

#### MEREDITH TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Meredith qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, 1950, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Treasurer for one year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and two Library Trustees for three years.
- 2 Do you favor retaining the Town Manager Plan as now in force in Meredith, New Hampshire. (By Petition)
- 3 To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- 4 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for current year and issue notes therefor and said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.
- 5 To hear the report of the budget and act thereon.
- 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. for the Meredith Village Cemetery Association for care and betterment of the Cemetery. (By request Meredith Village Cemetery Association)

- 7 To raise such sums of money as will be necessary for repairs of Highways and Bridges—Summer Maintenance.
- 8 To raise such sums of money as will be necessary for snow removal and sanding—Winter Maintenance.
- 9 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Highway expenses.
- 10 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a snow loader.
- 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$928.33 for Town Road Aid for construction, maintenance and reconstruction of rural post roads and Class V Highways provided the State will set aside \$3,713.32 for this purpose.
- 12 To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the construction of Eaton Avenue on Meredith Neck.
- 13 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to rebuild the Bear Island Wharf.
- 14 To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the purchase of land to move the Town Dump.
- 15 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preparation of complete assessment records.
- 16 To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Meredith for the coming year as follows—\$300. for the Chairman; \$200. for each of the other two members of the Board. (By petition)

- 17 To see if the Town will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees in the Employees Retirement system of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent ter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$950. for this purpose.
- 18 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Police Protection.
- 19 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward the support of the Fire Department.
- 20 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the payment of Old Age Assistance and for the benefit of indigent persons chargeable to the Town of Meredith.
- 21 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Libraries.
- 22 To see of the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Trustees of the Meredith Public Library to sell a narrow strip of land at the northwest corner of the Library grounds to the Baptist Church for their use in extending a proposed Parish Building over their line. The matter of whether to sell, and if so, at what price, to be left in the hands of the Library Trustees and any proceeds from the sale to be used by the Trustees for Library purposes.
- 23 To see what action the Town will take relative to the leasing of the Town Hall.
- 24 To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise toward the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust. (By request State Forester)

- 25 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$438. which is 1/100 of one per cent of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. (By request Lakes Region Association)
- 26 To see how much the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward defraying the expenses of Band Concerts for the season of 1950.
- 27 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Laconia Hospital. (By request Laconia Hospital Association)
- 28 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.) for the use of Meredith Historical Society to be expended for documentary preservation. (By request Meredith Historical Society)
- 29 To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$1,500. for the purchase of a new lot for a fire station on the North Corner of Oak street and westerly side of Route 3; or appropriate and raise
  - the sum of \$9,000. for purchase of lot in Corporation Square and added cost of construction to be paid back in two \$1,500. installments and six \$1,000. installments, first installments being paid during year 1950.
- 30 To see if the Town will authorize transfer of money in the Capital Reserve Fund to the Board of Fire Commissioners as agents for the construction of a Fire Station.

- 31 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the old sections of the Parade Road from Route 3 to the Laconia Line.
- 32 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of old sections of Oak Hill Pease Road from the New Hampton Line to the Parade Road.
- 33 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the Heinz Mountain Road, from 200 feet beyond Betsey Bobbitt Place, to the Sanbornton town line.
- 34 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the Chase Road, so-called, starting at a point on the Chase Road where road leading to Russell Place so-called, begins, to New Hampton line and the Russell Road, beginning at Chase Road, to end.
- 35 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF AUDIT

# Division of Municipal Accounting State Tax Commission—Concord, N. H.

February 23, 1950

Board of Selectmen Meredith, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Meredith for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Tax Collector, Treasurer, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer and Trustees of Trust Funds.

#### **Financial Statements**

Comparative Balance Sheets—Dec. 31, 1948—Dec. 31, 1949: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of Dec. 31, 1948 and Dec. 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$12,702.42 during the year 1949.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-1)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-1, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits B & C) Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended Dec. 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibits B and C. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit C), a net revenue surplus of \$2,152.68, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$817.37, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,335.31,

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of Dec. 31, 1949, showing annual maturities of principal and interest thereon, is contained in Exhibit I.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit D)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended Dec. 31, 1949, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit D. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of Dec. 31, 1949, is indicated in Exhibit E.

#### Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the collector's records.

#### **General Comments**

As a result of our examination of the Tax Collector's accounts and records, it is recommended that more careful attention be given to the keeping of these accounts, for purposes of accuracy and completeness.

It was noted, for instance, that added taxes which appeared as collections in the Cash Book had not been recorded in the Collector's Warrant Book. A separate

page or pages in the back part of the Warrant Book should be earmarked for this purpose and all added taxes listed thereon.

