TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the 2nd of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same. The Town must raise \$300.64 and the State will contribute \$2,004.29.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate purchased by the Town for non-payment of taxes.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts to the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or individuals, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer any balance in either the Fire Department appropriation or the Police Department appropriation to a Capital Reserve Fund to be used towards replacement of equipment in the future.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to finance the acquisition of a new fire truck or to take any other action related thereto. (Proposed by Fire Department -Budget Committee - Selectmen.)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to support the Antrim-Bennington Rescue Squad, or take any other action thereon. (Antrim-Bennington Rescue Squad.)

Article 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$335.00 for the support of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service in Keene. (Proposed by Selectmen – Budget Committee.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$905.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses Association, Inc. (Proposed by Selectmen – Budget Committee.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reduction in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced, or take any other action hereon:

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, negotiate for, contract for, accept and to do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State or other assistance (financial or otherwise) as may be available relative to disasters (natural or otherwise), or take any other action relating thereto. (Proposed by Selectmen.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the continuation of a Capital Reserve Fund to finance the acquisition of a tax map or take any other action relating thereto. (Proposed by

the Budget Committee - Selectmen.)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and save harmless all employees of the Town, Selectmen, and all officers and members of boards and committees of the Town, from personal financial loss and expense, including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property, if the person to be indemnified at the time of the accident resulting in the injury, damage or destruction was acting within the scope of his employment or office. (Suggested by Town Counsel.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 in order to drain the swamp area in the section of land containing the old town dump by constructing a drainage ditch direct to the river or to take any other

action thereto. (Proposed by Selectmen – Budget Committee.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 in order to provide suitable quarters for the Police Department. (Proposed by Police Department.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to repair the bridge on the South Bennington Road as recommended by the State Highway Department. (Proposed by Selectmen - Budget Committee.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will designate that the so-called Firemen's Hall is now to be used for recreational purposes by the Bennington Recreational

Association.

Article 20. To see what action the Town will take regarding proposed revised Fire Department bylaws as submitted by the committee appointed by the Moderator. (Bylaws Committee.)

Article 21. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to repair and transfer the electrical service for the Town fire siren. (Proposed by Fire Department - Selectmen - Budget Committee.)

Article 22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purchase and installation of a 6 inch valve and hydrant on the Francestown Road line, the purchase of a spare hydrant, and the installation of a 10 inch valve (presently owned by the Town) in the center of town. (Proposed by Water Department - Selectmen - Budget Committee.)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to commence and prosecute legal action against the Board of Commissioners of Hillsborough County to the extent necessary to obtain and order pursuant to the provisions of RSA 247:11 et seq. requiring the repair or replacement of the bridge crossing the Contoocook River between Antrim and North Bennington, known as the Iron Bridge, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. RSA 33:7-b et seq., as amended, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 25. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the celebration of the Bicentennial Year, (Proposed by Bicentennial Committee.)

Article 26. To see if the Town will adopt the revised schedule of town officers' salaries as recommended by the Budget Committee; also to see if the Town will adopt the revised hourly rate schedule for the Road Agent and highway crew. (See detailed recommendation printed elsewhere in the Town Report.) (Proposed by Budget Committee.)

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to require the establishment of a minimum \$100.00 trust fund with each purchase of a cemetery lot subsequent to this date. (Proposed by Selectmen – Budget Committee.)

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purpose of preparing a facilities plan on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$10,000.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Bennington, N.H., and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 29. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Statutory requirements and to carry the articles and appropriations of the

School District into effect.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

North Bennington Iron Bridge

The problems related to the so-called Iron Bridge which was closed many months ago were of major importance to the town and occupied a substantial amount of the time and efforts of the Board of Selectmen.

A brief review of the status of this problem since the last Town Meeting might well be helpful. At the last March Town Meeting the town approved the appointment of a committee including the Selectmen who would make a study and report back to an Adjourned Town Meeting scheduled for May 6, 1975. At that meeting the committee presented an extensive written report and upon their recommendation the town voted to appropriate and authorize the borrowing of some \$54,560 as the town's portion of the cost of a State Aid replacement bridge. Immediately following this meeting, a certification of the town's action was forwarded to the County Commissioners and to the State Highway Department and an application for the required State Aid was filed with the State. On June 2nd, Town Counsel followed up with the County Commissioners asking that they take the necessary action. Shortly after the County Commissioners requested a meeting with the Selectmen of both Bennington and Antrim together with their Town Counsels and that meeting was held in Manchester on June 16, 1975. The County Commissioners apparently hoped that the Town of Antrim would agree to proceed with the bridge without their having to take any action, but the Antrim Selectmen, quite properly in view of their town's action at Town Meeting, declined to do so. The County Attorney agreed at that meeting that it was the County Commissioners' responsibility to make a decision and to take whatever action they determined proper and necessary related to this bridge. However, it was becoming increasingly clear that they were reluctant to do so because it was inevitable that any decision they made would create unhappiness and perhaps political repercussions.

