The Old South Meetinghouse served as Seabrook's town hall for one hundred eighty-six years. It was built as a result of a dispute within the Congregational Church of Hampton Falls, created when the Rev. Mr. Paine Wingate was settled as the parish minister after the death of the Rev. Mr. Josiah Bayley. The parishoners in the southern part of Hampton Falls ( now Seabrook) objected to his ministry there. The dissenters withdrew from the established church, formed a Presbyterian society and erected the Old South Meetinghouse in the spring of 1764.

The Rev. Mr Samuel Perley became the first minister of the Presbyterians and was ordained in the meetinghouse on January 31, 1765. Despite the efforts of the Presbyterians to build their own house of worship and to hire their own pastor, the parish of Hampton Falls by law continued to tax them for the support of Mr. Wingate.

In November, 1765, the Presbyterians petitioned the Governor, His Council and House of Representatives to allow them to be set off as "a distinct Parish for ministerial affairs only." The petitioners were given a choice either to remain within the parish of Hampton Falls and pay the tax to the Congregational Church or to sever all ties with the parish of Hampton Falls. This ruling was supported by the Congregational Church in its letter to His Excellency Benning Wentworth, Governor, in answer to the Presbyterian petition.

Two years later, the Presbyterians again petitioned for an exemption from the tax to the Congregational Church. The house of Representatives voted to dismiss this petition, reserving the right to the petitioner to "Bring in a Bill as heretofore Granted to be set off as a Distinct Parish in all Respects."

On June 2, 1768, the House of Representatives enacted the Seabrook Charter--"An act for erecting and incorporating a new Parish in the southerly part of Hampton Falls in this Province. The first town meeting of the parish of Seabrook was conducted on June 27, 1768, by Moderator Samuel Collins, a Quaker. From that day until March 13, 1954, all town meetings of the Town of Seabrook were held in the Old South Meetinghouse.

George Austin Weare was First Fire Chief and organizer of the Seabrook Fire Department. He was Fire Chief from 1931 to 1946; at that time he was the youngest Fire Chief in New England, being 24 years of age. He also built Seabrook's first Fire Truck. He dedicated his life to Fire fighting and was one of New Hampshire's most widely known firefighters. He was known as New Hampshire's State Firemen's Association's first and last "Storyteller".

TOWN OF SEABROOK  
PROPOSED AMENDMENTS ZONING ORDINANCE  
(Final)

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

ARTICLE 2 NUMBER 1 To amend Section VII-ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT to add the following sections under Subsection C:

9. The Building Inspector shall obtain or the applicant for building permit must furnish information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest habitable flood (including basement if habitable) of all new or substantially improved structures, located within all areas having special flood hazards identified on the Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been floodproofed the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed.
10. The Building Inspector shall review proposed development to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or State law.
11. The Building Inspector shall notify, in riverine situations, adjacent communities and the State Coordinating Office prior to any alteration or relocation of water course, and submit copies of such notification to the Federal Insurance Administration.
12. The Building Inspector shall assure that the Flood carrying capacity within the altered or relocated portion of any water course is maintained.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section X-DEFINITIONS so that the definition of "Structure" is amended to read as follows:

STRUCTURE: Any structure constructed or erected by human means, whether on land or water, the use of which requires location on the ground or bed of water, or which requires attachment to something having location on the ground or water. Fences, stone walls, retaining walls and driveways are not to be construed as structures for purposes of side-line and setback requirements.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Conservation Commission for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section III D and E-ZONE 5, so that both Subsections as combined into one Subsection entitled D ZONE 4 so that said new section read as follows

D - Zone 4: Conservation Area

In Zone 4-there is allowed any use that does not involve the erection of any structure, including fences, walls, driveways or signs, or alter the surface configuration in any manner by the addition of fill or dredging or by bulldozing or otherwise moving and shifting the natural surface, unless such action is otherwise permitted and licensed by the appropriate State and Federal authorities. The following are permitted uses:

1. Non-Commercial Recreation such as hunting, clamming, fishing and picnicking.
2. Agriculture and Aquaculture.
3. Natural trials and wildlife refuge.

ARTICLE 5 To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Conservation Commission for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section II (entitled Establishment of the Use Districts) to combine Zone 4 and Zone 5 into one zone entitled Zone 4 and to amend the official zoning map of the Town of Seabrook to reflect this change.  
(Not Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 6 To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section 6:E - Motor Vehicle and Machinery Junk Yards, to include the following Subsection:

E. Regulations effective with the enactment of this Ordinance:

(a) No person, corporation or association shall locate or maintain a motor vehicle junk yard or a machinery junk yard within a distance of One Hundred and Fifty (150) feet from the surface of any public highway unless such yard is fenced or screened so as to be completely hidden from view of the highway.

(b) Yards currently in operation shall be permitted a period of sixty (60) days of grace in which to complete the actions necessary for compliance with these regulations before violators may be prosecuted.

F. Nuisance Abatement:

(a) Any motor vehicle junk yard or machinery junk yard located or maintained in violation of the provisions of this

subdivision is hereby declared a nuisance and the same may be abated on complaint of any prosecuting officer.

G. Penalty for Violation:

(a) Whoever violates any of the provisions of these regulations governing junk yard shall be fined not more than One Hundred (\$100) Dollars or imprisoned for not more than six months, or both.

ARTICLE 7 To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the Building Code Ordinance as proposed by the Board of Selectmen; said Ordinance having relevance to compliance with the Federal Flood Insurance Program.

1. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvement to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (50% or more market value of structure) including prefabricated and mobile homes must (I) be designated ( or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (II) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (III) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

2. The Building Spector shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize any base flood elevation data available from a Federal, State or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (I) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the base flood level and (II) all new construction and substantial improvements of nonresidential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or floodproofed to or above the base flood level.

3. The Building Inspector shall require that all mobile homes to be placed within Zone A on the community's Flood Hazard Boundry Map shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (I) over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four corners of the mobile home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring some additional tie per side, (II) frame ties be provided at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side, (III) all components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds; and (IV) any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored.

4. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood

prone areas new and replacement water supply systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems.

5. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood prone areas(1) new and replacement sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and (11) on-site waste disposal systems to be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT FOR 1979

The Town of Seabrook continues to grow in many ways and the demand upon the time and energy of the Selectmen and the Office continues each year at an ever increasing rate.

There are a number of areas of major concern to the Citizens of Seabrook and some of these will be presented as articles in the Town Warrant for your consideration this year. The areas of prime concern from the viewpoint of the Board of Selectmen are:

### FIRST:

A means of orderly growth control for the town through planning and zoning and the development and approval of a Master Plan. The effect of uncontrolled growth in Seabrook in the past is the prime reason for most of our problems today, particularly the problems of water and sewage. A Building and Life Safety Code are extremely important to the safety and welfare of everyone, as well as to the preservation of aesthetic values and protection of our water resources.

### SECOND:

The Town's municipal water system is an area that requires continuing attention, improvement, and expansion. A considerable amount of time and effort has been devoted by your Board of Selectmen again this year to the Town's most precious resource, the water supply.

The Mill Lane wells have been re-activated after much research and testing. This alleviated a critical water shortage last summer and saved thousands of dollars to the taxpayers. The further exploration and drilling of test wells has been abandoned as this is no longer practical and has proven a waste of money. The so-called Brown's gravel pit project on Lower Collins Street was the last such project. The well proved to be inadequate and was abandoned.