It was also noted that not all of the uncollected real estate taxes of the 1948 tax levy were sold at the tax sale which was held on June 16, 1949. The reason given for the omission of such taxes from the tax sale was that partial payments had been made in these particular cases prior to the date of sale. All such taxes should have been sold for the balance of the uncollected tax, even though partial payments had previously been made. Loss of the tax liens by the Town would otherwise result from the failure of the taxpayers to complete tax payments in full before the date on which the Town's tax liens expired.

Time spent in making the annual audit could be materially shortened if the town officials had their accounts properly closed and reports made out prior to the date of audit. Likewise the cost of the audit to the Town would thereby be decreased.

It should not be necessary for the Auditors to perform bookkeeping functions as part of the audit procedure.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Meredith for their assistance during the course of the audit.

#### TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

For the Year Ending December 31, 1949

1949 closes on the first full year of operation under the Town Manager form of Government. During the year several notable changes have taken place. One of the biggest changes has been the turning over of the duties of the Tax Collector to the Office of the Town Manager. At the close of the year 85.4 percent of the taxes had been collected. At the time this report was printed this percentage had been increased to 90.17 percent.

Besides the general maintenance work carried on by the Town, the following permanent improvements have been made:

- 1 A little over one mile (5600 ft) of the Parade Road has been completed. This was done with State Aid Funds with the State contributing \$19, 293.52 and the Town \$8,146.76. This now completes the State Aid work in Meredith and relieves us of 4.8 miles of maintenance on the Pease and Parade Roads. They were taken over by the State for maintenance both winter and summer, on December 18, 1949.
- 2 The Town Road Aid funds were expended on the Moulton Road, Collins Road, Nedeau Road and the Edgerly School Road near the New Hampton line. These funds were used for widening, providing adequate drainage and graveling large partions. A wooden bridge was also replaced with a large concrete culvert, thereby cutting down our replacing bridge planking each year.
- 3 Approximately 1500 ft of the Pinnacle Park Road was rebuilt with the money provided at Town Meeting. The road has been widened and graveled from the Meredith Neck Road to the Public Beach.

- 4 Eaton Parkway in the village has been reconstructed with an average of 8 to 10 inches of gravel over which an asphalt surface was placed. The cost of this job ran over the amount of money appropriated. This was partly due to the cost of filling in land that was affected by the road. It was built over the land as laid out in May 1940. The remainder of the over-expenditure was due to the excessive cost of surfacing the estimated amount. The surface was applied this year rather than waiting. If we had waited another year, a good part of the gravel would have washed away, this would have caused an added expense in addition to the surfacing, thereby costing much more than the amount actually spent. It would have been false economy to have waited. The detailed expenditures are listed further in this report.
- 5 The new wharf at Lovejoy Sands was completed early in the year so as to get extensive use during the summer months.

#### Highway Equipment

Two new Trucks were added to the Town equipment this year. During the year a record was kept of the number of hours these town trucks worked. Had we hired them at the prevailing rates for this type of truck the cost would have been \$8,063.60; our cost was \$4,012.48. The story by vehicles was:

Our cost figures include gas and oil, parts and repairs, insurance, depreciation and operator's salary for the hours worked. The amount of savings is the amount saved by owning our own trucks.

The facilities at Laevitt Park have been improved. Six new tables have been added in addition to an area cleaned for picnics, etc.

This report has touched mainly on the permanent improvements made, the detail cost of this work is listed further in the report.

# School Report



#### Meredith School Warrant 1950

#### State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Meredith, qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 10th day of March, 1950, at 8 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2 To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4 To choose another Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 5 To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
  - 6 To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
  - 7 To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 8 To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
- 9 To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell the wood shed at Meredith Center.
- 10 Article withdrawn.
- 11 To see if the School District will appropriate the sum of \$7,000. as a deficiency appropriation on account of teachers' salaries paid in July and August 1949.
- 12 To see what action the School District will take with reference to joining or establishing a cooperative School District as provided by public statutes, chapter 199, Laws of 1947, and the appointment of a committee to transact any necessary business in connection with this article.
- 13 To see if the District will vote to build a new high school, acquire the necessary land for a site, and purchase the necessary equipment.
- 14 To see if the District will vote to appoint a committee of three or more to be known as the building committee with authority to decide upon the location of the new high school building with the approval of the School Board and to advise the Board with respect to the construction of said building.

