NH RACES TIGHTEN ENTERING FINAL WEEK

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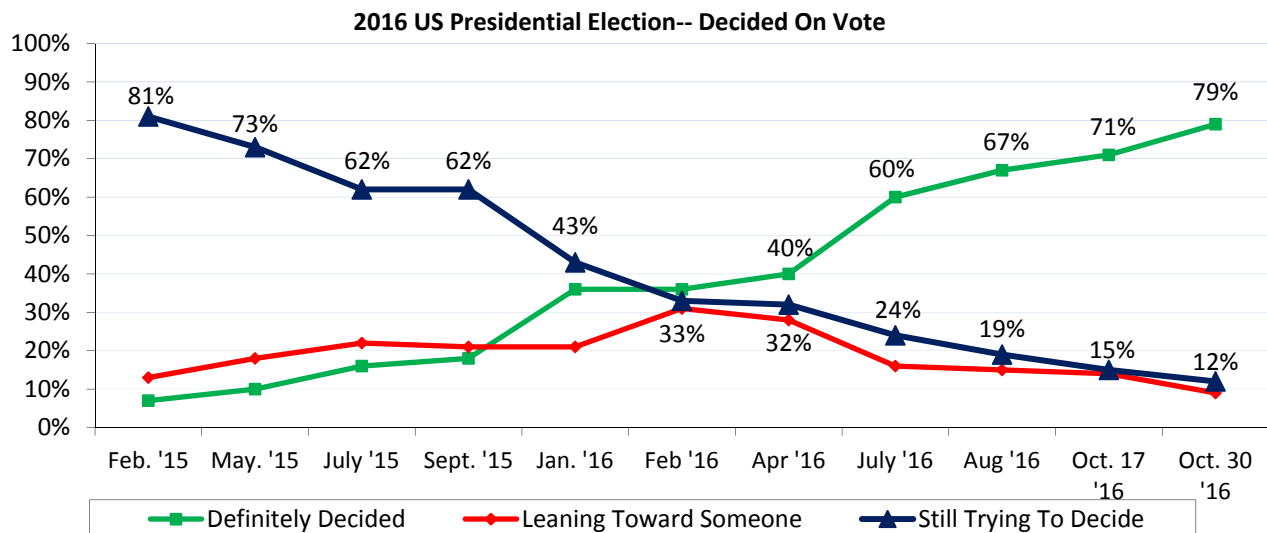
DURHAM, NH – Hillary Clinton continues to lead Donald Trump in New Hampshire, but her lead is now within the poll’s margin of error. The races for U.S. Senate and Governor are dead heats.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Six hundred and forty-one (641) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and October 30, 2016. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.9 percent.

2016 U.S. Presidential Election

One week ahead of the November 8th election, most New Hampshire voters have decided whom they will vote for in the presidential election. Four in five (79%) likely voters say they have definitely decided whom to support, 9% are leaning towards someone, but 12% are still trying to decide.

Democrats are more likely to have decided whom they are voting for than Republicans – 85% of Democrats say they have definitely decided whom they will vote for compared to only 76% of Republicans.

