SELECTMENS' STATEMENT

The year 1977 has been a difficult one for the Board of Selectmen. Great amounts of time and effort have been spent on the many projects we have started and problems we are facing.

We have purchased a new fire truck which will serve our town well for many years to come. We have purchased and equipped a police car. We have purchased and started construction on our new highway garage which is a long overdue step in improving our highway department facilities and equipment. We have updated our insurance on town property and added insurance for some previously uninsured and underinsured items. We have convinced the state to put a caution blinker at the junction of Rts 10 & 31 in an attempt to reduce the danger at this intersection, and we are still working to get a warning device of some kind at the junction of Rt. 10 and Brook Road. We have corrected the assessments on more than 80 pieces of real property in the town and established assessments on 22 new structures.

We have updated our files, records, and payroll forms and they are now in good order and completely useable.

All our projects have not been completed but many more have not yet been started. This years warrant and budget reflect the concerns and needs of the Town of Goshen as they are seen today. Our highway equipment is in seriously poor condition. The road agent position is unstable at best. Though improvement has been made in the past few months, our roads are in bad repair. Our highway garage won't be completed. The questions of tax maps and the dump must be solved. The flood insurance program must be future dealt with.

All these things must be handled by a board of three selectmen who are already overtaxed by their regular duties and the job of earning a living. They need assistance from interested citizens in the coming year as they have had to a limited degree in the past.

Our thanks to the officers of the town for their many hours of assistance in keeping things running smoothly.

**WARRENT
TOWN OF GOSHEN
State of New Hampshire**

The polls will be open from 1:00 p.m. 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 14, 1978. The business portion of Town Meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. at Town Hall in Goshen, N.H.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will adopt the proposals of the Goshen Planning Board included on the Official Ballot.
3. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of the Expanded Elderly Exemption Law included on the Official Ballot.
4. To receive the reports of the Town Officers and take action thereon.
5. To see if the Town will vote to have the Board of Selectmen appoint the Road Agent, beginning in March, 1979.
6. To see if the Town will vote to change the Road Agent's hourly wage to \$5.50 per hour with a 6% increase per year to become effective each January first and pay up to \$400.00 towards BC/BS for the Road Agent under the NHMA Group Plan.
7. To see if the Town will vote to change the wage paid for labor in the Highway Department to \$3.50 per hour.
8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) for the purchase of a new Highway Truck and authorize the withdrawal of \$15,375.69 plus interest for this purpose from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund and \$7,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local assistance Act of 1972, if entitlements are adequate to permit same, with the balance to be raised by taxation; and to authorize the Selectmen to take such steps as may be necessary to make said purchase.
9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the old Highway Building and Land located on Brook Road.
10. To see if the Town will vote to have the Board of Selectmen appoint the Police Chief, beginning in March, 1979.
11. To see if the Town will vote to change the Police Chief's hourly wage to \$3.50 per hour.
12. To see if the Town will vote to change the Deputy Police officer's hourly wage to \$3.00 per hour.

13. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the purchase of a radar unit for the Police Department and authorize the Selectmen to take such steps as may be necessary to make said purchase. (Not recommended by Budget committee)
14. To see if the Town will vote to create a Police Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing equipment for the Police Department.
15. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund.
16. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the Tax Map Reserve Fund.
17. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for construction of the New Highway Building.
18. To raise and appropriate the following sums of money; Town Officers Salaries \$6,300; Town Officers Expenses \$3,600; Election and Registration Expenses \$900; Social Security Payments \$1,740; Police Department \$2,100; Fire Department \$2,350; Insurance \$2,700; Civil Defense \$100; Vital Statistics \$15; Town Dump \$2,800; Street Lighting \$75; Town Road Aid \$325; Libraries \$2,000; Town poor \$300; Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled \$1,200; Patriotic Purposes \$25; Cemeteries \$500; Payment of Principal on Fire Truck Bond \$3,800; Payment of Interest on Fire Truck Bond \$1,900; Interest on Temporary Loans \$250.
19. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,100 for maintenance and repairs of the Town Hall and other Town Buildings.
20. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for repairs to the foundation of Town Hall.
21. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the expenses of the Planning and Zoning Boards.
22. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$4500 for Damages and Legal Expenses.
23. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,977. 50 for the Health Department. (Newport Ambulance service \$1,130, Newport Area Home Health Agency \$847.50)
24. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,400 for Summer Maintenance of Roads.
25. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500 for Winter Maintenance of Roads.
26. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for the General Expenses of the Highway Department.
27. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$114 for Advertising and Regional Associations.

