You are hereby notified to meet at Deerfield Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To decide, by ballot, on the proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.
- 3. To decide, by ballot, on the proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance as proposed by petition, of the voters of this town.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Deerfield Town Hall in said Deerfield on Saturday, the twelfth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will authorize that the Capital Reserve Fund, known as the Grader Fund, be hereafter referred to as the Highway Equipment Fund, and to require the Selectmen to contribute annually the following monies to the Highway Equipment Fund:
  - (1.) All unencumbered surplus funds appropriated for, but not used for, the maintenance of highway equipment, and
  - (2.) An amount per hour, as determined by the Selectmen, but not less than \$3.00 per hour, for each hour of use of the Town's highway equipment;
 And further, to authorize that the Highway Equipment Fund be used for financing all or part of the cost of the acquisition of equipment for use by the Highway Department in constructing, reconstructing and maintaining highways located in the Town of Deerfield.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) for a new four wheel drive loader and authorize the withdrawal of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and further to authorize the withdrawal and transfer of the other \$20,000 from the capital reserve fund formerly known as the Grader Fund to be changed to the Highway Equipment Fund.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,206.10 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$8,040.70.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000 for the purpose of making improvements on Class 5 roads within the Town, such roads to be selected by the Selectmen. Such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes, under and in compliance with the provisions of RSA 241, and to authorize the selectmen to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interest of the Town.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$31,900 for James City Bridge, so called, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,000 for this purpose from Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance to be raised by taxation.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$500 and to authorize the Selectmen to use this money to place the town tax records on data processing, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$259 to be expended for repairs and renovations to town buildings and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Title II Antirecession Fiscal Assistance to State and Local Government.
- 9. To authorize the establishment of a capital reserve fund to be known as The Cemetery Fund to be used for purposes of financing (a) all or part of the cost of acquisition of real estate for the expansion of existing cemeteries or the creation of new cemeteries within the Town of Deerfield, and/or (b) all or part of the cost of the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of capital improvements for said existing or new cemeteries; to authorize the transfer to the Cemetery Fund of \$2,500, which the Town has received from past sales of cemetery plots; and to further authorize transfer to the Cemetery Fund at the end of each fiscal year all proceeds from that year's sale of cemetery plots.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for the operation of the "Mosquito Control Commission," said sum to be used for purchase of equipment to conduct a study and formulate a Control program. (By petition Neil Maynard and others).
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to apply through the Federal Manpower Administration Program for, receive and expend a sum not to exceed \$8,000 for the purpose of employing participants under the Manpower Administration Program.
- 12. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary

to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through tax collectors deeds or otherwise.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the grave sites in the Old Center Cemetery.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) from Nora Anderson. This fund to be placed in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds to be held "in trust however" the interest only to be used for care of the lots of John F. White, Susan White, and Ella White in the Fellows Cemetery, so called, and for the general upkeep of the said Fellows Cemetery.

17. Pursuant to Chapter 36 Section 19a New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated to see if the Town will vote to grant power to the Planning Board to regulate Site Plan Review for the development of tracts for non-residential uses.

18. To see if the Town will vote to elect by ballot the members of the Planning Board, beginning at the Town Meeting of 1978. (By petition Joanne F. Wasson and others).

19. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its action on article 14 of the town meeting of March 6, 1973 whereby it voted to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law. (By petition of Joseph Stone and others).

20. To see if the Town will vote to establish an Advisory Budget Committee subject to the following conditions:

- 1) It shall consist of nine members-at-large, elected by ballot; one third of the members-at-large for three years, one third of the members-at-large for two years and one third of the members-at-large for one year at the annual meeting in March, 1978, and to further provide for the election for one third of the members-at-large for three years at each succeeding town meeting.
- 2) They shall meet with the Selectmen and with the School Board at least thirty days prior to the

respective Annual Meetings to discuss and advise them with regards to the appropriate sums to be recommended to the voters for their action at the regular Town and School Meetings.

3) They shall have no authority with regards to appropriations and their recommendations shall be of advisory nature only.

4) The Advisory Budget Committee shall serve for one dollar per year per member, and at no time shall their expenses exceed the sum total of fifty dollars per year, and the committee may only be dissolved by a majority of the registered voters at any town meeting, and at no time may be in conflict with any action passed by the town.

5) In case of need of counsel by the Board of Selectmen or the School Board, it shall be the duty of the A. B. C. to meet with either Board to consult and advise, upon said Board's request. (By petition of Joseph Stone and others).

