TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Hillsboro-Deering High School Auditorium in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Election of officers and balloting on Article 2 will take place between ten o'clock in the forenoon and six o'clock in the afternoon. Article 3 through 31 will be taken up at 7:30 P.M.

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk for one year; Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for three years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; Trustee of Trust Funds for one year; Water Commissioner for Three years; and all other necessary Town Officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town Plan of Hillsborough, New Hampshire in accordance with the proposals of the Planning Board as previously posted and published, Vote by ballot.

Article 3. To hear the reports of the Town Officers to the Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees or other Town Officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers Salaries, Town Officers Expenses, Town Buildings, Street Lighting and all current expenses of the Town.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Thirty Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$130,500.00) for the Department of Public Works, and building, repairing and maintenance of highways, bridges, culverts, sidewalks and sealing.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. R.S.A. 33:7-b et seq., as amended, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate a sum of \$85,000. for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. p1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Notes not to exceed \$85,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. R.S.A. 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Hillsborough and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. p1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 252 (supp), with relation to sidewalks and sewers.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take any and all such action as may be necessary to acquire whatever easements and lands as are required to comply with Order No. 1410, initially issued by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission on July 18, 1968 under the provisions of Laws of 1969, Chapter 149, and subsequently extended. Further, the Selectmen are hereby authorized to employ whatever statutory provisions, including R.S.A. 31:92-a, as are deemed necessary or desirable in order to secure the easements and lands required for the project.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to include a stipulation covering the Waste Water (Sewer) and the Fresh Water systems in the Town of Hillsborough; that hence forth resident non-users will have a tax liability of not more than 25% and the users to be taxed to the sum of 75% of any new systems, and any additions or repairs thereto plus the yearly use will be divided between those attached to the system.

By petition.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed at a public auction, the title to real estate taken by the Town in default or redemption from tax sale.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Hundred, Twenty Dollars (\$1,620.00) as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Central

New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Sewer Department income for the purpose of operating the Sewer Department for the year 1977, and the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) from the Water Department income for the purpose of operating the Water Department for the year 1977, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) to be withdrawn as required, from the Water Sinking Fund for the purpose of improvements in the Water System during 1977, and the sum of Thirty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) to be withdrawn, as required, from the Sewer Sinking Fund for the purpose of improvements in the Sewer System during 1977.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred, Fifty-five Dollars (\$1,355.00) for the purchase of a line painting machine for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of Thirteen Hundred, Fifty-five Dollars (\$1,355.00) for said purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purchase of a vehicle for the Public Works and Highway Departments, and to authorize the withdrawal of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for said purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar quarter in which remuneration paid for such services is less than \$50.00.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant a franchise to erect, install and maintain in, under or over streets, highways, and other public ways of the Town, wires, cable, and other equipment related to the delivery, or enhancement of television signals and other electrical impulses in accordance with New Hampshire Law R.S.A. 53-C:1 (Supp. 1974).

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of alterations to the Community Building for enlargement of the Town Office, and to authorize the withdrawal of Five Thousand, One Hundred Sixty-seven Dollars (\$5,167.00) for said

purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, and the balance to be raised by taxation.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for use in funding of Programs for the Senior Citizens, (those 60 years old and older) and to authorize the withdrawal of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, said amount to be administered under the authority and supervision of a committee appointed by the Board of Selectmen, said committee to be made up of one Selectman, one member of the Park Board, and one Senior Citizen.

By petition.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be applied to a Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Department Equipment.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Forty-two Hundred Dollars (\$4,200.00) for the purchase of a Police Cruiser, and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for the purpose of removing the Town Barn on Hoyt Lane and establish a municipal parking lot in said area, or take any other action relating thereto.

By petition.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred, Ninety-eight Dollars (\$1,398.00) for membership in Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to extend the boundaries of the Historic District of Hillsborough Centre, N.H., this addition to include the land and buildings on the North side of Shedd-Jones Road from Beard Brook Road thence East to the Center Road, thus including the residences of H. F. Judd, D. S. Hatfield, G. Wm. Cottrell and D. Latham, M.D. - the residence of Ralph C. Stuart became a part of the historic district when it was established in March 1975 pursuant to the town and N.H. Statutes Chapter 31 Section 89-a.