The Board of Selectmen this year hired another water engineering firm in an attempt to reach a solution to Seabrook's water needs. There will be proposals to act upon

at this year's town meeting to begin a comprehensive program for up-grading and improving the municipal water supply. Research on funding and means to resolve the water problems has been carried out so that we may ultimately do away with the annual summer water ban.

THIRD:

There will be articles in the Warrant which will be requesting you the voters to act on a municipal office building and the disposition of land and buildings owned by the Town. An integral part of this action will be the planning and funding of a recreational center in Seabrook. These issues are of the utmost importance and will be presented in detail at the Town Meeting.

The Town of Seabrook, because of unusual growth in the past few years, has called upon its citizens to make rapid adjustments to keep pace with change. The Selectmen's office has had to adapt in the administration of its affairs and services to the citizens and employees. Our payroll and budget are now on a computer system in the town offices and the tax billings and water billings are being programmed for computer. The Selectmen and our Administrative Assistant are very busy keeping pace with all the changes.

The dump problems which had plagued the town for years have been resolved with a five year contract for the hauling of Seabrook's trash. The platform scales have been installed at the transfer station as well as a road being built and paved. A scale building was constructed to house personnel and equipment. Total costs have been cut and the operation of the transfer station should realize a net reduction of \$40,000 per year.

The Police Department, under a newly appointed chief, has established a merit testing and hiring system for officers. The result is a marked improvement in officer efficiency, performance and appearance. We now have a professional Police Department in the real sense. With

continuing modernization and a training program, the Selectmen now feel the people of Seabrook can well take pride in the Police Department.

The Town has seen fit to improve the Fire Department by authorizing a new fire truck and by continuing improvements in the fire alarm system. Furmer Eaton has been certified as a training officer, assuring the continued high quality and professionalism of the Fire Department. Again, the people of Seabrook may well be proud of this Department.

Although Seabrook still faces many problems, the overall picture remains bright. One particular area which will require continuing vigilance is the attempts to infringe on our "Home Rule". Although we were successful in beating a bill to take the power plant valuation away, there will be future attempts to take away what we have. The town has never been in a better financial position, and can fund large capital improvement projects we need.

Last year, by prudent management and proper budgeting, enough interest was earned to cover the cost of our tax anticipation notes. This coming year, expenditures are being budgeted so as not to raise the tax rate and yet fund all our needs. With hard work the Town of Seabrook may well become one of the most enjoyable communities in which to live and work in this region.

Your Board of Selectmen wishes to point out that all of our Town Officials, both elected and appointed, have contributed to our present enviable position. With their help and yours, we hope to make Seabrook an even better community.

TOWN OFFICE STUDY COMMITTEE:

During 1979 we spent a great deal of time studying the office needs of the Town assisted by the architectural firm of Philip S. Tambling of Rye, N.H. We began by asking each department head for a list of desks, chairs, files, storage space, etc. which each would require to properly conduct business. With this information, the architect determined the amount of square footage which was needed for each office.

Then he proceeded to lay out a plan using the present building and found it required additions on three sides in order to provide necessary space. After calculating the expense of the remodeling work, we asked him to determine the cost of a new building with the same amount of floor space. As we began our study, we felt that the Clinic could be adapted successfully but our investigation showed that much more space was required than appeared to be needed at first look. When we found that the difference in cost would be about \$150,000 and a more efficient building could be provided, we recommended to the Selectmen that the old Clinic be removed and a new structure built on the site. The architects strongly support this decision.

We feel that a new two story office would be much more fuel efficient and easier to maintain over the years. It is our belief that the building we propose ought to meet the needs of the town for many years to come and we have allowed additional room where it appears that the function of the office is likely to increase soon. The location within the traffic circle is ideal because it is accessible from all parts of town, is easy to find, and traffic going in and out will move smoothly because of the one way flow around the circle.

Another attribute of the site is that it would provide an excellent impression of the Town and State as people drive across the state line and see a well designed and landscaped municipal office building. We have studied this very thoroughly and feel that the needs of the Town of Seabrook can best be served by authorizing new construction at the Smithtown Circle.

## ASSESSING DEPARTMENT

### Legislative:

#### State Ratio Studies

Annual state assessment ratio studies will be conducted rather than Bi-annually as before. However the sales and assessments checked will still contain "lag-gaps" between the time the study is made and the ratio received by the Town from the State. The only area of Town Valuation that could be affected by this new Legislation is new construction.

#### Legislation affecting a revaluation project:

The Department of Revenue Administration has had guideline, qualification, certification and financial responsibility legislation passed so that the local towns throughout the state who do not have full time Assessors will have a greater degree of protection in re-valuation quality.

#### Annual Inventories:

There was considerably less confusion over the annual filing and filling out of the inventories. The reason is that 1979 was the second year of it's applicability. Questions concerning the filling out of these inventories can be answered by contacting the Assessing Office.

#### State Board of Tax Appeals: (R.S.A. 76:16-A)

Fee for filing property tax appeals with the State Board of Taxation have been increased from \$10.00 - \$15.00.

House Bill 508

"Spreading the Nuclear Plant Valuation"

This legislation was halted from getting out of Committee, without a special session, for the year 1979 and 1980. Both Representatives from Seabrook put out superior effort in spite of repeated resistance in accomplishing this task. Unfortunately this legislation is very far from being a "DEAD ISSUE". The Town of Seabrook can be assured that it will rise again from it's own ashes in even greater strength.

NUCLEAR PLANT

Nuclear Plant:

The Atomic Power Plant being constructed here in Seabrook will continue to be appraised on "partial construction" basis this coming year. The Assessing Department has a program of continuing research which involves both Law and Appraisal Theory, in order to conduct fair and equitable assessment with regard to this property.

# Seabrook Planning Board

## Annual Report

The Planning Board has been extremely busy this year. We have conducted public hearings on subdivisions and for site plan reviews. We have reviewed plans of land for recording purposes only and held numerous sessions with residents regarding zoning and subdivision matters.

In addition to this work, the board, in cooperation with the Thoresen Group, professional planning consultants, prepared a Coastal Inventory and Assessment report. This program was funded by the state and federal governments, and it was the first phase of a coastal management program - later turned down by the New Hampshire Legislature.

The planning board also had republished the zoning ordinance and the subdivision regulations to include all recent changes up to Town Meeting of 1979. With the help of the town's Administrative Assistant, the Board has updated the town map, adding to it new streets, public buildings, historic and natural landmarks. These materials have been printed and are available at cost at the town office.

According to recent court rulings, it is imperative that the town adopt within the next year a master plan. To date the Planning Board has met with a member of the planning board of Amherst, NH, to consider the feasibility of using the sounding board approach to formulating such a plan. This method would involve wide-range citizen participation. In preparing the master plan, we will be using much of the basic studies published in the comprehensive plan for the town of Seabrook in 1967.

A member of the board has been appointed by the Governor to represent the Town and planning board on the Coastal Advisory Committee. It will serve to draft an acceptable coastal management bill for the Interim Study Committee of the State Senate. If it is found acceptable this study could be helpful in developing our own master plan.

The board will be proposing eight amendments to our zoning ordinance, and will be sponsoring the adoption of several building codes, at the request of the Board of Selectmen.

With your help and cooperation, we hope to make Seabrook a better and more enjoyable town in which to live.

On April 30, 1979 I became the first appointed Police Chief of Seabrook. Since that time I have received complete cooperation from the Selectmen, Police Officers and Residents of Seabrook.

A reorganization of the department was accomplished through examinations and promotions of the Officers. Dean Glover was promoted to Lieutenant in charge of the Operations Bureau. Lieutenant Detective George Dow was placed in charge of the Service Bureau. Robie Beckman was promoted to Sergeant.

