receive an adequate background in the "basics".

The emphasis in the "Town" school districts this past year has been the development of curriculum guides. These guides will help insure that the students receive the basic skills in a sequential order, and also guarantee that all students will be exposed to the same skills in their elementary education.

The curriculum committee has been working for the past year to develop a language arts curriculum guide. This guide will be in the hands of the "Town" teachers by September of 1980 and is to be used as a student record system enabling the teachers and parents to know what skills each child has mastered.

In order to evaluate our educational system, all students in the "Towns" will be given a national achievement test in the spring of 1980. The results of these tests will be used as a guide for teacher curriculum development. Parents will be urged to contact their school and obtain a copy of their child's test report. These reports should be retained by the parents and compared with the test results of the achievement tests given early each spring.

It is the hope of the school board and staff that by developing curriculum guides, and monitoring the progress of the students through achievement tests, we will be able to improve the quality of education for our students.

We wish to thank the school board and teaching staff for their assistance in the above projects. Also, the administration of the Keene Junior High School and Keene High School for their assistance in the curriculum projects. They have given freely of their time and abilities to begin the process of upgrading the education of the students in our community.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 1979-1980 school year began on Tuesday, September 4, 1979 with an enrollment of 148 students. As of December, we have an enrollment of 153 students.

We have three new staff members: Linda Ehrlich, grades 5-7, social studies; Paulette Fowler, school lunch; Karen Sawicki, school nurse.

The alcohol safety project has started and is broken down into three phases. Phase I, which started in late October, consists of a series of workshops on alcohol/drug awareness education conducted by Dr. Richard DeSantis for the parents and staff. Phase II will consist of a series of workshops dealing with the implementation of the Washington State Curriculum of Alcohol/Drug Abuse Education. Phase III will be the use of the curriculum in the school for all grades. It is our plan to begin Phase III by March, 1980.

As is everyone, we are concerned with energy conservation. We have turned our thermostats down and have taken additional steps to save energy. Thanks to the efforts of Lenville Meserve and several volunteers, our school now has a Trombe-Michel solar heating wall in the south wall of the seventh grade classroom. In addition, we have added styrofoam insulation to the windows of other rooms on the south side of the building in an attempt to convert these windows into solar heating units, similar in principle to the Trombe wall. Also under consideration is the possibility of building a solar roof on the building and using the heat generated from this to help heat a major portion of the school. These measures, we feel, will result in a substantial energy savings.

The physical education program, as part of the Long Range Plan, has been fully implemented and is working very well. The students and staff are very enthusiastic about the program Mr. Haskins has developed and is using at our school.

In keeping with our desire to maintain open lines of communication with the parents of the children, we have instituted a monthly newsletter which briefly outlines what will be happening in our school for the coming month. We have many opportunities for parent and community involvement.

One of our new activities is a cheerleading squad for our boys and girls basketball teams. Lori Walsh, one

of our high school students, has volunteered to coach the girls in grades 5-8 and has been doing an outstanding job. In addition, with the guidance of Ann Bergeron, the girls held a bake sale to earn money for uniforms.

We have begun to use new report cards which were developed last year. Parent reception to them has been very favorable. The staff is also very pleased with them.

The need for additional space is still a real concern. Three people still share the very small office. Two teachers share the former library and speech therapy is given in the present library twice a week, thus limiting the availability of library time for the students. Space for speech therapy, student/teacher/parent conferences, administrative conferences and other services is needed. The Building Committee is continuing to study this problem.

I would like to thank all members of the community for their warm welcome and assistance which has made my first half-year as principal both pleasurable and exciting. In particular, I wish to thank the entire staff for their fine support and active involvement. As we enter a new decade, as well as the second half of the current school year, I look forward to the exciting experiences and warm associations of working in this fine community.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Several preventative health programs were held this year through the school. The two dental programs were quite successful with eager participation by the students. The program of dry-brushing and fluoride rinse sponsored by the State Department of Dental Health was again offered to students in grade 1-4 and about 50 youngsters participated. The second dental program performed by Susan Merritt, R.D.H. included a cleaning of the teeth and an application of topical fluoride. The P.T.A. again offered their asiistance and 88 children took advantage of this program.

The efforts of all the parents have resulted in a dramatic increase in the number of children immunized against measles, mumps, German measles, polio, tetanus, whopping cough, and diptheria. An immunization clinic in December resulted in 16 children being immunized against

measles.

Physical exams were performed by the school physician, Dr. Charles McMurphy, for all students participating in sports and for 4th and 8th graders. A total of 72 physicals were performed and two referrals were made for further follow-up. Each child who had a physical had his blood pressure checked and a urine test done. Heights and weights done on each student were plotted on growth charts to note their growth progress.

Vision and hearing screening exams were done on every student at Westmoreland. Five referrals for vision problems were made and one referral for hearing. A very successful preschool vision and hearing clinic was held in May, with the town of Chesterfield, and nineteen children from Westmoreland participated. Two direct referrals were made for hearing problems and one preschooler was referred for follow-up after a second hearing test. This again indicates the interest of the parents in taking advantage of preventative programs.

Approximately 100 children were given first aid treatment at various times throughout the school year. These included both accidents at school and injuries sustained at home. Several conferences were held this year

both with parents and with other personnel.

Tuberculosis tests were done on school staff members and 4th and 8th grade students. One student was re-

ferred for a positive reaction to the time test.

The school year was a busy, but enjoyable one and I shall miss the supportive staff and parents, but most especially, the wonderful students of Westmoreland school.
