# TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sharon, in the County of Hills-borough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Brick School House in said Sharon on Tuesday, the ninth of March next at 8:00 P. M. of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees and Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
- Article 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing: specifically, Town Clerk, I year; Selectman for 3 years; Tax Collector, 1 year; Highway Agent, 1 year; Treasurer, 1 year; Trustee of Trust Funds, 1 year.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to establish the amount which shall be paid the Town Officers for their services or take any action relative thereto.
- Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for Town expenses, including payment of Workmen's Compensation insurance of \$100.00.
- Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the care of cemeteries, or take any action relative thereto.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the town health officer, or take any action relative thereto.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for fire protection, or take any action relative thereto.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22.00 (1-100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for summer maintenance, bridge repair, culverts for Mountain Road and road signs.
  - Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$1,800.00 to oil and sand Temple Road from the Temple Line to the junction of Route 123; and Spring Hill Road from Wilson Corner to Hamilton Corner.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$173.06 for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction or betterment aid and the State will contribute \$1,153.71. This is in accordance with Chapter 83 Laws of 1951 as amended by Chapter 31 Laws of 1953.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of plowing and sanding.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used for Blister Rust control.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to have an audit made by the State Tax Commission, Division of Municipal Accounting; or vote to have the audit made by an elected official or officials, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of same.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum of money not to exceed three thousand dollars in anticipation of taxes.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the Brick School House from the School District for the sum of \$1.00.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the Jarmany Hill school lot from the School District for the sum of \$1.00.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the installation of a heating unit; to buy files and desk or table, and to make general repairs, specifically, the ceiling of the Brick School House.

Article 19. To see if the Town will transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Article 20. Shall the provisions of Act 171A of the Revised Laws relative to the play game of Beano be adopted in this town?
