

GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION

County Farm Haverhill, N. H. September 9, 1938

Meeting called to order by Chairman E. H. Hunter at 11 o'clock. It was opened by prayer. The clerk called the roll and the following were present: Abraham L. Davis, Adelbert W. Bailey, Harry A. Goodwin, Harris W. Hammond, Willard S. H. Remick, Bertram W. Pulsifer, Joseph L. Graham, Herbert E. Walbridge, Warren A. Remick, Edgar H. Hunter, Clarence L. Bailey, Hormidas J. Brunell, Herbert S. Smith, Harry G. Titus, Harold G. French, Florence W. Hoyt. Joseph B. Perley, James E. Collins, Arthur L. Hamilton, Jacob F. Hildebrand, Charles E. Magoon, Ada A. Soper, Frank H. Bailey, Jed B. Jones, Edgar C. Lufkin, Earl V. Howard, Kenneth G. Bell, Harry A. Merrill, John Z. Taylor, Charles H. Houston, Lester C. Hutchins, Harry D. Sawyer.

Discussion was opened regarding the necessity and cost of new boilers, steam plant, etc. At 12:30 luncheon was announced, and it was moved and so voted that the meeting be adjourned until 1:30. After partaking of a bountiful repast, Chairman Hunter called the meeting to order, and discussion was resumed. Mr. Gadd, for the Commissioners, presented figures on Relief and figures on coal consumpton in the present steam plant.

The Clerk took the Chair while Chairman Hunter had the floor. Mr. Hunter resumed the chair and Mr. Smith of Haverhill moved and Mr. Graham of Canaan seconded the following resolutions:

1. That the County Delegation appropriate a

sum not to exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to purchase and install new boilers and make the necessary repairs and additions to the heating plant at the County Farm.

- 2. That the expenditure of these funds be made under the direction of a Committee to be made up of the Executive Committee of the County Delegation of 1937 and 1938 and the County Commissioners.
- 3. That the County Commissioners be authorized to apply for and accept Federal Funds to supplement the appropriation of the County.
- 4. That the County Commissioners and the County Treasurer be authorized to borrow in the name of the County, either by notes or bonds, such part of this appropriation as is found necessary. The County Commissioners and the Treasurer shall have full authority in issuing these notes or bonds, to determine the terms, and the date of retirement.

Discussion ensued; the question was called for and the motion was carried by a unanimous vote.

Mr. Goodwin moved and Mrs. Hoyt seconded that the meeting adjourn with a rising vote of thanks in appreciation of the County Commissioners' gratifying report on the current finances of the County. The motion was carried and the meeting adjourned subject to call from the Chair.

REPORT OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire the Commissioners of Grafton County herewith present the annual report of the Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditors, Superintendent of County Farm, Jailer, Clerk of Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Chaplain, Physician and Farm Bureau.

Again the Treasurer has succeeded in collecting

all county taxes for the year 1938.

The number of weeks board furnished county inmates at the County Farm, including the Hospital, House of Correction and Jail for the year 1938 was 6060 weeks and 6 days whereas 1937 was 6112 weeks and 5 days or a decrease of 51 weeks and 6 days. The per capita cost was \$7.25 per week as compared with a cost of \$5.77 per week for 1937 or an increase of \$1.48 per week. This increase is due to the hurricane of September 21, whereby the buildings were damaged to an actual outlay of approximately \$1400.00; also damage to farm crops as shown in the Superintendent's report. The Hospital has been taxed to capacity which incurred heavy expenses. The number of births during 1938 was 31 as compared to 20 for 1937. The number of operations was 86 for 1938 as compared with 62 for 1937. The number of deaths was 35 as compared with 32 for 1937. There was also a decrease of approximately \$2000.00 in receipts at the farm.

Taking care of the Poor not on the Farm including Old Age Assistance, Needy Blind and Boarded Children for the year 1938 cost \$149,454.39 gross. Of this amount we received reimbursement of \$18,538.90 from the State of New Hampshire, Towns and other Counties making a net cost of \$130,915.49. This compares with the gross cost of \$125,879.56 for the year 1937 and a reimbursement of \$34,076.42 leaving a net cost of \$91,803.14 for the year 1937. This makes a substantial increase over 1937 of \$39,112.35 and is a direct expense to the tax payers of

Grafton County.

On September 9, 1938 there was a special meeting of the Grafton County Delegation for the purpose of discussing changes in the heating plant at the Grafton County Farm. At this meeting the Delegation appropriated a sum not to exceed \$20,000.00 to install new boilers and make necessary repairs and additions to the present heating plant, which was in a very bad physical condition; the expenditure of these funds to be made under the direction of a committee to be made up of the executive committee of the County Delegation and the County Commissioners.

They further authorized the Commissioners to apply for and accept Federal funds to supplement the appropriation of the County. The Commissioners have been successful in obtaining the Federal grant. The contract has been let and work is going forward. The total cost to the County of this project should not exceed \$13,000.00 and should be a direct saving to the tax payers of the County of at least \$10,000.00.

