

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TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Francestown in the county of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Francestown on the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1.

To choose all the necessary Town Officers for the year coming.

Article 2.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating therto.

Article 4.

To see if the Town will vote to exempt itself from having the Town Clerk register voters according to RSA 55:9-C, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 5.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 6.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Department radio equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Fifty-Seven Dollars and Thirty Cents (\$1,657.30) to defray the Town's share of the cost of purchasing and equipping an ambulance to serve the present sixtown area, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Forty Dollars (\$1,640.00) to purchase and install a 2,000-gallon, 10-key gas pump, to be located at the Town Garage, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9.

To see if the Town will vote to allocate a sum not to exceed Three Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$3,300.00) of funds already received from Revenue Sharing to replace the Police Cruiser and in addition to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund for this same purpose, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10.

To see if the Town will vote to allocate a sum not to exceed \$21,000.00 of funds already received or expected to be received from Revenue Sharing and a sum not to exceed \$118.00 of Anti-Recession funds already received and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Three Hundred and Eighty-Two Dollars (\$5,382.00) for replacement of the Russell Station Road bridge over Rand Brook with culverts, of which sum the amount of \$1,500.00 shall be earmarked for the retention of competent engineering design services, said culvert to be constructed by the Town Highway Department, and to use any unexpended balance of said total sum for the improvement of the approaches to said culverts, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11.

To see if the Town Meeting will:

1. Affirm that the part of King Hill Road lying between Perley Place and the road leading from Route 136 to the Ludwig properties, continues to be a Class V road as shown on the State Highway Department inventory of Town roads, or 2.Affirm that the Easterly Eight Hundred feet (800') of the above mentioned segment of King Hill Road continues to be a Class V road, or

3. Instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee to study the condition of the above mentioned segments of the King Hill Road, which committee is to make a report to the 1979 Francestown Annual Town Meeting, or

4. Take any other action relating thereto.

Article 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Seventy Nine Dollars (\$879.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting nurse Association, Inc., or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Sixty-Five Dollars (\$365.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Services, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to add to a Trust Fund for the purchase of land for a future library building and/or construction of a new library building, or an extension to the present George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to defray the cost of providing suitable soil cover at the present dump area, \$223.50 of which is owed for work done to date for land fill, and the balance to provide sufficient top soil to repair the land for more attractive growth coverage, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt, as a by-law, a life safety code which shall conform to the Life Safety Code which is in effect at the time of the adoption of this by-law as promulgated by the National Board of Fire Underwriters and adopted by the State Marshal's Office, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17.

To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission which will have only such authority as conferred on it by RSA 36:53 of 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Fifteen Dollars and Forty-Four Cents (\$515.44), as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to defrxy the cost of preparing a Land Use Plan for the Town of Francestown, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19.

To see if the Town will vote to elect all members of the Francestown Planning Board as provided by and under provisions of RSA 36:4, par 11 (b) with the first election of members to be held at the 1979 Regular Town Meeting, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Seven Thousand Dollars (\$47,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing the George Foster lot on Scobie Pond for a new Town Beach and Twenty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for making improvement to same, such sums to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Ch. 33, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Francestown, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21.

To see if the Town will vote to allow the school children of Francestown to use the Town Hall for the school physical education programs, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22.

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-B and 43-C for Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate which provides for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption. Provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000.00. To Be Voted By Ballot.

Article 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for a year-round Recreation Program, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24.

To see if the Town will vote to relinquish all right, title, and interest, if any, in the old road leading from the South Francestown Road, so called, some 1,550 feet through the property of Brenda S. Parker and terminating at the northern end of said property, in accordance with RSA 238:1, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00) to employ the Department of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire to appraise all of the real property in the Town to a full 100% of value, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 26.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize a change in the name of the present Advisory Board to the Advisory and Budget Committee and to authorize the continued periods of service and terms of membership of the Advisory Board on the Advisory and Budget Committee and of subsequent appointments to that committee.

The duties and responsibilities of the Advisory and Budget Committee shall be:

To continue, upon the request of the Board of Selectmen, to advise and assist the Board regarding any matter affecting the Town.

To actively participate with the Board of Selectmen in the preparation and final compilation of the annual Town Budget.

To publish and post not less than 15 days prior to Town Meeting in two or more conspicuous locations within the Town, its findings and recommendations with regard to each item of the budget and all articles proposing capital expenditures as they are approved by the Board of Selectmen.

The Advisory and Budget Committee shall not have the power of veto over any item of the Town budget or of the Town budget in its entirety as it is finally approved and submitted by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 27.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant to the Francestown Electric & Water Co., its successors in interest or assigns a permanent easement and right of way, to enter upon Town property where and as may be necessary to construct, maintain and repair underground pipe lines and appurtenances for the purpose of conveying water across, through and under town property together with the right to excavate and refill and/or trenches for the location of said pipe lines, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28.

To see if the Town wishes to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$50.00, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 29.

To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen and the Building Inspector (if any) to discontinue issuing any Building Permits for new home construction in the Town of Francestown for a period of six months or until the completion of a Master Plan and Soils Study by the Planning Board and action by the Town on said plan and study, whichever first occurs, and further to request that the Planning Board not approve any subdivisions for a period of six months or until the Master Plan and Soils Study is completed and said action by the Town has taken place, whichever first occurs.

Article 30.

Are you in favor of adopting the following amendment to the Francestown Zoning Ordinance?