21. To see if the Town will vote to have Halloween celebrated only on October 31, (which is Halloween), every year and Trick or Treat to take place only on that date between 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. (By petition of Howard Maley and others).

22. To see if the Town will vote to close the town to all trespassing on private property except by written permission from the land owner. (By petition of Alf Lindahl and others).

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive, contract for, accept from and spend any and all money made available to the Town by any state or federal agency.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

One of the strengths of town government is the willingness of its citizens to participate by serving on committees, study groups or advisory boards, donating their time and abilities, to improve their town. Deerfield has been most fortunate in this respect and wishes to express the appreciation of the town to all those who have given their time for the general benefit of the town.

At the March meeting it was voted to erect a building for the general use of the highway department with the expectation that it would be situated on town property on Route 107. Subsequently the town received the Lovejoy property by deed and in discussions with Mr. and Mrs. John Petersen the Selectmen were advised that they would agree to exchange land at the rear of the town hall and adjacent to the library. The committee working on specifications were then requested to consider placing the building on the "Petersen" lot and to include provisions for space for the police department. The revised plan was presented to the Municipal Budget Committee and then was approved, both as to the building and the exchange of land, at the special town meeting in June. The building now essentially complete, lacking only water and toilet facilities, makes an attractive and useful addition to the town's needs.

The town hall was painted and the project of installing combination windows, started three years ago, was completed this year. Early in the year the water pump had to be replaced and certain corrections were made to the heating system to make it more efficient.

As the result of a broken part and the near impossibility of finding a replacement part, either new or used, the Selectmen recommended to the special town meeting in June that a used grader be purchased and the town so voted. Dealers in the area were contacted and the Selectmen and Highway Agent inspected those pieces of equipment that appeared to meet the specifications established by the town. By unanimous agreement of the Selectmen and Highway Agent a used Austin Western was purchased and from reports of the Highway Agent seems to be meeting the needs of the town satisfactorily.

The Highway Agent has been on full time status since April as recommended by a previous study committee.

Under the Federally funded manpower program several young people were employed this past summer with some working at the school and the others working on projects for the town. Town projects included, but not necessarily limited to, clean up and grading around the town hall and library, painting the inside of the town hall, clean up and brush removal from all cemeteries (not covered by trust funds or otherwise cared for) visible to or near all highways in town, clearing brush and grading at Veasey Park, and working in the Old Center Cemetery. The Selectmen received much favorable comment on the work accomplished by these young people which did so much to improve the appearance of the town.

During the year Deerfield's Zoning Ordinances were ruled to have been not properly adopted. It was decided not to appeal but through proper procedure by the Planning Board to make necessary corrections and to reenact essentially the original ordinances. This was done at a special town meeting in December. If there were procedural errors originally it would appear that the town may have been fortunate to have been able to correct the ordinances at a time when little damage could have occurred to the town.

Solid waste disposal, and the establishment of an ac-

ceptable landfill area has been of major concern for nearly three years and is now nearing a final solution. Progress is being made in land acquisition and all necessary plans have been completed and approved. The Selectmen, Legal Counsel and the Solid Waste Committee have all expended a great amount of effort on this project. In the Selectmen's report of 1973 it is interesting to note that items mentioned that would require the town's attention in the years ahead included a full time Highway Agent, a full time Police Dept., town owned equipment, new buildings to house equipment, the need to provide additional office space for the town, semi annual collection of taxes, conversion of tax records to data processing and the resolution of the solid waste problem. Most of these are a matter of accomplishment. The Selectmen will be proposing to the 1977 town meeting that the town convert its tax records to data processing and will be appointing a committee, or committees, to study the needs of the town in relation to the areas of office space and to look into and make recommendations as to safeguarding the town's records and at the same time making them available for study and research.

In these times of financial hardship the town continues to operate in a fiscally responsible manner in relation to the tax dollar. A study of the breakdown for 1976 will show that approximately 13.6% of the tax dollar went for town expenditures. Citizen participation has contributed in a large measure to the town being able to "hold the line" and still provide for the needs of Deerfield.

### ANNUAL TOWN REPORT FOR 1976 Municipal Budget Committee

The Municipal Budget Committee (MBC) reviewed the budgetary requests of the School Board, and the Board of Selectmen, and has presented the two budgets which we feel represent the best interests of the Town.

We have increased the appropriation to the Fire Equipment Fund in order to procure the required replacement in 1983.