Monthly training sessions dealing with new laws, techniques of arrests and firearms have been conducted. Over 90 % of the Officers have qualified on the Police Firearms Course.

All outside details are now assigned through the Police Department. Officers are under the supervision of a Sergeant while on a detail. Officers are paid by the town which is reimbursed by the requesting party.

Police equipment and uniforms have been altered to reflect a better image of the Department and Town.

The Police Officers went through a trying period during the October 6th Demonstration. However, their show of restraint and patience eliminated any injuries and violence on either side.

The two Lieutenants and the three Sergeants have completed a Supervisor Correspondence Course sponsored by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council. The Officers took the course on their own time and all five completed the course with high grades.

In November I was appointed as one of the two Town Police Chiefs on the Police Standards and Training Council. This Council sets the standards for Police Officers in the State. During the short time I have been on the Council we have upgraded the qualifications of the part time Officers. This appointment was not only an honor for me but also for the Town of Seabrook.

Officer William D. Nickles attended a week long course in Crime Prevention. During the Christmas Season he distributed and attached small tickets to automobiles warning motorist to keep their vehicles locked. It all but eliminated a growing problem we were experiencing in shopping centers of stolen groceries and presents. Officers Nickles also has initiated a program whereby any problems that he or any officer finds in and around Businesses or Homes are followed up by a personal talk or letter explaining the problem encountered to the owners

We of the Seabrook Police Department have made many advancements over the past months but are also aware that it is our responsibility to continue to make improvements in order to provide the Seabrook residents with the professional police department it deserves.

In the future we will strive to reduce Motor Vehicle Accidents through the use of radar and evaluating each accident. Officers will be attending specialized schools and will be using their acquired expertise to train other Officers. Crime Prevention programs will be increased. Rules and regulations and job descriptions for the department are being formulated. Juvenile programs to reduce the ever increasing Juvenile Crime rate will be implemented. An increase in the visibility of Police, especially during the summer months, will increase the Police Department's ability to protect and serve the residents of Seabrook. These programs and continued training should accomplish our Mission.

As the Chief of Police I welcome any comments about the operation of the Department and its personnel. Remember it is YOUR POLICE FORCE.

During the fiscal year July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979, 2857 calls were made to residents of Seabrook.

Of these calls 463 were made free of charge or at a reduced fee. It remains the policy of the Agency that no one is refused service because of inability to pay. Fees are scaled or care is provided on a no charge basis when necessary.

Currently 153 children are enrolled in our Well Child Clinic. Clinics are held twice a month and are staffed by a Pediatrician and a Pediatric Nurse Practitioner as well as Agency nurses. Children from birth to 6 years of age are seen on a regular schedule for physical examinations, immunizations, blood tests, counseling, developmental testing, vision and hearing screening, urine tests and lead screening. In addition children between the age of 3 and 6 are seen twice a year at our Dental Clinic by Dental Hygienists employed by the state. The Children are referred to local dentists for treatment when necessary at no cost to the family.

Each month at the Senior Drop-in Center we hold a blood pressure monitoring and screening program at the Trinity United Parish House. In addition to this, anyone may come into our office between 8 AM-4PM for a free blood pressure check, diet counseling, or to discuss any health problems which may be concerning them.

Our staff consists of 6 full time R.N.'s, 3 part time R.N.'s, a Physical Therapist, a full time aide, 1 full time Secretary/Bookkeeper and additional part time typing help as the need arises. We also contract with the Area Homemaker/Home Health Aide Agency which enables us to provide aides and homemakers to local residents when needed.

Although our budget has increased, the Board of Directors has voted not to ask the local towns to increase their appropriations based on updated population figures this year. Thus, we are asking the Town of Seabrook for \$5400.00.

## BROWN LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

The most exciting news received from the librarian this year is in the area of circulation which has increased from 3453 in 1978 to 5919 in 1979. This increase is more than the entire circulation of 2039 for the year 1975. Another bit of good news was the decrease in the number of overdue and lost books. This decrease may be due to the new policy of limiting the number of books loaned to children and first time users. Also, monthly reminders are sent to borrowers when a book has become overdue. There is a list of 1100 registered patrons in the newest file.

There has been purchased, this year, a total of 903 volumes plus two sets of encyclopedia with a total of 50 volumes. The sets of encyclopedia are for two separate groups, the Encyclopedia Britannica III for High School and adults, and the World Book for the younger people. There are 100 books from Time Life, including the Library of Art. History of World War II, the Great Ages of Man, and several other series. There are 22 new books from the National Geographic Society, and 607 books from the RECI program, both paperback and hardcovers. Also purchased were 6 large print books, and a total of 166 other books, mostly fiction for adults.

Another major purchase was a 16 mm sound projector and screen. These items may be borrowed by any community group. The Librarian will also try to get films requested from the State Library. A bicycle rack was also purchased and was much used during the warm weather.

The Brown Library received it's certificate of qualifications in the Statewide Library Development Program from the N.H. State Library Commission. The assistant librarian, Helen Skinner, completed two more classes in the Public Library Technique course run by the State Library in cooperation with University of New Hampshire.

The Library received a generous gift from the Spherex Company of an Apeco, Bond Copier. This was greatly appreciated and has been widely used. We were renting one on a trial basis. Copies may be made for 10¢ a copy to defray the cost of the paper. Also recieved was a \$50.00 cash donation from the Seabrook Bank & Trust Co. on the celebration of the opening of their Branch office on Rte. 286. Mrs. Charlotte Dow has continued to donate a book monthly from her Book of the Month Club.

Work done in the basement was to clean it out and loan some of the stored artifacts to the Seabrook Historical Society. Storage shelves were installed and are being used; a wall has been built separating the furnace from the main area. As soon as this area is completed with money received on last years budget, it will be ready for use for movies and slide shows and for other children's activities. A work table is being built to be used for book repairing, etc. Work will continue on the lawn and landscaping, with money received on last year's budget.

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AUDITOR'S OPINION

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and groups of accounts of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1978 listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The Town of Seabrook has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

In addition, the Town has not capitalized the cost of property and equipment purchased by the Enterprise Fund (Water Department). Likewise, no depreciation expense is recorded on this fund. Generally accepted accounting principles require that property and equipment of enterprise funds be capitalized and depreciated over the useful lives of the assets. The Town's records do not permit the application of adequate procedures to enable us to determine the cost value of capital assets or related depreciation expense on them.

Because of the material effect of the omission of fixed assets and related depreciation on the financial position, we do not express an opinion on the financial statements of the Enterprise Fund.

In our opinion, the financial statements listed in the aforementioned table of contents, other than the financial statement of the Enterprise Fund (Water Department), present fairly the financial position of the various funds and groups of accounts of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire at December 31, 1978 and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental schedules included in this report, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations of such funds and group of accounts, are presented primarily for supplemental analysis purposes. This additional information has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the aforementioned examination of the basic financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

In connection with our examination, we also (1) made a study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control, (2) performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Acts and regulations as required by Sections II.C.3. and III.C.3. of the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund Recipients (Guide) issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury and (3) compared the data on Bureau of Census Form RS-8 to records of the Town of Seabrook as required by Section II.C.4. of the "Guide." Our findings are set forth under the heading "Comments" in this report.

