TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To bring in your ballots for delegates to the National Conventions.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to make any additions to the electric lighting system and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a piece of land for a cemetery as recommended by the special cemetery committee, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department or take any action relating thereto.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take to provide supervision of the bathing beach during the summer months, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day and Old Home Week, or take any action relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an adequate sum of money for Workmen's Compensation and Public Liability Insurance, or take any action relating thereto.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for Class V roads, raise or set aside the sum of \$725.51, and the State will contribute \$2,902.06 or accept State aid for construction of Class II roads, raise the sum of \$3,000.00 and the State will contribute \$7,000.00, or take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take for extending or making replacements to the water system, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$80.00 to the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts or legacies left in Trust for use of the Town or take any action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of one percent on property taxes paid on or before July 15th, 1940, or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to publishing Vital Statistics in the Annual Town Reports, or take any action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 17. To see what action the Town will take relative to Flood Control in the Upper Contoocook Valley.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relating thereto.
- 19. To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and take any action relating thereto.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMITTEE

New customers added to the lines during the past year include Fred Green, Howard Dorry, Walter Dutton, Conrad Larson, Frank Moses, Dennis Hutchinson, Robert Claffin and Karl Upton.

Total income for the year amounted to \$4,799.16.

The rebuilding of the main line from West Peterborough to the village and addition of a fourth wire as voted at the last annual meeting has been completed and has resulted in higher voltage and much improved service. The expense of this reconstruction was much more than we anticipated due principally to the poor condition of the line as a result of the hurricane.

Late last summer, we were notified that there would be three road construction projects on our lines, and a total of 66 poles would have to be moved. This was done as directed by the State and Town Highway Departments. Our department was put to heavy expense to maintain service on the line running toward Stoddard during construction and so far, we have not been reimbursed by the construction company or the State for this extra expense.

All this extra cost, which was unforeseen, has made it necessary for us to use most of the Replacement Fund and also to draw on next year's appropriation in order to pay our bills for work already done.

Some of our lines are still in poor condition due to damage by the hurricane, and we have more work to do to complete the reconstruction caused by road relocation so we are asking for the same appropriation as last year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HANCOCK

I am enclosing with this my sixth annual report, the statistical summary of the Hancock schools for 1938-39, and the report of Miss Margaret E. Harris, School Nurse.

The enrollment for the present school year is 122, as compared with 118 for 1938-39, and 98 for the school year 1937-38.

The opening of the upstairs room in the grade school provided an opportunity to rearrange the grades in groups of two instead of three grades for each teacher.

We were glad to welcome Miss Nellie Welsh back as teacher of grades one and two, after an absence of two years. Mrs. Colby took the room formerly occupied by Mr. Craig's grades where she now teaches grades three and four, and Mr. Craig has grades five and six in the room on the second floor. This arrangement relieved the school of the congestion which had developed during the two preceding years. Now three teachers have 29, 22, and 27 pupils instead of two teachers having 42 and 36 pupils each.

The new fire escape has been installed thus providing an exit for the pupils on the second floor in case the ordinary stairway should become blocked.

The work of this school has been carried on very effectively.

The Hancock High School has maintained its high standing and Miss Manchester is to be commended for the fine work she has done in arousing the interest and co-operation of the students of the junior and senior high school.

We have been saddened by the loss of Mrs. Bertha Ware, who during her term of service on the school board gave cheerfully and unsparingly of her time and strength for the improvement of the Hancock schools.
