

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

- (a) Town Officers' Salaries.
- (b) Town Officers' Expenses.
- (c) Expenses Town Hall and Other Town Buildings.
- (d) Police Department.
- (e) Fire Departments.
- (f) Moth Extermination—Spraying and Pruning Shade Trees.
- (g) Health Department, including District Nurse.
- (h) Vital Statistics.
- (i) Sewer Maintenance and Rubbish Disposal.
- (i) Town Highway Maintenance.
- (k) Street Lighting.
- (1) Libraries.
- (m) Town Poor and Old Age Assistance.
- (n) Memorial Day and Other Celebrations.

(o) Cemeteries.

(p) Interest on Loans.

(q) Insurance Premiums.

(r) Sidewalk Maintenance and Construction.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$389.92 for Town Roads Aid, this sum to be matched by a state contribution of \$1,559.67.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$166.20 (1/100th of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1946 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

6. To see if the voters of the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on short term notes for the year 1947 to an amount not exceeding \$30,000.00.

7. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer money from one appropriation to another.

8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same. 9. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

10. To tranact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

PREVENT FIRES - IT PAYS!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this—

- 1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
- 2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
- 4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
- 5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PRE-VENT FIRES—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!

If she has not at hand the research material desired, she can secure books on almost any subject from the State Library.

Both the main library and the branch observed Book Week with a display of books, and both libraries were decorated for the holiday season.

Penacook and Boscawen Congregational Churches enrolled in the Congregational-Christian Reading Contest.

With the assistance of Miss Pratt of the State Library, the librarian has discarded obsolete books to the number of 216.

By purchase, 259 books have been added to the library and 347 catalogued.

Circulation the past year has been 7,070 books; Adult fiction, 4,216; Adult non-fiction, 717; Juvenile fiction, 1,513; Juvenile non-fiction, 624; magazines, 709.

Thanks are extended for gifts of books to Mrs. Edward Towne, Mrs. Charles Wendie and Mrs. Elizabeth G. Hall. The library also received the gift of a book from Dr. Henry D. Chadwick, entitled "The Modern Attack on Tuberculosis". This book was written by Dr. Chadwick, with Dr. Pope as co-author.

A legacy of \$920.00 has been received from the estate of the late Miss Lizzie Choate, the income to be used for the purchase of books and periodicals. The new librarian, Mrs. Julia Goldsmith, began her duties on May 1, 1946. Mrs. George Colby is the assistant at the branch. The librarian attended the Librarians' Summer School at Concord, also the New Hampshire Library Association Meeting at Franklin.

The Trustees were saddened by the death of Mr. Isaac Coulson, who had faithfully served on the Board since 1938.