We recommend to the Selectmen the fees for building permits be evaluated and brought more in line with neighboring towns.

We recommend to the Selectmen that a long range road improvement program be developed and specifically budgeted for. Also a job description be spelled out for the Road Agent.

We recommend that the Town develop a long range plan for capital needs, i.e.: schools, firehouses, recreation areas, equipment, office/workspaces, and personnel.

We suggest that the Town Information book distributed in 1976 be further expanded to include a codification of all by-laws, ordinances, and, resolutions, now in effect.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

### RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH REPORT

The past year has seen an increase in services provided by the RDHC. As the federal government continues to shorten the length of time allowed the patient



to stay in the hospital there is an increased need for health care in the home. The RDHC continues to qualify as a certified home health agency, implementing procedures to continue to provide quality care.

This is the third year the agency has supported the Referral Coordinator at Frisbie Memorial Hospital. Mrs. Marie Dexter, R.N. is seeing an increased need and receiving more referrals from doctors, nurses and families for home health care after hospital stay.

The Council continues to provide home health aide service through the contract of the Strafford County Home Health Aide Association. And also with the resignation of Joan Menez, to further her education, the Council hired two part time home health aides in order to cover the area more economically. Gail LaRosa who covers the areas of Farmington, Milton, Middleton and New Durham, while Roberta LaFrenier covers the Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington and Strafford areas. This enables the Council to better utilize the professional staff while continuing to provide quality care.

The agency's priority is skilled nursing service, but the agency staff conduct adult screening clinics monthly in Northwood, Farmington and this past year started a program at the Milton Health Center with a case load of 221. With 38 cases referred for further treatment. This has proven to be a needed service.

The staff also participates in the after care program in cooperation with the Strafford Guidance Center and Seacoast Counseling Center. Twice a month the Strafford Guidance holds group counseling at the office, and because transportation is such a problem this has been a great help to the patients.

This year with the nationwide immunization program for the Swine flu the council organized two clinics regionally to cover its member towns. This involved many hours of planning and organizing for the clinic manager, but both clinics were a great success, with 1,139 immunized at the Farmington clinic and 663 at the Northwood clinic.

The Maternal Child Health Program is a very active one providing physical examinations, immunizations and dental care for children 0-6 years enrolled in the Well Child Clinics. The agency staff also provides home visiting to the patients of the Strafford County Prenatal and Family Planning, and the Exeter Area Family Planning program.

The strength of the Council lies in the efficiency and dedication of its staff. With the resignation of Cynthia Blood, Myrtle Walsh and Lucy Myers within the year the Council has been very fortunate to add to their staff Mary Timmons, R.N. and Joann Pearson, R.N., B.S.N. Members of the professional staff are Mrs. Ardal Houle, R.N., Supervisor Director, Miss Arlene Thorne, R.N. Assist. supervisor and Maternal Child Health nurse, Mrs. Marie Dexter, R.N. Referral Coordinator, Mrs. Barbara Drew, R.N., Mrs. Mary Timmons, R.N., Mrs. Joann Pearson, R.N., B.S.N., Mrs. Kathleen Hansen, RPT. The office duties are handled with ease by Mrs. Norma Davis and Mrs. Eleanor Eaton.

As a result of the inflationary times and increase in services provided, it has been necessary, therefore, to increase the per capita request from each town to \$1.35 to enable the Council to continue to provide these greatly needed services.

During the past year the Council has made 286 home visits and 61 Well Child visits with a grand total of 347 for the town of Deerfield.

## DEERFIELD CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1976

The Conservation Commission has been active in two geographical areas in town during 1976. The Agnes B. McNeil Conservation Area covers sixty-five acres of woodland and was deeded to the town in 1967 by Burton McNeil, a member of the Commission. There is now a short nature trail with descriptive folders in a box at the beginning of the trail which everyone is encouraged to use. The Commission has more detailed information, printed and on cassette tape, for the use of teachers or other interested citizens. There is also an area of two acres on the Northwood Town line, covered mainly with



white pine, that has been thinned to encourage better growth in the area and to serve as a demonstration of good woodland management. Late last winter, Ron Alie, of the State Fish and Game Department, and the Penacook Fish and Game Club did some cutting in the Northeast corner of the lot to provide increased feed and shelter for wildlife. Three strips were cut with different methods and studied later. Two of the practices will be continued this coming year.

