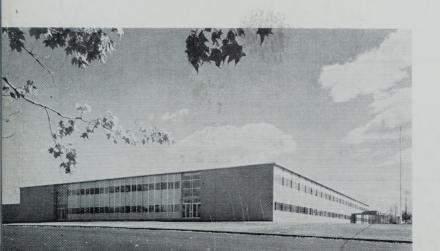

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, WOLFEBORO, N. H.

March 10, 1964

Brewster Memorial Hall

10:00 A. M.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the meeting was called to order at 10:00 A. M. by Moderator, Robert F. Thurrell.

The Moderator read the first three articles pertaining to election of Town Officers; also, Articles eleven and twelve, relative to choosing Delegates to the Constitutional Convention and "Shall Sweepstakes Tickets be sold in this town?"

The motion was made by Ford Smith, that the reading of the balance of the warrant be omitted at this time. It was seconded; voice vote was in the affirmative, and so declared by the Moderator. The balance of the warrant to be read at the evening session.

Balloting started at 10:00 A. M. and continued until 7:00 P. M. Approximately 800 voters weathered the storm to cast their ballots.

7:00 P. M.

Meeting was called to order by Moderator, Robert F. Thurrell.

Forrest Durkee made the motion to refrain from reading the warrant in its entirety, providing each article be read in full before being acted upon. It was seconded by Norman Hale; voice vote was in the affirmative, and so declared by the moderator.

Article 4. Donald Savard made the motion that the Selectmen be authorized to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise. Motion was seconded by Winston Hamm and voice vote was in the affirmative.

Article 5. Motion was made by Dr. Toms that the Selectmen authorize the Tax Collector to allow a discount on real estate taxes if paid before December 1st, at a rate of discount not to exceed the rate at which the Town can borrow money on short term notes. Motion was seconded and voice vote was in the affirmative.

Article 6. Dr. Toms made the motion to authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes. Motion was seconded by Willard Whiting, and voice vote was in the affirmative.

Article 7. Motion was made by Dr. Toms to authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a Deputy under the provisions of Section 42, Chapter 80 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended by Chapter 7 of the Laws of 1945. Motion seconded by Dorothy Morse; voice vote was in the affirmative.

Article 8. Norman Hale made the motion that the Town approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the

report and listed in the Budget. The motion was seconded by Howard Bean. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

Before voting on the Article, Edward Zulauf asked if there were any questions on the Budget; if so, the Selectmen would be glad to explain. There were no questions.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 1038.00 for the purchase of Life, Accident, and Health Insurance for all Town employees. Edward Zulauf explained to the voters the reason for this type insurance. The motion was made by Mr. Zulauf to adopt the article. Seconded by Norman Hale. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

In adopting this article, the employees of the Municipal Electric Department and the Water and Sewer Department will be covered, the cost for these employees will be paid by the respective departments.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote the following Roads or Portions subject to gates and bars; namely: The North Wakefield Road, The Bickford or Maplecrest Road from the intersection of Chick Road to the Stoneham Road. There was some discussion on this Article, which was explained by Lawrence Toms. After which, he made the motion to adopt the article. Seconded by Howard Bean. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

Article 11. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention, was voted in the affirmative by State issued ballots.

Article 12. To vote on the question "Shall Sweepstakes tickets be sold in this city or town?"; was voted in the affirmative by State issued ballots.

Article 13. To determine if the Town will vote to discontinue for Town highway use, the following portions of old Route 28, so designated on plan of relocation construction project TLR No. 14, 192. A motion was made by Dr. Toms to amend Article 13, to read as follows:

To determine if the Town will vote to discontinue for Town highway use, the following portions of old Route 28, so designated on plan of relocated construction project TLR No. 14, 192 & TLR 14, 184 with changes as follows:

- 1. and 2. to remain the same
- 3. Station 399.+25 to 427+50 TLR 14192 (to provide access to present driveway of Sidney Adjutant)
- 4. Station 269+00 to 276+00 TLR 14184 (meaning east of present driveway of Bernard W. Pineo, Sr. on Route 28)

After an explanation of the above as to location and mean-

ings, Dr. Toms made the motion to adopt the Article as amended. Seconded by Howard Bean. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Edward Zulauf called the names of the Budget Committee; all present stood and were recognized with applause. The polls were reopened for all those in the hall wishing to vote. Motion was made and seconded to adjourn. The moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 8:15 P. M.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

May 12, 1964

Brewster Memorial Hall

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, the meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Robert F. Thurrell.

After the reading of the Warrant, by the Moderator, Eliot U. Wyman explained the technicality necessitating a repeat of the November 5th, 1963 Special Town Meeting, which was due to a revised act of the 1955 Legislature.

Article 1. The motion was made by Eliot U. Wyman, and seconded by Carl Shannon to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$110,000.00 for the following purposes, and to raise the sum so appropriated by borrowing on the credit of the Town through the issuance and sale of bonds:

(a) To construct a new 12" cement lined cast iron water main from the Regulating valve at Pine Hill Cemetery to the Chlorinator building, a distance of approximately 6400 feet.

\$91,500 00

(b) To lay a new 10" water main to serve the new Co-operative High School.

15,000 00

(c) To install an altitude valve at the North Main Street Standpipe. Above article approved by Budget Committee

3,500 00

Show of hands was a unanimous vote to adopt the article as read and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 2. The motion was made by Norman A. Hale, and seconded by Lawrence S. Toms to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$60,000.00 for the purpose of enlarging pumping facilities and capacity of the Sewer Plant and to raise the sum so appropriated by borrowing on the credit of the Town through the issuance and sale of bonds.

Above article approved by Budget Committee.

Show of hands was a unanimous vote to adopt the article as read; and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 3. The motion was made by Norman A. Hale, and seconded by Lawrence S. Toms to authorize refinancing of the

present indebtedness of the Water and Sewer Department up to the amount of \$117,000.00 by borrowing on the credit of the Town through the issuance and sale of bonds.

Show of hands was a unanimous vote to adopt the article as read; and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 4. No further business. Eliot Wyman made the motion to adjourn; seconded by Howard Avery. Therefore, the meeting was adjourned at 8:20 P. M.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Gym in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, from ten A. M. until 7 P. M. for the casting of ballots, and at 7 P. M. to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and Town Constable for the ensuing year; one Auditor for two years, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Water & Sewer Commissioner for three years, five members of the Budget Committee, three for three years, one for two years, and one for one year, two Parks and Playgrounds Commissioners for three years, one Fire Commissioner for three years, one Municipal Electric Light Commissioner for three years, two Police Commissioners, one for three years, one for two years and one or more Overseers of the Poor for one year.

