LITTLETON WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the 8th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:30 P.M.), to act upon the following:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing the game of Beano be adopted in this Town?"

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, District Nurse, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, Garbage Disposal, Special Highway Account, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness, Sewage Treatment Plant, Ski 93 and other necessary expenses.

Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1966 and to be paid therefrom.

Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer and sell and convey any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds for such price and upon such terms as the Selectmen may in their discretion determine.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the portion of the road known as the Mount Misery Road from the former Stoddard Place to the end of said road near Whitcomb's camp, a distance of one mile, more or less.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,150.00) to install a storm drain and sanitary sewer from Union Street to Richmond Street, a distance of five hundred (500) feet, more or less.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$3,900.00) to extend the present sewer on West Main Street for a distance of eleven hundred (1,100) feet from its present terminus at the Sylvester Place.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000.00) to reconstruct and widen Grove Street from Cottage Street to Willow Street, including the payment of damages to land owners.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to convey to Albert L. Parker and Carrie S. Parker a triangular parcel of land containing one and one-half (1½) acres, more or less, situate on the westerly side of Interstate Highway 93 and bounded on the other two sides by land of said Parkers, and accept as consideration for said deed a deed from Albert L. and Carrie S. Parker to the Town conveying another triangular parcel of land containing one and one-half (1½) acres, more or less, situate on the easterly side of Interstate Highway 93 and bounded on the other two sides by the Ammonoosuc River and by land of the Town on which the sewage treatment plant is located; and to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver a deed of the first parcel of land above described in exchange for a deed to the Town of the second parcel.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote not to pay for septic tanks, cesspools and other sewerage facilities and installation of the same when such facilities are installed on premises on which more than one trailer is located.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Two Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$9,200.00) and pay such sum into the Aeronautical Fund and, further, to authorize the Selectmen, in accordance with the Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 423:8, to transfer said sum from the Aeronautical Fund to the New Hampshire Aeronautical Commission, said sum to be expended by said New Hampshire Aeronautical Commission on the Whitefield Regional Airport, so-called, in connection with the expansion of said Airport facilities. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 13. To see if the Town of Littleton will vote to acquire necessary land in a suitable location to build a Municipal Building for the purpose of housing equipment and functions of the Selectmen's Office, Town Clerk's Office, Fire Department, Police Department and District Court, as set forth in the Committee Report in the hands of the Selectmen. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 14. If the preceding Article is voted in the affirmative, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$160,000.00) for land acquisition, architect fees, construction and any contingency items. Further, that the Board of Selectmen of Littleton be authorized to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum so voted, to be paid out of Tax revenue over a period of ten (10) years. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 15. To see what action the Town will take upon the following: PETITION FOR MUTUAL FIRE AID—Whereas N. H. R.S.A. 154:24-29 authorized any city, town, or village to render to any other city, town or village, aid for the purpose of extinguishing fires, we, the undersigned, all being voters of the Town of Littleton as listed on the last revised check list, hereby petition the Selectmen of the Town of Littleton to insert into the Town Warrant for 1966 an appropriate provision to see if the Town will authorize the Chief of the Littleton Fire Department to extend such aid to neighboring towns and villages on a reciprocal basis. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote, for relocation of Town Dump purposes, to purchase from Clinton H. Kelley, of Littleton, approximately thirteen and one-half (13½) acres of land situate in the Town westerly of the Littleton Sand & Gravel Co., Inc. property and adjacent to land of the Boston & Maine Railroad, bounded as follows: on the northerly side four hundred fifty (450) feet by land of the Littleton Sand & Gravel Co., Inc., on the easterly side thirteen hundred and fifty (1,350) feet by land of Kelley, on the southerly side four hundred fifty (450) feet by land of Kelley, and on the westerly side thirteen hundred and fifty (1,350) feet by land of the Boston & Maine Railroad, for the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$3,250.00), provided there is deeded to the Town a right-of-way to said land from an existing public way for access to the same for a sum not exceeding Seventeen Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$1,750.00), and said deed from Kelley to the Town to provide that in the event the Town shall later have no further use for said land and shall desire to sell the same, said Kelley shall have the first refusal thereof; said total sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be paid from the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) raised and appropriated to acquire a suitable site for re-

