4. To hear the reports of Agents and Auditors and take

any action relative thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote for Class IV or Class V roads construction, re-construction, or betterment aid, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$962,88 therefore, the State contributing \$6,419.22.

6. To see if the Town will permit the playing of basket-ball in the Town Hall under regulations prescribed by the Selectmen, until the next annual Town Meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell any real estate deeded to the Town after Tax Sale, on such terms as they may deem reasonable.

12. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income from the Jotham Lord Trust Fund.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee under the Municipal Budget Act.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the State, or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come

before the meeting.

ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF WESTMORELAND CHESHIRE COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE

ARTICLE I

1:01 To promote the health, safety, convenience, prosperity and general welfare of the Town of Westmoreland and to protect and enhance the value of its properties, the following regulations are hereby enacted by the voters of Westmoreland.

ARTICLE II DISTRICTS

2:01 For present purposes these Zoning regulations shall not affect any building existing or under construction at the time of the original passing of these Regulations.

2:02 For the purpose of these Regulations, all land in the Town of Westmoreland is divided into three (3) Districts as described below:

- Zone A All land within 500 feet from the center line of Route No. 63 from the River Road to the Farrhill Road. This area to be zoned for residence only.
- Zone B All land within 500 feet from the center line of Route No. 12 from the Surry townline to the Walpole town line. All land within 500 feet from the center line of Route No. 63 from the Chesterfield town line to the intersection with Route No. 12 (excluding land in Zone A).
- Zone C All land not included in Zones A and B.

ARTICLE III REGULATIONS

- 3:01 Every dwelling house, or other building or addition thereto, shall be set back a distance of at least 75 feet from the center line of any public road or highway, and shall be set back a distance of at least 20 feet from adjacent property lines. Every dwelling house shall have a minimum ground floor area of 600 square feet, exclusive of porches, breezeways, garages, sheds or similar areas.
- 3:02 No owner or occupant of any land within said areas shall permit any building or fire ruins thereon to be left unfinished or incomplete on the exterior, but shall finish or remove the same within one (1) year. This section shall not apply to any existing building or buildings under construction.

- 3:03 No junk yard or place for storage of discarded machinery, vehicles or scrap material shall be permitted in the Town.
- 3:04 (a) Mobile homes, mobile home subdivisions, multiple family dwellings or conversion of a single to a multiple family dwelling shall not be permitted in Town until approval has been granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment, after a public hearing.

(b) Travel trailers and campers will be permitted on private property for no longer than four weeks during any one year. A written permit will be required from the Board of Selectmen for a longer period of time.

- 3:05 Outdoor advertising signs shall not be permitted in the Town until approval has been granted by the Board of Adjustment. Exception: owners of land may erect small signs of not over twelve (12) square feet in size on their own land for advertising their own products or goods raised or made on the premises.
- 3:06 (a) In Zones A and B all building lots for a single family dwelling shall contain a minimum of three hundred (300) feet frontage on a town approved and maintained road. This also applies to lots for trailers and mobile homes.
 - (b) In Zone C all building lots for a single family dwelling shall contain a minimum of five (5) acres, with a minimum of five hundred (500) feet frontage on a town approved and maintained road. This also applies to lots for trailer and mobile homes.
 - (c) Churches and schools are permitted in all Zones.
- 3:07 All roads built on private property shall meet construction standards of the Town of Westmoreland before being accepted by the Town. A set of such standards is on file with the Town Clerk.
- 3:08 No house or building may be sold or transferred with less than the minimum acreage or frontage prescribed for the Zone in which it is located. Any house or building now situated on less than the minimum lot size must be sold or transferred in its entirety.

- 3:09 (a) Business, industry and professions may be permitted in Zones B and C by special exception only, in accordance with the following requirements:
 - The proposed use is in an appropriate location for such a use.
 - 2. Such approval would not reduce the value of any property within the district, nor otherwise be injurious, obnoxious or offensive to the neighborhood.
 - 3. There will be no nuisance or serious hazard to vehicles or pedestrians.
 - 4. Adequate and appropriate facilities will be provided for the proper operation of the proposed use.
 - (b) A Special Exception is valid only for the business or location for which it is issued. It shall expire upon termination of the enterprise to which it is assigned.
 - (c) Any addition, expansion or alteration of an existing use for which a Special Exception has been granted must receive a new Special Exception.
 - (d) The cost of advertising and costs of mailing the notices of hearings shall be payable by the person making the appeal prior to the hearing.

