TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Veterans' Memorial Building, in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Auditors, and all other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for building and repairing bridges, for the suppression of moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of town officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of the Town halls, for the support of libraries, for State and County taxes, for the observance of Memorial Day, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for playground purposes, for co-operating with the State and Federal governments in control of insect pests and white pine blister and for all other necessary charges arising in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will accept State aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as the Windham Road leading from Shute's corner to Windham Junction and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said

purpose, the sum of \$1,880.25; or will accept State aid for construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose, the sum of \$931.32, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will direct the Collector of Taxes to allow a discount to all persons paying their taxes within such period as the Town shall limit, to fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes for the year 1940 on the negotiable notes of the Town, said loans to be repaid from 1940 taxes collected, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 or any other sum of money for the purposes of advertising and giving publicity to the natural industrial advantages of the Town of Derry, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for free public band concerts in the Town during the summer of 1940, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a stretch of road leading from Rayne's corner, so-called to the old Hampstead railroad station, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue those sections of Route 102, near Beaver Lake, which are no longer used for highway purposes because of the change of location of the State road, said sections being a portion of road bordering land of William M. Cole, et als., near Beaver Lake, and two short sections near Morrill's corner, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$200.00 for the purpose of paying rental on Adams Pond and for paying rental on land near said pond which is now or may be used for lumber storage purposes, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.

13. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before such meeting.

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY
ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES:

On September first, 1939 the trustees accepted with regret the resignation of Elsie Gaskin as librarian who had so efficiently served the library for the past thirty-four years. The assistant librarian Edith Hall was promoted to the office of librarian and Elaine Peart was appointed to be assistant.

The following reports of the librarian and treasurer cover fully the work of the library and are submitted herewith:

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library:

The 35th annual report is herewith presented.

May 1st a new reregistration was begun. The last registration was in 1912 and 10,062 had registered up to May 1939. 950 reregistered during the month of May, making a total registration of 1881 up to date.

Children of the grades have given us during this year some very commendable exhibits of their school work.

A noteworthy display of Red Cross World War posters was shown during the Red Cross Drive. Also we have had display of interesting safety posters showing safety in the home as well as at work. National Dog Week was observed by pictures and dog books were displayed and circulated among dog lovers.

The 21st anniversary of National Book Week was observed at the library with a splendid display of new books for children and adults. The rooms were gay with posters and bright colored book jackets. For the

children of the 5-6 grades a travel story hunt proved of great interest. Eighty-six book titles were used. Madeline O'Neil of the West Side 6th grade was winner having eighty-four correct titles. Pauline Madden winning the prize in the fifth grade with a score of seventy-eight correct answers.

Junior High pupils were given a scavenger hunt among the reference books. This proved a grand success. Questions were given and answers were to be found in the reference books. Theresa Boken and Doris Joslyn were winners here. Books were given as prizes.

The librarian visited all schools during the week and attended the Book Week play given by the Dramatic Club of the Junior High.

With the co-operation of the Boy Scouts, books have been sent once in two weeks to shut-ins about town. This service we hope will be increased during the winter.

The reading room was used by the Garden Club for their annual Flower Show. A committee from this club furnished the attractive Christmas decorations again this year. A Christmas tree donated by Joseph Edwards was placed in the reading room and prettily decorated with lights and ornaments.

A traveling display of new books for children was loaned by the State Library Commission.

Two volumes of world war records of the Derry Boys compiled by Jesse MacMurphy were placed in the library by the Lester Chase Post, American Legion and are to be kept in the library for ready reference.

Classes have been held in the library for instruction of the Junior High pupils in the use of the library. These were held in the forenoon. The classification was explained and pupils were taught to locate their own books on the shelves and in the card catalog.

After thirty-four years of active service Miss Elsie Gaskin resigned her position September 1st. Edith Hall, assistant was appointed to take her place with Elaine Peart as her assistant.

Although library work was entirely new to Miss Peart, she is proving a very capable assistant and is doing highly commendable work.

A new oil burner was installed during the late fall which has proved very satisfactory.

