TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Peterborough, in the County of

Hillsborough, in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon (Polls close at 6:00 p.m.) to ballot for Town Officers and other questions required by law to be decided by ballot. Pursuant to the authority of RSA 39:2-a and the vote of the Town on March 10, 1970, all business other than ballot questions will be recessed until 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, March 19, 1985 at Peterborough Elementary School, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

(By Ballot)

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Ballot)

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by petitions, or take any other action relating thereto. (By

Ballot)

Article 4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts to the Town in Trust or otherwise by any individual or individuals, or take any

other action relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed One Hundred Forty Three Thousand Six Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$143,690.00) at terms deemed to be in the best interest of the Town to be used for the purchase of a Class A Triple Combination pumper for the Fire Department or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Office, Town House, Legal Expense, Street Lighting, Water Charge, Patriotic Purposes, Vital Statistics, Local Planning, Board of Adjustment, Conservation Commission, Supervisors of Checklist, Highway Summer, Highway Winter, Public Works Summary, Highway Garage, Police Department, Fire Department, Ambulance, Library, Probation Department, Health Department, Welfare Department, Parks, Recreation Department, Solid Waste, and for any other charge arising within the Town.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand Eighty Dollars (235,080.00) for the paying of the Town debt and interest, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of collection of

taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to cover the interest on the notes, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amount in-

dicated, or take any other action relating thereto:

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote that Planning Board members shall be elected, in accordance with provisions laid down in RSA 673:2, II; RSA 669:17; and RSA 673:5, II, or take any other action relating thereto.

(By Petition)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: No person shall at the same time serve the Town in any two of the following positions: Budget Committee member; Selectman (except as ex officio member of the Planning Board); Planning Board member; Zoning Board of Adjustment; Town Counsel, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept and use from the State of New Hampshire approximately Seventy-Seven Thousand Four Hundred Eighty-Nine Dollars (\$77,489.00) in Highway Subsidy moneys restricted to highway construction or reconstruction, or take any other ac-

tion relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Thirteen Dollars (\$59,813.00) for renovations to the Town House heating system, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the reappraisal of real

estate, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$9,600.00) to replace a pickup truck and plow for the Department of Public Works, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Seven Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$27,775.00) to replace the Bombardier Sidewalk Tractor for the Department of Public Works, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$6,600.00) to purchase a ditching bucket and attachments for the Department of Public Works, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) for renovations to Noone Bridge,

or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to convert the Noone Bridge to a foot-

bridge or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) to upgrade the street lighting system, providing the repayment be made from savings incurred from reduction in annual service charges for street lighting, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$20,600.00) to install an underground drainage pipe at Adams Playground, or take any other ac-

tion relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to replace the 1983 Ford Police Cruiser, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to keep the 1983 police cruiser to avoid the necessity of purchasing a 1986 police cruiser, or take any other

action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Housand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to purchase a set of scales to weigh the trucks travelling in and through the Town of Peterborough, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$16,800.00) for a study and recommendations related to aquifers within the Town of Peterborough, or

take any other action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and to accept, on behalf of the Town or any department, thereof, any grants from any individual or federal or state governmental unit or governmental agency for the purpose of constructing a child day care facility by the Monadnock Community Day Care Center, and to further authorize that the funds be expended for the purposes stated, or act in any way relating thereto, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote that future Town Reports be required to contain a reporting of all legal fees, to whom they are paid to and what department was represented, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to require all Town employees and departments to prepare written bid specifications and to obtain at least three (3) written bids for purchases of all materials, supplies, and

services having a total cost of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or take any

other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to surface the driveway and parking area of the Lil' Engine That Could child care center, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to support the work of the Women's Crisis Center of the Monadnock Region, or take any other action relating

thereto. (By Petition)

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,450.00) for St. Josephs Community Services Inc., or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-Nine Dollars and Sixty Cents (\$15,239.60) for the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association Inc., or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for the support of the Monadnock Community Day Care Center, a non profit agency, or take any other ac-

tion relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Two Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$3,672.75) for the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 36. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's

Deed, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before

this meeting.