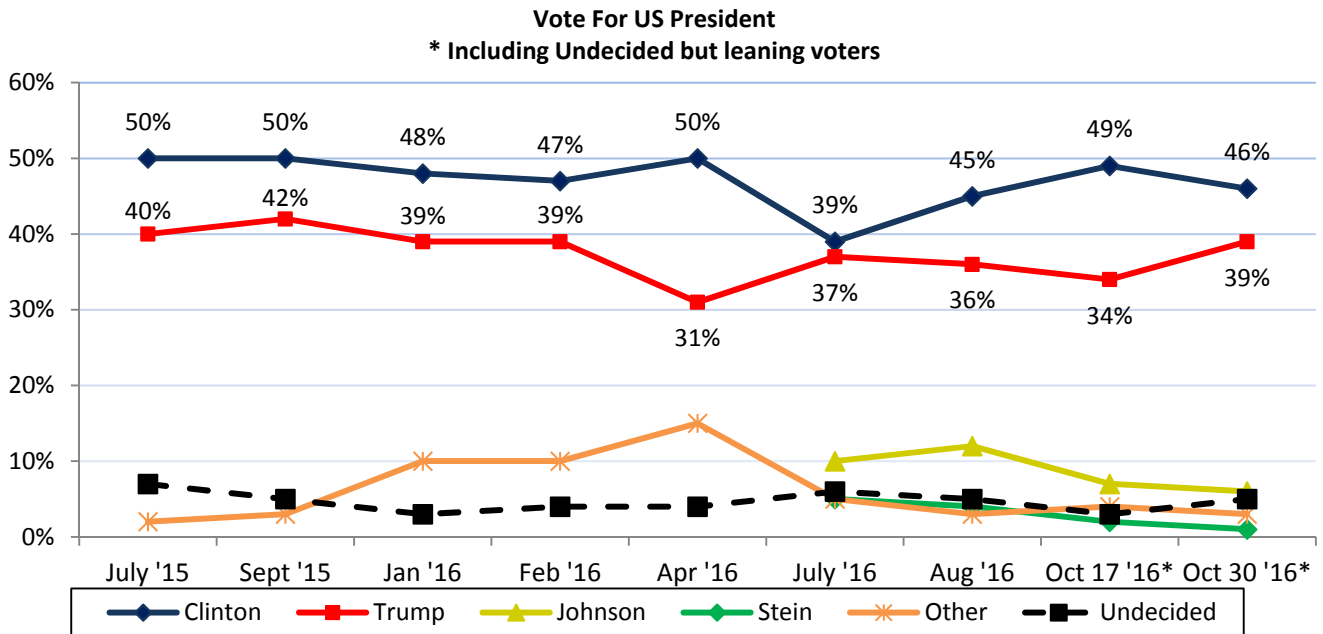

2016 Presidential Election

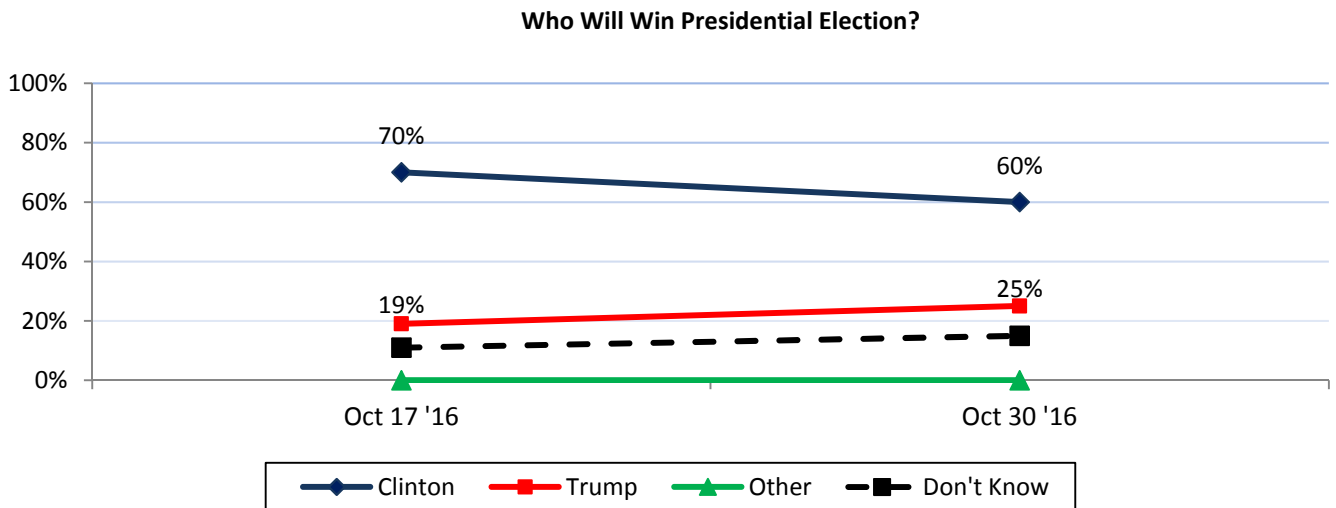
If the 2016 presidential election was held today, 45% of likely New Hampshire voters say they would vote for Hillary Clinton, 38% would vote for Donald Trump, 6% would vote for Gary Johnson, 1% would vote for Jill Stein, 3% say they would vote for another candidate, and 7% are undecided. When undecided voters are asked which way they are leaning, the results become 46% for Clinton, 39% for Trump, 6% for Johnson, 1% for Stein, 3% for someone else, and 5% undecided. This race has tightened since earlier this month.

Clinton is doing better among Democrats (89%-4%) than Trump is among Republicans (78%-9%), but Trump has a slight edge among Independents (34%-28%). There are significant gender and education gaps – Trump has a 45%-36% lead among men while Clinton leads by double digits (56%-33%) among women. Trump leads among those with a high school degree or less (57%-26%) and those with some college education or technical school (53%-32%) while Clinton has double digit leads among college graduates (53%-31%) and those who have completed postgraduate work (62%-25%).



Who Will Win Presidential Election?