Article 3. Lot Measurements and Setbacks.

After Subparagraph a) (2) delete all and insert "This paragraph 3a shall not apply to lots of record on July 17, 1972. However, after March 14, 1978, any such lots which are abutted by other land owned in common with them shall, if conveyed by the common owner, not be deemed lots upon which buildings may be erected unless, prior to such conveyance, sufficient land has been properly and legally added from the abutting commonly owned land so that the nonconforming lots are brought into conformity with this Ordinance. This provision shall not apply if it would require the commonly owned abutting lots to be reduced so as to also become nonconforming." (To Be Voted By Ballot)

Article 31.

Are you in favor of adopting the following amendment to the Francestown Zoning Ordinance?

Article 5A Zoning District Regulations.

I. Village Zone

(a) Permitted uses

1. After the word ".....dwellings" add "with accessory buildings" so that the provision reads "Single family dwellings with accessory buildings provided they do not exceed 35 feet to the highest point of the structure measured from the highest exterior grade at the foundation line." (To Be Voted By Ballot)

Article 32.

Are you in favor of adopting the following amendment to the Francestown Zoning Ordinance?

Article 5A Zoning District Regulations.

V. Omit this provision in its entirety and omit Article 7 in its entirety and substitute the following new article: Article 7. Nonconforming Uses and Structures in Nonconforming Locations.

a) Existing Uses: Any lawful building or use of a building or premises, or parts thereof, in existence at the time of adoption of this Ordinance, or any amendments thereto, may be continued although such building or use does not comply with the provisions hereof. No nonconforming use may be extended or enlarged nor may a nonconforming use be reestablished after abandonment of more than one year.

b) Change of Nonconforming Use: A nonconforming use may be changed only to a use permitted in the Zone in which it is located and, when changed to a conforming use, no building or land shall be permitted to revert to a nonconforming use.

c) Catastrophic Destruction of Nonconforming Use: When a nonconforming use, a structure on a nonconforming lot or a structure containing a nonconforming use is damaged or destroyed by fire, flood, wind or act of God, such structure or use may be reconstructed and used as before such damage provided such reconstruction is commenced within eighteen months and completed within two years after the date of the original damage or destruction.

d) Change of Structures in Nonconforming Locations: A structure in a nonconforming location may be enlarged or extended provided the enlargement or extension complies with all provisions of the Zoning Ordinance. Any other enlargement or extension shall not take place unless a variance is obtained from the Board of Adjustment. (To Be Voted By Ballot)

Article 33.

Are you in favor of adopting the following amendment to the Francestown Zoning Ordinance?

Add New Article 14. Definitions

Accessory Buildings: A detached building located on the same lot as the main building and the use of which is incidental thereto.

Building: Any independent structure having a roof with structural supports.

Dwelling: A structure designed for residential occupancy by one family, excluding hotels, motels, inns, condominiums, apartment houses, tourist homes, overnight cabins and the like.

Family: One or more persons living as a single house-keeping unit.

House Trailer: See Mobile Home.

Lot: Land occupied or designed to be occupied by a building(s) or use or accessory building(s) or uses incidental thereto. The word lot includes plat, plot or parcel where appropriate to the context.

Lot of Record: A lot which is part of a subdivision plat recorded in the office of the Hillsborough County Register of Deeds or a lot or parcel described by plat and/or deed which has been so recorded, and which has been approved by the Planning Board, if required.

Mobile Home: Any vehicle, or similar portable structure, mounted or designed for mounting on wheels, used or intended for use for dwelling purposes, including structural additions. Any such vehicle or structure shall be deemed to be a mobile home whether or not the wheels have been removed therefrom and whether or not it rests upon a temporary or permanent foundation. The term Mobile Home shall include and be synonymous with the terms House Trailer and Motor Home.

Motor Home: See Mobile Home.

Nonconforming Use or Structure: A use or structure which is lawfully maintained at the time this Ordinance and any amendments thereto become effective but which does not conform with the regulations for the Zone in which it is located. (To Be Voted By Ballot)

Article 34.

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Article 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,500.00 for replacement of the Poor Farm Bridge over the South Branch of the Piscataquog River with a culvert, of which sum an amount not to exceed one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) be earmarked for the retention of competent engineering services for the design of said culvert.

Article 5. Not carried.

Article 6. Voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 7. Voted that the Town instruct the Selectmen to reappraise all the land and buildings of the Town over a period of the next three years using criteria recommended and approved by the State of New Hampshire.

Article 8. Voted (a) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to pay dues to join the New Hampshire Municipal Association for the exclusive purpose of enabling group medical insurance to become available to Town Employees, and (b) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,494.12 for the purchase of a Blue Cross-Blue Shield Health Care Plan with Major Medical included for the three full-time Road Department employees and their wives and children.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,040.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$365.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Family Health and Mental Services.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate \$4,500.00 for the rental and transportation of refuse containers.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 to defray the cost of exterminating rodents and pests and to provide suitable cover at the present dump site.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for the erection of such recycling facilities as the Selectmen, in their descretion, may deem necessary, and in addition, to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 to cover the salary of a recycling supervisor.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to add to a Trust Fund for the purchase of land for a future library building and/or construction of a new library building, or an extension to the present George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to make repairs to the sidewalk on Main Street.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of the Police Department Cruiser.

