### WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stewartstown, in the County of Coos in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town of Stewartstown on Tuesday, the 7th day of March, next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid.
- To see if the town will vote to accept the budget made up by the Selectmen and Lynne Placey and to raise money for the same. If not, to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year as follows:
  - (a) Town Officer's Salaries.
  - (b) Town Officer's Expenses.
  - (c) Election and Registration.
  - (d) Town Hall, office and other buildings.
  - (e) Damage and Legal Expenses.
  - (f) Health Department.
  - (g) Town Dump Expenses.
  - (h) Vital Statistics.
  - (i) General Expense of Highway Department.
  - (j) Civil Defense.
  - (k) Interest of Temporary Loans.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for support of the poor.
- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for support of libraries.
- To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for care of cemeteries.

- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise two thousand seven hundred dollars (\$2,700.00) for street lighting
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the following departments:
  - (a) Police Department
  - (b) Fire Department
  - (c) Sewer Department
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to that required by law, for the town maintenance.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for winter roads.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer roads.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise nine hundred fifty dollars (\$950.00) to contribute to the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc. (By Petition)
- 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes of the municipal year and pay out of the tax money when it is received.
- To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint all other officers as required by law not elected by Non-Partisan Ballot.
- To choose by Non-Partisan Ballot the following Town Officers:
  - (a) Town Clerk
  - (b) Selectmen for three years coming
  - (c) Town Treasurer
  - (d) Town Road Agents
  - (e) One or more Auditors
  - (f) Overseer of Public Welfare
  - (g) Collector of Diamond Pond Rent
  - (h) One or more Sextons
  - (i) Trustee of Trust Funds
  - (i) One Library trustee for three years ensuing

- 15. To see if the town will vote to perambulate the town boundaries between Stewartstown and Clarksville.
- To see if the town will vote to have the outside boundaries of the Big Diamond Pond lot re-surveyed.
- To see if the town will vote to build two fire lanes to the Connecticut River. One in the village of Stewartstown and one in Riverside and what sum of money will be raised for same.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to appoint a zoning commission to recommend the boundary of various zoning districts and appropriate regulations to be enforced therein, and to authorize the moderator to appoint such commission to consist of five members, all being legal voters of said town; at least one of which shall be a member of the board of selectmen, in accordance with RSA 31 Sect. 65.
- 19. Inasmuch as the Burdett Adams residence is a permanent, year round residence, the Town of Stewartstown shall be responsible for maintaining, including snow-plowing, that portion of town road from Burdett Adams residence to the "Ben Gould turn". (By Petition)
- 20. Inasmuch as the David S. Herres' residency is a permanent residency in the town of Stewartstown, the town should be responsible for the maintenance year-round, including snow removal of the existing town road past Elroy Hunt's residency northeasterly to where the David S. Herres' turn will be. (By Petition)
- 21. To see if the town will vote in the Town Meeting (not by ballot) to see if the Town will approve the plowing of the road leading from the Heath Road to the Stewartstown—Colebrook town line. This being one of the roads abandoned in the last meeting in ignorance of the fact that permanent homes had been built and that it is necessary to have school bus service on that road. It is understood that this is not a request to have the road plowed until after April 10th, 1972. (By Petition)
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00), approximately what it would cost, for the re-evaluation of all taxable properties in said town. Such re-evaluation to be conducted by the New Hampshire State Tax Commission.

- 23. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Financing local educational costs has traditionally been the responsibility of the local community. Now, however, a California Supreme Court decision that declared California's present system of financing its public school systems to be unconstitutional has created shock waves throughout the nation despite the fact that ultimate decision will probably await a U. S. Supreme Court ruling.

In its decision, the California court ruled that the present arrangement based largely on property taxes levied within school districts denies equal educational opportunities to residents of less industrialized areas since they must be taxed at a higher rate to cover school costs than persons in wealthier or more industrialized areas.

Dependent upon the outcome of the California decision, some serious implications may develop. Invariably, when outside monies are channeled into local governments some degree of local control is lost or diminished through guidelines imposed or mandated. Whether this sacrifice will be necessary or whether alternative approaches such as revenue sharing on a state and local basis may be more feasible remains to be seen. The problem of providing monies for education, however, still remains.

The next decade will see an increasing emphasis on vocational education and career planning development. Our society now realized that a college or university education should not and need not be required of every youngster entering the field of work. Welfare statistics, however, clearly indicate that vocational education has sorely been overlooked by the public school system. Federal, state, and local monies combined now spent on welfare programs outnumber monies spent on education by a 6 to 1 ratio, with no indication that the gap will narrow.

