#### MINUTES OF 1959 TOWN MEETING

Hampton Falls Town Meeting was called to order at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, March 10, 1959 by the Moderator Robert Perfect. Supervisors took oath the checklist to be used contained 462 names. The Moderator read the Warrant and the ballots were counted with 597 found to be the total number to be used. Polls were declared open.

Business meeting was called to order at 7:05. Prayer was offered by Rev. Everett Scruton.

Moderator ruled that once an article taken up in the warrant and budget was finished, no further action could be taken on it.

#### Article 2.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Lois Perfect the sum of \$2,000.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Officers Salaries. Carried.

Gordon Janvrin made a motion the sum of \$1,100.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Officers Expenses. Seconded by Edward Pevear. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Election and Registration Expenses. Seconded by George Pond. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire, the sum of \$500.00 be raised and appropriated for Expenses of Town Hall and other town buildings. Carried.

Alphonse Lemire made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Police Department. Seconded by Carl Meyer. Carried. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn to defer action on "Fire Department"

until Article 5 in Warrant. Seconded by George Pond. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond and Seconded by George Merrill to defer any action on "Care of Trees" until taken up under Article 9 in the Warrant. Carried.

Alphonse Lemire made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$675.00 for insurance. Seconded by Edward Pevear. Carried.

Motion was made by Edward Pevear, Seconded by Ralph Sanborn the sum of \$25.00 be raised and appropriated for the care of the Town Clock. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for Health Department, including Hospitals. Motion carried.

George Merrill made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85.00 for Vital Statistics. Seconded by Alphonse Lemire. Carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded by Joseph Monko the sum of \$130.00 be raised and appropriated for Beacon Lights. Carried.

Alphonse Lemire made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the Town Dump. Seconded by Walter Combs. Carried.

Motion was made by Russell Merrill Jr. to delay action on Brush Removal until taken up under Article 10 in the Warrant. Seconded by Edward Pevear. Carried.

Gordon Janvrin made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Summer Maintenance of Town Highways. Seconded by Ralph Sanborn. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Edward Pevear to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Town Highways. Carried.

Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Street Lighting. Motion carried.

Alphonse Lemire made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Tarvia. Seconded by William Janvin. Carried.

Motion was made to defer action on Town Road Aid until taken up under Article 3 in the Warrant by Russell Merrill, Jr. Seconded by Edward Pevear. Carried.

Motion was made by Lois Perfect, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire, the sum of \$600.00 be raised and appropriated for Library. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Town Poor. George Pond made a motion to amend the motion by striking out the figure 300 and inserting 500 to read raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Town Poor. Seconded by Louis Janvrin. Amendment carried. Motion as amended carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded by Donald Janvrin the sum of \$300.00 be raised and appropriated for Old Age Assistance. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Eugene Heal to raise and appropriate the sum of \$135.00 for Memorial Day and Veteran's Association. Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire to amend the motion by changing \$135.00 to \$125.00. Seconded by Arnold Rasmussen. Amendment carried, motion as amended carried.

Motion was made by John Trumbull, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Parks and Playgrounds, including Band Concerts. Motion carried.

Alphonse Lemire made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for Cemeteries. Seconded by Arnold Rasmussen. Carried.

Motion was made by John Trumbull, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Damages and Legal Expense. Carried.

Action on Advertising and Regional Associations was deferred until Article 4 was taken up in the Warrant on motion of Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Ralph Sanborn, the sum of \$60.00 be raised and appropriated for Employees Retirement and Social Security. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Arnold Rasmussen, the sum of \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for Interest on Temporary Loans. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,650.00 for County Taxes. Seconded by Ralph Sanborn. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Russell Merrill, Jr. to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86,-254.75 for School Taxes. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,374.75 to pay our share of Operating Deficit of 1958-1959 of Co-operative School District No. 6. Seconded by Emmons Sanborn. Carried.

At this time the Governor was greeted by the Moderator and assembly.

#### Article 3.

A motion was made by William Marston, Seconded by Eugene Heal, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$267.87 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$1,785.78. Carried.

Article 4.

Motion was made by Russell Merrill, Jr., Seconded by Edward Pevear to postpone Article 4 indefinitely. Motion did not carry. Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Lois Perfect to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160.00 for Economic Advancement of the Town through Publicity and Promotional Services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in co-operation with other communities. Motion carried.

Article 5. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Gordon Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,397.84 for payment for services to the Town by the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. Carried.

