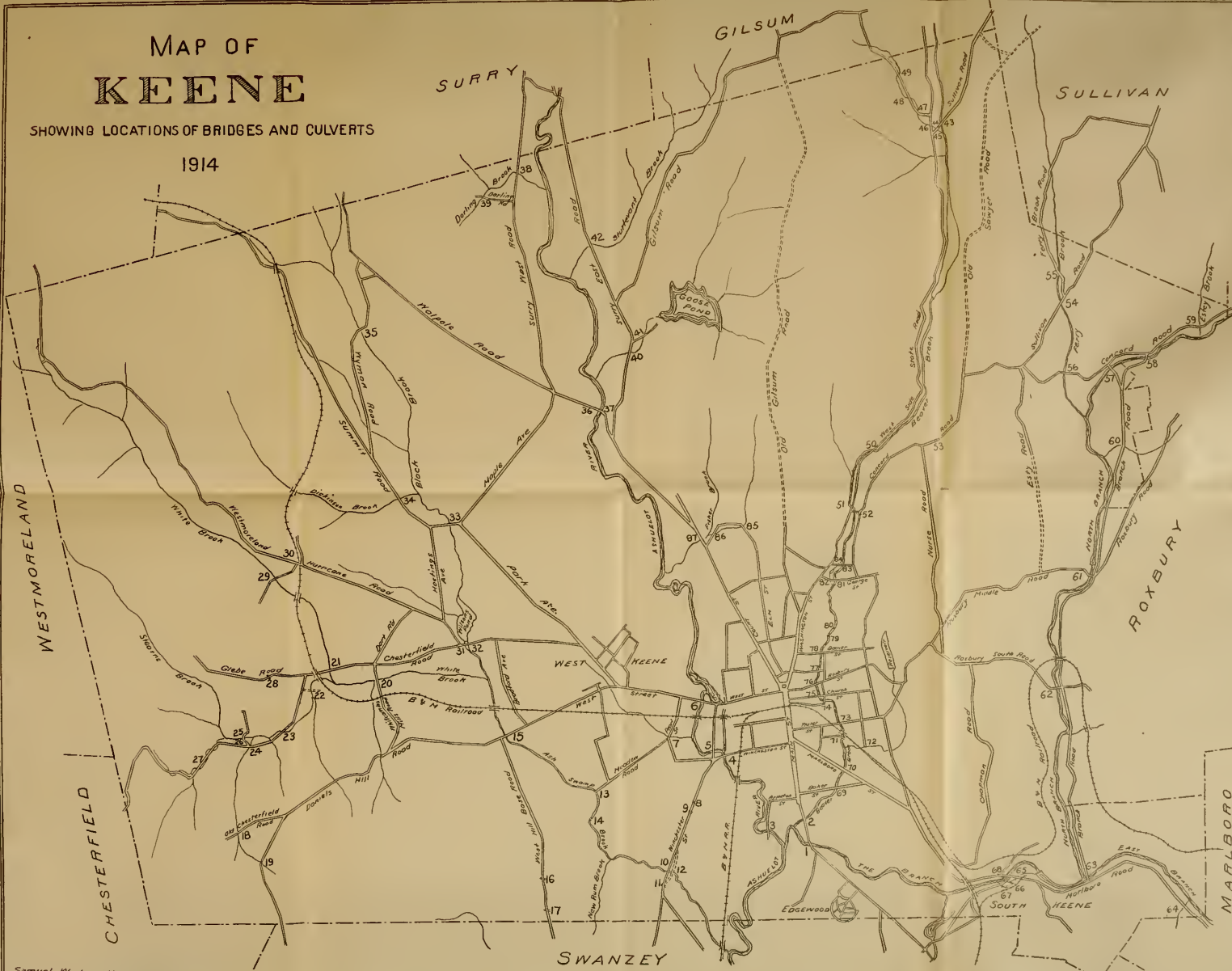

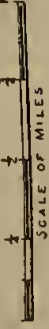


MAP OF KEENE

UPPER ASHUELOT

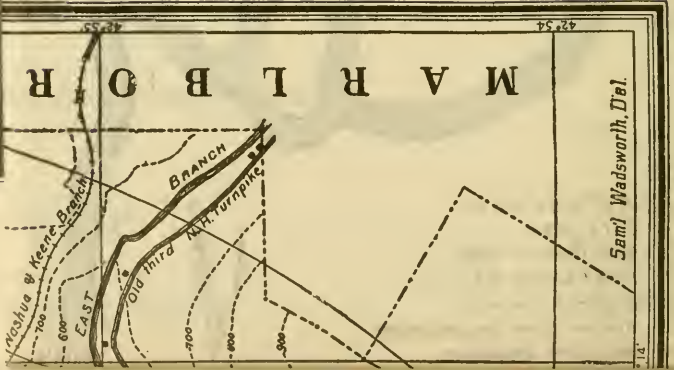

CITY GOVERNMENT

ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, January 3, 1928.

The members of the city government for the municipal year of 1928, having met for organization, agreeably to the provisions of the city charter, the convention was called to order by His Honor Mayor Jones at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Hon. Roy M. Pickard made the announcement that, Arthur R. Jones having been notified of his election to the office of mayor for the current municipal term, was present for the purpose of taking the oath of office. The oath of office was administered by Hon. Roy M. Pickard, who introduced the Mayor to the aldermen and councilmen elect and to the citizens present.

Our Father, at the beginning of a New Year, we come to Thee with thankful hearts, for all of thy manifold blessings. We thank thee for this land which we love. May we be ever mindful of the high ideals and lofty standards which have made this nation what it is. Remind us of our responsibility for the inculcation of these same noble purposes in all of the life and thought of our day.

May the ones, who at this time, take up their duties in the administration of the affairs of our city, remember that they serve Thee, through the service which they render to their fellow men. Grant that all of those in places of authority may look to Thee for wisdom and guidance.

Not alone for these do we ask thy blessing, but for every person in our city. Help every one of us to feel that we have a part in the effort to realize in our midst those things for which our Lord Jesus came to earth. These things we ask in the name of our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

After the prayer Mayor Jones delivered his inaugural address. Frank H. Whitcomb was elected city clerk and Charles S. Wright city messenger, and the councils then adjourned until 7.30 o'clock.

At 7.30 o'clock in the evening the common council organized by the choice of Paul D. Minnick as president and Harry E. Gale clerk.

THE MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Members of the City Councils and Fellow Citizens:

It is gratifying to report for the third consecutive year that the city is in an excellent financial condition and has enjoyed a good, healthy growth.

One of your first and most important duties will call for passage of the budget for the year. The estimated budget will be found on Page 307 of the City Report, which I recommend that you study, so that you may have a clear understanding of it. You will note that several items have been reduced from last year's budget. This does not mean that we are going to curtail work on these items, but that we have unexpended balances from last year.

The City Councils are not responsible for the Union School District Bonds. The councils are responsible for the Water Works Bonds, Highway Bonds, Cheshire County Jail Property Bonds and Fire Station Bonds.

With the ever increasing demand for all kinds of modern improvements and such excellent credit as the city enjoys, it will command all your thought and care to keep from running your city into debt. You will have to exercise due precaution

to distinguish between a public demand and a small group demand with a lot of enthusiasm and demonstration, urging that there is a general demand for this or that.

The city that is going to make the better growth in the future, will be the one with a small bonded debt, a fair valuation and low tax rate, and not one with a big bonded debt and palatial public buildings.

A rounded-out, balanced city that is attractive in every way, with good, well-kept highways and good water and sewer systems and a good school system, will be the more attractive to industry.

I urge that with due care we should be able to reduce taxes this year and at the same time make progress in the way of better highways, sidewalks, sewer and drainage.

I want to call your attention to the important and extensive work that the City Clerk, Mr. Whitecomb, is doing. He has rendered the city a most valuable service during the thirty years he has acted as City Clerk. He has seen the city grow from a \$6,283,854.00 corporation in 1898 to an \$18,988,300.00 corporation of today. His work has multiplied several times during his time of service. The editing of the City Report alone is a big task and requires a good deal of thought and knowledge. You will note that the report of 1927 or this 30th report which Mr. Whitecomb has edited unassisted, contains 548 pages. Mr. Whitecomb has served the city thirty years without any assistance and has done this without a vacation. He has been present at every meeting of the councils during this time.

The time has arrived when the city should provide him with an assistant so that he may not have to work beyond regular hours, and someone should be trained to carry on his work in case of sickness.

I therefore recommend that you create the office of an assistant city clerk to be filled by a young man with clerical training and methodical habits.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

It is my desire that this department be put on a balanced program, whereby we build a certain amount of cement highway and cement sidewalks each year and at the same time improve the roads in the other sections, resurface old walks and build new walks on streets where there are none at present.

During the past year, we completed work on the Concord Road in connection with the state.

We rebuilt, regraded and oiled the following streets: Carpenter, Kingsbury, Upper Elm, Kelleher, Pine and Eastern Avenue.

1.2 miles of cement sidewalks were built, two miles of new sidewalks were constructed on streets that had none, and seventy-six carloads of trap rock were used in resurfacing ten miles of sidewalks. A total of \$5,838.00 was spent on sidewalks last year, in addition to \$8,634.34, the cost of cement walks. This is the largest sum ever spent in any one year on this work. We should do as much more this year as there is nothing which improves the appearance of the city so much as good sidewalks and the people as a whole enjoy them more than any other highway improvement.

I recommend on permanent highway work this year that we use one-half of our appropriation on the Chesterfield Road in connection with the state, the city to pay one-half and the state to pay one-half the cost. One-half of our permanent highway appropriation to be used on cement constructed highway within the city and that all this work shall be done under the direction of the Superintendent of Highways, with local labor, as from past experience we get better work done at a lower cost than when outside contractors do the work.

During the past two years the Concord Road was built in connection with the state, each paying one-half the cost. This work was done under the direction of Superintendent Wallace, at a saving of 20% of the price the state estimated and would have been willing to have contracted for.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

We should be proud of our Fire Department with the record they made during the past year, responding to 253 alarms, with a total fire loss of only \$15,682.74, which is a record the members of this department can be justly proud of. They are to be congratulated for the excellent manner in which they handled the fires the past year.

The equipment is modern and is kept in excellent condition. The only additional equipment I would recommend at this time is the purchase of a Foam Generator, to be used in case of oil or gasoline fires. With the large quantities of oil and gasoline stored in the city, we should be ready to fight such a fire.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The work of this department is increasing from year to year and the department should have the whole-hearted cooperation and support of every citizen.

With the ever-increasing traffic problem, I recommend that our police authorities confer with the other police and town authorities in the state and see whether it is not possible to get a uniform traffic regulation throughout the state. With each town or city putting in different traffic regulations, it is a problem that is very annoying to the traveling public. In the past it was all right to have our local traffic regulations, but with the general use of the automobile, we should make our traffic regulations through the state as uniform as possible.

WATER-SEWER-DRAIN DEPARTMENT

This department is in excellent condition and will not require any unusual out-lay of money this year. During the past two years we have extended water and sewer mains to most of the sections of the city that were neglected in the past, so that today almost every part of the city is provided with both water and sewer services. I would recommend that we extend

both services to the new developments as soon as we are assured that they are needed.

About three miles of pipe of the 12 in. water main from the Stone Dam to Eastern Avenue, was cleaned last year, with a result that its carrying capacity was increased by 700,000 to 800,000 gallons per 24 hours.

We should clean some part of the water mains each year, in order to have water in volume in case of a big fire.

At the present time the city uses 1,800,000 gallons of water a day. If it were necessary, the present water mains would supply 3,000,000 gallons a day or enough water to supply a city double our present population.

AIRPORT

While the city cannot legally spend money for an aviation field, we should give thought to this mode of travel, as it will be but a few years before the aeroplane will be in common use, when it will be as essential to provide a landing field for aeroplanes as it is to provide good roads for automobiles today.

PARKS

We should give more thought to our public parks, particularly Fuller Park, which should be developed into one of Keene's beauty spots.

The beautifying of our city should have the approval and even the interest of every citizen. If we have this, we can make Keene a much more attractive city than it is. The citizens as a whole can help by removing all signs from their property and see that none are allowed on trees and poles on their property next to the traveled way. Those in the highways the city can and should remove, as there is nothing that detracts more from the appearance of a city than unsightly advertisement signs along the highways.

During the past year the city planted about 150 young elm trees in streets that had recently been developed, and we should continue this policy.

I would ask the people in the sections where trees are planted to take an interest and protect these young trees, as there is nothing that adds more to our beautiful city than trees.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

It should be gratifying to the people that since the filter system was installed by the water department and the sewer system extended to all the thickly settled sections of the city, the health of the entire population of the city has improved, as shown by the health officers' report.

With the collection of garbage by the city, as provided Aug. 8, 1926 by the City Councils, it should make Keene one of the healthiest cities in the state.

The City has endeavored by ordinances against fishing to protect its water supply from pollution. This effort has not proven wholly effective. If the present ordinance cannot be enforced, I recommend that an attempt, be made by petition to the Fish & Game Commission to close against fishing all sources of our water supply.

NEW CEMETERY

The Committee on Burial Ground report that it will be necessary for the city to buy additional land for burial purposes within two years.

REMODELING CITY HALL

There are two reasons why the City Hall should be remodelled.

First, it is inadequate and inconveniently arranged for the city business which is now done in it.

In this connecton the Mayor can now have no privacy when consulting with department heads or committees and has to provide office quarters elsewhere with clerical equipment for

the transaction of the city's business with which he is concerned.

There is no reason why the people of Keene should expect their Mayor to provide such quarters. During the past two years I have been more than pleased to do this, but I do not feel that the city should impose upon the chief executive by having him provide quarters in order to transact the city's business in a businesslike manner.

Second: There is a public demand for a comfort station. The City Councils have been petitioned by practically every organization in the city, demanding it. Realizing both needs and after due thought and consideration, they decided the past year that it would be best to provide both together.

With this in view, they have submitted for your approval, plans that show how the building may be conveniently remodeled for both purposes and the cost.

There are three things which the councils and the voters should have foremost in their minds when considering this matter, namely, whether you will build a new city building, whether you will remodel your present building, or whether you will do nothing at all.

Public opinion seems more or less divided at the present time. There are a few things in connection with the remodeling plan that I feel as chief executive I should bring to your attention. First: In the City Hall, the city has one of the most valuable building lots around the square. If I am correctly informed, it is the second largest area bordering on the square; being exceeded only by the Cheshire House lot. This makes it very valuable.

Some advocates of a new City Hall primarily have one of two things in view—to sell the city a piece of property for a new City Hall, or to buy this valuable piece of property at what would seem like a fair price, but which in reality would be very cheap. The city would be very unwise to sell this property at this time, as we all have faith in Keene and that it is going to

grow. Now if Keene does grow, as we all hope and anticipate in the future this property will be worth a good many thousand dollars more to sell then, than now, and the city in a future sale would be repaid for the expense of the proposed remodeling.

There are other people who are sincere in their belief that Keene should have a new City Hall. They seem to overlook the fact that when Keene builds a new City Hall and goes into larger quarters as would be the situation, overhead expenses will be substantially increased and the question is, with all of the other demands for public improvements which the people are making and have the privilege of enjoying every day, whether it is wise to make a large bonded debt for a municipal building that will be more ornamental than useful.

Criticism of the plan for remodeling has become somewhat intense on the part of some of its opponents, and even the good faith of the members of the councils has been attacked.

The suggestion that the public is being deceived or kept in the dark does not call for denial, but it does call for attention in showing the animosity behind the criticism and leads to the inquiry what is behind it.

CONCLUSION

When you were elected to your respective offices, you were chosen to manage the city's business. In order that you may do your whole duty and that you may serve your city best, you should be open-minded on all questions. Do not act with a prejudiced mind, but study both sides of the question. If you don't do this, it will interfere with the orderly conduct of the city's business.

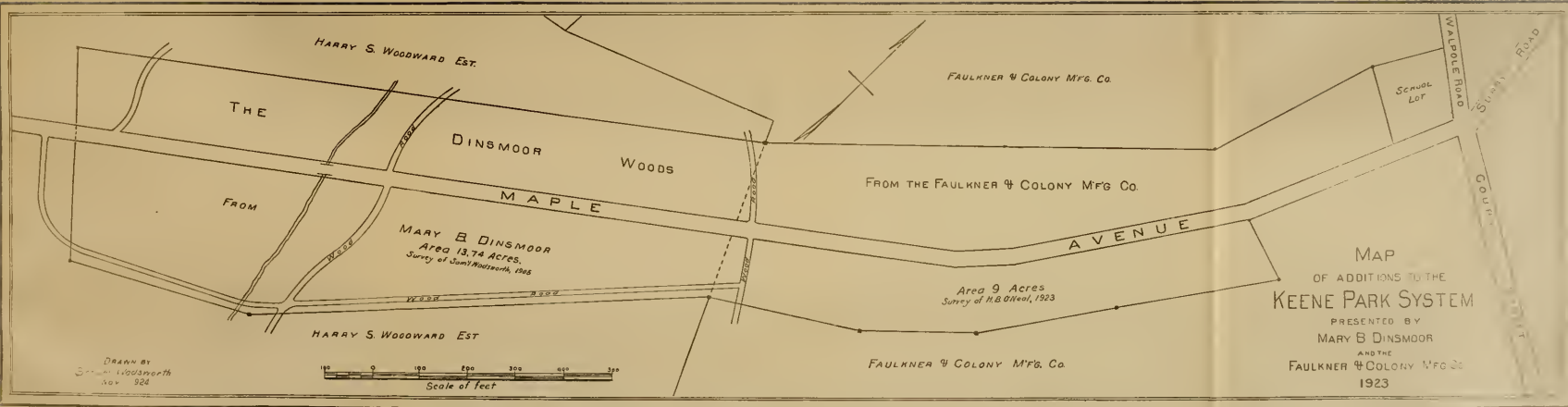

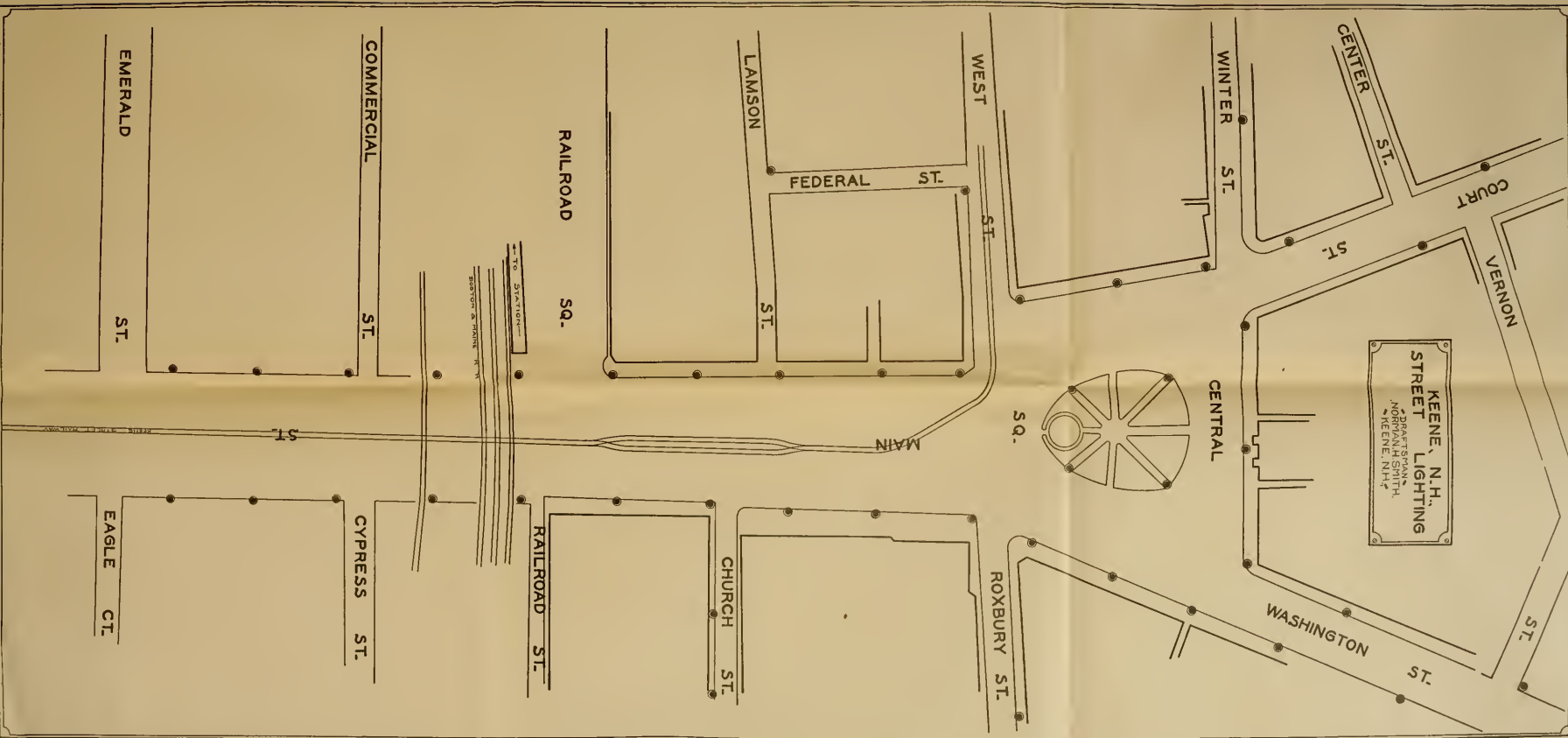

1733.—On April 20, a committee was appointed by the House of Representatives of the Province of Massachusetts, to which this part of New Hampshire was supposed to belong, and approved by Gov. Belcher and the Council, to lay out two townships on the Ashuelot river above Northfield.