ARTICLE 2. To choose one highway agent, or to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to authorize the Tax Collector to allow a discount on real estate taxes if paid before December 1st, at a rate of discount not to exceed the rate at which the Town can borrow money on short term notes.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a Deputy under the provisions of Section 42, Chapter 80 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended by Chapter 7 of the Laws of 1945.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and listed in the Budget.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$23,700.00 for the relocation and rebuilding of Forest Road. This sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes for three years, with the understanding that revenue under the State Town Road Aid Program will be used to repay the larger portion of the amount over the next three years.

ARTICLE 10. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$5,000. for the purpose of participating in the Economic Urban Development Program No. 701.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a Community Study Committee, (which may include representation from education, law enforcement, clergy, service, fraternal, governmental, or other groups), said Committee not to exceed eleven members.

To raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$100. for Committee expenses, said Committee to conduct a comprehensive townwide survey studying current uses of leisure time and present available facilities; interests of children, youth, adults, and senior citizens; the committee shall prepare and present a progress report and hold at least one public meeting for said purpose. A final report with recommendations to be given at a Special Town Meeting to be held not later than October 15, 1965.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Representatives of the Town of Wolfeboro and the General Court of the State of New Hampshire to submit a bill to said General Court providing for the repeal of Chapter 377 of the Laws of 1959 entitled "AN ACT ESTABLISHING A POLICE COMMISSION OF THE TOWN OF WOLFEBORO."

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to specify that the money in the "Goodwin Fund" shall be reserved for the specific purpose for building a FIRE STATION or a combined Fire Station and Town Office Building at such time as a suitable site and additional funds are available.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to give a ninety-nine year lease to the Harriman Hale Post No. 18, Incorporated of the following described land at a rental fee of one dollar per year with the express conditions that said premises shall be used for a Little League Park, Skating and Hockey Rink, and for such other public beneficial uses as Harriman Hale Post No. 18, Incorporated in its sole discretion shall deem advisable, and with the further express condition that the lessee shall not have the right to sublet nor assign said lease;

Beginning at the land of the Boston and Maine Railroad at land of Jutras, and running in a general southeasterly direction 850 feet more or less to land of Wolfeboro Shopping Center, Inc.; thence running in a southwesterly direction along the Wolfeboro Shopping Center, Inc., 207.7 feet to a point; thence running northwesterly 34 feet to a point; thence running southwesterly 80 feet to a point; thence running in a general northwesterly direction 1012.6 feet to Boston and Maine Railroad Property; thence running in a general northeasterly direction by Boston and Maine Railroad Property 460 feet more or less to land of Jutras, the point of beginning. Containing 6.3 acres, more or less. Together with and subject to existing Rights of Way.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Article:

OFF-STREET PARKING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF WOLFEBORO

It is the intention of this ordinance that all structures and land uses shall have a sufficient amount of off-street automobile parking to meet the needs of persons employed at, or making use of, such structures or land uses. No permit for the moving, erection or substantial alteration of a building, or for a use, nor approval of a subdivision shall be issued unless off-street automobile parking facilities shall have been laid out in a plan in accordance with the appropriate requirements for structures and uses set forth in this ordinance and approved by the Zoning Permit Officer, or, in the case of subdivisions, by the Wolfeboro Town Planning Board.

Any extension or any enlargement of a building which increases the floor area by 50 per cent shall contitute a "substantial alteration" regardless of the costs of such extension or enlargement.

EFFECT ON EXISTING USES: Structures and land uses in existence at the time this ordinance becomes effective or structures and uses for which permits have been approved at the time this ordinance becomes effective shall not be subject to the requirements set forth in this ordinance provided that any parking facilities now existing to serve such structures or uses shall not in the future be reduced, except where they exceed such requirements, in which case they may not be reduced below such requirements.

REGULATIONS

Section 1. In all districts there shall be provided facilities for off-street parking for every building hereafter constructed or enlarged as described above for commercial, industrial, multiple family residence or single family residence purposes. All such parking areas shall be graded and have a minimum of 20 feet as a means of access and a minimum of 20 feet as a means of egress

where separate means are provided; and be otherwise adapted to the parking of vehicles and shall be kept available therefor. Where only one means for both access and egress is provided, the width of the means shall be a minimum of 25 feet. In the case of single family residences, 11 feet width will suffice. A parking area for one vehicle shall be not less than 160 square feet plus space for maneuvering.

Number of parking spaces to be provided:

- 1. Residences, Multiple Housing and Apartment Houses: One car space for each family unit, provided that, in the case of boarding houses or dwellings partially devoted to rental of rooms, in addition to the car space for each family unit there shall be one space for each guest sleeping room.
- 2. Stores or other places conducting retail business one space for each 100 square feet of floor area plus one space for each 5 employees.
- 3. Offices, Banks and Similar Business: One space for each 300 square feet of floor area plus one space for each 5 employees.
- 4. Theatres, Funeral Homes, and Places of Assembly one space for each 5 seats; in the case of Bowling Alleys, 2 spaces for each alley.
- 5. Hotels, Motels and the like one space for each two guest sleeping room plus one space for each 5 employees.
 - 6. Industries one space for each 4 employees.
- 7. Restaurants and other places serving food or beverages one space for each five seats plus one space for each 5 employees. Drive-in establishments shall provide one space for each 50 square feet of floor area, plus one space for each 5 employees.
- 8. Home occupation, or accessory use one space for each non-resident employee, plus adequate off-street spaces for clients or customers.
- 9. Gasoline Station, repair or storage garage or automobile salesroom adequate off-street parking spaces for customers and employees.
- 10. Hospitals One space for each 1,500 square feet gross floor area.

LOADING AND UNLOADING AREAS

Hotels, restaurants and business or industrial establishments shall provide adequate space for loading and unloading all vehicles used incidental to their operation in addition to the facilities required for customer or employee parking.

SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS

Where the space required above cannot be reasonably provided, the Wolfeboro Zoning Board of Adjustment may grant relief by Special Exception following the procedure and taking into consideration the conditions, where applicable, as set forth in the Wolfeboro Planning and Zoning Ordinance.

