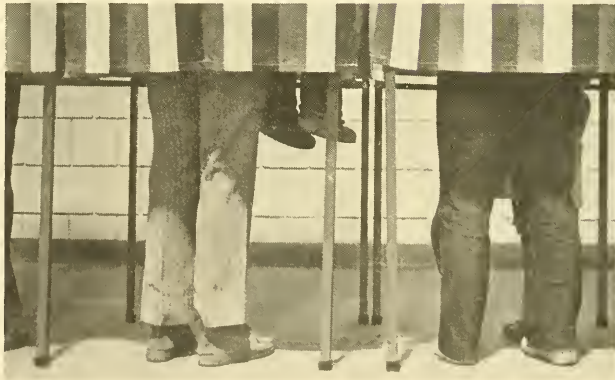

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TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY, County of Carroll, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Kennett High School Auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, 1982, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. Voting on Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$2,193,270.00 for the purpose of constructing the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility as provided for under Article 9, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to \$2,193,270.00 under the Municipal Finance Act and to determine all terms and conditions thereof including rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to carry out the project, provided that no debt shall be incurred under this vote until the Selectmen determine that the other members of the Mt. Washington Valley Regional Solid Waste Disposal Cooperative have voted to commit themselves to provide waste to the facility of at least sufficient tonnage and funding therefor to insure its feasibility as said Selectmen shall determine in their sole discretion, to be acted on under official ballot of the Town. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 3. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax. (These Statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000, or if married a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence.)

ARTICLE 4. To see whether or not the Town will adopt amendments to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance incorporating provisions on mobile home use as proposed and recommended by the Conway Planning Board to be acted on under official ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 5. To see whether or not the Town will adopt amendments to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance incorporating provisions on sign use as proposed and recommended by the Conway Planning Board to be acted on under official ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 6. To see whether or not the Town will adopt amendments to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance incorporating provisions on flood plain use as proposed and recommended by the Conway Planning Board to be acted on under official ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 7. To see whether or not the Town will adopt amendments to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance incorporating provisions on limiting permitted uses in the business district as proposed and recommended by the Conway Planning Board to be acted on under official ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 8. To see whether or not the Town will adopt amendments to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance incorporating provisions on conversions and density requirements of existing buildings as proposed and recommended by the Conway Planning Board to be acted on under official ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into an agreement for the purpose of disposing of the solid waste generated by the cooperating towns and for the recovery of energy where possible in the most economical and efficient manner and with authority to lease the Town's existing land and buildings used for solid waste disposal to the cooperative for the sum of \$1.00 for the term of the agreement once the bonding for construction is authorized: The Agreement set forth herein is intended to provide, under State Statute, for the joining of towns in a cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner that will meet Federal and State requirements. (Text of Agreement and proposed lease is printed in full as Addendum to the Warrant.)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State or other assistance as may be available for the construction of an incinerator plant and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. RSA 33:7-b et seq., as amended, and pass any vote relating thereto as it pertains to the project proposed in Article 2 of this Warrant.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated for the following specific purposes:

ARTICLE 12. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise Fifty Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$57,500.00) and authorize the Selectmen to spend up to said amount for purposes of paying the costs incurred by the Conway Village Fire District in contracting with Camp, Dresser & McKee for a preliminary study and plan for installation of a septage waste disposal facility at the District's waste treatment facility sufficient in scope and size to meet the prospective needs of the Town of Conway for disposal of septage waste. This appropriation will be allocated and paid as follows:

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$1,300.00) in support of the North Country Senior Meals and North Country Senior Wheels Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary Whitcomb and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Three Dollars (\$11,453.00) for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.60 per person in the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Miles C. Waltz and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400.00) for operational expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Glenna Mori and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to help defray the expenses of the Water Safety Program as carried out by the Conway Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Linda Kugel and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00) to assist the Conway Village Recreation Commission and the North Conway Community Center; \$18,000.00 to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and \$18,000.00 to the Board of Directors, North Conway Community Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Shirley Van Dyne and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to be divided equally between the Chamber of Commerce of Conway and the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce, with \$2,000.00 going to the Conway Chamber of Commerce and \$2,000.00 to the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jo Anne Dodge Cosby and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Thirty Dollars (\$4,030.00) for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley (C&Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Bill Fennell and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for the North Conway Day Care Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sheila M. Smith and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$10,500.00) for the Center of Hope, Inc. This total reflects services for twenty one residents @ \$500.00 per person. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joyce Kennett and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Four Hundred Twenty One Dollars (\$4,421.00) to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Eric Rollnick and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$30,250.) for the 1982 General Operating Budget of The Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Carl E. Lindblade and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to assist the Family Planning Service of Northern Carroll County. Agreeable to a petition signed by Eric Rollnick and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to assist in defraying the operational expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport. Agreeable to a petition signed by Arthur F. Brown, Jr. and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into one or more contracts for terms not to exceed five years covering the ambulance services to be provided to the Town and its citizens with all additional terms and conditions thereof to be as the Selectmen shall determine.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town of Conway Planning Board to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses and multi-family dwelling units, whether or not such development includes

a subdivision or resubdivision of the site, as provided by Chapter 36: Section 19a, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended.

ARTICLE 29. Are you in favor of authorizing the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of Resident Taxes prior to issuance of the Resident Tax Warrant, such payments not to be received before April 1st of any given year, in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 80:1a.

ARTICLE 30. Are you in favor of authorizing the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of property taxes prior to issuance of the Tax Warrant, such payments not to be received before April 1st of any given year, in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 80:52a.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an addition to its by-laws to require that the operator of any carnival or amusement ride (as defined by NHRSA, Chapter 321-A, Section 1) who seeks a license to operate the same within the Town of Conway, shall be required to cause each such ride to satisfactorily pass a daily safety inspection, to be made by a qualified inspector designated by the Selectmen; such inspection to be made each day said rides are to be operated after the rides have been set up and before such rides are used on said day by the public; such inspector to utilize as safety standards those adopted for such rides by the Director of the Division of Safety Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by John Santuccio and others.

ARTICLE 32. To see whether or not the Town will vote to authorize and/or instruct its Selectmen to waive the pavement requirement of the Town Highway Specifications as it applies to the main access road leading from Quint Street through Mt. Cranmore Lake Shores in the event said road is laid out and accepted as a Town road by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to abate the taxes on the Mt. Cranmore Ski Area of the Herbert Schneider Corp. on a basis of one dollar of taxes abated for every two dollars of capital improvements made by Herbert Schneider Corp. on that tax year, up to the full amount of the actual town tax bill. This credit is to be subject to inspection of improvements and records of expenditures by a board duly appointed by the Selectmen. This article is subject to enabling legislation by the N. H. State Legislature. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph E. Sullivan and others.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Road the extension of Amethyst Hill Road, said road thereafter to be maintained as a Town Road. Agreeable to a petition signed by Glenn R. Saunders and others.

ARTICLE 35. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to Six Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$6,900.00) for the purposes of acquiring a strip of land for highway purposes from Herbert Schneider Corporation as an extension southerly of Old Bartlett Road with the Selectmen authorized to negotiate and complete such purchase in behalf of the Town. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to plan and execute improvements in Center Conway Village during the calendar year 1982. The said improvements being in the area along Route 302 on the north and/or south side(s) from a point on the west side of Center Conway Village beginning in the area of Walker's Pond Press and travelling easterly to a point in the area of the Mill Brook as follows:

- A. Request that at no cost to the Town of Conway the New England Telephone Company and Public Service Company of New Hampshire set back all telephone poles to the extreme edge of the highway right of way.
- B. That a sufficient area along the highway be graded so as to provide for parking off the pavement and sufficient space for pedestrian traffic.
- C. That winter highway maintenance be provided to plow or remove snow from the area so as to provide for parking off the pavement and sufficient space for pedestrian traffic during the winter months.

