REPORT OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING October 1, 1973

A special Town Meeting was called to order on October 1, 1973 by Moderator Merle Patenaude, Sr., to consider action on the following article:

Article 1. Voted, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept grants of Federal or State aid or both as may be available, in an amount not to exceed \$7,500.00 (Seventy five hundred dollars) and to expend such grants for reconstruction of town roads, bridges or portions thereof, destroyed by flooding and to do all things necessary to carry out the purposes of this article.

TOWN WARRANT 1974 THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell High School Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday the Fifth day of March, next, at twelve of the clock noon to act upon the following:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

The Polls will be Open from 12:00 noon to 7:00 P.M.

As voted at town Meeting March 7, 1972, You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell High School Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday the Twelfth day of March, next, at eight of the clock in the evening to act upon the following:

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,200,000 for the purpose of financing and constructing a municipal sewage disposal system, including sewerage, intercepters, pumping stations, treatment works and such other related facilities inclusive of land acquisition, easements and rights-of-way as are required, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$1,200,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Henniker, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.

4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges and repair or purchase of machinery.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Police Department.

7. To see what action the Town will take concerning the purchase of a new police cruiser and the sale of the old cruiser.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Tucker Free Library.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V roads.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Concord Hospital.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the District Court.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Henniker Community Center activities. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Henniker Youth Services.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to apply to Federal, State, or other assistance that may be available for the purchase of a new ambulance for the Henniker Rescue Squad. (By Request)

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of the Town Hall (Community Center) or take any action in relation thereto.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Community Action Program. (By Request)

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

20. To see if the Town will vote to increase the exemption to New England College upon dormitories, dining rooms and kitchens from \$150,000 to \$1,000,000 as authorized by RSA 72:23 IV. (By Request)

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to exchange by deed property in connection with the relocation of a portion of Bear Hill Road. 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend on behalf of the Town any grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including but not limited to disaster aid and highway funds which may now or hereafter be available from the United States government, the State of New 'Hampshire or any federal, state or private agency or individual or take any other action in relation thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Mobile Home Park Ordinance to increase the minimum lot size to conform to the same standards required for house lots in the Henniker Subdivision Regulations.

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of the Rescue Squad lot on Western Avenue.

25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 31:105, and thereby indemnify and save harmless Town employees or agents from claims arising out of their employment with the Town, or take any other action in relation thereto.

26. To see if the Town will vote to approve the inclusion of its full time officers and employees in the New Hampshire Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by RSA 100-A (supp), for the employees of the Town of Henniker in accordance with Chapter 134, to be effective January 1, 1975 or take any other action in relation thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the current National Fire Protection Association's Life Safety Code 101.

28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept a street to be known as Goss Drive when the street meets Town specifications. (By Request)

29. To transact any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

RECORD OF AFFIRMATIVE VOTES AT ANNUAL MEETING 1973

- Article 3. Voted, that the Town accept the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees as printed in the Town Report.
- Article 4. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Seven thousand and forty five dollars (\$77,045.00) to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, divided as follows:

And that Town Officers be paid at the following rates: Auditors, Ballot Clerks, Fence Viewers, Health Officer, Selectmen, Supervisors of Checklist and Surveyors of Wood and Lumber at \$2.50 per hour, Moderator at \$2.75 per hour, Treasurer at \$600.00 per year, Tax Collector at the rate of three quarters of one percent of the taxes collected, and Town Clerk at \$100.00 per year.

- Article 5. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy seven thousand one hundred thirteen dollars and fifty cents (77,113.50) for the repair of highways and bridges, and repair or purchase of machinery. That \$23,113.50 come from the Highway Subsidy Fund and \$54,000.00 be raised by taxation.
- Article 6. Voted, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of Ninety Five Hundred Dollars (\$9,500.00) for use as a set off against a Highway appropriation for a new truck.
- Article 7. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Eight Thousand dollars (\$28,000.00) for the purchase of a truck and sander for the Highway Department to be paid as follows: in addition to the Revenue Sharing Funds of \$9,500.00, \$4,500.00 to be taken from the Heavy Equipment Fund, \$6,000.00 from the 60% James R. Straw Fund, and \$8,000.00 will be used from the Highway Department General Expenses.
- Article 8. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Three hundred Dollars (\$2,300.00) for the maintenance and plowing of sidewalks.
- Article 9. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Six Thousand Nine hundred Dollars (\$36,900.00) for the maintenance of the Police Department.
- Article 10. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty One hundred dollars (\$6,100.00) for the maintenance of the Fire Dept.