COMMENTS

Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Funds

As a part of our compliance audit of revenue sharing and antirecession fiscal assistance funds, we compared figures reported on form F-21A (required to be filed with the Bureau of Census annually) with audited figures for 1977. No material differences were noted except in part V, line 6 and 7 under column A, should be \$40,000 not \$50,000. Also, under column B, should be \$40,000, not \$51,513, and column C, -0- not \$2,240.

In addition, we discovered that Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Funds (ARFA) in the amount of \$4,166 were expended in 1978 without being appropriated as required by Section 52.44 of the regulations. In conjunction, we could not find that the Town of Seabrook had requested a waiver by the Director, Office of Revenue Sharing in the manner prescribed by Section 52.43 (b) of the regulations. The Town has custody of \$5,143 of ARFA funds received in 1976 and 1977 which should not be expended until requesting and obtaining a waiver from ORS.

Our comments and recommendations relative to accounting and internal control are included in a separate management letter to the Board of Selectmen.

We would like to extend our thanks to the officials and office staff of the Town of Seabrook for their assistance during the course of the audit.

ARTICLE 1. To elect by Non-Partisan ballot: One Selectman and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; One Fire Chief for a term of one (1) year; One Road Agent for a term of one (1) year; Three (3) Constables for a term of one (1) year; Two (2) members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; One member of the Budget Committee for a term of one (1) year; Two (2) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years; One Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years; One member of the Brown Library Trustees for a term of three (3) years; One Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years; One Supervisor of the Checklist for a term of six (6) years; One Moderator for a term of two (2) years.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section III A Zone 1 to include number 12 as follows:

There shall be ten (10) feet from any lot line for all residential buildings and structures and fifteen (15) feet from any lot line for all commercial and industrial buildings and structures.

To amend Section VII C 3. by increasing the estimated cost of the building or project from Five Hundred (\$500.00) to One Thousand (\$ 1,000.00) Dollars in the last line of said section so that it reads:

There shall be a fee for the review of an application, inspection of the premises (if required) and the issuance of a building permit of Five (\$ 5.00) Dollars, plus the sum of Two (\$ 2.00) Dollars per Thousand (\$ 1,000.00) Dollars (or any fraction thereof) of the estimated cost of the building or project over One Thousand (\$ 1,000.00) Dollars.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section VII C 3. second paragraph to require a Twenty (\$ 20.00) Dollar fee plus Two (\$ 2.00) Dollars for each person requested to be notified for a public hearing, so that the second sentence of said paragraph will read as follows:

In addition, a fee of Twenty (\$ 20.00) Dollars plus Two (\$ 2.00) Dollars for each person requiring notification by Registered Mail, shall be required if a public hearing is deemed necessary by the Planning Board, which fee shall be payable upon application.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section VII by adding a subsection CC to be entitled Certificates of Occupancy which shall read as follows:

CC Certificates of Occupancy

1. No building or structure which is hereafter erected, or moved and which is designed or is intended for occupancy including commercial, industrial and other buildings and structures in which humans work or are otherwise employed may be permitted such use unless and until a Certificate of Occupancy has been issued by the Building Inspector to the record owner of such premises.

2. The Building Inspector shall issue a Certificate to the owner when the structure conforms to the terms of this ordinance and the Town Building Codes.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section IV Area and Height Regulations, Subsection B by replacing said section with the following:

1. In Zone 1, no buildings shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located on a lot containing less than 43,560 square feet in area, or less than 150 feet of frontage on an existing road and has an average width of 150 feet as measured at right angles to parallel side lot lines unless said lot is a nonconforming lot of record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the enactment of this ordinance.

2. In all other zones, no buildings shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located on a lot containing less than 30,000 square feet in area, or less than 125 feet of frontage on an existing road, and has an average width of 125 feet as measured at right angles to parallel side lot lines, unless said lot is a nonconforming lot of record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds, prior to the enactment of this ordinance.

3. Provided that except in those areas of Zone 2 to the East of Blackwater River, an additional dwelling building containing no more than one living unit may be placed on a lot in Zone 2, in addition to such buildings as are otherwise herein permitted on a lot, provided that said lot contains Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet of land area per dwelling building.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the Official Zoning Map, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook as follows:

To amend the Official Zoning Map of the Town of Seabrook under Section II of the Zoning Ordinance to enlarge Zone 1 by extending the easterly boundary line of said Zone so that it runs in a line parallel and 2,500 feet westerly of Route 95 from the Massachusetts boundary line northerly to a point 1,500 feet south of Route 107; thence, westerly in a line parallel with and 1,500 feet south of Route 107 to a point at land currently within Zone 1.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Section X - Definitions so that the definition for "Schools" is included as follows:

Schools - Place for systematic instruction in any branch or branches of knowledge and which promotes the academic interests rather than commercial interests.

ARTICLE 10. Are you in favor of the adoption of the 1976 Life Safety Code NFPA No. 101 as proposed by the Planning Board?

ARTICLE 12. Are you in favor of the adoption of the 1978 National Electrical Code NFPA No. 70-1978 as proposed by the Planning Board?

ARTICLE 63. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of TWO HUNDRED TWENTY FIVE THOUSAND (\$ 225,000.00) DOLLARS raised under Article 27 of the 1979 Town Warrant for the purpose of purchasing approximately ten (10) acres plus certain easements from E. N. Dixon Company, Inc. and to ratify a certain Memorandum of Agreement for said purchase dated February 22, 1980.

ARTICLE 64. On Petition of Earl S. Perkins and Twenty Seven (27) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to direct and authorize the Selectmen to sell to Earl S. Perkins of Railroad Avenue, Seabrook, New Hampshire, the land formerly of John Chase, and described as follows:

Land on Pine Street and land known as one-half (1/2) of Seven (7) acres, assessed to the heirs of John Chase, and acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, dated December 31, 1979, for the sum of Two Hundred and Eighty-nine and 08/100 (\$ 289.08) Dollars.

ARTICLE 65. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following ordinance for the preservation of the health and safety of the public.

#### SWIMMING POOLS

1. All outdoor, artificial pools which have a maximum depth of more than three feet when filled to capacity, shall have a wall, fence or other enclosure with a minimum height of four feet constructed around the entire pool, except above ground pools having an elevation of four feet or higher above ground level.
2. The wall, fence or enclosure shall be constructed so that children will be unable to crawl, or pass through to the pool without first using the gate or door to the pool.
3. All gates and doors shall be locked by a hasp or other comparable locking device when the pool is unattended.

4. All existing pools must comply with the terms of this ordinance no later than June 1, 1980.

5. Penalty - Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of One Hundred (\$ 100.00) Dollars.

ARTICLE 66. On Petition of Edward Merrill and Eighteen (18) other voters of the Town: To extend, construct and complete Pine Street to Town Road specifications prior to application of asphalt to older section of same street.

ARTICLE 67. On Petition of John A. Campanella and Thirty Eight (38) other voters of the Town: To have the Seabrook Police conduct random patrols through Mobile Home Parks in Seabrook where permission has been granted from the park owners to allow these patrols to occur.

ARTICLE 68. On Petition of Alfred Norton and Ten (10) other voters of the Town: That the Town of Seabrook take over the Electric Light Pole #1411 located at the end of Virginia Lane.

ARTICLE 69. On Petition of Robert E. Thomson Sr. and Twenty Five (25) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to grant a cable television franchise to Cablevision Service Co., Inc., upon such lawful conditions as they may require, to erect, install and maintain in, under, or over street, highways, and other public ways of the Town, wires, cable, and other equipment related to the delivery or enhancement of television signals and other electrical impulses all in accordance with and as allowed by, New Hampshire RSA 53-C (Supp. 1977).

