To the inhabitants of the Town of Unity in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Unity on the second Tuesday of March next—March 14, 1961 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

To choose all necessary Officers, Agents and Trustees, for the ensuing year under the Australian Ballot System.

- 1. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing one year.
- 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing one year.
- 4. To choose an Overseer of Public Welfare for the ensuing one year.
- 5. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing one year.
- 6. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing one year.
- 7. To choose a Highway Agent for the ensuing one year.
- 8. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.
- 9. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

BUSINESS MEETING CALLED TO ORDER AT 2 O'CLOCK

- 1. To hear the report of the Selectmen and other Town Officials and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 2. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for other Town Charges.
- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Librarian's Salary and Library Tax.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor Charges.
- 6 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay just debts of Town.
- To see if the Town will vote to place the Road Agent on a yearly salary and to raise and appropriate the money therefore.

TOWN WARRANT (continued)

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to buy a truck to be used by the Highway Dept. and to appropriate the money for said purchase
- 9. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for maintenance of highways and bridges, snow removal, and determine price to be paid for labor and trucks.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 for the control of Blister Rust.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$749.85 for Town Road Aid. If this sum is raised the State will contribute \$4,999.00.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the benefit of the Unity Volunteer Fire Dept., Inc., the Fire Dept. to have authority to spend any part of this money for Civilian Defense equipment for the Fire Department.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote by ballot to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise one-hundredth of one per cent of valuation for the benefit of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Association.
- 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the Town's share of Social Security.
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to fix the foundation of and do general repairs on the Town Hall.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Unity School in said district on the ninth day of March, 1961, at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

To see if the district will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1961-1962, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of the Unity School District: I respectfully submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHING STAFF

Our school year began on September 7th. Three of our regular teachers returned leaving only one change in our staff for the fall term. Mr. William Hall, resigned to accept a position as teacher in the High School at Charlestown. Mr. Hall was with us for four years as teacher in the seventh and eighth grade room. We commend him for his years of service to the young people in Unity. Mrs. Elizabeth Nelson, Principal of the school, has taken over the seventh and eighth grade room as a new assignment.

Mrs. Frances Wirkkala was employed to teach grades five and six as successor to Mrs. Nelson, who formerly taught this particular room. We were very fortunate to obtain the services of Mrs. Wirkkala who is an experienced teacher and possessing considerable talent in the field of music. She formerly taught grades five and six at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

It is expected that we will have a first grade entering class of thirteen pupils next fall. This should give us a probable total school enrollment of one hundred and twenty pupils. The room allocations could be as follows:

Mrs. Cragin

Mrs. McCullough

Mrs. Wirkkala

Mrs. Nelson, Principal

Grades 1 and 2 - 29 pupils

Grades 3 and 4 - 28 pupils

Grades 5 and 6 - 29 pupils

Grades 7 and 8 - 33 pupils

Total - 119 pupils

MAINTENANCE

Mrs. Marjorie Smith continued this year as custodian of the school, and we are very appreciative of her efforts in making our school facilities comfortable and most livable. Our school plant is in very good physical condition and the School Board is ever alert to maintaining the building so as to keep our depreciation at a minimum.

Our repair and improvement program for the summer includes the painting of the exterior trim on the building, sanding and varnishing of desks, and the redecorating of the toilet rooms in the main part of the building.

STATE AID AND INCOME

It is estimated that we should have a balance surplus at the end of the current year amounting to approximately \$4,050.10. We received from the State \$18,975.07 in Foundation Aid, and \$838.98 in Building Aid. The above amounts, together with an income of \$200.00 from Trust Funds, gives us a total income of about \$24,064.15. This amount can help immeasureably in reducing the amount of money necessary to be raised by direct assessment.

SCHOOL COSTS

We note that the per pupil cost for operating the Unity School last year was \$212.27. This is in contrast to the State Average per pupil cost for Elementary Education of \$265.00 per child. It would appear then, that the school board members are making every effort to conserve the taxpayers' money and provide a worthwhile education for our children at a minimum of expense.

SCHOOL LUNCHES

Mrs. Chase has again supervised the serving of hot lunches in our school cafeteria. All children, who have wished to do so, have had an opportunity to take advantage of this school service. Monthly shipments of Government Surplus Foods have helped finance the lunch program, and enable us to serve meals at a minimum cost to the child.