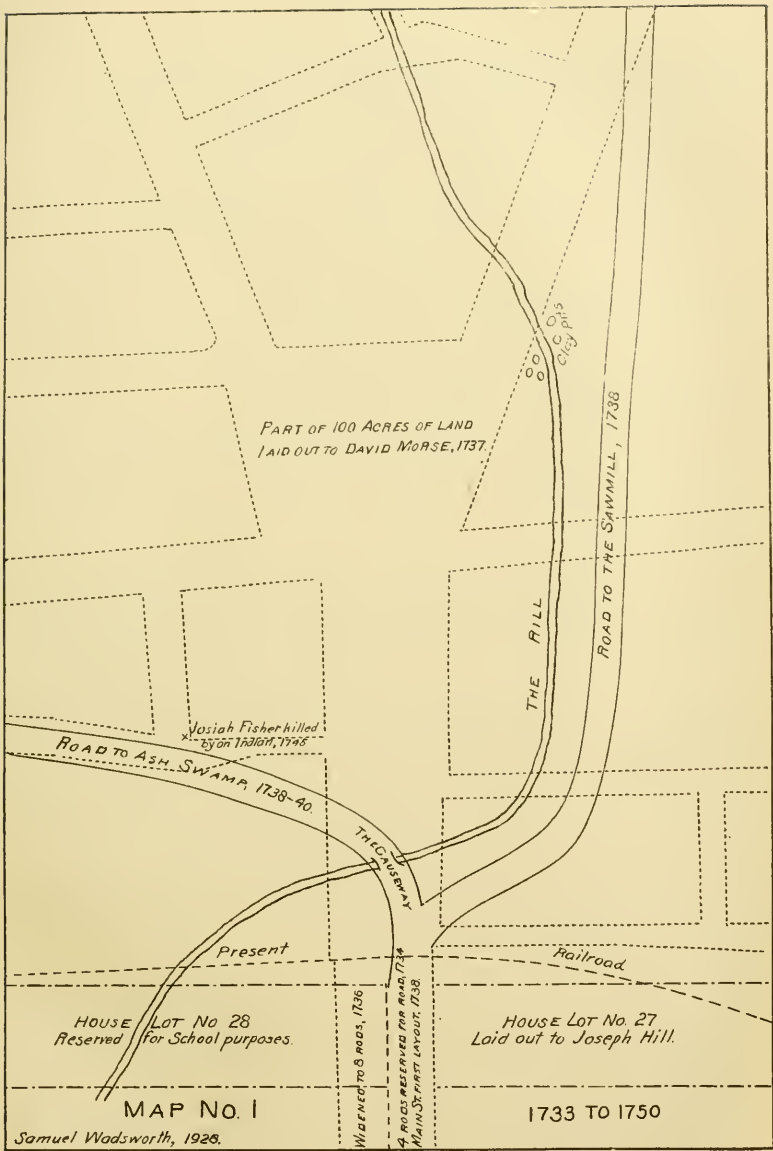
1734.—On Feb. 21, a return was made by the committee of a plat of two townships, each of the contents of six miles square, on each side of the Ashuelot river. On March 1st the committee was requested to lay out houselots in said towns, and reported on June 17 a plat of fifty-four lots of eight acres each, laid out in Upper Ashuelot, in the most

convenient place for building. The lots were numbered from one to fifty four, and were on each side of a four rod road, which is now the east half of our Main street. On June 26 the lots were assigned to the several grantees, the most northerly lot on the east side of the road being No. 27 and laid out to Joseph Hill, and lot No. 28 on the west side reserved for school purposes. The north line of lot 28 was where the south foundation of the former passenger station of the Cheshire railroad stood.

1736.—On October 1, the road between the house lots was widened by the proprietors from four to eight rods, by taking a strip four rods in width from the east end of the west tier of lots. The owners were reimbursed by having a strip of the same width added to the west end of their lots. To this action we are indebted for our present broad and beautiful Main street.

1737.—A division of one hundred acre lots was made, the first selection falling to David Morse, whose tract included a large part of the present Central Square and upper Main street, as well as the larger part of the compact part of the city northerly to Cross street.

1738.—A road was laid out from the southerly part of the town, passing between the house lots, and continuing northerly to the site chosen for a sawmill on Beaver brook. This was the first road formally laid out and recorded in Upper Ashuelot, and although not recorded by courses, there is evidence that it turned to the east at the north end of the house lots and followed the higher land between the small brook which then ran across Main street north of the present railroad, and Beaver brook, entering the present line of Washington street near Cross street.



- 1740.—About this time, or possibly in 1738 or 1739, a road was opened for travel from the north side of the house lots, crossing the small brook at the "causeway," thence turning westerly, nearly on the course shown on map No. 1, and running to Ash Swamp. That road entered the present line of West street nearly opposite School street, and from that point a road was laid out at the same time, or soon after, in a northerly direction, substantially where School street is, and continuing up the Ashuelot river. That road was for many years the only route from Keene to Surry and beyond. A part of the road from the causeway westerly was afterwards called Poverty Lane.
- 1745.—On July 10, Deacon Josiah Fisher was killed by an Indian on the north side of Poverty Lane, or near the north line of the present Lamson street, where the Griffin block now stands.
- 1747.—On account of the hostility of the Indians, the town was abandoned, the inhabitants returning to Massachusetts. It contained thirty one dwelling houses, several barns, a fort, a meeting house, saw and grist mill. All were burned by the Indians except four houses, one barn and the mills. Map No. 1 shows the beginning of the development of Central Square and vicinity during the above period.
- 1750-51.—Peace having been restored, the settlers began to return to the township. The exact date of the first arrivals is not known, but was during the years 1750 or 1751.
- 1753.—The town, heretofore called Upper Ashuelot, was incorporated under the name of Keene, the charter being granted on the eleventh day of April.
- 1754.—Prior to the burning of the town by the Indians, meeting houses had been erected in two localities. The first was built in 1737, and not completed, on the lot set aside for the purpose by the committee of 1734, immediately south of house lot No. 54, on the west side of Main street. That was on the site now occupied by the late residence of Elisha F. Kane, No. 441. The first burial ground, contain-

ing the remains of some of the earliest settlers, was located on the same lot. In 1741 the building was moved to a small eminence near the middle of the main street, nearly opposite the present location of the old Gen. James Wilson house, No. 129. The building was shingled, glass set and otherwise improved. The roadway in use at that time was on the east side of the building.

When the inhabitants returned and built new houses there was a demand for public worship and a temporary building of slabs, with an earth floor, was built on the west side of the main street near where the former Appleton house, now the Catholic parsonage, No. 173, now stands. In 1754 a new meeting house was built "on the road that goeth from the town street to the mills, on the highest ground between the causeway by William Smeeds and the bridge by the clay pits." This location was near where the soldiers monument now stands, and the meeting house was probably the first building erected between the present railroad and the north side of Central Square. Rev. Ezra Carpenter was the pastor.

This road was evidently a new road by a more direct route to the sawmill, via the present course of Washington street, although not formally laid out until several years later. On March 5, appears the first layout of a road to Ash Swamp, although that road had been travelled since 1738 or 1740. The easterly end of that road was called "Poverty lane." The new meeting house being set on the "highest ground" calls attention to the topography of that section at that time. From the small elevation that then stood on Main street and to which the first meeting house was moved in 1741, there was a downward slope, northerly, to the "Causeway," from thence rising in a much steeper grade than at present to the location of the new meeting house, then sloping downward to the bridge over the brook that flowed across the road a little north of the present city hall. From there the brook flowed in a southerly direction,

near the rear of the present business blocks, and again crossed the road at the causeway and continued in a south-westerly direction to Ashuelot river. The bed of the brook at the causeway, which was on Main street nearly opposite the Sentinel building, was so low that a person of average height could stand erect under the bridge. Recent excavations have shown that the top of the bridge was several feet below the present grade of Main street at that point.

West of the causeway, along the brook, was a tract of low land, later called "Mr. Richardson's meadow," and on the east, between the present Roxbury and Church streets, and south of the latter, was a swamp or quagmire, which with the causeway overflowed during freshets and necessitated the use of boats. On each side of the brook near where the city hall now stands were some clay pits, owned by the town and annually rented to the highest bidder for the purpose of making brick. William Smeed lived on the east side of Main street a little south of the present railroad tracks, where Dr. Twitchell later had his residence. The Boston & Maine roundhouse was afterwards built on the site and is now used for a garage.

1761.—The Reverend Clement Sumner was settled by the town as minister of the church.

On Sept. 28, the selectmen laid out a road from the "North end of the street by the causeway by the crotch of the roads and running northerly to the sawmill, and beyond. This is the first recorded layout of the upper end of Main street, the east side of Central Square and Washington street. It was laid eight rods wide to the north side of David Morse's one hundred acre lot, which was in the vicinity of Cross street, and then followed the line of the old road, four rods wide to the sawmill, which was located on Beaver brook some thirty or forty rods north of the present location of Giffin Street.

1770.—Capt. Josiah Richardson moved to Keene from Leominster, Mass. and purchased all the land lying west of the

Main street and the road to the sawmill, northerly of house lot No. 28, and south of the present line of Mechanic street. This included the greater part of Central Square. He erected a building on the north side of "Poverty lane," about where St. James Parish house now stands, where he kept a store and tavern.

1771.—Benjamin Hall bought of Abner Sanger the land on the east side of the roads. Mr. Hall's land extended from near the present line of Beaver street, southerly, to near the location of Water street, he having bought, in 1861, of William Smeed, six lots on the east side of Main street. His son Dr. Zilba Hall subsequently kept a tavern in the Smeed house just south of the present railroad.

1772.—Rev. Clement Sumner was dismissed as pastor of the church. During the succeeding seven years no pastor was settled in the town.

1773.—Josiah Richardson applied to the town and was given permission to change the course of the easterly end of the road to Ash Swamp, or "Poverty lane," as it was then called, to run in a straight course from near where School street is now to the meeting house. This established the first road on the line of our West street. The Rev. Aaron Hall, who was settled as pastor of the church a few years later, built his house on the north side of this road, where the Keene Public Library now stands. Having the meeting house and pastor's house on the same road caused it to be named Piety lane. It was afterwards named Pleasant street.

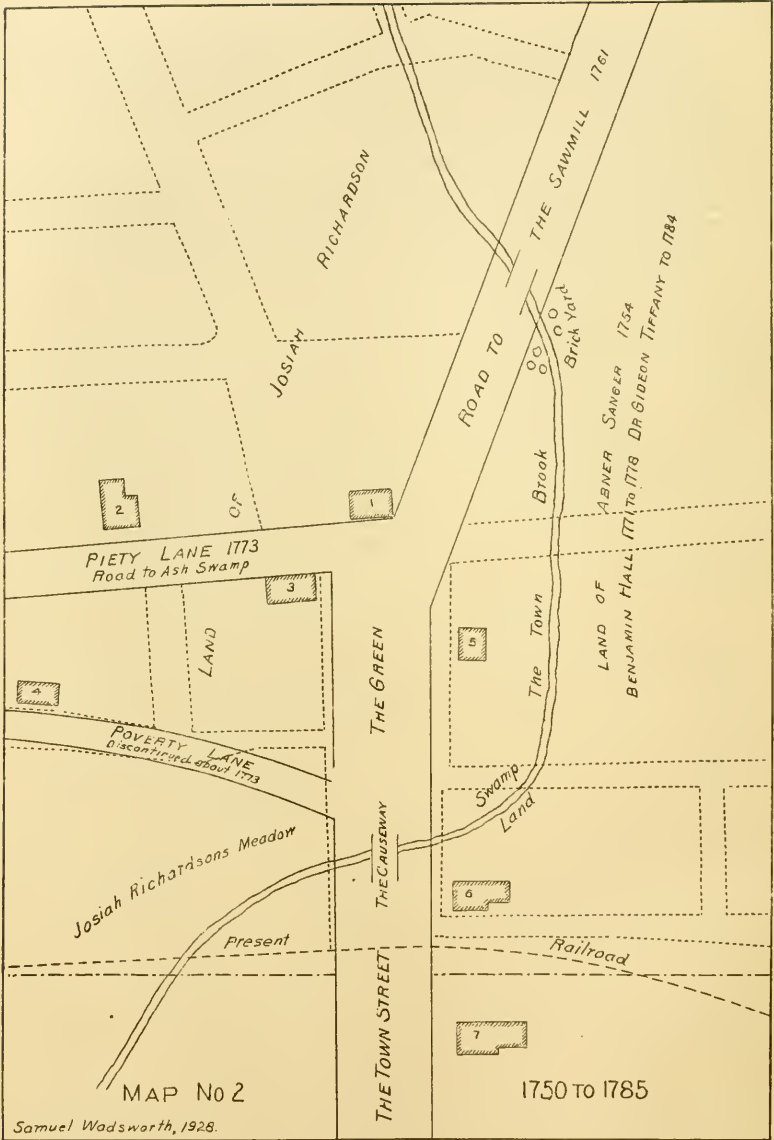
Capt. Richardson erected a new dwelling house and tavern on that street, the building remaining in the same location for about 120 years, and was the same building that was removed to permit the erection of the Y. M. C. A. building in 1893. About the same time Capt. Richardson erected a building for a store at the corner of Main and West streets, which was the first building to occupy the site of the present Elliot building, or St. John's block.

- 1775.—About this time the first mention is made of the “Green,” which was the name given to the open space on the “town street” (Main street), south of the meeting house. It was used as a parade ground. One or two small detached houses are mentioned at this time as standing on either side of the “Green,” but by whom built or for what purpose does not appear.
- 1778.—Benjamin Hall sold to Dr. Gideon Tiffany land on the east side of the road, east of the meeting house and north of the south line of the Cheshire House property. This was the land later known as the Edwards farm. Rev. Aaron Hall was settled by the town as pastor of the church.
- 1780.—Dr. Ziba Hall was succeeded as tavern keeper by **Aaron** and Luther Emes. Their tavern was on the east side of Main street just south of the present railroad.
- 1784.—A committee was appointed by the town to sell the old meeting house and see about building a new one, to be located a little north and west of the old one.
- 1785.—A road was laid out by the Court from the Keene meeting house to Surry, and beyond. It was “measured along the present road leading to Surry,” which was by the way of Pleasant (West) and School streets, Court street as now travelled not having then been opened. The town purchased of Josiah Richardson and Benjamin Hall one acre of land “a little north of the Meeting house” upon which the “Gaol” was built. This was the lot at the corner of Mechanic street. A wooden jail was built which was replaced in 1833 by one of granite, which stood until the jail at the upper end of Washington street was built in 1884. After the jail was built the road to the sawmill was called Prison street. The former jail, prior to 1785, had been located on Main street.

Lemuel Chandler and William McClellan bought one hundred acres or more of land east of the common and upper Main street, later known as the Edwards land. Asa Dunbar bought of Aaron Emes the lot on the west side of

Main street just south of the former passenger station, upon which he erected a tavern, which he kept, and his widow Mary Dunbar, until sold to Daniel Watson in 1795. The building is the same now standing on the premises and occupied by the Crystal Cafe.

Lemuel Chandler sold to Aaron and Luther Emes five acres of land on the east side of the street, where the City Hall is now, but extending easterly to the meadow.

1786.—The town purchased of Capt. Josiah Richardson, for twenty pounds, about one acre of land north and west of the Meeting house, bounded south and east on the roads and on the west by Mr. Richardson's garden. The new meeting house was built on this land, a little north and west of the old one. It was a building seventy by fifty feet in size, with the longest side towards the south. It had a belfry and steeple on the west end, a porch on the east end, but the main entrance was in the middle of the south side. It was "raised" from June 28 to 30. The land which the town purchased, together with the roads on the south and east, was called the Meeting house Common and comprised the larger part of our Central Square. Lemuel Chandler built and opened a new tavern, called the Chandler House, which was the first building erected on the site of the present Cheshire House. Benjamin Hall sold to Thomas Wells a small lot of land south of the Chandler House, upon which Wells built a small store and shop.

1787.—William Lamson came to Keene and established a tannery on land of Josiah Richardson on the west side of Main street, although the conveyance of the land was not made until 1791. Stephen Chase, a blacksmith, bought of Lemuel Chandler and Aaron Emes two lots on the east side of the street, where the High School now stands, and built a house and blacksmith shop on the premises.

1788.—The new meeting house having been completed for use, the former building was offered to the county for a Court house, provided they would move it to the north-west corner of the common and allow the town to use it for town

meetings, etc. It was located in what is now the middle of the roadway to Court street, nearly opposite the Bullard & Shedd drug store, no road to the north having been laid out at that time. Benjamin Hall sold to Luther Emes his land on the east side of Main street south of the south line of the Chandler House land.