VALIDITY

The validity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision or the validity of the Ordinance as a whole.

ARTICLE 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Selectmen's Progress Report

During the past 12 month period, the Selectmen have been concerned with their statutory duties, such as the Town Inventory, and the conduct of the Town Officers and functions of those offices. The Board as presently constituted, has endeavored to live up to the expression "Town Fathers."

This Board of Selectmen has and will attempt to have the highest degree of fidelity to the wishes of the taxpayer. Ultimately, it is the beleagured taxpayer who not only pays the bills of the Town of Wolfeboro, but also expresses his desires by his actions during the Town Meetings. For example, some years ago the Town voted to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act. It is the opinion of this Board that all Departments should adhere to this Law as enacted.

Along with the foregoing action, the Selectmen have taken the annual inventory and set the tax rate, which seems to be ever ascending. The annual increase this past year was \$186,879. The Board had hopes of a larger increase, however service exemption laws were revised by the past General Court resulting in an increase in the number and amount of exemptions to a total of \$281,200., an increase of \$59,800.

Serving as Trustees of the Libby Museum, the Board secured the services of Jackson Emery to serve as the Curator. The choice was a fortunate one, as the Museum has shown a modest profit for the first time since the Selectmen were appointed as Trustees, and will need no tax support this year, also a primary achievement.

Following the action of the 1964 Town Meeting, Life and Accident Insurance was secured for the Town Employees.

The Selectmen have been concerned with ideas and programs which, by the action of the Town Meeting, may or may not see fruition during the next year. The rebuilding of Forest Road has been one of these projects. Late in the summer of 1963, the Selectmen conducted a mail survey to ascertain the feeling of the residents along this road. It was their wish that if and when this road was rebuilt, that it would not become a "superhighway". It is along these lines that a program of rebuilding under the State Town Road Aid program has been followed. Except for money that will be used for purchase of right-of-way at the Carry and for Embankment Releases, the money borrowed will be repaid from funds provided by TRA program.

Another area of action has been the acquistion of the lower floor of Brewster Memorial Building presently occupied by Parsons Furniture. About April first, the Town will become the lessee for the purposes of providing adequate District Court facilities and the expansion of the present town offices, including a portion of the office force of the Light Department, which will enable the public to make Water, Light, and Tax payments in one area. It is hoped that funds will be available to provide space for expansion of the present police headquarters and also a portion for the State Police Troop Headquarters. It has also been taken under advisement that areas could be provided for the Chamber of Commerce, Trailways Bus, and public toilet facilities. Further exploration of the feasibility of these latter suggestions must be undertaken.

There are many areas that the Board has taken initial action. These and others will be discussed in future Town Reports. An Article in this years Town Meeting establishes an official committee for the study of the current status of youth, their problems, and what we as citizens may do to promote their ascension to adulthood. Secondly, a review of the Town's street lighting is to be undertaken. With the cooperation of the state highway department, plans are currently being considered for the construction of a side walk to the new Regional School. The initial action in this endeavor was undertaken by the Budget Committee as the need for such a facility was in the public interest. Without the State's cooperation, this construction would be an economic hardship on the community, already somewhat overwhelmed by the cost to the taxpayer of the new Regional School.

With the support of the State and Federal Governments, and the approval of the Town Meeting, a survey will be made of the various stages of growth that the Town is undergoing. With these results, the Planning Board may provide a plan for the town for its future growth and development.

Along with a look to the future, the Town must accept the responsibility to provide adequate recreation facilities for the summer resident and visitor. To this end, the present docks are rapidly becoming overcrowed and in some instances, in need of overhauling. Should the Brewster Trustees ever see fit to bar the Town from using the Brewster Beach, the only access the Town will have to the Lake, will be at the Carry. Consequently, a future Town Meeting will be asked to provide funds to procure more waterfront areas for the benefit of the visiting public.

BUDGET COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Your budget committee has had regular meetings since mid-January, consulting with department heads, commissioners, the Selectmen, and petitioners regarding their budgets and special requests for funds. The estimated receipts and expenditures of each budget were thoroughly studied and discussed item by item and our recommendations are submitted below for the consideration of the voters at Town Meeting.

A public hearing was held by the budget committee on January 18th at the Carpenter School. All department heads were present and each made a brief presentation of his proposed budget for the ensuing year. It is regrettable that these hearings are not better attended by the citizens, for they can be very informative and many misunderstandings can be clarified.

During the past year over 100 building permits were issued, thus we can expect an increase in our property tax revenue.

It should be understood that our two utilities, Water and Sewer Dept. and the Municipal Electric Dept., are self-sustaining and their budgets do not effect our tax rate. The reports of these two departments appear elsewhere in the Town Report.

The sums requested by many of the departments are the same as in 1964, those asking for significant increases are listed as follows:

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

The Selectmen's duties are continually increasing in scope and are requiring more and more time to perform. A salary increase of \$300.00 in total is recommended. Adjustment to clerical help wages amounts to approximately \$450.00. It is proposed that the town offices occupy the area being vacated by Parson's Furniture. This expansion would increase the rent \$1125.00 and in addition \$2000.00 has been set up for renovation of these new quarters.

PROTECTION OF PERSONS AND PROPERTY

The Police Department budget has been increased approxi-

mately \$2900.00 over 1964's expenditures for the purchase of a new adequately equipped cruiser, thus enabling the department to give better coverage of the town on a twenty-four hour basis with the help of the present cruiser. It is expected that this condition will greatly reduce mileage expenses. In addition, it is planned that the three permanent members of the force will all subscribe to the New Hampshire Police Retirement System, thus increasing the town's share about \$500.00.

The Fire Department's budget has been increased about \$3430.00 for an addition of one more regular fireman. This will decrease the eighty-four hour work week to one of approximately sixty-four hours for these men.

HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES

An increase of \$1250.00 gives the employees of this department full Blue Cross coverage, increased life insurance and vacation time.

OUTLAY FOR NEW CONSTRUCTION AND PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT

The following projects were approved:

New Garden Road bridge \$500.00; finish hot-topping the Mill Street project \$200.00; continue the improvement of the Beach Pond Road beyond Grover Moody's \$1,000.00; improvement of the Macomber Hill Road \$1,500.00; completing the Frost Corner project \$600.00; repairs to the Whitten Neck Bridge \$1,220.00.

