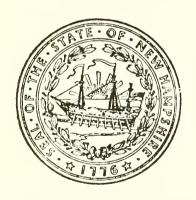

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Anyone having the occasion to visit the Selectmen's office this past year would have been aware, that this year has been most productive due to administrative changes agreed to by all the Selectmen.

We realize that due to the present economic times, many more people are becoming ever more interested in the activity of the selectmen's office and its function. Accordingly, we felt that initiating a somewhat informal but legal type of parliamentary business meeting would be in the best interest of all concerned. We have had an increasing amount of inquiry and correspondence due to the voluminous technical and legal changes that have come about in the past few years.

Most of the items brought before the board have required a majority vote. We know the necessity to procede in an orderly and swift manner has produced a considerable amount of decisive and objective results. We firmly believe, you the people will endorse such a procedure, thereby eliminating most of the unnecessary interface friction.

We wish to convey our deepest appreciation to all the Town Officer's and their departments for helping us achieve this most productive year.

The Duncan Funds were used to re-build the Eastern District road.

The TRA funds were used on the Wild Meadow Road.

The additional Highway Subsidy money was used to repair and widen the section of road that was eroded by the river on Taylor Hill road. It was also used for the section of Jack Wells' road to make access for the Fire Dept. to the Bridge. There was some blasting needed in conjuction with the Duncan project.

The bids were requested for the re-laying of the Town Hall water supply line. Only one was received. The work was done by Myrl C. Phelps and Sons. The cost of the project was \$1,500.00 as directed by the vote of the Town Meeting.

The Sanitary Landfill will continue to be open two days a wekk, and all loads covered to eliminate the unnecessary disposal of litter on the highways. There will be a fine imposed per town ordinance on anyone convicted of leaving trash by the gate or littering the highway. This is in addition to the State fine for littering, which is \$250.00.

Commencing with the new contract in July, all persons eligible for landfill use, will be issued a sticker by either the Selectmen or the Town Clerk.

The over-expenditures of the General Highway Expenses were due to the unanticipated major repairs to the Town equipment, mainly the Grader drive train and the trucks transmission and motor.

There are funds available for our Highway Safety Program, which necessitated a review and appointment of 5 people to the Highway Safety Committee.

Due to the efforts of Wesley Fifield and his able assistants, a productive Recreation program was given this past year. Through Recreational funds, we were able to pay for the Dabbury childrens Ski Program at Ragged Mountain. The remaining sum necessary to accomplish this activity was paid for by the Andover Lions Club.

The people residing on the left side of Echo Glen formed a group to raise funds to reconstruct the road to Town Specifications. There is progress being

made on the Echo Glen "land pool", but things are purposely moving slowly to accommodate legal matters.

Our thanks to all of you for your cooperation in achieving a very productive year.

### TOWN WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Danbury on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Business meeting on all articles to begin at 7:30 p.m.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,062.31 and receive the State contribution of \$7,082.06 for TRA.
  - 5. To see if the Town will vote to transfer any unexpended sums appropriated for civil defense and the Forest Fire Division to Capital Reserve Funds at the end of the year.
  - 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate taken by the Town for non-payment of taxes or by Collector's deed.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to designate the old Town Shed and the land upon which it is located for the exclusive use of the Volunteer Fire Department and to authorize the Fire Department to alter the structure or to remove it and construct a new building on the location.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$40,000 for the purchase of a new four wheel drive front end loader for the highway department. The above sum of money to be raised as follows:

\$10,800 to be withdrawn from the capital reserve fund for highway equipment, \$5,200 to be raised by taxation, \$24,000 to be raised by issuing a long term note for six years. This note to be repaid in six equal installments of \$4,000. plus interest.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the amount of \$3,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund for Highway Equipment.

- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. plus \$95.00 for principal and interest on the long term fire truck note, and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the state and local assistance act for use as a setoff against the above principal payment of \$2,000 incurred for "priority expenditures" since January 1, 1972.
- 12. On or after Town Meeting Day, 1979, no regional or multi-town sanitary landfill operation conducted in the Town of Danbury shall occupy a greater quantity of acreage within the Town than that quantity which is devoted to such operations within the Town as of said Town Meeting Day; provided,

That, the prohibition shall not, at any time in the future, operate to restrict the conducting of a single sanitary landfill operation that occupies a lesser quantity of acreage in the Town and serves only said Town of Danbury and one other town and further provided, that, the site of any future proposed landfill operation to be conducted in the Town of Danbury must be recommended by the Planning Board of Danbury to the Board of Selectmen and the Selectmen must approve said site before it can be so utilized; and further provided,

That, prior to acting on any such recommendation of the Planning Board, the Selectmen shall conduct at least two public hearings on the matter for which said Selectmen shall adequately post public notice thereof at least two weeks in advance of each such hearing.

Footnote: This proposal shall not be construed to effect the continuance of the present landfill operation in Town at its present size. It will not, however, be allowed to expand its current acreage.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Danbury.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 for bridge repairs.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$501.00 for the use of the highway department for the expenditure of Federal Anti Recession Funds. This money is to be spent for the purposes so designated by the rules governing this money and the approval of the road agent and selectmen.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated below; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

Police Department	\$3,000.
Highway Department	5,000.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purchase of a Base Station communications system with portable units for the Police Department. This sum to be reduced by a refund of up to 50% from the Federal Crime Commission. The town's share of the above purchase shall be paid by issuing a long term note for payments of two years in the amount of up to \$3,000.00 plus interest. The above purchase of equipment is subject to approval of the application for refund by the governmental agency.
- 18. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee to assist them in looking into the possibility of purchasing the William Park property so called, located in the center of town for use by the town as a municipal building for town offices and storage and retention of town records.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500. for the Danbury Volunteer Fire Department to assist in the defraying of expenses incurred.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# DANBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT FIRE COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

During the year 1978 the Danbury Volunteer Fire Department responded to a total of 26 calls:

- 2 Structural Fires
- 11Chimney Fires
- 4 Vehicle Fires
- 2 Brush or Grass Fires
- 1 Kitchen Fire
- 2 False Alarms
- 3 Mutual Aid Assists

In order to better protect our firemen the Department has purchased six additional sets of protective gear (coats, boots, gloves, and helmets). This purchase included four Nomax coats which are highly heat and flame resistant. We used the money voted for the Department at last year's Town Meeting to pay for 500 feet of hose, two Scott Air-Paks, with extra air tanks and a few supplies.

Last November the Department sponsored a CPR course. Nine people attended and are now qualified.

The Department has requested that an article be placed in the warrant authorizing the Fire Department to use the town property adjacent to the existing fire station. We need to expand our facilities which are now overcrowded. We hope you will support this article.

In closing we would like to thank all who have so generously supported our monthly cash drawings, the annual gun raffle, and our annual turkey supper.

# REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent & combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

I accepted the job of Forest Fire Warden upon appointment by the Director, upon recommendation of the Selctmen and the District Fire Chief. With the cooperation of Russ Farmer, civil defense director, and the Selectmen we were able to obtain a surplus Army Jeep which was picked up in Bayonne, N.J. We hope to mount a 300 gallon water tank on this four wheel drive truck and equip it with the Forest Fire Departments hand tools and Indian pumps. It should prove to be a useful vehicle for gaining access to remote areas due to its rugged features.

I would like to thank everyone in advance for their cooperation in keeping our woods safe by being careful with fire and reporting any signs of fire to myself or the fire department.

# COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM BELKNAP-MERRIMACK COUNTIES. INC.

As you are aware, the Community Action Program generates funds by attempting to mobilize any available Federal, State and private monies for the continuation of services to the low income population in Belknap and Merrimack Counties. We also rely on local tax dollars to support the operations of our neighborhood center system. The neighborhood center system provides the basic framework for outreach, program development, and needs assessments, as well as making it possible to provide direct services in each community. These services continue to be in great demand, due to unabated inflation and unemployment. Over the past thirteen years. Community Action has administered programs which help low income people become self-supporting and self-sustaining by opening up economic opportunity; by mobilizing the resources of the entire community to devise local programs which show promise of eliminating poverty; and by enabling the poor, by program participation, to become involved in their community.