By petition.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for a parks and recreation program, and to authorize the withdrawal of

Five Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$5,800.00) for said purpose under the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, and the balance to be raised by taxation.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand, Fifty-seven Dollars (\$1,057.00) to aid Concord Hospital in Concord, New Hampshire.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$950.00) for the support of Band Concerts for the coming season.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town and in anticipation of taxes.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty-two Thousand, Nine Hundred Twelve Dollars and fifty cents (\$22,912.50) for the purpose of paying the balance due on the Contract with Planning Maps, Inc. for a Tax Map for the Town of Hillsborough, Sixteen Thousand, Four Hundred Twelve Dollars and Ninety-one cents (\$16,412.91) plus accrued interest, to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund established for said purpose, and the balance to be raised by taxation.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred, Twenty-five Dollars (\$1,325.00) for membership in Contoocook Valley Mental Health Center, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Most department budgets were kept at a 5% increase over last year's appropriation and capital expenditures are less than last year. The total budget shows an increase of approximately \$15,000. in the amount to be raised by taxes. This amount may change depending on the vote on appropriation articles at the Town Meeting. School budget figures show a reasonably moderate increase and hopefully the County Budget will be kept in check this year. If So, there should be very little if any, increase in the 1977 tax rate.

Funds for Step II (final plans) on the sewer project are being requested. The total appropriation by the Town includes the State share but not the 75% paid by the Federal Government. It is our intention to move to raise \$17,000. by taxation and borrow the balance by Serial Notes if necessary in this tax year. The State's share will be reimbursed to the Town in the same year that the Town pays its portion.

The Town Office needs to be enlarged to allow room for the files, maps and other material for the Town Tax Map as well as space for additional files for the present operation. The estimate given by a local contractor to move some piping; fix floors, ceilings and walls; install a firewall next to the furnace; and electrical is \$10,000. Of this, \$5,167. is planned to come from Revenue Sharing and the balance, \$4,833., to be raised by taxation. The work will, of course, be put out to bid.

Through a tip from the Animal Control Officer, contact was made to the proper authorities for the acquisition of surplus military equipment. At the present time we have five trucks, one utility trailer, five radios, a quantity of wrenches, battery charger, plow, auxiliary generator for the Fire and Police Station, welder and compressor.

Two people who have been associated with the Town Office for many years are leaving as of Town Meeting. Town Treasurer, Margaret Metzger, has decided not to seek reelection due to a heavier work load in her other employment and Walter Taft has firmly requested that he be relieved of his duties in the Town Office. Both have served this Town well over the past many years.

HILLSBORO CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During 1976 your Conservation Commission did the following things.

One: We continued work on our tree nursery, which is located on ground made available to us by Fox Forest. Thanks to the generosity of the officials at Fox Forest, donors of seedlings, help and advice from Dr. Henry Baldwin, and muscle power from members of the Commission and their friends, the nursery is thriving. We expect that this spring's tree planting program will include some of our nursery trees.

Two: We carried out our annual tree-planting program. Last year we planted eight street trees. This brings to sixty the number of trees we have planted along the streets of Hillsboro since the program was started in 1971. It may interest citizens of Hillsboro to know that for one year a neighboring town raised and spent \$500.00 for eight sugar maples to be planted in their town. Thanks to the board of directors of the old Hillsboro-Deering Fish and Game Club and some generous (and anonymous) donors, Hillsboro's trees have cost the town nothing. The hard work involved was provided by a few interested and public-spirited citizens. We thank them all.

This year we will continue this program. We have already received some requests and can probably handle a few more. With our nursery coming along we expect to be able to do more this year than last.

Three: Early last year we learned of recent developments in the fight against Dutch Elm disease. With the help and advice of the Elm Research Institute in Harrisville we started our own program. We bought an injector and a supply of the newly-developed fungicide which, we are told, can save elms not too badly infected with the blight. We treated 20 trees (two injections per tree, about a week apart). Some of the trees we treated were 'street trees', and some were on private property. Many of the owners of 'private' trees gave a donation to the Commission which was used to help defray the cost of the fungicide and the injector. If the treated trees leaf out next spring we plan to continue and expand the program. Each tree treated last year will receive its annual injection (one) and we will handle as many new ones as we can manage. If tree owners are as generous this year as last, we can carry on our expanded program at no additional cost to the town.

Four: We supervised the regular annual 'Town Clean-Up Day' on May 9. We were this year, as we have been in the past, lucky with weather, and more than 200 people with more than 90 trucks left Grimes Field by 9:30 A.M. on a

beautiful Sunday morning. By noon the trash collected from along the town roads was delivered to the land-fill. The town was by evening much cleaner than it had been in the morning. In the name of the town, we wish to thank all who took part. George McNally, who was a principal organizer of the first Clean-Up, again provided the plastic bags used to collect the trash. Thank you again, George. This year's Clean-Up is scheduled for May 15. We will be making announcements about it (watch the Messenger) as the time approaches.

Five: On June 17 we conducted a guided tour of the River Walk for a group of Senior Citizens.

Six: Having received no requests from Hillsboro residents for classification of roads as 'Scenic Roads', the Commission is not asking the town so to designate any roads this year.