Finally, in August we discovered that they had decided to take no action and the Selectmen then realized that they "had been had." Heretofore, in both informal and formal meetings, the County Commissioners had agreed that it was their responsibility to rule and because the Selectmen were anxious to maintain continuing good relations with Antrim, they had stated more than once that they had no intention of going to the law related to this matter.

The Selectmen issued a lengthy news release in late August so that the residents of North Bennington would be aware of the fact that the County Commissioners had failed in their responsibility and the Selectmen did not feel that they could go to court requesting that the County Commissioners be required to rule in view of their commitments to Antrim.

The Selectmen have included in the Town Warrant an article seeking the decision of the town as to whether they should proceed to take legal action in order that the County Commissioners meet their legal responsibilities.

In the meantime, we have explored all possibilities for additional aid. In the fall, a new Federal Aid program for rural communities was announced and we

immediately contacted the State authorities and have followed this matter closely with them. We have just been notified that subject to the usual qualifications as to the continuance of the Federal Program, etc., it has been indicated that if the two towns proceed, \$70,000 of Federal Aid would be applied to the project to assist the financing. While Mr. Avery can make no absolute assurances, he has told the Selectmen that he thinks it very probable that this Federal Aid can be assigned to this project if the Federal program is still in effect. Immediately following this report we have included a letter from Floyd Avery showing the possible reduction in cost if this Federal Aid can be applied.

Accelerated TRA Program

The Accelerated TRA Project was completed and the road from the Antrim town line to the Joint Landfill Area was widened and resurfaced. The bank debt to accomplish this project will be paid off over the next four years by the State's annual TRA subsidy payment.

Joint Landfill Facility

As approved by prior Town Meeting, Francestown joined the Joint Landfill and is now sharing in the cost.

Fire Department

The new building that was built by the volunteer efforts of the Fire Department was completed and dedicated in June. The town shares with the Board our pride in this splendid project. A picture of the new fire station is on the cover of this report. As provided by the last Town Meeting, we have begun the accumulation of a capital reserve fund to acquire a new fire truck.

Police Department

The Police Department continues to broaden its training and coverage and through a Federal Aid program, walkie-talkie radios were acquired at a minimum cost.

Flood Insurance

The town has qualified under the Federal Flood Insurance Program and we now are awaiting a promised Federal survey to correct the original description of the flood plain area.

Federal Municipal Employment Program

The town was able to qualify two men under two different Federal Municipal Employment programs. One of these programs added a man to the Highway Department; the second program added a town maintenance man who would do maintenance and repair work on all town properties. One of the programs was paid directly by the Federal Government and the second one is reimbursed by the Federal Government. In both cases there is no additional cost to the town. The programs are for a limited number of months, although we were successful

in transferring the Highway Department man to a new program when the old one ran out.

Antrim-Bennington Rescue Squad

The new Rescue Squad is progressing excellently and has received the support of the Bennington Fire Department and the Bennington Selectmen. A Warrant item requesting support by the town is included this year.

Town Hall Lighting

The Town Hall lighting project authorized at the last Town Meeting was partially completed. It was found necessary to do a substantial amount of rewiring and installation of new junction box and, therefore, the total project as originally conceived could not be completed and the Board will review with the town as to whether it will be necessary to go further at this time.

Tax Rate

We were fortunate that we were able to maintain a level tax rate for the year but it should be pointed out that it did involve the application of some prior surplus. The increasing costs of the schools particularly will probably mean that the tax rate will have to increase in 1976. The town is in excellent financial condition.

Dear Mr. LeCein:

From time to time we have discussed construction of a new bridge over the Contoocook River on the North Bennington Road. This letter will attempt to update costs, town shares, and the prospect of Federal Aid Off-System Pund assistance.

The federal program is in its second year with no assurance of its continuation. An annual total of \$724,000 has been allotted to New Hampshire for 1975 and 1976 with a requirement that the funds be distributed on a "fair and equitable heasi in the counties throughout the state". This figure is to be \$70,000 for each of the ten counties in the state. I can promise that you will be considered in the new program but cannot guarantee that \$70,000 will be evailable or that the project will be eligible.

Using the same \$310,000 as the total cost, including a temporary bridge, I will develop the project with end without federal aid.

The Town Bridge Aid Law provides that the two towns share the local cost in proportion to the equalized valuations. The most recent figures result in this ratio of cost.