ARTICLE 70. On Petition of Emmanuel A. Garand and Thirteen (13) other voters of the Town: That the Town Selectmen inform the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) that no operating license should be granted to Public Service Company of N. H. because there is no way to safely evacuate the surrounding area. Further, the Town Selectmen inform the NRC that no Town Funds will be spent on an evacuation plan for the Seabrook Nuclear Plants.

ARTICLE 71. On Petition of Robie M. Beckman and Twelve (12) other voters of the Town: Do you favor adoption of the Town Manager Plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 72. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enact ordinances, rules and regulations and enter into agreements for all normal and emergency civil defense activities consistent with Federal and State Civil Defense laws which may include but not be limited to the following: Civil Defense Director's Authority, Emergency Operations, Emergency Plans, Mutual Aid Pacts and Penalties for Violations.

ARTICLE 73. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expense of the General Government for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the Town poor and for all necessary expenditures for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 74. To transact all other legal business that may come before this meeting.

## Report of the Water Department

389,089,635 gallons of water were pumped during 1979, an increase of 7,452,835 gallons over the previous year. Industrial and commercial use decreased from 136,808,530 in 1978 to 132,536,075 in 1979. U.S.M. Corp.- Bailey Division decreased nearly 4,000,000 gallons over the previous year, although a portion of their summer use was much higher than normal.

Three large water services were connected in 1979 (Best Western Motel, Amesbury Machine Company and Public Service Company of N.H. warehouse) for fire sprinkler systems only. Thirty-three new services were installed in 1979.

Two thousand eight hundred feet of pipe was laid along Route 107 from the entrance of Cargocaire connecting to the west end of Weare Road. This was done to increase fire flow and to improve the quality of water.

Further testing was done on a new well site. Results of the test showed it wasn't feasible to install a pump at this site. The location of the site was off Lower Collins Street.

The Mill Lane wells were needed from July 13th through October 2nd. The reason for using Mill Lane wells was because the demand for water was greater than the capacity of our other wells. At times all wells, including Mill Lane, were pumping continuously (24 hours a day).

New water mains were installed on nine streets at our beach. The funds were appropriated through Article 31. The new water mains (which are larger than the old ones) will increase water quality, update the system and improve fire flow. Also 8 new fire hydrants have been installed on these streets. The Town awarded the job to Robinson Construction Company of North Hampton, N.H.. The project is three-quarters completed at this time and will be completed in the spring of 1980.

Our thanks to the N.H. State Civil Defense for loaning a pump and pipe to the Department, free of charge, for the purpose of running an experiment dealing with ground water re-charge. The project was run most of the summer and all through the fall. Water was pumped daily from the small stream off Route 107 cross-country to a sediment pond between wells #1 and #2 on True Road. Although this was an experiment we are told by our consulting engineers, Coffin & Richardson, Inc., that 10% of all the water pumped in wells #1 and #2 during this period came from the water pumped by the Civil Defense unit.

New water rates went into effect beginning July 1st for commercial and industrial users (metered).

We want to thank you for the cooperation shown during the summer months for limiting outside use of water.

ZONING ORDINANCE  
OF THE  
TOWN OF SEABROOK, NEW HAMPSHIRE

SECTION 1:            TITLE AND PURPOSE

1. This ordinance shall be known as the "Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire".

2. The purposes of this ordinance are to promote the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook, to protect and conserve the value of property, to promote economic development of the Town's resources and to encourage the most appropriate use of land throughout the Town of Seabrook.

SECTION 11:            ESTABLISHMENT OF USE DISTRICTS

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Seabrook is hereby divided into five use districts:

ZONE 1

ZONE 2

ZONE 3

ZONE 4

ZONE 5

These districts and the boundaries of such districts are shown on the official Zoning Map of the Town of Seabrook, which Map is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof, and which is on file in the Office of the Town Clerk of the Town of Seabrook. This official Zoning Map shall be the final authority as the current zoning status of land in the Town.

1. No building shall be erected, reconstructed or structurally altered nor shall any building or land be used for any purpose other than is permitted in the district in which such building or land is located.

2. No building shall be erected, reconstructed, or structurally altered to exceed the height herein established for the districts in which such building is located.

3. No lot area shall be so reduced or diminished that the yards or other open spaces shall be smaller than prescribed by this ordinance nor shall the density of population be increased in any manner except in conformity with the area regulations as hereinafter provided.

4. No yard or other open space provided around any building for the purpose of complying with the provisions of these regulations shall be considered as providing a yard or open space for any other building.

5. Every building hereinafter erected shall be located on a lot herein defined, and in no case shall there be more than one building on one lot, except as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 111:            USE REGULATIONS

A. ZONE 1

In Zone 1, no building, structure or portion thereof shall be erected, altered, moved or used and no land or building or part thereof shall be used, arranged or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses:

1. Any use permitted in Zone 4.
2. Single and two-family dwellings.
3. Professional offices which are incidental to a residence and which conform in design to the structures in the area. There shall be no more than one office per single family house and no such office shall have more than three employees.
4. Municipal buildings.
5. Churches, schools and libraries.
6. Parks and non-commercial recreation.
7. Guest houses in which the owner is prime occupant and which is located in a building in existence at the time this ordinance is enacted which has not been expanded after the enactment of this ordinance.
8. Dead storage of travel trailers not more than 27 feet in length and boats used by the residents or tenants.
9. Swimming pools for use of occupants and guests.
10. Accessory buildings not for human habitation which are incidental to the primary uses.
11. Accessory uses by owner or tenants incidental to the above permitted uses and not detrimental to a residential neighborhood, except tents erected for the purpose of human habitation.

B. ZONE 2

In Zone 2, no buildings, structure or portion thereof shall be erected, altered, moved or used and no land or building or part

thereof shall be used, arranged or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses:

1. Any use permitted in Zone 1, subject to all limitations there applicable.
2. Home occupations including agriculture.....
3. Cemeteries.
4. Nursing or convalescent homes for not more than twenty patients.
5. Farm buildings for the operation of farms.
6. Retail businesses and wholesale businesses incidental to principal retail business.
7. Gasoline stations, but not including the outdoor storage or inoperative and unregistered automobiles, provided that no new gasoline station shall be located within 1,000 foot radius of an existing gasoline station.
8. Banks and offices.
9. Commercial recreation, amusements and entertainment which is conducted within the confines of a building, except in those areas in Zone 2 to the East of the Blackwater River.
10. Travel trailer parks, except in those areas in Zone 2 to the East of the Blackwater River.
11. Restaurants and lounges.
12. Hotels and motels.
13. Public Utility buildings (non-manufacturing).
14. Theatres and halls.
15. Manufacturing clearly subordinate and incidental to the permitted business conducted on the premises.
16. Accessory uses of structures and of land normally incidental to the permitted principal use of the premises.

### C. ZONE 3

In Zone 3, no buildings, structure or portion thereof shall be erected, altered, moved or used and no land or building or part thereof shall be used, arranged or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses:

1. Any uses permitted in Zone 1 and Zone 2, subject to limitations there applicable.
2. Warehousing, storage or wholesaling establishment.

3. Manufacturing of such a nature that the use is not obnoxious or injurious to the health and safety of the community.
4. Accessory uses of structures and open spaces normally incidental to the permitted principal use of the premises.

#### D. Zone 4

In Zone 4, no buildings, structure or other improvements shall be erected or altered herein and no land or building or part thereof shall be used or designed to be used except for recreation purposes.

#### E. ZONE 5

In Zone 5, there shall be no restrictions on uses.