Under the present law the towns, cities and counties have to assume 100% of direct relief costs. Therefore in our opinion direct taxes will increase

materially.

The Commissioners wish to extend their thanks to Mr. and Mrs. J. Earl Andrews, Superintendent and Matron, and all other employees for the faithful and efficient manner in which they performed their duties.

The Commissioners further wish to extend their thanks to the various County and Town officers and all others for their assistance in carrying on the work

of the County.

The Commissioners extend to the people of the County of Grafton and the public in general a hearty and sincere invitation to visit and inspect the Grafton County Farm. The former are especially urged to do so as it is their Farm and an institution in which they alone should be interested.

SELECTMEN OF TOWN AND OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

Your attention is called to the following extracts from the laws of 1903:

CHAPTER 42, SECTION 1

SECTION 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such persons the sum or sums paid out for such assistance the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration, provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his decease.

CHAPTER 106, SECTION 1, as amended

SECTION 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement, shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he resides in said town.

ASSISTANCE TO PERSONS IN QUARANTINE: PUBLIC STATUTES, CHAPTER 110, Following SECTION 6

SECTION 1. Whenever any person or family is placed in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public against small pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other dangerous, infectious or contagious disease, it shall be the duty of said board to assist such person or family while in quarantine in such

manner as in the judgment of the board may be deemed wise and necessary.

SECTION 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part thereof as the board may determine, shall be deemed a legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public health and shall be charged to the account of incidental expenses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the person or persons so quarantined and assisted unless such person or persons are already paupers as defined by the Public Statutes.

1938 proved to be a discouraging year to many farmers in this vicinity and Grafton County Farm was no exception.

The first part of the year was given to the regular farm work and improvements, but the fall was taken up entirely with repairing damages caused by the September hurricane. This necessitated a large expenditure of labor and money, as several sheds were blown down and extensive damage was done to roofs on house and barns. A large quantity of timber was also blown down and is being hauled to mill and to French's Pond this winter.

Army worms ruined the oat crop and high water destroyed the potato, bean and part of corn crops. The replacement of these damages increased our yearly expenses making our per capita rate higher than for several years.

As always, our outside friends have donated books, magazines, clothing, candy, flowers and many other gifts which have given much pleasure and are fully appreciated.

We have received the usual cooperation and helpfulness from the Commissioners, Physician, Chaplain, Employees and to them we extend our thanks.

During this time, I have officiated at seven funerals, held with one exception in the attractive chapel.

REPORT OF COUNTY PHYSICIAN

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I herewith submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1938:

During the past year the Hospital has been of more service to the County than ever before and its usefulness is steadily increasing.

The institution has been fortunate in that it has been entirely free from contagious disease during the year, which is a condition much desired but seldom evaluated, particularly where so many individuals are living in one building.

It has required constant supervision by the management and those working under them to provide nourishing food, sufficient heat and ventilation for so many patients and inmates, many of whom because of physical or mental incapacity have required a great deal of individual attention.

A Timer has been added to our X-ray machine which greatly improves its usefulness.

The nursing staff composed of three graduate nurses and two orderlies, have contrived to care for an average of 33 patients daily, and their work has been characterized by sympathy and kindness which is particularly desirable in any County Hospital. Mrs. Christina Clark is our head nurse and she has the supervision of all nursing. Mrs. Lamotte is day nurse and Miss Shortsleeves night nurse. Mrs. MacDonald and Mr. Young continue on as orderlies.

I gratefully acknowledge the valuable counsel of the Commissioners, the cooperation of the management and the assistance of all connected with the work of the institution.

SUMMARY OF FARM ACCOUNTS OF GRAFTON COUNTY FARM FOR 1938

This is the seventh year a complete set of farm accounts, separate from the regular Institution accounts, has been kept. All products produced on the farm and used by the Institution are charged at market prices, which together with all sales off the farm make up the farm income. The expenses include all regularly employed farm labor, all House of Correction labor when used on the farm, supervision, taxes, insurance, and all the usual items of farm expense, as feed, livestock, machinery, seeds, fertilizer, etc.

No account has been made of the fact that the farm serves as a source of high quality farm products of all kinds for all who live at the Grafton County Farm, that the farm provides labor for the House of Correction inmates, and that a Holstein herd has been developed which serves as a source of disease-free, well-bred dairy stock for the farmers of the county at moderate prices. Thirteen bulls have been sold during the year 1938.

The loss of 1200 bushels of potatoes, 25 bushels of beans, 30 tons of silage, and 25 tons of oat hay due to the hurricane and army worms, and the purchase of a new tractor, ensilage cutter, mowing machine, and cultivator largely accounts for the operating loss of \$2148.38. All other years for which records have been kept show a profit, except one, as follows: 1932 loss, \$333.08; 1933 profit, \$899.55; 1934 profit, \$1424.63; 1935 profit, \$532.60; 1936 profit, \$468.91; 1937 profit, \$470.96.