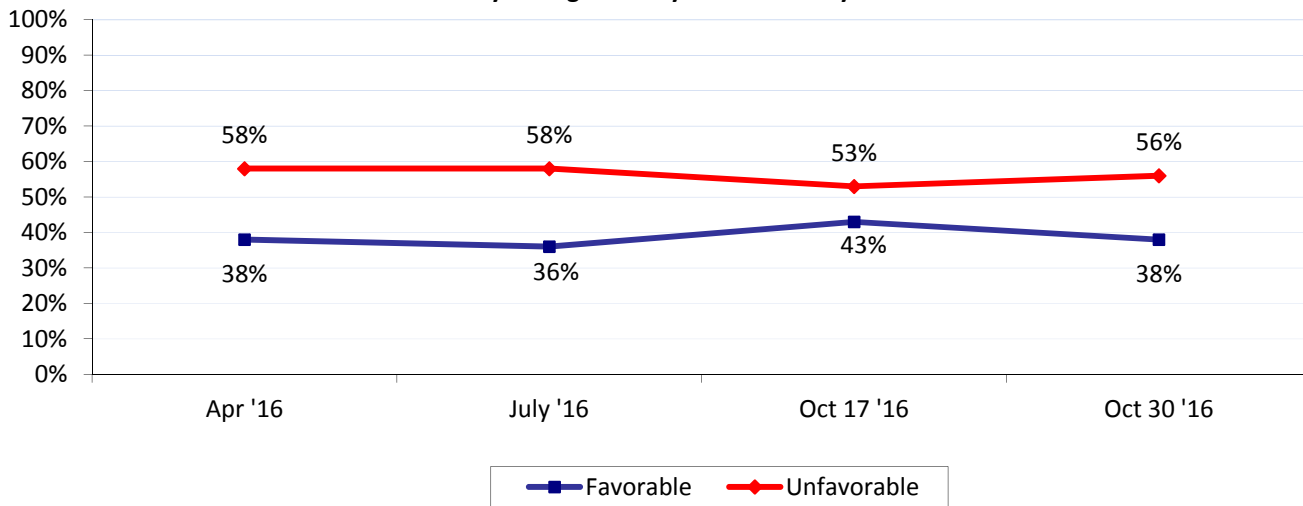
Three in five New Hampshire likely voters (60%) think that Hillary Clinton will win the presidential election, just 25% think Trump will win, and 15% are unsure. While nearly all Clinton voters (90%) believe that she will win, only half of Trump voters (52%) think he will win, and 28% think Clinton will win. This measure of electoral races has been shown to be a more accurate predictor of the winner than “horse race” questions, but not necessarily the margin of victory.



Favorability of 2016 Presidential Candidates

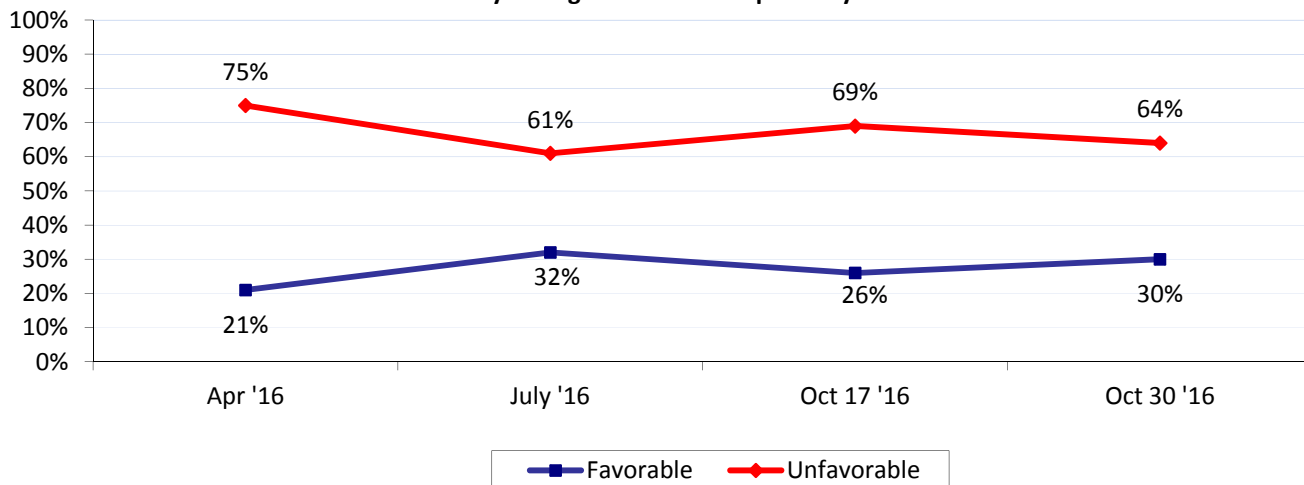
Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton continue to be hampered by their historic unpopularity. A majority of New Hampshire likely voters have an unfavorable opinion of both Clinton and Trump. Currently 38% have a favorable opinion of Clinton, 56% have an unfavorable opinion of her, and 5% are neutral. Clinton’s net favorability is -18%, down from -10% earlier this month. Clinton is very popular among Democrats (+60%) but very unpopular among Independents (-55%) and Republicans (-87%).