28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, in the form of Tax Anticipation Notes, in anticipation of taxes in an amount not to exceed \$80,000.
29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 36:4 II (b) to allow the personnel of the Planning Board to be elected rather than appointed. (Submitted by petition)
30. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to continue with efforts to solve the Town's solid waste problem by further investigating the studies being done in Sunapee, Newport, and Sullivan County to determine whether Goshen might best be served by joining with another town or area to dispose of its solid waste.
31. To take up any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The year 1977 was a good year for the police department. We were able to operate within our budget even with the addition of several new pieces of equipment.

Burglaries were down in number this year. We did have one case of vandalism.

Several arrests were made the first part of the year with the aid of radar borrowed from the town of Unity. Hopefully we will be able to obtain our own unit and do something about all the complaints of speeding through our town.

At this time I would like to thank the people of Goshen for the purchase of the cruiser. It seems good to be able to have a car that is equipped all the time. There was 2,409 miles put on the cruiser in the first 10 months of use.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES FOR 1977

The Olive G. Pettis Library has been the recipient of a number of gifts during 1977.

The Friends of the Library donated a new braided rug for the center of the room, a large mat for the porch, a pencil sharpener, and ten stacking chairs to be used at the library for meetings. The organization also paid for the cement walk and steps recently installed. The Goshen Historical Society donated ten more chairs to match those of the Friends. REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 1977 the fire department answered 11 calls with 111 men responding. Recorded property loss was \$29,100.00.

Again this year the fire department sponsored a fire prevention contest with the students at Goshen Lempster school participating in coloring, posters and essays. Our fire prevention program and contests at the school have been very effective and rewarding for the children as well as the town and the fire department.

The firemen's auction and other fund raising activities earned \$1,500 in 1977 for our equipment fund.

Your fire department is qualified to advise you about chimneys and gas, oil and wood stove installation. PLEASE, if in doubt, seek advice BEFORE you install your wood stove or heating unit.

As in past years our equipment has been maintained and training meetings have been attended. By the time this report is in your hands our new fire engine will be delivered and equipped. The contract price of the new fire engine delivered is \$39,541.00. By the time we have it fully equipped the cost will be \$45,000.00. All funds above the \$38,000 voted at Town Meeting will be paid with money earned by the firemen.

Please accept my sincere thanks to the firefighters for their many hours of help and cooperation and to the citizens and taxpayers of Goshen for their interest and participation in fire department activities.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands, (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The reasons and functions of a Planning Board are oftentimes misunderstood -- or ignored until a change in one's personal plans or objectives suddenly brings an individual into contact with a community restriction. Yet the very title should give a clue since none of use move through life without a degree of personal planning -- and no business or financial effort moves very far without both defining aims and creating the means of fulfilling these aims. Why should a community differ?

Just as constraints are placed upon one family member for the good of the unit, or internal controls are a mandate for business success, so does a political entity have to set up guidelines to, as stated in the HANDBOOK of the Office of State Planning, "restrain the action of individuals who might purposefully or inadvertently act to produce an economic loss to a community or diminish the quality of life which the community enjoys".

To continue, "Communities grow primarily through the development of individual parcels of undeveloped land and, secondarily, through the conversion of already developed land to new, expanded or more intensive uses. The rate at which development occurs, and the kinds of development which are permitted in various locations, affect not only the land immediately involved, but also neighboring property and the entire community Too much, too dense, or too rapid development can cause serious long-term problems for a community, and incompatible uses placed next to each other may diminish the worth of either or both, and thus affect the community tax base."

A Planning Board, then, is not to promote growth, or to thwart it. It is not to play one segment of a community against another - or to try to impose its own will. Since growth tends to come anyway as part of economic or population factors, a Board's function should point out how to direct growth in a manner most consistent with community goals; goals which should be developed by the community itself. A Board's tools should be questionnaires to ascertain community desires, hearings to discuss questionnaire results, a Master Plan to try to get objectives, directions and solutions down on paper, and, finally, zoning ordinances and subdivision regulations to transmit community desires into positive action for the good of all. Conservation programs, water and waste treatment regulations, highway locations and standards, establishment of historic districts, and taxation policies are among other types of land use control.

