TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of Bedford, in the County of Hillsborough
in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article I. To bring forward your ballots for the necessary town officers for the ensuing year and for the ensuing three years.

Art. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

Art. III. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor, for Memorial Day, Highways and Bridges, and for any other necessary expenses to the town.

Art. IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$10,000 if needed.

Art. V. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early payment of taxes, and if so, fix the time and rate.

Art. VI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary to maintain street lights for the ensuing year.

Art. VII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to pay up on notes.

Art. VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the Town Library.

Art. IX. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate, acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Art. X. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15 for the care of the clock on the church.

Art. XI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the care of the New Cemetery.

Art. XII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15 for the care of Joppa Cemetery, \$10 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road, and \$7 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Beals road.

Art. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2200 for the making of a Town map showing each parcel of real estate in the Town.

Art. XIV. To see if the Town will vote to charge a license fee to non-resident milk dealers.

Art. XV. To see if the Town will vote to buy a tractor and snow plow, or other snow equipment, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Art. XVI. To see if the Town will vote to buy 5,000 feet of snow fence and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Art. XVII. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$50 in trust from Nelson Fosher, the interest to be expended for the care of his lot in the New Cemetery.

Art. XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$856.65 for Class 5 road maintenance, the State to give \$3,426.62—or—

To raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,394.00 for State Aid Construction, the State to give \$2,394.00.

Art. XIX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35 for rent of a hydrant on Woodland Ave., 500 feet north of Donald Street.

Art. XX. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

Art. XXI. To see what action the town will take regarding the adoption of an ordinance regulating the construction of buildings.

Art. XXII. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town Clerk read the minutes of the meeting immediately after the meeting.

Art. XXIII. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, and of all other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

ANNUAL MEETING, 1934

The annual meeting of the Bedford School District was held at the Town hall on Thursday, March 8, 1934, at 2 P. M. The following officers were re-elected for the ensuing year:

Moderator—William Melendy.

Clerk of School District—Frank E. Manning.

Treasurer—Henry Blood.

Mrs. George T. Wiggin was elected a member of the School Board for three years.

The Town Auditors were elected School Auditors for the ensuing year.

It was voted to adopt the budget of \$18,929.00 recommended by the School Board. The District voted an extra \$300 to be used for High School tuition.

It was voted to raise and appropriate a deficiency sum of \$800.00 for High School tuition for 1933-34.

It was voted to raise and appropriate \$225.00 to paint the Peter P. Woodbury school building, this amount to pay for materials, and the CWA to furnish labor.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

A meeting of the School Board was held after the district meeting. The Board organized for the year 1934-35, with Mr. George H. Robertson as chairman and Mrs. George T. Wiggin as clerk.

A meeting of the supervisory union was held at the Webster School in Hudson on Thursday evening, May 17. Mr. Fred W. Hall was re-elected superintendent of schools.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Following is my second annual report as superintendent of schools.

In September, 1934, there were two changes in the teaching force in the Stevens Buswell school in Bedford Center. Miss Dorothy Goodale of Manchester, who had previously taught in Auburn, and Miss Charlotte Powers, who had previously taught in Hampstead, were employed to take the places left vacant by the resignations of Miss Beulah Perkins and Miss Anne Nichols.

The enrollment in the various schools in the town has been about the same as during the previous year, there being only a slight decrease in the lower grades at Donald Street and Peter Woodbury schools.

Through the use of achievement and intelligence tests, a special effort is being made to check the individual and group deficiencies in the several grades and to overcome the difficulties responsible for these deficiencies.

The three Parent-Teacher Associations in town are taking an active interest in the welfare of the young people of Bedford. They are attempting to understand the various school

problems and individually and collectively working with the School Board and Superintendent in furthering the opportunities and advantages of the boys and girls of Bedford. The teachers are working very hard and effectively to provide the maximum amount of training for each boy and girl, and in order for this training to be most effective, they must continue to receive the sincere co-operation of every parent.

Parents and all other interested citizens are urged to make more frequent visits to the schools when in session and observe for themselves the effective work that is being done.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent, the School Board, and Citizens of Bedford:

I present my report as School Nurse from February 1, 1934 to February 1, 1935.

Two clinics have been held; a toxoid clinic held in May, and a dental clinic in June.

A dental hygienist examined and cleaned the pre-school children's teeth at the Peter Woodbury School in February. Some of the school children were done at this time. The cleaning was continued by the children under my supervision with the material used by the hygienist.

The correction of physical defects in homes where the family income cannot be stretched to include extra attention to children who have defective teeth, tonsils, eyes, etc., has always been a source of concern to our school physicians and school nurses. The Child Health Recovery Program, made possible on July 1 through an allotment of federal funds to the New Hampshire Relief Administration, has made possible the treatment of these needy children suffering from these defects.

Milk and cod liver oil were also provided through the State Relief Administration.

It might be of interest to know that through this Relief and other sources 71 defective vision cases have been corrected, 49 defective tonsils have been removed, and 458 children have received complete dental care through the seven dental clinics which have been held since June, 1934, in this Union alone, consisting of Goffstown Village, Goffstown Town School District, New Boston, Weare, and Dunbarton.