Article 17. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$403.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost of a twofrequency police and fire radio, the other cost to be federally funded through the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Department radio equipment.

Article 20. Voted to authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$475.00 (representing the accrued interest) from the Trust Fund - New Cemetery Sales, for the Cemetery Commission to use for the care and maintenance of Cemetery No. 3.

Article 21. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$400.00 to paint or stain the exterior of the Town Garage Building.

Article 22. Voted to accept the following individual trust fund: For perpetual care of the cemetery lot containing the remains of Grace Ellsworth the sum of \$200.00.

Article 23. Voted to accept a certain parcel of land in Francestown on Todd Road, bounded by the Town dump, Bog Brook, and owned now or formerly by Rino Sanchioni, the property now or formerly of Charles W. Durgin consisting of five acres more or less.

Article 24. Voted to accept a certain parcel of land in Francestown located at the Junction of Route No. 47 and Abbott Lane (so called) consisting of 1500 square feet more or less, as shown on a map of property of Pearl Abbott Heirs, dated November, 1970.

Article 26. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Committee on the Arts; exclusively for such purposes as conducted in the Town of Francestown at the discretion of the Selectmen or their designees.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT AND BUDGET

In 1977 T.R.A. was spent again on Turnpike South; 1,600 feet was rebuilt with underdrain gravel and tar. The cost of this was \$10,250.00.

Duncan Fund monies were spent on County Road North again this year with plans to continue. Most of the work done this year was cutting of brush and trees, excavating, and buying of the culverts needed. Winter was upon us before we could put on any gravel; we also put some town money on this project. This year we intend to put in drainage, gravel and maybe do a little blasting.

We sealed part of Turnpike South, Russell Station Road, Woodard Hill Road, and part of Redhouse Road -- about four miles in all.

Culvert repair was made all over town, with more needed.

Cross Road was replanked as was Scobie Pond Bridge and new runners were put on County Road Bridge which will be replanked in 1978.

After much discussion and some delays as how to do the Poor Farm Road Bridge project, the job was finally handed to the highway department to build. We started the job Oct. 1 and with the expert help of Joe and Art Brennan and Phil Ireland, cold hands and wet feet, we completed it in about six weeks. \$20,500 was raised for the project, \$18,000 did the job except for Ireland's expenses. Plans for the same thing on Russell Station Road are in the works now. Hopefully the same type structure.

Extensive ditching and graveling was done below Phyl Cleaves house on Journey's End Road in '77, plus graveling and upgrading roads about town.

We would like to apologize for not getting all the roads scraped again in the fall. What with the bridge project and early frost and winter setting in, it wasn't possible. We hope we can start this year's bridge a lot earlier when the water is down and a bit warmer.

Winter was extremely hard in '77 with lots of snow and ice. The late storms in the spring were real tough on our budget with trees down and brush galore. It cost about \$4,500 to clean up after those last two storms. December started out with a blast, taking a lot of salting and sanding, never mind plowing. We have cut our salt consumption about in half from 1976 and are sanding a lot more. More people are asking for sand as are the police calling us out more. With storms like in December dragging out for a week at a time, sanding and salting is just about a full time job.

Bob Foote has purchased a new sander, so perhaps we can give a little more and faster service. It takes about eight hours sanding time to get ahead of the school buses and about forty hours to do the whole town. With only one sander it is impossible.

We have a special item in the summer budget this year for \$30,000. This is to rehabilitate the mud roads in town. This is to get all the people that live on real muddy roads out year round. Graveling these roads will do that, plus give them the fire and police protection they deserve. Some of the roads are listed below, with the estimated cost of gravel (depending on where we get the material). County Road South - \$1,500, Langmaid's Road - \$1,118, Turnpike North - \$2,236, Wilson Hill - \$3,354, Gillis Road to Bennington -\$1,118, Candlewood Road - \$5,590, Perly Road - \$1,118, Journey's End Road - \$2,236, Campbell Hill Road - \$2,236, Birdsall Road - \$2,236; plus crushing of a few thousand yards for where real thickness is not necessary.

We hope you people will strongly support this program. If there are any questions, please call the Road Agent to explain.

The highway employees will not be seeking wage increases this year; we will be trying to hold the line in this area.

I know this is a tremendous budget to raise, but I feel it is needed badly to carry out our year's work ahead. Your support will be greatly appreciated.

We would like to take this time to thank all the people of Francestown for their continued support of the Highway Department and look forward to serving you another year.

This past year, the Volunteer Fire Department answered 11 calls for chimney fires, 3 structure fires, 4 out-of-town calls for mutual aid, 4 dump fires, 2 brush fires. It made 4 smoke checks, and it inspected all chimneys upon requests by the owners. The fire station was also properly manned during 4 power failures. The Rescue Squad answered 10 calls to assist the ambulance, auto accidents, and resuscitator calls.

A first aid refresher course was held during this year. Norman Stewart, Jack Coakley, Ray Plante, Bob Cutter, and members of the Women's Auxiliary held a program for the annual Fire Prevention Week for the school children and the town kindergarten.

I wish to thank all the townspeople for their continued efforts and awareness in good fire prevention.

Report of District Fire Chief and Town Forest Fire Warden

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of $\frac{1}{4}$ of $1\frac{7}{4}$ of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

I would like to thank all who are involved in keeping our town green. This is becoming to be more of a problem each year, as more people move into Francestown. Some people think that they may burn whatever they wish, especially with wood cookouts. I will repeat, you must have a permit to do this and the outdoor fireplace must be approved by the State and local warden. The State law reads "the penalty for kindling a fire in woodlands of another without written permission of the owner or for kindling any fire without a written permit when a permit is required, a person may be fined not more than \$1,000.00 or imprisoned for 1 year."