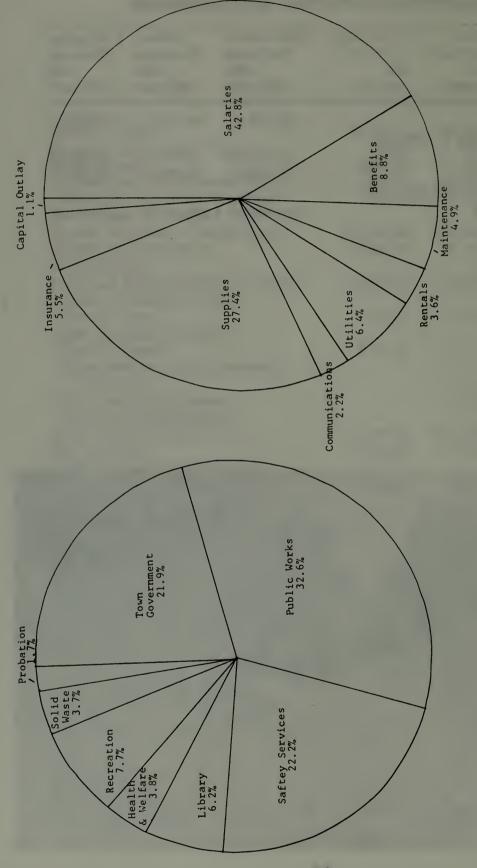

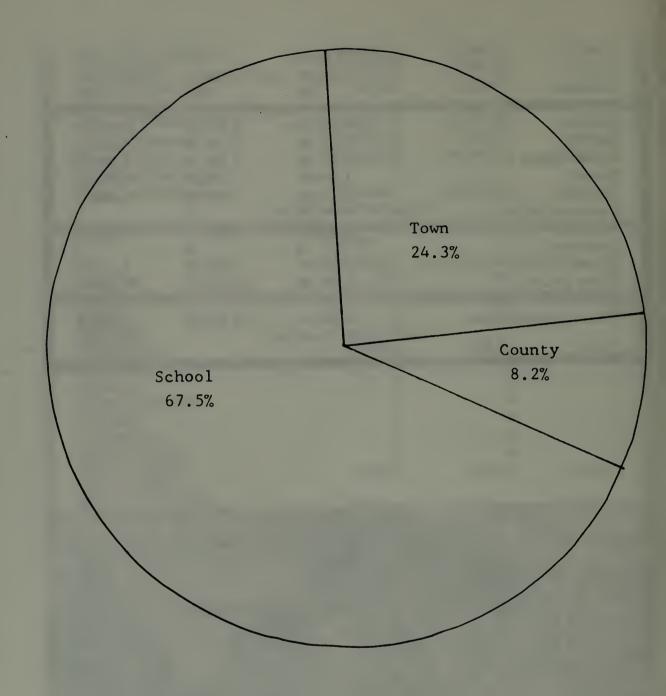

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1984

1. Summary of significant accounting policies:

The accounting policies of the Town of Peterborough conform to generally accepted accounting principles for local governmental units except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis of accounting - The accrual basis is used for all fiduciary and proprietary funds. Governmental funds use the modified accrual basis whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred (accrual basis) except:

- a. Disbursements for inventory items (materials and supplies) are considered expenditures when purchased.
- Prepaid expenses are not normally recorded.

General fixed assets - The Town instituted general fixed assets accounting as of December 31, 1979. However, historical cost records were not readily available for most assets. Therefore, the assets were stated on the following basis:

Land - Independent appraisal in 1974 increased by 41% to reflect current values.

Buildings - Independent appraisal in 1973 increased by 58% by insurance company to reflect current replacement cost. Assets acquired subsequent to appraisal are shown at estimated cost, plus a percentage, to reflect current replacement cost.

Furniture, fixtures and equipment - Estimated current values.

Vehicles - Estimated original cost.

Acquisitions subsequent to 1979 have been recorded at cost.

Property, plant and equipment - Fixed assets in the proprietary funds are stated at cost. Depreciation has been provided over the estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

1. Summary of significant accounting policies (continued):

Investments - investments are stated at cost.

Continuing appropriations - Appropriations for certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end are carried forward as continuing appropriations to the mext year in which they supplement the appropriations for that year. It year end, continuing appropriations are reported as a component of fund balance and are detailed as follows:

Taxes collected for others - The Town collects taxes for ConVal Regional School District and Hillsborough County which are remitted to them as required by law.

Interfund transactions - During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services, construct assets and service debt. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary funds financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

Proprietary funds record operating subsidies as other income, whereas the governmental fund paying the subsidy records it as a transfer.

