THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.

4. To raise and appropriate money for Town Road Aid.

5. To raise and appropriate money for Care of Cemeteries.

6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street Lights.

7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.

8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Fire Department.

9. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.

10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

12. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountains Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the Cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10c per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of the town for 1949.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or otherwise.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

16. To see what the Town wishes to do with the power shovel.

17. To see if the Town will vote to let the school use the community room and make necessary changes.

18. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate a sum in excess of the payment voted in 1949 on the State Aid Bridge Note.

19. To see if the Town will vote to throw up the road from the four corners on the Lily Pond road to the State highway by John Simpson's subject to gates and bars.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Everyone apparently fears fires but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditures of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION-fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

In July, the trustees voted to pay the librarian sixty cents per hour, instead of forty, and to hold monthly meetings.

The trustees thank all the friends of the library for their generous gifts of books and magazines and for their sustained interest.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Piermont Qualified to Vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 14th day of March, 1950, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payments of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of a School Lunch Program for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the installation of flush toilets in the school building and in the community room.

11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the continuance of the Primary Room for the remainder of the 1949-1950 school year, March 13-June 16, 1950.

12. To see if the District will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to apply to unanticipated expenses.

Teachers and Pupils

Miss Carole Lavoie returned as principal and teacher of grades five through eight, with Mrs. Josie Bowles again teaching grades one through four. The popular work of Mrs. Christie Goodwin as music supervisor and teacher continues and adds much to the program of studies.

The enrollment of 62 pupils in 1948-1949 increased to 70 by October, 1949; the heaviest load being in the primary grades with fourteen in grade one and total of 38 in the primary room. The added enrollment caused an unsatisfactory teaching condition, which was overcome by hiring of Mrs. Francis Patridge of Haverhill to assist, by teaching grades I and II which were moved into the Community room at the Library building. Mrs. Bowles and Miss Lavoie then equalized their teaching loads by moving grades five into the lower-grade room. It is the recommendation of both the School Board and Superintendent that funds be made available in the March District Meeting, to continue this plan in the future. Mrs. Patridge is a Plymouth Teachers College graduate and previously taught in Laconia, New Hampshire.

Building and Grounds

The bad condition of the chimney being considered a fire hazard, caused the Board to have it razed and a new one relocated in the main building. This improved the kitchen, and more space for storage shelves was thus made available.

A bubbler and lavatory were installed for the first and second grade pupils in the community room.

The toilet facilities in the main building are inadequate and not of the best type. With the exception of one one-room rural school, the Piermont building is the only one in this Supervisory Union that does not yet have flush toilets. The lighting arrangement is also poor, testing well below standard on a light reading meter.

The grounds were greatly improved by the removal of stones from the playing surface. Added playground equipment would be of material benefit to the growing boys and girls, especially for those in the primary age group.

General Information

The School Lunch Program continues successfully under the able supervision of Mrs. Florence Robbins. This year the lunches were started several weeks earlier than last year, and are popular with the pupils and teachers. This longer period of serving is partly made possible by the continued contributions of food from the parents and friends of the school in addition to surplus food from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The loss of Lottie M. B. Underhill, R. N., who was taken from our school system by death last March, was keenly felt by the administration. Only expressions of praise are written in the files of Superintendents Page, Janes, Martin, Douglass, and myself, all of whom she served during the years of her active service in this Union.

Miss Helen D. Latulippe, a graduate of Mary Hitchcock School of Nursing, and of Simmons College School of Public Nursing was obtained to fill the position left vacant. Miss Latulippe is a resident of Plymouth, New Hampshire. The efficient manner in which she has taken over the work of School Nurse is commendable. The Union is fortunate in securing one with such qualifications and experience.

The loss of State Aid, in the several school districts of this Union, has made it necessary for the districts to curtail any immediate plans for a cooperative secondary school, as such plans depend somewhat upon both building aid and transportation aid from either the state or federal level, or both. Specifically, in Piermont the State Aid dropped from \$2,976.31 in 1948-1949 to \$833.72 in 1949-1950.

Conclusion

My appreciation is herewith expressed, for the active and interested administration of the schools by the members of the School Board; for the professional attitude and industry on the part of the teachers, as well as for the loyal support of the citizens.