ARTICLE IV BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

4:01 Within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment of five (5) members, conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes, Annotated 1955. Thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the appointing Authority shall be responsible for filling vacancies and maintaining full membership in the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment here provided shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Section 67, Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes, Annotated 1955.

4:02 In addition to the general powers granted said Board of Adjustment by said Chapter 31, it may in harmony

with, and subject to its provisions:

(a) Allow slight variances from specific terms of this Ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.

ARTICLE V ADMINISTRATION

5:01 It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

5:02 Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall on their own initiative take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court, or by any other legal action.

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENT

6:01 The provisions of this Ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special Town Meeting by a majority of the voters present as provided by law.

ARTICLE VII GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 7:01 <u>Validity</u>. Should any section or provision of this Ordinance be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof.
- 7:02 <u>Interpretation</u>. In interpreting and applying the provisions of this Ordinance, they shall be held to be the minimum requirements for the promotion of the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the Town of Westmoreland and its citizens. The implied intent of the Ordinance shall be maintained. In addition to the general powers granted to the Board of Adjustment they shall allow slight variances from specific terms of this Ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.
- 7:03 Penalties and Remedy for Violations. Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance may be subject to a fine by the Board of Selectmen of not more than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day of said violation, plus any legal cost resulting in the enforcement of said violation.

7:04 Acceptance. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

BUILDING ORDINANCES FOR THE TOWN OF WESTMORELAND CHESHIRE COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE

ARTICLE I

1:01 To promote the health, safety, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare of the Town of Westmoreland and to protect and enhance the value of its properties, the following regulations are hereby enacted by the voters of Westmoreland.

ARTICLE II REGULATIONS

2:01 All land shall be subject to the following regulations, restrictions and conditions.

2:02 A new building more than 30 feet in height above the natural ground level must have prior approval of the Board of Adjustment.

2:03 No new building, exterior or interior, structure, or chimney shall be erected, or an existing structure or chimney be altered, without a building permit from the Building Inspector, to whom adequate plans of proposed building or alterations shall be submitted. No permit will be required for repairing the exterior or interior of a building if the total cost of such work, including labor and materials, does not exceed \$500.00. The fees for permits shall be according to the following schedule:

Living Area 4¢ per square foot
Basement 2¢ per square foot
Garage with house 2¢ per square foot
Garage or outbuildings 1¢ per square foot
Minimum fee....\$5.00

Fees must be paid to the Selectmen of the Town of West-moreland before a permit may be issued.

2:04 All building permits shall expire one year from date of issue. Extension may be granted upon application if required.

2:05 The Town Building Inspector shall base his approval or rejection on the provisions of this Ordinance. The requirements are as follows:

Every dwelling house, or other building or addition thereto, shall be set back a distance of at least 75 feet from the center line of any public road or highway, and shall be set back a distance of at

least 20 feet from adjacent property lines. Every dwelling house shall have a minimum ground floor area of 600 square feet, exclusive of porches, breezeways, garages, sheds or similar areas.

2:06 Foundations shall be continuous and be constructed of solid concrete, block, stone or other similar materials, extending at least four feet below the normal ground level. Accessory building may be set on brick, stone, concrete piers, or pressure-treated creosote posts, set 4" below ground level, completely enclosed to prevent leaves and other debris from collecting under the buildings. A concrete slab, designed by a registered engineer and app; roved by the building inspector, shall also be acceptable.

2:07 Every dwelling, other building, or addition to presently existing dwellings or buildings, is to be finished on the exterior in a permanent manner within a period of two (2) years.