I am not trying to be a dictator, but am trying to keep our town as is. It is your job as much as mine to report fires, not only of woodland nature but even wood campfires. We can't monitor the town on a twenty-four hour basis unless we have help from townspeople.

I would like to remind every person in town that my job is a non-paying job and I am only trying to carry out the laws of the state and to keep Francestown the way we all like it. Thank you for your cooperation and help.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 1977, the Francestown Police Department answered over 600 calls. The Department investigated five cases of breaking and entering, some with the help of the State Police. The Department investigated 28 automobile accidents, of which one was a fatality. Most of the rest were attributed to icy roads.

The Department investigated 16 calls of theft of skiis at Crotched Mountain, this was down from 1976.

With the help of the new radar unit we have been able to monitor traffic better. This has resulted in over 300 traffic citations. With all of the arrests the Department made this year, only four were found not guilty in Goffstown District Court. We had one car stolen this year, and the subjects were apprehended within 12 hours.

Unfortunately the town is growing and, with the addition of dances every weekend at Crotched Mountain and Bobcat Ski areas, we have had to increase patrols. This has caused the Department to exceed its 1977 budget and is why I have asked to increase the budget for 1978.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES

First, we would like to draw your attention to the Library questionnaire stapled in the Town Report. This questionnaire has been prepared in the hope of improving your Library's services to you. May we ask you to give it your considered attention and, when you have completed it, to return it to the Library? We would be most grateful.

The Library was again awarded the Outstanding Library Achievement Award, received by Ingeborg Anderson, Librarian, and the Trustees at ceremonies in Concord, N.H. Also in Concord that day, the Trustees and Librarian attended hearings on the State bill for aid to public libraries which we actively support.

The younger set had its turn with preschool reading program conducted by Pam Barry, and presently continued by Cecile Nelson, Patty McNeil, and Debbie Olson. In addition, the grade school enjoyed another year of movie programs, attending films lent by the State Library.

The Library Summer Program filled the children's vacation months with creative activity -- from quilting to totem-pole carving. The time, energy, and imaginative efforts of Joan Hanchett, Ethel Stubbs, Betsy Wiederhold, Bessann Tripplett, Chris Brown, Jo Staub, Bub Rokes, and all their faithful helpers, directed and ably assisted as always by Inge Anderson and Connie Varnum, ensured the program's success.

National Library Week, in early April, lured visitors in considerable numbers both to examine new book purchases and displays and to enjoy special events. Allan Block and Nancy MacDowell again generously offered an evening concert for the Town and drew a large and appreciative audience. The children were given the exciting treat of a visit by Wally Tripp who cartooned and clowned for them to their hearts' content. We are most grateful to these friends of the Library for their kind contribution of time and talent for Library Week and most gratified by the enthusiastic reception given them by the Town.

The Library Smorgasbord, revived last year, was an even greater success in 1977. The enthusiastic participation of such a large segment of the community creates the Smorgasbord's special atmosphere of happily shared effort. Again, Pat Standish, ably seconded this year by Lil Poor, was responsible for the master planning. Their hard-working crew was led once more by the "Rogues" who last year instigated the Smorgasbord's rebirth: Robert and Larry Ames and Kelly Straus, Andy Janiak, Andy Hungerford, Lisa Roberts, and all their friends. Primary, of course, was the varied and delicious array spread on the buffet tables, generously and skillfully prepared by the ladies (and some of the gentlemen!) of Francestown, and by the crew. We are most grateful to everyone whose efforts and open-handed, openhearted participation made this Smorgasbord so happy and successful (and delectable) an event. The final measure of this success was the \$852.76 added to the Special Account, allowing certain long-hoped-for Library projects to be undertaken.

High on the list of Library intentions was the redecoration of the beautiful but sadly shabby Reading Room. That room is now "fresh as new paint" thanks to the skills (and liberal discount on the work) of the Yankee Painters.

The Reading Room is further adorned and made comfortable by two sturdy and handsome new Captain's chairs, purchased from gifts given in fond memory of Helmut Sturow. Fine books have also been added to the collection in Mr. Sturow's name.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In response to a request from the Selectmen, the Commission supplied extra copies of the Town Soil Maps and a new Wetlands Map. The Commission had had this Wetlands Map prepared by the Hillsborough County Conservation District.

At the Selectmen's request, the Commission initiated three projects associated with growth in the town.

First, a questionnaire, mailed to all residents or property owners, disclosed that the 31 percent of residents and the 22 percent of non-residents who replied to the questionnaire were almost unanimously in favor of developing a town plan. Copies of the tabulated results of the questionnaire will be available soon.

The second project is a study of the effect of growth on local taxes. Bill Hansen, Associate member, is chairman of the corresponding subcommittee.

The third project is an indexing of the town's natural resources and property of all sorts. Shirley Davis is chairman of this subcommittee.

At the urging of the Selectmen, the chairman of the Commission attended the annual conference concerning the use of salt on roads -- generally known as "The Sensible Salting of Roads" -- held in Peterborough and furnished the Selectmen with the corresponding information and literature.