1789.—On October 10, Josiah Richardson conveyed to 29 grantees a strip of land 252 feet long and 10 feet wide, situated northerly of the new meeting house, upon which horse sheds had been built. They were built about where the front of Balls block and the First Church building now stands, extending west to the line of the court house and east nearly to Prison street. The grantees were as follows: Isaac Wyman, Jr., Gentleman, Asa Ware, Gent., Joseph Wilson, Gentleman, Thomas Baker, Esquire, Simeon Clark, Yeoman, Gersham Howe, Blacksmith, John Balch, Jr., Yeoman, William Bragg, Blacksmith, Thadeus Metcalf, Yeoman, Ezra Harvey, Yeoman, John Balch, Yeoman, Jesse Hall, Husbandman, Abiathor Pond, Yeoman, Luther Bragg, Blacksmith, Abijah Metcalf, Husbandman, Royal Blake, Husbandman, Reuben Daniels, Husbandman, Jesse Clark, Miller, Daniel Kingsbury, Gentleman, Timothy Ellis, Gentleman, Davis Howlett, Gentleman, Isaac Griswold, Gentleman, Abraham Wheeler, Jr., Gentleman, Abram Wheeler, Husbandman, James Wright, Gentleman, Ephraim Wright, Yeoman, William Wood, Husbandman, David Wilson, Gentleman, James Osgood, Yeoman, all of Keene in the County of Cheshire aforesaid.

1790.—Lemuel Chandler having died, the Chandler House was sold to Joseph and William Russell who kept it as a tavern until 1795.

1791.—The office of the New Hampshire Recorder, a newspaper established in 1787 and having previously occupied a building on the west side of Main street near where Mr. Wallace E. Mason now lives, was moved to a building south of the Chandler house. Post offices and post routes were estab-

lished by the state, and Josiah Richardson was appointed postmaster for Keene, the office being in his tavern on the site of the present Y. M. C. A. building. William Lamson purchased of Josiah Richardson a lot four by ten rods in size on the west side of Main street, where he had established, in 1787, his tannery business.

1792.—The first church bell to be used in Keene was purchased by the town and placed in the belfry of the new meeting-house. Daniel Watson bought of Josiah Richardson a lot eight by ten rods in size on the west side of Main street, which included all the land between the present Elliot block and the former Five Cent Savings Bank building, now Whipples. He built a shop for his own use as a sadler at the southeast corner, where the Wright block now stands, and conveyed the remainder to Moses Johnson. A store building had been previously built on the premises, which was the first building to stand on the site of the Buffum block, also a dwelling house had been built in the rear. Thomas Wells sold to Moses Johnson his land and building south of the Chandler House.

1793.—Josiah Richardson sold to the town of Keene “a piece of land sufficient to set a new schoolhouse upon in the Center School District, anywhere on the front side of Prison street north of the brook. To be set as near where the old schoolhouse stood as convenient.” This location was where the Warren block now stands, and the record shows that a schoolhouse had previously occupied nearly the same site.

1794.—The town purchased a larger bell, weighing one thousand pounds, for the meetinghouse, also engaged Luther Smith, a clockmaker of Keene, to make a clock for the same to cost thirty six pounds, sterling. The clock was made and placed in position but there has been some doubt expressed whether it was mounted as a tower clock or for the interior. Recently discovered records have proved that it was mounted in the tower and had one exterior dial on the south side of the belfry. During the latter part of this year

or the first of 1795, the first United States postoffice was established in Keene. Asa Bullard was appointed postmaster and the office was in his Coffee house which stood on the south corner of the present Dunbar and Main streets. At that time the principal stores and shops in Keene were on the east side of Main street between the Eagle Hotel and Water street, and that section was called Federal Row. Stephen Chase sold his land and buildings, where the High School lot is now, to James Wyman.

1795.—Dr. Thomas Edwards purchased the tavern formerly called the Chandler House and occupied it for several years. It was called Dr. Edwards' tavern. His wife was Matilda, sister of Lemuel Chandler. He also purchased the Peter Chandler farm of about one hundred acres, lying east of the common and on both sides of the present Roxbury street, which was then only a lane leading to the farm lands lying east, and to Dr. Edwards' house which was built soon after. The street was not laid out as a public highway until 1806. Daniel Watson bought of Mary Dunbar her tavern and land on the west side of Main street. This was part of the original lot No. 28, immediately south of the present railroad. It was occupied by Daniel Watson as his residence until his death in 1837. Dr. Thaddeus Maccarty bought the land and buildings, erected by Stephen Chase, where the High School lot is now. Peleg Sprague built a house on west side of Main street later Laton Martin's.

1796.—A new court house was erected by the county at the northwest corner of the common, or near the site of the old one, the former meeting house. It was also used by the town for its meetings, in consideration of allowing the county to locate the building on town land. A new road to Surry and Walpole was laid out this year from Pleasant street, where the Russell block now stands, and over the land now occupied by the buildings on the west side of Central Square, passing west of the new court house, and so on until it met the former road via of Pleas-

ant (West) and School streets. This was the first road travelled on or near the present line of the south end of Court street. The court house then stood in a direct line with the middle of Court street, as it now runs. The old court house, the former meeting house, was sold to Eliphalet Briggs and Silas Angier who moved it to the west side of Prison (Washington) street where the house of Mrs. Pollard now stands. It was fitted as a two tenement house and occupied as such for about forty years when it came into the possession of John H. Fuller, a wool merchant, who divided it and moved the south half to what is now Railroad square for use as his wool house. It still stands there and is the southeasterly building occupied by J. Cushing & Co., grain merchants. The north half was sold in 1856 to H. T. H. Pierce who resided in it for several years when he moved it to the south side of Maple street and built the brick house now occupied by Mrs. Pollard, No. 256 Washington street. The old building still stands at No. 26 Maple street and, with the Cushing building, form the two halves of the old meeting house that was erected on the common upwards of 175 years ago.

1797.—Moses Johnson bought of Luther Emes all the land on the east side of Main street between Dr Edwards' line and house lot No. 27, or the lot on which was the tavern formerly occupied by Dr. Ziba Hall, and later by Aaron and Luther Emes. A building stood on the premises that had been occupied by Johnson as a dwelling and store, on the site of the present Gurnsey block. Dr. Thomas Edwards sold to Solomon Woods a small lot of land on the east side of the common on which stood a blacksmith shop, where the City Hall now stands.

1798.—Samuel Dinsmoor moved to the house of Moses Johnson mentioned above. His law office was for a time in the building south of Dr Edwards' tavern, but he later succeeded Judge Daniel Newcomb in his office which stood

south of Dinsmoors residence, where the present railroad tracks are.

1799.—William Lamson purchased a strip of land on the west side of Main street as an addition to his tannery lot. John Prentiss established the New Hampshire Sentinel. His office was at first in a building on lower Main street, but later in the same year he moved to the building south of Dr. Edwards' tavern. The Third New Hampshire Turnpike was chartered, running from Bellows Falls, Vermont, to Townsend, Mass. Its route through Keene was via the Walpole road and along the present Court street to the common, and thence by Main street and the Marlboro road. It was laid out on the west side of the court house the same as the former road. Dr. Daniel Adams succeeded Asa Bullard as postmaster, and moved the office to his residence on Main street where Charles C. Beedle now resides, No. 324. Abel Wilder bought of Josiah Richardson the land at the corner of the common and Prison streets. A house had recently been built on the premises which faced to the east on Prison street, a little north of the common. The house was said to have been the best in town at that time. It was afterwards turned one quarter round to the north line, facing the common, and was the same building, belonging to Elbridge Clarke, that was burned in the fire of 1880. Abel Wilder built soon after a frame house immediately north of the latter, or near the present location of house No. 18. That house was burned in 1846. Dr. Thomas Edwards conveyed to Amasa Allen a small lot of land on the east side of the common, where Allen erected a building for a store, the first building to occupy the site of the present Colony block. It was occupied by Allen & Bond.

1800.—William Lamson bought an additional strip of land one rod in width on the south side of his tannery lot on the west side of Main street. At this time David Forbes had a law office on the east side of the common immediately north of the store of Allen & Bond, and farther north or

about where the city hall now stands was a blacksmith shop owned by Joseph Dorr and occupied by Towns & Wright.

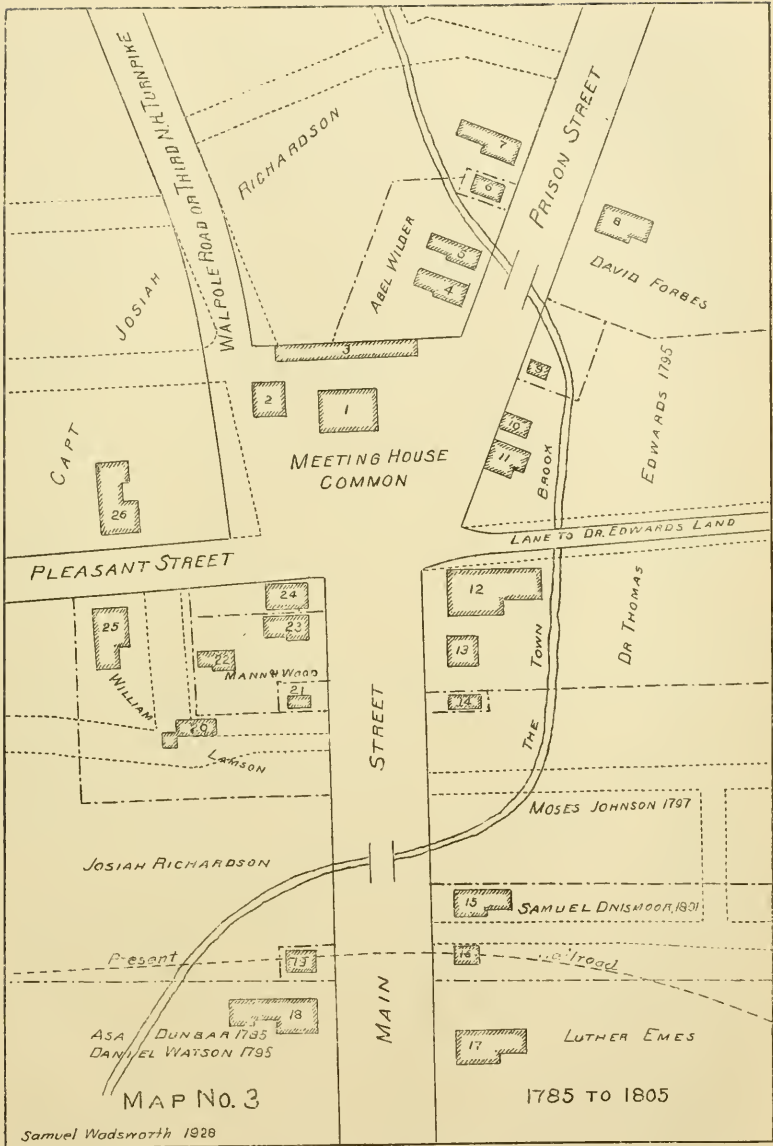
- 1801.—William Lamson bought of Josiah Richardson land on the west side of his tannery property extending to the south side of Pleasant street, on which he afterward built his dwelling house. Samuel Dinsmoor bought of Moses Johnson the house and lot on the east side of Main street where he had resided since 1798.
- 1802.—John G. Bond succeeded Dr. Adams as postmaster and the office was moved to the store of Allen & Bond on the east side of the common. The Branch Turnpike was chartered this year, running from the common in Keene to Fitzwilliam. Moses Johnson sold his property on the west side of Main street to Daniel Watson, James Mann and John Wood. Watson soon sold his interest to his partners and the firm of Mann & Wood was formed, occupying the former store of Moses Johnson on the site of the Buffum block.
- 1803.—The Cheshire Bank, the first bank established in Keene, was incorporated this year. The Dr. Maccarty estate on the east side of Prison street was sold to David Forbes. Josiah Richardson sold to Nathaniel Briggs a lot on the west side of Prison street, next north of the schoolhouse, where he built a house.
- 1804.—The Cheshire Bank bought of Josiah Richardson a lot of land on the west side of Main street, next north of Daniel Watsons, and erected a building for banking purposes. It stood on the site now occupied by the railroad tracks. William Lamson built his dwelling house which formerly stood on West street where the postoffice is now located. Roxbury street was first laid out this year but discontinued in 1805.
- 1805.—The Cheshire Turnpike, running from the common in Keene to Surry, on the east side of Ashuelot river, and thence to Drewsville and Charlestown, was chartered this year. The course from the common was the same as the

road laid out in 1796. Moses Johnson sold to Mann & Wood his remaining land on the east side of Main street, between that of Dr. Edwards and Samuel Dinsmoor, and Mann & Wood sold the south half of the same to John G. Bond. In the early part of this (19th) century the course of the Town brook was probably changed to run into Beaver brook as it now does, instead of crossing Main street at the Causeway and running to Ashuelot river as formerly. The work of making it a covered drain was probably commenced about this time, and continued as required. It has been wholly covered through this section of the town for nearly seventy years.

- 1806.—The office of the New Hampshire Sentinel was moved to the building formerly occupied by Moses Johnson, where the south part of the Gurnsey block now stands. Josiah Richardson sold to Noah Cooke a lot of land on the west side of Main street, south of and adjoining the Lamson tannery lot. A wooden building for stores and other purposes was erected on the lot but was burned in 1812. Mr. Cooke also bought of Mann & Wood a lot on the east side of Main street where the upper Lane block now stands. Mann & Wood also sold to Lockhart Willard the lot immediately south of the latter, including a part of what is now Church street. Josiah Richardson sold to John G. Bond all the land on the west side of Main street between the Cheshire Bank lot and that purchased by Noah Cooke. The road running east from the common was finally laid out this year, and after Roxbury was incorporated, in 1812, was named Roxbury street. Nathaniel Briggs sold the house that he had recently built on the west side of Prison street to Thomas Shapley.
- 1807.—Lockhart Willard sold the lot on the east side of Main street that he bought in 1806 to William Lamson. John G. Bond bought of David Wilder about one fourth of an acre of land and a dwelling house on the east side of Prison street where the City Hall now stands. The lot had changed owners several times since bought by Solomon Woods in 1797. Abel Wilder sold to John G. Bond his land and buildings on the west side of Prison street.
- 1808.—Dr. Edwards sold his tavern property to William Pierce and it was then known as Pierce's tavern. Elihu Holbrook had been the landlord for several years. Noah Cooke erected a building on his lot on the east side of Main street, south of Pierce's tavern. The same building was removed by E. F. Lane when he built his upper block in 1891. Abel Wilder sold to Albe Cady his house and remaining land at the corner of the common and Prison street. The course of the Third New Hampshire Turnpike was changed, be-

tween the common and the residence of Abijah Wilder, the old Sun Tavern which has lately been replaced by house No. 314 Court street. It was laid out in a straight line where Court street is now, and the court house which stood on the common, in direct line with the new road, was moved to its west side to a lot purchased of Josiah Richardson on the site of the stores now occupied by the Bullard & Shedd Co. and G. H. Tilden & Co. Samuel Dinsmoor was appointed postmaster in place of John G. Bond, and the office removed to his residence or office on the east side of Main street near where the railroad is now located.

1809.—John Elliot came to Keene and entered business with Shubael Butterfield in the store south of Pierce's tavern. The Keene Engine Co. was organized, being the first successful attempt to introduce a fire engine in Keene. The town well, a cistern for fire purposes, which was located at the north end of Main street, was built about this time and remained until the introduction of running water in 1869. Josiah Richardson conveyed to Cheshire County, by lease, the lot upon which the court house had been moved, with the condition that it must never be used for any other purpose. William Pierce conveyed to Noah Cooke a narrow strip of land as an addition to his lot upon which he had erected his building in 1808.

1811.—Church street was laid out this year to Beaver brook, and was first called Beaver street. A road had been previously travelled over the same route which in some records was called "Frog lane," probably on account of the nature of the land through which it passed which has been called an alder swamp. Samuel Dinsmoor having been elected to Congress, his partner, Booz M. Atherton was appointed postmaster. William Pierce sold to Gilbert Mellen his tavern and land which he bought of Dr. Edwards in 1808. John G. Bond sold to John Wood land and buildings on the west side of Prison street where house No. 18 now stands. A frame building was erected about this time on land of

- John G. Bond on the west side of Main street north of the old Cheshire Bank building, occupied by Henry & Thomas Lyman, hatters, and called Lyman's Hat Shop. This building was afterwards moved to the east side of Main street a little south of the Eagle Hotel and made into a dwelling. It was again moved, soon after 1900, and now stands at No. 56 South street and has much the same appearance as when first built. On its first site, on the west side of Main street, it was replaced by a two story brick building which was taken down when the Sentinel block was built. It had been occupied for several years by Davis & Wright dealers in stoves, tinware, etc.
- 1812.—The wooden building on land of Noah Cooke on the west side of Main street, south of Lamson's tannery, was destroyed by fire.
- 1813.—Joseph Buffum succeeded Booz M. Atherton as postmaster. He was a lawyer and had taken the place of Mr. Atherton who had retired. The office was continued in the Dinsmoor law office on the east side of Main street. Dr. Amos Twitchell bought the house and lot on the east side of Main street, afterwards occupied by him and Dr. George B. Twitchell. It was the old tavern site of Dr. Ziba Hall and Aaron and Luther Emes, and stood near where Safford's garage now stands.
- 1814.—Aaron Appleton came from Dublin and formed a partnership with John Elliot. They bought of Josiah Richardson the store and lot on the corner of Main and Pleasant streets, formerly occupied by Joseph Dorr. The lot extended west to land of William Lamson. Noah Cooke sold to Abijah Kingsbury the southerly part of his lot on the west side of Main street, where his building was burned in 1812, and Mr. Kingsbury erected a building where he afterwards lived. The property remained in the Kingsbury family until 1901. It has now been remodeled and a third story added and it owned by Mr. A. H. Bruder. The north part of the same lot was conveyed by Noah Cooke to Wil-

liam Lamson, upon which he built, about this time, a two story frame building which was occupied by Abijah Kingsbury as a shoemakers shop for many years. It remained until removed to make room for the Lamson block in 1877. The old building was removed to the rear and occupied as a dwelling for several years and then taken down. Gilbert Mellen sold his tavern to Salem Sumner, but the property was divided, Mellen retaining the store building and land south of the tavern. Rev. Aaron Hall having died, Rev. David Olliphant succeeded him as pastor of the church. John Wood sold to Daniel Bradford the lot and house on the west side of Prison street, north of that recently purchased by Albe Cady. Eliphalet Briggs established about this time a cabinet shop on the west side of Prison street, north of Mr. Bradford, or where house No. 24 now stands.

1815.—Appleton & Elliot sold to A. & T. Hall thirty three feet from the west end of their lot on the south side of Pleasant street, where they built soon after the brick building now owned by the Elliot estate and occupied by the Balch Brothers. Appleton & Elliot sold the old building on their remaining lot, and erected the present Elliot building, or St. Johns block, two stories in height. The old building was removed to Court street and a second story added. It was the residence of Don H. Woodward, 151 Court street, until he built a new house in 1891, when it was removed to No. 37 Woodburn street. John Wood and Aaron and Timothy Hall also bought of Mann & Wood their land and buildings on the west side of Main street, and A. & T. Hall succeeded that firm in the store south of Appleton & Elliot, where they continued business for about fifty years. A store had been built on land south of their store building, or about where the Cheshire Bank now stands. A blacksmith shop had been built a little west of Main street between the Lyman hat shop and the old Cheshire Bank building, where Railroad square is now located, and occupied by Towns & David. Dr. Thomas Edwards sold to

Phineas Fiske a lot on the corner of the common and Roxbury street, upon which he erected a frame building for store and offices. Justus Perry bought the store building of Amasa Allen on the east side of the common, and bought of Dr. Edwards the lot upon which it stood. This was on the site of the present Colony block. Gilbert Mallen sold to Daniel Bradford the store building and land south of his former tavern, where the south wing of the Cheshire House now stands.