2:08 All chimneys and fireplaces shall be constructed of stone, brick, concrete or cinder blocks, on a twelve (12) inch thick concrete footing. Width of footing for interior chimney shall be one foot wider in each direction than the width of proposed chimney. Width of footing for exterior chimneys shall be sixteen (16) inches wider in each direction than the width of the proposed chimney and set on top of the house foundation footing, but no less than four (4) feet below ground level. All masonry chimneys shall be lined with flue tile beginning at the footing and extending two (2) feet higher than the ridge of a peaked roof, or two (2) feet higher than a ten (10) foot measurement horizontally to the roof. All entrances to chimneys shall be of fireproof construction with each flue to have a cleanout at its base. Chimneys shall not be used to support beams or timbers in any manner. smoke pipe or thimble shall be installed so as to be within eighteen (18) inches of any combustible floor or ceiling unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible materials except when guarded by at least eight (8) inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and the combustible material. Flue tiles will be joined with refractory cement. Under no circumstances will mortar cement be permitted to join flues together. Prefabricated chimneys bearing the approved label of the National Board of Fire Underwriters shall also be allowed, provided they are installed in an approved manner.

2:09 No roof of any building shall be covered or recovered in whole or in part save with non-combustible

or fire-resistant roofing material.

2:10 Sewerage: All dwelling units used for permanent human occupancy must be supplied with running hot and cold water properly connected with the following fixtures: kitchen sink, lavatory sink, tub or shower, water closet. These fixtures must be connected with a septic tank and leach field which has been approved by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. The required septic tank and leach field must be of sufficient size to accommodate a water closet.

A family sized commercial dry composting toilet may be allowed in lieu of a water closet. Such a system must first be approved in writing by the local Board of Health based on the determination that said system will not endanger the health of any person or cause a nuisance and that the end product will be disposed of in a sanitary manner. All other requirements in the first paragraph of Section 2:10 must be met.

- 2:11 All electrical installations shall be in accordance with the requirements of the latest edition of the National Electric Code, the same being the standard of the National Board of Fire Underwriters for electrical wiring and apparatus.
- 2:12 All fuel burning equipment shall be installed in compliance with the latest edition of rules and regulations issued by the New Hampshire Board of Fire Control.
- 2:13 All construction unless otherwise covered by this Ordinance shall be governed by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International Inc. (BOCA).

ARTICLE III TOWN BUILDING INSPECTOR

- 3:01 For the purpose of this Ordinance, the Board of Selectmen shall annually appoint a Town Building Inspector who shall perform the duties pertaining to his office as designated in the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 3:02 The Building Inspector shall in all cases, visit the site of any proposed building or remodelling in company of the owner of the site before issuing a building permit. He shall satisfy himself that the proposal will meet all requirements of the Town Building and Zoning Ordinances.
- 3:03 No building permit shall be issued until the Building Inspector has certified that the proposed building or structure and its intended use comply with the provision of this Ordinance.

3:04 It shall be unlawful for any person to commence work on erection or alteration of any building or structure until a permit has been duly granted for such erection or alteration by the Building Inspector.

3:05 The Building Inspector shall not issue a building permit before the securing of a driveway permit, if a new driveway is required. Any new drive from a town public road shall require a driveway permit from the Town Road Agent. Factors to be considered include a safe location, suitable grade at its junction with the public road and adequate drainage.

3:06 <u>Certificate of Occupancy</u>: No building shall be used and no building shall be changed to another use until a certificate of occupancy shall have been issued by the Building Inspector only after the Building Inspector has inspected the property and finds that it complies with all provisions of the Building and Zoning Ordinances of the Town.

ARTICLE IV ADMINISTRATION

4:01 It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority, to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance. The Board of Selectmen shall act as arbitrator to resolve any differences between the applicant and the Building Inspector.

4:02 The Board of Selectmen shall require that the application for a building permit include a plot plan and contain all necessary information to enable the Building Inspector to ascertain whether the proposed building or structure and its intended use comply with the provisions of this Ordinance.

4:03 Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall on their own initiative take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court, or by any other legal action.

ARTICLE V AMENDMENTS

5:01 The provisions of this Ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special Town Meeting by a majority of the voters present as provided by law.

The Westmoreland Volunteer Fire Department had a very active year. We responded to fifty-two (52) alarms of which four (4) were serious structure fires and one (1) a serious brush fire. Two (2) men were injured at fires this year and utilized the town's insurance coverage.

The department presently has twenty-eight (28) members. We obtained four (4) new members, one (1) of which was our first female firefighter and we lost two

(2) members through resignation.