- 15 To see what action the District will take with regard to enlarging the playground at the Lang Street school and purchasing land therefor.
- 16 To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell or otherwise dispose of the Bixby house adjoining the Lang Street school, with the understanding that the building shall be removed from its present location.
- 17 To see if the School District will vote to build two or more additional rooms at the Lang Street school.
- 18 To see what action the School District will take with reference to building new classrooms on the high school building and purchasing land therefor.
- 19 To see how much money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of constructing a new school building or additions to our present buildings and grounds, purchasing land therefor and providing the necessary equipment as voted under the preceding articles; and in order to provide such funds, to authorize the School Board to borrow the amount voted and to issue serial notes or bonds in the name and on the credit of the District and to fix the time and place of payment, rate of interest, terms, maturities and provide for the sale thereof, all in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 72, as amended by Chapter 55 of the Laws of 1949, and any other amendments applicable thereto.
- 20 To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency or other United States Government or State agencies.

- 21 To see if the District will authorize the School Board to employ an architect to prepare final plans and specifications for a new school building, or additions to our present buildings, and to accept an advance of Federal funds for this purpose.
- 22 To see if the District will authorize the School Board to approve or disapprove completed plans and specifications for a new school building, or additions to our present buildings, if and when prepared by the aid of Federal funds.
- 23 To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 24 (By request) To see if the District will vote to revert to the three man School Board by electing one board member each year beginning in 1951.
- 25 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### REPORT OF SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING MARCH 4, 1949

The meeting was opened at 8:00 p. m. by the Moderator, Arthur Pottle.

It was moved to appoint a temporary clerk in the absence of Linden Grad, the regular clerk, before proceeding with the School Warrant.

The Moderator appointed Norman Piper as temporary clerk and he was sworn in.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Arthur Pottle was re-elected and sworn in by the temporary clerk.

Article 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Norman Piper was elected clerk and sworn in by the Moderator.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

The following candidates were nominated for Members of the School Board for three years: Helen Pottle, Marjorie Piper, Sedley Bartlett, Chester Lord and Joseph Pignone. The Moderator appointed as tellers Marshall Hodsdon, Ruby Weeks and Ernest Nedeau. Voting was by ballot and the voters passed in front of the Moderator's chair to cast their ballots. Candidate Joseph Pignone requested that his name be withdrawn from the first ballot. Results of the balloting were as follows:

On the first ballot, 198 votes were cast, necessary for a choice, 100; Sedley Bartlett receiving 103 votes, was declared elected.

Article 3A. To choose another Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

On the second ballot, 199 votes were cast, with 100 necessary for a choice, so there was no election. At this point a motion was carried for a brief recess. On the third ballot Joseph Pignone received 120 of the 199 votes cast and was declared elected.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Marion Chase was nominated and elected upon the Moderator casting one ballot.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

It was voted that salaries and fees of officers remain the same.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Ernest Nedeau gave a report of the committee appointed at the last District Meeting regarding the possibilities of a cooperative school. Mr. Nedeau presented many facts about the work his committee had done, including the advantages of a larger school, with increased enrollment, wider range of courses, specialized teaching staff and much more emphasis on vocational courses. The case would seem to call for some sort of action, with the elementary grades growing out of their present quarters at a terrific rate. Ashland, Bristol and Meredith were the towns involved in the triangle to work out facts and possibilities and loc-

ation of such a school. This combining of the 3 high schools would make the present schools available for elementary grades. The cost would run in the vicinity of \$1,000 per pupil and the estimate was to build a school for 800 pupils which would be \$800,000, including 12 to 15 acres of land. It is assumed that Federal Aid for such a school might be forthcoming, possibly as much as 50 percent; and another 25 percent is possible from the state, reducing Meredith's proportionate share to about \$54,000.

Mr. Nedeau strongly recommended that a committee be retained to continue research into the plan and a sum of money be available for this work. It was voted that the same committee serve this year and \$300 voted for their use. Mr. C. N. Roberts, Sr., moved that the committee be congratulated for their past labors and then discharged. It was not seconded.

It was also voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of five to study the situation in town as to enlarging the present schools, cost, etc., and report at the next District Meeting. Thus a comparison of the two plans could be had.