Favorability Ratings - Hillary Clinton - Likely Voters



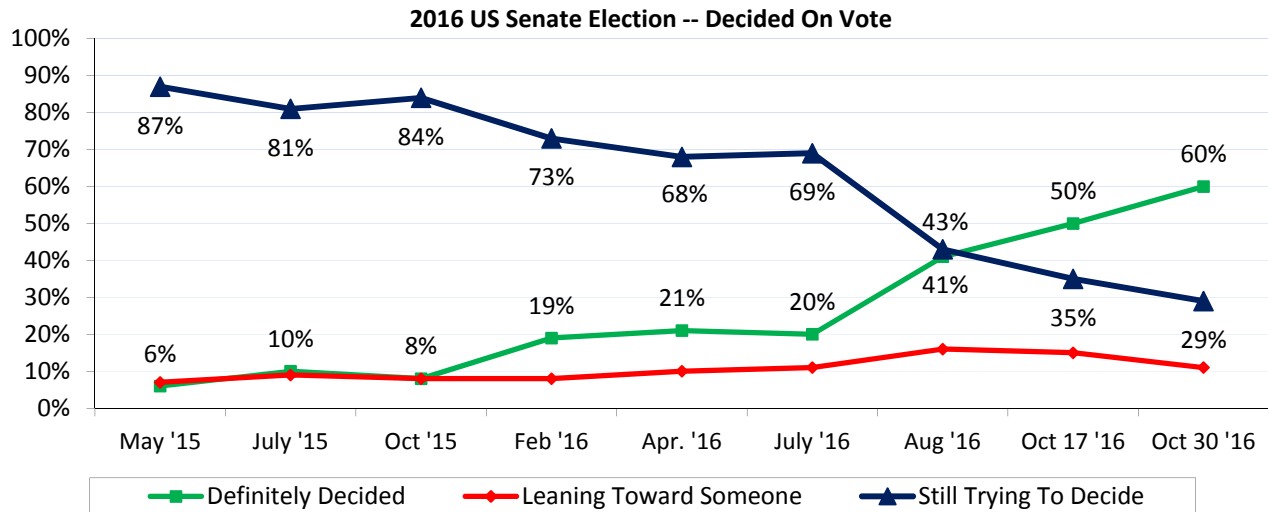
Donald Trump is even less popular – three in ten (30%) likely New Hampshire voters have a favorable opinion of Trump, 64% have an unfavorable opinion, and 5% are neutral. Trump’s net favorability is -34%, up from -43% earlier this month. Trump is only somewhat unpopular among Republicans (+30%), and is very unpopular among Independents (-44%), and Democrats (-92%).

2016 US Senate Election

The race for U.S. Senator from New Hampshire is likely one of the most expensive races in the country. But with only a week to go, only three in five likely voters (60%) say they have definitely decided whom they will vote for, 11% are leaning toward a candidate, and 29% are still trying to decide.

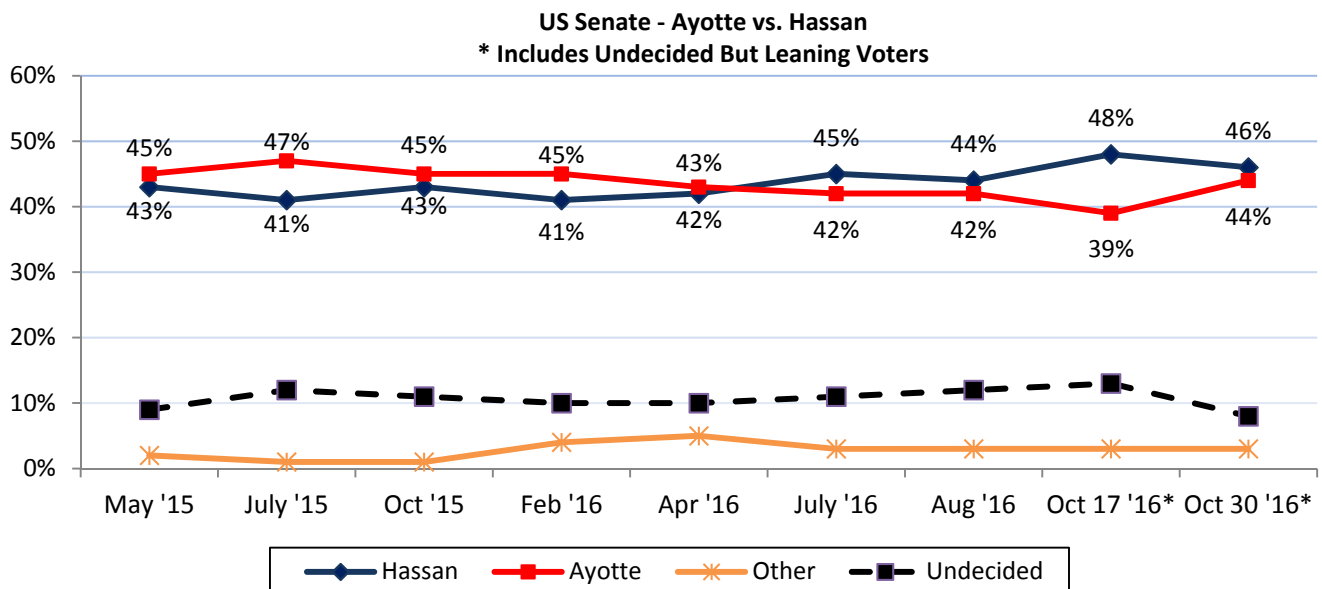


2016 US Senate Election – Ayotte vs. Hassan

This race has been very close for more than a year and looks to remain close until election day. If the 2016 Senate election was held today, 44% of likely general election voters say they would vote for Maggie Hassan, 43% would vote for Kelly Ayotte, 3% would vote for someone else, and 11% are undecided.