1816.—William Lamson sold to Samuel Wood, Jr., the land and buildings on the east side of Main street at the corner of Church street. Mr. Wood established a bakery in the building and it continued for that business until about 1900. Justus Perry bought his homestead lot on the east side of Prison street where he removed the house and shop built by Stephen Chase about 1787 and built the Perry house that stood on the lot until it was moved to Roxbury court in 1912 to make room for the erection of the new High School building. Daniel Bradford sold his store building, purchased in 1815, to Phineas Fiske and he conveyed it to Lynds Wheelock, who held it until 1838. Phineas Fiske sold his store and lot on the corner of the common and Roxbury street to Foster Alexander, who sold it the next year to William Lamson.

1817.—John G. Bond sold to John Wood his lot and buildings where the City Hall now stands. William Lamson bought of Foster Alexander the store and lot at the corner of the common and Roxbury street.

1818.—Thomas M. Edwards succeeded Joseph Buffum, who had been elected to Congress, as postmaster, and moved the postoffice to his law office over Lamson's store at the corner of the common and Roxbury street. Rev. Z. S. Barstow was settled as minister over the church, and was the last minister settled by the town. He continued as pastor for more than fifty years. John G. Bond sold to Daniel Adams his land and buildings on the west side of Main street be-

tween the Kingsbury lot and the Cheshire Bank.

1819.—Samuel A. Gerould came to town and bought the store of Ridgway & Rockwood in the Cooke building on the east side of Main street. Salem Sumner sold to Elijah Parker and Timothy Hall the tavern property at the corner of Main and Roxbury streets.

1820.—Ephraim Holland succeeded Salem Sumner as landlord of the tavern of Parker & Hall. The first movement leading to the development of Central Square in its present form was made this year, when meetings were held with a view to moving the buildings from the common and dispensing with the horse sheds. Josiah Richardson died, and was succeeded in the title of the real estate by his daughter and her husband, Joseph Dorr.

1821.—Abijah Wilder, Jr., bought of Joseph Dorr and wife, the land north of the common, between that of Albe Cady and the turnpike road, now Court street. John Wood sold to Justus Perry, land, with a house and wheelwright shop thereon, where the City Hall now stands. This included the lot sold by Dr. Thomas Edwards to Solomon Woods in 1797, but it had been transferred several times in the meantime.

1822.—George Sparhawk succeeded Ephraim Holland as proprietor of the tavern. On May 27 the tavern or former Chandler House, on the site of the Cheshire House, was destroyed by fire. The town well or cistern on the common was soon exhausted and bucket lines were formed to Beaver brook. The buildings immediately north and south were saved. The Keene Fire Society was formed and a new engine purchased. A new building of brick, called the Phoenix Hotel, was built the same year by Parker & Hall, and George Sparhawk continued as landlord.

1823.—George Tilden and John Prentiss formed a partnership in the book binding and the book and stationery business, and occupied the building south of A. & T. Hall's store, or where the Cheshire National Bank is now. Abijah Wilder,

Jr., built a new shop on the east side of the turnpike road, where the First Church block now stands, and commenced the manufacture of furniture and sleighs. Eliphalet Briggs, Jr., and John W. Briggs had previously established a cabinet shop, about 1814, on the west side of Prison street, where the house formerly of Dr. Carpenter now stands.

1824.—A new court house and town hall was built of brick on the site of the former building on the west side of the common. Joseph Dorr and wife gave a deed of the land to the county with the same condition that was in the former lease, that it should never be used for any other purpose. The same building now stands at the corner of Central Square and Winter street, the north half, occupied by the Bullard & Shedd Co. and others, having been but little changed in appearance, but the south half owned by the Chamberlain Co. and occupied by George H. Tilden & Co. and others, has been remodeled and a third story added. The old frame court house was moved to the west side of Court street where the Barker block now stands and used for business purposes until 1861 when it was destroyed by fire. Joseph Dorr and wife sold to the town of Keene a triangular strip of land west of the common as an addition to it, "For the use of the common and no other purpose." The land was west of the highway as laid out in 1796, and this conveyance established the lines of Central Square as now occupied. Joseph Dorr and wife conveyed to Samuel A. Gerould and John Prentiss lands on the west side of the common on which they soon after built their respective blocks.

1825.—John Prentiss and Samuel A. Gerould both built brick blocks on their respective lots on the west side of the common. As first built there was a passage way eleven feet wide between the buildings, and a space of about eight feet between the Gerould building and the court house on the north. John Prentiss moved his printing office to his new block and established a book store and bindery in the

north store. Mr. Gerould also established his business in his new building where he remained about fifty years. The Prentiss block still stands, owned by the heirs of Elbridge C. Whitecomb, but the Gerould block was removed to make room for the Chamberlain block built in 1904. Thomas M. Edwards built a small brick building on the north side of Roxbury street, a little east of Lamson's building, for his law office, and to which he moved the postoffice. John Hatch bought the Phoenix Hotel and became its landlord. Albe Cady sold to Abijah Wilder, Jr., his house and lot on the corner of the common and Prison street. John Towns bought of Daniel Adams his property on the west side of Main street, north of the Cheshire Bank, and occupied a building which formerly stood near the site of the Sentinel block, as a blacksmith shop.

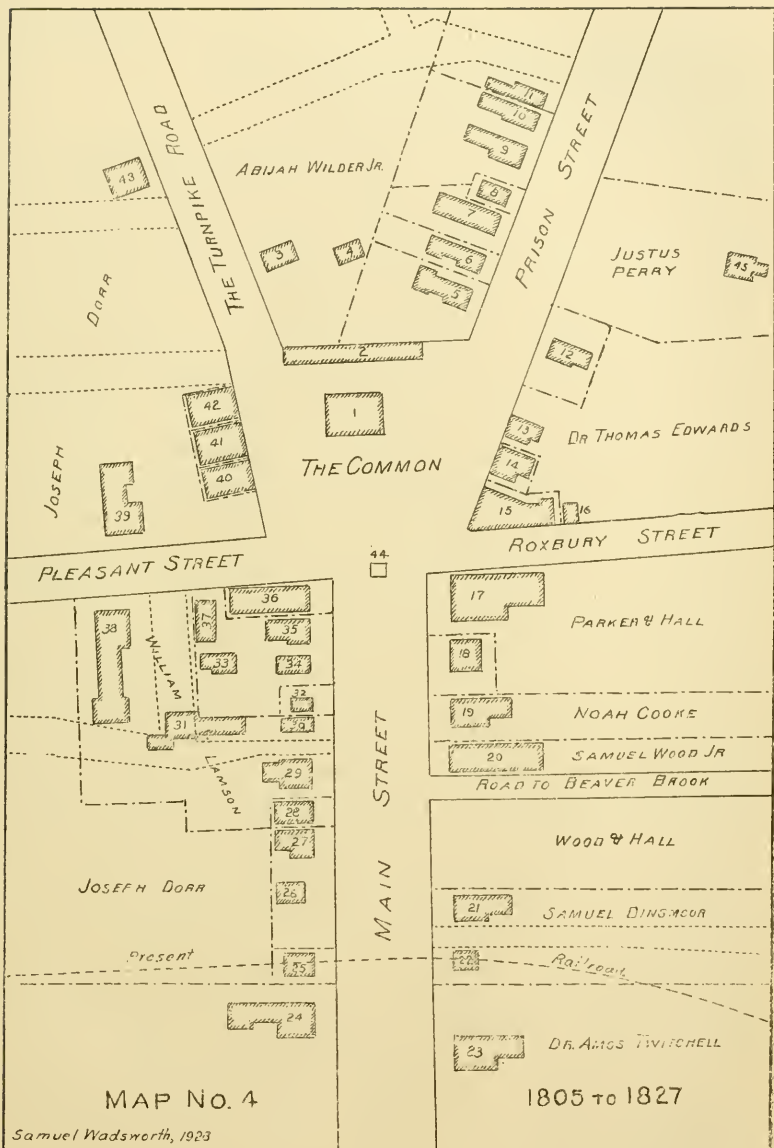
1826.—Daniel Bradford sold to John H. Fuller the lot with buildings on the west side of Prison street, formerly occupied as a residence by Elbridge Clarke, No. 18 Washington street. The building at that time was of wood and stood about ten feet south of the present house. It was burned in 1846.

1827.—William Lamson replaced his wooden store building at the corner of the common and Roxbury street with a brick block. This was the building, owned by George H. Richards, that was destroyed by fire, with others, in 1865. It stood on the site of the present bank block. It had a hall called Music Hall, in the third story, which was one of the first halls for public use in town. Abijah Wilder, Jr., conveyed to Azel Wilder an undivided half interest in all his land and buildings on the north side of the common.

1828.—As a result of the movement commenced in 1820 to enlarge and improve the common, the meeting house, heretofore standing on the common with the spire facing the west, was turned on quarter round and moved back to within four feet of its present position with the spire facing the south. The lot was given to the society by Abijah and Azel Wilder. The horse sheds that were erected on the north side of the common in 1789 were removed. Although the common had been cleared of buildings there seemed to be some doubt as to the title of the entire area and Joseph Dorr and wife gave a quitclaim deed to the town for a consideration of one hundred dollars, bounded as follows; “on the south by a line drawn from the north side of Appleton & Elliot’s building to the north side of the Phoenix Hotel; on the east by a line passing along the front side of the buildings of William Lamson, Justus Perry and Dr. Thomas Edwards, on the north by land of Abijah Wilder, Jr., and on the west by a line passing on the front side of the court house and the buildings of Samuel A. Gerould and John Prentiss and extending to said Elliot’s store, to be forever appropriated as a common and public highways. This defined the lines of the common as occupied since that time, and the present limits of Central Square. The common was then and for many years after an unimproved space, crossed by roads, and without trees. Abijah and Azel Wilder built the brick block at the north side of the common known as Wilder’s building, now Ball’s block, except the store at the west end, now occupied by the Telephone company, which was added several years later. As the block was first built it had no interior stairways but the upper stories were reached by exterior stairs on either end of the building.

Samuel Dinsmoor sold his residence on the east side of Main street, where the south part of the Gurnsey block now stands, to Collins H. Jaquith, reserving his office building, which stood where the railroad tracks are now, which he removed. The same building is now a part of the Poole residence, No. 320 Roxbury street. Samuel Dinsmoor bought of the widow of Peleg Sprague the house on the west side of Main street, later known as the Martin house, and moved to it. That house was removed when the Colonial Theatre was built on the same site. Collins H. Jaquith sold the north part of the former Dinsmoor lot to Thomas F. Ames, who erected and occupied the brick building later known as Baker's block, which was removed when the north part of the Gurnsey block was built.

Joseph Dorr sold to Samuel A. Gerould the land in the rear of his new block and in the rear of the court house, on the south side of Winter street as afterwards laid out. Mr. Gerould built a brick house on the lot where he afterwards lived, and subsequently moved a frame building to the lot, immediately west of the court house, which was used as a dwelling and shop. Both these buildings were removed when the Chamberlain block was built in 1904. The names of the streets leading from the common seemed to have been changed about this time to Washington, West and Court streets. A small building was erected by the Wilders on the north side of the common, east of the meeting house. This was afterward removed, and was said to have been part of the residence of Dr. Hill on Winter street. When the court house addition was built the old dwelling was removed to Church street. A larger building was erected on its former site on the north side of the common which has been recently removed to make room for the new edifice of the Keene National Bank.

At the annual town meeting it was voted to convey all right, title and interest of the town in and to the meeting house to the First Congregational Society, reserving the

use of the house and bell on public occasions, with a right to hang a bell in the belfry and control the same. The Keene High School was established this year in December, and was taught in the east room of Wilder's new block.

- 1829.—The Keene Congregational Society (Unitarian) bought of Wood and Hall, who had acquired the title from John G. Bond, the lot on the south corner of Main and Church streets, and built the first Unitarian meetinghouse. Wood and Hall conveyed to Thomas F. Ames a narrow strip of land south of the latter as an addition to his lot. The two story blacksmith shop on the west side of Main street, owned by John Towns, immediately north of the Cheshire Bank was burned, but immediately rebuilt. There were two fire companies and two hand engines in town at that time.
- 1830.—Abijah and Azel Wilder conveyed by deed to the First Congregational Society the land upon which the meetinghouse had been moved. John Wood sold to Eliphalet Briggs, Jr., a lot on the west side of Washington street, with the building that had been previously occupied by Mr. Briggs, as a cabinet shop. That was on the late Dr. Carpenter lot, No. 24 on that street. John Wood and Eliphalet Briggs sold to Whiteomb French the land and buildings previously occupied by him on the west side of Washington street north of the latter. Mr. French had opened a livery stable on the premises.
- 1832.—Winter street was laid out this year from the common to School street, two and one half rods wide. Joseph Dorr and wife sold to Zebediah Kise and Josiah Colony the land on the west side of the common now occupied by the Russell block, the Ashuelot National Bank building and the new block of Reginald Howe. The Dorr's also sold to Azel and Abijah Wilder, Jr., a large tract of land on the north side of Winter street, extending from Court to School streets, and included the present county lot, the old Armory and High school lots and others.

- 1833.—William Dinsmoor was appointed postmaster in place of Thomas M. Edwards, and the office was removed to his store in Wilder's building. Kise & Colony sold to the Ashuelot Bank their lot on the west side of the common and the bank erected two stories of the building which they afterwards occupied, now the Keene Savings Bank. They also sold to Elbridge Keyes and Joshua D. Colony the land south and in the rear of the bank lot, on which they built a brick building afterwards known as the Keyes block. It was removed when the Russell block was built in 1895. The Cheshire Provident Institution was organized, with George Tilden as treasurer, and the bank located in his store where the Cheshire National Bank now is. The old county jail, of wood, on Washington street, corner of Mechanic, was replaced by a granite building, which remained on that site until the completion of a new jail on upper Washington street, now the Armory, in 1885.
- 1834.—John Towns sold his property on the west side of Main street, north of the bank, to Grosvenor Brooks. Samuel Dinsmoor probably moved his office building to Roxbury street, as he purchased this year the property now owned by the heirs of George E. Poole, No. 320, where the building was moved. Stillman French bought of Whitecomb French his property on the west side of Washington street, where the new Bennett block now stands, and continued the livery business.
- 1835.—Grosvenor Brooks sold his property to Heaton, Abderson and Metcalf, including all the land between the bank and the Kingsbury lot. John Prentiss sold to Samuel A. Gerould a narrow strip of land between their buildings, and Mr. Gerould extended his brick block to the south to occupy the passage that formerly separated the buildings. George Tilden then moved his store and the Cheshire Provident Bank to the new room thus provided. Abel Wilder bought of John Wood the house and lot on the west side

of Washington street where Mr. Wilder afterwards lived, now occupied as a store by Leon M. Willard.

- 1836.—The Phoenix Hotel was burned on the 6th of April. Later in the same year a fund was raised by subscription to rebuild, and Nathaniel Dana and Thomas H. Levett were appointed trustees to take charge of the funds, and to whom the real estate was sold. Collins H. Jaquith sold to John Towns his property on the east side of Main street, extending from Thomas F. Ames' lot to the land of Dr. Twitchell. The Keene Academy building was erected on the site of the present Junior High School on Winter street, on land donated for the purpose by Azel and Abijah Wilder, Jr. The building was three stories in height, the lower floor being a little below the level of the ground, and was used by the First Congregational Society as a chapel, for weekly meetings, until their church was remodeled in 1859. The second and third stories were used for school purposes.
- 1837.—The main part of the present **Cheshire House** was built during that summer, on the site of the Phoenix Hotel. Benajah Cooke succeeded William Dinsmoor as postmaster, but still kept the office in the Wilder building. Dr. Thomas Edwards conveyed to his son Thomas M. Edwards all his real estate, about 150 acres, lying easterly of the common.
- 1838.—John Wood and A. & T. Hall obtained possession of the property south of the Cheshire House, where the south wing of the building now stands. The old frame building which stood there was replaced by the brick building now standing on the premises. Thomas M. Edwards sold to Silvanus Titus the land on the north side of Roxbury street, and Mr. Titus built the brick house afterwards occupied by Elbridge G. Whitcomb, now converted into stores. John Wood and A. & T. Hall bought of Salma Hale, executor of the will of Daniel Watson, the old Watson saddlers shop on the west side of Main street where the Wright block now stands.

1839.—The Baptist Society bought of Levi Willard the lot on the north side of Winter street and erected the brick church building, recently used as an armory, now the store of Bloomer & Haselton. Previous to this time the Baptist meetinghouse had been located on the south side of the old Westmoreland or Hurricane road a little west of Wilson pond. The bell in the present Baptist church was first used in the old building at West Keene. Daniel Watson having died in 1837, the house and lot formerly owned by him, south of the former passenger stations, was sold to Samuel Robinson. Abijah Wilder, Jr., conveyed to the trustees of the Keene Academy the lot on which the academy building had been erected. Azel Wilder, being one of the trustees, had previously conveyed his half interest to his brother.

The Dorr homestead on the north side of West street, formerly the tavern of Josiah Richardson, was conveyed to Harriet K. Evans, wife of Nathaniel Evans. Azel Wilder quitclaimed to Abijah Wilder, Jr., his interest in the old Cady lot at the corner of the common and Washington street.

1840.—The County of Cheshire bought of Henry Coolidge a small lot on the north corner of Winter and Court street, where they erected a granite building twenty eight by thirty two feet in size, for county offices and records. It was on the site of the present court house. Keyes & Colony sold to Charles Sturtevant the west part of their store lot, on the north side of West street, and Mr. Sturtevant erected the building, which, with later additions has been standing there until removed by Reginald Howe to make room for his new block built this year, 1927. Joseph Dorr sold to Charles Lamson an addition to his homestead, on the west side of his house on West street. The town voted to release to the First Congregational Society whatever interest they had retained in the meetinghouse, except the bell. Joseph Dorr and wife gave a quitclaim deed of the land on which the court house was standing to Henry Coolidge.

The significance of this conveyance will be seen by referring to the year 1857.

1841.—Charles L. Putnam was appointed postmaster and the office moved to the building south of the Cheshire House. The Daniel Watson house was sold to John H. Fuller. Robert C. Shelly bought of Thomas M. Edwards a lot on the north side of Roxbury street, and erected the building later known as the Kimball house, now occupied by C. E. Stickney and others.