BENNINGTON WATER POLLUTION TREATMENT PROJECT JOINT REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN AND THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board and the Selectmen have been studying options available to the Town with respect to its obligation to abate pollution of the Contoocook River within the central area of the Town.

In 196 (?) the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission issued an order requiring the Town to abate pollution in the Contoocook River. Since that time, for various reasons, the Town has received each year a one year extension waiving the requirement to comply with the order. State authorities have advised that further extensions of this pollution abatement order will be more difficult to obtain.

Fortunately, both our own studies and survey of the possibilities and the available technology quire recently approved by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency as qualifying for federal aid encourage us to recommend to the voters that the required action be initiated at this time. Therefore, we have included in this year's Town Warrant an article requesting an appropriation of \$10,000, to be raised by borrowing, for a revised engineering study keyed to a more modest and more economical approach to the pollution problem than was contemplated when the Town was considering a larger sewage treatment system involving the participation by Monadnock Paper Mills, Inc. and the Town of Antrim.

The proposed revised engineering study is absolutely required by both State and Federal authorities if the project is to qualify for State and Federal aid. We have jointly decided to engage the services of a new engineering firm which has specialized in the design of treatment facilities for small towns comparable to Bennington.

We therefore strongly recommend the adoption of this article, as well as a second related article to be included in the Warrant authorizing the Selectmen to apply for Federal and State aid and to authorize borrowing in anticipation of such aid. The form of these articles has been prescribed and recommended by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT - 1975

The New Hampshire Legislature, several years back, passed into law a future requirement that all full time law enforcement officers would be required to have state certification. A "grandfather clause" was included in the Act to exempt officers then employed on a full time basis. A Police Standards and Training Council was created by the Act with responsibility for -1) setting up the necessary standards for police training and certification, 2) provide for facilities to conduct the training, and 3) to be the administrator for the ongoing program.

The most recent session of the New Hampshire Legislature was asked to expand this Act to include part time law enforcement officers. The Police Standards and Training Council opposed passage at that time and recommended postponement until a future time. The Legislature saw fit to abide by this recommendation, but most indications are for the eventual passage of the

expanded version of the Act perhaps at the next Legislature session.

The Bennington Board of Selectmen, aware of the future ramifications this will present to the small town, have actively encouraged members of the Bennington Police Department to participate in worth-while training programs. The Board has been willing in the past, and indicate the same policy for the future, to reimburse individuals for expenses incurred in traveling as well as the cost of tuition upon successful completion of such training. Wages are not generally paid to officers for attending training sessions since most officers of the department are willing to donate such time on a gratis basis.

In the year just completed members of the police department were involved in

the following training:

A. One member of the department attended and graduated from a full time week long Prosecutor School held at the N.H. Technical Institute in Concord, N.H. sponsored by the Police Standards and Training Council.

B. Three members attended, and were certified by the N.H. Heart Association, an evening training program at the Monadnock Community Hospital in Peterborough, N.H. in the cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) emergency procedure for basic life support.

C. One member has been attending twice-a-week classes at Saint Anselm's College in Manchester, N.H. in such subjects as Criminal Law, Criminal

Investigation, and The Laws of Arrest, Search, and Seizure.

D. All members attend, as often as possible, in-service type training produced locally.

Effective during 1975 a policy was adopted that in the future individuals seeking employment as a police officer, with no or insufficient experience, would have to serve initially as a trainee. No permanent warrant would be issued until certain minimum qualifications were met. These include the requirement that the trainee must spend forty hours on patrol with a full time police officer or myself — twelve of these hours must be spent with the State Police. The trainee must also spend ten hours of classroom type training. All of this is done without compensation to the individual. Arthur Bissell was the first member of the police

department to be required to meet this training. He successfully fulfilled these requirements and was appointed a police officer.

During 1976 we expect to continue to stress the importance of training to all local police officers. Early in the spring a part time police officer certification school is conducted at the Technical Institute in Concord. We will try to have every member complete this during 1976. We are prepared to also participate with other surrounding towns in regional training to whatever extent this can be arranged.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT 1975

There were relatively few sub-divisions in town during 1975. The only major sub-division was along North Bennington Road where a parcel was broken into approximately ten five-acre lots. There were five other minor sub-divisions, including only exchange of land or the sale of individual lots in other areas of the town.

Several other landowners had their property surveyed this year. Such plans required the Planning Board stamp of approval before filing. These surveys will be very helpful when the town tax map is prepared.

The sub-division regulations were modified as required by the Federal Flood Control program, making it necessary for the Planning Board to consider

possible flood damage in any proposed sub-division.