#### \* F. MOBILE HOME PARKS

No Mobile Home Park or House Trailer Park shall be established or be allowed to expand if already established, within the confines of the Town. Mobile Home Park and House Trailer Park means any parcel of land under single or common ownership or control which contains, or is designed, laid out or adapted to accommodate two or more Mobile Homes. Mobile Home or House Trailer means a prefabricated dwelling unit which: (a) is designed for long term and continuous residential occupancy; (b) is designed to be moved on wheels, as a whole or in sections; (c) on arrival on the site, is complete and ready for occupancy, except for incidental unpacking, assembly, connection with utilities, and placing on supports or a permanent structure.

#### SECTION IV: AREA AND HEIGHT REGULATIONS

A. HEIGHT: No structure may exceed the maximum height of two and one-half stories or thirty-five (35) feet except Public Utility or Municipal structures.

\*\* B. AREA AND FRONTAGE: No building shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located on a lot containing less than Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet in area, or less than One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of frontage on an existing road, or less than One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of depth and has an average width of One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet, unless such lot is a lot of record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the enactment of this Ordinance. No dwelling building shall contain more than two (2) living units per One Hundred and Twenty Five (125) feet of frontage on an existing road or more than two (2) living units per Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet of land area. Provided that except in those areas of Zone 2 to the East of Black Water River, an additional dwelling building containing no more than one living unit may be placed on a lot in Zone 2, in addition to such buildings as are otherwise herein permitted on a lot, provided that said lot contains Thirty Thousand (30,000) square feet of land area per dwelling Building.

\*\* C. SETBACK AND SIDELINE: No Building or structure shall be placed within

- 1) Twenty (20) feet for a residential use, or
- 2) Thirty (30) feet for a commercial use, or
- 3) Fifty (50) feet for an industrial use

from the sidelines of the right-of-way of any road. There shall be a side yard having a minimum width of ten (10) feet for all residential buildings and structures and fifteen (15) feet for all commercial and industrial buildings and structures. Steps shall not be considered a part of the structure, but porches, piazzas and other similar elements shall be considered a part of the structure.

#### SECTION V: BOUNDARIES OF DISTRICTS

In the event that uncertainty exists with respect to the boundaries of the various districts as shown on the official Zoning Map, the following rules of interpretation shall be applied:

A. Where a boundary is indicated as a highway, railroad or such other landmarks, it shall be construed to be the center line thereof unless otherwise indicated on the Zoning Map.

B. Where a boundary is indicated as approximately parallel to a highway, railroad or such other landmark, it shall be construed as parallel thereto and at such distance from as shown on the Zoning Map.

C. If no dimension is given on the Zoning Map, the location of any boundary shall be determined by use of the scale shown on the Zoning Map.

D. Where a boundary coincides approximately by lot lines, such lot lines shall be construed to be the boundary where such interpretation is practical. However when a boundary between two districts divides a lot the Board of Adjustment may upon application by the lot owner allow those uses for the lot which are least restrictive as between the two districts.

E. Where not otherwise provided for, or a question exists, the Planning Board shall determine the exact boundary line.

#### SECTION VI: GENERAL PROVISIONS:

##### A. SANITARY AND SAFETY PROTECTIONS:

The Building Inspector shall maintain a complete record of all building permits granted under the terms of this Zoning ordinance and shall send a monthly report to the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, with a copy to the Planning Board, of all permits which have been granted during the previous month which in the judgment of the Building Inspector involves construction falling within the jurisdiction of review of said Commission.

B. NUISANCE CONTROL

The occurrence of activities that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or the emission of odor, dust, smoke, fumes, refuse matter, noise, vibration, or similar conditions, or that are dangerous to the health, safety or value of property of the community, or that lends otherwise to the annoyance or disturbance of a neighborhood, shall be prohibited.

C. THE DUMPING OR DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND OTHER REFUSE:

Promiscuous dumping: No land in any District shall be used for a dumping place for garbage and refuse from either private or from commercial or from industrial sources except the public dump as provided by the Town and except with the approval in writing of the Public Health Officer or the Board of Adjustment upon such conditions as they may require.

\* D. SAND, TOPSOIL, AND GRAVEL REMOVAL:

It shall be unlawful to excavate and remove from any premises, sand, topsoils, gravel or rock, excepting such surplusses of topsoil, sand, gravel or rock, as may result from excavations when constructing basements or foundations for buildings or when excavating for driveways, parking lots and streets except in accordance with the following conditions:

A.) A permit has first been obtained from the Board of Adjustment following written application therefor, and said Board has held a public hearing thereon.

B.) The Board of Adjustment must first find that such use is not detrimental, injurious or dangerous to public health and the welfare of the district or town, and shall not constitute a nuisance due to noise, vibration, smoke, odor or other objectionable features, nor adversely affect the economic status of the district or town. The Board shall consult with the Planning Board of the Town as a resource for making these findings.

C.) Both existing and proposed uses must have a permit to operate. A permit so issued shall be issued for an initial period of not more than one year and to be subject to renewal upon application to and at the option of the Board of Adjustment for successive periods of not more than one year provided, that a bond is posted in the name of the Town assuring satisfaction of any requirements of the Board of Adjustment which it may require to safeguard the interest of the Town.

\* E. MOTOR VEHICLES AND MACHINERY JUNK YARDS:

In pursuance of the authority conferred by Chapter 267 and Chapter 267-A of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, the following regulations shall govern the upkeep of motor vehicle and machinery junk yards. The following definitions shall be used in the interpretation of these regulations:

A. No new junk yards as herein after defined shall be established,

opened, or operated within the Town.

- B. No existing junk yard within the Town shall be expanded or in any way enlarged unless a Variance is granted by the Board of Adjustment.
- C. The term "Motor Vehicle junk yard" as used herein shall include any business whether conducted in connection with any other business and any place of storage or deposit, whether conducted in connection with any other business (such as garage, auto repairs, new or second-hand auto sales, service station, etc.) or not, which has stored, deposited or abandoned:
- (a) Two (2) or more unregistered motor vehicles which are no longer intended or in a condition conforming with legal requirements for use on the public highways, or
  - (b) Used parts of motor vehicles, or such pieces of iron, bronze, or other metals, glass, paper, rubber, or other discarded or second-hand material as has been a part, or intended to be a part of any motor vehicle, the sum of which parts or materials shall be the equivalent in bulk of two (2) or more passenger car motor vehicles.
  - (c) The term "motor vehicle junk yard" shall also include any place of business or storage or deposit of motor vehicles purchased or acquired otherwise for the purpose of dismantling the vehicles for their parts or for use of the metals for sale as scrap materials as well as those places where scrap metals are salvaged by burning the motor vehicles or where motor vehicle parts are cut up for the salvage of metals in more convenient sizes.
- D. The term "Machinery Junk Yard" as used herein shall mean any place of storage in which there is displayed to public view junk machinery of any kind or scrap metals, wood, glass, fabric or other materials commonly called junk.

\*\*\* E. Regulations effective with the enactment of this ordinance:

- (a) No person, corporation, or association shall locate or maintain a motor vehicle junk yard or a machinery junk yard within a distance of one hundred and fifty (150) feet from the surface of any public highway unless such yard is fenced or screened so as to be completely hidden from view of the highway.
- (b) Yards currently in operation shall be permitted a period of sixty (60) days grace in which to complete the actions necessary for compliance with these regulations before violators may be prosecuted.

F. Nuisance abatement:

- (a) Any motor vehicle junk yard or machinery junk yard located or maintained in violation of the provisions of this subdivision is hereby declared a nuisance and the same may be abated on complaint of any prosecuting officer.

