To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on Tuesday the 6th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To vote and bring in ballots for election of Town Officers to be elected by ballot for the Town of Columbia for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a five-man Town Planning Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36 Sec. 2-18 of N. H. Revised Statutes, Annotated. This Planning Board would assume the duties of the Zoning Commission which would then no longer exist.
- Article 5. In the event Article No. 4 is passed; To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to regulate subdivision of land in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36, Sec. 19-29 of N. H. Revised Statutes, Annotated.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to pay the five member Planning Board a salary of \$75.00 per year each.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will accept and include in the budget the monies received from the State Gas Tax.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operating expenses of Ambulance District A-1. \$1.25 per capita is requested if needed. \$583.70.
- Article 9. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Department and the Stratford Fire Department for the purpose of extinguishing fires in said Town, and in the event of favorable action to make necessary appropriation for the same.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$545.77, the State to contribute the sum of \$3638.45.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further, to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon;

If Article No. 11 is accepted, pass over Articles 12, 13, 14, 15 and 20.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to contribute to the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services, and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$441.00.

Article 13. To see if the Town will raise \$350.00 for use of dumps.

Article 14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of cemeteries.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$238.01 for the purpose of uniting with the 45 other Towns in the White Mountains Region Association in publications and otherwise promoting the natural and commercial factors upon which the economy of the North Country is based.

Article 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.

Article 17. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Old Age, Blind and Disability Assistance for the year ensuing.

Article 18. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of summer roads and bridges.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to take such action regarding plowing or otherwise keeping winter roads open in said Town for the year ensuing, as in their judgment seems conducive to the best interest of the Town, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise toward Reappraisal of the Town property.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticition of the taxes for the ensuing year, and to pay such debts out of tax money when the same is received.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply any surplus remaining in their hands at the end of the fiscal year 1972 to the defraying of Town Charges for the fiscal year 1973 in order to effect a proportionate reduction of the amount to be raised by taxes.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents, auditors, selectmen, and all other officers, and ratify and confirm the same.

Article 25. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative Statetown program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. unless it is raining, except for commer-

cial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devasting force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

- 1. To bring in your ballots for the election of the School District Officers to be elected by ballot for the School District of Columbia for the ensuing year(s).
- 2. To bring in your ballots on the following: "Shall the School District accept the provisions of RSA 195-A (as amended) providing for the establishment of an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area plan (tuition contract) with the School District of Colebrook to serve grades 1 12 from the School District of Columbia in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the district clerk?"
- To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the District will vote to support the Early Childhood program and raise money for the same.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States.
- 7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### Superintendent's Report

The announcement by the Sisters of Our Lady of Grace of the closing of their elementary school this coming June is received with disappointment and regret. For many years the school has provided a distinct need and has assisted in the overall education program for youngsters in the local and surrounding school districts. A sincere thank you and grateful appreciation is extended to the Sisters and faculty of Our Lady of Grace.

The closing of the school will mean that approximately 60 or more youngsters in grades 1 - 8 will have to be absorbed in the local public schools this coming September. This will not be accomplished without overloading and crowding the present limited facilities. Plans of the School Board and building planning committee, however, do call for resolving the situation in the near future.

This year, the voters in the towns of Columbia and Colebrook are being asked to vote on an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) plan to serve the two towns. The plan is a five year tuition contract plan whereby the Town of Colebrook agrees to accept tuition pupils from the Town of Columbia and Columbia in turn agrees to send its pupils to Colebrook.

There are advantages and disadvantages for both towns but it is the recommendation of both school boards and both AREA planning committees that the following advantages far outweigh the disadvantages:

- Acceptance of the plan would make possible a sounder basis for future planning either in educational or building programs in that Colebrook School District would be assured of an added source of revenue (tuition) for a five year span.
- State Building Aid for expansion, purchase or construction of buildings under this plan would be increased from 30% to 40% for the Colebrook School District and would remain at 40% until such indebtedness is paid in full.
- State Incentive Aid based on \$45 per elementary pupil and \$75 per high school pupil would be received by the Colebrook School District for such tuition pupils received from Columbia.
- 4. The Columbia School District would be assured of an educational facility for five years to which it can send its pupils and at a tuition rate established by an agreed upon formula.
- Joint school board meetings would be held at least twice a year during which time problems, recommendations and proposals would be discussed.