This past year we obtained the following new equipment: two (2) hand lights, two (2) $2\frac{1}{2}$ " to $1\frac{1}{2}$ " reducers, one (1) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " cap, two (2) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " nozzles, a ten foot attic ladder, two (2) pair of bolt cutters, and vehicle batteries for 36M4. In addition, we received a generous donation of a 4000 watt alternator. With volunteer labor and the purchase of a ten horsepower gasoline engine, we now have a portable power plant to run lights, our smoke

ejector, etc.

All our committees have been active this year. The Drill Committee executed fifteen (15) drills that included the detailed development and trial run of a Mutual Aid pre-plan for the County Farm and a tour of Cedarcrest. In addition, they compiled a complete book which includes standard operating procedures, detailed maps of the various sections of town with landmarks noted and all waterholes listed, and pre-plans for Park Hill and the County Farm, along with other pertinent information. The Building Committee continued to make progress on the fire station addition with plans for completion in the late spring of 1981. The Ways and Means Committee sponsored square dances in the winter and spring and ran the Annual Chicken Barbeque and Fireworks. The Fire Prevention Committee made a presentation and provided several handouts on fire prevention at the school during Fire Prevention Week. A new committee was formed to recommend to the department what it should have for a new tanker, how much it will cost, and how it will be financed. This committee is still out.

We are always looking for members of the community who would like to volunteer their time and energies - we meet the 3rd Tuesday of every month at 8:00PM at the fire station.

GOALS COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE PLANNING BOARD

PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT AND HISTORICAL PRESERVATION

GOAL: To maintain the rural character of the Town, both natural and man-made. Roads, stone walls, brooks, woodlots, fields and swamps all contribute to the natural character. The fine older structures in Park Hill, East Westmoreland, and the South Village, as well as the extensive use of land for agriculture, and the scattering of individual homes throughout the hills and valleys, contribute to the man-made character of Westmoreland.

RECOMMENDATIONS: To maintain strong building codes and subdivision regulations to avoid over-use of the Town's land resources, and to avoid conditions which will be detrimental to the general welfare of both the community and individual neighborhoods.

Encourage the retention of agriculture as a major land use asset of the community.

To preserve stone walls, tree-lined lanes and scenic roads through the adoption of maintenance and improvement standards which are compatable with sound engineering standards - as long as public health and safety are protected.

Establish historic districts, where appropriate.

Protect swamps, brooks and wetlands both for their ecological features and for their ability to lessen flood potential, lessen soil erosion and preservation of water quality.

Protect fragile lands such as steep hillsides and areas of shallow or highly erosive soils.

Preserve woodlots and fields as a resource for food, fibre and fuel production.

Plan for acquisition by Town of Connecticut river frontage and/or right of way for recreational purposes, safety and civil defense needs.

GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC FACILITIES

- GOAL: Since there is general satisfaction with the existing Town government and services, the goal should be to maintain the existing services with minimum financial expense to respond to needs and desires of community.
- RECOMMENDATIONS: Maintain an adequate waste disposal facility for the health and well-being of the Town.

Encourage more participation in Town functions so that government will be responsive to the wishes of a maximum number of its citizens.

Limit Town Hall as a facility for competitive sports so that its interior and structure can be maintained in a safe condition and explore an alternate recreational facility for Youth Activities.

Make better use of Town Hall to meet existing and future requirements of Town functions.

Expand the library so that it can respond properly to the increasing educational and leisure needs of the Town's citizens.

Provide administrative assistance to Selectman to relieve them of clerical tasks.

Have continuing education for Town officers to keep up-to-date on current laws and procedures.

HOUSING

- GOALS: Provide the ability for a choice in housing, without sacrificing the intrinsic qualities that make Westmoreland unique. This housing should provide shelter for old and young, large and small families of all types.
- RECOMMENDATIONS: Relate new housing developments to the physical conditions of the land, by developing a land use plan based in part on soil mapping as part of the community's Plan.

Encourage types of development which conserve land with preservation of open space.

Have periodic updating of building and zoning codes to protect life and safety.

TRANSPORTATION

GOALS: Maintain an adequate transportation network without sacrificing the integrity of the Town's residential neighborhoods.

RECOMMENDATIONS: Continue regular road maintenance, brush cutting and bridge inspections.

Make available transportation at a reasonable cost while keeping rural character of Town.