<u>Property taxes</u> - Annually, the Town establishes an amount for abatements, discounts and refunds of property and resident tax revenues known as overlay. All abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to overlay. Overlay is included under the classification of general government in the financial statements.

As prescribed by law, the tax collector sells, at tax sale, all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due, where applicable. The purchaser, at tax sale, has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a liem for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the three-year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the liemholder.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1984

Reserve for delinquent taxes - When taxes receivable are reported, a reserve for taxes which remain uncollected after 60 days is established and offset against fund balance.

Retirement system - The Town provides for pension benefits to substantially all full-time employees through a contributory system under New Hampshire law. The law prescribes the formula for computing pension benefits and presently does not permit advance funding of pension liabilities. Pension benefits are paid from Town funding and employee contributions based on date of entry. Pension expense for the year ended June 30, 1984, the latest year end of the New Hampshire retirement system, was \$33,688. There is no unfunded past service liability and the value of vested benefits has not been determined. The date of the last actuarial report on the New Hampshire retirement system is June 30, 1979.

2. Purpose of funds and account groups:

The Town reports its activities in numerous individual funds to comply with the limitations and restrictions placed on both the resources made available to the Town and the services provided. Individual funds and account groups summarized in the accompanying financial statements are classified as follows:

A. Governmental funds -

These funds are intended to provide recurring general services. They are controlled by a budget approved by the voters.

General fund - Used to account for all revenues and expenditures which are not accounted for in other funds or account groups.

Special revenue funds - Used to account for specific restricted revenues and expenditures for various purposes. Receipts and expenditures of each fund are governed by the terms of contractual agreements, statutes or local law.

B. Proprietary funds -

Enterprise funds - These funds account for operations of entities that provide services on user charge or other basis to the general public.

C. Fiduciary funds

Trust and agency funds - These funds are used to account for assets held by the Town in a fiduciary capacity for various purposes, including cemetery operations. Receipts and expenditures of each fund are governed by statutes or local law.

- 3. Budget:

The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special Town meetings. The selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary.

4. Long-term debt:

General - General long-term debt at December 31, 1984 represented the unpaid balance of the 5.10% sewer construction bonds. The bonds are payable in annual installments of \$180,000, plus interest, through 1990.