The Commission has also done some work in the Lindsay nature area behind the Bicentennial Field. The Selectmen have authorized us to implement a conservation program which will consist of laying out and constructing a nature trail, marking plants and trees and providing wildlife habitat. The area, which is closed to any motorized vehicles, is ideal for nature study. It is a long piece stretching from Route 107 to Cole Road with many different habitats including upland woods, marsh, old fields, horse paths, streams and vistas. It is also very close to the school and teachers have shown interest in using the area. Some work has been done to brush out trails and to remove dangerous dead trees near the paths. Young growth was cut in a small patch to keep it open for wildlife. Several specialists were brought in to look at the area and will return to help us this spring in laying out a nature trail.

The Commission sponsored the annual Earth Day road clean-up and we want to thank the many people who helped to make it a success.

We have continued to fulfill our responsibility to make on site examinations of each application for Dredge and Fill operations as they come to us.

The Commission hired a student from the University of New Hampshire under the Work-Study program. He did an extensive study of the past trends in Deerfield dealing especially with population trends.

The Commission would like suggestions from the town's people about what they would like to see happen in terms of conservation and action (recognition of potential or existing pollution hazards, open space, woodland management, etc.). We published a questionnaire with the help of the UNH student and sent it to a random sample of townspeople. Those who responded seemed to favor a move toward long-range planning and the possible development of a master plan. They also indicated a desire to maintain the rural character of the town. We will be holding an open meeting this year to discuss your ideas and to involve more townspeople in our efforts.

In December we were very fortunate to obtain a 1-ton Dodge Pickup Truck. This will be issued to some agency in the town by the Selectmen and C.D. Director.

### 1976-77 ANNUAL REPORT OF DEERFIELD MOSQUITO CONTROL COMMISSION

The 1975 Town Meeting by a 2-1 vote created the Deerfield Mosquito Control District, in compliance with N.H. Statute RSA 437-A. Purpose of the Control District: "To preserve and promote the public health and welfare by providing for control of mosquitoes and other arthropods."

No appropriation for operation of the Commission was made in 1975 or 1976. The request for 1977-78 is for \$250 of the Town Budget. Funds would purchase two (2) Light Traps @ \$55 each, plus \$40 for batteries, test tubes and other supplies, and \$100 for the services of an entomologist consultant to identify the species present. Light Traps have been used successfully in many areas to attract and capture live mosquitoes all over town, since they are portable. It is essential to determine what areas are breeding sites. Many types are not harmful to man or animals, whereas some carry virulent diseases. Of concern in New England are Eastern Equine Encephalomyelitis and Swamp Fever (E.I.A.) in horses, and heart worms in dogs. The diseases are carried by mosquitoes from birds to other birds or from birds to man and animals.

Mosquitoes can utilize a child's swimming pool, rain-filled discarded tires, tin cans, temporary woods puddles, areas around clogged culverts, swampy land and debris-filled brooks. One of the purposes of this Commission is to help the landowner help himself, through information about free measures which can minimize this problem.

Due to the efforts of Ruth Stimson, Rockingham County Extension Service, twenty-five Mosquito Control Districts are in operation in this County . . . thirteen

of these towns have budgeted a total of \$72,000 for control programs. Districts have also been established in Merrimack and Lincoln. We hope the voters will approve our present request so that the Commission can get started with its work at last.

### **PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION**

This committee appointed by the Selectmen, is presently composed of Charles Osborn, John Crumney, Pat Healey, Cindy Tomilson, Jolene Smith, Jeff Southmayd, and Joe Stone. Meetings are held at the George B. White School the second Wednesday of each month. The function of the committee is to oversee all of the Town parks and recreational areas, Veasey Park, (Committee made up of Charles Osborn, Jolene Smith, and Jeff Southmayd), and the Town's Recreation Programs.

Work on the Bi-Centennial Project, (Recreational Field) has progressed to the point where half of the field had been completed when, because of the weather, the Committee had to curtail work until next year. It would be impossible to mention the names of all the people who contributed to the project this past year. However, to the following a tremendous debt of gratitude is extended: George Clark, the N.H. National Guard and the Army Reserve, the Deerfield Fair Association, the local contractors and the many Deerfield residents who pitched in.

Presently the Committee has applied to the Department of Recreation and Economic Development for matching Federal Funds to enable us to complete the two baseball fields, soccer field, and parking lot. The schedule calls for all work on the Recreational Facility to be completed as of the middle of August, 1977 at which time the playing areas will be seeded. The facility will be ready for use in the Spring of 1978. Also in the planning stage and the second half of our project is the construction of two tennis courts opposite the George

B. White School. With the use of donations and matching Federal Funds, we would hope to have this completed in the Summer of 1978.