The request of the Highway Department for a new pick-up truck \$2320.00 and a new Mack dump-truck \$7,330.00 was approved.

The proposed improvement of Forest Road was approved.

A petition requesting construction of a sidewalk from Clark Road to the Kingswood Regional High School was approved.

The petition requesting an appropriation of a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 for the purpose of participating in the Economic Urban Development Program No. 701 was approved. This project should be implemented under the direction of the Planning Board.

The petition regarding the appointment by the moderator of a committee of eleven for the purpose of making a survey of leisure-time activities and the present facilities available to the youth of our community was discussed and an appropriation of \$100.00 was recommended for this purpose.

The cooperation of the various department heads, commis-

sion personnel and the Selectmen in working with the budget committee is gratefully acknowledged in the preparation of this budget.

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

This is my fifteenth year as your Tax Collector, and it has been a busy and full year.

Mrs. Nary and I appreciate the confidence that the citizens of this town have had in us and our efforts to give understanding service.

A few outstanding facts should be of interest.

For the Tax Year of 1950, the Property Levy raised by taxation was \$192,185.99, while for 1964 the Warrant was for \$540,765.71.

The sum of all Warrants amounted to \$555,704.38.

It cannot be emphasized too strongly that Poll and Head Taxes are Demand Taxes, and are due when the bill is presented. Should a person who is liable, not receive a bill, it is that person's responsibility to ascertain why.

Persons signing an application for a driving license, registraton of a car, fishing or hunting license, should read carefully the affidavit before signing, as the Poll and Head Taxes for the previous year must be paid before applying.

Tax payers applying for the Veterans Exemption need to be sure that ALL outstanding taxes are paid by April 15th of the year following the levy. The application must be filed by April 15th. Last year a number of applications were disallowed.

Persons involved in the transfer of property should notify the Board of Selectmen and the Tax Collector of such a transfer, giving the name and address of the new owner.

When there is a change of address, the Board of Selectmen and the Tax Collector should be notified, as each year many tax bills are delayed in mailing because of the lack of an accurate address.

Boat Taxes, being personal property taxes, action can be taken to collect fourteen days after delivery of the tax bill.

If there is any question as regards a tax bill, it should be inquired into promptly, in order to avoid interest charges for delayed payment after December 1st of the tax year.

The Tax Collector maintains regular office hours three days a week, Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, from 9 A. M. until 1 P. M., at the Town Offices, and is available at home. Part time Tax Collectors are only required by Statute to be at the Town Offices one day a month. The Tax Collector of Wolfeboro is classified as a part time officer, and so compensated.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

James E. Bovaird, M. D. Wolfeboro, N. H.

December 27, 1964

Subject: Report of Health Officer

The year of 1964 has been a relatively healthy one in so far as contagious and infectious diseases are concerned. There was no case of poliomyelitis. Infectious mononucleosis was present in scattered numbers among the secondary school age group, but was not serious. Impetigo has also been diagnosed in a few cases.

Measles have occurred in epidemic form during the past month of December in all age groups from infancy through the teen ages, but mainly in the ages up to twelve years. As there has not been an epidemic for some years, there are many non-immunes in the ages from 6 months to 12 years. A fair number of the youngest children have received the live measles vaccine, and are protected. This live measles vaccine is relatively new. It is indicated mainly in the ages of 9 months to 4 years. It is expensive but it is worth it. Measles are serious in the younger age group and not so serious over the age of 3 or 4 years.

Your health officer investigated several complaints about odors especially from pig pens and cesspools and received the cooperation of the offenders in every instance. The laws of the State Board of Health are very specific as regards things that can be classed as a nuisance by the health department.

The centralization of the schools in the new school district has brought more children to our town during the school hours. We are fortunate in having Miss Mary Morse, R.N. in charge of nursing facilities, with Miss Vivian Savard, R. N. as her capable assistant, and the health problems of our schools are being met with excellent judgment. For many years our school system has been most fortunate in having Dr. Harold E. Gregory as school physician, a position he continues to hold and to perform most efficiently.

The Town of Wolfeboro also is fortunate in having available Mrs. Dorothy Hickey, R.N. as town nurse. It is hoped that her services will be utilized more adequately, especially for the preschool age group and also by the older citizens. We physicians, who were associated with Mrs. Hickey at Huggins Hospital when she was supervisor of nurses can vouch for her capabilities.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT — 1964

Due to the expenses of the last two years, very little new construction is planned for 1965.

The Altitude Valve which was scheduled for this year on North Main Street will be installed as soon as possible in the Spring.

The 12" Main that was laid this Summer gave us a greater volume of water, closer to meeting our demand, but is far from a cure-all.

Beech Pond dropped 44½" during the Summer which tends to indicate that it is not an endless source of water as its re-

covery is not fast enough.

It is felt by the Commissioners and Engineers that there is far too much waste of water. This is partially because there are so many people who feel that Beech Pond could supply any demand. Meter records, measurements on depth and ability to recover, prove that Beech Pond could very well get to a point where it could not supply our heavy summer demand.

It is therefore felt that the curfew on hoses should go into effect the middle of June instead of the first of July. Notice will be published in the local paper and if necessary sent by mail

to each customer.

Meter reading for one (1) full year: August 1, 1963 to August 1, 1964 — 257,613,500 gallons used. Highest minute reading recorded was 790 gallons per minute. This was on July 28, 1964 at 6:00 P. M.

Waste like this, not only puts hardship on you and the department, it also doesn't leave much water for the Fire Department, should there be a bad fire during this heavy domestic demand. Please cooperate.

HEREWITH A REPORT OF THE

Wolfeboro Police Commission

FOR THE YEAR 1964

Based on activities for the last six months

The past six months have shown many changes in the police department due, in part, to the hiring of a New Chief of Police, and a change in the telephone system from the central office located in town to the dial system, as well as changes in police proceedure which have been instituted. Some of the changes follow, with explanations.

It is generally accepted that the town of Wolfeboro has a population of twenty seven hundred year round residents. The fact is generally overlooked that there is, in addition to this figure a summer population of about twenty thousand for a period of three months. A mean average for the year would indicate a population of about seventy seven hundred population. A division of the police budget, as proposed by this Commission for the year 1965 would suggest a figure about three dollars and fifty cents per person per year as the cost to the town for

the police Commission and department. This figure is well below that figure experienced by towns with organized police departments within the state.