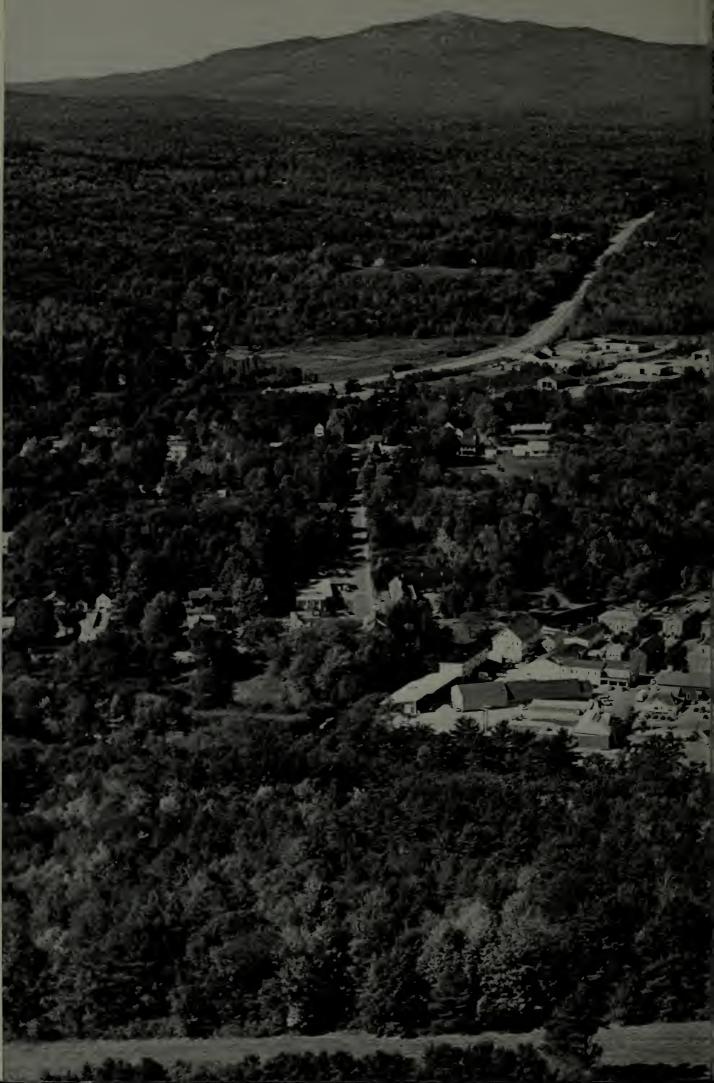

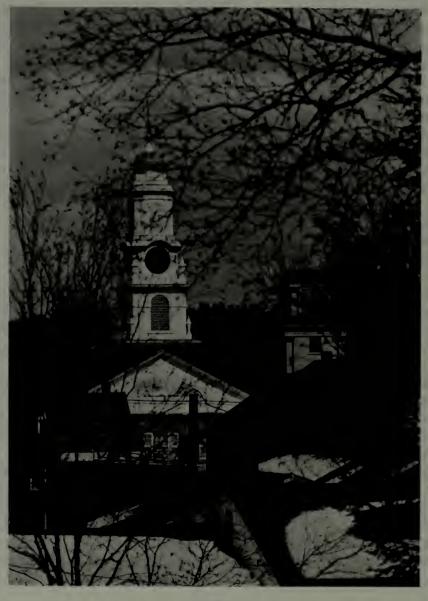

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC WORKS RELATIVE TO ADMINISTRATION OF

The following is a brief report of the Departments that I have administered during the past year.

Highway Department

After a three year hiatus another section of Pine Street was rebuilt complete with new drainage, curbing, sidewalks and surface.

Only a short section remains to reach Cheney Avenue.

Despite a labor shortage during the summer months crews managed to complete a new pedestrian-bikeway from the Basket Shop to Noones Falls along the abandoned railroad bed. This walk has been used extensively to avoid a dangerous narrow section along Route 202.

Crews also placed a temporary hot mix surface on a deteriorated portion of the High Street sidewalk to PES, which will render the condition

safe until a more extensive rebuild can be accomplished.

The department was called upon to demolish the Downing house next to the Fire Station and to do some preliminary site work at that location.

Water Department

A new 8" transmission main was installed on Summer Street to tie in the Summer Street Well with the existing mains near the Henderson residence. This connection has improved supply and efficiency to the downtown area.

There were eight new services installed in 1984.

Sewer Department

There were three new services installed during the past year. Routine maintenance made up the balance of the department workload.

Solid Waste

This department saw increased volumes of both refuse and recycled materials in the past year with sales reaching almost \$17,000.00.

Also in 1984 the Town continued as a member of the Contoocook Valley Solid Waste District as had been mandated by the State Legislature.

Trees and Forests

Forty-five dead or hazardous trees were removed by Town and contract crews.

On New Years Eve vandals cut down the Town Christmas Tree in Putnam Park. The tree was replaced in September with a new tree donated by Woodmans Florists and was relocated to the Park from the Greenfield Road by the Bartlett Tree Company.

Town Office

Activity around the Town Office saw the completion of the computerization program.

Town financial functions are now entirely computerized.

Town House

A lot of facelifting was done on the old building in the past year.

Through community donations the deteriorated weathervane was duplicated and reinstalled atop the cupola completing that restoration project.

The upper hall received a new coat of paint, the floors were refinished

and new fans were installed.

New draperies and shutters adorn the hall through the generosity of the Womens Club.

Cemeteries

The cemeteries continue to be well maintained by Bud Grant and crew. Hans Kaufhold completed the stone restoration work in the Old Street Road Cemetery.

There were fifty-seven burials in 1984.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the Selectmen, my office staff, Thelma Turner, Becky Baldwin, and Deanna Atkinson; my foremen, Pete Deiana, Howard Parker, and Tom Weeks; fellow department heads, and to you our valued citizens, for your support and encouragement during the past year.

REPORT OF THE WELFARE OFFICER

I believe this to be my 20th report as Peterborough Welfare Officer. In any event, it is my final one. I've been searching for some words for a farewell report that might lead to immortality, I know not where they are! In any event it is simpler to say it has been a pleasant and rewarding experience to have been for 20 years, a local Welfare official. I do hope however, that some day the Legislature will change the title to Human Services Officer. I believe it to be much more appropriate.