After including undecided voters who have indicated the candidate to whom they are leaning toward, the percentages become 46% for Hassan, 44% for Ayotte, 3% for someone else, and 8% remain undecided. Support for Ayotte has improved since earlier this month.

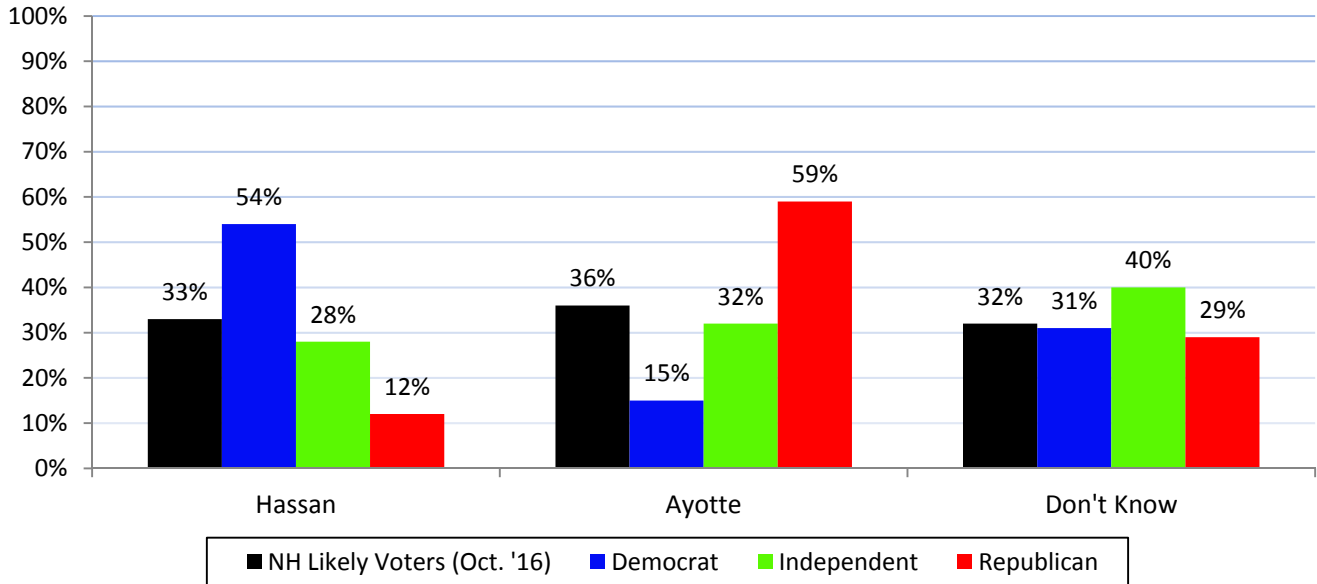
Ayotte and Hassan hold wide leads among members of their parties; Ayotte leads among Republicans 81%-10% and Hassan leads among Democrats 85%-9%, while Ayotte has the slight edge among Independents (44%-32%). Ayotte has the support of most Trump voters (87%) while Hassan has similar support among Clinton voters (86%).



Who Will Win Senate Election?

When asked which candidate they think will win the U.S. Senate election, 36% of likely voters think Ayotte will be re-elected, 33% think Hassan will win, and 32% are unsure. A majority of Republicans (59%) think Ayotte will win, a majority of Democrats (54%) think Hassan will win and a plurality of Independents (40%) are unsure. Nearly two in three (65%) Ayotte voters think that she will win while a majority (59%) of Hassan voters believe that she will win.

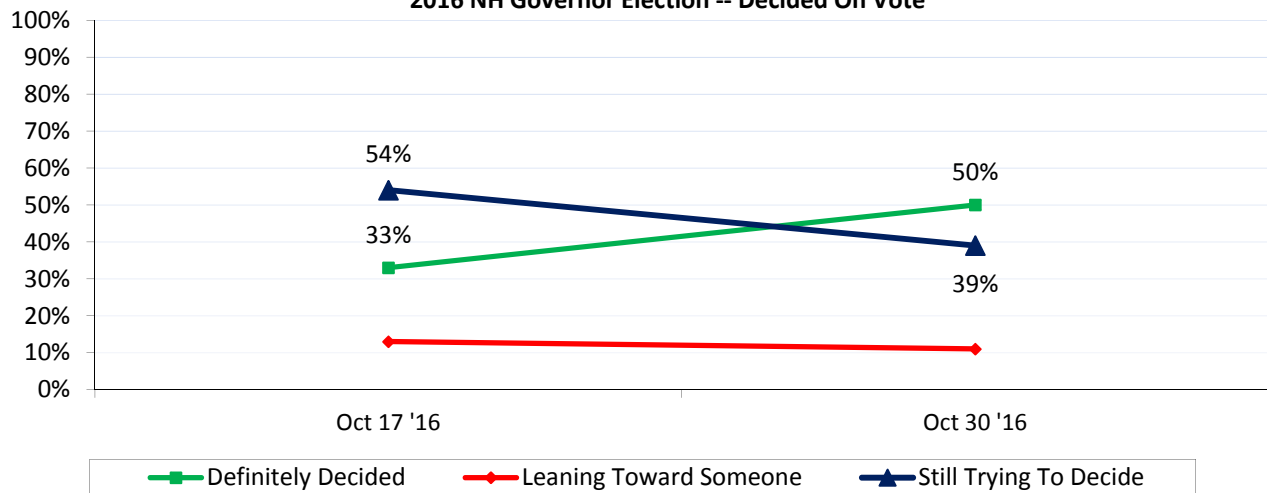
US Senate - Who Will Win? - Likely Voters