Meandering country lanes should be maintained in a natural condition to preserve the rural character and aesthetic value of the community while encouraging slow, safe driving.

Consider all or some of Town roads as SCENIC roads (article on warrant required).

Maintain an up-to-date list of the status of all roads.

EDUCATION

GOALS: Provide equal opportunity for a quality education for children of the Town.

RECOMMENDATION: Provide adequate space for education, learning and extra-curricular activities that consider basic minimum standards. Sufficient tax monies from whatever sources should be set aside for this purpose.

Local home rule while taking benefits from state and federal sources.

Insofar as possible with available space, the eight (8) elementary grades should remain in Westmoreland.

Provide an educational atmosphere that will adequately prepare students for High School so that they can develop into responsible citizens.

Encourage cooperation in purchasing books between Town and school libraries.

Consider better provision of transportation for High School extra-curricular activities.

Expand activities of Recreation Committee to coordinate with school.

ECONOMIC ENVIRONMENT

- GOALS: Try to maintain present rural character of Town while giving careful consideration to all proposals for new construction.
- RECOMMENDATIONS: Discourage any proposal resulting in large development which causes a premature or unusual expenditure of public funds to provide new or expanded services.

Encourage older citizens to remain in Town by prudent expenditure of public funds in relation to an expansion of the tax base.

Avoid strip development, since it is an inefficient use of land and expenditure of public funds for services.

OPEN SPACE AND RECREATION

- GOALS: The Town should encourage the preservation of open space, both for its functional uses, and for the social and psychological well-being of its residents.
- RECOMMENDATIONS: Keep property taxes to a minimum to encourage larger land holdings than five (5) acre lots.

Use such mechanisms as development rights, etc. to preserve open space of all types.

Evaluate carefully plans for development regarding the land's value for agriculture or open space.

Town too small to maintain specialized recreational facilities. If special facilities like swimming pools, tennis courts, etc. are desired, they should be funded privately.

PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT - 1980

The Public Library has had a busy year with various activities and several improvements to the building.

Funds from the Library Improvement Fund were used to construct two new bookshelves. Jerry McCollough and Sid Fitzgerald donated their time and skills to make the shelves, and Mr. and Mrs. Carl Walley stained and varnished them. One bookcase is being used for the juvenile nonfiction collection, and the other holds reference books and the magazine collection.

Revenue Sharing funds were made available to the Library, and have been used to repair the piers under the

floor and to install a storm door.

The Friends of the Library have been active, sponsoring several programs and raising funds. A very successful Easter Egg hunt was held, and the group held a Christmas crafts event for children that was very well attended. Another popular event was Robert Cox's slide presentation of "Old Homes in Westmoreland." In December the Friends had a successful bake sale which began a series of fund

raisers which will enable the Library to purchase a movie projector in order to make use of the many films

available through the State Library.

The task of cross-checking the books with the card catalogue is being continued by the Friends. Mrs. Anne Lawson and Mrs. Fran Laurent have generously given many hours over the past two years to this project. They have recently completed the juvenile section and have begun work on the adult books. The Library is extremely grateful for this help with a tedious task.

In May the Librarian and Trustees sponsored a slide lecture by Jim and Debbie Langley about their crosscountry bicycle tour. During the summer, the library held a weekly story hour for children, and during the school year the kindergarten has been making weekly trips to the Library to select books and hear a story. The fifth and sixth grades from the Elementary School have

also made several trips to the Library.

The Library was certified by the State Library Commission, and continues to enjoy books from the Bookmobile. In addition, the Library has recently been able to enroll in the Centralized Card Service, available through the State Library. This service enables the Library to receive complete sets of catalog cards for each of its new purchases. These are at no cost except for the postage used to send in the list of books for which cards are needed.

Fifty-two special requests were made for books from the State Library. 162 films were requested and supplied to Maplewood and Cedarcrest. The Library continues to be a member of the Nubanusit Library Coop which helps to

reduce costs for books and supplies.

A 1980 World Book Encyclopedia was purchased this year with money from the Special Book Fund. Volumes from the 1975 encyclopedia are now available for circulation.

WESTMORELAND SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 14, 1980

Agreeable to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the moderator, Carlson D. Barrett at 10:00 AM. Article 1 was then read by the moderator and after declaring the polls open for voting, the business meeting was adjourned until 7:30 PM.