Within the town there are ten churches which require a great amount of traffic duty, especially during the summer season. Changes have been made which have proven to be satisfactory.

With the opening of the doors at Kingswood Regional High, problems were presented and steps taken to properly handle the situation. The problem of traffic supervision has not been a small one, although there has not been an accident at that location since the beginning of the school year. This would include the many extra-curricular activities which have taken place, for the most part during the weekends. The rivalry which was anticipated between schools within town has proven to be friendly and no problems have been experienced in that area. For the most part the young people in attendance at the various schools in town have been most cooperative with this department and special thanks go to them from the entire department.

There has been a major change in the security checks made during the night patrol. This has been proven to be very effective which is proven by the fact that sixty six doors and windows were found unlocked by the night patrol in the last six months of 1964. These matters have been taken care of to the satisfaction of those concerned and this department. As many as three checks are made in some areas during the patrol each night. Accurate reports are made during each such patrol.

Accurate reports have been given to newspapers, on their request and this has been of value to this department as well as to inform the townspeople of the work which is being done by their police department.

With the change of the telephone system and the advent of direct dialing, it became necessary, with the sanction of the town budget committee to employ a night dispatcher from ten PM to 6 AM. This has proven very satisfactory although the cost was not anticipated at the time of voting on the budget at town meeting. Plans are in process to alleviate this condition so that the services of the men now required to answer the phone during that period can be used to a better advantage within the department.

The question of twenty four hour coverage is a serious problem. At this time there are periods when there is no man on duty which necessitates that calls be answered by a man who may have just completed his tour of duty and then is called out for as many as three or four extra hours. No provisions were

made for this extra duty and the money necessary for this extra duty has been a problem.

Many new signs have been installed in places where they were thought to be necessary at town expense and some with the cooperation of the state highway department, at their expense. There are still many signs which should be installed or replaced and these will be taken care of in the ensuing year.

The matter of traffic in the square downtown and at Pickering Corner is a major problem and changes will be made early in the year. It is felt that traffic at the monument could be taken care of more satisfactorily with few changes and every attempt will be made to enlist the aid of the department of public works and highways of the state. This will be done as soon as arrangements are made.

It is planned to run a two man patrol during the summer months. This would apply to security checks and night patrol of highways as well as taking care of complaints which come in during the night hours. It is preferable not to run one man in a car during the night hours and we hope that this can be taken care of in the ensuing year.

The department wishes to thank all those who have assisted the men in the performance of their duties, especially the town departments, who have been so very kind in lending a hand to the new chief. Without their help and cooperation, his job would have been beyond his capabilities.

Special thanks from Chief Wentworth to the young people of Wolfeboro and the surrounding towns for their understanding and cooperation. A look at a newspaper on almost any day should be adequate proof that the conduct of the vast majority of these young people is a credit to themselves, their parents and their community.

The Parks and Playgrounds Commission had a meeting with the heads of Carpenter School, Brewster Academy, and Kingswood Regional High School; also the Home and Study Group from Tuftonboro; and worked out a formula agreeable to the schools, the Commission and Mr. Hersey. A new poly tow rope was installed. Due to the lack of snow, the tow started about a month late.

Brewster Beach

A new road from Clark Road to Brewster Beach was built and put into use when the beach opened for the season. This year we plan to make the parking lot larger by removing trees and putting in more fill. We plan to put more fill at the rear of the beach to fill the swamp.

A beach and bath house is planned for this summer. This bath house will be made of cement blocks with a cement slab for a base. We plan to remove the life guard house and toilets, and dressing room out of the beach area.

The Commissioners plan to have a street light installed at the beach for summer use. We plan a clean up at Rust Park in South Wolfeboro; also plan to regrade the Wolfeboro Falls Park this summer.

At this time I would like to thank Mrs. Alice Cole, and Mrs. Rachael Jones for all their help they have given to the Commission.

It has been a pleasure to serve the town on this commission, and I think everyone should serve at least a term to find out what the Commissioners do.

Thanks to the other commissioners for their cooperation in the three years that I have served with them.

Report of the Public Health Nursing Committee

1964

The Public Health Nursing Service again had a successful year. Mrs. Elizabeth Brown, R. N. served as Public Health and School Nurse until July 31, 1964. The month of August was covered by Mrs. Nancy Bean, R. N.

The opening of the Kingswood Regional High School with their own nursing service brought changes in our program. We were most fortunate in obtaining Mrs. Dorothea Hickey, R. N. as our new Public Health Nurse. Her office is located in the Black Building, and she is on duty Monday through Friday, 8:30 to 12:30.

Mrs. Brown's report from January 1, 1964 to July 31, 1964, included the following:

Sixty students' visits were made to Dr. Kipp and Dr. Brodrick, January through June, 1964. These dental visits were financed by State matched local funds, raised by the Public Health Association.

The Orthopedic Clinic was held by Dr. Garger at Huggins Hospital. Sixteen children were examined.

Five children received vision examination and one new glasses, courtesy of the Lions Club. The Lions Club also provided the camp fee for a boy to attend the Salvation Army Camp at Lake Sebago. This child was outfitted by the Martin Fund and by the St. Cecilia Church. Stationery and toilet articles were also donated for this boy by the Market Basket. Three other children received clothing for their graduation exercises, courtesy of the American Legion Auxiliary. Two children were provided with the "hot lunch" program, courtesy of the Salvation Army, also one child was supplied with orthopedic shoes. Baskets were delivered to needy families donated by the Hi-Y Club, the Girl Scouts and the Salvation Army at Thanksgiving

and Christmas time. Twenty children maintained a winter vitamin program, courtesy of Tobey's Pharmacy.

Physical examinations were conducted on the 1st, 3rd, 5th, and 7th grades of Carpenter and Tuftonboro, also on the athletic teams of these schools and on the South Wolfeboro children.

Urinalysis were done on the 1st, 3rd, 5th, and 7th grades of the same schools by the nurse and on the Brewster students by the nurse and Mrs. Ardra Piper.

Patch tests were done by Mrs. Aquirre, the State "TB" nurse, on the 1st, 4th, and 7th grades of the Carpenter and Tuftonboro schools, and on the South Wolfeboro children.

