THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1400 for the payment of outstanding bonds and make an appropriation for the same.
5. To find out how much money the town will vote to raise for support of highways, bridges and sidewalks, more than the law requires, for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, more than the law requires, for the town library for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
8. To see if the town will install a few electric street lights at Otterville and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars to light the town clock.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for electric street lighting for the ensuing year.

11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemetery purposes.

12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for the control of the White, Pine Blister Rust.

14. To see what Action the town will take regarding the celebration of Old Home Day and what money it will raise and appropriate for the same.

15. To see if the town will vote to lay out and build a road from Main Street across the easterly side of the Town Lot to the residence of Fred G. Williams and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to displace the stone side walk with concrete from the Post Office to Whipple Memorial Hal and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to purchase land for the purpose of establishing a town forest and appropriate money for the same.

18. To see if the town will vote to cooperate with the Towns of Sunapee and Newbury, to advertise Lake Sunapee, each town to raise or appropriate Three Hundred Dollars for this purpose, the Nine Hundred Dollars to be pooled, and the Selectmen of each town to act as the Committee to cooperate with the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade and pass any vote relative thereto. It is the understanding if one or more of said towns fail to raise or appropriate the Three Hundred Dollars this article will become null and void in the other towns mentioned.

These figures show that the hospital has proved its need and its usefulness, but this work would not have been possible without the interest and cooperation of the townspeople. This has been a great help and encouragement to the Executive Board and they wish to say a hearty "thank you" to all who have in any way given assistance.

Several important additions to the equipment have been made during the year and the thing most needed now is a filing cabinet for keeping the records of the patients, etc. This year's work has brought to mind several changes that would add much to the working facilities, most needed are more closet space and a store room for hospital supplies. Those most intimately connected with the work feel that before very long some arrangement must be made for a maternity ward.

Since we are often asked what is needed at the Hospital, we print a short list of things that are always in demand:-

Sheets, 2 yds. wide, 2 3/4 yds. long.

Draw sheets, 70 in. long, 40 in. wide.

Pillow slips, 36 in. long, 21 in. wide.

Swathes, unbleached cotton, 40 in. long, 12 in. wide, double thickness.

Infants' slips, white cotton or flannel.

Infants' dresses.

Towels, all kinds.

Wash cloths.

Unbleached cotton for making operating room supplies.

Old cotton or linen cloth.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Andover, N. H., Feb. 11, 1925.

To the School Board and Citizens of New London School District.

I hereby submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of your schools. This report takes up current school matters and includes the honor roll and the statistical table for the year ending June 30, 1924.

We were fortunate to retain in the Colby Hill primary room Miss Theresa Davis, and for the sixth year at Low Plain Mrs. Sadie Shepard. As Grammar School Principal we secured Miss Hazel French of Tilton, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School. Miss French has had one additional summer of normal school work, two summer courses in music at the Northampton Institute of Musical Pedagogy, and several years of experience in teaching. For the intermediate grades we engaged Miss Dorothy Stratton of Enfield, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School with one year's experience and at Elkins Miss Emma Stanley of your own town.

For the last two years the distribution of pupils through the grades was such as to allow only two grades in the primary room thus requiring three in each of the other rooms. This year grades 1 to 3 are in the primary room, grades 4 to 6 in the intermediate and grades 7 and 8 in the grammar room. The present division is a marked improvement, since the work and the methods for grade 7 and 8 differ fundamentally from those of grade 6. For the last two years, in order that the eighth grade pupils might complete their work, an assistant has been provided for the last third of the year. The assistant last spring was Miss Priscilla Carpenter of Berlin, a young woman with training and experience who did not spare herself in her effort to round out the 8th grade work creditably. To her was largely due the success of the graduation program.

The average attendance of your schools was 29 more last year than five years ago which is a substantial increase. When the number is large enough to warrant the opening of a fourth room, so that no teacher will have more than two grades, the program will be more easily carried out. The room finished off on the second floor last year is used now by the first and second grade children who have to stay for the school teams. A helper has been provided for

the primary teacher for the last hour of both morning and afternoon sessions to take care of these children and to direct their play. The large basement room has been cleared of wood and the cement floor painted so that this can be used as a playroom on stormy days when not too cold. The upstairs room now always available for their use would make a desirable office for the superintendent. There is at present no place in which he may hold conferences with school patrons.

The text-book equipment has been increased by the addition of "Self-Help English Lessons" for grades 3 to 8, science texts, Guittean's history of the United States, supplementary histories, and two sets of Hawksworth's science readers for grades 7 and 8, also Stone's "Child's Book of Numbers" for grade 2, and several new readers for primary and intermediate grades.

The attendance for 1923-24 was 95% which is excellent, but the tardinesses, 334 for the year, were too many. This is an average of three per pupil of the average attendance, and probably the greater part of this is unnecessary. The schools would be improved by fuller cooperation of parents with teachers to secure regular and punctual attendance. The number of visits paid to the schools by parents and citizens shows keen interest, and is an encouragement not only to the pupils but to the teachers who welcome this opportunity for acquaintance and conferences.

As I write this brief report I want to express my appreciation of all courtesies shown to me by officers and patrons of your schools.