I hope my successor enjoys his activities as much as I have. I expect he will experience as many changes in the philosophy and laws as I have

witnessed.

Six hundred thirty eight dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$638.59) were distributed from Common Trust "D" fund, and one hunderd seventy two dollars and two cents (\$172.02) from Trust "D" Overseer of Welfare Fund.

Generous contribution from the Congregational Church, provided, through this office for Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets. The "Crop Walk for Hunger" sponsored by Monadnock Community Churches was once again most helpful in replenishing the Food Bank Account.

The Business and Professional Women's Association once again coordinated volunteer efforts, and contributions for Operation Santa Claus,

with the center of activities being the All Saints Parish House.

Once again many proposed changes in State Laws pertaining to Welfare will be before the coming Legislative session. Having served 14 years as a legislator, I am not optimistic about major changes. There is a great need to relieve Towns and Counties from much of the financial burden of Court Ordered Juvenile Placement.

Reading from the Town History, in February 1904, there were 48 tramps housed in the Lockup, between the ages of 35-65. During the two months from Feb. 15th-April 15th, 1908, the Town was host to a total of 250 tramps, an average of 4 a night. Who said Street People are a new phenomenon? In 1984 we assisted one!

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Peterborough Board of Adjustment received 47 applications during 1984, representing an increase of nearly 40% over the number of cases heard during 1983, and almost twice as many applications as were received during 1982. Thirty-two of the applications sought special exceptions, 17 requested variances, two asked for both a variance and a special exception, and one represented an appeal from a preliminary decision of the Building Code Officer. Two of the applications were withdrawn prior to hearing.

A special exception permits the use of property for a purpose specifically designated in the Zoning Ordinance and is granted in situations where the Board determines that the proposed use will not adversely affect other neighboring properties and will be consistant with the overall character of the respective zoning district. On the other hand, a request for a variance asks the Board to permit a use not otherwise provided for in the Zoning Ordinance, and usually requires the applicant to show that some undue hardship will result unless the variance is granted. The Board is also charged with hearing appeals from administrative decisions of town of-

ficials, such as the Building Code Officer or the Selectmen.

There were 10 applications received with respect to property in the Family District, five of which sought special exceptions, three of which sought variances, one involved an appeal from an administrative decision, and one application sought both a special exception and a variance. All except two of the applications were granted, some with conditions of approval, and on the appeal of the administrative decision, the Board ruled that it had no jurisdiction to act. The majority of the requests for special exceptions involved homeowners seeking to use a portion of their residences for so-called customary home occupations or professional uses, while the variance applications typically requested relief from required setback or development density requirements.

Thirteen applications were received with regard to property in the General Residence District, seven of which sought special exceptions, five of which sought variances, and one of which sought both a special exception and a variance. Again, all but two of such applications were granted with appropriate conditions of approval. As in the Family District, nearly all the special exception requests were for customary home occupations or professional uses in personal residences, and the variance requests all involved either setback, density, or sign size relief. One of the applications, for operation of a so-called bed and breakfast as a customery home occupation, has been appealed by an abutter of the property and is currently pending in the Hillsborough County Superior Court.

The Board considered 13 applications in connection with property located in the Rural District, ten of which sought special exceptions, and three of which requested variances. All of the applications were granted, except a request to construct a building within the Conservation Zone along the Contoocook River in South Peterborough, which was denied following a rehearing. One other case, involving a sand and gravel opera-

tion, had not been finally decided by year end.

There were eight applications with respect to property located in the Commercial District, of which six requested special exceptions, and two requested variances. Again, all of the applications were granted with conditions of approval, except a variance request for a larger than otherwise allowable sign.

Finally, there was but one case received or considered concerning property in the Industrial District. This sought a variance to construct a building for commercial purposes, and a decision was withheld pending receipt of more specific information concerning the nature of the com-

mercial use intended for the property.

The Board was sorry to lose the services of David A. Berg during 1984, as a result of a move to Virginia. Mr. Berg served enthusiastically and with great concern for the best interests of the Town for more than five years, and his insight and wit will be missed. Nevertheless, Stanley T. Szydlo, an alternate member of the Board for a number of years, has been elevated to fill Mr. Berg's position, and his participation on a more regular basis will be welcomed.