Article 6. Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by Edward Pevear to pass over this Article indefinitely. Motion did not carry. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Maurice Merrill, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$269.25 to cover the cost of a two way radio purchased in the name of the Town by the Civil Defense Director. This amount to reimburse the Civil Defense Director. Carried.

Article 7. Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by Ralph Farley to pass over this article indefinitely. Carried.

Article 8. Motion was made by Cynthia Trumbull, Seconded by George Merrill to raise and appropriate the sum of \$680.00 to purchase the snow plow now leased. Carried.

Article 9. Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 toward the removal of infected trees. Carried.

Article 10. Motion was made by John Trumbull, Seconded by Cynthia Trumbull to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$300.00 for the removal of Brush and Poison Ivy. Carried.

Article 11. Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by Russell Merrill, Jr., to adopt this article. Motion did not carry.

Article 12. Motion was made by Arnold Rasmussen, Seconded by Russell Merrill, Jr., to lay this article on the table indefinitely. Carried.

Article 13. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn to give the Selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by Tax Sale. Seconded by Arnold Rasmussen. Carried.

Article 14. Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Edward Pevear to give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Carried.

Article 15. Russell Merrill Jr. requested the Road Agent be given authority to put up signs "Passable but unsafe" on Curtis Road, but was answered an article in the warrant would be necessary.

Motion was made by Russell Merrill Jr., Seconded, the Clerk cast one ballot for Robert and Joyce Marelli for Hog Reevers for one year. Carried

Motion was made at 10:35 the polls be closed by George Merrill, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire. Carried. Polls were declared closed.

Town Officers were commended for the fine Town Report.

Resolution was presented by George Hay with a motion to accept, Seconded by George Pond:

Resolved that this Town Meeting approve the action of the Selectmen in accepting a deed which returns to Hampton Falls that part of the Common held by the State of New Hampshire since 1854. The State retaining only land occupied Gov. Meshech Weare Monument, Accepted.

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at three of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$266.04 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$1,773.63.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,390.84 in payment for services to the Town by the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. Signed by Richard Bohm and ten others.
- 5. To raise and appropriate, for economic advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in co-operation with other communities, the sum of \$160.00.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following Subdivision Regulations of the Town under Section IV (General Requirements for the Subdivision of Land), Paragraph M, by adding thereto the following:
  - 1. The paved roadway shall have a width of at least 18 feet.

- 2. The roadway shall be constructed in accordance with the following specifications:
  - A. All topsoil or loam must be removed from the limits of the road bed to a depth of at least 12 inches. Topsoil shall be removed from areas that will be filled. Where loam or improper road foundation material exceeds 12 inches in depth, such material must be excavated and replaced with bank run gravel or broken rock.
  - B. The base course shall consist of bank run gravel, free from loam or organic matter to a thickness of at least 12 inches.
  - C. The finish course shall consist of fine gravel, 100% of which must be capable of being passed through a 2 inch mesh screen.
  - D. The surface shall consist of one application of primer (SC 1-3 or equal road tar) applied at the rate of  $\frac{3}{4}$  gal. per sq. yd. and one application of MC 2-4 (or its road tar equivalent) applied at the rate of  $\frac{1}{2}$  gal. per sq. yd. The surface shall be sanded with clean sharp sand following the final coating of oil.
- 3. All drainage facilities and culverts shown on final subdivision map and profile shall be properly installed to the satisfaction of the Board of Selectmen.
- 4. The roadway shall be graded and paved to the final grade in accordance with profile submitted.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following Amendment to the Building Code and Zoning Ordinance, Section V (Enforcement) Paragraph 4, by adding thereto the following:

"Trailers and/or mobile homes shall meet the same requirements as Section III, Paragraph 4a."

so that said Section shall read as follows:

- "4. Permits. After passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any building or alter the bulk of any building or relocate any building in Hampton Falls without first obtaining a building permit from the Building Inspector. Trailers and/or mobile homes shall meet the same requirements as Section III, paragraph 4a."
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following amendment to the Building Code and Zoning Ordinance, Section V (Paragraph 6) by adding thereto the following:

"Also it shall be unlawful to start a gravel or sand pit or remove topsoil without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen."

so that said Paragraph 6 shall read as follows:

"6. That no land or place of business in the Town of Hampton Falls, N. H. shall be used for an amusement or entertainment center, a dump (except the municipal dump duly regulated), a trailer camp, or place for refuse, waste or junk of any kind, nor for an automobile junk or grave yard, carriages or other vehicles, abandoned machinery or tools or appliances, nor used in a manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious, offensive or detrimental to the public, or to the owners or occupants of adjacent property or prejudicial to the general welfare of the community, without the approval, in writing of the Board of Adjustment upon such conditions as they may determine.