The Committee has also applied for Federal Monies to be used for a Summer Recreation Program and athletic equipment along with monies to be used for water safety instruction. This has been a very productive year for this committee and I wish to thank them all for their invaluable help. The Committee invites anyone to contact any of the Committee for any information or ideas you may have to help us improve the Recreational opportunities in Deerfield.

Since the project began in 1975 over 190,000 cubic yards of dirt and fill have been either moved or brought to the project. The total cost to the town to achieve this consisted of the cost of diesel fuel and lunches for the guardsmen. The approximate cost was less than \$1,000.

You are hereby notified to meet at Deerfield Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the Second day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. Shall the provisions for absentee ballot for the election of Town Officers be adopted by this Town Meeting? (by ballot - Ref: RSA 60:38)

3. Do you approve of having two sessions for the annual Town Meeting in this town, the first session for choice of Town Officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the Selectmen, for transaction of other business? (by ballot - Ref: RSA 39:2-a)

## THE FOLLOWING ARTICLES TO BE TAKEN UP AT 8:00 P.M.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,305.72 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$8,704.81.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize use of the money in the capital reserve fund known as the Grader Fund for capital equipment and capital improvements for the highway department. (Requires a two third vote).

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of the sum of \$60,000.00 for the purchase of capital equipment and capital improvements for the highway department and to authorize the withdrawal and transfer of \$30,000.00 of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and further to authorize the withdrawal and transfer of the other \$30,000.00 from the capital reserve fund known as the Grader Fund.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the transfer of \$30,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use in the purchase of a truck, tractor and a building for the highway department.

8. to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42,500.00, the State to contribute \$42,500.00 under the Town Bridge Aid Program and the Federal Government to contribute \$70,000.00 under the Federal Aid Off-System Funds for the purpose of reconstructing Bridge No. 147/098 located in James City on Nottingham Road and crossing Lamprey River.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act through the issuance of notes or bonds \$42,500.00 for the purpose of reconstructing Bridge No. 147/098 on Nottingham Road with such notes or bonds being scheduled for repayment in equal amounts over a 5 year period. (Requires a two-thirds vote).

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Mosquito Control Commission the sum of \$600.00 for the purpose of sampling and identifying the various types of mosquitos in Deerfield.

11. To see if the Town will vote to apply through the Federal Manpower Administration Program for, receive and expend a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 for the purpose of employing students under the Manpower Administration Program.

12. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through tax collectors deeds or otherwise.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the grave sites in the Old Center Cemetery.

16. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

17. To see if the Town agrees to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, certain areas of Deerfield are subject to periodic flooding from streams, rivers and lakes, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in flood-plain areas having special hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156 and 156A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Programs Regulations; and

2. Vests the Planning Board with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

(a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and Local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with



neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.

3. Appoints the Building Inspector to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest flood (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the flood immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

18. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulation pursuant to RSA 156 as follows:

1. Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, and proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) to use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept a parcel of land situated off Rt. 107 deeded to the Town by Mrs. Madeline Lindsay for the general purpose of providing a forested and wild area for use by Town residents and their invitees, with trails and footpaths but no roadways for vehicles.

20. To see if the Town will vote to accept a parcel of land situated on Tandy Corner Road deeded to the Town by Mr. Paul O'Neal for the general purpose of being used as a park and recreation area.

21. To see if the Town will vote to elect by ballot the members of the Planning Board, beginning at the Town Meeting of 1977. (By Petition — Ref: RSA 36:4)

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Highway Agent each year beginning with the term commencing on Town Meeting Day 1977. (By Petition — Ref: RSA 245:6)

23. To see if the Town will go on record as supporting a returnable beverage container system within the State of New Hampshire to reduce the litter on our roadsides and contribute directly to energy savings and conservation of our natural resources. (By Petition)

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive, contract for, accept from and spend any and all money made available to the Town by any state or federal agency.

### ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 2, 1976

Moderator Robert B. Sanborn called the meeting to order at 10:00 A.M.

Warrant read by the Moderator.

Printer's error on the ballot noted by the Moderator who stated the office of Overseer of the Welfare is for a term of one year.

Ballot boxes were inspected, shown to be empty and then locked.

Polls were declared open. Balloting began.