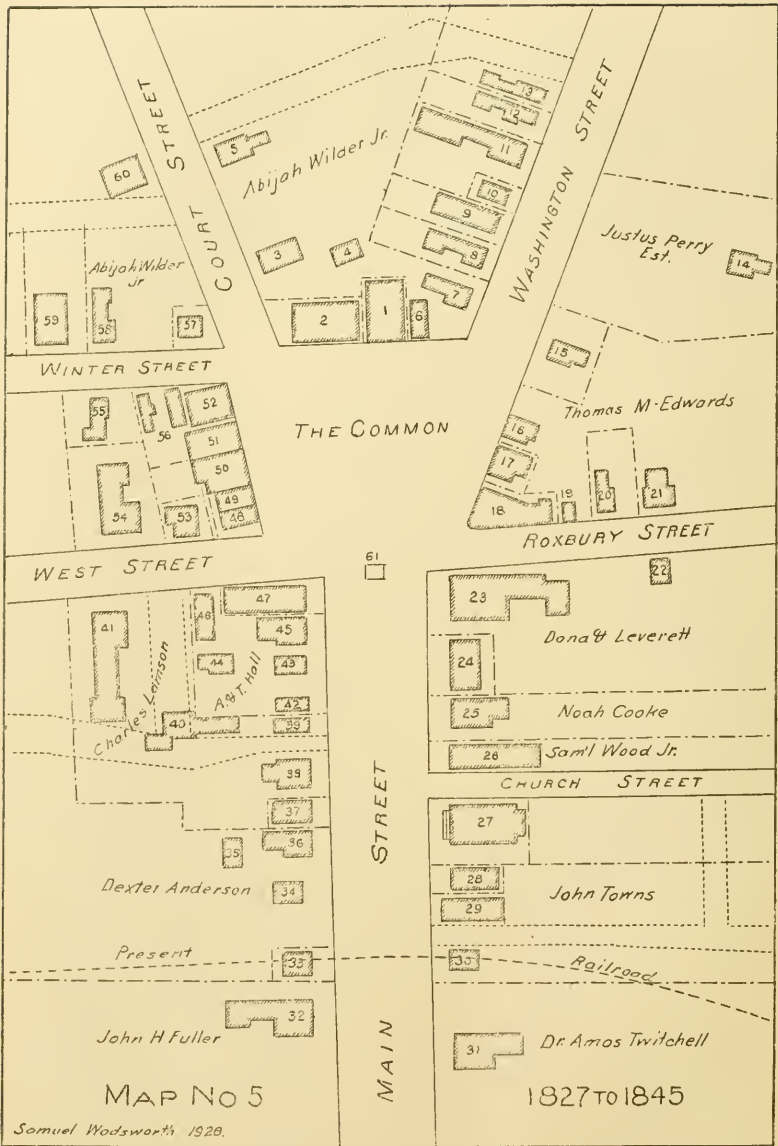
1842.—Charles Sturtevant sold to John Prentiss the north part of his lot in the rear of the Prentiss building. Harriet K. Evans having died, her estate on the north side of West street was sold to Zebediah Kise.

1844.—The Forest Tree Society had been previously formed, the object of which was to plant trees and otherwise improve the beauty of the town. At a town meeting held this year it was voted "that the society have leave to fence and ornament a small portion of the common, of such size and shape as the selectmen deem compatible with the convenience of the public highways." A plan was prepared by George W. Sturtevant and the selectmen gave permission to enclose a circle three rods in diameter "as marked out."

A bitter opposition arose among the traders and other citizens to any encroachment on the free and unobstructed use of the common as a parade ground, public market place and highways. The desired improvement was not carried out for several years. The common was described about that time as a "sandy waste." Charles Sturtevant sold his land and buildings on the north side of West street, west of Keyes & Colony's store to James B. Elliot. The Keene Center school district sold to Eliphalet Briggs the old schoolhouse and lot on the west side of Washington street, north of his cabinet shop, where the Warren block now stands. The Center district bought of James Buffum and John Wood a lot on the north side of Church street, and built the brick building where the school was kept

until 1883, when it was sold to S. W. Dickinson and has since been used as a laundry. Eliphalet Briggs sold to Augustus T. Wilder the house and lot on the west side of Washington street formerly of Abel Wilder, now occupied as a store by Leon M. Willard.

1845.—A charter was obtained for the Cheshire Railroad this year. William L. Foster was appointed postmaster and the office moved to the store now occupied by J. Fred Whitcomb.

1846.—The cabinet shop of Eliphalet Briggs on the west side of Washington street, and the two story brick school building immediately north, formerly of the Center school district and purchased by Mr. Briggs in 1844, as well as the two story dwelling on the south owned by John H. Fuller, were destroyed by fire. Mr. Briggs moved his cabinet business temporarily to the building standing on the present city hall lot, and the same year purchased the Ames building, on the east side of Main street, south of the Unitarian church, and afterwards moved his business to it. He also bought of John Towns the brick building immediately south, with the land in the rear, and extending to Dr. Twitchell's lot on the south. The land on the south, except a driveway twenty feet wide where Railroad street now is, was sold to the Cheshire Railroad Co., the building of the railroad having been commenced.

The location of the station and grounds were in question for sometime, many of the citizens wanting the depot located farther south on Main street. As an inducement to the railroad company to accept the present location, a subscription was raised and a large tract of land purchased west of Main street and south of West street, extending to the east line of land now owned by John J. Colony, and conveyed to the company. On Main street the land secured by the railroad company included the Cheshire Bank lot, the old Watson house and lot from John H. Fuller, and the

land between the bank lot and the Kingsbury building from Dexter Anderson; on the east side of the street the land of Eliphalet Briggs mentioned above, and a part of the Dr. Twitchell lot.

The Cheshire bank bought of John Wood and A. & T. Hall their present lot on the west side of Main street. Zebediah Kise sold the former Richardson homestead on the north side of West street to Harvey A. Bill, reserving the north part of the lot on Winter street, on which he built the present brick house numbered 16 on that street. Eliphalet Briggs sold to Daniel Adams and William S. Briggs the house now on the south corner of Vernon and Washington streets, and Dr. Adams sold his half to Mr. Briggs the following year. Eliphalet Briggs, Jr., sold to Stillman French the lot upon which the school house formerly stood.

1847.—The Cheshire bank erected two stories of the present bank building. The Cheshire Railroad Co. build the passenger station which formerly stood on the west line of Main street until removed when the present station was built in 1910. A committee was appointed by the town to see about purchasing land and building a town hall. The town had heretofore used the court house for its meetings. Zebediah Kise sold his lot and building on the south side of Winter street to Charles Keyes. The Keene Fire Society, formed in 1822, gave up its organization and turned over to the town all its apparatus, consisting of two fire engines, hose and buckets, as well as the engine house which stood on the Cheshire House land on the south side of Roxbury street.

1848.—The town purchased of the estate of Justus Perry the lot on which they erected the main part of the present city hall building. The Cheshire railroad was opened to Keene, and a charter obtained for the Ashuelot railroad. The county enlarged the lot on which the county building stood, by the purchase of land on the north of Abijah Wilder. The heirs of Henry Coolidge sold their interest in the former

court house lot, acquired from their father, to Samuel Wood. Abijah Wilder, Jr., conveyed to Henry and Amos Pond, by lease for twelve years, their building and land on the north side of the common, east of the meetinghouse. The Ponds enlarged and improved the building next the church, turned the old Cady house formerly facing Washington street, one quarter round and moved it to the north side of the common. The space between the two buildings was soon after filled with another building.

1849.—Selden F. White was appointed postmaster and the office was moved to his store in Wilders building, Azel Wilder, who had acquired from his brother the sole title to Wilder's building, sold the same to Henry and Amos Pond, who built an additional store on the west end, extending the building to the line of Court street. The outside stairways were removed and others made in the interior. John H. Fuller sold to Robert Shelly the land on the west side of Washington street, where his house was burned in 1846, and the present brick house, No. 18, was built.

1850.—Robert C. Shelly sold to Thomas M. Edwards his house and lot on the north side of Roxbury street. This was the so called Kimball house now occupied by C. E. Stickney and others.

1851.—The Cheshire House property was conveyed by Dana and Leverett to John Henry Elliot and Frank S. Fiske, and they conveyed it to Leonard Bisco and Elbridge G. Whitcomb. Samuel Wood sold his bakery property on the corner of Main and Church streets to Asa Duren and Peter B. Hayward. William Lamson sold to George H. Richards the brick block at the corner of Central Square and Roxbury street, and Mr. Richards established his watch and jewelry business in the corner store. The opposition which developed in 1844 to improving the common and using part of it for park purposes having subsided, The Forest Tree Society graded and improved a portion of it, set out trees and built a wooden fence around it. From a map of Keene published

in 1853, the part so improved seems to be about one hundred and twenty-five feet in length and width, but of an irregularly six sided shape, widest at the north end as now. It resembled in shape the burial coffins in use at that time and received the name of "Coffin common."

1852.—The Methodist Episcopal Society bought their lot on the west side of Court street of Abijah Wilder, and the following year built their first meetinghouse on it.

1853.—Joshua D. Colony was appointed postmaster and the office was moved to Richards' building on the east side of Central Square. The High School was established in the Keene Academy building on the north side of Winter street. The land and building immediately south of the Cheshire House was secured through foreclosure by Francis A. Faulkner. The Baptist Society sold to Joseph Foster and Charles P. Felt, the north part of their lot where Foster & Felt continued the manufacture of organs and melodeons in the building later known as the gun shop.

1854.—The old Watson harness shop on the west side of Main street, north of Lamson's tannery, was burned.

1855.—The firm of A. & T. Hall having failed in business in 1850, their real estate on the west side of Main street and south side of West street was sold by Lewis Campbell, the assignee. The brick building on West street, west of Elliot's building, was bought by Amos C. Greely; the dwelling house and land in the rear to Albert Kingsbury. The rest of the property on the west side of Main street, both north and south of the Cheshire bank was sold to Henry Pond. This included the old A. & T. Hall store building, where the Buffum block now stands. Henry Pond sold to the Cheshire County bank, which had just been organized, the lot immediately south of the Cheshire bank, and the brick building was erected, now owned by John C. Tierney, two stories in height. Asa Duren sold his half of the bakery property to his partner, Peter B. Hayward. Silvanus Titus sold his house on the north side of Roxbury street to

Elbridge G. Whitecomb, who occupied it as a residence, and has been owned by his heirs until recently. Henry Pond built about this time the brick building on the west side of Main street later called Wright's block, now occupied by the Douglass Shoe Company.

1856.—Amos C. Greely bought of Francis A. Faulkner the block south of the Cheshire House. About this time a band stand was built on the north part of the park where the Ingersoll fountain was later located. It remained for several years, but was burned on a fourth of July morning as a part of the patriotic celebration of Young America. About this time also the old wooden fence around the park was removed, the park somewhat enlarged, and the lines changed to nearly its present form, and the present stone posts and iron rail fence built. The park did not extend so far south as now, and was not as wide at the south end. Gravel walks were also built through it. A tall flag pole erected for campaign purposes was standing near the south end of the park where it remained for several years. James B. Elliot sold to John W. Prentiss his lot and building on the north side of West street.

1857.—The county again enlarged the county record lot by purchasing land on the northwest side of Abijah Wilder. The title of the county to the old court house and lot having been forfeited by reason of renting a part for business purposes, the main part of the present court house was built during this and the following year on the site of the former county record building. Selden F. White and Amos L. Wood, executors of the will of Samuel Wood, who held a quit-claim deed of the premises, formerly given by Joseph Dorr and wife, also secured the title to the building from the court, and sold the south half of the land and building to Samuel A. Gerould. Mr. Gerould added a fourth story and remodeled the building, and is the same now owned by Wm. P. Chamberlain Co. and occupied by George H. Tilden & Co.

and others. Amos C. Greely sold to John Henry Elliot the brick building west of Elliot's block on the south side of West street. Elbridge Clarke bought of Abijah Wilder the land and buildings on the north side of Central Square, afterwards known as Clarke's block.

1858.—Josiah P. Cooke sold to Brigham Nims the former Noah Cooke property on the east side of Main street where the E. F. Lane upper block now stands. John Prentiss sold to Elbridge C. Whitecomb his brick block on the west side of Central Square. Abijah Wilder sold to the County of Cheshire a strip of land on the west side of the court house lot. Horatio J. Perry sold to Robert C. Shelly and George G. Sawyer, the Justus Perry store and lot on the east side of the square where the Colony block now stands.

1859.—The heirs of Eliphalet Briggs sold to Dr. A. S. Carpenter the brick house and lot on the west side of Washington street where Dr. Carpenter afterwards lived. The house was built by Eliphalet Briggs after the fire destroyed his cabinet shop, on the same site, in 1846. Shelly & Sawyer sold to Colony Brothers, proprietors of the Cheshire Mills at Harrisville, eighteen feet from the south side of their lot on the east side of the square. Shelly and Sawyer replaced the old Perry store building with a brick block three stories in height, and the Cheshire Mills Co. built one in connection with it, of the same height, with an ornamental iron front, painted white, and the lower floor of marble.

The First Congregational meetinghouse was moved to the north four feet, about this time, and remodelled to its present size and form. Thomas M. Edwards sold to George H. Richards his store, called the "white store" on the east side of Central Square north of the Shelly & Sawyer building, and including the land in the rear, as well as the small brick building on the north side of Roxbury street occupied by Mr. Edwards as a law office. Henry Pond sold to Stephen L. Randall the brick building on the west side of Main street, later known as Wrights block and now occu-

pied by the W. L. Douglass shoe company. Bisco & Whitcomb sold to Henry Pond the Cheshire House property, and Mr. Pond bought of Amos C. Greely the block immediately south of it. This brought together the different parts of the Cheshire House property, which was divided in 1814. Mr. Pond remodeled the brick block, connecting it to the Cheshire House by building upon the driveway that formerly separated the buildings, and finished the upper part into a public hall, called Cheshire hall. The building was known as the Cheshire block.

1860.—Henry Pond sold to Caleb T. Buffum the old A. & T. Hall store and lot on the west side of Main street where the Buffum block now stands. The Parish of St. James bought of the Cheshire Railroad Co. the lot on the south side of West street where their church now stands. Selden F. White and Amos L. Wood sold to Dauphin W. Buckminster the north half of the old court house and lot. That building, now owned by C. Gale Shedd and occupied by himself and others, remains in substantially the same form on the outside as originally built in 1824. Elliot's building was remodeled, another story being added, which was afterwards occupied by the Masonic lodges. John W. Prentiss sold to Francis E. Keyes, the building on the north side of West street, west of Keyes' store.

1861.—Thomas E. Hatch was appointed postmaster and the office removed to a small building erected for the purpose by Thomas M. Edwards, south of the town hall. The building on the west side of Court street, where the Barker block now stands, was destroyed by fire. This was the old frame court house, erected on the common in 1796, moved to the west side in 1808 and moved to this site in 1824 when the brick court house was erected. Foster & Felt sold their lot north of the Baptist church to George O. Leonard, who occupied the building for the manufacture and repair of guns and rifles.

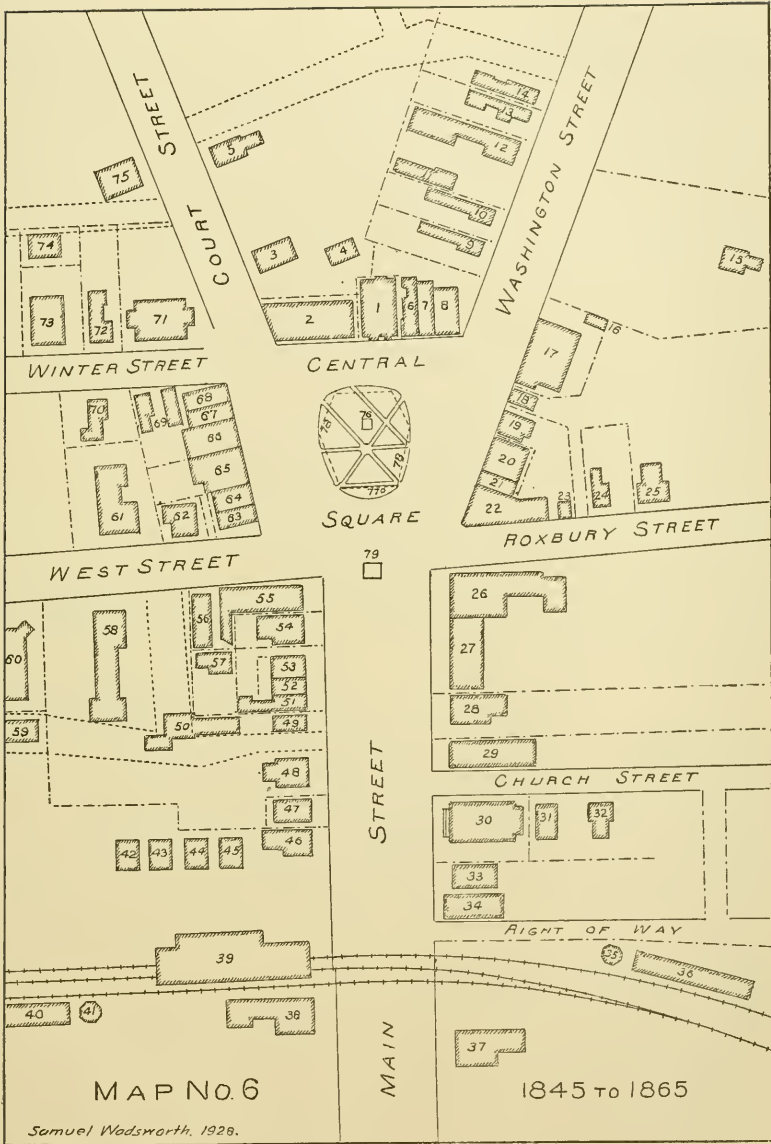
- 1862.—During the night of Feb. 6 the “old white store” on the east side of Central Square, owned by George H. Richards, was destroyed by fire. The south store was occupied by Stephen Barker, grocer, and the north by S. L. Randall, dealer in boots and shoes. The second story was occupied by Samuel Woodward as a tin shop.
- 1863.—The heirs of Eliphalet Briggs sold to S. L. Randall and S. O. Gates the brick building on the east side of Main street north of the railroad, where the south part of the Gurnsey block now stands. Henry Pond and the heirs of Amos Pond sold the old Wilder building on the north side of Central Square to George W. Ball, and it has since been known as Ball’s block, and now owned by his heirs. Albert Kingsbury sold to S. L. Randall the dwelling house that he had occupied in the rear of the Cheshire bank. The St. James Parish built their church edifice this year. Henry Pond sold the Cheshire House and Cheshire block to George Doolittle and Augustus Grimes, and Mr. Doolittle became landlord of the hotel. The heirs of Justus Perry conveyed to Rev. William O. White the Perry homestead north of the town hall, now the High school lot.
- 1864.—Randall & Gates sold to George Burnap and Joseph M. Hyland the store north of the railroad which they bought in 1863. Shelly and Sawyer sold to Henry and Alfred T. Colony their brick block on the east side of Central Square. The belfry and tower on the City hall was built.
- 1865.—S. L. Randall conveyed to Leonard Wright one half interest in his block on the west side of Main street, as well as the dwelling in the rear of the Cheshire bank. George H. Richards sold to Charles Bridgman his white store lot on the east side of Central Square, where the Bridgman block now stands. Thomas M. Edwards and the Town of Keene exchanged deeds to establish the south and east lines of the town hall lot. The buildings on the east side of Central Square, including the Richards building on the corner of Roxbury street, the Cheshire Mills and the Shelly &

Sawyer blocks, were destroyed by fire on the night of Oct. 20. The small buildings south of the town hall used for the postoffice, was torn down to prevent the fire spreading to the north. The post office was moved to the grand jury room in the court house for a short time and then to the west store of Elliot's building on the south side of West street. J. G. Warren bought of Stillman French his house and stable on the west side of Washington street. The main house was taken down in 1886 and the ell moved to No. 77 Spring street. The new Bennett block now occupies the site of the old house.

1866.—Charles Bridgman bought of Thomas M. Edwards a small addition to his lot and built the present Bridgman block. F. L. Sprague and others bought of Mr. Edwards the land between the Bridgman lot and the town hall and built the block now owned by Knowlton & Stone. The Town of Keene built a room for the selectmen, now part of the office of the Superintendent of water works and sewers, with a room over it, by filling the space that was left between the new Sprague block and the town hall. Rev. William O. White sold to the Town of Keene an addition to the town hall lot on the north, a part of the Justus Perry homestead. Randall & Wright sold to Lucy Leonard the old dwelling and lot in the rear of the Cheshire Bank. George Doolittle sold to Fred A. Barker and Curtis E. Willard the Cheshire House property and they conveyed the same to Morgan J. Sherman, who became the landlord of the hotel and continued in that capacity for many years. Norris G. Gurnsey bought of Charles Keyes his residence on the south side of Winter street. F. W. Beckley bought the William S. Briggs house at the south corner of Vernon and Washington streets. East end of Centre street land out.