The major concern of the Planning Board has been the investigation of alternative solutions to river pollution by sewage from town residents. Sub-surface water treatment remains a possibility as an alternative to pumping sewage to the proposed Antrim sewage-treatment plant. Two sites are being considered and a soil survey on one shows promise.

Federal money is available to help with sewage treatment facilities but either of the above alternatives requires a sewage collection system for which no federal money is available at this time. Quick estimates of the cost of a collection system range from \$250,000 to \$750,000. We can see no other feasible alternatives at this time and time may be running out rapidly as river clean-up priorities reach the smaller towns.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

Among the many projects that were done this spring, such as graveling the North Bennington Rd. and the Old Greenfield Rd., there were many smaller necessary projects like patching roads, cutting brush and cleaning ditches. A few new culverts were installed in various areas throughout the town and many more old culverts were dug out and cleaned.

The two main projects, which were rebuilding the Gillis Hill Rd. and the TRA project from the Antrim-Bennington Bridge in North Bennington to where it ended in 1972, were both completed during the summer. The North Bennington Rd. is now paved from the bridge to just beyond the Sanitary Land Fill. Gillis Hill Rd. is passable all the way to the Francestown town line.

A few roads were tarred this summer and fall, but with the high cost of oil this was kept to a minimum, only tarring the areas that were really in need of it.

On behalf of the Highway Department, I want to thank the people of Bennington for their support and understanding.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden.

Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

1976 PROPOSED REVISED FIRE DEPARTMENT BY-LAWS

Statement of Purpose: Be it ordained by the Selectmen of the town of Bennington that a department to be known as the Bennington Fire Department, the object of which shall be the prevention of fire and the protection of life and property in the town of Bennington, is hereby created as follows:

Section 1 Officers

- No. 1- The Department shall consist of a Chief, First Deputy Chief, Second Deputy Chief, who are elected yearly by the people at town meeting and, 27 men.
- No. 2- The Chief shall be held accountable to the Selectmen only and make written and verbal reports thereto as the Selectmen require. All other Department and Company officers shall be accountable to the Chief only.
- No. 3- The Chief shall be responsible for the general condition and efficient operation of the Department, the training of the members and the performance of all other duties imposed on them.
- No. 4- The Chief shall see that each fire is carefully investigated to determine its cause, and in the case of suspicion of incendiarism, shall secure and preserve all possible evidence for future use in the case.
- No. 5- In the absence of the Chief the next ranking officer shall be in command until he is relieved at the scene by a superior officer.
- No. 6- Only members of the fire department are eligible to run for the position of Chief, First Deputy Chief, and Second Deputy Chief.

Section 2 Membership

- No. 1- The membership of the company shall consist of such persons as accepted by the members of the company. All members must be residents of the town of Bennington and be at least 18 years of age.
- No. 2- Any member of the department may be suspended or discharged from the department upon the recommendation of the Chief and by a vote of the members.

Section 3 Equipment

- No. 1- The department shall be equipped with such apparatus and other equipment as may be required from time to time to maintain its efficiency and properly protect life and property from fire.
- No. 2- Recommendations of apparatus and equipment needed shall be made by the Chief and, after approval by the Selectmen, shall be purchased in such manner as may be designated by the Selectmen.
- No. 3- No persons shall use any fire apparatus or equipment for any private purpose nor shall any person willfully and without proper authority take away or conceal any article used in any way by the department.
 - No. 4- No person shall enter where fire apparatus is housed or handle any

apparatus or equipment belonging to the department unless accompanied by or having special permission of an officer or authorized member of the department.

No. 5- No apparatus shall be hired out or permitted to leave the town except in response to a call for aid at a fire in a neighboring community without the consent of the Chief. The officer in charge of the department shall have power to assign equipment for response to calls for outside aid and in other cases, only when the absence of such equipment will not jeopardize protection in the town of Bennington.

Section 4 Company Officers

- No. 1- The company shall elect by written ballot a Captain, First Lieutenant, Second Lieutenant, and a Secretary-Treasurer at their April meeting. Their term of office shall be for one year.
- No. 2- The duties of the Captain are to conduct all meetings of the department and to see that orders of his superior officers are carried out.
- No. 3- The duties of the Secretary-Treasurer are to make records of all meetings, to make out pay sheets and pay the men, for all fires and meetings and to conduct any secretarial work that is necessary.

Section 5 General

- No. 1- Fire alarm signals shall be such as prescribed by the Chief and it shall be his duty to test or have tested at a regularly designated time each week the fire alarm system to see that it is working properly.
 - No. 2- The wages to be paid the firemen shall be governed by the town.