The disadvantage is that both school districts are committed to a contract for five years. This normally leads to the question "What happens if there should be a substantial pupil population increase during the five year term in either or both towns that may warrant a town to maintain its own schools and not send or receive any tuition pupils?" Should such an event occur, and the possibility has been considered by both boards and planning committees, it is anticipated that such an increase would not take place overnight and the proposed AREA plan does allow for revision or termination of the plan every five years. Should a sudden and rapid pupil population increase occur, however, emergency alterna-

tives such as a split morning and noon school session would have to be employed for a limited time until the situation is resolved.

The proposed plan presents what is now traditionally taking place between the two school districts and it is sincerely recommended that it be adopted by the voters in both communities.

### GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

Guidance is a continuous developmental process which ideally should enable each student to understand himself better, to make sound decisions, to develop healthy attitudes and to achieve an awareness of his responsibility to himself and to others. Listed below are some of the activities directed toward these ends which have been initiated during the past year.

- 1. Each student's Cumulative Record Folder is being updated.
- 2. A profile Sheet has been developed for each student in Grades 9 11 inclusive. This sheet contains information gathered concerning the student's ability, aptitudes, achievements, attitudes, interests and personality. The development of these sheets is an ongoing process with new information being added as it is obtained.
- A Career Development Program utilizing one period a week has been instituted in the Pittsburg seventh and eighth grades and the Stewartstown eighth grades.
- 4. A follow-up by phone or personal contact has been made in the case of each of last year's Seniors in order to ascertain exactly what they are doing as related to what they had intended to do.
- A system of referrals for handling special cases in cooperation with the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services Inc., has been set up. Each referral necessitates at least one home visitation on the part of the Guidance Counselor.
- 6. In a number of cases, evening interviews have been held with students (past or present) and/or their parents concerning Education or Career plans.
- 7. A Guidance Inventory Survey intended to predict needed changes which could possibly prevent certain students from becoming problems or drop-outs has been administered to every Pittsburg student in grades 9 - 11 and to Freshmen in Colebrook.
- 8. A Strong Vocational Interest Survey has been administered

- to individual Seniors who were completely unsure of future plans. The results of these Surveys have been discussed with each student concerned.
- Arrangements have been made for students to meet with representatives of colleges and also representatives of the Armed Services.
- 10. The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery has been administered to nearly all students 9 - 12 and the results are being discussed with each student concerned.
- 11. Juniors planning to continue their schooling after finishing high school took the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests in October and results have been discussed with each student concerned.
- 12. Over 200 individual interviews have been held with Seniors concerning their future educational or career plans.
- Similar conferences with Freshmen, Sophomores and Juniors have been, or are being, held.
- Educational and Career Information has been made increasingly available to students.

I hope that the activities described above will give you some idea of the work that is being done in Guidance.

### School Health

The objectives of a school health program are to perform the necessary functions to maintain and promote good health for all the pupils in our schools.

Each year the following services are performed: checking heights and weights, testing vision and hearing, physical examinations for students in grades 4, 8, 11 and those participating in athletic sports, T. B. skin tests as recommended by the T. B. Association which included all personnel in Supervisory Union 7 this year, immunizations as needed, pre-school clinics which include immunizations, physicals, T. B. and urine tests, home visits for followthrough health care as deemed necessary, promotion of good mental health with the assistance of Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services, first aid and emergency care, health teaching and counseling, and continuous supervision of general health.

The Matching Fund Dental Program sponsored by state and local monies was utilized again this year with many students receiving dental care.

This year the P. T. O. sponsored a program on venereal disease to junior and senior high school students through the Department of Public Health.

North Country Education Services again provided speech therapy for all students in Supervisory Union 7 requiring help.

The American Cancer Society provided films for all junior and senior girls and their mothers for early detection and treatment of cancer.

Two hygienists from the Dental Bureau in Concord presented a very thorough and interesting program on the care of teeth to all elementary students in the area including St. Albert's School and Our Lady of Grace Elementary School.

There was a pre-school hearing and vision clinic in May sponsored by the  $N.\ H.\ Division$  of Public Health for early detection of defects.

Each year we strive to improve the health program. With everyone working together, it is hoped that we can achieve our goal in this endeavor.