NH Gubernatorial Election

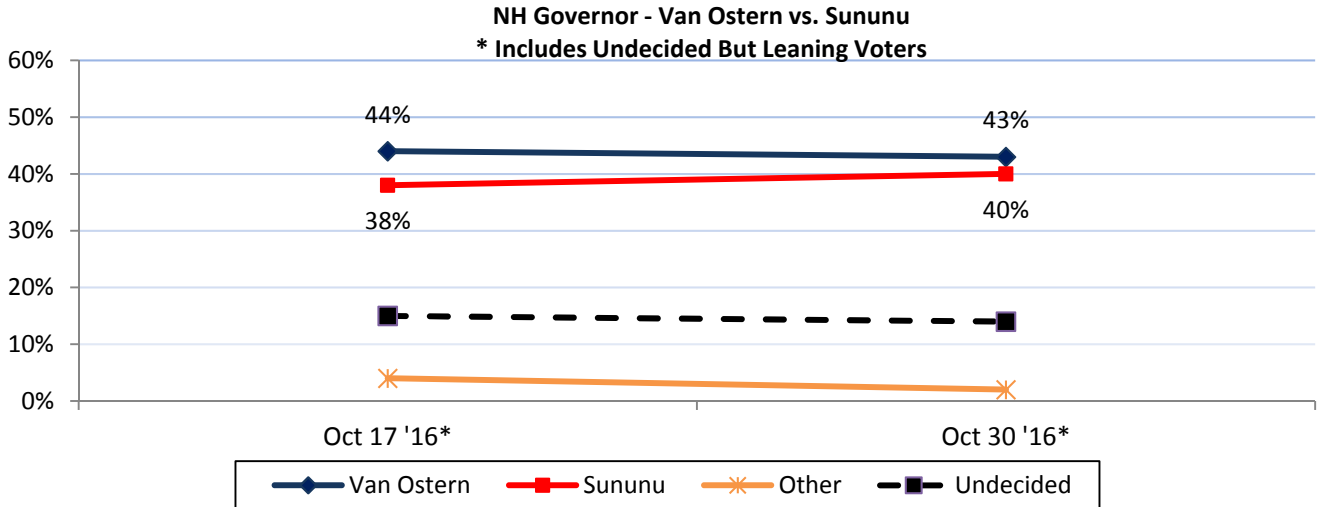
With high profile presidential and Senate races, the race for New Hampshire Governor has flown under the political radar. Only half (50%) of New Hampshire likely voters say they have definitely decided whom they will vote for, 11% are leaning towards someone and 39% are still trying to decide. The percentage of voters who have definitely decided whom they are voting for has increased 17 points since earlier this month.

2016 NH Governor Election -- Decided On Vote



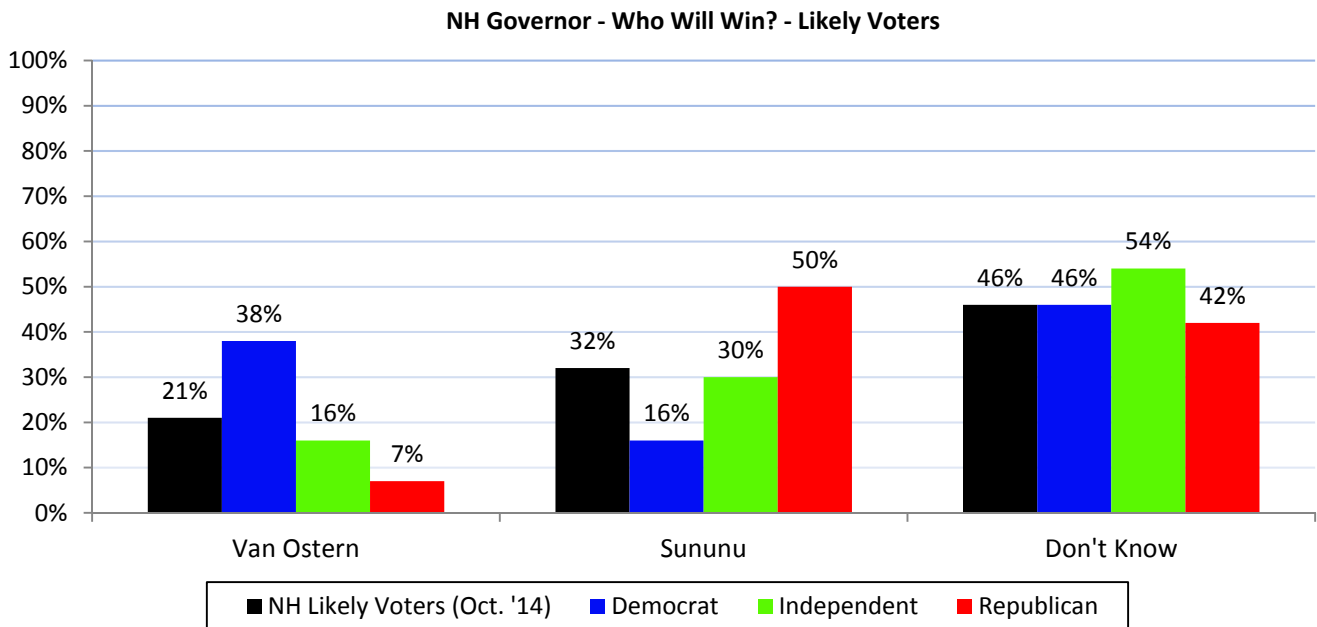
If the election was held today, 40% of New Hampshire likely voters would vote for Democrat Colin Van Ostern, 35% would vote for Republican Chris Sununu, 2% would vote for someone else, and 23% are undecided.

