



Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

The Commissioner herewith submit their annual report, together with those of other county officials, for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1907, to which is added a copy of the proceedings of various meetings of the County Convention. Attention is called to these reports for detailed information regarding the work done in different departments of the county's business.

The county buildings and other property are in good condition at the present time and we know of no changes or improvements calling for a large expenditure of money that will be necessary in the near future.

The almshouse and house of correction have continued under the management of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Weymouth as superintendent and matron. Their long experience and natural fitness for these positions have made their services of special value to the county and we are glad to report that they will remain the coming year.

There has been a gradual decrease in the expenses of the county in certain directions within the past few years. The number of inmates in the almshouse and house of correction has fallen off somewhat, and while as a general rule, the smaller the number of inmates the higher the average cost of maintenance, within certain limits, as more than one-half of the expense of an institution of this kind is a fixed charge and does not depend on the number of inmates, yet the average cost per week for board at the farm the past year has been only \$2.05 or slightly less than the previous year. This is partly due to the fact that the

amount of orders drawn on the farm account has been smaller, and partly to a gain in the sum received for board of persons who otherwise would be a charge on the county.

There has also been a falling off in the number of persons aided and the sum paid for external poor, or poor off the farm. As will be seen by reference to the financial part of the report the total amount thus expended has been \$7,064.67, while there has been collected from other counties and towns chargeable with the support of persons aided in this county the sum of \$797.10, leaving as the actual cost to this county for aid rendered this class of dependents the sum of \$6,267.57.

It may be stated in this connection that all cases requiring assistance are personally investigated either by the overseers of the poor or the commissioners, and oftentimes by both, and such method of relief pursued as seems best suited for all concerned. While exercising due care as regards a class which is sometimes disposed to abuse public charity, relief is always cheerfully given to the deserving poor.

The plan of increasing the sinking fund for the redemption of the outstanding bonded debt has been continued. A beginning has been made of calling in such county bonds as are available. In response to notices in the local press, \$5,000.00 of the court house issue due in 1913, has been secured and added temporarily to the sinking fund account. These bonds, with a \$1,000 City of Boston bond, make \$6,025.57 added to the fund the past year. The sinking fund thus started in December, 1905, now amounts with accrued interest to \$18,639.91.

The commissioners thank all county, city and town officials and others for their assistance and co-operation in the discharge of the duties pertaining to their office.

We herewith submit our twenty-first semi-annual report of the auditing of the several accounts of the county officers for the six months ending June 30, 1907, as required by law.

We have examined the bills rendered by the county commissioners for their services and expenses from Jan. 1, 1907 to June 30, 1907, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county, and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable.

We also examined the treasurer's account and find it correct, with proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have compared the orders drawn by the treasurer with the record of orders drawn by the county commissioners and find that they agree, and that the treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

The treasurer had on hand Jan. 1, 1907, \$17,016.32. He has received from all sources, \$1,513.08, making a total of \$18,529.40. He has paid out on orders drawn by the county commissioners, \$11,450.61; coupons on bonds, \$1,030.00; on orders drawn by the court, \$2,574.85, leaving a balance in his hands of \$3,463.94.

We have also examined the account of the superintendent of the county farm, and find that he has received since Jan. 1, 1907, for board of inmates, and all other sources \$645.08; he has paid the treasurer, \$400.00, and has on hand, \$245.08.