Agreeable to a petition signed by Carol P. Dandeneau and others.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation to introduce a resolution in the United States Congress requesting the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union a Nuclear Weapons Freeze: a bilateral halt to the testing, production, and deployment of new nuclear weapons and their delivery systems. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sally L. McAlpine and others.

ARTICLE 38. To see whether or not the Town will vote to establish a standing committee to be known as the Conway Airport Authority having the responsibility of investigating planning, maintaining and/or operating all air navigation facilities in and of the Town of Conway with the power to hire and discharge employees and/or lease such facilities for terms not to exceed one year all in furtherance of the above purposes within the budgetary limits established by the Town; such Authority to be comprised of five citizens of the Town who shall elect a Chairman from among their number and may adopt by-laws for the conduct of their business, all to be appointed by the Selectmen of Conway for five year terms ending March 31 of each year provided the first appointments shall be spaced by lot for terms of one through five years with the first term ending March 31, 1983 and annually thereafter successively, provided this Authority shall be subject to and empowered by such further provisions as the Town may from time to time vote.

ARTICLE 39. To see whether or not the Town will vote to exempt the owner of the White Mountain Airport from Town real estate taxes for the tax year 1982 and annually thereafter so long as the owner operates an air navigational (airport) facility available for public use without charge pursuant to the provisions of RSA 73:38.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the voters of the Town of Conway will vote to abolish the position of Assistant Town Manager and direct the Selectmen to search for and employ a qualified person trained in an accredited

college in the major field of Municipal Government and with at least 2 years experience in Town Government. This person would be considered as a trained replacement for the retiring incumbent Town Manager. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jesse E. Lyman, III, and others.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to direct the Board of Selectmen to petition the State and Federal Government to seek an indefinite waiver of such EPA standards, to permit the Town to continue open pit burning of rubbish, until such time as Federal or State funds are available to construct an acceptable incinerator system. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jesse E. Lyman, III, and others.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined school, town and county tax budgets, in anticipation for town, county and school purposes.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the Town of Conway, N. H. to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Conway, N. H. applied for and to receive and expend them in accordance with the purposes thereof.

ARTICLE 44. To see whether or not the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw Capital Reserve Funds established by the Town from time to time and disburse the same in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were created respectively.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at their discretion, at public auction, any real estate in the Town to which the Town has title by Collector's Deed; except when it is being sold back to the former owner, or to a party who has succeeded to the title of the former owner, in which case private sale may be utilized; any such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before the next annual Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 46. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Conway, New Hampshire, as of and for the year ended December 31, 1980, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1F, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements referred to above, present fairly the financial position of the Town of Conway, New Hampshire at December 31, 1980, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Conway, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining, individual fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1981 started with little snow, but ended with plenty. The lesson learned is that snow is an economic necessity to the Town of Conway and the Mt. Washington Valley. While there was some surplus generated in the highway department budget by lack of snow during 1981's winter, by December, 1981 we had used most of the salt budget, except for about 200 tons that was carried over from 1980.

In the spring, the regular sweeping of highways and rubbish clean up was accomplished by the highway department. Following that, highways were striped, crosswalks painted, and street signs renewed. The town also designated and painted bicycle lanes. A big task in 1981 for the highway department was the installation of 4,000 feet of underdrainage, 30 catch basins and a number of culverts. Over 900 feet of the Valley View highway was completely rebuilt with drainage installed. Approximately 1,500 feet of this highway was hot-topped. During this same period, 5,000 cubic yards of sand was stockpiled. This was purchased from Conway Sand and Gravel when the cost was lowest to the town. The salt shed was filled with 700 tons of salt during the summer months, purchased at the 1981 price. This allowed the town to buy salt while the water content was at a minimum to allow more volume per ton.

In late summer, the highway crew applied asphalt to the West Side area of Conway, which fell within the 3-year cycle of street maintenance in the asphalt program. There were also three streets that were hot-topped on the West Side.

There were many changes at the Conway landfill this year. The area across from the incinerator building was filled to capacity and capped off with the proper amount of sand. In the spring of 1982 this area will be seeded and covered with hay to combat the wind erosion that exists there. All of the incoming traffic has been directed to a third landfill area. In this area, the landfill face is being kept narrow and compacted daily to reduce the unsightly problem of an extra wide face. The town was directed to employ this method by the State Inspector, who was critical of having so much landfill face open at one time. The Selectmen implemented new landfill regulations which mandate the separation of corrugated cardboard. In about six weeks, fifty 1,000 lb. bales have been stockpiled for future sale. It is estimated that the baling effort will save approximately 4,500 cubic yards of space in the landfill each year. This will extend the life of the landfill considerably. The voluntary separation of glass and newsprint is being encouraged and provisions have been made to make this effort easier for the public.

The election of Priscilla Barringer as the first woman Selectman for the Town of Conway was a pleasant experience for Selectman Bumstead and myself. Selectman Barringer gave a great deal of effort and good thought during her seven month tenure and, although we are happy that she has a new home, we were disappointed that it was not in Conway, and she could not finish her term. Paul Ashnault accepted an appointment by the Board to serve the remainder of Priscilla Barringer's first year. Selectman Ashnault chaired the multi-town ambulance committee and has contributed many hours to town affairs.

The year was one of some challenges to the town's municipal law. This seemed to your Chairman to be a logical and fair process. If

Recycling is one thing you can do to directly lower your taxes. Recyclable materials can first be removed from the waste stream to save costly landfill space and then sold to produce income.

Recycling is reusing. Making new things out of old things saves irreplaceable natural resources and the energy needed to convert them.

For example, since the mandatory separation and baling of corrugated cardboard began in Dec., 1981, a space equivalent to the volume of two medium-sized houses, representing 30% of the total waste stream, has been saved each month in the Conway landfill. The thirty half-ton bales produced per month can be sold for up to \$20.00 apiece and reused in producing pizza box-type cardboard. Full recycling of glass, which never decomposes in the ground and clogs incinerators, would save an additional 10 to 15%, or another house per month in landfill volume.

Conway has an excellent building and a heavy-duty baler which can be used to store and process a variety of recyclable materials. But the most important element of your town's recycling program is YOU. *PLEASE SEPARATE THE FOLLOWING MATERIALS AND MAKE RECYCLING WORK!*

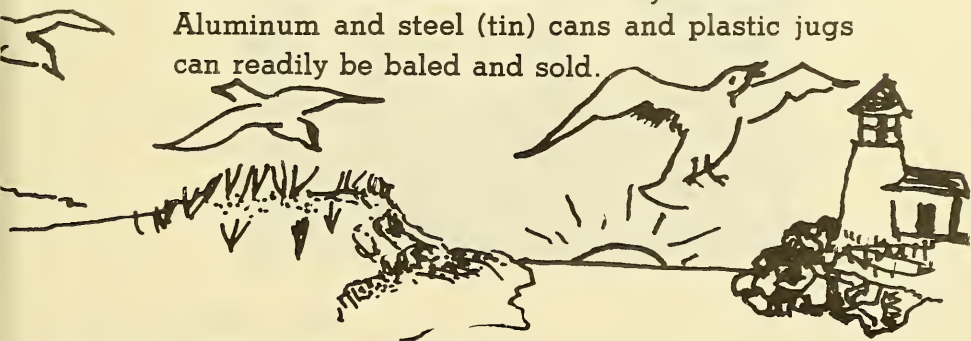


CORRUGATED AND KRAFT PAPERS Broken-down cardboard boxes (not cereal or shoe boxes) and brown paper bags can be deposited for baling and recycled together. They should be clean, dry, and preferably free of contaminants—including waxed cardboard, staples, and tape.