- Article 11. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand dollars for the purchase of a radio dispatch alerting system for the Fire Department.
- Article 12. Voted, that the town raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the support of the Tucker Free Library for the ensuing year.
- Article 13. Voted, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 14. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen hundred eighty-seven Dollars and Nine cents (\$1,487.09) for State Aid Construction on Class V roads.
- Article 15. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Eighty Three dollars for the support of Concord Hospital.
- Article 16. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$8,830.00) for the District Court.
- Article 17. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the support of the Henniker Community Center Activities and that Five Hundred dollars (\$500.00) of this sum be used to allow the Center to cooperate with the Henniker Youth Services in their programs.
- Article 18. Voted, that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow a sum of money not to exceed Fifteen Thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) for the purpose of defraying extra costs due to changes in scope associated with the preparation of final plans and specification for the sewerage and sewage treatment plant facilities for the Town. This cost to be incorporated in the aided sewage project currently under design.

b

- Article 19. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the acquisition of land and easements for the sewage system.
- Article 20. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred twenty-five dollars (\$625.00) for the Conservation Commission's Ford Foundation Program.
- Article 21. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the observance of Old Home Day in August 1973.
- Article 22. Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of Fifty Five Thousand dollars (\$55,000.00) for repairs to the Town Hall; and that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for repairs to the roof of the Town Hall.
- Article 23. Voted, that the Moderator appoint a special unpaid Advisory Committee of three persons to be known as the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee which will join with other towns on the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board. Such Committee shall make recommendations to Town Meeting for upgrading the town dump including, but not limited to, the advisability of joint action with other towns; and that the Town raise and appropriate Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) as the Town's share of costs to undertake this work, conditional upon the terms set forth in the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board's proposed by-laws.
- Article 24. Voted, that the Town accept the gift of a parcel of land from Dr. Francis L. Childs; said parcel is identified as lot number 402 on the Town's property map.
- Article 25. Voted, that the Selectmen be authorized to accept a street in the Morse subdivision off Dodge Hill Road when the street meets the Town's specifications for new streets and that the street be known as Morse Circle.

- Article 26. Voted, that the Selectmen be authorized to accept a street in the Tree Growers, Ind., subdivision off College Hill Rd. when the street meets the Town's specifications for new streets and that the street be known as Longview Drive.
- Article 27. Voted, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Forty Dollars and Ninety Two Cents (\$640.92) for the support of the Community Action Program, said sum to be paid over only if this agency receives sufficient support from other communities to continue it's programs.
- Article 28. Voted, that the Town change the name of Butter Road from it's intersection with Huntington Rd., over Mount Hunger to Morse Road, to Mount Hunger Rd.; and that part of Butter Road from Morse Road to the Weare Town line be changed to Morse Road; and that Quaker Street at the fork at the Grady residence turn south to the Deering line and the left fork at the same place be known as Heath Hill Road to the Deering Line.
- Article 30. Voted, that the town instruct our two state legislators that it is not in favor of the bill pending before the State Legislature that would remove the district courts from Henniker and surrounding towns and create a full time district court in Concord.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT Henniker, N. H.

December 31, 1973

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen of the Town of Henniker, N. H. and the Residents of same:

Dear Sirs:

The Town's Residents have enjoyed reasonable good health for the past year. The only illnesses of any proportions have been in the virus and flu categories.

Complaints received were investigated in order to determine as to whether they would be potential health hazards. If found to be such, the parties involved were notified that the same must be corrected, with the exception of one case, which is still under investigation.

The Bi-monthly water samples of the Cogswell Spring Water Works were taken to the State Board of Health Department in Concord, N. H. for testing. All were found to be exceedingly good.

Numerous places for public gatherings and public eating places within the Township were inspected and were found to be satisfactory after minor corrections were made.