1867.—George H. Richards sold to William P. Wheeler and Francis A. Faulkner the brick law office building, formerly occupied by Thomas M. Edwards, and the firm of Wheeler & Faulkner continued to occupy it for the same purpose. The Keene Congregational Society (Unitarian) enlarged and remodeled their church edifice at the corner of Main and Church streets. A tower with a tall spire was built at the northwest corner and a new tower clock with four dials placed therein. D. W. Buckminster sold the building at the corner of Central Square and Winter street to E. N. & L. W. Cummings. J. G. Warren bought of Augustus T. Wilder his residence on Washington street and occupied it as a residence. Francis E. Keyes sold to O. H. Gillett the lot and building on the north side of West street west of

the Keyes store. That is where the block has been recently built by Reginald Howe.

1868.—William S. Briggs sold to Baker & Wellington the old Ames building on the east side of Main street where the north part of the Gurnsey block now stands, and Joseph M. Hyland sold to N. G. Gurnsey the old brick building at the corner of Railroad street, where the south part of the same block was erected in 1895. F. L. Sprague sold to M. T. Tottingham & Co. his block on the east side of Central Square, now the Knowlton & Stone building. The Court Street Congregational Church was built during this and the following year. The Elliot building was again remodeled, the present roof being built and St. John's hall enlarged for the use of the Masonic fraternity.

1869.—George H. Richards sold to Elisha F. Lane and Mr. Lane to the Cheshire Provident Institution, the lot at the corner of Central Square and Roxbury street. John Henry Elliot bought of Robert P. Leonard the Lucy Leonard lot in the rear of the Cheshire National Bank, Mr. Leonard reserving the old dwelling house standing on it, which was taken down and erected on Douglass street. The outside was never finished, showing the rough boarding. It was afterwards destroyed by fire. Mr. Elliot built on the former Leonard premises, at that time or soon after, the present brick building, connecting it with the building facing West street which he bought of Amos C. Greely in 1857. The old Methodist meeting house had recently been moved to the east side of Court street and was being used by the Court Street Congregational Society for their services during the erection of their new church. It was afterwards moved to the north side of Vernon street and became the Bethany Pentecostal Church. A part of Vernon street, from Court street easterly, was laid out this year. Dr. G. C. Hill bought the former Abijah Wilder house on the north side of Winter street which he used as a residence. The house was said to have formerly stood at the north side of

the common, east of the meeting house. When the Court house was enlarged it was moved to Church street.

1870.—Henry C. Handerson was appointed postmaster, the office being continued in the Elliot building on the south side of West street. The Bank and Colony blocks on the east side of Central Square were built this year. When nearly completed one of the most severe earthquakes ever felt in this vicinity occurred, which made the buildings tremble so violently that the workmen rushed outside, and looked back as if to see the buildings fall. The introduction of water from Goose pond, commenced in 1869, was completed, and the old town well or cistern at the head of Main street, being of no further use, was soon filled. A band stand was afterwards erected in the site, which stood for many years.

1871.—The Soldiers monument was erected this year. Farnum F. Lane bought the building at the corner of Central Square and Winter street, formerly the north half of the old court house. It was held by him and his heirs until recently sold to C. Gale Shedd. Railroad street was laid out as a public highway. It had previously been a passage or right of way established by Eliphalet Briggs to his property east of Main street.

1872.—Robert C. Shelly sold to Edwin Parks and he to Elbridge Clarke, the house on the west side of Washington street, afterwards used by him as a residence. The Baptist Society bought the Abijah Wilder homestead on Court street at the corner of Vernon.

1873.—Joseph G. Warren completed his brick block on Washington street, commenced in 1872.

1874.—The city government was organized this year. The new Baptist church was built on the Wilder lot on Court street. Dr. George B. Twitchell sold to the railroad company his house on Main street. The house was soon afterwards moved to the rear of No. 96 Main street, on what is now called Cypress court, and used for business purposes. The

- railroad company built an engine house on the Twitchell lot, now (1927) used for a garage. The Keene Public Library was established. Henry C. Handerson, the postmaster, died and was succeeded in the office by his widow, Lydia M. Handerson. A mechanical fire alarm was attached to the bell of the city hall building. Vernon street was extended to Washington street. Dr. Twitchell bought of Thomas M. Edwards a house lot on the north side of Roxbury street.
- 1875.—Dr. Twitchell built his new house on Roxbury street, now the Odd Fellows building. The old ell of the Cheshire house was taken down and a new block, built of wood, on the south side of Roxbury street. Mrs. Lydia M. Handerson died and Dr. Thomas E. Hatch was appointed acting postmaster. Center street extended to School street.
- 1876.—The new High school building, now the Junior High, on Winter street was erected on the site of the old Academy building which was constructed in 1836, and had been occupied by the High school since 1853. The High school was kept in the city hall during the erection of the new building. Asa Smith was appointed postmaster.
- 1877.—The old dwelling house on the Lamson property on the west side of Main street was moved to the rear and the present Lamson block erected in its place. The old house continued to be used as a dwelling until 1903, when it was taken down. The Keene Public Library was moved from the Colony block to Warrens block.
- 1878.—The First Congregational Society bought the property on the east side of Court street where the brick block now stands. The lot was formerly occupied by the cabinet shop of Abijah Wilder.
- 1879.—A new mechanical fire alarm striker was attached to the bell on the city hall building.
- 1880.—Clarke's block at the north side of Central Square, including the old Albe Cady house which was built soon after 1800, was nearly destroyed by fire. The present block

was built, and Liberty Hall which then occupied the third story of the building was dedicated. The city hall was enlarged and remodeled. An addition for a new room was built at the north end, the roof raised, tower extended, and a stage and balcony added. The city bought of Reuben Stewart, who had recently purchased it of the Baptist Society, the west part of the land on Vernon street, now occupied by the fire department. The Deluge engine house was moved from St. James street to this lot. Fisher Kirk and Sewall bought the store lot on the north side of West street formerly occupied by O. H. Gillett, where the new Howe block has been built this year, 1927.

1881.—The Public Library was moved to the new room built in 1880, at the north end of the City hall building. A large factory building was erected in the rear of the Lamson block, replacing the old tannery building that had stood there for nearly one hundred years. The factory building remained until taken down to make room for the Latchis theatre.

1882.—The brick building on the west side of Main street, formerly occupied by the Keene Five Cent Savings Bank, now by the jewelry store of Frank F. Stearns, was erected, replacing the old Lamson store building that was built during the early part of the last century. The heirs of Peter B. Hayward conveyed to George O. Hayward the bakery property at the corner of Main and Church streets.

1883.—Charles H. Stone bought of M. T. Tottingham & Co. their brick block next south of the city hall. The wooden block on the south side of Roxbury street, belonging to the Cheshire House property, was burned in August, and the present east wing of the Cheshire House built.

1884.—The City of Keene bought of the Baptist Society and of David M. Nichols, lands on the south side of Vernon street as additions to the fire department lot.

- 1885.—The First Congregational Church block on Court street was built. The old Wilder cabinet shop that stood on the premises was moved to the rear, and was the most northerly of the two buildings that were removed in 1924 when the new parish house was built. George O. Hayward sold to N. G. Gurnsey & Sons the bakery property at the corner of Main and Church streets. The Cheshire Provident Institution bought of J. T. Colony and others the brick office building on Roxbury street, formerly the law office of Thomas M. Edwards and Wheeler & Faulkner, and built an addition to the bank block. The postoffice, which had occupied the adjoining store on the west, was moved to the new building, where it remained until removed to the Russell block in 1896. An additional story was built on the Keene National bank building, now Tierney's block. The Stevens fire alarm system was installed. A new building for the fire department was erected on Vernon street.
- 1886.—The new armory for the Keene Light Guards on Winter street was dedicated. It was formerly the Baptist meeting-house, built in 1839, with an addition on the north end extending to Center street. The Ashuelot Bank building was remodeled and a third story added. A third story was added to the Cheshire National bank building and other alterations made. Ormond E. Colony was appointed postmaster.
- 1890.—Rev. William O. White sold to Henry O. Coolidge, and Mr. Coolidge conveyed to the City of Keene the old Perry homestead on the east side of Washington street, for library and park purposes. Caleb T. Buffum built the present Buffum block on the west side of Main street, removing the old A. & T. Hall building that was erected by Moses Johnson about 1792. Vernon street was widened to better accommodate the fire department. Fred E. Barrett was appointed postmaster.

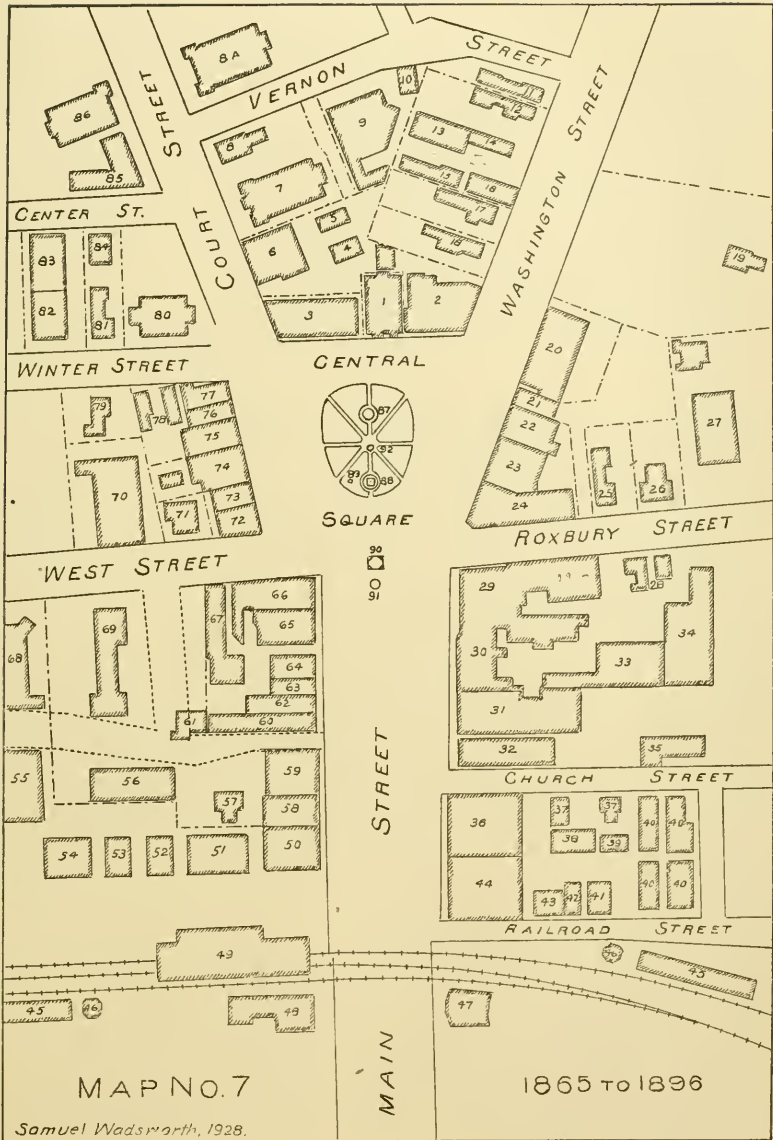
- 1891.—Elisha F. Lane bought of Brigham Nims the old Noah Cooke building and lot on the east side of Main street, south of the Cheshire House, and built the present brick building on that site. The south wing of the Cheshire house was again remodeled, the present front being built and the old Cheshire hall divided into rooms for hotel use. J. Fred Whitcomb, administrator of the estate of Mrs. Harvey A. Bill, sold to Charles L. Russell the Bill homestead on West street.
- 1892.—Charles L. Russell conveyed to the Young Mens Christian Association the Bill property on West street. The park in Central Square was enlarged a few feet at the south end, and with the adjoining portions of Central Square, filled and regraded. Concrete walks were laid in the park and granite paving around it. The fire station on Vernon street was enlarged. Main street was widened on the west side, and the line and grade established from West street to the railroad. The Sentinel Printing Co. purchased of the Young Mens Christian Association, who had bought it of the Railroad Co. in 1890, the old brick store and lot north of the passenger station.
- 1893.—The Sentinel building was erected this year and also that of the Young Mens Christian Association, the latter replacing the old Richardson tavern that was built about 1773, and later known as the Bill homestead.
- 1894.—The Keene Congregational Society (Unitarian) sold to Elisha F. Lane their lot at the corner of Main and Church streets, and Mr. Lane built the E. F. L. block. The society had purchased the old Dorr lot on Washington street in 1892, and erected the present stone church building this year. N. G. Gurnsey & Sons removed the old Ames building and built the north part of the Gurnsey block. Main street was widened and the line and grade established on the east side from Church to Railroad streets. The Holbrook Grocery Co. erected their warehouse on the east side of St. James street.

1895.—The Russell block at the corner of Central Square and West street was built, replacing the old Keyes block built in 1833. The south part of the Gurnsey block was built on the site of the old Moses Johnson store and former residence of the elder Governor Samuel Dinsmoor and the birthplace of the younger governor. It was built prior to the year 1800. Fred A. Barker was appointed postmaster. A small addition was made to the rear of the city hall building to enlarge the office of the superintendent of water works and sewers. The Keene National bank sold its building on the west side of Main street to John C. Tierney and moved their banking rooms to the north room in the E. F. L. block which they have just vacated, (1927).

1896.—A fountain, called the Ingersoll fountain, was erected in the park on Central Square from funds left by the will of Caroline H. Ingersoll in memory of her brother, Allan H. Ingersoll. It remained there about eighteen years when it was removed. The postoffice was moved from the Bank block to the Russell building at the corner of West street. An addition was made to the rear of the Cheshire National bank building. The east line of Main street was established from Roxbury street to Church street, and the roadway from Central Square to the railroad graded and a macadam pavement laid.

1897.—Charles A. Jones built the large building for manufacturing purposes on Church, Wells and Railroad streets, replacing the old buildings formerly used as a carriage manufactory by J. & F. French.

1898.—Jerry P. Wellman was appointed postmaster. E. F. Lane erected a small brick building for a store on the south side of Church street, east of the E. F. L. block.

1899.—Elisha F. Lane built a large extension on the east end of his upper block on the east side of Main street. The Thayer library building, formerly the residence of Henry Colony, was completed and the Keene Public Library moved from its former location in the north store in the city hall building to it.

- 1900.—The Keene Electric Railway from Marlboro to West Keene was built. E. F. Lane bought of N. G. Gurnsey & Sons, the west part of their Bakery property, fronting on Main street, and Messrs. Gurnsey & Sons built their new bakery on the east part of their lot, on the north side of Church street, and moved their bakery into it. The bakery had been established in its former place since 1816. The Abbott Grocery Co. built a large addition to their warehouse on Railroad square, that they had occupied since 1890.
- 1901.—E. F. Lane built his brick block on the corner of Main and Church streets, where the bakery formerly stood. He also built a brick building on his Cooke lot on the east end of his upper block. The heirs of George Kingsbury sold to William P. Chamberlain the Kingsbury building on the west side of Main street. The property had been owned by the Kingsbury family since 1814. Mr. Chamberlain bought of Margaret L. Griffin a small piece of the Lamson land to enlarge his lot on the west. Mrs. F. A. Corey built the Corey block on the south side of Vernon street.
- 1904.—William P. Chamberlain & Co. bought of the heirs of Samuel A. Gerould their property on Central Square and Winter street and erected the Chamberlain block. A. H. Bruder bought of William P. Chamberlain the Kingsbury property on the west side of Main street and Mr. Bruder built a brick addition to the west end of the old Kingsbury building. A new band stand was built at the north end of Main street on the site of the old one removed a few years before. The Odd Fellows Association bought the Dr. George B. Twitchell homestead on Roxbury street and remodeled the house for their use. Wildey hall was built in connection with the old house.
- 1906.—The heirs of Elbridge Clarke sold the Clarke property on the north side of Central Square, and the house on the west side of Washington street to J. Whitney Buckminster, Adolf W. Pressler and Ervin J. Davis.

- 1907.—A part of the old Lamson property, belonging to the heirs of Margaret L. Griffin, was purchased by the Federal Government as a site for a post office building. A street (Federal street including part of Lamson street) was laid out southerly and westerly from West to St. James street, passing through the old tannery building that was built by William Lamson in 1787, which was removed. As the first postoffice established in Keene was in the old Richardson tavern on the site of the present Y. M. C. A. building, the new site will be directly opposite.
- 1910.—The old Lamson house on West street was demolished preparatory to the erection of the new postoffice. Ben O. Aldrich was appointed postmaster in the place of Jerry P. Wellman who had resigned. The new railway station was erected and the former station which was built in 1847, removed. Charles L. Griffin and others sold to the Nims Brothers a piece of land at the corner of West and Federal streets. Central Square was re-graded and a new pavement of vitrified brick laid.
- 1911.—The new Federal building for the postoffice was erected on the site of the former Lamson house. Nims Brothers built a new brick block for stores and offices on their new lot at the corner of West and Federal streets. Lamson street was extended to Main street. The house on Winter street formerly occupied by Dr. G. C. Hill was removed and an extension of the Court House towards the west commenced.
- 1912.—The erection of the new High School building on the Coolidge, or former Perry lot, was commenced. The Citizens National Bank and the Keene Savings Bank fitted up new quarters in the Russell block recently vacated by the post office. The Court house extension was completed this year. The heirs of John Henry Elliot bought of the Lamson estate a tract of land on the east side of Federal street, south of the new Nims building. Ornamental lights were placed around the Common on Central Square.

- 1913.—The land of Mrs. Mary Elliot, formerly the Edwards land, in the rear of the City Hall was purchased by the city as an addition to the City Hall lot, and new buildings erected on it for the use of Water and Sewer and the Highway departments. The Ingersoll fountain, erected in the park in 1896 was removed. A brick pavement was laid on West street from Central Square to St. James street.
- 1915.—About this time the Elliot block was built on the east side of Federal street.
- 1920.—Charles L. Griffin and others sold to Henry Swan the two Lamson blocks and all adjoining land formerly belonging to the Lamson estate on the west side of Main street, and Mr. Swan sold to Fred O. Whipple the block and land immediately north of Lamson street, between Main and Federal streets.
- 1921.—Elisha F. Lane sold to Charles C. Baldwin the northerly part of the former Laton Martin property on the west side of Main street. The heirs of Leonard Wright sold to Roy V. Whitney the Wright block on the west side of Main street.
- 1922.—Henry Swan sold to Demetrius Latchis the Lamson block and land west of it, being part of the Lamson estate which he purchased in 1920. He also sold to Arthur B. Nims the land north of Lamson street and west of Federal, where Mr. Nims erected the brick building now occupied by the Nims Plumbing Co. Flora B. Shepardson sold to F. A. Putnam & Co. the frame building on the north side of West street east of the Y. M. C. A. building, formerly owned by her father, James B. Fisher and occupied by Fisher, Kirk & Sewall dealers in stoves and tinware.
- 1923.—Charles C. Baldwin removed the old Laton Martin house on the west side of Main street which was built by the Hon. Peleg Sprague in 1795, and erected the Colonial theatre. Demetrius Latchis removed the old factory building in the rear of the Lamson block and built the Latchis theatre.