One final quote from the HANDBOOK perhaps sums up this background: "If land is developed wisely, if the density of residential and business development is properly related to the financial ability of the community to provide services, and if the unique characteristics of the community are preserved through well-drawn, well-administered land use controls, a community will benefit economically, and the quality of life will be enhanced."

We believe that the record of the past dozen years shows the Goshen Planning Board has followed this pattern of trying to assess community strengths and weaknesses, of pointing out problems and solutions of other similar-type communities, and then getting together with you to review ways of improving our town. We have been criticised as often for not moving fast enough in suggesting directions to move as we have been accused of trying to overcontrol. Occasionally our suggestions have been knocked down, far more often they have been supported. It is important to note that on every single occasion our ideas and suggestions have been brought to your Town Meeting for approval -- or disapproval. Many of these ideas have come as suggestions from other townspeople, and we have a responsibility to help bring them to light.

So, though we have our detractors, we would suggest that really they are detractors of the townspeople -- for we act as their agent, carrying out their suggestions and their mandates, with each set of changes being voted upon at Town Meeting. The present legal actions against the town are not because of Planning Board or Zoning Board or Selectmen activities; rather they are the result of these boards carrying out the instructions of the townspeople made through Town Meeting actions. We have confidence that our fellow townsmen and townswomen do recognize that at times their boards have to stand up and say "whoa" -- and we know that those who follow will always receive the same support, if they continue to work with all citizens in continually looking forward and planning for a better Goshen.

changes. A new subparagraph 1) has been added under D to cover a previous omission of reference to commercial use, and previous printing errors in present C references have been corrected. In actual effect, no changes have been made from the present code even though the whole section is reworded.)

"A. All non-conforming properties in active use this ordinance is passed and adopted may continue indefinitely in their present use **and size**.

B. Building Expansions. Any and all non-conforming buildings, whether commercial or otherwise, may be altered but may not exceed the height limits as defined in Section III, D3. Any proposed structural expansion that could not conform to provisions of the Zoning Ordinance shall require approval by the Board of Adjustment. **No expansions along rights-of-ways shall be approved which decrease the setback requirements, or the existing setback if already below minimum. In expansion on undersized lots, where-in hardship may come into play, the Board may reduce side and rear setbacks to not less than twenty feet from a lot line, providing, however, that no structure shall be expanded closer than thirty-five feet (35') of an abuttor's building.**

C. Building Restoration: Any non-conforming building which is partially or totally destroyed by reason of obsolescence, fire or other act of God may be restored remodelled and operated -- if same is done within two years -- providing, however, that proximity to a lot line or right-of-way may be no nearer than the lesser of the original building and setbacks defined in Section III D (1 & 2) above, and height does not exceed the limits as defined in Section III D 3). **Any expansion during restoration shall conform to Section VI B above.**

D. Non-conforming Land: Any present lots rendered undersized by this ordinance for building purposes may be exempted for a residential unit, providing, however, that no building may be constructed within thirty-five feet (35') of an abuttor's building, or within fifty feet (50') of a highway right-of-way. **In cases of hardship, The Board may reduce side and rear setbacks to not less than twenty feet (20') from a lot line.**

1) Proposed commercial use on non-conforming lots shall be allowed similar waiver for hardship. Front set-back waiver shall be not less than fifty feet (50') in any event, and less than seventy-five feet (75') only if parking space problems are created by the undersized lot.

E. Non-conforming use: A non-conforming use of a building or tract may not be changed to another non-conforming use **without approval by the Board of Adjustment.** The discontinuance of a non-conforming use for more than one year shall **also** require approval before reactivation. Said approval may be withheld or restricted as though it were an application for a new commercial use.

F. The Board of Adjustment shall have the right to place restrictions or conditions upon commercial approvals, if felt necessary to maintain the spirit and intent of the Zoning Ordinance. **Reference to applicable standard codes or practices may be made as part of ultimate decisions.**

SECTION VII. Enforcement.

Upon passage of this ordinance, it will be unlawful to erect or relocate any building without first obtaining a building permit from the Building Inspector.

SECTION X. Penalty.