location of the Town Dump under Article 11 of the Town Warrant for the year 1961.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote, for relocation of Town Dump purposes, to enter into a written lease agreement with Raymond J. Little, of Bethlehem, New Hampshire, under the terms of which said Little would lease to the Town all his land located in the Town of Littleton between Mt. Eustis Road and the Ammonoosuc River and containing approximately fourteen (14) acres, and under the terms of which said Little would agree to operate upon said land a sanitary land fill for the benefit of the Town in accordance

with all provisions of applicable Town ordinances and State laws relating to sanitary land fills and the disposition of rubbish and like materials; said Little to furnish all necessary equipment at the disposal area, provide suitable fencing for the same and keep said dump area open forty (40) hours per week, and supervise and operate the disposal of the materials; said lease agreement to run for a period of three (3) years with an option to the Town to have the first refusal to purchase said land; and to provide for the payment by the Town to said Little of the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) annually during the term of the lease agreement; and further, to authorize the Selectmen to determine the details of said lease agreement and execute the same on behalf of the Town; and further, to see, if the foregoing vote is adopted, if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the first annual rental.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote, for relocation of Town Dump purposes, to enter into a written contract with Littleton Sand & Gravel Co., Inc., of Littleton, under the terms of which said Company would agree to operate upon its land in the Town a sanitary land fill for the benefit of the Town in accordance with all provisions of applicable Town ordinances and State laws relating to sanitary land fills and the disposition of rubbish and like materials; said Company to furnish all necessary equipment at the disposal area, provide suitable fencing for the same and keep said dump area open forty (40) hours per week, and supervise and operate the disposal of the materials; said contract to run for a period of five (5) years and to provide for the payment by the Town to said Company of the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) annually during the term of the contract; and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the details of said contract and execute the same on behalf of the Town; and further, to see, if the foregoing vote is adopted, if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for the first annual rental.

Article 19. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 20. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the warrant.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1965, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Sewer Bond Fund, Library, Planning Board, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1964 — December 31, 1965: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1964 and December 31, 1965, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$89,154.26 in 1965.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1965, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$33,595.10, plus a revenue surplus of \$4,965.22, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$38,560.32.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1965, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1965, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Parking Meter Reserve Fund: (Exhibit B-4)

A summarized statement of the activity in the Parking Meter Account during 1965 is presented in Exhibit B-4.

Sewer Bond Fund: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the Sewer Bond Fund account for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1965, is presented in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report, are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$4,354.26, from \$59,467.41 to \$63,821.67 in 1965, as shown herewith:

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1965

For a second winter season, we are enjoying nylon carpeting in the library lobby and up the stairs to the children's room. It looks nice, has proved that it can take the weather wear, has not caused the custodian more work, is quiet and comfortable for all.

Three large tables and twenty-four chairs were delivered March 23, 1965 (ordered in 1964) for the young people's room. This really made us closer to having the children's room upstairs. The older tables with the bright colored tops could be moved to the children's room.

By May we had Barbara Corey on the library staff to be the attendant for the children's room. With the help of some people from the Junior Friends of the Library, Miss Corey moved all the books for kindergarten through sixth grade up to their new location. We are most grateful to Paul Perry, Dennis Bergeron, Peter Greenlaw, and Willard Riley for this volunteer help. During the summer, Miss Corey took inventory of the books in her room. Along with the usual results of inventory, this allowed Barbara to handle her collection so that she knows what she has to offer her young public.

April 15 our library received its first printed catalog cards from the State Library Central Cataloging. These cards were for the books ordered through Central Purchasing April 9, 1965.

During the year the librarian was pleased to talk to the classes of Mrs. Bender, Mrs. MacKenzie, Mrs. Nute, and Mrs. Baldwin at the library.

Operation Head Start in Littleton and in the area used over a hundred books.

The Mildred Lakeway Elementary School had classroom collections of books last January-June 1965 but has not asked for books this school year. This condition lowered the juvenile circulation figure. Three high school teachers placed sizable groups of books on reserve for classes this year. This has lowered the adult non-fiction circulation.

In September, steel library shelving was assembled at the end of the young people's room for the reference collection. Soon after the reference books were moved to their new location, the old reference room was made into the librarian's office. This freed the former office for a work room for mending and processing books, some typing, shipping and such duties.

During October, the basement room beneath the present library

stacks was filled with steel shelving which is needed very badly to relieve our overcrowded shelves on the main floor. We cannot move any books to these shelves until we can provide staff enough to reach to another floor. For this we are waiting for the 1966 budget and more student help.