Mrs. Hickey's report from September 1 to December 31, 1964, included the following:

Home nursing visits 189
Office visits 17
Miscellaneous 4

Now that the Regional School has its own program, Mrs. Hickey is able to devote more time to Public Health services. It is our hope that in the following year, we will continue to effectively serve the community.

The Nursing Committee thanks everyone who has in any way contributed to the success of this program.

Report of the Librarian

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro-Brewster Memorial Library:

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending January 1, 1965 is herewith presented.

The year 1964 will be recorded in the annals of the library as being different from all previous years in that for the first time school libraries were established in our local schools. Although this action has changed somewhat the work of our library, it is too early to determine the specific changes. However, the librarians are convinced that it will increase rather than decrease the usefulness of our public library.

It is always a joy to welcome back each summer former library patrons as they return for their vacations as well as new borrowers who may be visiting Wolfeboro for the first time. In July open house was observed when Miss Shirley Barker, author and librarian, spoke on the subject, "Books about New Hampshire." At that time books and material about New Hampshire were displayed.

In March the Wolfeboro Historical Society met at the library at which time Mr. Edward Zulauf, Selectman, brought to the meeting from the town office valuable documents of particular interest to the Society to illustrate his talk.

This year the book service to shut-ins has continued through the cooperation of Mrs. Elizabeth Crawford and the Rev. Benjamin Hamblett. For this service there are increased expressions of appreciation.

During the year the librarians attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association at St. Paul's School in Concord; the librarians attended a meeting in Concord honoring the retiring State Librarian, and in April a meeting when the subject under discussion was the problems of school and public libraries. The librarian went to the annual meeting of the New England Library Association at Wentworth-by-the Sea;

and Mrs. W. Fred Tuttle, library assistant, and Mr. W. Fred Tuttle, library trustee, attended a meeting in Concord on the subject of book selection.

The librarian and assistant librarian gave book reviews for the Women's Society of the Congregational Church and the librarian gave a book talk to the women of the Episcopal Church. Also the librarian was a judge of an essay contest in Tuftonboro on the subject of the value of a library to a student.

This year, as in previous years, special events have been observed by displays appropriate to the occasion. During National Library Week there was a display of new books in Mr. Parson's store window in addition to one in the library.

Some valuable reference books were added; for instance, "World Book Encyclopedia," "World Book Encyclopedia Dictionary," "Worldmark Encyclopedia of the Nations," "The Harper's Encyclopedia of Science."

Work on the information file of inexpensive material as well as the picture file, both of which are of increasing value, has continued. An excellent source for the former is government pamphlets which are issued on an ever expanding number of subjects. No library can afford to overlook the value of such material.

As this report will indicate, there has been an increasing number of gifts of money and books this year. For all of these gifts which express an interest in and a loyalty to the library, the librarian expresses thanks and appreciation.

The circulation of books and magazines for the year was 36,292 of these classes: adult, fiction, 14,189; non-fiction, 9,024; children's, 13,079. Six hundred and one new cards were issued. The largest day's circulation was 281 and the smallest 32. Six hundred and twenty-two new books were added, and of this number 151 were contributed. One hundred and twenty books were borrowed by mail from the State Library, and 562 by the Bookmobile.

LIBBY MUSEUM TRUST

Trustees of the Libby Museum Wolfeboro, New Hampshire

Dear Sirs:

The Libby Museum continues to attract more visitors each year. This year the total attendance was 6,347, which reflects a substantial gain over previous years. Income from donations, maps, and postcards was \$1,438.18. Visitors came from 18 for-

eign countries, 31 states, and the District of Columbia.

The emphasis placed this year on the local natural history theme of the museum, appeared to have increased the attendance of school age visitors. Exhibits were loaned by the Ossipee and Tuftonboro 4-H Clubs. Mr. Arthur Dodge of the Extension Service in Conway, loaned a forestry diorama, which will return in 1965 by popular request. Many copies of Extension Service and Department of Agriculture booklets on over 30 different subjects were distributed to visitors with the cooperation of the Extension Service.

The Museum, as usual, was happy to receive gifts of many new items for exhibition including currency, coins, Indian relics, minerals, insects, shells, a mastodon tooth, a rattlesnake skin, and a painting. Two glass enclosed showcases were donated to help display items. Also on loan were identification blueprints of various native leaves prepared by Mrs. Clinton R. Roper, and the specimens of New Hampshire flora prepared by Bud Berry of Camp North Woods. Mr. Warren D. Thompson of Wolfeboro and Florida, gave many of the new items from foreign lands. The New Hampshire blister rust scouts donated a specimen of blister rust found near the Museum.

The plantings in front of the Museum, given by the Garden Club, continue to prosper, and this year were aided by the terraced floral display stands planned and furnished through the efforts of Mrs. James E. Boyaird and Mrs. William B. Herbert.

As in previous years, local artists exhibited water colors and

oil paintings.

The new ceiling and lighting installed in 1964 aided greatly

in the proper display of the art works, and all displays.

Many of the exhibits were refurbished. Dr. Lawrence S. Toms, and Carl N. Shannon reconditioned and rehung the flying

birds from the new ceiling.

More visitors than ever came to the museum by water this year, docking in front of the museum. As usual there were many visits by groups from schools and summer camps. The museum was opened on several occasions for the benefit of groups who wished to visit at night or after the museum was closed for the season. Arrangements for groups to visit may be made by contacting the director or the trustees through the Selectmen's Office.

I wish to thank the Municipal Electric Department for furnishing electricity (2,701 Kilowatt hours) at no cost to the museum; and also the Water and Sewer Department for furnishing water at no cost to the museum. The Highway Department also aided in the installation of the terraced floral displays and the grading and seeding around the historical marker at Lang Road and North Main Street. May I take this opportunity to thank the Selectmen, Mrs. Cole, Mrs. Jones, and all the donors, artists, and other volunteers who helped make this a successful season.

Gentlemen:

The Wolfeboro Historical Society has passed another year as custodian of the Early American Living Museum. Considerable maintenance painting has been done inside and outside the buildings; some second story flooring in the Clark House has been strengthened and shelving and lights have been rearranged to improve exhibit facilities on that floor.

The house wiring has also been reinforced to permit electric heater use during occasional cool weather.