G. Penalty for violation:

- (a) Whoever violates any of the provisions of these regulations governing junk yards shall be fined not more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars or imprisoned for not more than six months, or both.

SECTION VII ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT

A. AUTHORIZATION FOR ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT:

1. This ordinance together with the Building Code of Seabrook, New Hampshire shall be administered and enforced by the Board of Selectmen.
2. The Board of Selectmen is hereby given the power and the authority to appoint a Building Inspector and a Deputy Building Inspector, who shall act in the absence, disability or unavailability of the Building Inspector, and to delegate to such Building Inspector the power and authority to administer the provisions of this Ordinance that require use of the Building Permit.

B. BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT:

A Board of Adjustment as established, is hereby continued as such, and its membership and duties shall conform to the provisions of Chapter 31, Sections 66 to 89 inclusive of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated or any amendments or additions made thereto.

C. ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES PERTAINING TO USE OF THE BUILDING PERMIT

- \*
1. No person or entity shall undertake any construction, development or alteration of any building structure or use of land without a written building permit issued by the Building Inspector unless such undertaking is for normal maintenance or for emergency repairs.
  2. No building permit shall be issued by the Building Inspector until all applicable provisions of this ordinance have been complied with.
  3. There shall be a fee for the review of an application, inspection of the premises (if required) and the issuance of a building permit of five (\$5.00) dollars, plus the sum of two (\$2.00) dollars per thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars (or any fraction thereof) of the estimated cost of the building or project over five hundred (\$500.00) dollars. Such estimated cost shall be submitted by the applicant, subject to the approval of the Building Inspector who may revise such cost estimate if it appears too high or too low, but if the applicant is not satisfied, the Selectmen shall make a final determination on behalf of the Town of Seabrook, and he shall account and pay over all such fees to the Town. In addition, a fee of twenty (\$20.00) dollars shall be required if a public hear-

ing is deemed necessary by the Planning Board, which fee shall be payable upon application. The building permit fees may be increased, if circumstances warrant, by unanimous consent of the Board of Selectmen.

4. No application for a building permit shall be accepted or approved unless it is (1) filed in writing on a form prescribed by the Selectmen, (2) accompanied by the required permit fee, (3) accompanied by a drawing or plat, in duplicate, showing the lot plan, the location of the building, or use on the lot, accurate dimensions of the lot and building or use, and where for human habitation or use, showing location and specifications, and means of waste and sewage disposal, means of access to such lot or use, and such other information as the Building Inspector may deem necessary to provide for the observance of the provisions of this ordinance. No building permit for any work or project estimated to cost more than \$10,000.00 shall be issued until the Building Inspector has inspected the premises and has satisfied himself that all lot, building, structures and land use stakes or markers are in place and comply with the provisions of this ordinance.
5. No application for a building permit shall be approved until stakes or markers shall be fixed on the lot to indicate the location of lot lines and all corners of building(s), structure(s) and alterations proposed, and where the Building Inspector deems it necessary or desirable, of the means of access thereto. Where the application is for land use not involving excavations, grading, or other development or use of the ground or landscape concerned, stakes or markers shall be fixed on the lot to indicate the location of lot lines and bounds of all such excavations, grading or land development(s) proposed.
6. A building permit whether for a building, structure, material alteration or proposed land use, or otherwise, under the authority of which no work has been commenced within one year after issuance shall expire and become void upon such anniversary.
7. No land shall hereafter be used for building or development and no building or structure hereafter erected, enlarged, materially altered, or moved, in whole or in part for any purpose until a building permit shall have been issued by the Building Inspector showing that the use and development of the land, building or structure complies with the provisions of this ordinance.
8. A building permit may be issued upon such conditions as the Building Inspector, or when applicable, as the Board of Adjustment may deem necessary to assure the observance of the provisions of this ordinance. Any building permit issued shall authorize only such work or project as the application and the permit, taken together, reasonably allow. The Building Inspector or the Selectmen may suspend or revoke any building permit upon determining that the work or project in process is not in conformity with the permit as granted, or is otherwise in violation of the terms of this ordinance. In event of such

suspension or revocation of a building permit, the work or project concerned shall immediately cease, or legal action to enforce such cessation shall forthwith be taken by the Selectmen.

- \*\*\* 9. The Building Inspector shall obtain or the applicant for build-permit must furnish information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest habitable flood (including basement if habitable) of all new or substantially improved structures, located within all areas having special flood hazards identified on the Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood insurance Rate Map, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been flood-proofed the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed.
- \*\*\* 10. The Building Inspector shall review proposed development to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or State law.
- \*\*\* 11. The Building Inspector shall notify, in riverine situations, adjacent communities and the State Coordinating Office prior to any alteration or relocation of water course, and submit copies of such notification to the Federal Insurance Administration.
- \*\*\* 12. The Building Inspector shall assure that the Flood carrying capacity within the altered or relocated portion of any water course is maintained.

#### D. DUTIES OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR:

1. The Building Inspector shall assist the prospective builder to conform with the provisions of this ordinance.

2. To determine at the site of work operations whether these follow the plans and specifications as proposed in the application for a building permit and the extent of compliance with the Building Code ordinance of the Town.

3. To maintain a complete and accurate record of the work performed by the Building Inspector, keeping such records as are required for this purpose in files at the Office of the Board of Selectmen.

4. To assist the Selectmen in the enforcement of this ordinance.

#### E. ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE:

1. Upon receipt of information from any source that any provision of this Ordinance is being violated, the Building Inspector, Health Officer, or Police Chief shall promptly investigate the alleged violation at its site and, through the Board of Selectmen, shall undertake the following actions to enforce the provisions of this ordinance:

- a. Notify the owner or his agent in writing of the nature of the violation and ordering immediate correction of it, and
- b. When satisfactory compliance has not been obtained following such notification, the Selectmen shall have a complaint prepared against the offending party who shall be summoned to appear in Court to answer such complaint, or the Selectmen may take any other action that may be appropriate or in accordance with the advice of Town Counsel.

2. Penalties: Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation, punishable by a fine of not more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, upon conviction, for each day such violation may exist or continue. Any such violation, once commenced, shall constitute a continuing violation until it is terminated, and such a continuing violation may be prosecuted as a single violation, or as a series of separate violations.

**\*\* F. CONTROLLED GROWTH**

To guide the growth of the Town in a manner not to exceed its present and future ability to provide expanded facilities to support such growth, such as water quality and quantity and sewage treatment requirements.

The following restrictions are set:

1. The issuance of building permits for dwellings in any subdivision shall be limited in any one calendar year to fifteen (15%) per cent of the number of undeveloped lots existing in said subdivision as of January 1, 1978, or if approved after January 1, 1978, on the date of said Town approval until said subdivision is filled.

2. In all cases where the computation of the percentage under sub-paragraph 1 above is a fraction, that fraction shall be rounded to the nearest whole number, and in no case shall be less than one.

3. For the purposes of sub-paragraph 1 above, a subdivision shall mean the division of a lot, tract or parcel of land into two or more lots, plats, sites or other division of land for the purpose of sale or building development including mobile home parks.

**SECTION VIII: NON-CONFORMING USE:**

A. At the time this ordinance takes effect, all lawful buildings, structures, and land then devoted to uses which would not be otherwise allowed in the district where the same is located by the terms of this ordinance are declared to be non-conforming uses.