National Library Week, April 17-23, the Littleton Public Library celebrated 75 years of library service as a town-supported library. Two "readingest" families were named by the librarians: The George R. Judge, Jr. Family and The Robert N. Hill Family.

The North Country Library District Council of the New Hampshire Statewide Library Development Program met first March 23 at the State Library District Office in Littleton. Mrs. Caroline Gale, chairman of the Littleton Public Library board of trustees represented our library at this meeting since the board had not yet appointed a delegate. At the next library board meeting your librarian was named delegate and has attended meetings in June and October. She is now serving on the Planning Committee for this organization. The Littleton Public Library trustees have voted to apply to the council to be a service center library. At this time the council's Qualifications Committee is not ready to act upon any applications.

Your librarian has attended the usual professional and neighborhood meetings.

The Littleton Public Library staff was delighted to have librarians in the area come for ten weeks in the fall for a course in book selection. Mrs. Haskell took this course for credit. In the spring of 1966 another ten week course will be taught here in library cataloging.

Thirty-two memorial books were given in 1965 in memory of the following people: Izora G. Eaton (Mrs. Howard), Mr. Howard Eaton, Mr. Reuel T. Eastman, Mrs. John M. Hull, Sr., Mr. and Mrs. A.I. Nichols, Peter Cooney, Kimon N. Foley, Mrs. Agnes Wright, Mrs. Nellie H. Nute, Mr. Herbert T. Muzzey, Mr. H. H. Wright, Mr. Robert Edge, Mr. Rupert Willey, Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Eaton, Mrs. Lexie S. Lee, Mrs. Belle Lane, Thomas Lavoie, Mr. Adolf F. Scheurer, Mrs. William Green, Sr.

We are again grateful to the White Mountain Garden Club for remembering us with both flowers all year and several new books on gardening. The Friday Club is very faithful to us with a check to augment the book budget. We thank you.

Each one of the nine trustees of our library has worked on some of our problems and projects. Our finances, our building, our material value, our by-laws, and our complete operating policies have all been carefully studied by the trustees this year. The by-laws have been rewritten for the first time in 75 years. The policies

were never assembled together and made available so that anyone can see them at any time until this year. As your librarian, I know that you wish to join me in appreciation for this active board and its accomplishment. In recent years we have had a very outstanding chairman of the library board who received recognition from the New Hampshire Trustees Assoc., Attorney Alexander Corey. Some of us should tell them about Caroline Gale, our present chairman, who spends much time, thought, and energy for the Littleton Public Library and its services.

Again I wish to thank Mrs. Nita Howard, Mrs. Royce Haskell, Miss Barbara Corey, Mr. Joel Bedor, Mr. Peter Cooper, Miss Delight Wing, and Mr. Norman Kinne for their parts in the services of the Littleton Public Library in 1965.

ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

T.R.A. Work

The section of road that was started last year on Manns Hill was completed this year. During the 1965 season another section extending in a southerly direction for approximately .05 miles, was widened, straightened and graveled. This year the crushed gravel and asphalt surface will be laid, completing this section.

Sewers

In 1965 a new 8 in. transite sanitary sewer main was laid in Elm St. from High St. to Oak Hill Ave. This new sewer replaced an old 4 in. sewer which was inadequate and very troublesome.

A new storm sewer was laid on Cross St. between Union and Pleasant Sts. The purpose of this new storm sewer was to intercept the storm sewer on Pleasant St. and lead it on to the Union St. storm sewer. This should help to eliminate the flooding condition on Main St. near the theater. Also the department installed a new storm sewer from Main St. down through the Thayers parking lot to the river bank. The purpose of this new storm sewer was to relieve the storm sewer on Main St., in hopes that this may help eliminate the flooding problem in that area.

Streets and Highways

Your highway department continued its program of blade mixing and sealing town streets and rural roads, as has been done in the past. This program is to continue this coming year.

The final asphaltic concrete surface was placed on the Eames parking lot and parking meters installed.

REPORT OF LITTLETON WATER AND LIGHT DEPARTMENT FOR YEAR 1965

An extension of 908 feet of 6" Universal, cast iron, cement lined water pipe was added at the Dump road off Bridge street and 670 feet of the same type pipe replaced an 1½" line on Elm street from the corner of High street to corner of Oak Hill avenue. Relocation of the water line on Lafayette avenue at the new garage consisted of 186 feet 6" Universal pipe.