Sedley Bartlett asked to have an explanation of why the School Board had not carried out the mandate of the District Meeting of March 10. 1936 regarding a detailed report of expenditures of the District, to be published in the School Warrant. Raymond Watson answered that a complete report of the action of last year's meeting was in the District Report, that the State Auditors' report was there also, and thought that adequate. Mr. Bartlett replied that it was not sufficiently detailed and he was not satisfied with the report as printed. Ted Currier rose to exress complete satisfaction with the report and Treasurer Marion Chase said that the records were available at all times. Marshall Hodsdon advised that a detailed report would add to the cost of printing the Town Reports, stating that last year's book had cost between \$800 and \$900.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

This article was passed, no matter arising that called for action.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Raymond Watson read the budget and explained a couple of revisions, (for less money than the printed report showed). Mr. Bushnell explained that the uncertain situation of State Aid, but if present legislation went through, the town could receive some \$2,000 more than shown in the budget. In the face of presenting a motion to raise an indefinite sum, a motion drawn up by the Attorney General was presented as follows: "I move that the School District raise and appropriate \$82.731 as called for in the school board's budget and to authorize the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum of \$6,220 as income estimated by the school board, exclusive of State Aid, and upon the determination of the amount of State Aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from State Aid and with the District Clerk, certify to the Selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes." Included in this motion was \$300 for the use of the cooperative school committee. It was so voted.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$105. for liability insurance on the school buildings and the school employees.

Discussion ensued as to the legality of anyone sueing the School District for an accident. John Ramsey stated that the only liability of the District was in renting of the gym. It was voted to get the insurance.

Article 10. To see how much the District will vote to raise and appropriate for resurfacing the playground at the Lang street school.

Much discussion centered on the plan to resurface the Lang street playground. Raymond Watson had figures of \$400 (approximately) to do the job. Several protests were registered on the danger of a macadam or tarred surface for children to play on. It was finally voted to raise \$400 to resurface the playground, with the specific stipulation that it should not be a hard surface.

Article 11. To see if the District will elect to approve of the inclusion of employees (other than teachers) in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by chapter 183 of the laws of 1945, and as provided by chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

The article was voted.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Welch spoke on the awkward manner of voting in District Meetings. It was voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of three to study the advisability of electing future District officers by means of a check list and the committee should report their findings at the next annual meeting.

Meeting adjourned.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### Enrollment

The increase in school enrollment that is already beginning to affect schools throughout the country and is sure to continue for the next few years, is a nation-wide condition of which Meredith has its share. Census figures show an estimated school enrollment for the next five years as follows:

Our present facilities at both the Lang street school and the high school are already limited and over-crowded. Two years ago we made over a basement room at the Lang street school into a classroom. This arrangement is unsatisfactory because of insufficient windows and ventilation. By 1951 another classroom here seems certain to be required.

At the high school one class in mathematics numbers more than fifty pupils this year. In our school shop we have bench facilities for a class of 12 and one of our classes numbers 21. We are using a room in the Baptist church vestry on two days a week for instrumental classes.

Needs for more space may be met by one or more of the following procedures:

- 1. Purchase and erect a portable school building for temporary emergency quarters.
- 2. Build a new small high school for Meredith pupils only, refusing to admit tuition pupils from other districts.

- 3. Build a high school adequate for Meredith, Center Harbor, Moultonboro and parts of Holderness and New Hampton that find it convenient to send pupils here to high school.
- 4. Build additional rooms at each of our present schools which are already handicapped because of limited playground space.
- 5. Join with Ashland and other nearby smaller districts to build an adequate cooperative high school.

Committees appointed for the purpose are expected to report at this year's district meeting, giving more specific details as to desirable action for the district to take to provide the added space which this increased enrollment requires.

Of plans so far suggested, the plan of the cooperative high school seems to the writer to be the most desirable. It goes farther toward providing the services that should meet the needs of our pupils ten or twenty years hence. The trend throughout the nation today is away from the small high school that served us so well in the horse and buggy days. To add on a room here and there, or even to erect a new school for the present small district to use, seems like investing money in an institution that will be obsolete before it is paid for.

#### **School Marks and Promotions**

About fifty years ago in the rural schools of America, each pupil learned at his own rate. Children were not designated as first graders, third graders, eighth graders, etc. Nine years was generally allowed for the courses in the elementary grades; but with the short terms of school at that time, many attended more than nine years.

In the city schools, pupils generally were grouped according to grade. Text books were written for the first grade, for the third grade, etc. Gradually this practice spread into the rural schools also, so pupils were enrolled in the register as being classified by

grades. Promotions from grade to grade were usually based upon marks in various subjects. The length of the elementary school course was shortened to eight years.

For a long time teachers have realized that each pupil is different from every other pupil and that any group of pupils in one grade shows wide variations in achievement, attitude and maturity. Marking them all on a percentage basis assumes that they are alike and that the difference is in effort. Since this is a false assumption, we have often questioned whether or not marks should ever have been given and whether our traditional system of grading and promotion is at all justifiable.