Further, the Selectmen requested a census of dead trees on those town roads which have been designated as "Scenic Roads"; eight of the 21 roads have been surveyed and a report presented to the Selectmen.

The Commission obtained information about the availability of water for domestic use from the Geological Survey in Concord and turned over the information to interested residents along Main Street.

Jim O'Mahoney checked conditions in connection with three Fill and Dredge permit applications, and these were subsequently approved.

The Commission followed the three Land Use Programs which were broadcast by Channel 11. These provided considerable background information concerning problems encountered and actions taken by other New Hampshire towns confronted by unexpected, rapid growth. The Commission was considerably assisted by the audio taping done by David Barr.

On December 15, Mr. William Rourke of the Southwest Re-

gional Planning Commission presented to the Conservation Commission what he considered to be the important reasons for Francestown to become a member of this organization. Also present at that meeting were Selectman John Schott and Planning Board Member Herbert Benedict.

During January, the last fund-raising square dance was held at the Town Hall. The Commission found it was no longer able to continue this effort.

New members of the Commission last spring were Shirley Davis and William Cowles. During October, Bill Hansen and Brenda Parker joined the Commission as Associate Members. Early in December, Liesel Gilman resigned from the Commission and was replaced by Brenda Parker. Bill Hansen resigned his Associate Membership in order to join the Planning Board.

THE PLANNING BOARD

In 1977 the Planning Board held 22 regularly convened meetings. John R. Schott replaced O. Alan Thulander as the Selectman ex-officio member and Herbert Benedict replaced Royal S. Cleaves who retired from the Board after many years of faithful service. William Edwards was appointed to the Board by the Selectmen to fill the unexpired term of Robert H. Cloutier. William Hansen was appointed by the Selectmen to replace Bill Edwards, who resigned December 16. Hearings were held and approvals granted for fifteen subdivisions. Four amendments to the Zoning Ordinance were presented for ballot vote at Town Meeting, after having been heard at two statutory public hearings (January 14 and February 4). Three of these amendments were adopted, to wit:

sometimes discriminatory, provision for the acquiring of abutters' signatures in order to place a structure closer than fifty feet to a lot line. The amended article is now equally applicable to all.

Article 5A - Zoning District Regulations

This amendment removed the implication that home occupations in the Village Zone are restricted to the confines of the domicile structure only.

Article 5A - Zoning District Regulations

This amendment removed retail stores from the "Permitted Use" category in the Rural Zone to the more restrictive classification of "Special Exception."

An amendment which proposed the instituting of an Occupancy Permit requirement for all new structures was defeated.

Amendments to the Subdivision Regulations were voted by the Planning Board after the required statutory public hearings. Although some of these changes are considered to be administrative and relatively minor, those of greatest import provide for better control of the responsibility of the improvement and/or reconstruction of Class V and VI roads on which subdivisions may be located, and provide for better control of the location of scattered or premature subdivisions.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment is a five member board appointed by the Selectmen. It acts under the provisions of Chapter 31:60-89 New Hampshire Statutes annotated 1955 and amended thereto, as well as the Town of Francestown Zoning Ordinance as amended through March 1977.

The Board held fifteen public hearings during 1977. Most of the cases dealt with setback clearances. Two cases were denied, two cases were granted with restrictions. One case on a reappeal was denied which resulted in the Board being included in litigation over the case. One dealt with a special exemption as provided in the Ordinance and it was granted.

It is the policy of the Board to inspect the sites involved in order to supplement the testimony presented at the hearings. As above stated, in certain cases it was necessary to attach conditions relating to the decision.

In addition to the public hearings the Board held eleven executive sessions.

Recommendations were also made to the Planning Board for suggested changes to the ordinance for their consideration as possible amendments.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Advisory Committee reviewed a variety of matters pertaining to the construction and proper maintenance of town roads. The concluding recommendations of its report to the Selectmen were as follows:

"4. Suggested remedial action:

A. The selectmen either by themselves or through a special road committee appointed by them may:

1. Prepare an index of existing town maintained roads;

2. Prepare an article in proper form for the town warrant clearly abandoning all other roads in which the town may have an interest and adopting the inventory of existing town maintained roads;

3. Prepare a method, policy or by-law by coordinating an up-to-date town road inventory and standards with the Planning Board.

B. Review with the Planning Board the advisability of amending the Subdivision Ordinance in the light of the information contained in this report for additional protection against a costly road expense being suddenly forced on the town by development for residential uses."

WASTE DISPOSAL COMMISSION

As of July 1, 1977, it was illegal to have open dumping and burning of refuse at the Francestown Dump. We hired the Community Sanitation Service of Peterborough to transport our disposal waste to the Antrim-Bennington-Francestown Sanitary landfill site on a twice-weekly basis. This operation has had a mixed degree of success and failure. We were unable to use Ken's Sanitation Service as proposed in last year's Town Report because the Sanitary Landfill hours did not adjust to Ken's service program. We hesitated to add extra equipment and service on the few peak days because of the sizable increase in costs. Also we are of the opinion that our proposed recycling program can reduce the total amount of disposable waste that goes to Bennington, even though the number of families moving here is increasing rapidly.

As of January 3, 1978, recycling operations have begun on a voluntary basis at the Dump. Each family in Francestown has received a letter to this effect and a pamphlet of instructions. We will have an attendant, John Farrar, on hand during normal working hours to assist you in cooperating on this program.

