### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epping in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epping on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for roads and bridges.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for contract with New Hampshire Electric Company.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Public Library.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary of the Chairman of the Selectmen at \$400.00, the remaining two Members at \$225.00 each, the Town Treasurer at \$150.00, the Town Clerk at \$150.00, and the Auditors at \$25.00 each.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Memorial Day Expenses.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for winding and care of the Church Tower clock.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for control of white pine blister rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay off an extra water note on the Church Street and St. Laurent Ave. issue with balance left over from the new water project and water meters.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. to grade and tar, from the house owned by John Woods on High Street to Elm Street. Any balance to be used on Pike Street.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for civilian defense.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$641.64 for Class V highways upon the condition that the state contributes \$4,277.60.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. to purchase seats for the Town Hall.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the construction of a new sidewalk commencing at fire hydrant nearest town hall and continuing to retaining wall on side of town hall. Concrete to be donated by J. Ludwin Proulx.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services

in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a road grader and for such purpose to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$7,500.00 and to raise such sum to authorize the issuance of serial notes or bonds an amount not exceeding \$7,500.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws, and any amendments thereto, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on serial notes or bonds and to take whatever action as may be necessary to the issuance thereof.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a truck and snow plow and for such purpose to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,300.00 and to raise such sum to authorize the issuance of serial notes or bonds an amount not exceeding \$4,300.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws, and any amendments thereto, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on serial notes or bonds and to take whatever action as may be necessary to the issuance thereof.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Zoning Ordinance as recommended by the Epping Planning Board and to take any other action relating thereto as authorized under Sections 50-71, Chapter 51, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942 as amended by Chapters 110 and 278 of the Laws of 1949.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Building Code as recommended by the Epping Planning Board and take any other action relating thereto as authorized under Sections 18-21 inclusive, Chapter 176, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942.

- 23. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a Building Inspector, to serve for one year, and by vote fix and regulate his compensation as authorized by Section 17, Chapter 176, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942; all as mentioned in the recommended Building Code.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



Team work has won victories from time immemorial — for families, towns, cities, states and nations. Team work is the highest form and most democratic example of cooperation. Without team work, America and Americans would never have achieved the greatness that is theirs. We are all aware of its power and appeal. It is no less needed now than in the past.

Team work among those who live, work and recreate in and near the woodlands is vital. There never was a time when our woodlands as a whole were in such

precarious condition as they are now.

Since the hurricane, nearly 900,000 acres of slash have been added to our already sizeable slash problem. If we are to avoid unnecessary trouble with fire in our woodland areas everyone must cooperate — we must have team work. The remedy is simple —

#### YOU and YOU and You and You

MUST secure the required permit from your local forest fire warden before burning.

MUST use necessary precautions while burning or smoking in or near woodlands.

MUST not throw lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from vehicles moving along the highways.

Otherwise YOU might well contribute to a costly and damaging fire. And don't forget that fire might destroy your own property!

REMEMBER — Only YOU and YOU and YOU can prevent fire!



#### SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Epping qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said district on the 14th day of March, 1953 at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.
- 4. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or Agent of the district.
- 7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto
- 8. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other in-

come; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$550.00 to be used for the transportation of West Epping High School pupils.
- 11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate \$200.00 to be used for the transportation of other High School pupils who live more than two miles from school.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to construct and equip a four classroom addition to the present central elementary school, and to make the necessary alterations and renovations, including suitable kitchen facilities and an oil burner to replace the present stoker, to the present central elementary school building.
- 13. To see if the District will vote to construct and equip a two classroom addition to the present central elementary school building, and to make the necessary alterations and renovations, including suitable kitchen facilities and an oil burner to replace the present stoker, to the present central elementary school building.
- 14. If either Article No. 12 or Article No. 13 is adopted to see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$60,000. for the construction, equipping and furnishing of an addition to the present central elementary school building, and for making the necessary alterations and renovations, including suitable kitchen facilities and an oil burner to replace the present stoker, to the present central elementary school building; and whether the District will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial bonds, under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws and any amendments thereto, for

all or any portion of the sum appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on said bonds and to take such action as may be necessary to the issuance thereof.