THE HENNIKER YOUTH SERVICE

The Henniker Youth Service has been in service to the community for almost two years, having commenced operation in June, 1972. During this time, cultural, educational and recreational programs have been organized, utilizing primarily the facilities of New England College and the Town of Henniker. In June, 1973, Henniker Youth Services received state recognition when it was awarded a grant from the N. H. Commission on the Arts, approved by the Governor's Council, in support of its arts programs. Among the programs thus far organized are: *Theater*, annually producing a major Broadway musical ("Godspell" in 1973 and "Jesus Christ Superstar" in 1974) and a summer production ("Stop the Presses," Aug., 1972, "No Exit," Aug., 1973): A Dance program of ballet, jazz, baton, acrobatics and tap dance; Music lessons offering individual instruction in elementary and advanced piano, guitar and recorder; Art lessons in clay work, painting, potato painting and elementary design: Sewing classes teaching students the art of dressmaking, embroidery and patchwork; A Children's Film series of ten Walt Disney film classics; field trips to movies, plays museums and sporting events, Community ice skating, and special events as the Easter Egg Hunt and Halloween Carnival and Fun House. H.Y.S. is the local sponsor of the federally funded Neighborhood Youth Corp (NYC) program through which local youth are employed on community programs and salaried by the Federal Government.

Last summer, Henniker Youth Services renovated the first floor of the Henniker Community Center, washing, plastering, sanding and painting to faciliate the use of the building by all community organizations. 'H.Y.S. held its summer theater and dance program in the center.

The Henniker Senior Citizens Club and Henniker Youth Services are working together on a number of programs including Telephone Reassurance, Homebound Visiting, Transportation, Discount Purchasing and Distribution of Information Projects to benefit senior citizens. In the Spring, H.Y.S., in conjunction with the Congregational Church Youth Ministry, sponsored the first of a series of bi-annual trips, this year to Arundel, England where youth and parents toured England, Scotland and Wales.

Henniker Youth Services and the youth of Henniker would like to publicly thank all the community organization leaders, merchants, the Congregational Church, New England College, the Town of Henniker, the Community Center Organization and all those who have contributed so much to the success of the above mentioned programs.

REPORT OF THE SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE TREATMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE

This fifth annual report of the Committee authorized by the 1969 Town Meeting covers progress from the end of January 1973 thru January of 1974. It should be read with the reports of prior years for a full picture of events to date.

Plans and specifications for the treatment plant and sewerage were reviewed at the 75% stage by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and Town. The review took considerable time, in part because of difficulties in determining the requirements of other agencies. Completion of the design stage is now expected shortly.

Procedures to secure a Farmers Home Administration contract to purchase sewer bonds at a favorable rate of interest were completed before that agency's authority to give such assistance terminated. The Committee and Selectmen worked on other program requirements as they came into focus, including the securing of necessary easements, through the period.

Henniker has passed into a permit status under federal law, allowing the continued discharge of raw sewage on the condition that a treatment plant be placed in operation by July 1, 1976. To accomplish this, it will be necessary to start construction in 1974. The State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission has programmed state assistance and allocated a portion of the state share of federal grant aid due in the 1974-75 fiscal year on this schedule.

Among the requirements of an application for federal grant aid are the Town's vote to bond for the necessary amount, and the transcript of an environmental hearing. To comply with these requirements, public notices in required form have been given for an environmental hearing and a bond hearing, both on the afternoon of February 16, 1974.

If the outcome of these hearings and the subsequent vote on the bonds at Town Meeting is favorable, progress can continue on this undertaking.

CENTRAL N. H. REGIONAL

PLANNING COMMISSION

As one of the 14 voting members of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, Henniker was represented at each of the monthly meetings by Adolphus Holton and Clarence L. Fitch; 'Mr. Holton is also a member of the Commission Executive Committee. As a member of the Commission the Town also maintained its membership eligibility in the Refuse Disposal Planning Board which is developing a refuse disposal plan including Henniker, as required under the State law.

In 1973 the Commission assisted the Town Planning Board with subdivision review and revision of the Town's subdivision regulations. The Commission also reviewed and recommended approval of Federal monies under the A-95 requirement for a \$724 grant as part of the \$1,050 Town law enforcement project and for a \$50,000 grant as part of the \$250,000 academic facility at New England College. The Commission has also published several documents on housing, open space, natural resources, and transportation that provide valuable data to Henniker.

In 1974 the Commission will be assisting the Planning Board with the updating and completion of all elements of the Town Development Plan.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Developers presented plans for one hundred and ninety four new lots in Henniker this year. The Planning Board spent considerable time revising regulations to permit expansion of this intensity without overtaxing the limited resources of the Town. We received complaints from lot buyers who had bought land relying upon the developer's promises of new roads and were asking the Town to build and maintain what the developers had abandoned. Regulations adopted this year put the burden of development on the subdivider. One proposal for one hundred and one lots was refused approval partly because of inadequate guarantees that the roads would be completed before all lots were sold. A joint meeting with the Deering Planning Board on this subdivision showed the value of cooperation with our neighbors on some projects. Another subdivision involving State acquisition of a long section of the North bank of the Contoocook River was disapproved, because it lay on a class six road, and the Town would have to maintain and probably improve several miles of road for a subdivision of only four lots. One developer was refused permission to subdivide because of inadequate roads, and has sued the Planning Board in the Superior Court to get approval.