One hydrant was added on the Dump road and one at the corner of Elm street and Oak Hill avenue.

To relieve the condition of low water pressure at the end of the line on Bethlehem road, an agreement was made with the Bethlehem Water Department to service those customers on the Bethlehem road and Badger street. A pressure reducing valve was installed in this area to minimize the effect of added force as a result of tie-in with the Bethlehem supply.

The year 1965 saw the construction and completion of a Norlite block building for storage of Department trucks, equipment and supplies. In years past, the trucks and some of the supplies were stored at the hydro generating plant on Carleton street with the balance of the material being stored in two old wooden buildings on Lafayette avenue. The new structure, 120' x 78', has 9,360 square feet and was built by Clinton Clough, low bidder for \$64,890.00 or \$6.93 a square foot which is very reasonable for this type of building.

In the electric department, three phase lines were built on South street and Lafayette avenue. Single phase lines were added on Manns Hill, Dells road, Lisbon road, Mt. Eustis and Bethlehem road. Secondary wires were extended on Fairview and Railroad streets.

Larger transformers and services were installed to meet the demand of increased load in various locations.

Two fluorescent lights were added to the circuit as were two regular series street lights.

Eleven area lighting fixtures were added on customers' property.

Rudolph R. Holmes, superintendent of power plants, retired after 43 years of service.

A revised electric rate booklet was printed and the rate of .018c per kilowatt hour was established for all kilowatt hours over 100 for electrically heated homes.

Christmas gifts of November kilowatt consumption were given for the sixth consecutive year to all customers for a total amount of \$35,151.27.

A lighted sign at the Department office replaced the original sign which was installed at the new building on Lafayette avenue.

Maintenance, repairs and replacements of lines and services were made as were additions of new services in both Departments.

Improvements including the new garage and stockroom structure totalled \$107,156.48.

At the 2 Orthopedic clinics held in Littleton, on the first Friday in May and November, every year, there were 53 children seen. Of this number, 21 were school and 9 pre-school children from Littleton.

At the Pediatric Diagnostic clinics, 4 were pre-schoolers and 4 were school children from Littleton.

The special Mobile Chest X-ray clinic held last September took a total of 983 Chest X-rays; 355 of these were taken on the Main St. where the Mobile Unit was set up in front of the Chamber of Commerce Booth. The other X-rays were taken by the Unit at the Industrial plants in town. The men who ran the Service stated it was one of the most gratifying responses they had received on their tour of the many towns. They will return in about two years.

There have been 37 patients who have received hospital equipment the L.C.N.A. has available. The time of use has varied from 1 day to use of 5 years, with a usual loan of two months for most. There is a charge of \$1.00 per month for any of the items loaned, if the patient can pay, but there is no charge if he cannot. We have received some extra donations from the grateful users of the beds, wheelchairs, walkers, side rails and bedside commodes. The equipment is available to anyone, provided he has a Doctor's recommendation, and this is checked out with the Physician. The transportation of the items from the Community House to the patient and the return of them are up to the patient, or his family. The person who comes for the item signs his name as the one responsible for the use of it, and when it is returned it is noted as again available.

During the year I helped out at some of the clinics at the schools, and there was an opportunity for some of the pre-school children to have booster immunization shots before starting school.

There were numerous meetings and conferences attended in cooperation with allied professional groups to keep up to date on current developments.

At Christmas time, through the generosity of local clubs and organizations, 31 families received food and clothing. The merchants in town are always generous to this cause.

My sincere thanks to all who have helped me at the clinics and with various L.C.N.A. projects throughout the year, Mrs. James Lytle, the president of L.C.N.A., members of the Board, and Mr. and Mrs. Tefft of the Community House for their many kindnesses.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Littleton Union School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1964 and June 30, 1965, are represented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$70,250.45 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C and D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$28,443.95, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$12,153.21, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$16,290.74.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965, made up in accordance with the uniform

classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1965, is indicated in Exhibit F.

School Lunch Program: (Exhibits G and G-1)

Summary statements of the School Lunch Program account for the Littleton High School and Elementary School are presented in Exhibits G and G-1.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Littleton is included in Exhibit H. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1965, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1964-65 School Tax in the amount of \$468,283.71.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1965, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$3,040.29 to \$16,290.74, during the fiscal year as shown by the following statement:

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

Very few changes have taken place on the faculty since my last report .

