# The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Northwood, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
  - 2. To elect one selectman for three years.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,100 to accept Trunk Line maintenance.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for State Aid maintenance.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1, of the Revised Statutes on a section of the Central road so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for Town Highways the sum of \$200 for this purpose.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to accept Trunk Line Aid for construction.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to co-operate with the State in Pine Blister Rust eradication.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or hire, the sum of \$4,000 to purchase tractor snow plow, hired by Selectmen, as provided by vote at the last annual meeting.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 for street lighting.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Selectmen the sum of One Hundred Dollars each per year for doing the usual business of the Town as required of them.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in excess of the amount required by law for the Northwood Public Library.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the care of cemeteries, as provided in Chapter 10, Laws of 1925.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money to replace temporary loans.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to discount two per cent. on all property tax paid on or before August 1st.
- 19. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all other purposes.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Northwood:

The work of our schools is proceeding in an orderly and efficient manner. This is largely due to the effective efforts of the teachers. The fact that there were no changes in the teaching staff this year is a source of satisfaction. All of our teachers now hold state certificates.

### CHARACTER TRAINING

Much emphasis has recently been placed upon character education. Commissioner Butterfield has inserted a chapter on the subject in the 1925-26 Report of the State Board of Education. In this report, attention is directed to the fact that it is well understood that character is developed in children more satisfactorily by the conscious or unconscious imitation of parents, pastors, teachers and associates than in any other way. Our laws recognized this from the beginning and declared that the schoolmasters and schoolmistresses must be of good character. This is the qualification not specifically named as an essential for town or school district officers.

We believe that the high character of New Hampshire pupils in no small degree is due to the character of the teachers employed in New Hampshire. In our schools, there is an increasing amount of attention given to formal outlines and definite instruction in civic and personal virtues. New outlines have been produced and are now available for the use of the teachers in New Hampshire.

### REPAIRS

In 1925 the Narrows building was painted and the Ridge building shingled. In 1926 the Ridge building was painted. In 1927 the Mountain building should be painted and the new playground at the Ridge should be leveled and made available for the use of the pupils.

### HARVEY LAKE WOMAN'S CLUB

For the fourth time in my annual reports I am paying tribute to this organization for their continued interest in and activity on behalf of our schools. During the past year they have caused to be erected playground swings on the Ridge and Narrow school grounds. The appreciation of the pupils is evidenced by the continued use made of the swings.

At Coe's Academy a new drop curtain for the stage was presented by the Woman's Club.

### TARDINESS AND ATTENDANCE RECORDS

In my last annual report attention was called to our low attendance record, and the large number of tardinesses. Again this record needs to be brought to mind. During the year 1925-26 the per cent. of attendance in Northwood elementary schools was 90.76 while the average for the whole state was 94.24.

In Northwood we averaged nearly 3 tardinesses per pupil for the year, while the average for the state was 1.22. That this laxness becomes a habit is reflected in the records of Coe's Academy, which school has next to the poorest tardiness record in the state. The parents and guardians are largely responsible for the low tardiness record. They should see that pupils leave home early enough to arrive at school on time.

There is no legitimate reason why Northwood pupils should continue to make such low attendance and tardiness records.

### THE BUDGET

The chief item of increased expense in the budget submitted by the School Board is for academy tuition. This is due to the increased rate of tuition and to a larger registration of Northwood pupils at Coe's Academy.

Of the eighteen pupils who finished the work of the eighth grade last June, fifteen entered Coe's Academy in the fall. Next June there will be over twenty in our eighth grade class, most of whom will attend the Academy next fall. We are glad to have an increasing number avail themselves of the opportunity to get high school training. The cost for tuition is far less than the cost would be of maintaining a public high school.

### CHILD HEALTH CONFERENCE HELD AT NORTH-WOOD

A Child Health Conference was held at Northwood July 8, 1926, under the supervision of the State Board of Health, with the Women's Club of Northwood cooperating. Thirty-three children were weighed, measured and given a complete physical examination. The following defects were found: Glands, 11; Genitalia,

12; Undernourished, 1; Enlarged tonsils, 17; Teeth, 12; Eyes, 3; Lungs, 1; Bleeder, 1; Ears, 2; Flat chest, 2; Spinal curvature, 1; Defective finger, 1; Hernia, 1; Heart, 1; Posture, 3.

The corrections made since the conference are as follows:

- 1. Genitalia—2 circumcised, 4 children moved, 4 under treatment.
- 2. Glands, 11—No recommendations made, 9; under treatment, 2.