"Also it shall be unlawful to start a gravel or sand pit or remove topsoil without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen."

9. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following Amendment to the Building Code and Zoning Ordinance. Section III (Residential District) Paragraph

3. By striking out the whole thereof and inserting the following: "3. Frontage. Each building site shall have a frontage of at least two hundred feet."

Paragraph 4a shall be stricken and the following regulation inserted in place thereof: "4a. No building site for dwelling purposes shall be less than 40,000 square feet."

Section VI (Board of Adjustment) Paragraph 1c shall be amended by striking out the number "22,500 square feet" and inserting in the place thereof the number "40,000 square feet", so that Section VI (Board of Adjustment) Paragraph 1c shall read as follows:

- "c. Waive the 40,000 square feet lot area requirement on lots served by either a public water system or a public sewage disposal system, where after a thorough investigation of soil and drainage conditions the Board finds that such an exception would not be detrimental in any way to the future health of the neighborhood".
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to paint and decorate the Town Clock. Signed by Russell P. Merrill and ten others.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money to improve the road known as Brimmer Lane. Also that Brimmer Lane be improved so that it is passable at all seasons of the year. On petition of Donald Harriman and twenty others.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Brush and Poison Ivy removal.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 toward the control of infected trees.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell abandoned Town gravel pit areas.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by tax sale.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.



### SCHOOL WARRANT FOR 1960

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hampton Falls, in the County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote upon District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls, on the Fourth Day of March, 1960, at Four P.M. in the afternoon, and to cast ballots for candidates for the following District Officers:

- 1. Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. Treasurer for the ensuing year.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at Eight O'clock in the evening of the same day to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other Officers of the District.
- 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 3. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the School

Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by the Town.

- 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.
- To see if the District will vote to authorize the construction of an addition to the present Lincoln Akerman School building consisting of two classrooms, storage space, and incidental facilities at a cost not to exceed Forty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$48,000.00), including the construction of the addition, furnishings and equipment, architectural and other fees, grading, and any other items incidental to and necessary for such construction; and to authorize the school committee to act as a building committee or to authorize the moderator to appoint a building committee consisting of the school committee and four other legal voters in the district, to determine the final construction plans, to engage the services of an architect, to solicit bids from competent firms, to accept the most advantageous bid or bids, to supervise the construction and to see that the contracts are carried out, to purchase the necessary equipment and furnishings, to accept the project for the School District, and to take any other necessary or desirable action in connection with such bids, contracts, construction, and all other matters in connection therewith.
- 7. To see if the School District will appropriate a sum not exceeding Forty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$48,000.00) for the purpose of constructing an addition to the present Lincoln Akerman School, and all other items as described in Article 6 of this warrant, and determine how such appropriation or any part thereof shall be

raised, whether by taxation, by borrowing or otherwise, and, if by borrowing, to authorize the issue and sale of bonds or notes of the School District therefor under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act as amended, and other applicable laws.

- 8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$10,700.00) for the employment of one additional teacher, the increased cost of utilities, custodial services and supplies, payment of principal and interest on debt, and other incidental expenses for the coming year required by the acceptance of Article 6.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize and accept the employment of an Assistant to the Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 21, this article to take effect for the Supervisory Union year beginning with July 1, 1960, and to raise and appropriate the District's pro rata share of a \$7,000.00 salary and of a \$1,000.00 travel allotment, namely \$254.40, provided that each of the other districts in the Supervisory Union vote to accept this article and to raise and appropriate their pro rata share of the salary and travel allotment.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Hampton Falls School District:

It gives me great pleasure to submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools. The past year has been productive of both personal and professional satisfaction, all of which has been due to the continued co-operation of the professional and lay people who support the Hampton Falls School. I look forward to the privilege of serving these people in the year ahead.

The Lincoln Akerman School has made considerable progress during this school year. Despite the reduction in funds requested for the salaries of teachers it was possible to secure an excellent staff. Inasmuch as a school revolves about its teachers, success in this venture assured success for the remainder of school activities.

Mr. Nicholas Kontinos, completing his third year as your Principal, is an excellent teacher and principal. Much of the credit for the school's progress can be attributed directly to him. Mrs. Frances Mahoney, now in her second year at the Akerman School, was transferred from a combined Grade One and Two to a Grade Three. She has displayed the ambition and initiative so characteristic of her and much progress can be observed in her classes.