- 15. To see if the District will vote to appoint a building committee consisting of two persons, to be appointed by the moderator to advise with the school board in the supervision of the construction of said addition, providing that the plans and specifications shall finally be approved by the school board acting alone as required by law, and to further authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction, equipping and alterations of said addition as provided in Article No. 12 or Article No. 13.
- 16. (By Petition) To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. to be used for the purpose of making the following additions, alterations and improvements to the West Epping School buildings; to install a central heating system, to install flush toilets and wash room facilities for at least 60 children, to install a new kitchen sink, to install necessary plumbing and sewage systems and to install an artesian well and electrical water system to supply adequate supply of potable water for same; said sum of money to be raised by the sale of the School District's notes or bonds.
- 17. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Epping:

I hereby submit with pleasure, this, my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

A study of school enrollment fosters the conclusion that Epping has come to a point where something must be done to relieve its school housing problem. In the past few years Epping teachers have been doing a fine job under increasing difficulties. Results of our comprehensive testing program have been gratifying, but we cannot continue to crowd a few more youngsters into our classrooms indefinitely.

In 1953-54 the problem in the high school will be acute as the following table will show:

It is easy to see that one Home Room with a capacity of twelve cannot seat twenty seniors. With the other Home Rooms filled to either capacity or near capacity, it is apparent that our problem is by no means remote.

Because three grades must be housed in two rooms, we are forced to double up on classes as far back as the third grade. This is not a good educational set-up and needs correction by the addition of extra classrooms on the central school.

I would recommend the addition of four rooms to the Central School, one of which would be used for 7th and 8th grade shop, thus making the present shop available for a kitchen making it possible to set up the school lunch program in the school building. As part of the overall program, I would recommend moving the 8th grade from the high school into new quarters in the central school thereby relieving the problem of housing in the high school. To make the shop and home economics available for all 7th and 8th graders, I would recommend transferring the 7th and 8th grades only, from West Epping to the Central School.

To be sure, this would require the services of two additional teachers for grades 6 and 8 but this connot be put off; unless it is done at the expense of Epping's children.

#### New Teachers

Mrs. Marion Wheeler, Keene Teachers College, Summer of 1951 and school year 1951-52, replaced Mrs. Edna French who left to accept a position in Plaistow. Mrs. Wheeler comes to us with ten years teaching experience in the elementary schools of Berlin, N. H. She is teaching grade one.

Miss Julia Keoseian, Boston University, 1952, to replace Miss Ann McCusker who left to become married. Miss Keoseian is teaching Commercial subjects and coaching girls' sports.

Mr. Philip Dunphy, Boston College, 1951 to replace Howard Jackson who left to go into Insurance. Mr. Dunphy teaches Mathematics and Science and coaches junior varsity basketball and varsity baseball.

Miss Rosemary Leombruno, Boston Conservatory of Music, 1952 to replace Miss Anne-Marie O'Shea as Supervisor of Music for Union No. 14.

Mr. John Scanlan, Guidance Director for Supervisory Union 14; is a graduate of U.N.H. 1946 with teaching experience at Barre, Mass. Mr. Scanlan has a Special Degree in Guidance from Boston University.

#### Guidance

This is the first year for our Pilot Program in Guidance on a Supervisory Union basis. Ours is the only such program in the state and is being watched with interest by other Unions interested in a similar program. Because it is a Pilot Program, the State Department of Education is paying half the Director's salary from Federal funds set up for such a purpose.

Mr. Scanlan's summary follows this report, so to

avoid repetition, I will only say here that the program is getting off to a very good start under Mr. Scanlan's direction.

#### **School Lunch**

Mrs. Hackett has been supplying the young people of Epping with very good hot lunches this year. Government surplus has provided more meat than usual with quantities of eggs, beans, peaches, peanut butter, and canned grapefruit sections.

The Mothers of West Epping are cooperating to give the children of the West Epping school a hot dish each school day. This is a very worthwhile program that entails many extra efforts on the part of West Epping parents and interested citizens.

#### Repairs and Replacements

The program of providing moveable furniture for Grade 1 has been carried on and should be completed in 1953-54. Twenty-one new units were provided for the Home Room in the high school in the Home Economics room as a result of larger class enrollment.

The blackboards in the high school have been painted green and add greatly to room appearance.

The shop classes have constructed a basketball backboard for the Central School and this will be erected in the Spring. This will give the older boys and girls a chance for more varied play activity at the elementary level.

According to state requirements, our toilet facilities in the Central School are inadequate. If an addition should be erected this can be easily corrected.

#### Looking Ahead

"Foresight is much better than hindsight" as the saying goes. The time has come for the citizens of Epping to show foresight in regards to the educational future of their young people.

It is the judgment of your School Board and Superintendent that it is time to take positive action toward some type of building program for the Epping Schools.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, Citizens and Teachers for the friendly and cooperative spirit shown me. It has been a real pleasure working with you.

#### REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF EPPING HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools, Board of Education and Citizens of Epping:

It gives me great pleasure to submit this report, my second as Principal of Epping High School.

