TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Veterans' Memorial Building, in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Auditors and all other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for building and repairing bridges, for the suppression of moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of town officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of the Town halls, for the support of libraries, for State and County taxes, for the observance of Memorial Day, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for playground purposes, for co-operating with the State and Federal governments in control of insect pests and white pine blister and for all other necessary charges arising in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will accept State aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as the Windham Road leading from Shute's Corner to Windham Junction and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said pur-

pose, the sum of \$1884.00; or will accept State aid for construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose, the sum of \$1037.02, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will direct the Collector of Taxes to allow a discount to all persons paying their taxes within such period as the Town shall limit, to fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes for the year 1941 on the negotiable notes of the Town, said loans to be repaid from 1941 taxes collected, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 or any other sum of money for the purposes of advertising and giving publicity to the natural industrial advantages of the Town of Derry, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for free public band concerts in the Town during the summer of 1941, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00, or any other sum of money for the purpose of providing supervision, instruction, equipment and maintenance at the Hood Pond Park, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to make an audit of the accounts and records of all the Departments of the Town, and that copies of the same be printed and available at the office of the Selectmen at a price not

exceeding fifty (50c) cents per copy, and raise and appropriate any money necessary thereunder, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to direct the Collector of Taxes to extend the time for the sale of property for unpaid taxes to not earlier than August 1 in each year, starting in the year 1942, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to extend street lighting on Crystal Avenue to the Londonderry Town line on Route 28, so-called lights to be so placed that a light will be in front of dwellings thereon, and raise and appropriate any money therefor, and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. (By petition) To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be spent for the improvement of the road running along the rear of the shore lots on the Southerly side of Beaver Lake from the outlet of said Lake to the tarred road near Comeau's Beach, and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the bequest made to it under the will of Helen M. Barker, late of Methuen, Massachusetts, for the benefit of Taylor Library, and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.

16. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before such meeting.

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY

Annual Report of the Trustees.

On February 7th, 1941/ at a meeting of the trustees, Miss Edith Hall was re-appointed librarian for one year. Miss Elaine Peart was reappointed assistant librarian.

The appended reports of the librarian and treasurer cover fully the work of the library and are submitted herewith:

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library,

The 36th annual report is herewith presented:

The Derry Public Library marked its 35th anniversary August 10th. The following statistics show the growth of the library during the 35 years: When the library opened in 1905 there were 1229 books on the shelves. During the first six months after the library opened 922 cards were issued and 9,747 books loaned with a daily average of 69. The largest number loaned in a single day was 169.

Now the library has 2386 active borrowers with a circulation of 49,695 during the year 1940. The largest day was March 6 when 335 books were loaned. The average daily circulation at the present time is 165. This shows how much the library has been appreciated by the people of Derry.

This year the library has had many worthwhile exhibits. In April, Garden Book Week was observed. Many posters, garden books and seed catalogs were on display. A picture of the display was taken for the newspapers and your librarian submitted the picture and a story of the events of the week in the National Garden Book Week contest. The result was a small cash prize for the library.

A Button Show and also a Hobby Show called forth many unusual treasures. This attracted many visitors from out of town.

An exhibit of soap carving was loaned by the National Soap Sculpture Committee. This was on display two weeks and proved very interesting.

Once again our library was given National recognition when the picture of the 1939 Book Week prize winners was awarded a prize in the Junior Literary Guild Book Week contest. This prize was a beautifully illustrated copy of Wagner's operas.

The various schools also gave us many interesting exhibits of their school's projects.

Miss Hazel Stevens of Derry loaned us the Mexican exhibit made by her children in the second grade of the Pollard School in Plaistow. The foundation for this exhibit was a Mexican story book loaned by the library to Miss Stevens.

A vacation reading club was enjoyed by the grade children during the summer. This year the reading project was "shingling a house". For every two books read a bright colored shingle with the child's name was placed on the roof of the little "library house". Thirty-eight diplomas were given in the fall to those that had read the required number of books during the summer.

Classes were held in the library for instruction in the use of the catalog and location of books on the shelves. This year an English class of 35 to 38 were given a full class period of instruction and practical work among the books on the shelves. The students were accompanied by their English teacher. This method proved far more satisfactory than the 20 minute periods of last year.

Book Week was observed in the usual manner. Children's books were displayed in an attractive manner. This year a table of new 1940 books for adults were on exhibit. This proved a very pleasing arrangement. The new books could be looked over and then reserved for later reading.