At 7:30 PM the business meeting was called to order by the moderator. Mr. Barrett then reviewed his rules of procedure.

The warrant was then read.

Article 1. Reginald Simino made the motion which was seconded by David Leinster - Moved to hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Discussion followed. Reference was made to Article 6 in last years warrant on the Building Committee report which had not been received by the voters. The chairman of the school board replied that a verbal report was given to the school board. A member of the committee then reported on their findings. Motion passed.

Article 2. Lenville Meserve made the motion which was seconded by April Ferguson - To see if the District will vote toauthorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. Motion passed with no discussion.

Article 3. Ann Ray made the motion which was seconded - To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 to fund the design and bid phase of renovations and additions to the Westmoreland Elementary School to include a pitched roof with solar heat, two classrooms, multi-purpose gymnasium, teachers' room, storage room and possible expansion of the library. A lengthy discussion followed. A detailed description of the article, item by item, was given by the school board. A motion was made for a vote by show of hands which was seconded. An amendment was then made requesting a ballot vote which was also seconded. In acting on the amendment, and by voice vote, the amendment failed. A vote by show of hands was then taken with 76 YES votes

and 46 NO votes. Motion passed.

Article 4. A motion was made and seconded that Article 4 be passed over. Motion passed.

Article 5. The motion was made by Ann Ray and seconded - To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,999.21 as a deficit appropriation for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1980. Discussion followed. It was noted the reason for a large part of the deficit was the increase in fuel prices and the school tuition. Motion passed.

Article 6. The motion was made and seconded - To see if the District will authorize the establishment of a public kindergarten within the Westmoreland School District, and further, to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,700.00 to effectuate the purpose of this article. Said kindergarten would remain in the Town Hall until space becomes available in the Westmoreland Elementary School. Discussion followed. A vote by show of hands was then taken with 27 YES votes and 100 NO votes. Motion defeated.

Article 7. A motion was made by Reginald Simino and seconded - To see if the District will vote to henceforth elect its district officers by separate ballot at the Town election. Discussion. Motion passed.

Article 8. Ann Ray then made a motion with a second by David Adams - Moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$544,744 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Discussion followed. An inquiry was then made as to where the \$544,744 figure came from as the school boards figure in the 1980-81 budget was \$551,244. It was then noted that the figure of 6500 was deleted under account 4000 which then resulted in the requested figure. An amendment to the motion was then made by Bob Moore and seconded that the figure be reduced by 2400. for a corrected budget of \$542,344. Further discussion followed. It was noted that this figure shows in the budget under account 2000 - Support Services for guidance/testing. A motion was then made and seconded for a hand vote on the amended motion of \$542,344. The vote was 53 YES and 35 NO. Motion passed.

Article 9. Motion made and seconded. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Motion passed.

Article 10. Motion made and seconded to transact

any other business which may legally come before this meeting. Mr. Brown requested an opinion of the voters relative to a guidance councilor. This was a non-binding vote. Mr. Howard requested that the school committee furnish to the residents of the town, one (1) month prior to the next school meeting the school population history of the last five years and expected population for the next five years. It was noted at this time the school reports did not show this year the population of the school by grades, etc. The motion was made and seconded. Motion passed.

A motion was made by Mr. Herrick and seconded that the annual school meeting be moved back to the Town Hall another year. Motion passed.

A motion was made by Mr. Gordon that hereafter, Roberts' Rules of Order would be used at all school meetings. The motion was seconded and discussed. Motion defeated.

At 10:48 PM the business meeting was adjourned and the polls closed.

The ballots were then counted. Number of votes cast: 126.

For moderator for the ensuing year - Carlson D. Barrett - 126 votes and was declared elected.

For clerk for the ensuing year - Earl B. Spaulding, Jr. - 125 votes and was declared elected.

For member of the School Board for the ensuing three years - Robert M. Moore, Jr. - 102 votes and was declared elected.

For treasurer for the ensuing year - Rodman R. Tatnall - 122 votes and was delcared elected.

For district auditor for two years - Griffith Royea received 29 votes and was declared elected.

