TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of Bedford, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

Article I. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

Art. II. To bring in your votes for the necessary town officers for the ensuing year and for the ensuing three years.

Art. III. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray. Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

Art. IV. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor, highways and bridges, and for any other necessary expenses to the town.

Art. V. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$10,000.00 if needed.

Art. VI. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early payment of taxes, and if so, to fix the time and rate. Art. VII. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Art. VIII. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes or bonds of the Town to an amount not exceeding \$15,000.00 for the purpose of refunding outstanding indebtedness of a like amount as authorized by Chapter 48 of the Laws of 1935.

Art. IX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to maintain street lights for the ensuing year.

Art. X. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Town Library.

Art. XI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 for the care of the clock on the church.

Art. XII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of the New Cemetery, \$30.00 for the care of Joppa Cemetery, \$10.00 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road, and \$7.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.

Art. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to buy a tractor road-grader and snow plow, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Art. XIV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purchase of snow fence.

Art. XV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$864.99 for Class V road maintenance, the State to give \$3,459.97; or—

To raise and appropriate the sum of \$2370.00 for State Aid Construction on the New Boston Road or the Shirley Hill Road, the State to give \$2,370.00. Art. XVI. To see if the Town will vote to install new furnaces in the Town Hall, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Art. XVII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid the Treasurer of the Trust Funds for annual services and expenses.

Art. XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in trust from Peter Parker, the interest to be expended for the care of his lot in the New Cemetery.

Art. XIX. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in trust from Albert P. Watson, the interest to be expended for the care of his lot in the New Cemetery.

Art. XX. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in trust from Charles D. Woodbury, the interest to be expended for the care of his lot in the Cemetery.

Art. XXI. To hear the report of the Zoning Committee appointed at the 1935 Town meeting and act upon their recommendations.

Art. XXII. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, and of all other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In September, 1935, there was one change in the teaching staff at the Donald Street School. Miss Kathryn Lorden, a graduate of Keene Normal School, was elected to the position left vacant by the resignation of Miss Gretchen Smith.

The enrollment in the various schools has been about the same as during previous years.

Through the use of achievement tests, the annual progress of each child in each subject is being carefully studied. Through the results of these studies, it is hoped that proper emphasis and teaching technique may be used with each group to assure a continuous uniform standard advancement by each child in each subject during his elementary school life.

Most parents dislike to have their child advance at less than the average rate in any group. We find that in many cases a child may be good in some subjects and poor in others. It is far better for a child to repeat and spend more time on a subject which is difficult for him to assimilate. After a child is put into a group for which he is not adequately prepared, he has presented to him day by day material which he cannot understand and thus he becomes discouraged and loses his interest in school activities.

I believe that every child should be doing work in which he can succeed; work which he can handle in school from day to day, and thus gain new courage to attack the new problem which may be a little more difficult, but, nevertheless, which is within his experience and ability to master.

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
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
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