This year we are making a start in the direction of eliminating marks and promotions. For the present, this change affects only the primary grades. The proposal is to have each pupil progress at his own rate through work hitherto covered in the first three grades. All pupils are grouped on the basis of their progress in learning to read. A child begins in the first grade at the "readiness" stage as indicated by standard tests and teacher observation, and he progresses at his own speed through the various stages of reading readiness, pre-primer, primer, first reader, second readiness, second reader, third readiness, third reader, etc. At the end of the year a child does not receive a Repeat Grade One or Promoted to Grade Two on his rank card. Instead he receives a statement as to the level at which he will begin in the fall. This is particularly beneficial to the youngster who does not progress quite far enough to be promoted. He is not handicapped with the feeling of failure and as a result, the next year may make up the lost ground.

Most pupils will be able to complete this work in three years; some may take four; occasionally a child can complete it in two. Parents can be kept informed by letters and through conferences with the teacher as to the progress which their children are making. It is hoped that this plan will contribute toward more natural growth for each child and

that it will eliminate many tearful occasions caused by non-promotion or by comparing one pupil's work with another's. Whether or not it is practical to continue this new plan through the entire elementary years is a question. If it proves to be successful on the primary level after two or three years of trial, it may be desirable to continue the plan through the sixth grade at that time.

#### Improvement of Teachers in Service

A salary schedule for teachers has been adopted by the school board. This provides that a teacher with a bachelor's degree, but without experience, shall be employed at the minimum rate set by the state board of \$2000 per year, and this salary shall be increased at the rate of \$100 per year until the maximum has been reached. This action is in line with plans that operate in many communities in the state. This schedule also provides the requirement that six weeks of summer school attendance, or its equivalent in professional study through extension courses, is required once in five years, unless specifically excused by the school board.

The state board has also encouraged teachers to devote time during the year to improvement of their methods by stating that schools may be closed for this purpose for not more than eight days during any school year. In April of 1949, schools in this supervisory union were closed for one week and all teachers were privileged to attend a workshop on the subject of conservation education. This workshop was held in Meredith and was guided by members of the faculty at Plymouth Teachers College, members of the state department of education, and a number of capable experts in the fields of soil conservation, forestry and water resources. The purpose of these sessions was to emphasize to the teachers the necessity on the part of all citizens to guard our nation's bank account of natural resources so the future generations will not find the soil, forests and water supply insufficient. The teachers who attended seemed very enthusiastic as to the practical nature of the work in this

week's workshop. Plans formulated from this workshop are being carried out this year in the schools, both in the elementary grades and on the high school level.

School boards of the union have indicated their approval of the workshop plan and voted to continue this

type of teacher training in the future.

#### Changes in Personnel

Two new teachers at the high school and one at the Lang street school are on our staff this year. Miss Barbara Kemp replaces Miss Reilly as home economics teacher, and Mrs. Irené Lasak takes Miss Jackson's place in the commercial department. The sixth grade, formerly taught by Elizabeth Thompson, who retired from the profession in June, is now under Miss Jean Smith. All three of the new teachers are 1949 college graduates with bachelor's degrees.

#### Kindergarten Education

At various times during the past ten years private kindergartens have been conducted in Meredith. These schools, with all expenses paid by the parents, have gradually gained new supporters. Sooner or later the district will be called on to decide whether kindergartens shall be open only to those whose parents can afford to pay the bill, or whether all pupils shall have the privilege of kindergarten training. This type of work is very valuable and should be added to our curriculum when we can find a room suitable for the purpose and can afford to add another teacher to our staff.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

During the first month of school, the Lang street school children and the Meredith Center children were weighed and measured. This routine will be carried out again in March and finally in June, giving a complete picture of a child's gain or loss in the entire school year. The students of Meredith high school are weighed and measured at the beginning of the fall term.

Physical examinations have been completed on the first four grades at Lang street school, all children at the Meredith Center school, and the young men and women who are playing basketball at high school.

With the use of the new Maico audiometer, six children were found to have hearing defects.

Daily morning visits are made at Lang street and Meredith high school. At this time, any first aid treatment that is necessary is given. Children who become ill while at school are given transportation home.

So far this year we have been quite free of any contagious disease, with the exception of mumps, which has been confined to two families.

We have had a few cases of scabies and impetigo, a few mild cases of athlete's foot, and a few cases of pediculosis.

One child was taken to the Mental Health Clinic in Laconia.

During the fall term a talk on General Health was given to the eighth grade, followed by a question period.

. Several children have been taken to Dr. Hernandez' office for eye examinations; some of the children were found to need glasses and a few had a vitamin deficiency.

The cooperation of the superintendent of schools, school board, teachers and parents has been greatly appreciated.