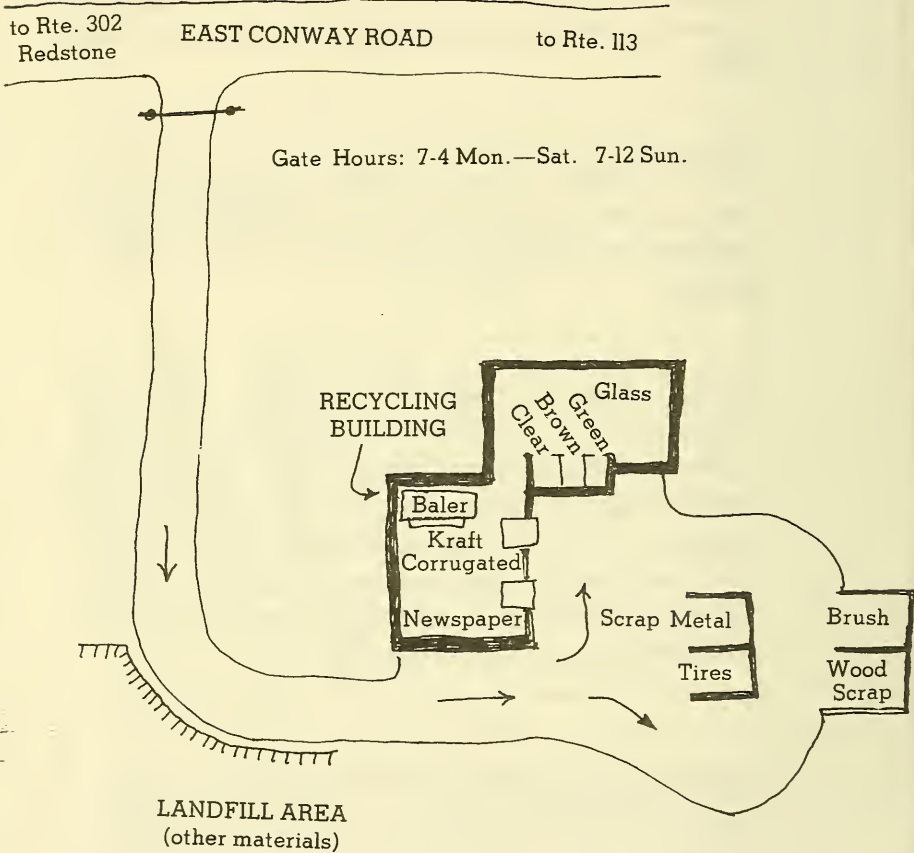
NEWSPAPER Free of glossy magazines and scrap paper, newspaper should be kept dry and preferably bundled with string in 12 to 18 inch stacks.

GLASS A large "roll-off" container with three compartments is available for clear, amber (brown), and green bottles and jars. Glass must be separated by color, either as it is discarded at home or as it is deposited at the facility. Labels and metal caps and rings need not be removed. Baking, plate, and windshield glass; light bulbs; and pottery are not acceptable.

FUTURE MATERIALS With increased participation in separating out the above materials, it should become feasible to recycle others. Aluminum and steel (tin) cans and plastic jugs can readily be baled and sold.

public law is not made in a proper manner, and it takes away individual rights, then the law should be corrected or repealed. All of our law in the last three years has been made according to enabling legislation and by a vote of the people at Town Meeting. You, the voters, can change or do away with it at your will. There is a financial cost to uphold municipal law, but, in the opinion of your Chairman, there is a greater cost if there is no law. It is, of course, the decision of the voters to determine the future of the town's growth and services.

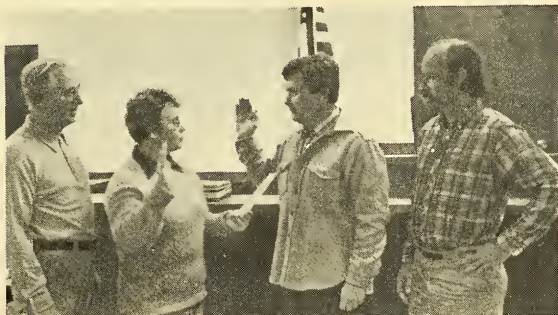
The Police Commissioners and Selectmen have worked closely and well together for the last three years, and the Board is thankful to have these dedicated people setting police policy, in conjunction with the Selectmen's input to them, for the town.

The key to successful government in this Town is participation by the citizens. A cross section of the community serves continuously in many ways, and the Selectmen wish to give credit to these people and express their thanks for these efforts.

The most important issue before us this year, is the decision for the solid waste solution. Should we incinerate our solid waste, or not? There is concern in Congress over those industries that are polluting our lakes and streams by creating acid rain. If we support our legislators in their concern over clean air and clean water, can we afford to do less? The regional solution which is most economical for the long term, and complies with the Federal Clean Air Act, is incineration. We cannot build at lower cost in the future. The principle of regionalization is that it will cost less per taxpayer than it would if the Town of Conway were to construct a facility on its own. The effect on the budget through taxes would not occur until mid 1984. The cost to a taxpayer in Conway would be 83¢ per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. Thus, if your property were valued at \$50,000, you would pay \$41.50 per year.

My message as Chairman this year, is that business, government, management, and workers, must work together as a team to give the people educated choices for decisions that will affect the quality of their lives and their taxes. By oath, the Selectmen's role is to implement policy and uphold the laws established by the voters. There should be debate and challenge, but not on a personalized level. The majority should not hold it against the minority, personally, for dissenting on issues, and vice versa. I believe that sensible growth is the question in the minds of our citizens and, hopefully, we can create a town that can attract light industry and other job opportunities. Human misery is attached to high levels of unemployment, and the exercise of home rule will allow us to help prevent this.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

Building starts followed the general economic trend in 1981. There were fewer new home and commercial building permit applications, but more for additions, renovations and alterations including the conversion of larger, economically expensive, (energy-wise) older homes to condominiums.

It is hard to anticipate any change unless interest rates drop substantially in the months ahead, which will mean even more buildings being renovated and converted as the cost of energy increases.

The added revenue generated by the construction of the Mall was a tremendous help in keeping the 1981 tax rate down. We cannot count on this kind of major construction yearly; however, and our only hope is to keep up with the changes as closely as possible.

As many taxpayers know, there is a penalty affixed to failure to file the Inventory of Taxable Property form, which the State requires each town to send out each year. This year there is some hope that, because of a bill in the legislature at the time this report is being written, each municipality will have the option as to require the inventories be filed or not. It may not happen in time to help in 1982, however.

Following are some statistics comparing tax rates and valuations by precinct:

The Assessor's office processed 5,283 tax bills in 1981. This resulted in a net taxable value of \$208,463,624, up approximately fourteen million from 1980.

CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION

The year 1981 was a busy year for the Police Department. The Town's need for police services has increased dramatically as a result of business growth within the Town. The increase in crime, the unfortunate carnival accident and the two homicides put an added strain on our budget this past year. With the poor economical situation in mind we have tried to keep requests for 1982 to a minimum. However, it should be mentioned that in poor times the police agencies are often the busiest, and present trends seem to bear this out.