The following Election Officials were present: Mrs. Nettie Farr, Mrs. Irene Shores, Mrs. Lucy Bowden and Mrs. Virginia Gluckert. Assistant Moderator was George W. Owen. Assistant Town Clerk was Mrs. Priscilla Watts. Gatekeeper was Walter Markson.

Because of the inclement weather William E. Sanborn moved that all Articles of the Warrant except Articles 1, 2 and 3 be postponed until Friday, March 5, 1976 at 7:30 P.M. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Nancy Beeten. Roger King asked "This has been cleared through Town Counsel, is that correct?" Moderator Sanborn replied "That is correct." Motion put to vote. It was a vote in the affirmative and the motion carried.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The George B. White school year got off to an auspicious beginning this year and it appears that the faculty and staff have not looked back. We continue to attempt to forge ahead in our objective of providing the best education we can with the facilities at hand. Though we lost a number of the teachers at the end of the last school year, the replacement teachers have brought with them a new spirit and willingness to get the job done which, when combined with the nucleus of faculty remaining, gives us a fine staff indeed. *People* are what make any institution go, and we feel we have the *people*.

Speaking of dedicated people, the board reluctantly accepted the request of Mrs. Marge Harris to be relieved of her duties in the school cafeteria. Marge has gone far beyond the call of duty for many, many years in feeding the children attending G. B. White. We wish her all success in her future endeavors, and thank her for her dedicated years of fine service.

The school board has made a concerted effort to return to good basic education, particularly in regard to methodology of teaching and course content. Though I am sure some progress has been made, there still remains a long way to go in this area. Having Mrs. Hinderer, our reading specialist, working full time has really strengthened our reading program at the school. She is ably assisted by Mrs. Hussey.

The board continues to feel that the student body of the school can benefit greatly from a well planned physical education and athletic program. We hope to expand our efforts in this direction.

Our physical plant has taken on a new face in that we have had all upstairs classroom windows in the upper school replaced with a modern thermopane window. These units add a new dimension to the classrooms as well as hopefully conserve fuel during cold weather. Another improvement was the re-tiling of the front hall and upper school landings.

Unfortunately, all our efforts cannot be applied to things that are positive, and we have had our share of negatives during the course of the year. Over two years ago the water pump and an electric line entering the school were struck by lightning. Though we have had repeated meetings with the insurance representatives and had them accept the fact that lightning was at fault, this issue has not been settled to date. Many hours have been spent on this insurance problem over the two year span.

A subject came up during the fall which is basic to the functioning of a well run school. The subject is discipline. At a meeting attended by a good representation of concerned parents, the faculty and administration of G. B. White, and the school board, a thorough airing of all aspects of discipline took place. We cannot help but feel that as a result of that meeting, improved discipline procedures and practices will create in our school a better atmosphere in which to both teach and learn.

Fenton Scribner resigned early in the fall and Mr. Joseph Stone was appointed as his replacement.

In closing, the school board wishes to thank the faculty, staff, volunteers and parents for their contribution in making the George B. White school the educational institution that it is.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

We are continuing our efforts to develop a regional special services center for children. Dr. Alan Pardy was appointed as the director of this center which is called the New Hampshire Educational Resource Services Inc. The initial task of surveying the various school districts has been completed and a proposal has been presented to the school boards as to what services the region will be able to deliver during the 1977-1978 school year. Dr. Pardy has also assisted us in preparing a special services report that must be filed with the State Department of Education during the month of February. In addition a number of proposals have been filed with the Federal Government for the funding of special programs. The center has also conducted a number of workshops dealing with the development of programs for individual children.

The staff evaluations process that was discussed last year has been completed; and was implemented last September.

We are continuing our work with the Curriculum Committee. We are also preparing a report on the state elementary minimum standards that were established by the State Board of Education several years ago. This report as well as the program of the George B. White school will be reviewed by a representative from the State Department of Education in the Spring.

I would like to thank the School Board, School Staff and citizens of Deerfield for their support.

Moderator McIntyre asked that we have a show of hands to dedicate this meeting to the bi-centennial spirit of the continuing freedom of expression by the citizens of Deerfield in a continuing and viable democracy.

Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made to adjourn meeting at 5:15 p.m. by Mr. Arthur Fritz; seconded by Thayer McCain. Accepted and passed on a voice vote.

- (1) for a male or spayed female - \$2.00
- (2) for a female - \$5.00

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00

Certificate of Rabies shot must be presented when registering dogs.
