State of New Hampshire TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Windsor on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1981, the Town Meeting to open at 6:30 P.M., Polls open to 8:30 P.M., to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of Auditors and Agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to elect one (1) Chief Constable, with Deputy or Deputies appointed as needed, per motion made and seconded at the Town Meeting on March 11, 1980.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 for highways and bridges.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid on its highways and raise and appropriate \$25.07 as the Town's share.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,300.00 for Police and Fire expenses, \$288.64 of this sum being Windsor's portion to operate the Central Emergency Communication Dispatch Center.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,700.00 for repairs and upkeep of the Town House.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$85.00 for Street Lighting.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the upkeep of the Town Cemeteries.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the

state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent.

- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to use all or any amount of surplus to alleviate the tax rate.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to donate to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to be paid to the Town of Hillsboro for the use of the public sanitary receiving station in Hillsboro, N. H.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize with-drawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated, and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amount if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon:

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the annual membership fee in the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and Planning Board expenses.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for legal expenses.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$80.00 to support the Fuller Library in Hillsboro.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for Town Mapping.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

DISTRICT CHIEF & FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

The meeting was called to order at 6:22 p.m. by Moderator Louis Werner.

The warrant was read by the Moderator.

Article 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot the following school district officials

- A. Moderator for the ensuing year
- B. Clerk for the ensuing year.
- C. Treasurer for the ensuing year
- D. School Board Member for a 3 year term School Board Member for a 1 year term
- E. Auditor for the ensuing year.

The checklist was prepared by Bob Atkins, Chairperson of Supervisors, and used.

There were 53 names on the checklist, and 33 votes cast. Results are as follows:

Member of the School Board for 3 years Billie Jean McGuire 27 votes

Article 2. To determine & appoint the salaries of the school board & truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district. Eric Wilton moved, and Joe Sweeney seconded, to raise salaries by 100% to \$10.00. Thus \$70 was added to the budget. All were in favor.

Article 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Linda McNamee reported on the School District Audit. There were no votes relating thereto.

Article 4. To choose agents, and/or committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Bill McNamee moved, and Joe Sweeney seconded, to pass over this article. All were in favor.

Article 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept on behalf of the district, any and all grants or other funds for educational

purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the US government or from the State of New Hampshire for the school year 1980-81. Eric Wilton moved and Joan Cuddy seconded that this article be accepted as read. All were most definitely in favor.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. A motion was made by Ronnie Houghton and seconded by Joe Sweeney, that this article be amended to add the new increases approved in article 2. John Cuddy moved, and Rita Johnson seconded to accept the amended article. All were in favor.

Article 7. To see if the district will vote to change the title of the office of Financial Coordinator for the school administrative unit #24 to Business Administrator, School Administrative Unit #24. Further, to ratify the appointment of David Hill as Business Administrator with the authority to perform the functions of the office in accordance with the laws of New Hampshire, or take any other action in relation thereto. Stan Nelson moved, and Joe Sweeney seconded, to accept this article as read. All were in favor.

Article 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Mrs. Woodrow asked how many Windsor Students there are. Mr. Minichiello reported that there are 10. Rita Johnson moved and Joan Cuddy seconded a motion to ask the Town Clerk compile a list of students' names and grades for the School Warrant. All were in favor. Mrs. Woodrow moved, and Mildred Houghton seconded, to adjourn the meeting. All were most definitely in favor. The meeting was adjourned at 6:55 p.m.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

To the Citizens of the Windsor School District.

Since the students from Windsor attend the Hillsboro-Deering Schools, under the AREA Agreement, I am taking the liberty of presenting my report to the citizens of Hillsboro-Deering in this space. I believe this report will be of interest to the citizens of Windsor.

Way back in 1647 when public education was born in this nation, schools were basically asked to teach the traditional three R's; Readin', 'Ritin' and 'Rithmetic. Wilson Riles, State Superintendent of Schools in California, put it well when he said that today schools are being asked to do what people used to ask God to do. When I look at the myriad of tasks we have, I don't think he's far from wrong.

Exactly what is public education being asked to accomplish? Whether through state or federal laws or through local directive, today's schools are being asked to feed students breakfast, lunch and a snack; check student's vision, hearing and teeth; show students how to brush their teeth; teach young people good nutrition; provide special services for the gifted and the handicapped; provide recreation; teach students to respect others and to respect themselves; show young people how to ride their bikes safely and how to drive cars; and convince young people not to use drugs.

All of these are great challenges, but where does it stop? Education has accepted them because they must be done. A hungry child can't learn. A disrespectful, disruptive child can't learn. In the past the family or other agencies handled these responsibilities. But today they fall upon our public schools. Even with these additional, time-consuming tasks, local public education is achieving many successes. The following is a sampling.

- * Discipline has improved Firm but fair administration of discipline by teachers and Principals has been responded to by over 90 percent of our student body who cause no significant disciplinary problems.
 - * 41% of last year's Seniors went on to further education.
- * Participation by our students in the Concord Area Vocational School is expanding thereby providing expanded program opportunities for our Juniors and Seniors that could not be available locally without excessive cost. Twenty-four (24) Juniors are currently attending Concord Area Vocational Programs and we anticipate 50 Juniors and Seniors attending in 1981-82.

- * Quality services, as required by law, are being provided for 67 handicapped students.
- * A Unit-wide Community Education Program has been re-activated under the able direction of Jolene Schillinger and is functioning on a financially self-sufficient basis.
- * Accountability Programs and programs for Gifted and Talented students are being developed.
- * The First Annual School Board's Awards Program provided recognition to the following teachers for their teaching excellence in 1979-1980: Heleen Kurk, Villa Ramsay, Constance Douglas, Marcia Barford, Nina Van Lund, Roberta Wheldon, Geraldine Phelps, Glenn Page, Barbara Murphy and Chuck Gaides.
- * Five of our elementary students were State Young Authors Contest Winners.
- * Four of our elementary students were winners in the "MESSENGER" writing and art contest.
- * Mrs. Heleen Kurk's third grade class won an award from the U.S. Environmental Agency's Poem and Poster Contest.
- * A reading/writing Grant was obtained that permitted expanded local elementary programs without local district expense.
- * The results of the Metropolitan Reading Tests in the Elementary School indicated that our students are performing at a good level.
- * Charles Gaides, High School Science Teacher received an N.E. Award as Teacher of the Year in Earth Science.
- * Computer education programs were provided for the first time and are being well received by students.
- * Standardized test results in the Middle School are at the 60.2 percentile nationally.
- * Marion MacWilliams, Librarian, has developed a library education program for 8th graders that results in students taking the "National Library Exam".
- * A fully developed and widely supported athletic and activities program has been implemented in Grades 6-8.
- * Roberta Wheldon's successful work with students in compiling excellent records in Math League competition.
- * Stacy Gauthier and her staff of the "Bailey Bugle" received a 2nd place award in the prestigious Columbia University Scholastic Press Association Competition.
- * A \$19,000 grant has been received from the State Department of Energy due to the efforts of Head Custodian Mike Jones and a wide variety of energy savings programs have been implemented.

These and many other positive developments have been achieved through the hard work and commitment of the whole school community. While more remains to be accomplished, I am sure your continued support and cooperation will result in continued advances.