- 1924.—Additional land was purchased at the east end of the school lot and a large addition to the High School building erected. The Ashuelot and the Citizens National Banks combined under the name of the Ashuelot, Citizens National Bank, and bought the Russell block at the corner of Central Square and West street. The Keene Savings Bank bought the former Ashuelot Bank building. The Cheshire National Bank erected a new front and made other improvements to their Bank building. The First Congregational Society built a new Parish house on Court Square, in the rear of their church, removing the two old Wilder buildings that had occupied the site for many years. Charles C. Baldwin sold to Demetrius Latchis the Colonial theatre. Fred E. Howe sold to Carl F. Bloomer the old Armory building on the north side of Winter street, formerly the Baptist Church. The new Soldiers monument and flag pole was erected at the north end of Main street.
- 1925.—The Keene Savings Bank put on a new front and otherwise improved the old Ashuelot Bank building which they purchased in 1924. The Ashuelot, Citizens Bank also put a new front and remodeled its banking rooms in the Russell block. The Cheshire County Savings Bank also remodeled the banking rooms in the Bank block. Bloomer & Haselton re-fitted the Armory on Winter street for store purposes and later built an addition on the east side for the same purpose. The heirs of Elbridge G. Whitcomb sold to Morris Medvidosky the former Whitcomb homestead on Roxbury street and Mr. Medvidosky enlarged the house making two stores. F. A. Putnam & Co. sold the premises on the north side of West street, which they purchased in 1922, to George G. Doucoumes. New and brilliant street lights were installed around Central Square and on the adjacent parts of the radiating streets.
- 1926.—The Keene Fire Department building on Vernon street was badly damaged by fire. It was rebuilt on an enlarged and improved plan. The Keene National Bank purchased

of the Keene Gas & Electric Co. the old frame building and lot on the north side of Central Square, east of the church. The old building was taken down and the erection of a modern bank building commenced. Charles Gale Shedd bought of the heirs of the Farnum F. Lane estate the building which he had occupied at the corner of Central Square and Winter street. This building is the north half of the old Court House built in 1824. Reginald Howe sold to John Elliot the Buffum block on the west side of Main street which he had received as a share of the estate of Caleb T. Buffum. The Keene Gas & Electric Co. was sold to the Public Service Company of New Hampshire. Frank J. Bennett built the Bennett block on the west side of Washington street.

1927.—Reginald Howe bought of George J. Doucoumes the old frame building and lot on the north side of West street east of the Y. M. C. A. building, which he removed and erected the Howe block. The heirs of Elbridge C. Whitcomb conveyed all the remaining title to the Whitcomb block on the west side of Central Square to J. Fred Whitcomb. The heirs of Mrs. George Ball conveyed to Robert F. Carroll and Frank M. Wilder the Ball block on the north side of Central Square. The Gurnsey block at the corner of Main and Railroad streets was conveyed to J. J. Newberry & Co.

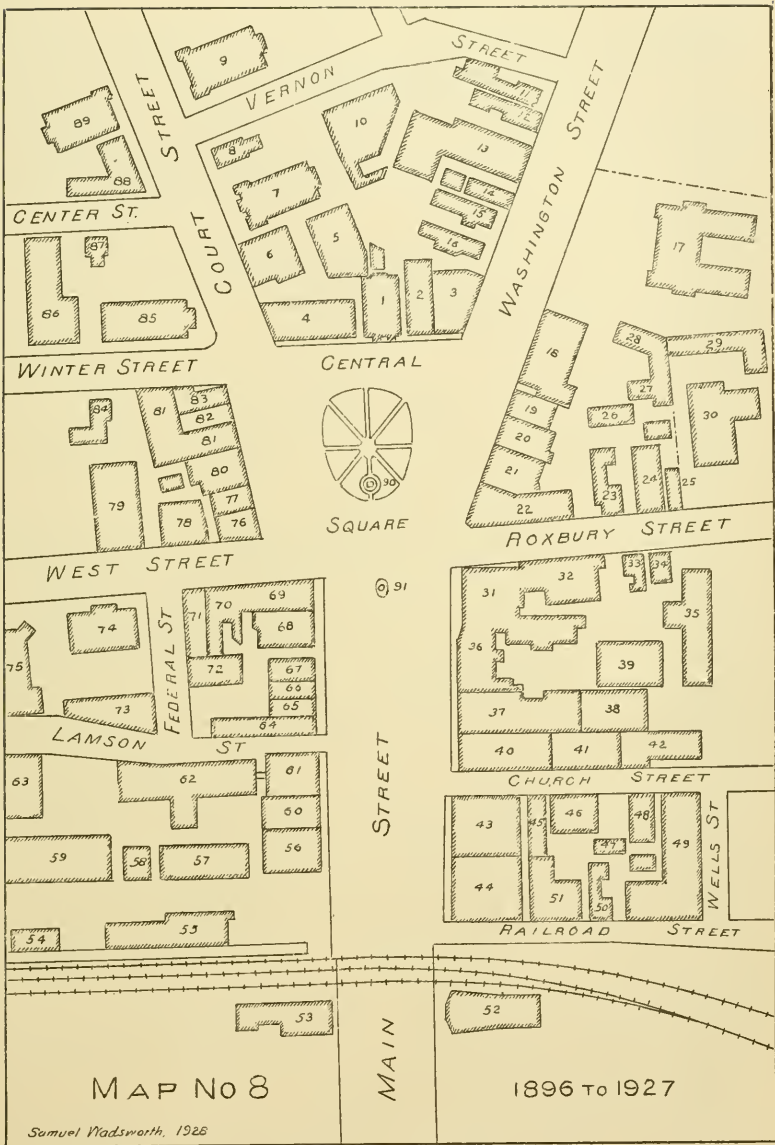
1928.—The City Hall was remodeled. The former stores were converted into city offices and a comfort station installed in the basement. The awning was removed and the exterior cleaned and re-finished.

ORDINANCES AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

CITY OF KEENE

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and
twenty-seven

AN ORDINANCE relating to firearms and explosives.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

Section 1. That the title of Chapter XXX of the Keene City Ordinances of November 20, 1924, shall henceforth be—
RELATING TO FIREARMS AND EXPLOSIVES.

Section 2. That section 3 of said chapter be amended by striking out the whole section and insert in place thereof the following:

Section 3. The penalty for violation of sections 1 and 2 hereof shall be a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, and costs of prosecution.

Section 3. That new sections, to be known as section 4, section 5, section 6, be added to said chapter, which sections are as follows:

Section 4. No person, association, partnership or corporation, shall use, cause, or permit to be used, any building, land, or place, for the storage, deposit, or keeping of gunpowder, giant powder, dynamite, blasting powder, nitro-glycerine, or other like explosive, in quantities over 15 pounds, unless said building or place of deposit is at least 1,000 feet from any dwelling house, public road or public place, municipal water system, dam, reservoir, mains, or other principal parts thereof, and under a license from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen.

Section 5. Any person, association, partnership or corporation that shall violate the provisions of section 4 shall be fined not to exceed \$25 for each offense. The imposition of one penalty for any violation of section 4, shall not excuse the violation, or permit it to continue; and all violations or defects shall be required to be corrected or remedied within a reasonable time, and when not otherwise specified each five days that prohibited conditions are maintained, shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. The application of the penalty provided in section 5 shall not be held to prevent any action to secure the removal of the prohibited condition by suit at law or in equity, as provided by the ordinances of the city, or by the laws of the state.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

The Keene Water Works were established and have been extended from time to time by authority of a charter from the legislature of New Hampshire, granted July 3, 1861, and amendments thereto dated June 24, 1868.

The first contract was made with the Patent Water and Gas Pipe Co., of New Jersey, September 3, 1868.

Water was let into the system November, 1869.

1872.

Beech Hill reservoir was built and connected with the system.

1882.

The Waring system of sewers was adopted and turned over to the city in 1883.

1886.

The Roxbury supply was brought into the city via Beech Hill.

1890.

The first meters were installed.

1891.

Ten and one-half miles of cement lined pipe were replaced with cast iron. There remains in service (1916) 7,047 feet in Court Street, 400 in Roxbury Street, and 186 in West Street.

1902.

Additional water from Roxbury was brought into the city via South Keene.

1908.

The Board of Water Commissioners was abolished by the City Councils.

1910.

The dam at Echo Lake was rebuilt, raising the water in the lake six feet.

1914.

The meter system was adopted and all services ordered metered.

1917.

Guards maintained at Echo Lake for three months.

1924.

By vote of the City Councils two filters and a storage reservoir were authorized. One filter and reservoir on Beech Hill and one filter at the stone dam.

1925.

The Beech Hill filter and reservoir was completed and water turned into City October 7, increasing the pressure about twenty-five pounds.

An Altitude Valve was placed in the Court Street main thereby eliminating all waste and reducing the pressure in the old cement lined pipe.

The stone dam filter was completed and water turned on December 9th.

1927.

The 12 inch main pipe from the Stone dam to Eastern Avenue was cleaned, about 14,500 ft. and 3,000 ft. of 8 inch, increasing the capacity 700,000 to 800,000 gals. daily.

1928.

1,300 tons of sand was placed in the Stone dam and Beech Hill Filters.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF HIGHWAYS

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I beg leave to submit a report of the Highway Department for the year of 1928.

After careful consideration of the cost of maintenance of streets subjected to the heaviest traffic, it was deemed best by the Mayor and councils to construct these streets of more permanent materials. Consequently, a plan was mapped out to improve the principal streets radiating from Central Square by building concrete pavements to a point, where in most cases the state aid commences. A bond issue of \$165,000 was provided to finance this work. To carry on this work a road paver was purchased, this machine being paid for out of our fund for new equipment. After receiving quotations for crushed stone or washed gravel, and after considering the cost of same and the possibility of delay in shipments, it was plainly evident that it was economy for the city to purchase equipment and open the old granite quarry on the Concord Road.

The cost of the crusher was \$1,884; installation and building bins, \$6,411.63; air compressor, \$1,132.30; for batchers from the Blaw Knox Co., \$470.40; for motors from the Frank Ridlon Co., \$487.50; for motors from W. R. Kirk, \$150. Some of the larger items of equipment needed to build these roads are as follows: 2,000 feet of 9 inch road forms costing \$1,480; 2,000 feet of 6 inch road forms costing \$1,240; mechanical cement finisher, \$300; jack hammers, drills and other supplies, \$1,444.62; dynamite and caps, \$2,293.45; 7,900 pieces of steel reinforcing mats, \$17,254.37; calcium chloride, \$1,640.62; cement and handling, \$57,893.38.

The total cost charged to this work, including labor and material was \$162,235.64; with credits for empty cement sacks

returned; cement sold to the Water Department; materials on hand; credits for cement sacks now due; for materials used in construction of Railroad St. pavement: \$10,879.09.

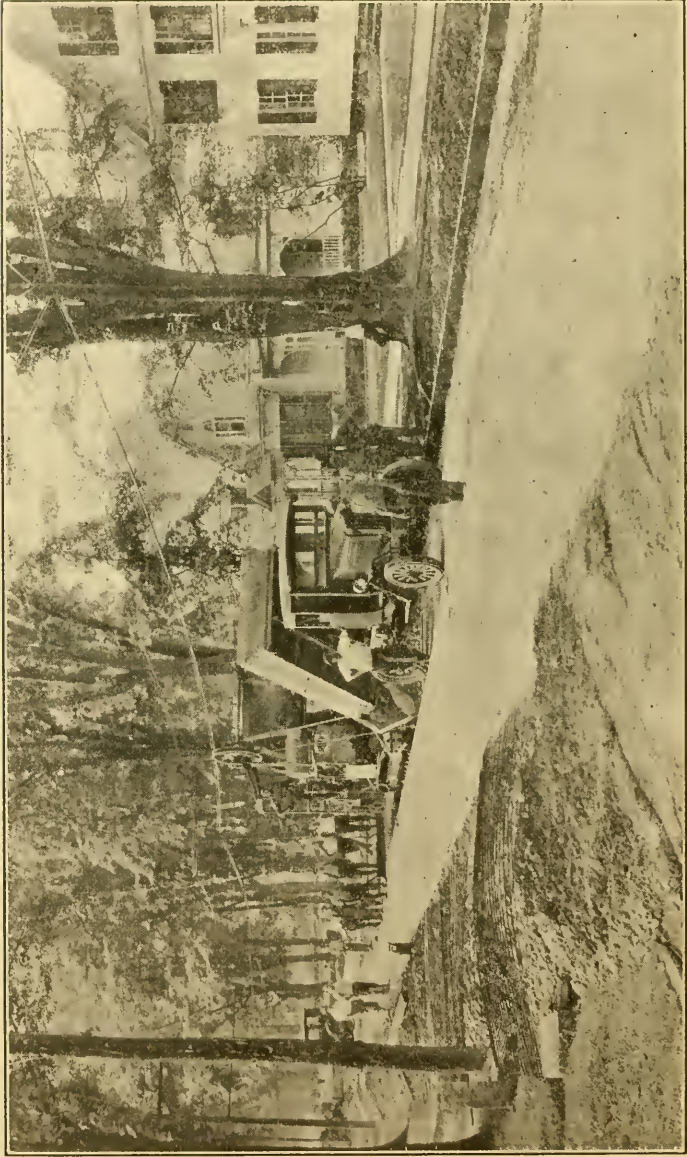

The City has an asset at this time the crusher, dynamos, air compressor, pneumatic tools, storage bins, road forms, etc.; the whole cost of which is included in the price of \$2.265 per square yard of pavement.

In connection with this work, Wright St., Meadow Road, Wood St., Wagner St., Belmont Ave., Branch Road, Roxbury Middle Road, Laurel St., Edward St., streets in Arlington, and other streets have been greatly improved with the crushed stone and other good materials excavated from the streets which have been paved with concrete. The cost of excavation and loading this material was charged to Permanent Improvement, the hauling and spreading only, being charged to the several streets.

PERMANENT STREET WORK

The permanent improvement money was spent on the following streets: West St. and Park Ave., 4838 feet between West St. bridge and Arch St.; Winchester St., 2391 feet between Ashuelot River Bridge and Main St.; Marlboro St., 1650 feet between Jennison and Baker streets; Washington St., 6,000 feet between Mechanic St. and Concord Road; Court St. from Mechanic St. to a point 3386 feet northerly near house No. 401 Main St., 950 feet between Winchester St. and the south rail of the south track of the B. & M. Railroad; Roxbury St., 3200 feet between Central Square and Oak St. These concrete pavements are all 20 feet or more in width, and are the thickened

edge type, being 6 inches thick in the center, 6 inches thick 2 feet from the edge, and 9 inches thick at the edges.

Expansion joints were placed 50 feet apart; and the concrete was reinforced with electric welded steel mesh weighing about 64 pounds to 100 square feet. The ends of the 50 foot slabs were dowelled together but no dowells were placed lengthwise in the slabs which are of monolithic construction. Calcium chloride was used, 200 pounds being dissolved in 50 gallons of water; 1 quart of liquor to each bag of cement. The pavement was not cured by wetting or covering, and was opened in seven days to all traffic. Crushed granite was used entirely for coarse aggregate, and proportions of concrete mixture were approximately $1 \frac{1}{10}$ — $2 \frac{1}{10}$ — $3 \frac{7}{10}$.

After completing the original bond issue program of concrete paving, the Department began work on Railroad Street. This pavement was laid about 24 feet wide and at the Western End joining Main St., additional land on the South Side was purchased from the Boston & Maine Railroad. This strip of land was about 6 feet wide at Main St. and extended 356 feet easterly to a point opposite the center of Wells St. An exchange of land with the Beaver Mills Co. was made on the Easterly End of the street which was advantageous to both parties. The City obtaining additional land on the North Side allowing a better entrance to Harrison St., and the Beaver Mills receiving a strip on the South Side of the street next to their Mill buildings. The cost of this paving was \$9,181.33 including curbing, and the expense was borne by the general street maintenance fund.

The construction work on these concrete pavements has been done by the City Highway Department in a thorough manner; the best of materials used; local help employed; and the people of Keene should take pride in the fact that theirs was the first city in the state to purchase paving equipment and operate a quarry.

OIL AND TAR TREATMENT

Owing to the concrete construction of the Main streets, it gave an opportunity to do more oiling on outlying streets. To complete this work it required:

Although the main streets may be constructed with concrete, there will continue to be many streets and roads that can be better maintained with oil and tar than in any other way, as the oil and tar binds gravel together and saves considerable washing.

PERMANENT STATE ROAD

Aside from our own program of cement construction, and in conjunction with the State Highway Department it was decided to spend the joint fund for concrete pavement on the Chesterfield Road. The contract for 1.63 miles of this construction 18 feet wide, was let to P. J. Holland, and cost \$59,964 56.

CONCRETE SIDEWALKS

Concrete walks 6648 feet in length and with a total of 5114 square yards, were constructed this season. The estimate for these walks included parts of Middle St., Gurnsey St., Winchester St., Wilson St., High St., Barker St., Court St., West St., and Main St., but, in addition to these walks, the construction of concrete pavements on Main, Roxbury, Washington and Railroads Sts. made advisable the construction of concrete walks in connection with the paving work. This work was done on portions of these streets. The remodelling of the City Hall made necessary the building of a walk in front of that building and also in the alley-way leading to the office of the Water Department.

CARE OF TREES

Last spring many egg clusters of Brown Tail moths were found and for this reason all trees in the center of the city were examined and these eggs destroyed. Also, a considerable number of dead trees were removed and some trimming done at a total cost of \$1,351 56.

SNOW REMOVAL

Last winter not much time was needed for snow removal, so the help was employed in graveling the East Surry and Walpole roads.

GRAVEL WALKS

Over one-half mile of gravel walks have been built on Park Ave. from Wheelock Park to Arlington.

The work of building sidewalks on lower Main St. was continued this year to Edgewood Ave.

CLEAN UP WEEK

This year the usual plan was followed and an extra collection made during fire prevention week.

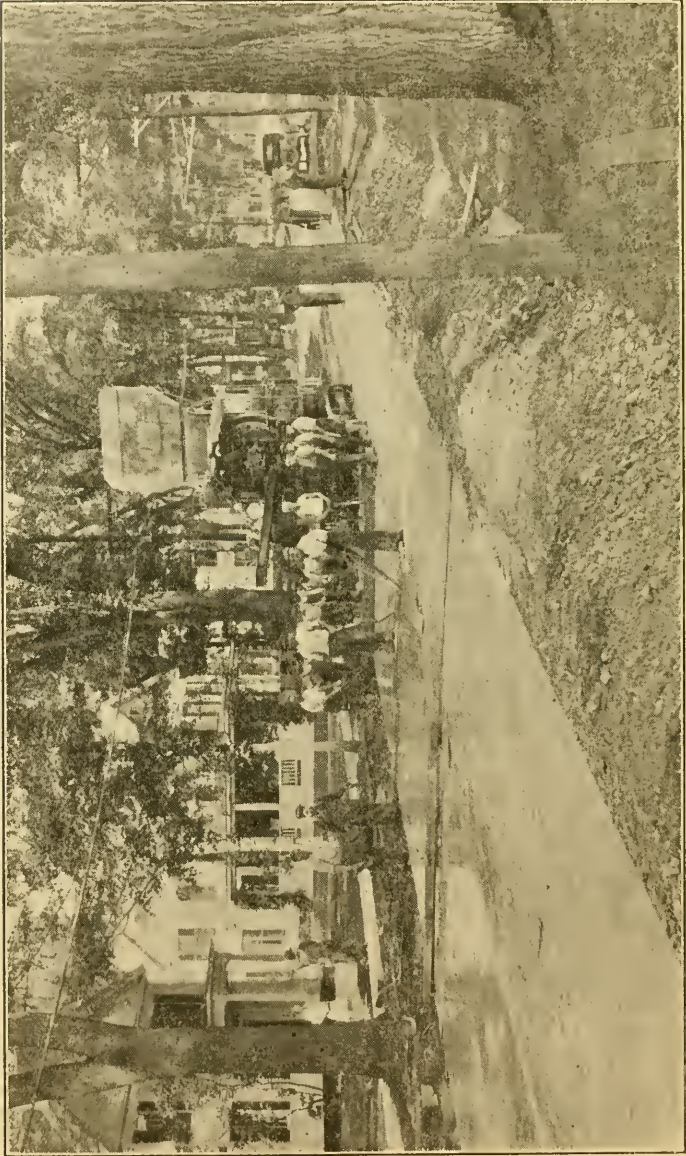

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONER

To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils:

The annual report of the Park Commissioner is submitted herewith, together with recommendations for the coming year.