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than **one hundred dollars (\$100)** upon conviction for each day such violation may exist. **A violation shall commence upon notification by the Selectmen, said notification containing reference to the section being violated."**

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of the Goshen-Lempster Co-operative School District:

ENROLLMENT

The present number of students totals 127 in Grades 1-8. The pupil-teacher ratio in Grades 2 and 3 is 31 students. This exceeds the State Minimum Standards in addition to being a double grade set-up which makes a more difficult teaching situation.

Sixty-seven students are attending high school: 7 at Sunapee, 1 at Stratton Mountain, and 59 at Newport. One student is attending the Claremont Vocational Rehabilitation Center.

SPECIAL SERVICES

The needs of several students are being met within the school with the addition of a Special Education position this year. Outside specialists are reinforcing the work of the Pupil Placement Team in providing an appropriate program for certain students who require other than a regular program. This action is mandated by P.L. 94-142, the federal Handicapped Children Act. The diversity of student needs will no longer permit a one-program-for-all type of operation.

FINANCES

BUDGET

Present expenditures and a small drop in tuition students make it possible to stay within the 1977-78 budget.

The 1978-79 budget contains a request for a General Aide. This would pick up the present CETA-II, federally-financed position.

A new transportation contract has been signed with Charles Newton. He has purchased new and larger buses which should continue to provide good service for the next five years.

While a slight drop in enrollment has abated the immediate urgency for more space, the facilities for the Special Education program are minimal. Some funds are budgeted to provide for improving the present area.

CONCLUSION

Mention of a number of special projects and activities are made in the Report of the Head Teacher. It is heartening to realize that the staff is truly interested in the students. It is a pleasure to indicate that the staff works well together, is reasonable in its requests and makes good use of what is provided. The interest and support of the citizens is the best indicator for a continued, cooperative relationship on the part of all the staff in dealing with your children.

REPORT OF HEAD TEACHER

Nineteen Seventy-Seven has been another year in the period of growth and change of the Goshen-Lempster School. Growth, in the form of a new faculty position created to serve our special educational needs, brought to us Mrs. Cynthia Fellows of Lempster. In September, Mrs. Fellows enthusiastically accepted the challenge of developing skills within our exceptional students, and, as her program progresses, her effectiveness is exhibited by the happy faces of her students. A change occurred among our kitchen staff as Mrs. Jane Miller was replaced by Mrs. Linda Smith of Newport, maintaining an excellent hot lunch program. A welcome addition in September was Mrs. Rachel Tirrell, kitchen and teacher aide (funded through CETA). Mrs. Tirrell provides much needed help in the kitchen and much desired help in the classroom.

The Title I, ESEA program remained involved this past year in aiding our students overcome reading deficiencies. A change took place in the part-time staff as Miss Snow Wakeman, Remedial Reading, was replaced by Mr. Robert Mullen who comes to Goshen-Lempster once each week.

Also Mr. Keith Kendall, Home Visitor, was succeeded by Mrs. Susan Currier who consults with our Title I staff one afternoon a week about visitations with parents of Title I students at their homes. Mr. Robert Purmort continues as our full-time Reading Aide. He and the other staff members are engaged in a reading and self-improvement project aimed at nurturing skills in reading and language arts and increasing self-esteem, self-awareness and motivation.

Last winter and spring our school was visited by International 4-H Youth Exchange (IFYE) delegates, presenting to the student assemblies a slide discussion of their recent experiences overseas. On February 1st, Barbara Roberts informed us about the United Kingdom, and, on May 31st, Katherine Foster gave her account of New Zealand. The delegates, college students, spend from six months to a year in their respective countries. The program, organized through the Sullivan County Extension Service Council, serves to enthuse the students in their social studies as they acquire knowledge about other cultures in a manner which is as close as possible to being firsthand.

Field trips are an essential deviation from the norm needed to stimulate the student educationally. Field trips made in 1977 were:

During April, the seventh grade went to Plimoth Plantation and the Marine Academy at Buzzard's Bay, Mass. with Mr. Harrison.

During May, the eighth grade went to Sturbridge Village with Mr. Bonfiglio and Mrs. Harrison.

During October, several eighth grade students went to Nantucket, in conjunction with a literary study of *Moby Dick*, with Mr. Harrison.

Also during October, the sixth, seventh and eighth grade students went to the Squam Lakes Science Center in Holderness with Mr. Bonfiglio and Mr. Harrison.