Children's book week contests were of great interest to children and adults. The lower grades had a poster contest. Many fine posters were submitted. The judges were Mrs. Walter Pillsbury, Mrs. Florence Addison, and Miss Elsie Gaskin. Prizes were given to the following children: 6th grade—Louise Morency, first, Phyllis Gratton, second; 5th grade—Anna Eaton.

first, Carolyn Nutt, second; 4th grade—Elaine Rand, first, Patricia Butterfield, second.

Junior High contest was "window shopping". Doris Joslyn was winner for the 8th grade and Louise Smith stood first for the 7th grade.

The Public Library contribution to the flower show this year was a fine display of new books and posters on flower arrangement.

The Garden Club decorated the mantle and front door again this year for the holiday season. In addition to the Garden Club decorations the little "library house" was lighted with candles and Santa was seen on the roof with his sleigh and reindeer. This made an attractive addition to the Christmas decorations.

Your librarian and her assistant attended the neighborhood meeting held in Auburn. We were also in attendance at the three day meeting of the State Association.

Miss Peart attended Library Summer School for two weeks.

We wish to extend our thanks to those who have given books and magazines to the library during the last year and to the newspapers who have printed our lists and notices. The store keepers should have thanks for their kindness in donating space in their windows during Book Week for the "window shopping" contest for the Junior High students.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Derry:

I herewith submit my third annual report as superintendent of schools of Derry.

Each year our report consists of statistics and a brief review of the progress of the schools. It is our sincere hope, in presenting this material, that it may serve as a means of permanent record as well as information which may be of public interest.

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment through January 31, 1941 was 772 as compared with 803 for the same period last year and 778 two years ago.

Through the death of Mr. Joseph Edwards last spring the community lost one of its most active men and the Oak Street School was deprived of a capable instructor. Mr. Edwards had taught shop work to the eighth grade boys for several years. His untimely demise is regrettable.

During the summer Mr. Charles Beard resigned his position as manual arts teacher to accept a promotion to the high school in Rochester. He was replaced by Mr. Joseph P. MacCormack, of Manchester, who is a graduate of St. Anselm's and Fitchburg Teachers' Colleges.

Miss Marjorie L. Frost, of Derry, was added to the staff of the Oak Street School. Miss Frost is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and has taught for several years with fine success in the schools of East Jaffrey.

On January 29, 1941 Mr. Neil Sullivan was granted a leave of absence from his duties as teacher of mathematics and physical education at the Oak Street School. Mr. George Zoulias of Manchester, a graduate of Keene and Salem Teachers College, was selected as his substitute.

REPAIRS, SPRING & SUMMER 1940

All schools were given the usual attention during the summer vacation period. Besides the regular cleaning and minor repair jobs there were various projects undertaken. This work included:

Floyd School

- Weatherstripping windows of Grades 2 and 3
- Work on boiler and chimney
- Painting of basement and toilet floors.
- Painting of lower walls of classrooms and corridors

Oak Street School

- Correction of leaks in forge shop and main roof.
- Correction of leaks through brickwork into basement.
- Rewiring of shop rooms.
- Painting of classroom ceilings, shop and basement walls.
- Repair of lower front porch.
- New gutters and drain pipes.
- Improvements on boiler and plumbing.

West Side School

- New urinal in boys' basement.
- New gutters and drain pipes.
- Grading school yard.
- Electrical work.
- Painting of toilet floors.

It has been and will continue to be our policy to maintain the school plants in the best condition possible. As necessary repairs and needed improvements exist it is good policy, both from the standpoint of economy and safety, to correct them. Included in the work planned for next summer, besides the usual cleaning and minor repairs, is the installation of new floors

in the West Side School to replace some of those which are in very poor condition, and painting window sashes and white trim at the Floyd School.

It should be planned to paint the outside of the West Side and Oak Street Schools in the not-too-distant future. Consideration should also be given weather-stripping at the West Side School and the completion of the work begun this year at the Floyd School.

The yard and play space around the West Side School is a continual source of worry. It is dangerous for the pupils to play in front of the building near the main street. If the boys and girls are to continue to play in and around the front of the building a sturdy fence should be constructed which will protect the children in their play. Should the district purchase additional land in the rear of the building not only would more adequate space be provided but the appearance of the grounds in front of the school could be greatly improved with a small outlay of money.

INSTRUCTION

The program of the seventh and eighth grades has been greatly improved during the current year. By hiring an additional teacher it has been possible to divide each grade into three sections for classroom teaching, instead of two. The enrollment in the seventh and eighth grades had increased to the point which made this step absolutely necessary. Instead of classes with forty-five to fifty pupils no teacher now has more than thirty-five. The advantages of this smaller number per class are obvious.