In its decisions during 1984, the Board again attempted to apply and interpret the Zoning Ordinance in a consistant manner. Variances of use restrictions were denied except in extraordinary cases, while variances of setback, frontage and other such requirements were granted where the established criteria were met. The Board granted special exceptions, often subject to numerous conditions, where it deemed that the spirit and

intent of the Zoning Ordinance would be preserved.

REPORT OF THE PETERBOROUGH CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1984

It is a pleasure to report the dedication, on October 13, 1984, of the 1.6 mile trail from Old Mountain Road to the top of South Pack Monadnock. Laid out and supervised by commission member Lee Baker and forester Steven Lord, the trail was built with the help of Boy Scout Troop 808, largely on land which had been given to the town.

The addition of this trail, named for Fairfield E. Raymond, is an example of positive action to enhance use of the environmental resources of

Peterborough.

The Commission is currently exploring possibilities for development of as much of a greenbelt as possible for walks and hiking along the town's rivers.

In its role of environmental overseer, the Commission was very pleased to find the Selectmen, Planning Board and Board of Adjustment taking appropriate action to protect the 100 foot Conservation Zone along the rivers and to ensure actions in accordance with State statutes regulating

excavations of sand and gravel.

This year the emphasis of the program of the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions (attended by two members of the Peterborough Conservation Commission) was on the importance of the proper identification and protection of aquifers and other water sources to ensure continuing pure water supplies for each town. It is heartening to see Peterborough showing leadership in this area by appointing a Water and Sewer Committee to study future needs and suggest actions to be taken. Recommendations of this committee for scientific studies should receive full town support.

Because environmental concerns and problems do not stop at town lines, your commission took the lead in calling together interested conservation commissions of other Monadnock Region towns to see what could be done about effective communication between commissions. This will

probably result in a regular regional information exchange.

The Commission wishes to acknowledge with sincere thanks the years of service by Mr. Nathaniel Bowditch, whose other duties precluded his accepting appointment to another term. In his place we welcomed the appointment by the Selectmen of Mr. Richard Estes, a very well-informed and active conservationist. Mr. Estes has already assumed very effectively leadership in some of our new projects.

Finally, we wish to emphasize that our environmental role is really a coordinating one — so individual citizens with questions or concerns in the area are asked and urged to bring them to the attention of members of the

commission for consideration, and for help in achieving desirable action. The Commission has no enforcement powers, but can suggest action by those who do have such powers.

It has been a pleasure to serve the Town for another year in its efforts to

ensure that Peterborough remains "A Good Gown to Live In."

PLANNING BOARD 1984 ANNUAL REPORT

1984 was another busy, and at times controversial, year for the Peterborough Planning Board. Meetings were held monthly, and on several special occasions, to receive and act on applications concerning land and property uses which is the Board's primary function. The Board acted in accordance with town regulations and it's an understatement to report

that decisions in all cases were accepted as rendered.

A decision approving bed and breakfast for the so-called Manse on Main Street brought a court challenge from a neighbor (still not settled); another applicant felt aggrieved at not being permitted to use land within the Conservation Zone on Route 202 South for a commercial building. The same person presented the Board with 18 questions on procedural and other matters as well as arguing the issues at board meetings. The Board in October closed that debate by providing the applicant with written responses to each question, and the information was also sent to area media.

Major development projects which the Board approved were as follows:

Housing subdivision, 8 lots, Fly Pond area, Summer St., and Mac-Dowell Rd.; 9 lots, Old Greenfield Rd.; 5 lots, Old Dublin Rd.; 4 lots, Gulf Rd.; 3 lots, Old Bennington Rd.

Apartments, 4 units, Union St.; 12 units, Summer St. (subject to 1985 zoning change).

Commercial, mini-shopping center, 13,600 sq. ft., Route 202N; conversion of former garage, Main St., 3 retail shops; 12 units, nursing home, Old Dublin Road.

Developments on which preliminary hearings were held, and the board is waiting for further details before making final decisions:

Stone Barn, Old Street Rd., 21 condominiums; 17 house lots, Route 101W; 6 or 8 lots, Gen. Miller Rd.; 3 lots, Greenfield Road.

There were two after-the-fact site plan situations that the Board approved (applicants claimed not to be aware of town regulations), which involved a day care business on Route 101E, and a plumbing shop on Route 202N.