When undecided voters are asked which way they are leaning, the percentages become 43% for Van Ostern, 40% for Sununu, 2% for someone else, and 14% remain undecided. Van Ostern fares somewhat better among Democrats (81%-11%) than Sununu does among Republicans (74%-8%) while Independents are split between the two (35%-33% Van Ostern).



Who Will Win NH Governor Election?

When asked which candidate they think will win the Gubernatorial election, nearly half (46%) of likely voters are unsure. About a third (32%) think Sununu will win while 21% think Van Ostern will win. Half of Republicans (50%) think Sununu will win while just 38% of Democrats think Van Ostern will win. Three in five (60%) Sununu voters believe he will win compared to only 44% of Van Ostern voters predicting his victory.

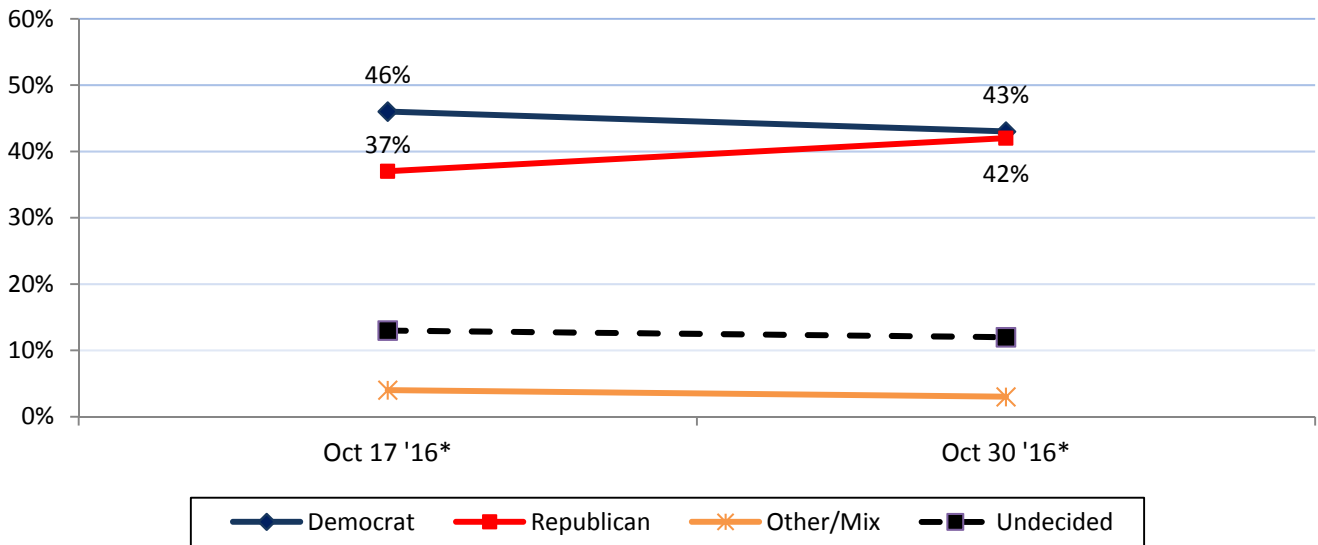


New Hampshire House of Representatives

Likely voters were asked which party's candidate they planned on supporting in the upcoming election for state representative. Voters are currently divided on which party to support, with 41% supporting Democratic candidates, 40% supporting Republican candidates, 3% supporting another party or a mix of Republicans and Democrats, and 17% undecided.

When undecided voters were asked which way they were leaning, the results become 43% for Democratic candidates, 42% for Republican candidates, 3% for another party or a mix of Republicans and Democrats, and 12% are still undecided.