SUPERINTENDENT'S RECOMMENDATION

That definite action be taken to provide a special class for Mentally Retarded Children, this class to be organized on a cooperative basis, with several towns in the Union sharing in the financial responsibility. It is hoped that the new legislature will pass a bill which will furnish monies for salaries of teachers in Special Class assignments,

Again I wish to thank the school board members, the teachers, and the citizens of Unity for their support and loyalty. I am very appreciative of their cooperation. Working together we can continue to maintain a high standard of Education, and give the people of Unity the kind of school of which they may be proud.

Principal's Report

The past year's program has not been "School as usual". It has been a program of intense endeavor to keep pace with the trend toward higher standards which our times demand. We believe that a strict adherence to the school curriculum, and a dedication to the task of learning, on the part of the pupils, are necessary if they are to meet the requirements of higher education.

The Unity Elementary School, is taking advantage of the new medium in educating, Channel Eleven Education Television. Grades one and two have a music course: Grades three and four a science and a New Hampshire history course; Grades five and six, science. Special programs are heard by the seventh and eighth grades. These programs supplement courses in regular classes.

Music is taught in all grades by Mrs. Wirkkala.

Added to the serious business of study, a number of special functions were held at the school. The Book Fair was very successful. Mr. William Tracey spoke to the older children and parents, and Mrs. Sam Bayer read to the lower grades. Books were again furnished by Mrs. Waite of Newport. The Christmas Pageant was witnessed by a large audience and achieved a spirit of reverence in keeping with the season. Open House was very well attended by parents. A series of baseball games were played with the Goshen-Lempster School. A Doll and Toy Show was held at the first and second grades, a Pet Show by the third and fourth grades, and a Flower Show by the fifth and sixth grades. A magazine subscription drive by the seventh and eighth grades netted the school the sum of \$116.77. A Junior Audubon Club has recently been organized.

Physical fitness tests conducted by Mr. Douglass Reed of the Sullivan County Y.M.C.A. indicated results slightly better than national averages.

Among the local organizations which have helped us we would like especially to thank the Friends of the Unity Library, who have supplied us with many books, and the Unity P.T.A. for supporting the dental clinic, as well as solving many of our other problems.

Report of School Nurse

In submitting my eighth annual report as School Nurse for Supervisory Union No. 5, I would like to cite some of the changes beneficial to the School Health Program which have been made during this eight year period.

Eight years ago Supervisory Union No. 5 was made up of eight school districts in which there were a total of 22 schools. In five of these districts heating and sanitary facilities represented serious health problems. Heating these particular school buildings was next to impossible during the severe winter weather. The only persons in the school who could keep warm were those seated near the stove. In most instances the stove had to be fed frequently with chunk wood. I recall one severe winter when it was necessary to close the school buildings in one district for three weeks because they could not be heated. Frequently children, of necessity, sat in school with heavy jackets and boots in order to keep warm. Sanitary facilities were at a minimum in these buildings. Water for drinking and hand washing was carried into these schools from a nearby water supply which had been tested and approved by the State Board of Health. Lighting in these buildings was also poor.

Geographically these areas were widely separated and the large number of buildings necessitated miles of time consuming travel. This, in turn, curtailed the Nurse's services to the children in school as well as home visits and conferences with parents.

Today Supervisory Union No. 5 is comprised of six school districts, one of which is a cooperative serving two communities. There is a total of nine buildings in the Union. Each of these buildings is equipped with modern heating units, excellent sanitary facilities and adequate lighting. Hot water is provided in all buildings. The total environment in the present school buildings is one conducive to good health and good health habits.

The smaller number of school buildings affords more time for the School Nurse to spend in the school, as well as more time for home calls and parent conferences, which are so important.

New equipment to improve testing programs has been purchased. Namely: an Audiometer for hearing tests, an Orthorater for vision tests and a Wood's light for detecting scalp ringworm. This equipment makes for greater accuracy in the testing programs.

Improvements such as those listed above certainly create a healthful environment which in turn makes for better education and more wholesome living.

In conclusion I would like to extend my appreciation to all of you who have been so interested in the School Health Program and who have helped in so many ways.