B. A non-conforming use, except for the uses authorized under Section III, C-2, 3 and 4, may not be changed subsequently to another non-conforming use of the same premises nor may the non-conforming use be expanded beyond that which existed upon the adoption of this ordinance, nor resumed after the lapse of one year unless a special exception has been granted by the Board of Adjustment.

C. Land and buildings that are idle or not put to any specific use shall be considered to be in a conforming status.

D. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent substantial restoration within one year and continued non-conforming use of a building that has been damaged by fire, water or other casualty. Authorization must be obtained from the Board of Adjustment before restoration of non-conforming property may be undertaken when such restoration involves (1) structural or architectural changes in the building, or (2) changes in the use of the property.

E. Any buildings or structures for uses as authorized in Section 111, C - 2, 3 and 4, whether or not in Zone 3 for which building permits have been issued prior to the enactment of this ordinance, shall be considered as existing for purposes of this Section only.

F. Any building, structure or land, in or on which a non-conforming use is replaced by a permitted use, shall thereafter conform to the regulations for the district in which such structure is located, and the non-conforming use may not thereafter be resumed.

SECTION IX: AMENDMENT, SEVERABILITY, AND WHEN EFFECTIVE:

A. When provisions of this ordinance, or any part thereof, may be amended, supplemented or repealed in the manner set forth by Chapter 31 of Revised Statutes Annotated as amended.

B. Whenever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance or other regulation, that provision which imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall prevail.

C. Should any section or provision of this ordinance be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent authority and jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other provision of this ordinance, and to such end all sections and provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

D. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and shall thereupon supersede all prior zoning ordinances of the Town of Seabrook. No provision of this ordinance however shall limit or affect the power of the Planning Board as authorized by the Town under Chapter 36 Section 19 of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, on March 7, 1972.

SECTION X: DEFINITIONS:

Accessory building: A building whose purpose is subordinate to that of the main building. It may be separate from or attached to the main building. For the purpose of this ordinance a breezeway, a garage or a carport that is attached directly to, or by means of another structure to the main building, shall be regarded as an integral part of the main building.

Accessory use: Any subordinate use of premises which customarily is accepted as a reasonable corollary to the principal use thereof, and

Which is neither injurious nor detrimental to the neighborhood.

Alteration: Of a building or a fabricated structure means a change, rearrangement, or addition involving the original structural parts, or significant changes, or additions to the plumbing, gas piping, electrical wiring, ventilation, or heating installations. Such alterations are not to be confused with replacements or repairs.

Building height: The height of a building is the vertical distance from the grade to the highest point of the coping of a flat roof, or to the decline of a mansard roof, or to the main mean height between the plate and the ridge of a pitched or a hip roof.

District: A division of the total area of the Town including all the land, water, streets, and buildings within the designated boundaries.

Dwelling: Single-family - A detached building designed for or occupied exclusively by one family.

Dwelling: Two-family - a detached building designed for or occupied by two families exclusively, living independently and separately of each other therein.

Foundation: The structural materials supporting a building.

Frontage: Line separating private property from a public right of way or street.

Home occupations: Any work involving mechanical production, crafts, domestic arts, or services that are produced for a profit on the premises and incidental to the occupancy of a dwelling and its accessory building by a family unit and employing not more than three (3) persons outside of the immediate family. Examples: radio repair, hair-dressing, dressmaking, shoe repairs.

House, guest, rooming: A building in which bedrooms are rented to semi-permanent guests whose meals, when consumed on the premises, are prepared only by the proprietor or his employees.

Hotel, motel: A building designed for or used commercially as more or less temporary living quarters for persons who are lodged with or without meals, in which are ten or more sleeping rooms usually occupied by transients.

Land: For the purposes of this ordinance, the word "land", wherever used, shall mean and include all the surface of the earth within the limits of the Town of Seabrook, including all land, ground and sub-surface deposits, all the air space above the land to the limits of the Town's jurisdiction thereof, and all waters, tide waters, marshes, flats and underwater lands to the limits of the Town's jurisdiction thereof. Provided, however, that as to a lot and its area the bounds as defined herein, the term "land" shall not include water or underwater lands, whether tidal or otherwise, unless otherwise provided herein.

Lot: One parcel of land set off as a unit and either occupied by or intended to be occupied by a building or fabricated structure, and

including the open spaces required by law.

Lot Area: Means the extent in square feet of the surface of a lot. The lot area shall not include any part of the street upon which the lot fronts or abuts.

Lot depth: The mean distance from the frontage line to the rear lot line when measured on a line halfway between the two side lot lines.

Lot lines: The lines bounding a lot, and dividing the lot from other lots, streets, land or water.

Lot of record: A lot which has its principal frontage upon a street and is described in a deed which has been lawfully recorded in the Registry of Deeds for the County of Rockingham, or which, if not so deeded, is a lot which is part of a subdivision, the plan of which has been lawfully recorded in such Registry of Deeds.

Lot width: The mean distance between the lot side lines measured on a line which is the mean direction of the front and rear lot lines.

Neighborhood: An area of land local to the use concerned, generally lying within a radius of 1000 feet of such use for the purposes of this ordinance, but including all areas farther away from such use whenever the use creates a condition which by reason of noise, smoke, vibration, lighting or other cause creates a detriment, hazard or injury to an area more extensive in size.

Non-conforming use: A building, structure or use of premises that does not conform to the provisions of this ordinance in the district in which it is situated, and which is permitted solely because it was in lawful existence as such a use prior to, or at the time this ordinance took effect. Only the principal use of the premises concerned may be continued if it is non-conforming; a subsidiary, secondary, subordinate or part-time use of premises may not be deemed non-conforming.

Repair: Replacement or mending of parts already existing but in a state of deterioration with equivalent materials and for the purpose of maintaining their quality.

Story: Means that part of a building or structure comprised between a floor and the floor or roof next above it.

\*\*\* Structure: Any structure constructed or erected by human means, whether on land or water, the use of which requires location on the ground or bed of water, or which requires attachment to something having location on the ground or water. Fences, stone walls, retaining walls and driveways are not to be construed as structures for purposes of sideline and setback requirements.

Trailer, travel trailer type: A fabricated structure mounted on wheels and especially designed: (1) for hauling it on highways with a motor vehicle, and (2) to provide temporary living quarters during travel, camping, recreational or vacation trips (synonymous with "Trailer Coach").

Variance: Means a variation from the terms of this ordinance not otherwise permitted within the district concerned, which may be granted by the Board of Adjustment pursuant to its discretionary power, where the Board finds that the grant of such variance will do substantial justice and the intent of the ordinance will be still observed. The Board of Adjustment may in such case waive the literal enforcement of the applicable provision(s) of this ordinance and grant a variance only where such literal enforcement would result in unnecessary hardship to the applicant.

BUILDING CODE ORDINANCE  
Adopted March 13, 1979

1. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvement to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (50% or more of the market value of structure) including pre-fabricated and mobile homes must (i) be designated (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.
2. The Building Inspector shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize any base flood elevation data available from a Federal, State or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the base flood level and (ii) all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or floodproofed to or above the base flood level.
3. The Building Inspector shall require that all mobile homes to be placed within Zone A on the community's Flood Hazard Boundary Map shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (i) over-the-top ties be provided each of the four corners of the mobile home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring some additional tie per side (ii) frame ties be provided at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side, (iii) all components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds; and (iv) any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored.
4. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood prone areas new and replacement water supply systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems.
5. The Building Permit Officer shall require within flood prone area (i) new and replacement sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and (ii) on-site waste disposal systems to be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.
