Town Warrant

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Town of Brookline on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for same.
- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative to same.
- 4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing.
- 7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries.

- 8. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to charge a twenty-cent penalty on each poll tax remaining unpaid after September First, or take any action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract for janitor services at Daniels Academy Building, or take any action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$369.81 to secure State Aid for Permanent Improvements of highways.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for spraying elm trees against Elm Tree Beetle, said sum to be used where property owners have contributed 50% of the cost of spraying elm trees on their property, or take any action relative thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of same.
 - 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for cutting and removing trees, or take any action relative thereto.

- 17. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civilian Defense.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract with Brookline Grange for rental of the Town Hall for three years, establishing in such authorization the rental price to be charged, or take any action relative thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for fire hose and equipment, or take any action relative thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Equipment, or take any action relative thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for additional police protection, or take any action relative thereto. (See police department report).

22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the

following resolution:

Whereas the Mason Road from the Gould Mill Brook going Westerly to the Brookline-Mason town line is narrow and crooked, and whereas the remainder of Mason road is hard surfaced, then,

Be it resolved that this meeting does petition the Selectmen to have this section of Mason road widened, straightened, and surfaced to best serve the public interests.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for painting the fence at Lakeside Cemetery.

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Town Hall repairs, or take any action relative thereto.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract for care of the Town Dump, or take any action relative thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the following rules and regulations pertaining to the administration of the Town Dump:
- 1. The Brookline Town Dump has been established for the use and convenience of the residents and taxpayers of Brookline for the disposal of rubbish. Any use of the dump by other than Brookline residents and taxpayers is hereby prohibited.
- 2. It shall be illegal to dump any vegetable, animal, or garbage matter on the Brookline Town Dump.
- 3. All trash, rubbish and waste material shall be deposited over and beyond the graded portion of the dump, or as directed by the Custodian.
- 4. The dump shall be open for the dumping of trash, rubbish, and waste materials on Saturdays and Sundays from 10:00 A. M. to one-half hour before sunset. The dump shall be closed at all other times except by special arrangement with the Custodian.
- 5. No person except the Custodian shall start or kindle any fire at the dump.
- 6. It shall be illegal for any unauthorized person to trespass beyond the barrier at the entrance to the dump, when the dump is closed.

- 7. No material may be removed from the dump without permission from the Custodian.
- 8. No firearms may be discharged at the dump without permission from the Custodian.
- 9. Any person violating any of the above provisions may be fined not more than \$10.00.
- 10. It is required that all persons driving vehicles on the highways of Brookline for the purpose of carrying material to the dump, shall cover and/or tie their loads. Drivers failing to have such loads covered and/or tied, and by such violation allow trash, rubbish, or waste material to fall along the highway shall be subject to a fine of not more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).
- 11. These rules and regulations shall take effect on date of acceptance and approval.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for an aerial mosaic of the town for a preliminary town map, or take any action relative thereto.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept, as a gift from the Brookline Fire Department, one 1937 Packard Ambulance with the following provisions:
- 1. That the services of the ambulance shall be free to all residents and taxpayers; however, if the patient or member of the patient's family desires to make a donation for the volunteer driver, it may be accepted. Non-resident cases are to be charged the current ambulance rates as set up by the Board of Fire Engineers.
- 2. That the Town will assume the cost of insurance and maintenance of ambulance.
 - 3. That the net proceeds from non-resident

cases shall be used for the purchase of fire fighting equipment.

- 29. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following Amendment to the existing ordinance in regard to licensing of trailer parks:
- 1. No house trailer shall be located within three hundred feet (300') of any dwelling house without the written consent of the owners of record of all dwelling houses within 300' of the proposed house trailer location. In such cases where consent is required hereunder, it shall be the responsibility of the person seeking the license to obtain written evidence of such consent and file the same with the application for license. No license shall be issued until such consent is filed, if required.
- 2. Trailer licenses shall be applied for and issued in the name of the record owner of the land on which the house trailer is to be located.
- 3. A separate license shall be required for each house trailer. Such licenses shall not be transferable. On change of ownership of the land where a license has been issued, licenses issued shall expire and new license must be applied for as specified in Section I.

Enforcement

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen and the Board is hereby given power and authority, to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.
- 2. The Building Inspector shall issue any and all Trailer Licenses requested when such license is in accord with the provisions of this Ordinance or legally authorized by the Board of Appeals and then only. The fee for such license shall be \$2.00 and any fees for licenses required under this ordinance shall revert to the Town Treasury.

3. Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Board of Appeals

In accordance with Chapter 51 of the Public Laws of 1942 the presently established Board of Appeals will have authority over this ordinance.

Amendments

This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting.

Penalties

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars upon conviction for each day such violation may exist.

Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

When Effective

This ordinance shall take effect on its passage.

30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following sums; the income from same to be used for perpetual care in Pine Grove Cemetery:

\$200.00 from Arthur W. Lawson, for perpetual

care of the Arthur W. Lawson Lot.

- \$200.00 from Mrs. Marion Draper for the perpetual care of the Job Shattuck Lot.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of a school building on the prop-

erty known as the Town Park or take any action relative thereto.

32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Selectmen's General Report

Financial

It has been possible this year to pay off the Town debt of \$4,000.00. This was made possible in part by the receipt of a large payment on back taxes.

It is recommended that a capital reserve fund be established for Fire Equipment this year starting with an appropriation of \$1,000.00.

Roads

The Oak Hill Road job was finished in the spring. This was done on recommendation of the State Engineer since further postponement would have necessitated graveling again before surfacing.

The Mason Road project was started but had to be stopped when the land owner involved withdrew his permission to use his land for the necessary widening and straightening. We recommend the adoption of the resolution in the Town Warrant to give the Selectmen the power to obtain the land under Eminent Domain proceedings if necessary to insure completion of the project this year.

Town Hall

Considerable plastering was done in the first floor hallways and stairways last summer. We have arranged with our janitor, Mr. Andrew Marshall, to paint the walls and ceilings in the sections that have been repaired and judging from present appearances we feel you will be pleased with the improved appearance of the inside of the building. It is recommended that a sum of money be raised again this year to further the repairs inside the building. It will be necessary in the near future to replace the water pump that supplies the building with water.

Warrant for Annual School Meeting

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of BROOKLINE qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Daniels Academy Building in said district on the 8th day of March 1956 at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents,

and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to build and equip a new Elementary School of at least three classrooms with adequate sanitary, service and administrative facilities, and to acquire any real property that may be necessary for the proper location of such a school and take any action relating thereto.
- 10. If the preceding article is adopted, to see what sum the district will raise and appropriate for the construction, equipment, and furnishings for such a school; and whether the district will vote to authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale, the time and place of payment of principal in accordance with Chapter 72, Revised Laws as amended by Laws of 1955.
- 11. If the district has adopted the articles above, to see if the district will vote to appoint a building committee to consist of the school board and five citizens to be appointed by the Moderator to select the location of the building and to supervise the construction of said building, provided that the plans and specifications shall be approved by the school board acting alone as required by law, and the school board be further authorized to execute

any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction of said building in accordance with Chapter 141 Revised Laws.

12. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes, as may now, or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any state or private agency.

Administration

I herewith present my seventeenth Annual Report. Statistics printed on other pages are also a part of this report.

Instruction

There was one change in the teaching staff from the previous year. Mrs. Katherine Shea of Wilton, who had previously trained to teach but had never taught, was employed to succeed Miss Treganza in Grade I. Mrs. Shea took a refresher course last Summer before beginning her service here.

I also wish to call your attention to the most successful workshop which has been conducted in this Union. For two days and an evening, the teachers of this area participated in a conference on "Current Events for Teachers," a program which they themselves planned and executed. Principal Rockwell and Mr. DeLacev acted as cochairmen and the success of the sessions is a tribute to their tireless efforts. As you may know, we had able Consultants from various colleges and other institutions to lead the discussions. A Bulletin, giving the recorders' notes, has been published and distributed. This whole subject was a sort of a "pilot" project for the State — it being unique from all the others previously attempted. You can see that I am proud of the staff and feel that the carry-over to everyday teaching will last for a long time to come.

Costs

A new law, enacted by the last General Court, prescribes the maximum liability of a school district not maintaining a high school as the average per pupil cost of all the high schools in the State or the average cost of the receiving school, whichever is less. Another provision empowers the State Board of Education to estimate these costs on the basis of the previous year's costs.

Since those costs for 1956-57 cannot thus be determined accurately until after June 30, 1956, we do not know what these costs may be but the State office freely predicts that the state high school cost will be \$330 and the elementary \$215 per pupil. I hear predictions from many sources that the rising trend will prevail for quite a while yet.

Another new law provides for approximately 20% state aid for building construction. There is no aid on interest payments, just on the Principal.

You will note also that state aid dropped considerably from previous estimates at the last session, a change in the formula for state aid distribution was developed which resulted in a drop to you.

Deeds

I am pleased to note the improvements made in the appearance of your rooms. For a number of years I have advised re-decorating year by year. That you are now doing this gives me inspiration as I feel it must to the pupils. Likewise, the improved condition of the Daniels Academy hallway is very pleasing.

To Come

An oil burner at the Primary School would make for more even heat and lighten the janitorial load.