In the interests of our Town, the Commissioners through the courts pursued and won a reversal of the N.H. Labor Relations Board directive telling us we had to recognize the Union as the bargaining agent for the Police Officers. The Court decided in our favor because it could not justify the inclusion of probationary officers which was our feeling and reason for appealing the decision of the N.H. Public Employees Labor Relations Board. After the decision was rendered, we met with members of the Police Department and agreed to recognize them as the Conway Police Association for the purposes of bargaining and to deal with our differences on a local level in hopes of maintaining harmony within the Department.

The new Motorola Console that was authorized at the 1981 Town Meeting has been installed and is now operating.

A Prosecutor's position was tried this past year at minimal cost to us by obtaining William Albrecht on a work study program from Franklin Pierce Law School. Mr. Albrecht was a third year law student and performed very well as the Department Prosecutor. This year we are asking to fill this position on a full-time basis to allow the detectives to have more time for investigative purposes.

The turnover in personnel was minimal this past year. Two patrolmen were promoted to Sergeant, Christopher Canney and Leon Shackley.

We were unfortunate in having a great many problems with the two Plymouth Cruisers resulting in an excessive maintenance cost so we met with the Budget Committee and they authorized the purchase of two 1982 Ford Cruisers to replace them.

The public attendance at the regular Commission meetings dealt mostly with problems of safety and citizen concerns which were handled and a solution to solve them was directed to the Chief or Town official that was able to take care of a particular complaint.

As Commissioners, we are proud of the Police Department and the services that they provide the Town.

We would like to thank the Selectmen and Town Staff for their assistance and look forward to a continuation of mutual cooperation in the future.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

The year 1981 has been recorded as a year that brought tragedy and sorrow to our community. We experienced only one fatal automobile accident but suffered three other untimely deaths. Two of the deaths were a result of homicide and the third a tragic accidental death at the Americal Legion carnival.

The Department experienced a 29% increase in requests for police services. We received 55,765 telephone calls or an increase of 41% over 1980. The number of criminal offenses reported increased by 10% and criminal arrests were up by 5%. The Department arrested or summoned 2,144 persons to appear in court while issuing 2,332 warnings for violations.

The new communications equipment has been installed. The console has given us direct communication with the Oxford County Sheriff's Department in addition to the Carroll County Sheriff's Department, New Hampshire State Police, and Town Fire Departments. We have also included a new frequency to be used for other municipal services. All radio and telephone communications are tape recorded and many other features are included in this console.

I must report that the 1981 Police Budget will reflect an overexpenditure. I take full responsibility for this overexpenditure. I do not have the final budget figures at this writing but believe the overexpenditure to be in the area of 1%.

The explanation that I offer is the unanticipated costs of the two homicide investigations and the New Hampshire Retirement System having doubled the Town's contribution for employee retirement.

The 1982 Conway Police Department budget reflects an increase of 13.9% over the 1981 budget.

I offer the following explanation:

LABOR:

An increase of \$43,813, or 12%, is the result of negotiated salaries, increased costs of foot patrol, overtime, and the addition of a prosecutor to handle all court cases on a full time basis.

BENEFITS:

An increase of \$30,976, or 38%, is the result of a negotiated increase in Blue Cross/Blue Shield and a mandatory increase in the Town's contribution to the New Hampshire Retirement System.

VEHICLES:

An increase of \$1,137, or 2%, is attributed to the increased cost of fleet operations.

The overall increase requested is \$75,926.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

There has been an increase in activities in the Conway Public Library each year for the past ten years. Circulation rose from 25,311 in 1971 to 38,398 in 1981, an increase of 52%, and in the past year from 36,791 to 38,398, an increase of 4.4%. Reference questions rose from 460 in 1971 to 2,224 in 1981, an increase of 383%, and in the past year from 2,072 to 2,224, an increase of 7.3%.

Many reference questions were answered through the inter-library loan service (non-fiction only), which increased from 169 in 1971 to 381 in 1981, an increase of 125%, and from 324 in 1980 to 381 in 1981, an increase of 17%.

The number of volumes in the library has grown from 12,834 in 1971 to 16,508 in 1981, an increase of 25%. Included are many paperbacks which have been given to the library, and which are very popular.

The library is now a depository for copies of minutes of meetings of Selectmen, Police Commissioners, Planning Board, Board of Adjustment, School Board, Budget Committee, and the ConWay Committee.

There were many interesting exhibits in the library, including one of some of the old town records.

Several film and discussion programs were held for adults, including "New Hampshire Writers and the Small Town," a slide presentation of the 1980 Blowdown in our area by a representative of the Forest Service, and a series of short stories.

Fifty children who participated in the summer reading program read over 500 books, and received prizes donated by local businesses. Other activities for children included "A Birthday Party for Dr. Seuss," several puppet shows, and 54 story times and summer films.

The library continues to be used for meetings by community groups, including the Historical Society, Stamp Club, Conservation Commission, Arts Council, Children and Youth Project Board meetings, Conway Home Industries, and the ConWay Committee. "The Pot Luck Singers" held a Christmas concert in the library.

Films used by private kindergartens are supplied by the library.

The Conway Woman's Club generously donated three outdoor benches, which are located in the park east of the building. In addition, the Club helped the library in many ways including decorating the Christmas tree and working at the book sale.

The Mountain Garden Club continued to work on landscaping the grounds, planting shrubs in the front and rear of the building.

The library gratefully acknowledges the bequest of Ernest F. Kroner of a cuckoo clock from the Black Forest which hangs in the children's room, all his books and recorders and \$2,000 to be used for two metal plates for the clock and for foreign language magazines. Mr. Kroner was a devoted trustee of the library for many years.

The library is fortunate in its dedicated and enthusiastic staff which has remained unchanged for many years. Two CETA workers joined the staff for the summer.

Deep appreciation is felt for the increasing number of volunteers who help in many different ways.

Margaret Marschner, Librarian, was honored by serving as a member of the search committee that selected a new state librarian.

The trustees and staff are very proud of the library and its continued growth, and appreciate all the support it receives.

PLANNING BOARD

The year 1981 proved to be a busy year for the first elected Planning Board of the Town of Conway. Administration of the Subdivision Regulations required more than half of the time spent by the Board. The following is a summary of subdivision considerations and actions:

In addition to Subdivision Regulations administration, the Board reviewed two flood plain variance requests. The professional services of the North Country Council were used extensively in the following ways: when the Board amended the Subdivision Regulations to comply with recent changes in the State of New Hampshire law; in the writing and adoption of a set of by-laws to guide the Board in its proceedings; and in research and development of comprehensive zoning amendment proposals for the 1982 Town Meeting dealing with the flood plain, mobile home use, sign standards, multi-dwelling unit use for older buildings, and restrictions of amusement and arcade type primary businesses in the Business District.

Conway's 1981 master planning activities began with the efforts of a steering committee directed toward the composition, publication, distribution, and compilation of a community attitude survey. The responses represented approximately one-third of the households and one-half of the registered voters in town. Meanwhile, North Country Council, consultant for the project, was busy assembling sizeable data handbooks from other studies, the 1966 Master Plan, feedback from the town department heads, and their own research. A citizen's advisory board, dubbed the "ConWay Committee", began its monthly meetings in April and subdivided further into three groups dealing with Natural, Human and Community Resources. At this point, goals and objectives are being formulated by each subcommittee and refined by North Country Council, providing the focus for a future land use policy and capital improvements program. Detailing the means of implementing these priorities is the final step before publication of the Master Plan in November, 1982.