School opened on September 3 with an enrollment of 116 in grades 8-12. Despite somewhat crowded conditions the first two months, classes went on with a minimum of confusion and conflict. The situation was relieved to a certain extent, by 7 transfers to other communities, in and outside the state, 2 enlistments in the armed services and 7 drop-outs because of disinterest. The present enrollment is an even 100. This June we expect to graduate 11 from the Senior Class with 30 coming into the 8th grade from Central School and a few from West Epping. Next September Epping High School can expect to open with an approximate enrollment of 125 for the 5 grades.

The attitude of the pupils has been dynamic and wholesome although the first three months saw a number of changes in the teaching staff because of sickness. We are indeed fortunate that serious delinquent problems are non-existent in our school.

The usual change of personnel seems to be inevitable but Epping was blessed in keeping three experienced teachers. Two new teachers joined the staff — in science and commercial. Mr. Albert Manning, (the first of three science teachers) a product of Rhode Island College of Education and the University of Rhode Island started the school year. Unfortunately, our climate did not agree with Mr. Manning and he was forced to leave after two weeks with a bad case of asthma. He was temporarily replaced with Mr. Charles Parker of Brent-

wood, a retired Navy Officer and graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy. We were fortunate in eventually acquiring the services of a capable and personable young Boston College graduate, Philip Dunphy. Mr. Dunphy has done a splendid piece of work in integrating and consolidating the teachings of two previous teachers into smooth working classes.

Miss Julia Keoseian, a Boston University graduate replaced Miss Ann McCusker in the commercial course, and has done a remarkable job, with a teaching load of 6 classes, basketball and the yearbook. She is indeed an asset to any teaching staff.

Mrs. Doris Swift and Mr. Clayton Gray, who need no introduction to the community, continue their fine work in home economics and social science respectively. Two teachers of this caliber are irreplaceable.

Educationally, we are marching ahead and keeping up with the times. A new course in Problems of Democracy is now being offered. Office Practice for commercial girls has been introduced for the first time. Foods classes have been broken down into two units. Several classes have been placed on individualized study basis. Plans have been made for next year to widen our choice of courses for General Course pupils. Two students are taking extension courses from the University of Nebraska.

The testing program, which proved so successful last year in our guidance work, has taken place and we are now awaiting the results. Last year's tests results were directly responsible in guiding 7 of a graduating class of 11 into college and vocational schools. The United States Employment Service has administered its tests to the Seniors who intend to join the working world. Coupled with our own tests results our graduates will be well informed as to their strengths and limitations in fields of work.

Some changes in the physical plant have also been

made. Two typewriters have been added to the typing room, and home economics room now has twenty moveable desks and chairs. Thanks to the graduating classes of 1951-1952 a safe has been bought for the office and through the kind generosity of the PTA a new duplicating machine is now in use in the commercial department.

It has been a busy year, but an interesting and invigorating one. To the teachers I wish to express my sincere thanks for the close cooperation that denotes a successful school and for the many hours spent in advising, coaching and directing the many and varied extra-curricular activities.

To the parents my deepest gratitude for your interest and understanding. We have tried to instill in your children the needed knowledge and qualities that will lead to happy and well integrated lives in our complex world. Alone we can only do part of the job; together we can mold the whole individual.

#### MUSIC SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

To the Superintendent and School Board, Citizens of Epping:

More than one hundred years ago, when music was first introduced in the public schools, the main accent in education was on the three R's.

Today, so much has been added to the elementary and secondary school curriculum; health, physical education, art, reading, arithmetic, science, thrift, character education, safety, dramatics, good citizenship, social studies and last but not least; music.

The aims of every music teacher are to obtain an appreciation and love of good music leading to the cultural development on the part of the child and to train the child in habits of concentration and thinking. We want all our children to love good music, to be intelligent when they sing or play or listen to music and we want each boy and girl to be given abundant opportunity for learning to sing or play or listen in accordance with the dictates of his inclination and capacity as an individual.

Music is primarily a group activity and is accomplished through songs, rhythms, records, games, folk dancing, rhythm bands and tonette groups of which all the children have participated in and enjoyed. We have experimented with square dancing in the first and second grades and found them to be done successfully and needless to say, the children have enjoyed them as much as their rhythm bands.

At Christmas time the children and the Girls Glee Club of Epping High School gave us an evening of first rate performance and enjoyment.

I feel that the music program in our schools, is run-

#### GUIDANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Board and Citizens of Epping:

It gives me great pleasure to present my first annual report as Director of Guidance.