Another marked improvement which should be mentioned has to do with the shop program of the junior high school grades. This department has been completely reorganized since the previous report at no added expense to the district but with a very definite

increase in efficiency. In the previous few years the boys of the eighth grade were given machine shop training. The machines so used, besides being quite antiquated, were not suitable for instructional purposes on this level. Besides these facts, the floor space taken up by the machines should be used to greater advantage each school day. It was possible to dispose of the machines to the Claremont School Department for use in its senior high school at a price of seven hundred dollars. The money obtained has been partially utilized in re-organization for the purchase of necessary tools, apparatus, and materials. Today, we are offering woodworking to the seventh grade boys and general shop to the eighth grade. This latter unit is taught under the following sub-divisions:- woodworking, forging and metal work, electricity, plastics, and drawing. The program so presented is well within the grasp of the pupils and unquestionably more practical. Many fine projects have been completed by these classes.

The domestic arts department of the junior high schools has been given proper attention. Besides the additions made in previous years a new combination sewing machine has been purchased, besides necessary kitchen utensils. Here the girls are not only learning to sew but practise in cooking and serving meals is a requirement of the course. Other phases of home making are also stressed.

We have continued to increase upon the amount and quality of the textbooks which are used in all grades. Pupils now have individual copies of books for class use in most major subjects since we have been successful in furnishing additional texts in arithmetic, language, music, geography, and history. A new fourth grade history series has been adopted. Improvements are continually being carried on in reading, with texts

and materials being furnished in all grades.

Important textbook needs which should be given attention next are history for grades five, social science for grades seven and eight, and language for grade three.

Last spring a new state law was enacted which made it necessary to instruct the physically handicapped child. As a result steps were taken to carry out the dictates of the law. Lip-reading classes were taught for a period of ten weeks during the spring. Twelve pupils who were hard of hearing met twice weekly under the leadership of Mrs. Catherine E. Hammond of Manchester. We were most fortunate to obtain Mrs. Hammond for this work; she was highly recommended by the State Department of Education which assisted us in establishing our classes. At the same time home instruction for one child, who was unable to attend school because of a tubercular hip, was offered. Part of the expense of the lip-reading classes was shared by the school districts of Chester and Derry Village since one pupil from each town participated.

May I call your attention to the following passage from an article, "Interpreting 'A Bill of Rights for the Handicapped Child'", by Marjorie S. Woodbury of Manchester, which appeared in the N. H. S. T. A. Bulletin of January 1941 — "Following the preliminary steps, in some school systems, classes have been established in lip-reading and speech training taught by specially qualified teachers. Among all such, to Derry must be awarded the palm of being the first supervisory union in the State to organize public school classes meeting on school days in regular schools hours . . . , with Mrs. Catherine E. Hammond as teacher, the classes began on Good Friday, 1940, meet twice weekly throughout the school year."

At the present time we are continuing classes in lip-

reading for eleven pupils of the first eight grades. Londonderry and Derry Village are each financially interested in the project, with one child from each town enrolled. Interested citizens are invited to visit these classes.

It will be necessary in planning budgets for future years to provide means for carrying out the provisions of Chapter 156 of the 1939 laws.

TRANSPORTATION

The transportation routes remain the same as for the previous year as far as the Checker Cab Company is concerned. Routes covered by three of these buses transport around ninety pupils. Mrs. Henry Chase carries three children who live in the Number Nine district.

HOT LUNCHESES

During the fall plans were completed for serving a cup of hot soup or cocoa to the pupils who travel to school by bus or otherwise remain at school throughout the noon hour. Since the Thanksgiving Recess about ninety pupils have been receiving this benefit at the Floyd and Oak Street Schools each day. This project has been made possible through the financial assistance of the Derry Kiwanis Club which has contributed generously, the Derry Junior Woman's Club, and the P. T. A. Due credit must be given the teachers and pupils who have prepared and served the food, and the members of the school board who assisted in making the project possible.

MUSIC

A move to interest junior high school pupils in playing musical instruments has been started through the cooperation of Miss Clara Marquis, assisted by Mr. Ralph Matthews. Groups were formed for the study of cer-

tain instruments and in recent weeks these units have been combined into an orchestra. This type of endeavor furnishes a desirable activity to include in the training of boys and girls. It is hoped that, with the purchase of a few instruments as a nucleus, this form of music instruction may be permanent to the seventh and eighth grades.

The second annual public presentation of the music department was given on Friday, April 19, 1940, at the Adams Memorial Hall. "A Pageant of America" was prepared by the pupils and teachers under the direction of the music supervisors. The pageant portrayed the growth of music with the development of this country. Nearly two hundred pupils took an active part with each school and grade being represented. This program not only was enjoyed by those people who attended but it proved to be an excellent project for the pupils.