We extend our thanks to all those who have given books or magazines to the library the past year, also the newspapers who have printed our lists and notices.

I herewith submit my second annual report as superintendent of schools of Derry.

This report will consist of statistics which should be published each year in order that they may be made a matter of permanent record and a brief review of the progress of the schools from July 1, 1939 to February 1, 1940.

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment through January 31, 1940 was 803 as compared with 778 for the same period last year and 752 two years ago.

Four changes have occurred in the staff since a year ago. Mr. Neil Sullivan of Manchester replaced Mr. Leslie Griffiths of Berwick, Me., who was completing the unexpired term of Mr. Clinton Leach, who had resigned to enter business. Mr. Sullivan is a graduate of Keene and Fitchburg Teachers' College and has had experience in the Raymond Schools. He teaches mathematics and physical education in grades 7 & 8.

Miss Martha Ross of Derry replaces Miss Ruth Gilkerson who resigned to be married shortly after schools closed in June. Miss Ross teaches the Floyd School first grade and she comes to us after two successful years in Grantham. She is a graduate of Plymouth Teacher's College.

Mr. and Mrs. Norwood Hinkle left us to become affiliated with the Putney School of Putney, Vermont. Both were most successful in their short stay in Derry. Their places are filled by Miss Clara Marquis of Lawrence and Mr. Ralph Matthews of Cambridge. Miss Marquis, a graduate of Lowell Teachers' College, has had two years' experience at Vineyard Haven, Massachusetts. Mr. Matthews is a graduate of the University of Michigan and has attended Harvard University.

Repairs, Summer and Fall 1939

The three Derry elementary schools are in fine condition due to the work that has been done on them during the past two years.

The Floyd School was given the usual summer cleaning and is kept in good repair after its extensive renovation during the summer of 1938.

The following work was done at the West Side School:

1. Painting of walls and ceilings of classrooms and corridors.
2. Varnishing of woodwork.
3. Re-plastering in classrooms and corridors.
4. Installation of a bubbler in the boys' basement.
5. Repair of boiler and plumbing.
6. Shingling roof.

At the Oak Street School the work done included:

1. Repair of front porch.
2. Construction of a new fence to protect shrubbery.
3. Painting of walls and ceilings of classrooms and corridors.
4. Varnishing of woodwork.
5. Repair of boiler and plumbing.
6. Weather stripping doors and windows.
7. New ceiling and re-wiring of manual training room.
8. Installation of adequate light globes in six classrooms.
9. New linoleum in domestic arts room.

INSTRUCTION

Good progress has been made since the last report in connection with the policy adopted last year to improve the text books in use as fast as possible.

Reading continues to be our greatest concern throughout the grades. The modern system of reading, which was adopted last year, is gradually being extended upwards through the primary grades. In order for pupils to succeed in school work it is essential that they possess a good foundation in reading habits and abilities. Various text books and materials are being supplied in all grades to meet this need.

Some language books, which were non-existent in all grades, have been purchased for grades five through eight. It is our desire and intention to continue to complete the installation of these very necessary texts in all the grades.

New literature books for grades seven and eight, science books for grade eight, readers for grades two through six, geographies and histories for grades three through six, dictionaries and reference books have been purchased during the past year. As pointed out in the previous report — we cannot hope to fulfill the textbooks needs in a single year but particular attention will be given this item until the textbook supply is deemed adequate.

One condition which seriously handicaps the efficiency of a teacher is the crowded conditions of a classroom. Each pupil cannot receive the necessary individual instruction when classes are large. A study of the school - grade table, given at the beginning of this report, will show that steps should be taken in the near future to eliminate this handicap in certain grades.

Particular attention should be given the situation in grades 4 - 8. For us to seat 45 to 50 children in a room is to absolutely prohibit the attainment in Derry of ac-

cepted educational standards and is to fail to recognize the value of generally accepted health standards.