The 1981 annual appropriation was \$18,570, including roughly \$9,200 for the Master Plan update process. Expenditures were \$16,087, leaving \$2,483 in the general fund. Fees and charges income turned over to the Town Treasurer amounted to \$2,206.

The coming year should see our Master Plan project completed. Consideration of a possible site plan review process for commercial and multi-dwelling unit development, an in-depth review of the impact of and standards for amusement and arcade type businesses and further review and improvement of the Subdivision Regulations are other priority projects for the Board.

We acknowledge and appreciate the consistent cooperation and assistance we have received from the Town officials. Also, we thank each and every interested citizen that participated with us in the planning process.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

REPORT

The North Country Council has provided a good deal of technical assistance to the Planning Board in a number of areas such as amendments to the zoning ordinance, and site plan review. The Council, under contract, is helping the Town prepare a Town Master Plan. The council has worked on water supply, wastewater treatment, and solid waste issues in the Town. The Council also initiated and coordinated a Downtown Improvement Program, entitled Project MOVE, which was well received by the Town. The Council attended approximately 30 meetings in Conway.

The past year was a busy one for the Council in terms of providing a variety of information and technical assistance to the towns in our region. For nine months, the Council had an active Business Development Program with a staff member contacting industries in southern New Hampshire and northeastern Massachusetts to discuss the characteristics and advantages of the region's growth centers and labor force. As a result, several companies expressed serious interest in locating their industries in the North Country. The Council was also very active in other aspects of economic development including initiation of an industrial park study in Lancaster and providing assistance to the Littleton Industrial Development Corporation in expanding their park. An application was prepared and submitted to the Economic Development Administration for a \$600,000 Revolving Loan Fund to help finance the location of industries in growth center communities.

The mainstay of our assistance to towns has been community planning. The Council staff met throughout the year with planning boards, boards of adjustment, and master plan committees to discuss solutions to local community issues, such as zoning, subdivision review, sign, parking and mobile home regulations, recreation, and more. The Council organized a seminar for Coos County towns on the subdivision review process in April. After the amendment of the subdivision law during the recent legislative session, we sponsored three subregional seminars on the new procedure for subdivision review. Fact sheets on both the new mobile home law and the new subdivision law were prepared and sent to the planning boards and selectmen.

In the area of solid waste, the Council continues to provide assistance to numerous communities by helping them find cost effective solutions to the solid waste problem, such as sanitary landfill, incineration, and resource recovery. The Council has also worked with legislators to draft appropriate amendments to the recently passed solid waste law. In the area of transportation, the Council has continued to encourage the State to improve regional highways. The Council has worked in support of commuter air service to both the Berlin Airport and the Whitefield Regional Airport. The Council worked with the Railroad Division of the DPW&H to encourage the retention and improvement of rail service on the State-owned lines in our region and also to improve other important lines such as the Conway Branch line.

In the area of community development, the Council prepared four applications for community development assistance in 1981 with one, the development of a water supply for Whitefield, receiving full funding from HUD. The Council has been keeping up on the proposed regulations to the Small Cities Community Development Program so that communities in the North Country may benefit from the grant monies as they become available through this program.

In the area of housing the Council has initiated a survey to determine the potential for rehabilitation of existing units in towns as an alternative to the traditional approach of building new housing units. There appears to be general support from the area selectmen for this type of moderately-priced housing project. Energy continues to be a very important project of the Council with NCC acting as a coordinator and clearinghouse for energy conservation and planning information.

During this past session, State Legislators requested our comments on certain bills such as the proposed enterprise zone and the amendments to the Industrial Development Authority legislation. NCC continues to be active in such groups as the National Association of Regional Councils, the NH Environmental Law Clinic, and New Hampshire Regional Planning Commissions, in order to bring valuable information and services to our communities.

The Council is a very cost-effective local organization, as was shown by a recent survey which showed that for every dollar that was appropriated by towns in 1980, almost six dollars in services were provided by the Council. As in the past, the Council's major emphasis will continue to be technical assistance and information on municipal planning and development for local governments, especially selectmen, planning boards, and other related groups. The Council staff is always available to meet with local officials to discuss projects and needs of the towns and ways in which NCC can provide assistance.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission has been involved in many projects during the year. Members were assigned the responsibility of looking after certain parcels of land and reported back as to what immediate action needed to be taken. Some of the actions taken are reported here:

- (1) Puttling Pond: Access road needs to be constructed. Soil Conservation Service designed road and Commission filed for and received dredge and fill permit. Due to financial limitations only a portion of the road will be built in 1982. Nature trails arrows were made and will be in place in 1982.
- (2) Scenic Vista, Route 16: Dead or dying shrubs were removed and selected trees removed to increase scenic view.
- (3) Whitaker Woods: Eastern Slope Ski Club was given permission to use country trails as long as race day signs were posted at each entrance.
- (4) East Conway Common Land: Boundary lines were identified, corner pipes placed and boundary lines brushed out. Final land description to be completed in early 1982.
- (5) Shedd Woods: Boundary work on lower portion of land next to 1st bridge on River Road was completed. Plans are to leave a strip of trees along road and to clear the trees behind to create a large field.

The Commission has also looked into conservation agreements which would provide an economical mechanism for the protection of privately held open space. A Conservation Agreement separates the right to build, the "development rights", from ownership of the land. The landowner who donates his or her development rights through a Conservation Agreement retains all other ownership rights, continues to use and enjoy the land as before and may receive significant tax advantages. But, most importantly, the community receives and enjoys the benefits of the permanently protected open space.

The Conway Conservation Commission in 1981 received a donation from the Walker Pond Association of a parcel of land below the Conway Lake Dam. We thank them for the donation and the trust they have in the Conservation Commission.

WATER SAFETY REPORT

Swimming lessons were held for children from three years of age on up. The three and four-year-old classes worked out well, and we plan to continue offering them. A parent is requested to be on hand for all pre-school children.

During the first four-week session, instructors Tracy Gardner, Verlene Kendrick, Sheryl Lowd and Pam Nagy taught at Echo Lake State Park. Lessons went smoothly; state budget cuts reducing support for the park did not hurt our program there. Ellen Gardner and Rick Rapone were at Conway Lake. The second session saw Tracy and Ellen Gardner at Conway Lake while Pam Nagy taught a concentrated Advanced Lifesaving course at Echo Lake.

Special thanks go to Andy Fickett who did a great job as a volunteer aide at Echo Lake. Karen Grindle and Dodie Bolduc also helped out. We encourage anyone, young or old, with an interest in swimming to consider being an aide in the Water Safety Program.

There was an increase in enrollment over last year--a total of 228 students, not including North Conway Day Care Center children who received private instructions.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Another fire season has come and gone, and again we have lucked out by not having any bad fires. This year Mother Nature helped by keeping things moist enough to protect our beautiful valley.

The quick action of our excellent fire departments and their devoted men has also kept losses to a minimum. This will, and can, not go on forever. Time and odds are against us. We do not have an asbestos valley as some of the public believes. Also, 20 to 24 years ago we could let a few acres burn and not lose too much in value, though to those people concerned it was a lot in those times.

Houses in that era went from \$7,000 to \$40,000 and they were located mostly in the precincts. Land sold for \$200 to \$300 per acre. Today, buildings go from \$40,000 to several million dollars. Land goes for \$2,000 to \$20,000 per acre and everywhere you look you can see houses, buildings, industry and malls. There isn't too much that is not covered with some type of structure.