Mr. Richard Bouley was transferred from the junior high social studies to teach Problems of Democracy in the high school replacing Brian Smalley, who resigned to further his education.

Mr. Jere Peabody of Littleton, a graduate of Plymouth State College, was elected to teach junior high social studies replacing Mr. Bouley.

Mr. Stephen Bamford of Durham, a graduate of Plymouth State College, was elected to teach physical education, coach basketball and assist in football, replacing Mr. John Smith who was appointed Assistant Principal.

Mrs. Linda MacLeod of Worcester, a graduate of the University of Massachusetts, was elected to teach English in the junior and senior high school.

Mr. Robert J. O'Connor of Bellows Falls, a graduate of Keene State College with a Masters degree from Arizona State University, was added to the staff to teach Science and Physics in the high school.

Mr. Frank Perry of Manchester, a graduate of Keene State College, was elected to teach English, replacing Keith Gould, who resigned to further his education.

David Stoddard of Littleton, a graduate of Plymouth State College, was elected to teach physical education in the Lakeway school replacing Roland Barnaby who resigned to accept a similar position in Linwood High School.

Miss Karen Tunney of Littleton, a graduate of Keene State College was elected to teach Grade 3 replacing Mrs. Janice Guyette who resigned to accept a similar position in Lisbon.

Recently, Mr. Douglas Roberge of Manchester, a graduate of Keene State College, was elected to teach French, replacing Phyllis Brown who resigned at the Christmas recess.

Major work done in the school since my last report includes the following:

Elementary School—

- New roof over gymnasium
- Install independent hot water heater
- Sand and refinish gym floor
- Repaint four classrooms

High School—

- Anchor lockers
- Install movable partition in cafeteria
- Install 62 new lockers in corridors
- Repaint cafeteria and rooms 11, 5 and 24
- Minor repairs to floor tile and stairways.

A record number of teachers attended summer school this past year and many have participated in extension courses. All this helps to improve instruction in the classroom.

Title I program in remedial reading under Public Law 89-10 Elementary-Secondary Education Act has been approved and we are just beginning to implement the program in both the elementary school and high school. A grant of approximately \$15,000.00 was approved for Littleton.

The Area school study committee appointed last year has held a number of meetings with representatives from neighboring towns studying the educational needs of the area. The committee is concerned with both curriculum and facilities. A preliminary report will be coming from this committee soon.

As of July 1, William Grass, Jr., will take over as superintendent of the entire Union #35 with Harvey Harkness, Jr. as Assistant Superintendent. It is hoped that a business administrator can be employed to do much of the work in that area thereby relieving the superintendent and assistant superintendent to devote more time to administration and supervision.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the people of Littleton, the school boards, teaching staff and other personnel for their continued cooperation and support. I particularly want to express appreciation to Mrs. Marion C. Howland who has been most helpful over the years as secretary and assistant. I have enjoyed working with the people of Littleton for three years as principal of Littleton High School and for the past nineteen years as superintendent. I sincerely hope that I have contributed in a small way to the better education of your children. It has been a privilege for me to have served you.

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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I hereby submit my second annual report as principal of Littleton High School, for the year beginning September 1965, to date.

REGISTRATION

The total registration to date for the high school is 521 plus 207 in the junior high school for a total of 728 in grades 7-12. This compares with a total registration of 717 for the entire 1964-65 school year and represents an increase of 2 in the high school and 9 in the junior high school. Twenty-nine have withdrawn from the high school to date and four from the junior high school. Fifteen of these people are continuing their education in other schools while eighteen have dropped from attendance at any school. The majority of this latter group have dropped out due to the attainment of age 16, the legal age for leaving school, and a general lack of interest.

ACCREDITATION

Littleton High School is accredited by the State Department of Education as a comprehensive high school and by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the regional accrediting agency.

To maintain accreditation standards set forth by the State Department of Education it will be necessary to employ an additional guidance counselor and to expand the art offering to include a credit course for high school students.

An evaluation of Littleton High School was made by a committee from the NEACSS in November of 1961. A two year report was filed in November 1963 and the school was granted continued membership. A five year report will be due in November 1966 and many recommendations of the original evaluation have been put into effect. A re-evaluation will be required no later than the 1971-72 school year and will be much more demanding for membership than the previous one. It is vital that planning for this re-evaluation begin in the near future to insure continued membership.