An attempt has been made to improve the appearance and equipment in the domestic arts department, of the Oak Street School. Besides the painting and varnishing, adequate light globes and the new linoleum, the old wood-burning range has been replaced by a new and up-to-date electric stove, loaned through the generosity of the Derry Electric Company. Much needed table linen, silverware, glassware, and dishes have been furnished. The seventh and eighth grade girls are now receiving a better training as a result of the above investments.

A new band saw has been purchased for the manual training room. This machine was needed and is being used in connection with the project work in grades seven and eight. Other tools, materials, and equipment have been purchased for both the manual training and machine shop departments. With added improvements this phase of the educational progress of the junior high grades will be made more efficient and worth while.

Projects that the manual training classes have completed include:

1. Refinished twenty-five chairs for the domestic Arts room.
- 2. Window screens for basement.
3. Lunch table and bench for a Windham School.
4. Dress rack for Domestic Arts room.
5. Flag holders for several rooms.
6. Bulletin boards for hallway and rooms.
7. An athletic room for physical education equipment.
8. Installation of railings for basement stairs.

9. Various tables, lamps, racks, and other objects were completed as individual projects.

Projects completed by the classes in machine shop include:

Ripping bars, crow or pinch bars, fire-place tools, wood working bench vices, machinist vises, screw clamps, double tree sets, farm and garage anvils, heavy strap hinges, and various machinist tools.

TRANSPORTATION

The transportation routes are the same as for the previous year except for the addition of one other route:

1. The Checker Cab Company operates the three routes as outlined in last year's report transporting a total of 86 pupils.
2. Mr. Harry Ryder, who lives on the Windham Road, carries 2 pupils.
3. Mrs. Eva Gamache brings in one child from the Kendall Pond section.
4. Mrs. Henry Chase carries one child who lives on the Windham Road. (New route.)

RURAL SCHOOL SALES

During the spring of the year Schoolhouse and Lot Number 3 were auctioned to Mr. Bert Ross for \$400.

The remaining rural school property was auctioned during the summer as follows:

Number Seven Schoolhouse and Lot were sold to Mr. Arthur Bingham for \$180. Number Four House and Lot went to Mr. Francis Higgins Jr. for \$215. Number Six Schoolhouse was auctioned to Mr. William Weston for \$75. Lot and Schoolhouse Number Five were auctioned to Mr. John Palmer at \$500.

As a result of these sales it was possible to cancel all insurance policies on this property and re-write the same amount on the central schools. This step was alone a forward one since the town schools had been carrying a very small amount of insurance.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

A great deal more has been done to increase the opportunity for the pupils to engage in physical education, especially in the upper grades.

During the fall the junior high school engaged in football while the girls were playing softball.

By the use of the special appropriation of \$200 requested last March it was possible to hire Veterans' Memorial Hall for physical education classes during the regular school day. In addition the boys and girls of grades seven and eight each sponsor a regular school basketball team and are playing a few games with other schools. The above activities not only contribute to healthful living but also furnish a vehicle for desirable contacts with pupils from other schools and homes. Teams are well supervised with good sportsmanship and fair play the key note of all sports.

Saturday morning classes in physical education activities have been carried on during the winter with the pupils of grades two through six taking part.

It is planned to carry on seasonal activities during the spring term, in the upper grades, with baseball and softball being played.

THE BUDGET

Certain items in the budget for 1940-1941 should be noticed.

The per pupil cost for books, for the five years previous to this year was 59c, as compared with \$1.12 for other towns of similar size to Derry for the same peri-

od. The per pupil cost as requested in the present year's budget is about \$1.25 — while the same figure for the next year will be approximately \$1.00 per pupil. This decrease is due to the fact that we have been able to purchase a few more books than was planned for the present year.

The per pupil cost for scholars' supplies, for the five years previous to this year was 46c, as compared with \$1.58 for other towns of similar size to Derry for the same period. The per pupil cost as requested in the present year's budget is approximately 87½c. For next year the per pupil cost will be \$1.25 but this figure also includes machine shop and manual training supplies which were asked for under a special appropriation last March.

The state average per pupil cost for 1939 was \$1.22 for books and \$1.43 for scholars' supplies.