The Federal and State Governments have all cut back drastically on funds and help for the local towns, and as time goes on, will be cutting back even more. We have trained some local citizens in a trailer park on what to do and how to start an initial attack on a forest or grass fire. Also, in the past two years we have trained some high school students. These people will help the local fire departments. It is one way to beat the financial crunch and make the citizens more aware of fire and its control. If any group or area would like to set up training to get a head-start for protection, please give me a call and we can make arrangements.

If you have brush to burn, do it while the ground is covered with snow. This way we do not need State approval and it eliminates the hazards it could cause in the spring, summer or fall. Any time of year there isn't snow on the ground, giving complete cover around the fire area, you must have a fire permit. When a permit is required, you CANNOT BURN from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., seven days a week. If it is raining during the day, you may burn between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. provided you have a valid fire permit. If at this time it stops raining, you must put the fire out until after 5:00 p.m. A permit may be obtained from the fire chief, or his designate, of the area in which you intend to burn.

All commercial burning will have to be cleared by the State EPA; Sven Carlson, State District Fire Warden; and myself. We should have a 3 - 4 week notice to contact and get approved or not approved for this type of permit.

Have a pleasant and fire free season.

AGREEMENT FOR FORMATION OF MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY
REGIONAL SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL COOPERATIVE

WHEREAS, the municipalities to this Agreement have the duty to provide for the disposal of solid waste generated within their respective territories; and

WHEREAS, the municipalities to this Agreement have determined that it will be a more efficient use of their powers and to their mutual advantage to enter into this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the municipalities to this Agreement are authorized to enter into said Agreement pursuant to the New Hampshire Intergovernmental Agreement Act, RSA 53-A;

NOW, THEREFORE, the municipalities of Eaton, Albany, Conway, Ossipee and Jackson for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements hereinafter stated and the performance, therefor, do hereby promise and agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

PURPOSES

The purposes of this Agreement are to provide for the efficient and economic disposal of solid waste generated within the territories of the municipalities joining in this Agreement, to provide for the recovery and sale of by-products from the disposal of solid waste, and make provision by careful planning and design for the recovery and sale of energy now or in the future as may be deemed practical.

ARTICLE II

ORGANIZATION

The municipalities joining in this Agreement do hereby associate together for the purpose of forming the Mt. Washington Valley Regional Solid Waste Disposal Cooperative to administer and operate a solid waste disposal facility and make provisions for an energy recovery facility as provided herein.

ARTICLE III

ADOPTION OF AGREEMENT

This agreement shall not take effect with respect to the municipalities signing this Agreement unless all of the following occur:

A. The terms of this Agreement conform to the specific requests of the Attorney General, provided that the failure of the Attorney General to approve of this Agreement within thirty days of its submission for review shall constitute approval thereof as provided in RSA 53-A:3, and other agencies of the state government having constitutional or statutory powers of control for their approval or disapproval as may be required pursuant to RSA 53-A:5.

B. This Agreement has been filed with the Clerk of each municipality voting to approve it and with the Office of the Secretary of State.

C. The combined capital authorization of the municipalities voting to adopt this Agreement at the 1982 annual meeting amounts to \$2,193,270.00 provided that the vote of each municipality to adopt this Agreement and appropriate a pro-rata share of the initial capital investment shall be deemed to continue until July 1, 1982.

D. In the event the combined capital authorization of the municipalities voting to approve of this Agreement at the 1982 annual meeting does not amount to \$2,193,270.00, this Agreement shall be adopted as follows:

1. The Boards of Selectmen of the municipalities voting to adopt this Agreement and voting to appropriate a pro-rata share of the capital cost of the facility, shall appoint a director to serve on a provisional board which shall exist until no later than July 1, 1982.

The provisional board shall have the limited authority to:

(a) solicit the membership of additional municipalities to the Cooperative;

(b) determine the pro-rata capital contribution and net operating contribution of new members; and

(c) assess municipalities a pro-rata share of the legal, administrative, and consulting costs associated with the formation of the Cooperative even though the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility is not constructed.

2. Each director serving on the provisional board shall have one vote and all actions by the provisional board under this article shall be by unanimous vote.

3. A municipality or municipalities shall be invited to join the Cooperative subject to such terms and conditions as decided unanimously by the provisional board.

4. If this Agreement is approved by a majority vote of the legislative body of the municipality seeking admission to the Cooperative, said municipality shall become a member of the Cooperative subject to all provisions of this Agreement, any amendments thereto and such further conditions as imposed by the provisional board.

5. As soon as the combined capital authorization of the municipalities approving this Agreement no later than July 1, 1982 amounts to \$2,193,270.00, an organizational meeting of the directors of the respective municipalities shall be convened and the process of financing the cost of construction and the cost of operation of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility shall be implemented as provided in Articles VI and VII hereof.

6. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing sub-paragraphs, and in the event new members cannot be solicited, the provisional board of the municipalities voting to adopt this Agreement shall have the authority to proceed with the project on a reduced scale which fits the needs of the communities represented by the provisional board and within the funds appropriated by the municipalities adopting this Agreement.

ARTICLE IV

ADMINISTRATION

The powers, duties and responsibilities of the Cooperative shall be vested in and exercised by a joint board. Each municipality joining in this Agreement shall be represented by one director who, in the first instance, shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen of the respective municipality. Each director shall have one vote.

The terms of office of the directors representing the respective municipalities approving this Agreement shall be fixed as follows:

Phase I. The directors for the Towns of Eaton and Albany shall have an initial term of one year. Subsequent directors representing said municipalities shall be appointed by the Boards of Selectmen and shall serve for terms of three years.

Phase II. The directors for the Towns of Conway and Ossipee shall serve an initial term of two years. Subsequent directors representing said municipalities shall be appointed by the Boards of Selectmen and shall serve for terms of three years.

Phase III. The directors for the Town of Jackson, and other communities joining the Cooperative, shall serve an initial term of three years. Subsequent directors representing said municipalities shall be appointed by the Boards of Selectmen and shall serve for terms of three years.

In the event of resignation, incapacity or death of a director, the Board of Selectmen of the municipality so affected shall appoint an interim director to fill the unexpired portion of the vacant office.

Any director may be removed from office by the municipality which he represents for any reason which would justify the removal of a public official under the laws of New Hampshire.

Upon the effective date of this Agreement, or as soon thereafter as possible, the directors shall hold an organizational meeting to elect officers, to appoint an operational committee and to appoint such other committees as the joint board shall deem necessary. The joint board shall, at its annual meeting, elect officers to serve for a term of one year. The terms of committee members shall be for such periods as fixed by the joint board.

The joint board shall choose a chairman by ballot from its membership. It shall appoint a secretary and treasurer who may be the same person, but who need not be members of the joint board. The treasurer shall receive and take charge of all money belonging to the Cooperative and shall pay any bill of the Cooperative which has been approved by the joint board. In the event the treasurer is not a member of the joint board, he shall serve at the pleasure of the board; otherwise he shall serve for a term of one year. The treasurer may by vote of the joint board be compensated for his services.

The directors shall appoint from their membership an operational committee consisting of three members. This committee shall have the responsibility of making recommendations to the joint board with regard to the ordinary operation and maintenance of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility.

The joint board shall meet at least bi-monthly. A special meeting of the joint board may be called by the chairman or by any three directors. Unless otherwise provided by this Agreement, all questions decided by the joint board shall be approved by a majority vote of the directors representing all of the municipalities belonging to the Cooperative. Provided that all new capital expenditures shall be by unanimous vote of the directors representing all municipalities belonging to the Cooperative. A quorum for any meeting of the joint board shall consist of one more than one-half of the directors representing all of the municipalities belonging to the Cooperative.