As June approached, the eighth grade class members began to finish out their Goshen-Lempster experience with a day trip to the Newport High School, choosing a curriculum for the upcoming school year and familiarizing themselves with the school layout. Then Mr. Harrison and Mr. Bonfiglio took the class for a fun trip to the Riverside Amusement Park in Agawam, Mass. Graduation took place on the evening of June 22nd at the Lempster Town Hall. The Valedictorian was Daniel Kimball of Lempster, and the Salutatorian was James Jones of Goshen. The Reverend William Geertz performed the Invocation and the Benediction; Mr. Peterson conducted the music; and Mr. Edward LeClair, School Board Chairperson, presented the diplomas. After the ceremony, the graduates and their parents gathered at the school for reception sponsored by the P.T.C. and the mothers of the seventh grade students.

Open House was held during American Education Week. Parents, students, members of the School Board, and staff members assembled at the school at 7:00 P.M., November 17, for a program of student speakers and slides of school activities. Refreshments were provided in the form of a bake

sale sponsored by the eighth grade class. After the assembly, parents wandered into the individual classrooms where they browsed through instructional materials and consulted with the teachers about their children's progress. Fulfillment for all was evidenced by friendly conversations and cheerful faces.

The Goshen-Lempster School receives many services aimed at maintaining the physical, emotional and social health of its students. Mrs. June Buck, School Nurse, continues periodic health examinations of students. Mr. Thomas Maynard, Counseling Center of Sullivan County, meets monthly with the staff and Mr. Alphonse Soucy, Teacher Consultant, to discuss student problems. Last spring, in preparation for the Special Education Program, psychometric evaluations of some students were made by the Specialists in Assessment of Intellectual Functioning (SAIF). The information derived from these testings were used by the Pupil Placement Team (the staff and Mr. Soucy) to devise programs for the students. The team meets periodically to discuss the progress of particular special education students and to plan programs for future students. In addition, we are receiving psycho-educational services offered by Central New Hampshire Educational Services, Inc. as qualified specialists are dispatched to our school from time to time to diagnose learning problems and to provide a means for dealing with the problems.

The standard daily curriculum is complemented by such services and endeavors as:

Mr. Peterson's chorus instruction (as an extra at the end of the day) as well as the Christmas assembly he conducted for and by the students.

Mrs. Lohman's excursions to the Towle School Media Center's "Books on Exhibit". She transported fifth through eighth grade students the entire week of November 28th so that they might browse through a collection of some of the best publications of the current year.

Educational TV (Channel 52/Keene) offers excellent programs used to enhance classroom activities.

Mr. Edward Baker's fire assembly during Fire Prevention Week. The Goshen Fire Chief presented a safety program, consisting of films and a discussion on the use of fire extinguishers.

Mrs. Ruth LeClair's devotion of time to direct two plays to be put on by the students during the February vacation.

A donation of \$50.00 by the former pupils of Mrs. Susie B. Hurd used to purchase some playground and educational equipment.

The students' collection of Campbell Soup labels to cash in on a special program. Last Spring, the labels were traded in for two basket balls, three baseball bases, and a volley ball set.

The seventh and eighth grade students are encouraged to engage in group ventures, hence imparting to them the feeling of the power and the satisfaction of cooperative effort. At the beginning of each school year they elect officers, and, throughout the year, they conduct class meetings via the use of parliamentary procedure. At the meetings, the discussion is usually concerned with financial endeavors in an effort to boost the class treasury for a fun class trip. Some of the activities involved are:

Greenhouse - The seventh grade starts tomato and pepper plants in February in preparation for a sale to members of the community in June.

Dances - The eighth grade class sponsors several dances throughout the year. They organize the function entirely on their own, designating student committees to handle decorations, music, refreshments, finances, chaperons, and clean-up.

In conclusion, I wish to record a sense of deep appreciation to each member of the community whose friendship and support in the common enterprise of the Goshen-Lempster School has meant a rewarding year for all of those associated with the school.

ARTICLE 1: To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2: To choose one Member of the School Board from Lempster for the ensuing five years.

ARTICLE 3: To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 4: To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$258,777.05, as recommended by the School Board, for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of available income estimated at \$12,205.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from Federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts, and other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1978-79 for the school lunch program, general expenses, equipment, and improvements.

ARTICLE 7: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