Because we were unable to complete the regrading operation before winter weather set in, we have made temporary provisions for housing of the new attendant, and the location of a vehicle for storing paper and cardboard out of the weather; also, a place for containers for the glass and tin is provided. We hope to build in the Spring, using some of the money voted last year, a more attractive shelter and storage bin complex. This building will be flexible as to size so that we may keep pace with the growth, interest and cooperation of the families of Francestown in recycling.

We hesitate at this time to place more restrictions on the use of the Town Dump area, because with the cooperation of the families here we sincerely believe that we can keep our costs at a minimum and in line with our town growth and yet realize sizable savings through our Recycling Program.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORIAN

Planning, zoning and subdivisions have been issues throughout the year as increased concern is expressed over the rapid growth of the area. First steps toward a land use study are being made. The population of Francestown (N.H. Office Industrial Development) is estimated at 758, an increase of over 44 percent since 1970. The Selectmen have issued 45 Building Permits, 20 of these for new homes.

In the spring Tenneco, Inc. announced plans for a pipeline for natural gas, from St. Johns, New Brunswick, Canada to Pennsylvania. The route was to cross Francestown and several other Monadnock Region Towns. Opposition to a 50-foot wide swath cutting through scenic and historic areas was immediately expressed by many local citizens and our Selectmen. An ad hoc committee called COPE (Citizens Organized to Protect the Environment) was formed with members, from all walks of life from area towns, following an initial meeting with company officials held in Francestown. William Hansen was elected chairman; monies were raised; and an attorney was hired to go before the Federal Power Commission in Washington with the recommendation that the pipeline might more appropriately be laid along the existing right-of-way of the Public Service Co. This route was later approved by Washington.

A March snowstorm left some local residents without electrical power for several days.

In April Dr. John Maes was named minister of the Community Church after several years in which guest ministers have conducted the Sunday Services. Dr. Maes was installed by the Hillsboro Ass'n. of United Church of Christ at ceremonies held in November with visiting dignitaries throughout New England attending. The Unitarian Church held summer services at the Old Meeting House with Rev. Roberts W. Cummings returning, for the eighth year, to serve as the minister.

In July, lightning was responsible for a fire which destroyed the lift building and machinery which ran the chair-lift at the Crotched Mountain ski area. The lift was replaced and will be operating as usual this winter. The Improvement and Historical Society appointed Eleanor Kiblin temporary curator of the Historical Rooms which were opened on Memorial Weekend after a complete rearrangement of the exhibits, necessitated by the construction of the new Fire Exit from the upper floor. The rooms were open every Wednesday and Saturday afternoon during the summer, with hostesses to greet visitors at these times. Inge Anderson and Connie Varnum opened the rooms to visitors on many, many other occasions. This has been a major contributing factor to the success which we have experienced this year.

During the summer Mr. Charles Parsons of Goffstown contacted the Society in an attempt to locate furniture made in Francestown by Daniel Bixby (1791-1870), Cabinetmaker, and his son, James. Mr. and Mrs. William Triplett were able to help locate a chest of drawers signed by James Bixby, the first positive identification of the work of these men. It is hoped that other pieces will be located and any information would be welcome.

Mr. Parsons gave to the Society Rooms a partial list of items, made by these men, extracted from a Bixby ledger which Winterthur Museum copied on to microfilm. (The N.H. Historical Society also has a copy.)

Other activities of the Improvement and Historical Society include sponsoring the annual Labor Day celebration. This year's parade theme was "Village Life."

Two visits of the Little Red Wagon, also sponsored by the Society, entertained the children on the Common.

Financial help was granted to the Little League Baseball Team. Ed Farhm and Joe Ludwig were coaches this year.

A group of generous citizens donated monies in the total amount of \$10,000 so that the Society could purchase the F.H. Colburn property on Main Street for use as a park (in perpetuity). A committee has been named by President "Dud" Parker to develop a landscape plan for the property.

The Francestown Water and Electric Co. voted to empower their directors to change the Water Co. to either a non-profit corporation (cooperative) or a water district. The Directors prefer the former. Water users elected approximately the same board of directors and have also voted in favor of a non-profit organization if it is possible.

The Directors are actively pursuing this direction by working on the legal requirements for affecting the organizational change. Meanwhile, an engineering study indicates that the water main must be replaced. The present plan of the directors is to borrow money for this purpose as soon as the company's reorganization is complete. Well houses have been replaced on both wells this year.

The Water company was first organized in 1880. The present company was established in 1922.

A Co-operative Kindergarden and Pre-School was organized. Pam Berry is the director and teacher. Classes are held in the basement of the Community Church for kindergarten on three mornings each week and for younger children on two mornings.

A Children's Carnival was held on the Common in August to raise money for the kindergarten.

Two 4-H Clubs have been active this year. Leadership has been provided by Mrs. Donald Hoyt, Mrs. William Triplett and Mrs. Clarence Paige assisted by a number of parents.

Some names in the news: David Carney became the Town's first Eagle Scout at ceremonies held in the Town Hall. Brooks Place was named one of 16 top point winners in the New England Amateur Grand Prix of Tennis. Willis Hadley finished sixth in competition with over 50 of the State's top school bus drivers in a school bus safety rodeo (written as well as road tests were administered).

DOG CONSTABLE'S REPORT

It has been my pleasure to serve as dog constable. This office requires that I be a special police officer, in case some people wondered.

