TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stoddard in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for snow removal for the ensuing year.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for general expenses of the highway department for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Old Home Day.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred eighty-eight dollars and ninety-six cents (\$188.96) for T.R.A.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of forty-six dollars (\$46.00) to advertise the Town.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for street lights.

13. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to raise the money to cover the expense of such audit.

14. To see if the Town will vote to take any action for the control of White Pine Blister Rust and raise the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for the same.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for further improvements and upkeep on the Public Picnic Area on Island Pond.

16. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete reappraisal of the land and buildings within the Town, to equalize valuations in accordance with the law and to raise money for this purpose.

17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the purchase of additional snow removal equipment.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be used with the Davis bequest, for the purpose of erecting a new Library building.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to put into the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of road equipment.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred seventy-eight dollars and sixty cents (\$178.60) as its proportional share toward the support of the Elliot Community Hospital in Keene.

21. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salary of the Chairman of the Selectmen and to what amount.

22. To see if the Town will vote to change the salary of the Tax Collector to one per cent of the total money collected in lieu of the one hundred dollar salary now paid.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

Scarcity of labor and lack of sufficient income from the funds make any general improvements in the several cemeteries impossible. This year a part of the gate at one of the cemeteries was found to be in a dangerous condition, beyond repair, and was removed by one of the Trustees. Other than that no work except the usual mowing and a small amount of grading was attempted.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Stoddard :

This report covers a period of astounding rehabilitation of the Stoddard school to the extent that it is now better appointed than nearly any school of its size in the whole area. Your school board has completed the installation of the oil-fired heating system, a driven well, water pump to supply running water to the new flush toilets and sinks, and the new sewage disposal system. Lastly all new pupil desks and chairs have been installed, to replace the Civil War type which were still in use.

To see this great development now in operation, it is very difficult to remember back two years to the highly undesirable educational plant that was the Stoddard Center school. Today your pupils can attend school with a much safer degree of good physical and mental comfort due to these modern appointments.

These changes have all been brought about in record time and at very low cost due to the active participation and cooperation of the school board and townspeople. Not contented with all the internal changes, the PTA after considerable work and sacrifice purchased a large swing set for the playground, which cost nearly a hundred dollars.

Much credit must also be given to the citizens who attended the special meeting of the district last August 16th and authorized the School Board to complete this fine program. Although the power to borrow \$1,200 was granted, it now appears that it may not be necessary to borrow this whole amount, in order to complete the fiscal year. This is indeed a tribute to the fine business acumen of your school board.

The school still needs more smaller remedial alterations to make it ideal. Such changes can be planned for over a

period of time and should include attention to lighting and painting, as further recommended when the State Board of Health made the survey two years ago which prompted the plumbing and heating improvements. These may be brought about by adding windows, adding lights and light paint. The new desks have fine tops that are light to serve to lighten up the work areas.

The pupil enrollment still holds high and may be studied from the following table.

This represents quite a pupil load on a teacher under present day standards. Mrs. Lane has continued to serve her pupils well. She not only serves them well during school hours but also in outside activities such as clubs. Mrs. Lane attended the workshop conducted by the State Board of Education for elementary teachers in this area, held at Henniker in October. The principal objective of the workshop was to acquaint teachers with newer methods of teaching geography and history and the materials to be included in this field. Most people are beginning to realize that the vast technological changes of the past half century have reduced the world to one community. Our problem is to properly gear our elementary program so that it will educate our pupils to feel competent to understand or further study this whole new day we're living in. Significantly such things as a whole year study of the Civil War such as we had in the seventh grade for many years may have to be eliminated so that our boys and girls may learn to understand the world we live in rather than what we HAVE lived. The problem is to determine just what changes must be made in the elementary curriculum. Our new type of report cards indicate some of our new goals.

This problem of a new curriculum brings to use the problem of teaching tools for the day. In other words we've had to shift to different types of text books and reference

books and we've had to have more types. Most schools are now using moving picture projectors, radios and phonographs in their daily studies at school. They're using current magazines and newspapers. In Stoddard, we have made excellent progress towards these new goals in properly equipping our teacher and pupils. This day of penicillin, nuclear fission, television, and atomic power really calls for drastic action in the educational field if we expect our pupils to be equipped to properly take their places in such a world.

At this writing, it looks as though the legislature may pass a bill to make transportation of high school children by a district compulsory. This may compel your board to operate such a program next fall and to ask for a deficiency budget to cover the same at the next annual meeting. While the law if passed may work some tax increase on a community, it will serve to promote the American ideal of equal educational opportunity for all American boys and girls where they don't happen to live within walking distance of a high school.

The educational program in Stoddard has taken giant steps during the past year. Mrs. Lucy Hill, Mrs. Ruth Mansell, and Mrs. Helen McClure of your school board deserve your heartfelt praise for their untiring efforts in behalf of this excellent accomplishment. A very few people in every community seem to think that a school board exists only to receive complaints. While we are pleased at the very low incidence of local problems, a word of appreciation to public officials such as your school board, is in the true spirit of American ideals. I should like to here express my gratitude to your fine board, to Mrs. Lane, your pupils and every one who has co-operated to so pleasantly carry forward the Stoddard school program, during the past year.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.