During the year a plan for the development of Fuller Park has been completed by Mr. Arthur A. Shurtleff of Boston, the landscape architect of the Metropolitan Park System and many other notable projects, and it is earnestly recommended that a special appropriation be made in order that a large part of this plan may be carried out during the coming year. The lower portion of the park that was graded and seeded during the previous year has been kept mowed, resulting in an improved appearance, and the portion west of the Armory has been ploughed, graded and seeded and a sidewalk built on the west side, of surplus filling. The possibilities of this park both for beauty and recreation are so great that its early development will be a source of pride and gratification to the entire city.

At Wheelock Park, as a result of a detour through it during the construction of cement roads, and of trucking of lumber it was necessary to repair some of the roads with gravel, about half of the expense being borne by the highway department, and the truck owners. The constantly increasing use of the park as the city play ground and by many gatherings necessitates increased supervision and labor and, with the present limited appropriation, leaves practically no money available for the other park lands.

Some thinning in the Drummer land and clearing in Robin Hood Park and the Dinsmoor and Faulkner & Colony Woods has been accomplished at practically no expense and, while it is recommended that these lands be kept as natural forest lands. a considerable amount of clearing and work on the roads would

make them more attractive and available to the public, it is, therefor, recommended that an annual appropriation of one thousand dollars be made for the use of the department.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

To the Board of Health:

I hereby submit my report as Health Officer for the City of Keene for the year ending December 1, 1928.

There has been the least number of contagious and infectious diseases reported during the last year of any year in a long time. There have been only fifteen cases of scarlet fever reported at various times during the year, and only thirty-seven cases in all of any reportable diseases, with not a single death of any reportable disease except tuberculosis, which is a very low record for a City of twelve thousand, and I think that the general health has been very good in the whole City.

I wish again to call the attention of parents to the law in regard to reporting measles, chicken pox, mumps, and whooping cough, and to warn them to keep children, with any of these diseases at home and not allow them to play with other children, or on the street or public places.

SANITARY INSPECTIONS

This important work of the department is increasing each year, not only in the City proper but on its outskirts as well, with the increasing number of small stores, road stands, and over night camps that are continually starting up, requires no little attention to keep them in a sanitary condition so that the public health may be protected. These places are all inspected several times during the year by myself, and as often as possible by the State inspector, and I think that you will find in his report that he found them in a very satisfactory condition.

GARBAGE COLLECTION

The ordinance providing for the collection of garbage by the City has been in effect a little over a year, and has worked out very satisfactorily, I had but very few complaints from either the collector or the public, and if the people would read their cards which tell them just what kind of receptacle they must provide, and just what they can put in it, and where they must keep it, it would be a great help to the collector, and the service he would be able to render.

MILK SUPPLY

During the year I have issued one hundred and eighteen licenses to dealers and producers, and fifty-three to stores, refused three and revoked one:

It looks to me as if the milk situation in the City will be quite a serious question in the near future, the farmers in the surrounding towns have not been making as much milk the last summer and fall as they have in the past.

The City ordinance requires that all milk sold in the City must be drawn from tuberculin tested cows, and some dealers have not been able to get enough milk of this quality to supply their customers this summer and fall, and have been obliged to send away and get pasteurized milk, which is all right although they say that some of their customers do not like the taste of it. There is no question that pasteurized milk (if correctly prepared) comes the nearest to protecting the consumer from infectious disease of any milk sold, and it looks to me as though the City will be obliged to use more of this milk, or else the dairymen and farmers will have to increase their production. The State inspector was here in October and we inspected the premises of nearly all the principal dealers, and found that they had made many improvements during the last year, and some were preparing to make more, the inspector in one or two cases suggested that they make some changes in their premises, and the method of handling their milk, which they agreed to do.

Two residences outside the fire district have been moved to new locations, and quite extensive alterations and improvements have been made to several brick blocks in the center of the city, especially to the Gurnsey, Lane and Museum Blocks and the Eagle Hotel. The outside appearance of these buildings has also been greatly improved.

The Keene City Hall has been remodelled and a comfort station installed in the basement, the exterior brickwork has also been cleaned by sandblasting.

I believe that most of the contractors and builders have complied with the Building and Zoning ordinances and that violations have been through carelessness or misinterpretation of the laws rather than from intention to evade or cheapen construction.

Over seven hundred inspections have been made in connection with building work and electric wire installation, and more would have been made except for pressure of other work.

Sixty-four new house numbers have been given out this year.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF KEENE PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils:

Gentlemen:—The Trustees of the Keene Public Library submit the following report:

Since the Children's Room was opened it has been a source of intense pleasure and gratification to watch each year the increasing interest taken by the children of the City. This interest and patronage of the Children's Room is an outstanding feature of the Library's worth and influence.

Another change in the Librarian for this room was made necessary in the summer as Mrs. Caroline H. Wellman removed from Keene. Miss Bernice Wilson, a resident of the city who substituted for Miss Maud H. Sherman during the latter's illness this spring, was engaged to fill the position and although she is not a graduate of any training school, she has had enough experience combined with a natural ability to have been very successful in working with the young people. Our very able and efficient Librarian, Miss Saxton, has given much time to assist and instruct her in Library efficiency and other members of the staff have shared in the work.

The Vacation Reading Club was especially active this year. There has not been as large an increase in the general circulation this year for several reasons, the one most affecting it being the fact that the Summer school was held this year at the Plymouth Normal and another that funds were not available to make large purchases for current fiction, since replacements for the Reference room were necessary and a new edition of Historical books.

It is especially gratifying to hear visitors and patrons, engaged in research work, speak appreciatively of the assistance

rendered and the kindly interest shown by Miss Saxton and the assistant librarians.

The library has received several gifts of books, valuable both for their age and subjects. Three books of especial interest were a bequest from the late Dr. J. Whitney Barstow. A Geneva Bible, a volume of Latin Poetry published in 1627 bound in Vellum, in excellent condition, and a book descriptive of the Egyptian obelisks brought to this country, the method of removal, transportation and erection.

There are numerous repairs needed this year to keep the building in good condition. These the Trustees hope to accomplish in the near future.

We refer you to the excellent report of the librarian herewith appended for a more detailed account of the work and statistics.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Keene Public Library :

The report of the librarian for the year 1927-1928 is herewith presented :

The year closes with a record of which indicates a healthy growth in circulation. The increase this year brings the gain of the last five years up to 23,081. This has been accomplished with very little additional income but it is obvious that such a record can not be maintained without greater financial resources and more assistance.

There is a growing call for the latest books in almost every subject as people turn more and more to the library for such information and added to that is an imperative demand for new fiction, while the item alone of keeping books in repair and rebound as well as that of replacing those worn beyond the point of rebinding is a big one especially in the juvenile department. Very little replacing has been done this year and the list of those desirable to restore to our shelves is large. To carry on an institution as important to the community as the library is a constant problem for economy with efficiency.

The library is again acting as distributing agent for the books of the University Extension Course which the teachers of the city are taking. Arrangements have been made with two Junior High Schools for regular instruction in the use of the library in the coming months. Library Hall has been used for the monthly meetings of the Historical Society and the so-called club room has been used by many groups for committee purposes.

The old set of the Encyclopedia Americana has been turned in to the publishers and a recent edition secured and a similar offer has just been accepted for The New Larned's History for Ready Reference.

The Vacation Reading of the children was put on a little different basis this last summer by the offering of prizes of books for the greatest number of books from a selected list read and reported on satisfactorily. The result was that the books were unusually well chosen and the reports showed more careful reading than formerly. Thus we feel that the introduction of a somewhat debatable method, in this case, proved of value. A boy and a girl were the recipients of the gifts which were awarded at a story-hour given to those who had been vacation-readers. Miss Martha Randall of the Normal School told stories of European children both real and legendary. During Book Week, a contest involving the finding of hidden book-titles in a story was enjoyed by thirty children and for two almost perfect and very neat papers, Mr. Kingsbury of the Tilden Book Store presented books.

Miss Bernice Wilson, a student for two years at the Normal School and who has acted as page and later as substitute during the past two years has been assisting since the first of August when Mrs. Carolyn Wellman gave up a position here to open a circulating library in Manchester.

A member of your Board and the librarian attended a joint meeting of the Massachusetts and Western Massachusetts Library Clubs at the Jones Library in Amherst which was formally opened the previous day.

A steady growth in accessions since the building of the stack-room in 1911 and 1912 finds the shelving today crowded and another bookcase will become a necessity possibly before another year. For two years, the process of placing the less used books in several classes in the basement stack-room has alone kept the present book-stacks from being over-crowded. There is still some unused space in the lower stack.

A few repairs needed about the building in the coming year and additions and improvements in equipment have already been reported in detail to the Administration Committee.

It is a pleasure to acknowledge once again loyal support and assistance from Trustees and Staff, and in anticipation of its continuance to look forward to a year of greater usefulness.

REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR

To His Honor the Mayor, and Members of the City Councils:

I beg to submit herewith my report as City Solicitor of the City of Keene for the year 1928.

The duties of this office are defined in some detail in section 2 of Chapter 10 of the City Ordinances as revised November 20th, 1924. The City Solicitor is legal adviser to the City and to its officials he shall draw all contracts, agreements or other legal instruments which may be required of him by the City Government; he shall commence, prosecute or defend any and all suits and actions in which the City is interested; shall advise the City Government and city officials upon legal questions, and in general shall represent the City in all legal matters. This enumeration of the duties of the Solicitor shows that it is impossible to give a report that will name all matters that come before the City Solicitor each year. They may be roughly divided into four groups as follows:

1. Requests for legal advice from city departments.

Such requests come from the Mayor, the assessors, tax collector, building inspector, highway department, and in fact from nearly all of the many departments which carry on the work of the City. Sometimes the advice given is oral, but in certain cases where the questions are more difficult, written opinions are given. The zoning law which has been in effect in Keene for two years has brought to this office many legal questions. I have endeavored to advise correctly in all these numerous cases.

2. Drafting Resolutions and Ordinances and other legal instruments.

These require considerable care and attention, and it is hoped that the city ordinances and resolutions that have been drafted have fulfilled some need of the city.

3. Prosecutions of violations of City Ordinances and lesser infractions of the state law.

There have been the usual number of such matters which have been or will be finally disposed of before the Municipal Court of Keene. Reference is made to the report of the Police Commissioners in another part of the City Report as to the number of such violations.

4. Appearances in civil actions in which the City is an interested party.

The following disposition has been made of the cases mentioned in the City Report for the year 1927:

Equity No. 869—Keene Country Club v. Keene.

Equity No. 1038—Keene Country Club v. Keene.

Equity No. 1162—Keene Country Club v. Keene.

The above cases were petitions by the Keene Country Club for abatement of taxes for the years 1925, 1926 and 1927. The Master before whom the first two cases were heard decided that the Country Club was entitled to an abatement and found that the fair value of its property for the years in question was \$35,000. Some further adjustments were necessary to make the tax levied upon this property proportional to that levied on other property in the City, and he found that the Club was entitled to abatement as follows:

1925	\$492.14
1926	515.33

These amounts with interest and costs were paid.

No. 1176 was not tried, but was settled on the basis provided by the above decisions. The amount paid back for the year 1927 was \$504.21 with interest and costs.

Certain other suits are pending. Among them are

Equity No. 1048—Latchis v. City of Keene.

Equity No. 1126—Latchis v. City of Keene.

Equity No. 1168—Latchis v. City of Keene.

These are all tax cases in which Mr. Latchis seeks an abatement of his taxes by reason of alleged excessive value. The facts are more fully set out in my report for 1927 to which ref-

erence may be had. These cases should be tried early in 1928.

Equity No. 1106—Harry F. Mason v. Portland Construction Company and City of Keene, and the Maryland Casualty Company. The nature of this case is fully set out in my report for 1927 to which reference may be had. The case is on our court list for hearing at this term of our Superior Court, and probably will be disposed of before January 1st. I do not believe there is any liability against the City.

There is now pending in the District Court of the United States an important case as follows:

Equity No. 187—America Land Company v. City of Keene.

The facts in this case are as follows: The City of Keene purchased in 1922 about thirty acres of land owned by the late Elisha F. Lane, west of Main Street, south of Beaver Brook and on each side of the Branch. The City sold this land to the America Land Company in 1925, and conveyed by warranty deed. The Land Company surveyed and platted the tract and advertised and sold lots. Our Zoning Act became effective about January 1, 1927, and the part south of the Branch was placed in the unrestricted district in which no dwelling can be built without the consent of the Board of Adjustment, provided by the Zoning Act. The part north of the Branch was placed in the semi-resident district. The Land Company complains that the part south of the Branch suffered a loss of value by this treatment. It has not been possible to adjust the differences between the Company and the City of Keene, and this suit is pending in the District Court of the United States. It probably will be tried before Judge Morris in January. I advised the City Government that I did not feel competent to prepare and try this case, and they authorized me to retain counsel to prepare and try the case. Mr. DeWitt Howe of Warren, Howe & Wilson of Manchester has been engaged for that purpose.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF CEMETERIES

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I submit the report of the Cemetery Department for the year ending November 30, 1928.

The regular routine work has progressed in the customary manner.

Considerable road work has been done, 232 loads of filling have been used on the roads in Greenlawn and Woodland Cemeteries. A new iron fence 1,212 feet long was erected in Woodland Cemetery last Spring. The old wooden fences should be replaced by iron fences as fast as possible as they are good for ten years service without any attention after erection.

We have some new wall maps of Greenlawn and Woodland Cemeteries corrected to date and showing new lots added.

We have developed twenty new lots and more are in process of development. There have been twenty-four lots sold during the year.

There have been one hundred thirty-four burials and one removal.

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS

PLAYGROUND REPORT FOR THE SUMMER OF 1928

The playground work for this season was conducted at Wheelock Park, perhaps the most beautiful natural layout used for this purpose anywhere in New England. The Wade-Across on the Ashuelot river was used again for the swimming classes. The playground was open five days a week during the season, weather permitting, from nine until four o'clock, the Wade-Across being under supervision in the afternoon.

The playground was open thirty-five full days, five days being lost because of rain, while weather conditions permitted the use of the Wade-Across on thirty afternoons. The average daily attendance at Wheelock Park was 212, and at the Wade-Across 65. The total attendance for both for the season was 9,280, an increase of about 3,000 above any previous registration, representing approximately a 50% gain.

A program of free play, games, athletics, and story-telling was carried out at Wheelock Park, and general swimming, as well as training classes, was conducted at the Wade-Across. Twenty-three children learned to swim, eight were able to pass the advanced swimmer's test, and two each passed the junior and senior life-saver's examinations.

Several feature days were held at the Park during August, including a Doll Day, Junior Olympics Day, and Costume Day. These were very popular with the children, and small prizes were awarded the winners. The season closed with the field day at the Park, at which refreshments were served to the children. The largest attendance on record was attained on this day, reaching 750.

The playgrounds, for the third season, were under the direction of Mr. Drew, assisted by Robert Greene, Lorna Elwyn, and Barbara Wilber.

REPORT OF OVERSEER OF POOR

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I hereby submit the annual report for the year ending December first, 1928.

There has been a very large increase in the cost of maintaining this department this year. This does not mean that there are so many more poor people in the City than there have been in previous years, but it is due to several reasons:

The winter of 1927-1928 was a very hard one for the laboring class, work was very scarce and it was very hard for them to get along. Another thing, there has been more desertion this year than usual, which means that if a man leaves his wife and family the City must support them until he can be found and brought back. Another thing, there have been more people sent to the County farm for various crimes this year than usual. In these cases the County gets the benefit of the mans work while the City has to support the family, which to me does not seem fair to the City, although it is the law. Another thing, I have been obliged to put more people in hospitals this year than usual, some in the Elliot Community and some at the County farm. Up to July first the price at the County farm was ten dollars a week, at that time the price was raised to fifteen dollars a week.

These are the principal reasons for the increase in the cost of maintaining this department this year.

I wish at this time, on behalf of The City and myself to thank all Churches, societies, and private Citizens, also the Bureau of Public Service, the Keene District or Visiting Nurse Association, who have in many ways aided the poor people in the City, and I can not help but feel that with the fine cooperation which we have with all of this group that the poor people of the City are well taken care of.

During the year I have furnished aid to City and County dependents, also dependent soldiers and their families, as follows: (and I hope every Citizen will read the list carefully, and I will be only to glad to listen to any suggestion they have to make.)

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

I hereby submit my report for the year ending December 1, 1928.

There were 26 bell alarms; 239 still alarms and 11 out-of-town calls, making a total of 276 alarms.

The Department has on hand 8,750 feet of double jacket fire hose, and 1,500 feet of linen hose on hose reel and in hose house at South Keene.

During the year there has been turned over to the Water Department 400 feet of No. 2 hose, also 1,350 feet to the Highway Department for their cement road work.

The Motor Apparatus and its equipment including tools are in very good condition, except the steam fire engine which is 45 years old. In the near future this piece should be replaced by a modern Pumping Engine.

The Fire Alarm System is in A No. 1 condition. During the year 160 new cells of battery have been put into service, replacing the old battery on the four working circuits of the system. There has been installed at the corner of Main and Railroad Streets a new Pedestal also a new Fire Alarm Box of the latest quick pull type, and the old wood pole has been removed. This

makes a big improvement on this corner. All wires have been changed to the South side of Railroad Street as far down as 93rd Street and the poles on the North side removed. The Fire Alarm Boxes have been painted with a red enamel instead of regular red paint as the enamel will keep its color much longer. A new Fire Alarm Box should be purchased to replace Box 22 on Fire Station.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Board of Engineers recommend the purchase of 1,000 feet of fire hose.

A Fire alarm box to replace Box No. 22 on fire station.

A wire basket for Ladder Truck for carrying extra equipment.

A Foam Generator outfit for the extinguishing of oil fires.

Also that the old tar concrete in front of Fire Station be replaced by cement concrete.

Two new Smoke and Gas masks. Also that a hydrant be installed on Proctor Court and the flush hydrants on lower Winchester Street be replaced by post hydrants.

To His Honor the Mayor and Members of the Joint Standing Committee on Fire Department, Members of the Board of Engineers, Officers and members of the department, and to the public, I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation for the aid and support rendered me during the year.

REPORT OF SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

To the Honorable Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Keene:

I have tested and sealed all of the scales and measures used in trade in the City. I have tested all of the coal weighing scales and found them all in good condition. There are now 35 or more stores outside of the business center of the City.

The largest part of the sealer's work now is testing and sealing gasoline pumps. During the past year I have tested and sealed 124 pumps, of which 34 are new pumps put in this year. This increases the sealer's work very materially each year. There should be some way for making a charge for each pump sealed. I have tested as many as 7 pumps at one stand, and from two to four at several stands. I do not think that, for the accommodation of the public it is necessary to have so many pumps.