The problems of dogs in town is becoming a big item in our town business and call for a lot of time. One of the major problems are people who move here to the country with the idea that they may let their dog or dogs run at will. This is a falsehood. A dog, as your own child, should have a strong hand of guidance to have them grow to be a respected member of the town. Yes, even some of our dogs in town are good members of the town and have our love and respect.

The pleasure of knowing a few of these dogs that have gone from us this year: such as the Wiederholds' Ursla, Gallops' Goldie, and Rices' Roger are just a few.

If you get a dog, that animal becomes part of your family and should be treated as such. Just because this is the country you may not let him roam at will or he will find trouble.

You should know at all times where your dog is, because it is the common house pet that forms packs, destroys property, preys on game and domestic animals, fowl or even human beings. You, as a dog owner, should know the State Law pertaining to dog ownership, as stated in Chapter 222, H.B. 702, State of New Hampshire, relative to vicious dogs or dogs as a nuisance, which includes:

"Under this section, a dog is considered to be a nuisance, a menace, or vicious to persons or to property under any or all, but not limited to, the following conditions:

(a) If it barks for sustained periods of time, or during the night hours so as to disturb the peace and quiet of a neighborhood or area;

(b) If it digs, scratches, or excretes, or causes waste or garbage to be scattered on property other than its owner's;

(c) If any female dog in season (heat) is permitted to run at large or be off the premises of the owner or keeper during this period except when being exercised on a leash by a responsible adult. At all other times such dog shall be confined within a building or enclosure in such manner that she will not come in contact (except for intentional breeding purposes) with a male dog. A female dog in heat shall not be used for hunting;

(d) If it growls, snaps at, runs after or chases any person or persons;

(e) If it runs after, or chases bicycles, motor vehicles, motorcycles, or other vehicles being driven, pulled or pushed on the streets, highways, or public ways;

(f) If, whether alone or in a pack with other dogs, it bites, attacks, or preys on game animals, domestic animals, fowl or human beings."

As you look upon the behavior of your dog, is he lawful or not?

This year, as of January 1st, was a busy year — four dog complaints, which involved 20 - 30 hours each. These complaints included one in which a dog killed two sheep, one in which dogs were chasing cows to the point of a pack attack during which a young heifer was downed and being mauled, and the worrying and killing of a domestic pet.

The rest of the time I have been taking an average of two to three phone calls a week on lost-and-found dogs either from this town or from other towns in the surrounding area.

The salary I receive is less than ten dollars a week, which is not enough for this job. When you consider toll calls, gas, equipment and other expenses, I have found I'm way in the red and have done it for the uncertain pleasure of it.

The town offers no equipment for this office and all the equipment I have is my own. I do enjoy the office of Dog Constable as I feel I have added a little humane treatment and love and understanding to this position. I hope to serve you another year.

RECREATION COMMISSION

In March 1977 the Selectmen established a Recreation Commission and appointed six people to this new Town board. In addition, special thanks go to Mary Jane Marsden for volunteering her time and energy to the Commission.

Our Commission meets twice a month and, if necessary, more often.

During July and August a Summer Recreation Program was provided for all children in the community between the ages of 6 through 14. It was funded by Southern New Hampshire Services whose offices are located in Bedford, New Hampshire. Because the money came from an outside source, we had very little control or voice in how the program was run. Also, the possibility of being funded again by this organization is very remote.

Our committee sponsored Contra-Dances from June through December and they will begin again in the spring. It was from the proceeds of our first dance that we were able to pay for and mail a newsletter and questionnaire to all townspeople.

A special committee headed by Charles Onasch was appointed to look into the present Scobie Pond Beach situation, as to problems of parking, non-resident use of the beach, etc., plus the possibility of finding a new location for a Town Beach. A report was sent to the Selectmen, including a proposal, asking the town for funds to purchase property on Scobie Pond.

On October 31st a Community Halloween Party was held for children of all ages, parents and other interested people. It was well attended and generated much enthusiasm. Special thanks go to David Carney, the Hansens, Staubs and Bicknells, plus the many other people who made donations or participated in making this party such as success.

On November 7th, Beaver Jutras, Director of the Peterborough Recreation Program, attended our meeting. He offered suggestions and answered questions concerning future programs.

On December 16th, a Community Christmas Party was held. Both the Elementary School and Community Pre-School presented plays and songs. Our committee would like to thank the Improvement Society, Women's Guild, and Sock Darners for their contributions toward the Christmas Party.

We were not funded by the town for 1977, so this limited

what we could do. A proposal has been submitted to the Selectmen, asking the town for a small budget to help pay for a yearly program. This would include plans for a Summer Program which would be run in conjunction with the Library's activities, tennis and swimming lessons and would enable us to continue both the Halloween and Christmas Parties.

The following is a report from the Recreation Commission to the Board of Selectmen, which is the basis for an Article in this year's Town Warrant:

TO: Board of Selectmen Town of Francestown

FROM: Recreation Commission

RE: Report On A Possible New Town Beach

OBJECTIVE: Because of the growth of our town over the last four years (103 persons since 1973), the Recreation Commission set forth to determine if other properties presently available in Francestown offer better alternatives, both long and short range, to the present town beach, which we feel at the present time is totally inadequate to handle the town's population.