On January 21, 1950, I wrote a little article for the Town Report entitled, "Stork and School Board." In it, I tried to point out that Grades 1-6 would have approximately 75, 79, 75, 84, 89 and 93 in the six years from that date. Actually, there were 90, 90, 90, 92, 102, 114 different pupils enrolled in those same years. The prediction totalled 495 children whereas the total number of different pupils was 578. All of the latter children were not present all the time. I was then advocating three teachers instead of two. That was accomplished and later another room and another teacher was added. Now the growth is anitcipated which would require an additional room or two

and the teachers to go with them. In 1949-50, you had approximately 45 pupils per teacher; in 1950-51, 30 pupils; in 1953-54, 25 plus pupils. Up to this date this year, 125 pupils have been enrolled or 31 pupils per teacher.

Closing

"Good teachers do not just happen. They are the product of the highest personal motivation, encouraged and helped in their work by adequate salaries and the respect, support, goodwill of their neighbors. The quality of American teachers has never been better. But the rewards of too many teachers are not commensurate with their work and their role in American life. It is my earnest hope that, along with progress in other aspects of education, the states and communities will give increasing attention to this taproot of all education — good teachers, and hence good teaching." This is a quotation from none other than President Eisenhower.

Good schools just don't happen. They require planning, hard work and adequate finances. Expenditure still is a good criterion of what kind of school you have.

I am very thankful for the efforts of all my associates including Miss Connolly, the Teachers, the School Board. My contacts with the Community have been very rewarding.

Our Helping Teacher

By Mabel I. Connolly

Purpose — to Help

The purpose, as previously reported, which underlies the work of the Helping Teacher continues to be the same — to help. Areas where help is needed remain basically the same but vary from time to time in the amount required. Help is available, but to be effective the teachers should desire it. Whenever they seek to improve their methods of instruction or acquire ideas or materials which will aid them in doing a better job then the Helping Teacher attempts to provide such help.

It is through classroom visitations that most needs become apparent and assistance is requested. How is help given? Mostly through individual conferences which follow the classroom visits, through group conferences and participation in teachers meetings, and sometimes through demonstration teaching. It is hoped that material contained in the monthly **Helping Teacher's Bulletin** also contributes. This includes such items of interest to the teachers in this union as results of surveys, sharing teaching techniques, reviews of professional books and magazine articles, and sources of help. A handbook has been made available to teachers of the first grade. Its purpose is to present a coordinated program and state the general aims and goals of the grade. It should prove helpful to all, but especially those who are beginning.

Often the help that is requested concerns the child directly and has to do with his adjustment and the school program. This may involve giving the child one or more tests to better understand his needs and having conferences with his parents, teachers and others.

Scope of Program

Many phases of the Helping Teachers' program have

been described in previous reports. The most important might be listed as follows: scheduling, curriculum development and coordination, testing, guidance, developing methods of instruction, classroom visitation, pupil grouping, participation in conferences and other meetings, role of counselor, consultant, organizer and resource person. At present this includes working with about 50 teachers and 1400 pupils throughout the union.

Specifics

I would like to report in some detail about a few specific phases of the program.

Pupil grouping as based on the results of the reading readiness tests seems to be paying big dividends. Where this was followed in last year's first grade the progress made in reading was quite accelerated and the second grade teachers this year have noticed a decided increase in reading achievement. It should be noted here that we have a common reading system in this union in which phonics has a definite role. Other subjects which are coordinated on a union-wide basis are language, social studies, and handwriting.

A recent survey of handwriting in grades four, five, six and twelve shows results that may be termed as higher than average. The handwriting system we use starts out as manuscript and by the fourth grade works into the cursive.

Evaluating the children's work and reporting to parents has always been a major problem. This past year a committee made up of parents and teachers developed a new elementary school report card which, with revisions suggested by parents and teachers during a trial run, has been adopted for the time being. Another such committee developed one for the junior-senior high schools. A poll of parents showed a total of 86% in favor of the new junior-senior high school card. Of the 1412 returns in

the elementary school poll before revision 60% favored the new card. We agree that no perfect instrument of evaluating and reporting to parents has yet been devised. However, the method used to evolve the cards for Union #40 gave all who participated a better understanding of the problems faced by the pupil, teacher, and parent in their interpretation.

Availability

To be of greatest help your Helping Teacher must be available whenever and wherever needed, and may be directly contacted every morning before 9:30 at the Superintendent's office. After that the contact may be made through the office. Sometimes a problem requires immediate attention, but usually a teacher has a list of questions and needs which are taken care of after the regular classroom visit. One may correctly infer from this that the teacher who asks for the most help receives the most.

My effectiveness may be measured only by the amount of help I am able to give. In this case giving and receiving are integrated, as my efforts would be in vain without the help and cooperation received from the parents, teachers, principals, members of the school boards, and Mr. Bowley. I am very grateful.
