To the Inhabitants of the Town of Groton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Groton on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and three years.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as prepared and make appropriations for same.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 3% on property taxes paid on or before August 1st.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of or administer any real estate acquired by tax collector's deed.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for blister rust control and make appropriation for same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid construction and make appropriations for same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to accept T. R. A. for Class V roads and make appropriations for same.

- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for fire fighting equipment and make appropriation for same.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to have state auditors and make appropriations for same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for shutters for Town Hall and make appropriation for same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to buy the place formerly occupied by Arthur Fuller and appropriate money for same.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to make a charge of 20c on all poll taxes not paid on or before Sept. 1.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot System.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to dispose of the blown down tractor house near Gould's either at private sale or by auction.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for street lighting and public buildings and make appropriations for same.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for wiring public buildings for electricity and make appropriations for same.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for record book for trust funds and make appropriation for same.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for blade and wing to be used with truck and make appropriation for same.
 - 21. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of

money for sander for sanding roads in winter and make appropriation for same.

And to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