Numerous applications were approved for two-lot subdivisions, all residential, which in many cases were family matters, or property line adjustments. This was also a busy year for "home occupations", and all were approved in residential districts where it was clear that the use was professional and no commercial operation was involved.

Hearings were held on changes to the town street light system (upgrading old lights, which may be done in '85), and the future of Noone Bridge in South Peterborough. The Board recommends that the bridge either be limited to one-lane motor traffic, or restricted to pedestrian use.

Four petitions were received for zoning amendments, and they will appear on a special ballot at the next town election March 12, 1985. Two are

recommended by the Board, namely extending the General Residence District on Summer St., and eliminating two zones (Rural and Family) at the Lobacki Poultry Farm, Route 101E, in favor of placing all 16 acres in the General Residence District. The latter is subject to extension of town water and sewer to the property.

The Board voted a negative position on rezoning 165 acres of land at No. Peterborough, owned by PIDC Partners, to industrial and residential use, pending an "aquifer" study of that area, and whether development of the land could have a detrimental effect on two town wells located there. As this report was written it was uncertain whether the two PIDC applications would be withdrawn and not appear on the zoning ballot in March.

The Board had hoped to have available the results of an 8-page questionnaire distributed at the presidential polls in November. Voters were asked to respond to 36 questions relating to planning, demographics, likes and dislikes about the town, etc., similar to a poll taken in 1972 on which the Board developed a Master Plan for the community. Compilation of the responses, however, proved to be more difficult and time-consuming than expected, which are the reasons for the delay.

Board membership was unchanged during the year, except for exofficio representation from the Board of Selectmen which was covered by Stanley Peters. At year's end plans were made to employ a secretary to record minutes of meetings, and other duties, functions which had been handled by Board members and others for a number of years. Hired for

this position was Patricia Alexander of Lookout Hill Road.

This report can not end without the Board extending its thanks for the patience, understanding, and assistance of many citizens of the town, officials, and others, in the conduct of board responsibilities. Our community is growing, and changing, which is what town planning is all about.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT, 1984

Volunteers made the difference in 1984. They stretched the library budget and answered the community's request for more library hours. In February, the library began opening from 12-2 Sunday afternoons, making the collection accessible fifty hours a week. One dozen volunteers coordinated by Helen Harrison perform this task. Once each week, Helen Harrison, Eleanor Proudman, Connie Quick and Ruth Young meet at the library to mend books. RSVP volunteer Vin Powers performs a variety of clerical tasks while middle-school student Daniella Taylor volunteers as a library aide each Saturday morning. Part-time employee Jeannette Baker volunteers many more hours each week, helping with the library work load. The generosity of these people represents over 1,000 hours labor.

Increased hours mean increased use, giving Peterborough the distinction of one of the highest per capita circulations in the state, and the second highest within our population grouping: 13 books read for every man, woman and child. One thousand, eight hundred sixty-seven new books were added for your reading pleasure this year. Of these, 73.6% were purchased, while 26.4% were the generous gifts of friends.

In addition, the library meeting halls continue to be filled with a variety of groups which gather all week long. Girl Scouts, yoga, Widow/Widower Support Group, Boy Scouts, exercise classes, Weight Watchers, Bridge Club, Adult Tutorials, Extension Groups, Monadnock Community Education, Garden Club, AAUW, Friends of the Library, DAR, and Camera Club are just a few of the more than 100 groups who have shared our space over

900 times this year.

The Friends of the Library hold their Brown Bag Lunches for a full house every month, taking time out only long enough to organize their annual fundraiser, the Friends of the Library Book Sale. This fall's successful sale, organized by Deece Lambert and Gif Russell, brought in over \$1,600. This money will be used for new telephone lines and equipment for the building. Other purchases made with Friends funds include tables, a lecturn and a mapcase for the Historical Room. Poinsettias brightened the holiday season, thanks to the Friends, while the Peterborough Garden Club takes credit for the monthly flower arrangements at the front desk.

The Elizabeth Room for Young People continues to be a busy place and the source of many popular programs: storytime, Paperbacks in the Park, After School Movies, the Summer Reading Program, and the Little

Red Wagon.

Adult programming offered the University of New Hampshire lecture series "1984" at the start of the year. Fall saw a very successful "Authorized Hour," a series of readings by New Hampshire poets and fiction writers, funded by the National Endowment of the Arts.