GRADUATION EXERCISES

On Tuesday afternoon, June 18, 1940, eighty-five graduates of the junior high school were awarded diplomas at the Adams Memorial Building. This group was one of the largest classes to graduate. Citizenship awards, presented each year by the Molly Reid Chapter, D. A. R., were awarded to Murial Bain and Thomas Caron. Appropriate exercises preceded the presentation of certificates to the following:

THE BUDGET

The total appropriation which the budget for 1941-1942 suggests is about the same amount voted for the current year. This has been made possible, even though it has been necessary to increase certain items of the budget, due to the fact that a state aid check of \$1150.24 has been received plus a balance which will exist at the end of the school year from the allotment for high school tuition. The total estimated cash on hand for July 1, 1941 is \$2,500.00.

We are likely to have over 220 pupils in high school next year. However, the budget calls for the same tuition figure which was approved for 1940 - 1941. In recent years most of the pupils who finished the eighth grade entered high school. This year has been an exception because twenty pupils who were graduated from the Oak Street School in June did not enter high school. Many of them were over-age and have since entered some form of employment. If most of the graduates of the junior high school should enter secondary school in September we will probably be faced with a deficit at this time next year.

Included in the item of teachers' salaries is an amount for the instruction of handicapped children.

It seems advisable to ask for the same amount under repairs since there are various improvements, as mentioned previously, which should be accomplished in order to maintain the school plants in good condition.

It is interesting to notice that the per pupil cost of the Derry elementary schools for 1939-1940 was \$67.72 as compared with a state median of \$81.85.

CONCLUSION

May I recommend to your consideration and careful study the principles and policies set forth by the Educational Policies Commission in "Education and the

Defense of American Democracy." The following quotation is taken from that document. "The defense of America requires that all agencies lay aside interests of secondary nature, submerge petty competitive rivalries, and concentrate a wide range of procedures upon providing for the common defense. It requires confidence in the sincerity and reliability of one's fellow citizens and comradeship in the common search for solutions to the nation's problems. It requires above all, that common understanding of aims and procedures which leads to united and effective action. Of such elements is the defense of our democracy to be built. In the building of it the schools of America are ready and determined to play their part."

I wish to thank you, the members of the School Board and our fellow citizens, for the broad-minded interest and patience extended to the schools in our dealing with our very human problems.

Also may I express appreciation to the teachers and other assistants for their loyalty while carrying through the work of another year.

To the School Board of Derry Village:

I herewith submit my third annual report as superintendent of schools of Derry Village.

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment for grades one through six for the period ending January 31, 1941 was 38, as compared to 41 for the same date last year, and 39 two years ago.

It has been, and will continue to be, our policy to assist and attempt to anticipate the needs of both teachers and pupils in the learning process. Besides being furnished with ample materials and text books, the pupils of the Derry Village School are most fortunate to be guided by two splendid young women as teachers. Miss Thelma Hoyt and Miss Alice Watts are a continual source of inspiration and help to the young people under their care.

Various repairs have been done on the school plant since the last annual report. A faulty sewer condition was corrected, and new grates and a smoke pipe have been installed in the heater. The building has been

made more weather-proof by work around the basement walls. Besides these repairs, the old yellow shades which formerly hung on the upper part of the classroom windows have been replaced.

The building is kept in a clean and comfortable condition by Mr. Ernest Glidden, who acts as janitor.

Continual attention should be focused on the care and up-keep of a building. It is essential and economical to maintain a plant in good repair. With this thought in mind, work should be done in the schoolhouse at an early date. Among the important needs in this respect is the painting and varnishing of walls and ceilings of classrooms, corridors, and toilets.

A study of the budget as proposed for 1941-1942 will reveal a reduction in excess of eight hundred dollars. This lesser amount is due, for the most part, to a smaller anticipated high school enrollment for next year as well as a small surplus which will exist at the end of the present school year. The majority of the items in the proposed budget are essentially the same as for the current year.

One matter of instruction which should be mentioned in this report is the work that has been done according to the dictates of a law passed by the state legislature last spring. This law concerns the instruction of handicapped children. One pupil has been given lip-reading instruction since last April, the expense being absorbed in the current budget.

May I say in conclusion that it has been a pleasure to work with the members of the school board, teachers, pupils, parents and citizens during the past year.

“We may think of the past with something of pride, perhaps with a little of regret. Of the future it is our nature to think with hope. . . . However, we must do

more than hope. We look ahead, and we must resolve to work with a will and together, that our schools, our community, our Nation, our world may become a happy, wholesome place for the development of childhood and youth."