We have had some unusual meetings. We entertained the State Association of Historical Societies at which three of the member Societies showed separate exhibits and Mr. Frank T. Lewis of Wakefield showed a collection of colonial tools and early wrought iron work. We were also visited by a group of ladies from the Asquamchumauke Chapter DAR of Plymouth, New Hampshire. A meeting of special interest was opened to the public and was addressed by the well known archeologist, Roland W. Robbins, who described some of his restoration work and discussed some of the developments which might be possible on the Governor Wentworth property. A very interesting inspection tour was made which included some of the "Lord's Hill" houses in Effingham having walls still covered with the old French landscape paper.

A daily record was kept of the more than 1000 visitors and a weekly record of the occurring human interest stories was published in the Granite State News as well as publicity material regarding special events, in that and other papers.

Among guests entertained, was Mrs. Pauline Baker, lecturer on New Hampshire history over Channel 11, WENH-TV. She expects to show some pictures, from Robert Meader's "Saga of a Palace," on Channels 11 and 8 at an early date.

The usual visits from school classes were also enjoyed.

Mrs. Hamm, our Chief Hostess, assisted by her grand-daughter, Marion, and Mrs. Witham, prepared special exhibits in the schoolhouse every week including articles contributed or loaned to the Society by members or non-members. A 3 volume Wentworth Genealogy, loaned by Mr. and Mrs. Leonel Copp, was in use much of the time. One couple from Andover, Massachusetts spent a forenoon with it. Books, also, on loan on Colonial Living, early American architecture and furniture, were much enjoyed by visitors.

Unfortunately we are short of library space. We have some

1300 items of documentary papers and books, catalogued and stacked in a cupboard, but no place to properly display or use them

without interfering with visitors.

It is planned to have the Museum open to the public next summer, every day, except Sundays and holidays, between July 6, and September 4, inclusive, from 10:00 A. M. to 12:00M, and from 2:00 P. M. to 4:30 P. M. It is hoped that the donations from visitors will pay the hostesses' salaries, something that has not yet occurred.

The Wentworth House pamphlet, "Saga of a Palace," is still on sale at the Museum, at Black's, and at the Stationery Store. It, and the Parker History Index, are also, available from our Treasurer, Dr. Howard Sawyer or our Assistant Treasurer.

Fire Commissioner's Report

1964

The Fire Commissioner's would like to thank the people of Wolfeboro for their constant cooperation with the Wolfeboro Fire Department. Especially this year, when we were plagued with a drought, we had only a few brush fires due to the citizens vigilance.

As in past years, in order to maintain a constant efficient Fire Department, we have had to replace old equipment and add new. This year, due to a F.C.C. regulation, we had to replace our old Forestry Transmitter receiver. The original has been in service since it was built by our former Chief, Roy Mansfield.

As it is our policy to replace a certain amount of hose each year, as it becomes of age (25 years) or is damaged, we obtained 500 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch.

We wish to thank the Wolfeboro Water Department for their cooperation in replacing some old hydrants, and adding new ones.

Your Commissioners wish to thank the Chief and all the personnel of the Department, who through their efficient efforts, have made our Fire Department one of the best in the State.

Under the new telephone system, we have made a few changes and would like the citizens of Wolfeboro to remember that our Emergency phone number is 569-2121, all other calls are requested to be made to 569-1400.

Chief Engineer's Report

To the Board of Fire Commissioners and the Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro:

I herewith submit my reports for the year ending December 31, 1964.

The department answered a total of 72 calls of which 11 were box alarms, 1 brush fire alarm, 2 engineers calls, and 58 still alarms. There were 36 calls for fires in buildings, 4 for smoke scares, 5 for first aid and rescue, 10 grass fires, 6 gasoline spills, 5 automobile fires, 2 false alarms, 3 dump fires, and 1 for mutual aid out of town. The causes of the fires were overheated boilers, defective oil burning equipment, electrical appliancs, dirty chimneys, defective smoke pipes, L. P. Gas leaks, careless smoking, and grease spills.

In answering the 72 calls the department traveled 212 miles, used 1800 ft. of $\frac{3}{4}$ inch hose, 800 ft. of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose, 400 ft. of $\frac{2}{2}$ inch hose, raised 136 ft. of ladders, used 17 lbs. Purple K Powder, 24 lbs. of Dry Powder, and employed approximately 308 man hours of time.

The estimated value of buildings and contents, where there was over \$50.00 damage from fire, was \$104,500.00, the insurance carried on these properties was \$78,000.00, the estimated loss was \$15,925.00, and the insurance paid for actual loss was \$21,769.00.

The department completed inspection of 52 oil burner installations, inspected some public buildings for fire hazards and rubbish disposal, and made recommendations for L. P. Gas installations where requested. Held fire drills in all schools and the dormitories at Brewster Academy.

We replaced 2700 ft. of Fire Alarm Wire, 5 cross arms with insulators and hardware on Centre St., 800 ft. of wire, 5 cross arms with insulators and hardware on School St., and changed cross arms and Fire Alarm Boxes on poles where necessary to comply with changes made by New England Tel. & Tel. Co.

Nine members of the department attended the N. H. State Fire School held at Fitzwilliams, N. H., 2 attended a new equipment demonstration at the Boston Fire School, and 3 a similar demonstration of new fire fighting methods at the Manchester Fire Dept. Each Company held outside drills during the summer months and there were 2 joint drills held with the Tuftonboro Dept.

I wish to thank the Fire Commissioners, the citizens of the town and the members of the department for their excellent cooperation at all times.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden

AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area -4.350.000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- 2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out. A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE MUNICIPAL ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT

Production

On January 9 the diesel driven generators were stopped and the complete power requirements were purchased from Public Service Company of New Hampshire. Except for a few isolated periods of short duration the noise of the power plant had been constant for 38 years. It is impossible to describe the unnatural feeling caused by the silence. The ticking of the master clock, never heard before, caused hours of confusion before the ticking noise could be identified. The hum of the water cooler motor was greatly intensified and was interpreted as a loose connection. The telephone bell would make one jump it was so loud and it was several weeks before the operating personnel became acclimated to the noise free power plant.

There were several occasions during the year when load conditions or emergencies made it necessary to run the diesels and generate part or all of the daily power requirements. A rather unique situation happened several times when the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire purchased power from the Department.