The town mourned the passing of many good citizens. Several were remembered by memorial gifts to the library: Laurie Armstrong,

Thomas O'Connell and Isabel Sedgewick.

"Our Town" was in the national media a good deal in 1984. The library

too, was mentioned in many state papers, Esquire, and Money Magazine for its high circulation and computer loan program. Any success we've experienced is due in part to a flexible staff who have been willing to accept change and try new things, and a progressive Board of Trustees who have been supportive. We are proud to be an integral part of this community, and welcome suggestions for new ways to serve you.

REPORT OF THE PETERBOROUGH FIRE DEPARTMENT 1984

Fire calls in 1984 decreased by ten the number for 1983. Our total calls numbered 175 with only three structure fires. Just one of these resulted as a working fire. The break-down of calls is as follows:

Chimney fires remained about the same as 1983 but brush fires were up but they were all of a minor nature. Auto fires and smoke investigation were also up in number. Once again our fire loss for the year remained very low.

Our ambulance calls dropped by two this year making a total of 397 calls. During the year we did lose several of our attendants and at one time we were dangerously low. However at the present time we do have as many attendants as we did thirteen years ago. Many of our younger fellows are taking up the slack when the veterans decide it is time for you younger folks to take over. We are now enjoying very much help from our other five towns and it does make our task that much easier. As stated before we are strictly an emergency ambulance service and we just cannot take care of non-emergency calls. Through the cooperation of our hospital, doctors, nurses, and nursing homes and many others involved we have been able to hold these ambulance calls under control. Our budget this year remains about the same as last year, with a slight rise for electricity.

Once again we wish to thank each and everyone that make our work that much easier. We have tried to keep both the fire and ambulance budgets where the voters and citizens could live with them. As we have stated in the past the voters have been very good to us and hope they will continue this year as we are asking for the purchase of a new fire truck which appears to be overdue. We are at the present time working on our specifications which we would like for our new truck and should you have any questions any of the firemen would gladly talk it over with you. We wish to thank you once again for the fine support we do receive and hope you will continue your support to purchase this new fire truck for us so that we may serve you better in the future.

RECREATION REPORT 1984

This past year saw the establishment of the Friends of Recreation, comprising a 5 member committee (none of whom can serve simultaneously as Selectman, Budget or Recreation Committee member) registered with the State of New Hampshire office of Attorney General Charitable Trust Division in Concord.

The Friends of Recreation is independent from the Peterborough Recreation Committee, but is designed to assist the Peterborough Recreation

Department in financial matters and program planning.

This year also saw the establishment of a 5 member Special Recreation Committee (Board of Selectman member, Budget and Recreation Committee representatives, member at large and Recreation Director) designed to advise their respective governmental agencies on current and long range plans that may be studied or sponsored by the Peterborough Recreation Committee.

The number one priority of the Special Committee is to attain a Master Plan for the Peterborough Recreation Department. It now appears that this Master Plan will be completed early in 1985.

Sandblasting of Adams Pool was completed in October.

Major electrical improvements for Adams Playground were also effected. This is ongoing and should be completed by no later than June 1, 1985.

All 4 outdoor tennis courts as well as the Adams Playground outdoor basketball court were specially sealed and painted earlier this year.

Inroads have begun toward an eventual Nature Trail on the Seccombe

Program Director Lynn Castonguay again managed an outstanding American Red Cross Learn to Swim Summer Program. Assisting in coordinating the overall summer Aquatic program were: Janet Chandler, Joan Norton, Angele Summers, Christine Temple and Tom Feller.

Playground Supervisor Catherine Calhoun offered a splendid summer park program for youth as did tennis coordinator Monique Pelletier and

Arts and Crafts Director Kelly Keating.

Lynn Castonguay's creative and skillful means also render to popular and diverse year round program offerings for residents of all ages.

Yet the endless list of program volunteers continues to be the integral strength of the varied and overall program offerings by the Peterborough

Recreation Department.

Special acknowledgements should be made to Conval High School Athletic Director Robert Butson, Peterborough Elementary School Principal Moe LeFlem, and Conval's Assistant Business Manager Ken Noyd for their personal efforts in bridging the gap toward favorable community-school relations.

Special gratitude is also extended to Steve Conroy, Director of the Monadnock Retired Services Volunteer Program for providing outstanding personnel services to the Peterborough Recreation Department.