The joint board may adopt by-laws for the conduct of business as long as said by-laws do not conflict with the terms of this Agreement or the provisions of RSA 53-A.

ARTICLE V

POWERS

The Cooperative shall have the following powers and duties:

I. To sue and be sued, but only to the extent and upon the same conditions that a city or town may be sued.

II. To hold, purchase, convey or lease real or personal property for the lawful purposes of the Cooperative and to plan, construct, equip and operate a solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility for the benefit of the member municipalities and to make any necessary contracts in relation thereto.

III. To receive and disburse funds for any lawful purpose for which the Cooperative was formed.

IV. To assess member municipalities for any expenses incurred for the purposes for which the Cooperative was formed.

V. The Cooperative may establish a capital reserve fund for the orderly replacement of existing buildings and equipment which has been approved by the joint board and the Cooperative may establish an operating reserve fund. The joint board shall invest all monies in said funds in the same manner as capital reserve funds of towns are invested pursuant to the requirements of RSA 35:9. The joint board shall serve as the trustees of the capital reserve and operation funds. The trustees of the funds shall post bond in such amount and in such form as the New Hampshire Commissioner of Revenue Administration shall prescribe.

The proposed annual contributions to the capital reserve fund shall be set forth in the budget of the Cooperative and the trustees shall annually within 3 months of the close of the fiscal year of the Cooperative file an account with the selectmen of the towns comprising the Cooperative setting forth the amounts held by the trustees, the manner in which they are invested, and the purposes for which they are held. The trustees may, from time to time, vote to expend any funds held by them for the replacement of existing buildings and equipment required by the Cooperative without further vote of the towns comprising the Cooperative.

VI. From any surplus remaining at the end of any fiscal year, an amount may be transferred to the capital reserve fund provided that the amount transferred shall not exceed one percent (1%) of the last year's

total equalized valuation of the municipalities belonging to the Cooperative.

VII. From any surplus at the end of any fiscal year, an amount may be transferred to the operating reserve fund provided that the amount transferred to said fund shall not in any year exceed five percent (5%) of the operating budget of the Cooperative for the prior year.

VIII. To engage legal counsel.

IX. To submit an annual report to each of the member municipalities containing a detailed financial statement and a statement showing the method by which the annual charges assessed against each municipality were computed.

X. To engage employees and consultants to operate the Cooperative.

XI. To enter into contracts for solid waste disposal with persons, corporations, non-member municipalities and any other lawful political entities.

XII. To incur temporary debt in anticipation of revenue to be received from member municipalities.

XIII. To receive any grants or gifts for the purposes of the Cooperative.

XIV. To engage in any lawful act or activity and exercise any power or powers, privileges or authority exercised or capable of exercise by any individual municipality hereunder and to do any and all of the acts herein set forth or implied and such other acts as are incidental or conducive to attainment of the objects and purposes of the Cooperative.

ARTICLE VI

CAPITAL COST

A. The capital cost for the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility, including equipment, construction, engineering and startup expenses, has been estimated at \$2,193,270.00 which includes a ten percent (10%) overrun allowance.

B. To establish the apportionment of the estimated capital cost of the solid waste disposal facility, including a ten percent (10%) overrun allowance, the total equalized assessed valuation for each municipality for the year 1980, based on figures supplied by the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration, has been determined. The resulting total equalized assessed valuation for each municipality has been divided by the sum total of the total equalized assessed valuation for all municipalities. These percentages of total equalized assessed valuations have been multiplied by the above estimate of capital costs to determine the pro-rata share of the capital costs apportioned to each municipality.

C. In the event the Cooperative is established by the process contained in Article III, Paragraph D, the capital cost for the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility, including equipment, construction, engineering and startup expense, plus ten percent (10%) allowance for an overrun, shall be determined and apportioned by the joint board in the same manner as described in Paragraph B above.

For those municipalities adopting this Agreement between the 1982 annual meeting and July 1, 1982, the joint board shall determine and apportion the share of said communities by employing the same method of apportionment as provided in Paragraph B. above.

ARTICLE VII

COST OF OPERATION

A. The term "net cost of operation" or "net operating cost" shall mean all costs and expenses of the Cooperative relating to the operation and maintenance of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility, including without limitation, all costs of accepting, processing, storing and disposing of waste, labor, utilities and all costs associated with spare parts, equipment, insurance, maintenance of equipment and facilities, cleaning services, general outside accounting service, consulting services and legal services, and all costs and expenses relating to the payment of any bond or indebtedness, including principal, interest and bonding charges, whether incurred by one municipality or two or more municipalities for the benefit of the Cooperative, minus revenues received by the Cooperative in exchange for the sale of energy or from the sale of by-products recovered from the processing of said waste.

Provided, further, that the costs incurred by the individual municipalities for transporting solid waste to the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility shall not be considered in determining the net operating cost.

B. The net operating cost of said facility for the first year and the apportionment to each community shall be determined by the joint board by first determining the total equalized assessed valuation for each municipality in the preceding year, based on figures supplied by the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration. The resulting figures shall be divided by the whole figure of total equalized assessed valuation of all the municipalities. The percent of total equalized assessed valuation by each municipality shall be multiplied by an estimate of the net cost of operation as determined by the joint board for the first year. The resulting figure shall be the mandatory operational fee for each member municipality for the first year. The apportionment of net operating cost for each community will be determined in the same manner for each succeeding year.

C. The success of the Cooperative is premised upon the Agreement by each municipality to guarantee its share of the operating costs during the term of this contract. Accordingly, after the second full year of membership in the Cooperative each municipality approving this Agreement guarantees to share annually its percentage of the total

operating costs as determined above.

D. Each member of the Cooperative shall to the best ability of the Cooperative, be guaranteed that during the term of this Agreement it shall be permitted to process a certain percentage of the total solid waste processed at the facility in any one year, which percentage shall at least be equal to the average of the percentage processed by it during the first and second years of membership in the Cooperative; however, the Cooperative shall utilize its best efforts to receive all solid waste of member towns entering into this Agreement prior to July 1, 1982, and said towns shall be given priority over any other town entering into the Cooperative or using the facility after July 1, 1982.

E. Notwithstanding any provisions in this Agreement, the Cooperative may, by unanimous vote of the joint board, decide to adjust the relative pro-rata shares of the members in regard to initial capitalization, net operating fees and guaranteed percentages.

ARTICLE VIII

OPERATING AGREEMENT

The Cooperative may in the future enter into an Agreement with a customer for energy produced and in this event, each member municipality agrees that it will be bound by the terms and provisions of such an Agreement relating to, but not necessarily limited to, such subjects as vehicular regulations, liability for processing of hazardous waste, hours of operation and health and safety regulations.

ARBITRATION

A. In the event a dispute shall arise between any member municipality and the Cooperative with respect to the manner in which the total equalized assessed valuation of said municipality was computed in any year, such dispute shall be resolved by arbitration as hereinafter provided.

1. Within 15 days of the determination of the total equalized assessed valuation by the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration, each municipality shall notify the joint board of any dispute regarding the manner in which the total equalized assessed valuation of said municipality was computed.

2. Within 15 days of the receipt of said notice of dispute, the joint board and said municipality shall meet with the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration to review the method by which the total equalized assessed valuation of said municipality was determined.