Total generation for the year amounted to 336,550 K.W.H., approximately 3.2% of the total 10,508,650 K.W.H. available for sale and use. The balance of 10,172,100 K.W.H. was purchased. A fact of great interest is that although the K.W.H. generated and purchased was only 9.3% more than 1963 the total K.W.H. sold increased 14.3%. This was made possible by a substantial reduction in line loss (K.W.H. unaccounted for).

The reduction in line loss was accomplished by the installation of capacitors on all circuits; the testing, calibration, and repair of the metering facilities at the power plant and a program of tree trimming. The rebuilding of several old lines also contributed

to the reduction.

Transmission Line

The transmission line has held up remarkably well and no outage was experienced during the year. The hunters in the area are to be commended for their respect for this vital equipment by not shooting at the insulators. However, several pole number markers showed the results of well aimed shots.

Maintenance of the line has consisted primarily of helicopter and foot patrols. In cooperation with the Public Service Co. of N. H. the entire line from the substation to the termination at Tuftonboro will be sprayed in the spring of 1965. This may be supplemented by spot trimming of stubborn growth. Helicopter and foot patrol will be scheduled several times during the coming year to insure continuity of service.

The substation required very little maintenance during the year. It is anticipated that the area will be landscaped and ade-

quate drainage provided during 1965.

Kingswood Regional High School

Kingswood Regional High School opened September 14 with an enrollment of approximately 740 students. This was 4 days later than scheduled and only 11 months after construction began. The rapid construction of the building can, at least in part, be attributed to the use of Electric Heat which required no complicated piping and supplementary equipment.

A total of 389,600 kilowatt hours was used by the school from September 14 through December 31. Of this total 241,882 kilowatt hours costing the School District \$3,870.11 were used for heating the building and hot water. Based on the data available from the metering system installed by the Department it is firmly believed that the yearly cost of operation will be well within the original estimate given to the school board by the design engineers.

Free Service

During the year the Department provided various services, at no charge, to community projects. Listed below are some of the projects, the value of electricity and materials provided, and the value of labor.

In addition to the above, free energy is supplied to the Town Offices and Library; Town Garage, Libby Museum, Clark House, Abenaki Ski Slope, Fire Station, Youth Center, and Town Docks.

Bell Shop

The boiler in the Bell Shop was replaced at a cost of \$4,449.58. The installation of the new boiler was made by the personnel of the Power Plant. Inspection of the roof indicates that at least the back half will have to be repaired during 1965. Except for the roof no major repairs are contemplated.

The Malone Knitting Company continues to lease the build-

ing for shipping, inspection and some manufacturing.

Accounts Receivables

This is a "be darned if you do and be darned if you don't" situation. The Department has for the past several years made a conscientious and somewhat successful endeavor to reduce the amount of money owed for electric service. The majority of customers pay their bills within the 30 days allowed. However, there are some customers who have taken advantage of the previous policy of the Department and have used various excuses in the

request for credit extensions. If all charges for electric service were paid promptly the rates of the Department could, no doubt, be reduced. The obvious conclusion is that the delinquent custom-

ers have delayed a rate reduction.

In view of the above the Department will no longer extend credit over the normal 30 days. If a balance is indicated on a bill for electric service, the customer will be advised that the service will be disconnected unless the overdue amount is paid within 15 days. Existing arrangements for payment of back bills will be honored only as long as such payments are made on schedule.

At the customer's request, and depending on the type and capacity of service, prepayment meters may be installed on a

lease basis.

Fuel Charge

The fuel surcharge, a part of all rates since 1941, was eliminated September 1, 1964. This in effect resulted in a small rate reduction.

Line Extension Provisions

The Line Extension provision of the Tariff was revised December 1 to make it more uniform with the provisions of the other Electric Utilities serving the state. The new provision reduced the payment period of the surcharge from 120 months to 60 months and increased the surcharge from \$.50 per 100 feet to \$.75 per 100 feet. The revised provision also provides for extension of three phase service.

Distribution and Service

The continuity of service during the year was above average. No outage was experienced due to "hi line" failure but there were 113 off hour trouble calls on the distribution system which required a total of 344 man hours to repair. The system has now been converted from a 3 wire 3 phase "delta" 2400 volt system to a 4 wire 3 phase "Y" 4160 volt system. This conversion, made early in the year, has resulted in better voltage regulation, and reduced the amperage on the lines thus making possible the temporary postponement of several circuit rebuilding schedules.

During the year the Department set 64 poles and transferred to an additional 56 new poles set by the Telephone Company; installed 838 KVA of additional transformer capacity; installed 38,077 feet of service cable and 39,984 feet of line wire, installed 42 new services and changed 8 services from 2 wire 120 volt to 3 wire 240 volt. The Department also installed a new circuit, including the necessary circuit breaker in the power plant, of 4/0 aluminum spacer cable to Pleasant Valley Road. This circuit supplies only Kingswood Regional High School at present but will supply Pleasant Valley Road in the future. Provisions will be made to supply Huggins Hospital and South Wolfeboro during emergencies.

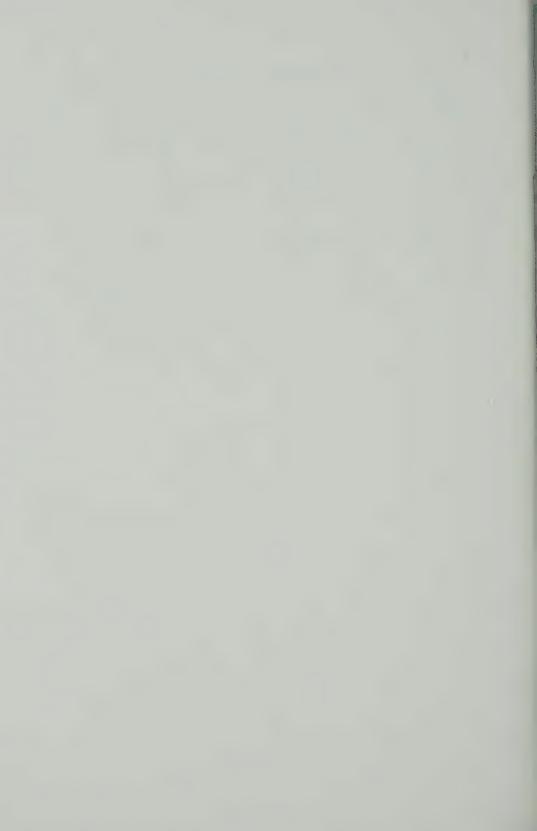