The total per pupil cost for the Derry elementary schools for 1938-9 was \$62.12 as compared with a state median of \$81.07.

High school tuition estimates for 1940-1941 show an increase of \$2500 due to the fact that we are graduating more pupils in June than we did last year. Most of the pupils who graduate from our eighth grade enter high school. This fact is commendable.

The total appropriation which our budget for 1940-1941 calls for is \$65,754.62 as compared with \$66,547.82 a year ago. This shows a reduction of \$793.20.

CONCLUSION

“What the year 1940 holds in store for the world no one can foretell. The greeds and hatreds which bring about suffering and sorrow to mankind are as unpredictable as ever. In the midst of this uncertainty there shines the light of our democracy as a beacon to lead men to sanctuary and peace.

Hence the responsibility of the teacher increases in proportion to the need for safeguarding and perpetuating this democracy. The dangers to our democracy are many. That freedom of action which is the essence of our form of government has inherent in it some of these dangers. The school becomes the training ground for and the bulwark of democracy.

The school's first responsibility is then to train boys and girls for living in our democracy. This involves not only the teaching of the facts of our history, but also the developing of proper attitudes and ideals of citizenship. It also demands that the school be on the alert to combat all undemocratic philosophies which might now or in the future endanger the type of government which we have set up.

This, then, is our greatest obligation to the boys and girls in our care — that, whatever else we may do for them, we may not fail to teach them the American way of life."

All the adult public must be enlisted in this work, for it is only to the extent of its confidence and support that we may achieve these objectives. The job of education belongs not alone to the craft, but to every individual of the community. May we in 1940 strive for that cooperation.

The teaching staff of the Derry Village School remains the same as last year with the exception of a new music supervisor. Miss Clara Marquis of Lawrence, a graduate of Lowell Teachers' College, replaces Mrs. Cornelia Hinkle who is now at the Putney School in Putney, Vermont. Miss Marquis has had two years experience in the schools of Vineyard Haven Massachusetts.

Both Miss Hoyt and Miss Watts attended the summer session at Keene Teachers College during the past summer.

At the beginning of the school year we were faced with an over crowded condition in the intermediate room. As a result five pupils were seated in the primary room. By careful planning on the part of the teachers as well as fine cooperation between teachers and pupils the problem was easily overcome with no loss in efficiency. At present, because of elimination from school of some children whose families withdrew from town, all pupils who are enrolled in the intermediate grades are now seated in that room.

Continuing our policy began last year we have carried on the installation of the modern basal system of reading. As a result we now have this worth-while system well established in the primary room and have installed it, to some extent, in the intermediate room.

A new language system, which was non-existent in the intermediate grades has also been introduced. Be-

sides meeting a very fundamental need as regards instructional materials it eliminates much copying from the blackboard by the pupils with the resulting increased efficiency as regards teaching.

Other additional books, as needed, because of increased enrollment have been purchased, such as, geographies for grade four, and readers.

In looking forward to another year the needs as regards books should center on a continuance of the reading system, health for all grades, dictionaries, reference books, and a new history series for grade four. The fourth grade history now in use is far too difficult for pupils at that level.

Pupils who are attending grades seven and eight in Derry are generally doing satisfactory work as are those who have continued on to high school.

The major repair job during the previous summer was the shingling of the roof of the school house. At some future time attention should be given the interior of the schoolhouse where paint and varnish would add materially to the appearance.

The school budget for this year shows a deficit of \$170.03 due entirely to increased elementary and high school tuition, as well as plumbing repairs during the current weather.

“What is education anyway? It is not a course of training to prepare for life at some future date. It is living life now. It is not confined to the hours or days in the classroom nor to a particular chronological age. It is a continuous process throughout life. Hence it behooves us all — teachers, school officials, pupils, parents, citizens — to have a clear philosophy about education, a philosophy that considers the maximum development of the individual as of paramount importance. Such a development involves adequate teacher

background and preparation, efficient administration, right attitude of girls and boys, cooperation of parents, and an intelligent and active interest in matters of education by all citizens.”
