TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Fremont on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as the town deems necessary.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as deemed necessary for the following purposes: Town charges, care of cemeteries, street lighting, support of poor, old age assistance, maintenance of highways and bridges, general expenses of highway department, the public library, and for Memorial Day.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to accept Town Road Aid on highways and appropriate \$234.32 for same.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$510.00 for the use of the Fremont Fire Department.

- 5A. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$340.00 to purchase portable fire pump.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for surveying and mapping of Village Cemetery.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to appropriate from the surplus the sum of \$3,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund.
- 8. On petition of A. W. Peterson and sixteen others to see if the town will vote to hold its meeting for the election of all town officers not required to be elected by ballot and all other articles of town warrant at eight o'clock in the afternoon.
- 9. On petition of A. W. Peterson and fourteen others to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.00) to be used on the so-called Lyford Road beginning at the Brentwood line, to widen, grade and surface with gravel to a width of not less than eighteen feet.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To transact any other business that may be deemed necessary.

Fremont.

It proved to us the value of our tank trucks. Water was available the minute we reached the fire. Without these tank trucks we could have lost thirty minutes or more in laying hose to the river.

Fires cannot be put out before, they are discovered, but every minute after discovery counts mightily. It also showed us how valuable a piece of equipment the portable pump is, in keeping our tank trucks full. No time is lost as it would be if we had to draught each lead. This portable pump has not been purchased, it is here on trial, but we do need it. It would make our equipment complete to handle almost any fire which we might have here.

The Department has burned over the town dump twice, and installed calcium chloride filled barrels in all water holes throughout town, to facilitate the labor of getting water when they are heavily frozen.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

(1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.

(2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.

(3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Fremont qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fremont Town Hall in said district on the 7th day of March 1949, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
- 9. To hear the report of the building committee and take any action thereon.

- 10. To see if the School District will vote to build, erect and equip a centralized school building at a cost not to exceed Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.) and to authorize the Building Committee, consisting of the School Board of the Town of Fremont and Harold L. Jones, George A. Bassett, Albert G. Fuller and William Butler, all residents of said Fremont, in connection with said construction to supervise the construction, to sign all contracts and other papers for and in behalf of the School District, to see that the contracts are carried out, to accept the project for the School District and to take any other necessary or desirable action in connection with such contracts and construction.
- 11. To see if the School District will vote to borrow the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.) and to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing notes or bonds of the School District of the Town of Fremont in the principal amount of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.), such notes or bonds to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws of 1942 and any amendments thereto, payable exclusively from funds to be raised by taxation, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum payable semi-annually, to be payable in equal annual installments of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.) each year, the first installment to be payable one year after the date of said notes or bonds, to be sold for not less than par, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, the fixing of the rate of interest, the provisions for the sale of the notes or bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith to be left to the discretion of the School Board, subject, however, to the foregoing limitations.
- 12. To see if the School District will vote to approve the action of the Building Committee in asking the General Court of New Hampshire for authority to exceed

the debt limit of the School District.

- 13. To see what action the District will take in regard to the Building Committee in the ensuing year.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Citizens and School Board of Fremont:

It is with pleasure that I submit my second report as Superintendent of your schools.

The major problem facing all of us today is finding the money to give our children the type of education they should have. All phases of education are costing more money and there seems little chance of a recession. Studies show that our elementary schools will have a large increase in enrollment during the next 8-10 years and we will feel this in the High Schools after 1960. Larger and better school facilities are needed badly. It is hoped that some form of State or Federal legislation will aid this situation financially in the near future. This item needs your active support so that the property tax will not continue to carry such a heavy burden.

In September the Pine School was reopened for grades 7-8. This change has greatly aided the children and teachers in Fremont. Grades 1-3 are now in the Primary School, grades 4-6 in the Grammar School, grades 1-6 are in the South Road School and grades 7-8 at the Pine School.

GUIDANCE

No school can have an efficient instructional program without knowing what it is accomplishing. It must know what is happening to boys and girls as well as what it is teaching them. The children in your schools are being given new type intelligence tests this year that measure both verbal and non-verbal. These tests will tell what a child is thinking as well as doing. Parents are urged to consult with teachers concerning their child's school progress.

The tests are being corrected and processed in the Superintendent's Office thus saving much valuable teacher time. Standardized Achievement test will be given next year.

REPAIRS

The interior of all schools were painted during the summer months and the ceiling of the Pine School repaired During this year a driven well was added to the Pine School to insure an adequate water supply for the children.

TEACHERS

Hope Barker teacher in the Grammar School left to accept a position in Beverly, Mass. Mrs. Marion D. Kenison of Rochester with many years of experience in Milton was elected to fill this vacancy. Mrs. Kenison is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and has attended summer sessions at Keene and the U. N. H. She has been teaching for twenty years.

Mrs. Helen Saulnier of Lee, a graduate of Plymouth with fourteen years of experience is teaching grades 7-8 at the Pine School. Mrs. Saulnier formerly taught in Lee.

P. T. A.

The P. T. A. was organized this year. This group is doing a fine job in sponsoring hot lunches for the children in your town. They deserve the support of the parents and townspeople.

VISUAL AIDS

During the fall, I received a war surplus sound motion picture projector for use in your schools. This was obtained through the State Board of Education. This machine is for the use of Fremont, Brentwood, and Sandown.

To date six films have been shown to each school and films are planned for each month during the balance of the school year. Pictures concern health, safety, conservation, science, geography and history. The use of motion pictures supplements textbooks and is a valuable aid in the process of education.

AN INVITATION

The schools are yours! Why not visit them while in session? Teachers welcome visits of parents to class as well as to public assemblies. The home and the school should cooperatively work together for the development of your children. Parents should take a little time to acquaint themselves with school problems and get to know the teachers and accept them as friends. Greater public participation in school affairs is a crying need in this community and deserves your support.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens of the community for their hearty cooperation during the past year.

REPORT OF MUSIC TEACHER

To the Superintendent and School Board of Fremont, New Hampshire.

I hereby submit the annual report of the music department.

Since it is obvious that the trend of education today is to prepare our young people for citizenship and to give a broad intellectual experience; it is natural that the arts-literature, painting and music should have an essential place in a person's educational scheme. The music program of today does not stress theory alone, but presents all the aspects of music in such a way as to create enthusiam and interest.

A program composed of music appreciation, folk dancing and theory is followed in the Fremont schools. Each child is given instruction appropriate to his grade.

Early in the spring term, the Fremont schools will combine to present an operetta for the public. All the grades will participate and will be an exhibition of the work accomplished during the year.

In addition to the above described activities, the grades will give a public performance for graduation exercises which will demonstrate additional musical knowledge.

The health of the school children during 1947-1948 was unusually good. We had no serious epidemics.

The annual health examination of eyes, ears, teeth, throats and skin was made during the early part of the

school year. This examination was followed up with home calls for the correction of physical defects, and any other conditions which would result in having healthier and happier children.

The usual health program is being carried on with frequent visits to the schools, close contact with parents, teachers and pupils.

Our greatest need is dental work. It is impossible to secure the services of a dentist for clinic work. This condition exist all through the State. Therefore I ask the parents to secure their own family dentist and get their children to him at least once a year.

I sincerely thank the School Board, teachers, parents and many others for their continued fine cooperation.