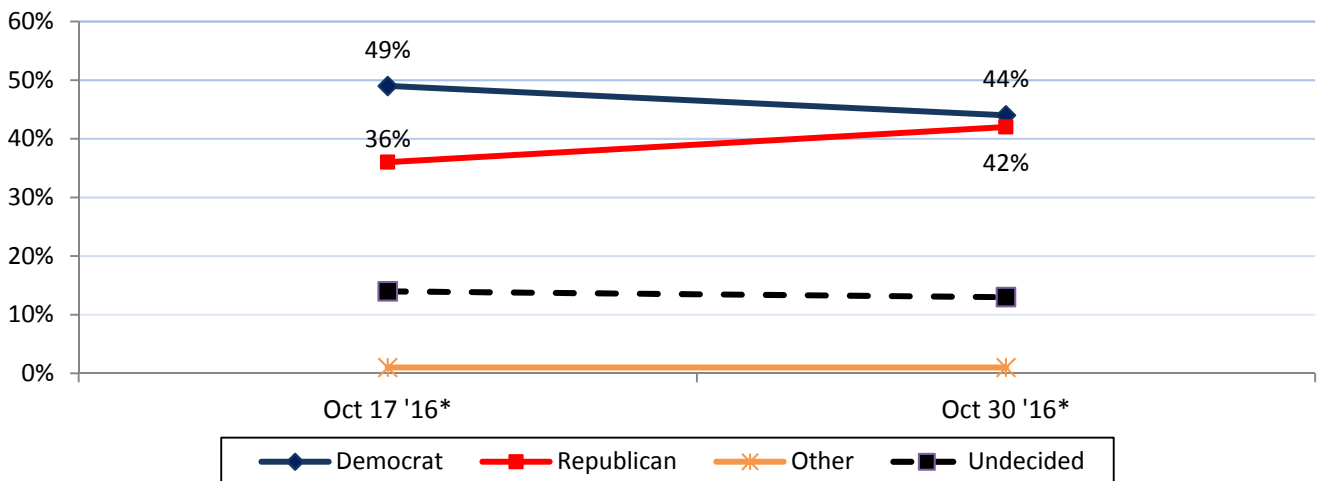
New Hampshire House of Representatives Generic Ballot - With Leaners



Likely voters are also evenly divided on which party to support for the State Senate, with 42% supporting Democratic candidates, 41% supporting Republican candidates, 1% supporting another party, and 16% undecided.

When undecided voters were asked which way they were leaning, the percentages become 44% for Democratic candidates, 42% for Republican candidates, 1% for another party, and 13% are still undecided.

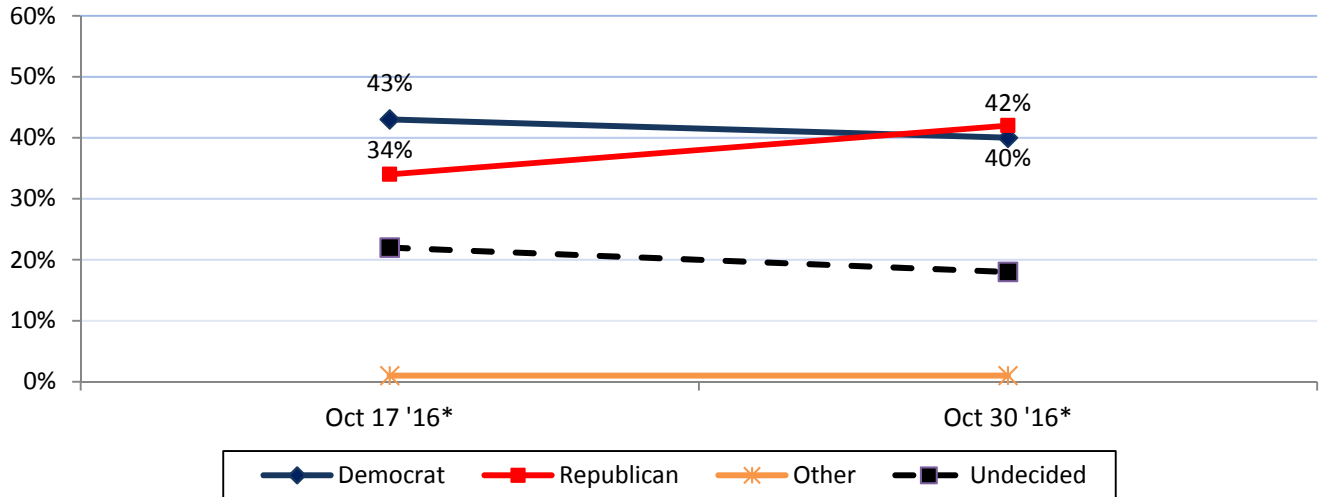
New Hampshire State Senate Generic Ballot - With Leaners



Currently 39% of likely 2016 New Hampshire voters would support the Republican candidate for Executive Council, 38% would support the Democratic candidate, and 22% are undecided.

When undecided voters were asked which way they were leaning, the results become 42% for Republican candidates, 40% for Democratic candidates, 1% for another party, and 18% are still undecided.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center and funded by WMUR-TV, Manchester, NH. Six hundred and forty-one (641) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and October 30, 2016. If a household included more than one adult, the adult who had the most recent birthday was selected to be interviewed.

The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.9 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.1%.

The random sample used in the WMUR Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