The oath of office was then given to the elected officials by the moderator and clerk.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

The 1979-80 school year presented numerous challenges for your school district and its staff. The ever increasing inflation rate has made itself felt in all the goods and services purchased by the school district. The staff has worked hard and long to maintain a quality education for our children in the face of ever increasing prices. This has proved to be difficult in that costs for some educational supplies are budgeted one year prior to purchasing. The staff is to be congratulated for their efforts.

The student testing program is in its second year of operation. All students were given a full range achievement test in the spring of 1980. These tests were used to evaluate the programs for the 1979-80 school year and for the planning of the 1980-81 school year. Parents are encouraged to meet with their child's teacher to review the results of these achievement tests which will be given on an annual basis.

The Accountability Testing Committee has developed and administered tests in the areas of mathematics and social studies in Grades 5, 8, and 11. The results of these tests will be distributed to your school board and made public for comment and review. The Language Arts Accountability tests are now being developed and will be administered to the students in the spring of 1981.

The administration will present to the school board and general public a management plan using the results received from the accountability testing program. This management plan will outline any changes in curriculum or methodology which may be required as a result of these tests.

The town's Curriculum Council has developed a draft of a Language Arts Curriculum Continuum for Grades 1 through 8. This guide will be distributed to all town teachers in September of 1980, and will be used as a pilot curriculum guide for the 1980-81 school year. These guides will be reviewed during the summer of 1981 using comments received from all teachers. The Language Arts Curriculum Guide will then be presented to all town school boards in August of 1981 for their adoption as the Language Arts Curriculum Guide for Grades 1 through 8.

The town's Curriculum Council will begin work on a Mathematics Curriculum Guide in the spring of 1981. This guide will be implemented during the 1982-83 school year.

Your staff and administration are deeply involved

in improving the quality of education offered to our children. We believe that a school either improves or becomes poorer - it seldom just "holds its own." No school or school system is so good that it cannot improve.

We wish to thank the school board and staff for their aid and cooperation in the past year. We also appreciate their willingness to devote the long hours which are necessary to manage and operate an effective school system.

Through their efforts, the students at the school have been and will be exposed to a variety of programs, each one a different learning experience. We have so far made masks, learned American folk songs and learned about magic. We will be making pottery, learning more about contra dance, and making baskets from nature's materials. It is my hope that this committee will continue with their fine work.

I would like to thank all the members of the community for the help and assistance, which was shown to me during my stay at the school. It has been a truly memorable experience which I will not soon forget. I have been very proud to be the principal of your fine school and I wish the students, staff, parents, and friends of the school continued good luck.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Several preventative health programs were held during this school year. There was a special human development course presented to the 7th and 8th grade by Dr. Charles McMurphy. This was well presented and greatly appreciated by the students.

The two dental programs were quite successful with eager participation by the students. The program of dry-brush and flouride rinse sponsored by the State Department of Dental Health was again offered and included grades 1-5. Hopefully grades 1-6 will be involved next school year. About 74 youngsters participated. The second dental program was performed by Susan Merritt, R.D.H. and included a cleaning of the teeth and an application of topical flouride. Many thanks Sue, for a job well done! Also I would like to express my thanks to all the mothers who volunteered their help with this wonderful program. The PTA again offered their assistance and students, including Kindergarten, took advantage of this program.

Physical examinations were performed by the school physician, Dr. Charles McMurphy, for all students participating in sports, and for 4th and 8th graders. A total of 72 physicals were performed and two referrals were made. Each child who had a physical had his blood pressure checked and a urine test done. Height and weight were done on each student and plotted on growth charts to note their growth progress.

Vision and hearing screening were done for every student. Twelve referrals for vision problems were made, and two hearing referrals were made.

There were 23 accidents which occured at the school, which needed medical treatment, some needing a doctor's attention. Fortunately, none were serious.

Tuberculosis tests were done on a few of the school staff members and all of the 4th and 8th grade students (total 45). There were no referrals made, all tests results were negative.

Another project this year was trying to update the immunization records for all of the students. The State Department of Communicable Diseases would like to have 100% protection of all school children in New Hampshire. This is a tremendous job which requires full cooperation.

The school year was a busy, but enjoyable one and I shall miss the supportive staff, parents, and especially

the wonderful students of the Westmoreland School.