New to the staff this year were Miss Evelyn Harvey, Grade Four, Mr. Roland Shevenell, Grade Five, and Mrs. Pearl Marston, Grades One and Two. The former two are beginning teachers and they have performed very satisfactorily. Miss Harvey's conduct of the French program over Education Television has won the commendation of visitors from Portland, Maine and Channel Two in Boston. Mr. Shevenell has displayed a great deal of

imagination in meeting the demanding claims of 29 eager students.

Mrs. Marston, no stranger to residents of Hampton Falls, graciously accepted a last-minute transfer from Grade Three to a combined Grade One and Two. It was felt that her long experience in multiple grades would be an asset in this situation and the subsequent results have proven this to be an accurate estimate. If it is necessary to have combined grades, the communities that have them should also have a Mrs. Marston. Unfortunately, this is not always possible.

In an effort to retain these fine teachers for future years, and to reward their unselfish efforts of the past year, the School Board has included substantial increases in their salaries for the forthcoming year. It is my hope that the citizens will indicate their appreciation by abiding by their School Board's recommendation. Most certainly, the road to long-range economy is not replacing qualified teachers with those less qualified.

Other areas of the budget reflect a desire to make improvements. Sums for Music and Art have been increased to afford an increased amount of instruction in these two areas. Penmanship, a victim of budget reduction last year, has been restored. This instruction has proven very satisfactory in other schools in Supervisory Union No. 21, and it is felt that it should be available to the Hampton Falls children. Funds for the transportation of children on field trips have been added also. This is a relatively small amount and one that will enable the children to enjoy such ventures while it does not reduce their educational value.

Once again a request will be made for a two-room addition to the school. The same reasons that applied last year are applicable this year. Two of the classrooms are overcrowded and enrollment, increasing everywhere, is certain to increase in Hampton Falls. The time to build is now before the deterrent effects of over-crowding and

rising costs make this too expensive both educationally and financially.

Other items to be included in special articles are funds for the purpose of matching a federal grant under the National Defense Education Act, and Hampton Fall's share of the salary and travel for an Assistant to the Superintendent. The latter is a relatively small amount and is being submitted despite its defeat last year. Once again, a unanimous approval by all eight districts will be required before this becomes effective. Your School Board has agreed that it is necessary and if passed, will permit the Superintendent to do more work, not less, as might be the logical conclusion of a person not thoroughly familiar with the situation.

Hampton Falls continues to share in, and benefit from, the progressive educational program of the Supervisory Union. Now the sixth largest educational unit in New Hampshire, this organization has been able to move forward in many areas. The most recent request, one approved by the Supervisory Union School Board, is for more adequate office facilities. While the site has not yet been determined it is expected that Hampton will remain the location.

Much has been said and written concerning American public education during the past few years. In general it would seem that the trend of thought is that education, once considered "desirable" is now considered "necessary." This subtle change in emphasis will have far reaching effects on the school system of each community, large or small. With the current philosophy that education is a local matter the desired and needed changes must be initiated at the local level. We cannot expect the federal or state governments or charitable foundations to be concerned about your problem and mine.

For this reason I have recommended to the School Boards, that curriculum studies be undertaken in this

Supervisory Union. At the time of this writing a Science group is meeting for the third time, and plans are being developed for a series of meetings on the subject of Arithmetic. It is fully expected that positive action will be taken by these two groups of Teachers and Administrators to improve our instruction in these two vital areas.

"Schools reflect the society they serve. Many of the failures we ascribe to contemporary education are in fact failures of society as a whole. A society that is indifferent to its own heritage cannot expect the schools to make good that indifference. A society that slurs over fundamental principles and takes refuge in the superficial and ephemeral cannot demand that its schools instruct in abiding moral values. A society proudly preoccupied with its own material accomplishments and well-being cannot fairly expect its schools to teach that the snug warmth of security is less meaningful than the bracing venture of freedom. In all this, to reform our schools is first to reform ourselves." Henry Steele Commager, "Our Schools Have Kept Us Free", October, 1950.

In closing I wish to thank the School Board, the staff of the school, and all those thoughtful and considerate citizens who have aided in the support of your school. The past year has not been an easy one "to be for education" and I admire those who have persisted in the face of criticism.

I wish also to pay tribute to Miss Leota Whitcomb, Helping Teacher, Miss Edith Hammond, Executive Assistant, and the other members of the office staff whose diligent labor and selfless devotion to their work has enabled me to do much that would have otherwise been left undone.