Seven: We received three applications for dredge and fill. Each site was inspected and our recommendations sent to the N.H. Water Resources Board.

Eight: The town-owned areas on Beard's Brook (near Gleason Falls) at House Rock, and the River Walk were policed during the year, and remain available to the public.

Nine: This year we have a major development to announce in the field of land acquisition. Some time ago the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department started a project in the area of Hillsboro known as Farrar Bog. They planned to buy approximately 300 acres of wetland draining Sand Brook, raise and improve an existing dam, and manage the tract for the benefit of wildlife. It would provide a fine breeding ground for water fowl, as well as ideal habitat for the many species of fish and animals that thrive in and near marshland.

The Fish and Game Department had the land acquisition program well under way when hard times dried up their funds, and the State of New Hampshire directed them to stop buying land. At the time of the freeze they had bought between half and two thirds of the property they planned to acquire.

Your Conservation Commission had been enthusiastic about this program from the beginning, and we were disappointed when it came to a halt. After discussing the matter with the Fish and Game people over a long period of time, we found a way we could help get the project going again.

The arrangement we worked out was this. The Fish and Game Department would negotiate to buy the land. When terms were agreed to, we would send a check to Fish and Game for 25% of the agreed price. The Fish and Game Department would then apply for funds from the Federal Gov-

ernment, under the Pitman-Robinson Act, to pay the balance.

We are happy to announce that the purchase of the necessary land project has been completed except for some legal work necessary to clear up questions of title on a portion of the property. Our land acquisition fund has been sufficient to carry us through this procedure and to pay for the legal fees we expect. As a result of our efforts, a valuable area of approximately 300 acres is secured for public and ecologically desirable use. The area will be professionally managed for the benefit of wildlife of all kinds, and hikers, bird-watchers, hunters and fishermen will all share in the benefits of having such an area in our town.

As we mentioned before, our land acquisition fund has survived the strain so far, and we have no project in mind now that will exhaust it. Therefore this year, for the third successive year, we have decided not to ask for an appropriation for land acquisition. Probably by next year we will decide the fund needs padding again, but that is next year. This year we think we have enough.

Our meetings are usually held on the second Wednesday of each month, at 7:30 P.M. in the Community Center. The meetings are open to the public. We will welcome anyone who wishes to come, and any member will be happy to answer any questions anyone may have as to what we are doing and why.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

CENTRAL N. H. REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

At the end of 1976 and six years of operation, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission had completed several studies of a regional as well as a local assistance nature.

During 1976 the Commission completed the following studies: an historic preservation report listing significant historic sites by community, a community facilities inventory for each community, a study outlining the impact of institutional tax exempt properties within each community. Currently the Commission is preparing a future land use study, a housing needs update study and an economic base study, all from a regional perspective.

During the year the Commission delivered a set of 9 x 9 aerial photographs of the Town to the Planning Board for their use.

During September and October of 1976 the Commission co-sponsored a series of seminars dealing with the legal aspects of planning. These seminars were heavily attended and hopes are that they may be continued at a future date.

In addition, the Commission met with the Selectmen and Planning Board on several occasions during the year to discuss the assistance available and to answer specific questions dealing with state laws and local regulations. The Commission also provided assistance to the Park Board in developing a plan for Grimes Field as well as assisting the Public Works Department in developing a road classification map.

The Commission hopes to be able to continue to serve the needs of its member communities in future years and greatly appreciates the past support of its activities by the Town of Hillsborough.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

As a result of this Commission's preparations for the 1976 Bicentennial, the cast metal sign "Colonial Grant" a New Hampshire Historical Marker was received and installed by the State Highway Department. This sign was located in a straight section of the State Road to eliminate any traffic hazard and take advantage of parking space in front of the "Old Centre School" and the "Club House". Application was made and "Historic Marker Ahead" signs were installed at approach locations on Dunbar Hill and on Meeting House Hill.

Contacts were maintained with National Trust for Historic Preservation, participation in State preservation "Work Shops" was accomplished plus conferences on Historic District area requests for alterations, construction, and repairs were received, inspected, and approved as follows:

Major dredge and fill for earth dam and farm pond on Rev. Gibson orchard property, Withington landscape and fill south of Methodist Church, landscape east of Congregational Church, landscape of Club House grounds, Hingston landscape plans, reinforcement of "frog pond" dam, restriction on mail box concentration in district, petition for extension of Historic District Area, hazardous tree and shrub removal (parting of the ways area), notice to new district resident, application for inclusion in State Directory of historic markers, and security of buildings within the Historic District Area.

A request is being prepared to gain recognition by the U.S. Government of the Hillsborough Historic District as a National Historic Site to make possible acquisition of landmark funds for future maintenance in the district.