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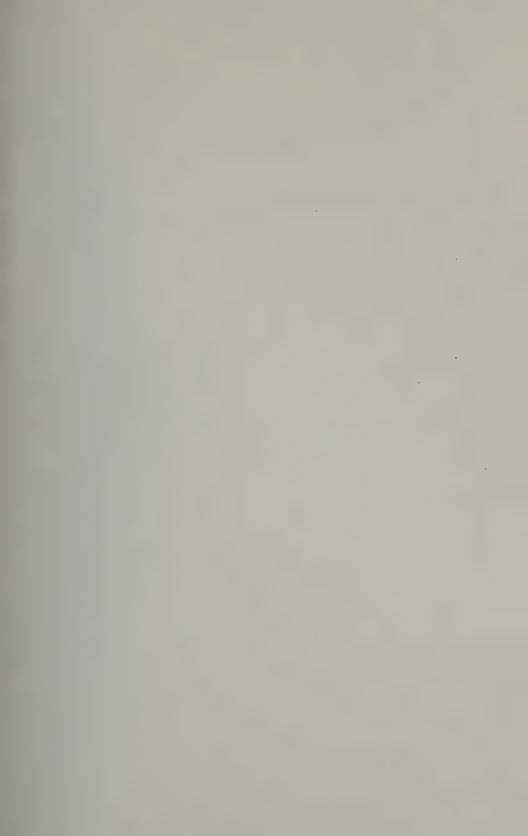
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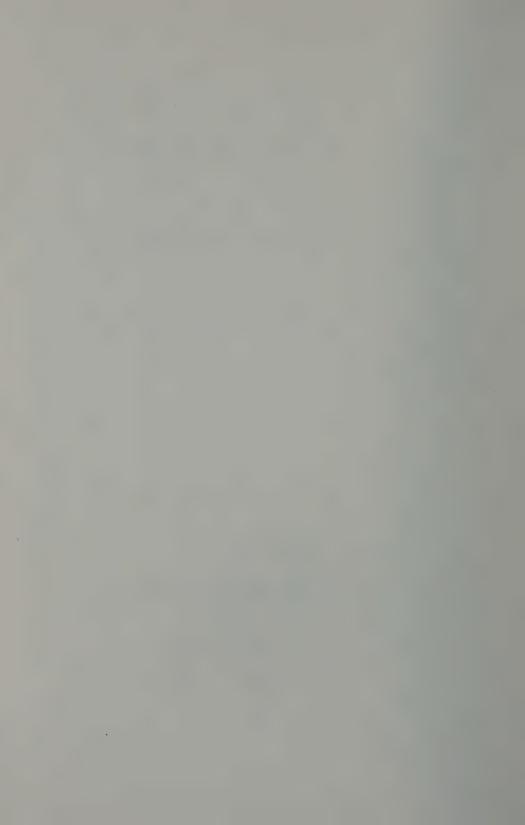

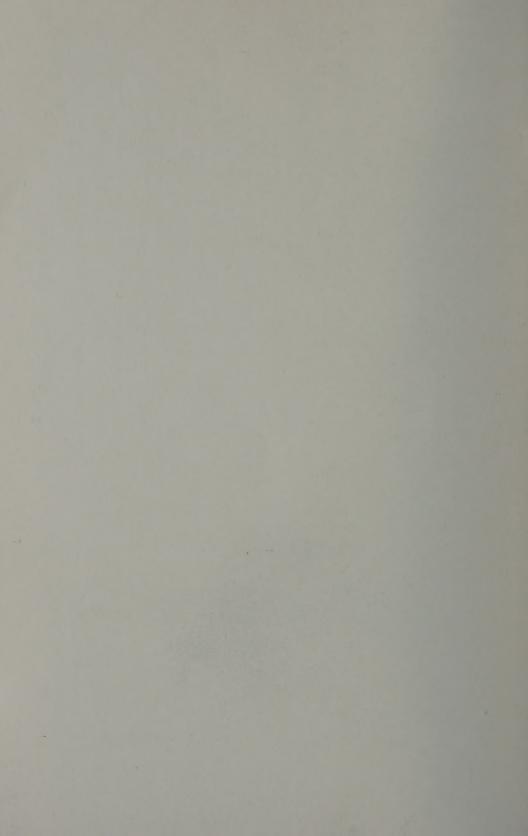