In these first few months a good start has been made in laying the foundation for a high grade program of guidance services for the pupils in grades one through twelve. Under the supervision of Mr. Ramsay and working with the help and advice of Mr. Radasch, New Hampshire State Director of Guidance, the University of New Hampshire Guidance Department, and the Boston University Guidance Department; short term and long term objectives for the program were formulated.

A survey was made during the first week in September during which time all teachers in all grades were seen and asked in what way the guidance program could best meet the needs of their pupils. After this information was tabulated and analyzed we set up our objectives.

The first objective for these early months was to set up an individual inventory for each pupil in the 8th and 12th grades. These pupils are faced with an immediate and important choice in their planning for a career, and more than any grade these pupils need guidance immediately. An individual inventory is an inventory of the pupil's assets and liabilities in the physical, mental, social, emotional, and spiritual areas of life. Over the years, this will be a record of his or her growth in these areas as well as a very specific and analytical record of his growth in the educational skills. An important part of the inventory is the results of the University of New Hampshire battery of tests covering

ability, interests, aptitudes, and personality. This first objective has been accomplished.

Using the inventory as a basis we are now in the process of counseling and guiding these 8th and 12th grade students in their next important step, for the 8th grade students their choice of an occupation for which they will start preparing in their four years of high school work, for the 12th grade pupils, about to be graduated, their choice of an occupation, further training for a trade or semi-professional field or college.

In the process of the carrying through of this part of the program, 35 visits have been made to the schools. Each of the seniors in high school has been counseled individually at least twice and each of the 8th grade students has been counseled at least once. Each of these students will be counseled individually at least twice more before June, or as many more times as is necessary in order that it is as certain as we can make it that he or she is making the proper choice.

It is necessary that these pupils should know what they can expect in their chosen occupation as far as the kind and amount of training necessary, personal requirements, aptitudes, special abilities required, salary, opportunities for advancement, etc. is concerned. This information will be given them.

For the high school, a bulletin board program has been in operation for some four and a half months during which time posters, which are changed each week, have been displayed giving information about approximately 400 different careers. An occupational information file is being set up. At the present time information on approximately 1100 different jobs is available. This file will be expanded to cover every possible need. We will make use, too, of the facilities of the State Library in Concord, through the cooperation of our Epping Librarian, Miss Brown.

Mr. Boulanger and I gave the University of New Hampshire tests. These standardized tests compare our pupils with thousands of other pupils in the same grade in the United States. Mr. Boulanger gave the tests to the high school. Twenty-eight 8th grade students, twenty-one 10th grade students and eleven 12th grade students were tested on twenty-one different attributes of personality. These tests are of immeasurable value in guiding students into the proper educational and vocational fields. Thirty 4th grade pupils and thirty-nine 6th grade pupils were tested on ten attributes of personality and growth in twenty-six educational skills. The attributes scores are valuable in diagnosing for the guidance of these pupils and the growth in educational skills scores are of great value in aiding the teacher to see those skills in which the pupil needs more help. Ten individual tests were given to pupils upon whom certain specific information was needed so that factors which were slowing down their progress might be brought to light and rectified.

A chart is being set up which will show the types of job opportunities in the Epping Area, the immediate vicinity of Epping, Exeter, Raymond, etc. the not toodistant areas, Dover, Somersworth, etc. the distant areas, of the state and other states. Placement services will be available to those 12th grade students who are going into the labor market. They will have, too, training in the proper method of applying for a job. I might add that for these students' benefit, we are working with the United States Employment Service and five of the pupils were given the U.S.E.S. tests. Before the year is completed the 8th and 12th grade students will be given a short intensive course in "Choosing A Career." In other words, they will be given every possible aid so that they will be placed in the position for which their abilities, aptitudes, and personality fit them.

A follow-up study of our graduates and drop-outs

will be made in order to evaluate the success of our school training and the guidance program. When the 8th and 12th grade students have been properly served by the guidance program an individual inventory will be set up for each pupil in each grade, starting with the first. This inventory will follow the child from grade to grade. At present our testing program starts in at the 4th grade. We would like to extend this down to the first grade.

A very important part of any guidance program is the help which a counselor can give to those pupils who are not adjusting well to the school and who are not making the progress of which they are capable. Through tests and counseling interviews, it is very often possible to find the reasons for the pupil's poor progress and to help him, or her, so that they may be happier in school and able to take advantage of its benefits. The success other guidance programs have had in this particular area have been quite remarkable.

An adult education course in the training of children and the proper handling of their problems has been given in February and another will follow in the spring, if there is a call. When school closes in June, the facilities of the guidance office will be available to the out-of-school members of the community. It is hoped that many adults will take advantage of its testing, counseling, and consultation services.

I feel that we have made an excellent start and look forward to great accomplishments in the remainder of the year and next.