3. In the event any such dispute cannot be resolved within 30 days of said meeting, then the municipality and the joint board each shall appoint a person as arbitrator who shall have had at least 5 years of experience in the State of New Hampshire with the appraisal of real estate. If either party fails to appoint an arbitrator, as is provided, the other party's arbitrator shall give notice of his intent to appoint a second arbitrator and after expiration of twenty (20) days from receipt of notice, said arbitrator shall appoint an arbitrator, at which time all arbitrators shall have the power to act in furtherance of the provisions of this Agreement.

4. Within 15 days of their appointment, said arbitrators shall

appoint an umpire who shall have had 5 years of experience in the State of New Hampshire with the appraisal of real estate.

5. In the case of the failure of said arbitrators to agree upon an umpire, then such umpire shall be appointed by the American Arbitration Association from its qualified panel of arbitrators.

6. The arbitrators and umpire, after being duly sworn to perform their duties with impartiality and fidelity, shall proceed to determine the question submitted. The decision of the arbitrators and the umpire shall be rendered within 30 days after their appointment and such decisions shall be in writing and in duplicate, one counterpart thereof to be delivered to each of the parties hereto.

7. The award of the arbitrators shall be binding, final and conclusive on the parties.

8. Each of the parties shall be responsible for the fees and expenses for the arbitrator appointed by it. The fees and expenses of the umpire shall be borne equally between the parties.

9. The fees of respective counsel engaged by the parties and the fees of the expert witnesses and other witnesses called by the parties, shall be paid by the respective party engaging such counsel or calling and engaging such witnesses.

ARTICLE IX

PREPARATION OF ANNUAL BUDGET

Each year the joint board shall determine the amounts necessary to be raised to maintain and operate the Cooperative during the next calendar year and the amounts required for payment of debt and interest incurred by the Cooperative that will be due in the next calendar year. The joint board shall prepare a budget and make a preliminary apportionment of the amount so determined among the member municipalities in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. Prior to December 31st, the joint board shall hold at least one public hearing at some convenient place in Conway and Ossipee on the amounts required in the budget and the preliminary apportionment of the amounts listed in the budget. At least seven days notice of the meeting shall be given by publication of the budget and apportionment in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation within said towns and by posting a copy of the budget and apportionment in a public place in each municipality in the Cooperative.

After the hearings, the joint board shall adopt a budget and make a final determination of the apportionment among the member municipalities. After the joint board has adopted the budget and determined the apportionment of the expenses, the Cooperative treasurer shall certify to the Boards of Selectmen of the member municipalities in the Cooperative the amount of money assessed each municipality. The selectmen of each municipality shall seasonably assess the taxes to be raised to pay the apportionments. Each municipality treasurer shall pay to the Cooperative the amount so apportioned in quarterly installments each year, due on March 31st, June 30th, September 30th and December 31st.

The joint board shall cause a certified public accountant licensed to practice in either the State of New Hampshire or the Commonwealth of

Massachusetts to conduct an annual audit of the accounts and records of the Cooperative.

ARTICLE X

ADMISSION OF NEW MEMBERS

After initial adoption of this Agreement, municipalities may be admitted to the Cooperative by a majority vote of the legislative body of the municipality seeking admission and upon such terms and conditions as established by a unanimous vote of the joint board of the Cooperative. New members shall agree to all of the provisions of the Agreement and any amendments thereto, and any other conditions of admittance imposed by the joint board.

ARTICLE XI

DURATION OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall continue in force for a term of fifteen years or extended throughout the life of the facility. No municipality approving this Agreement may withdraw from the Cooperative for any reason during the term of this Agreement.

Each municipality approving this Agreement hereby agrees to pay its full pro-rata share of net operating costs of the facility as defined by Article VII hereof.

ARTICLE XII

BREACH OF AGREEMENT

A municipality shall be deemed to be in breach of this Agreement if it fails to appropriate or make timely payment of its share of capital cost and mandatory operating costs or if it fails to perform or comply with any of the terms, provisions, or conditions of this Agreement or operating guidelines and regulations. The joint board shall give a municipality written notice of specific acts or omissions which constitute breach. The municipality so notified shall have seven (7) days to conform. If the municipality fails to conform within the above mentioned time period, then the joint board shall have the power to exclude the solid waste generated by said municipality from processing at the solid waste disposal facility. No such exclusion shall render the Cooperative liable for damages or relieve the municipality deemed to be in breach from performance of its obligations hereunder and the Cooperative reserves the right to insist upon specific performance by the municipality deemed to be in breach of its obligations under this Agreement and/or claim money damages. Any municipality found to be in breach of this Agreement by a court of law shall be responsible to the Cooperative for its reasonable attorney's fees and expenses incurred in respect to said breach.

ARTICLE XIII

DISTRIBUTION OF ASSETS

Assets of the Cooperative remaining at the time of termination of this Agreement shall be divided among the municipalities according to their proportionate payments or contributions to the capital construction and improvement of the Cooperative during the full term of this

Agreement, except that any municipality entering the Cooperative after July 1, 1982, shall only share according to its proportionate payment or contribution to the capital and improvement costs made by it upon and after its entry into the Cooperative.

ARTICLE XIV

AMENDMENT

This Agreement may be amended only in the following manner:

The director representing any member municipality on the joint board may propose amendments. Any amendment must be the subject of at least one public hearing called in a convenient place within Conway and Ossipee. At least seven days notice of the time, place and subject of the hearing shall be published in a paper or papers of general circulation within said towns and posted in a public place in each member municipality. After the hearings, the joint board may adopt the amendment and certify it to the Board of Selectmen of each municipality. The adoption of any amendment shall require approval by at least two-thirds of the Boards of Selectmen of the member municipalities.

ARTICLE XV

SEPARABILITY

In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions contained herein shall not in any way be affected or impaired thereby.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the municipalities of Albany, Eaton, Conway, Jackson, and Ossipee have caused this Agreement to be signed by a majority of their Boards of Selectmen as of the dates hereinafter written.

LEASE

THIS LEASE made this day of , 1982

WITNESS

That the Town of Conway, a municipal corporation duly organized and existing within the State of New Hampshire, hereby leases, demises, and lets unto MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL COOPERATIVE, an association of towns within Carroll County, New Hampshire, as follows:

The existing solid waste disposal site with the buildings thereon and appurtenances thereto located near and non-adjacent to the Redstone Road leading to East Conway in said Town of Conway, as owned of record by the Town of Conway.

Said property is leased "as is" and shall be used by the Cooperative consistent with the purposes thereof, which Cooperative shall hold the Town of Conway free from liability by reason of any operation conducted on said site by the Cooperative (other than to the extent the Town of Conway as a member of said Cooperative shall be liable thereof).

The Cooperative shall use the site for a regional solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility. In connection therewith, the Cooperative shall not violate the Town of Conway ordinances "Respecting the Dumping, Processing, Removal, and Disposal of Hazardous Wastes" as now existing or any amendments thereto.

This lease shall hold for a term of fifteen (15) years or the duration of the contract of the Cooperative with the participating towns, including the Town of Conway, whichever longer, with the term to commence with the execution of the Cooperative Agreement.

The rental fee for the entire term shall be One Dollar (\$1), the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged.

The Cooperative shall bear all costs of maintenance, repair, suitable insurance, and all other expenses arising in conjunction with the use and operation of said site, with the Town to have no expenses by reason of its legal ownership thereof (not to exclude the Town's obligations by reason of the Cooperative Agreement).

The Town covenants with the Cooperative that the Cooperative may occupy the premises during the term aforesaid peaceably and free from all lawful claims of any other person.