AVAILABLE PROPERTIES (real and suspected) SCOBIE POND

- 1. George Foster property
- 2. Wm. Nickerson property
- 3. Mrs. Sipes property

PLEASANT POND

None known to be available of sufficient size to be considered as a potential town beach. **SCOBIE POND**: Of the properties available on Scobie only the Foster piece was deemed possible at first judgment -- price. Since any project in this area would require the Town to issue bonds, it was felt that cost had to be the prime preliminary consideration.

Mrs. Sipes property, 83 acres with considerable lake frontage (500'-600') is on the market with an asking price of \$103,000. Our judgment was that the price was, for the town, excessive and too much acreage was involved to obtain just the waterfront portion.

The Nickerson property, while providing lakefront, is not available at this point in time since the owner plans to sell lakefront property along with the rest of the property as a single piece. He does not plan to break up his holdings.

The George Foster Property. This is a piece approximately 875' along Journey's End Road and about 395' to 580' deep with approximately 825' of lake frontage. A total of 6.9 acres more or less (see attached). There is presently an access road close to the west end of the property that runs from Journey's End Road to the water. This has been graveled and would not require too much work to restore to first-class condition, approximately \$1,000. It is approximately 14' to 18' wide its entire length, and the lake extends out into the water about 20'. At the end of the gravel road there is a partially cleared area that we feel would be suitable for parking. To totally clear this area and gravel it for parking would cost approximately \$1,500. Since the primary consideration of this investigation was to establish the suitability of any (or all) of these properties as bathing beaches, measurements of water depths was undertaken at two distances from the shore: 25 and 50 feet. A total of 10 measurements were taken across the 825' water frontage at both 25' and 50' from the shore. In no instance was the water depth over 3 feet, generally less, about 2'4" or so. Several measurements were made at the extreme outside edge of the weed growth -- probably 125' to 150' from shore -- and the greatest depth measured was 5 feet.

THE FOSTER PROPERTY SPECIFICS:

Total Asking Price: \$47,000.00, one-half down (\$23,500) and the balance in two equal annual payments at 8 percent interest.

Approximate Costs: Road - \$1,000.00

Parking - \$1,500.00

Sand for Beach - \$750 (this is for a beach size of 60 feet long and 20 feet deep and includes spreading of the sand.)

Initial Cost to the Town: \$26,750.00 - approximately.

- Pluses: 1. 825' of water frontage on Scobie Pond.
 - 2. Existing road already cleared to water front.
 - 3. 875' of road frontage.
 - 4. Ample space for parking.
 - 5. Ample space for other town activities.
- Minuses: 1. WETLAND: We have been unable to determine the actual amount of wetland on this property. Because of the cost involved, we suggest that the Selectmen, before making an offer, look into this problem

2. IMPROVEMENT TO JOURNEY'S END ROAD: If the Town votes to purchase Mr. Foster's property, we suggest that the Selectmen look into the problem of Journey's End Road, for it is now only able to handle traffic in one direction.

3. WEEDS AND DEPTH OF WATER: Because of the heavy growth of weeds along the the shore it definitely needs to be cleared. However, we feel that the only economical solution is to have a group of concerned citizens hand clear the water's edge. The depth of the shore line is something that would be good for the children.

CONCLUSION: The Francestown Recreation Commission unanimously recommends that the Town of Francestown vote to purchase the George Foster Property, and make said improvements on same, for a possible new town beach.

BOARD OF HIGHWAY SAFETY

Early in the year the Francestown Highway Safety Committee got off to a good start. On April 14th the committee met with David H. Deans, Field Representative for the Highway Safety Agency for the State of New Hampshire. Later in April Mr. Deans accompanied the committee on a survey of the town's 40-odd miles of highways.

On May 25th Mr. Henry D. Brinn, Municipal Traffic Operations Engineer from the State of New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways accompanied the committee on a second survey of Francestown highways. The following criticisms were made by both Mr. Deans and Mr. Brinn:

- 1. Some stop signs improperly placed
- 2. Wrong heighth for some signs
- 3. Some signs obscured by foliage
- 4. Some signs tipped over
- 5. Lack of a sign where there should be one
- 6. Need to correct bridge approach signs

After the surveys were made, the above criticisms evaluated, and with the approval of the Selectmen, the committee purchased \$437.00 worth of signs, posts and markers. The purchase was made direct from the State at State costs. This means a substantial saving of Town funds. Further savings were made in purchasing much needed radar equipment for the police cruiser.

The committee, accompanied by both Mr. Deans and Mr. Brinn looked at the possible hazards to safety connected with two bridges, the Russell Station Road bridge and the bridge on Old County Road - North. Criticism of the Russell Station Road bridge and the Old County Road bridge by both Mr. Deans and Mr. Brinn:

The Russell Station Road Bridge:

- 1. Too narrow for today's travel
- 2. Under structure of the bridge very poor

3. The north side approach dangerous

The County Road Bridge - North:

- 1. Considered too narrow
- 2. Approaches good
- 3. Abutments, girders and planking seemed to be in pretty good shape. It was thought that this bridge could go for some time, but plans should be laid for improvements in the near future.

Other recommendations were submitted to the Highway Department covering such things as blind corners, badly eroded areas, bad culverts, etc.

The Safety Committee will continue to work hard to make the town's highways safer. Highway safety is not only the business of police departments and committees but the business of every person who drives a car. Posted speed limits and markers are of little value if they are continually ignored. Let us all be concerned with Highway Safety.


As of this date, the inventory has not been completed, and therefore no action is recommended at this time.