The enclosed budget reflects the minimum costs to continue operations of the Franklin and Tilton Area Centers. I respectfully request that an item be placed into the budget in the amount of \$370.41 for the Council's consideration. The amount requested this year is based on the total amount needed to be raised from local cities and towns (\$21,777.86) to operate the center system, in relation to Danbury resident participation in available programs and services (1.7%).

The staff of Community Action sincerely thanks the residents of the Town of Danbury for their support in past years, and hopes that the Selectmen and Budget Committee will give positive consideration to our request so that we may continue to provide services to the poor in your community and surrounding towns.

# KEARSARGE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION ANNUAL REPORT OF SERVICES AND ACTIVITIES

The Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association continues to take health skills into the home and the community to meet the needs of the area residents. A total of 245 home visits were provided in 1978 by our staff. These visits include skilled nursing care, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, homemaker/home health aide, health education and mental health follow-up.

### DOG OFFICER'S REPORT

### TO THE PEOPLE OF DANBURY

The Selectmen and the Dog Warden are pleased with the citizens of Danbury for taking more interest in their dogs and cooperating with the state dog ordinances.

There are still some dogs running at large, endangering others who wish to ride bikes, horses, cars, or walk on the streets and roads of our town. There is action being taken on those not caring for their dogs.

All dogs must be licensed when they become three months of age, and the license fees are prorated for the number of months that the dog is being licensed. Also, all licenses expire on April 30 of each year and must be renewed during the month of May or be subject to penalties and fines for failure to license. These licenses can be obtained through the Town Clerk, providing that you have the proper papers.

# DANBURY POLICE DEPARTMENT CHIEF'S MESSAGE

Yes, Danbury does have a Police Department again!

In the past 12 months, I have strived to bring integrity and professionalism of Police Protection and Services to the Town of Danbury.

A rural community, such as ours, must have a department trained, equipped, and capable of responding to the various needs of its people.

My primary concern has been to make our limited equipment available as many hours a day as possible, and to respond to any and all emergency calls as your needs demand.

Within 48 hours of last year's Town Meeting, the cruiser was equipped with a full line emergency first aid kit. The oxygen kit was filled and made ready for use. The cruiser was equipped with flares and emergency tools, so necessary in case of accidents. These items were used often in the past year and are now "standard equipment" in our cruiser.

This year the three people associated with the Police Department became trained in CPR and First Aid.

One Special Officer has completed Juvenile Training School and both Special Officers started the eight-week Police Officers School at Plymouth State College this February. I attended this school this past year and can speak for its usefulness.

Special Officer Knott has made significant strides forward in our Safety Program for our children. We have many more programs in line for all ages, dealing with safety, drugs and alcohol, in 1979.

The Town of Danbury now has Mutual aid with nine other *local* Police Departments. Our goals in this endeavor are to upgrade and maintain trained and knowledgeable police officers on the local level. To answer the cry of many local people, we *can* handle many of our own problems from within our own community. However, Danbury has, once again, established a fine rapport with the State Police, who do respond to our needs, when called upon, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Their cooperation and availability are still *very* necessary to a community of our size. Our Police Department will continue to maintain a good working association with the New Hampshire State Police!!

In keeping with our goal to maintain our own department, we were able to lease a radar unit. This machine has made a marked difference in answering the numerous complaints I have received from many people about speeders in different areas of our town. Its use will continue.

# THE OUTLOOK FOR 1979

Our department has three main objectives for 1979. Leading the list is the installation of a communications system, to make our unit and officers available to YOU at all times.

Secondly is the training of our personnel in all phases of police and safety work.

Third, and very important to our needs, is making the cruiser and its operators more medically oriented.

I have included, in our proposed 1979 budget, more emergency equipment and all officers will continue training in this area.

I hope to provide for you FULL TIME "Part-Time Coverage."

Keeping our costs down is important, but you, the taxpayers, should and must demand responsible and trained police officers to serve you, the community.

Many of our goals and the equipment that we want to obtain, are and have been standard items in most communities. In the past, you have not received even the basics; now you have come to expect the best. Now you should demand it. Do not settle for less.

I have been pleased to serve you this past year and hope to continue to do so in 1979.