Innovations—1965-66

Two additional faculty members have been employed: one in English and one in science-math. This has permitted a slight reduction in the teaching load for English teachers but additional personnel are still badly needed in this department. The average teacher of English meets one hundred thirty-two students daily; far above the recommended standard and the regulated standard in some states of one hundred students per day. It is vital that this teaching load be reduced to insure high standards of teaching.

The employment of the additional science-math teacher has permitted additional sections of physics and chemistry and laboratory experiences for General Science 9.

Other innovations this year have been:

1. Additional sections of BSCS biology, an innovation of the past school year, have been programmed.

2. Math I—This course is designed for those students not desiring to specialize in mathematics and for those not having the highest of aptitudes for mathematics. Math I and II (to be programmed during the next school year) will provide the student with the background of Algebra I and selected topics from Geometry. The student will then be permitted to take Geometry and will have met the mathematics requirement for post high school study.

3. An additional section of Industrial Arts IV has been offered to meet increasing demands.

4. Art—The time which the art instructor is available has been doubled. This has permitted an expansion of the program from about fifteen or twenty to eighty-four at present. This program should be made a full-time offering in the very near future.

Areas of Special Concern

The two most pressing "needs" at Littleton High school are (1) a broader curriculum which would provide greater opportunities

for those not continuing their education beyond high school and, (2) additional faculty to reduce the teaching load so that greater attention can be given to individual needs.

These needs must be met if Littleton High School is to maintain its position as an excellent school. We cannot afford to be complacent at a time when tremendous educational progress is taking place throughout the country. Complacency can lead only to mediocrity.

Within the near future the voters are going to be asked to render a decision relative to the future organization of the school. It is my sincere hope that they make this decision solely in the light of the benefits to be realized by the students.

CONCLUSION

I would like to take this opportunity to express my deep appreciation to the school board, Mrs. Howland, Mrs. Beere, the people of the school community, and you, for the help and cooperation which I have received.

During the current school year the staff has been studying the curriculum. Dr. Baker's Elementary Evaluative Criteria has been used as a starting point. I have been pleased with the results so far and wish to commend the staff for its acceptance of this project with a view to possible future action strengthening the whole school.

Library

The library continues to expand in comprehensiveness and services offered to students and faculty. Mrs. Howard is now employed full-time. Your school has one of the few elementary libraries with a full-time librarian in the state.

Music

The vocal music program is very extensive. More time is needed in instrumental music. Because of commitments at the junior and senior high school a number of pupils are not having the opportunity to participate in this program. Those pupils who are participating show continued growth and their public performances are always well received.

Federal Funds

In December the town voted to accept federal funds under PL. 89-10 Title I. Part of these funds will be spent to employ additional remedial reading teachers. An additional program is being studied at this time.

Conclusion

I wish to thank the school board, the superintendent, the staff, and the people of our community for the help and cooperation you have given me.

Presently we are revising our White Mountains Map which lists nearly 200 points of interest in our region, which was designed to keep the tourists with us a little longer. Information booth people tell us it is very popular with tourists. The new edition will be printed this winter.

Worked in cooperation and attended meetings with the White Mountains Recreation Association, Coos County Rural Areas Development Committee, Coos County Planning Committee, Carroll County Rural Areas Development Committee, N. H. Ski Areas Operators Association, White Mountains Region Industrial Council, the Coos, Carroll and Grafton Counties Community Action Program. The association with these many groups has been mutually helpful in developing new projects and programs in the north country.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush;
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Town of Littleton Conservation Commission was authorized in Town Meeting on March 19, 1965, and in accordance with R.S.A. 36-A. The Commission met five times in 1965, one of these being a joint discussion with the Park Commission. The Enabling Act, under which the Commission is set up, states that its function is the promotion and development of the natural resources of the town and the protection of its watersheds. The powers of the Commission are investigative and advisory. Any recommendations would be voted upon at town meetings or acted on by another agency where appropriate, such as the Park Commission. The Commissioners are appointed by the Selectmen. The Commission is particularly concerned with keeping citizens informed on conservation problems and projects. To that end, several films have been shown to the Littleton High School students. Others are contemplated.