Additional and new programs in vocational education would indeed cost more money and will give rise to concern as to how it can be afforded. However, can we not afford it if we are to prepare youngsters for a productive and secure life as opposed to a life of welfare and non-productivity? The cost of the latter is obvious. The rapidly changing field of technology has resulted in major changes in labor productivity and occupational fields available, consumer products, environmental conditions, housing, transportation, and changes in practically all aspects of our daily living. The question now remains if we are to meet this forthcoming challenge in education by local, state, or federal mandate.

### GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

In my first year as Guidance Counselor in grades 8–12 of Supervisory Union No. 7, I have had three basic objectives:

- To ascertain what has been done in the way of guidance during the past few years in Supervisory Union No. 7.
- To build upon the past by initiating a program which will develop in each student a sense of self-understanding, a store of healthy attitudes, a realization of his responsibility to himself as well as others, and the ability to make sound decisions.
- To become acquainted with students, teachers, administrators, and parents so that all can move toward the abovementioned goals which really are the purposes of and reasons for guidance.

While the scope of these objectives is virtually unlimited, I feel that firm steps have been taken toward their eventual fulfillment. Much has been accomplished through innumerable dialogues with individuals, some group guidance, a considerable amount of group and individual testing and the providing of desired information and materials.

Much remains to be done in this never ending process of guidance. One of the weaker points of the program thus far has been the lack of communication with parents. Although I have talked with quite a number of fathers and mothers concerning a variety of matters involving their children, a great deal more needs to be done in this particular area. Steps to correct the situation will be taken little by little commencing this spring with a series of guidance newsletters to parents, some newspaper releases and an increase in the number of visitations. Hopefully, over a period of time, a close relationship can be established between parents and the guidance office, with the common aim of helping students—sons and daughters, achieve a greater degree of happiness and success in their homes, their schools, and their communities.

# SCHOOL HEALTH

The objectives of a school health program are to perform the necessary functions to maintain and promote good health for all the pupils in our schools.

Each year the following services are performed: checking heights and weights, vision and hearing screening, physical examinations for students in grades 4, 8, and 11, as well as all involved in athletics, T. B. skin tests as recommended by the T. B. Association of this state, necessary immunizations, pre-school clinics for incoming first graders and including the Early Childhood Program pupils this year, home visits as deemed necessary for good communications between the school and the parents and for follow-through health care, first aid and emergency care, health teaching and counseling, promotion of mental health, and continuous supervision of general health.

The Matching Fund Dental Program sponsored by the local towns and the state was utilized again this year with as many pupils receiving dental care as time and monies allowed.

North Country Education Services again provided a speech and hearing specialist with one and one-half days per week devoted to Supervisory Union 7 students with speech and hearing defects.

Each year we strive to improve the school health program. With everyone working together, it is hoped that we can achieve our goal in this endeavor.

### ANNUAL REPORT FOR

### VER-SHIRE SCHOOL & SHOP

### Colebrook, New Hampshire

This program has dealt specifically with the handicapped and disadvantaged in the area. It has served individuals in this capacity from the ages of 6 to 63. In the true sense of the word, it has been special education for the handicapped and disadvantaged in relation to each individual's needs.

Upon enrollment each individual experiences an evaluation process as a basic orientation to the program. The program is an assessment of the capabilities and limitations of the individual enrollee through vocational related activities.

It has been demonstrated that if certain individuals are unable to sufficiently develop a trade or skill, they can still benefit from an opportunity to work and socialize outside of their neighborhood environment.

An academic program of specialized tutoring for each individual's basic needs and academic skills has been developed. This aspect of the program coordinates with the vocational related activities thus being the motivating factor for continued academic achievement on the part of individuals.

In recognition to this new and innovative type of approach to education, the State Title III office has provided a grant to Ver-Shire School and Shop to develop this program more extensively. One of the Title III primary purposes being to provide such information to other communities throughout the state and nation for utilizing these educational techniques for the handicapped and disadvantaged.

The number, range and variety of handicaps served in this program have demonstrated the need for growth in this facility. Acquisition of adjoining space is in the process.

In recognition of the success achieved by this program, on September 10, 1971, the New Hampshire Council for Better Schools presented its commendation award to Ver-Shire School and Shop for its Sheltered Workshop for handicapped and disadvantaged individuals:

"With the emphasis on remedial education pre-vocational training and the development of attributes of honesty, responsibility, trust and reliability, the project is not unlike other

vocational-technical projects for the handicapped. The outstanding aspect of the Ver-Shire project is the degree of community involvement. It was the community that recognized the demand for a program to serve the disadvantaged. The community and its various organizations provide economic support. Community resources are utilized to provide educational remediation, skilled instruction and employment opportunities. The value of such a program for the disadvantaged individuals is undisputed and this community has discovered that the benefits reach into all aspects of community life."

I would like to take this opportunity to "congratulate" and "thank" each and every one of you in this total community for making Ver-Shire School and Shop a reality.