During the slack season for developers, the Planning Board is organizing and collecting material for a more complete master plan. A very informative joint meeting was held with representatives from all twelve town committees. Each committee reported on its resources, activities and future plans. This valuable opportunity to learn what the others were doing gave us all a chance to learn where we could cooperate with each other in providing the growth of Town services which we must have to such rapid development.

The regional planning director has visited our meeting on two occasions with offers of help with work on the master plan, Chairman Andy Holton has continued his tremendous work on the Town Tax map. This work has saved the community many thousands of dollars, since the legislature has required all town to have tax maps by 1980. We are six years ahead of schedule and the Town has been given this extremely useful information at practically no cost. The plan may be seen on the West wall of the Henniker Courtroom where the planning board meets on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. Townspeople are always welcome, to learn first hand what is happening in our village.

REPORT OF THE ZONING BOARD

OF ADJUSTMENT

Upon approval of the Town of 'Henniker Zoning Ordinance at Town Meeting on March 6, 1973, the Board of Selectmen appointed the first Zoning Board of Adjustment the end of March, in accordance with Article VIII of the Zoning Ordinance. The Board of Adjustment has the function of hearing all appeals for variance and requests for exception to the terms of the Zoning Ordinance.

Since March of 1973, through the month of January 1974, the Zoning Board of Adjustment conducted ten hearings. The Board approved the action requested by the applicant in seven cases; denied the request in two cases; and at the request of the applicant, one case was discontinued during the hearing. Two hearings were conducted on subdivision of property; three hearings on erection of signs; two hearings on construction closer to property lines; and one hearing each on conversion of a building to apartments, commercial use of property in a residential district; and construction of a building on an undersize lot.

The Board appreciates the assistance provided by the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board, and wishes to thank Mrs. Lorraine Knapton and Mrs. Jeannette Pennock for the clerical help they so graciously gave us.

HENNIKER CONSERVATION COMMISSION

ANNUAL REPORT — 1973

Recognizing the need not only for greater utilization of existing park facilities in downtown Henniker, but additional preserved open space as well, due to increasing development in Town, the Conservation Commission has been actively involved in planning improvements for Azalea Park and the land around the covered bridge recently erected by New England College.

The covered bridge and its proximity to Azalea Park offer a unique opportunity to enhance the natural resource value of the Contoocook River as a conservation area in the midst of downtown Henniker.

With "seed money" provided by a \$1,375. grant from the Ford Foundation's Municipal Conservation Commission Assistance Program (and matched by \$625. of local funds), Henniker's Conservation Commission has undertaken an open space preservation program to prepare landscape plans for improvements to Azalea Park and lands around it in proximity to the covered bridge. The Commission at the same time is also investigating various means of increasing the amount of open space in close proximity to downtown Henniker for future recreation and open space as the Community develops.

Working closely with the Park Commission throughout the year, the Conservation Commission has also met frequently with the School Board members and the Planning Board to coordinate the development of these plans with others.

The firm of Shurcliff, Merrill and Footit has been retained to prepare the landscape plan, which will be presented to the Town upon completion. Soon the Commission will be investigating the possibilities of applying for State and Federal funds through the U. S. Department of Interiors Land and Water Conservation Fund for implementation of the recommendations put forth in the landscape plan.

In other areas of activity, the Commission was recently informed of powers granted to it by House Bill 817 which gives it a greater degree of local review and participation in "dredge and fill" prospects in the State's wetland and surface waters. To date Henniker has not reviewed any such local prospects of this type.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

HENNIKER COMMUNITY CENTER

During the past year the Henniker Community Center continued to provide financial support for several youth and social activities for the town. Due to the *generosity* of the town the Center was able to assist the Henniker Youth Services with its worthwhile programs.

In the summer months a well attended swimming program was conducted at Pleasant Pond which provided swimming instruction as well as a supervised beach facility utilized by large numbers of townspeople.

The PeeWee League this past summer provided an attractive baseball program for 47 boys, age 8 thru 11 who made up a 4 team Community Center League. After an eight game season two All Star Teams were selected, who then swept a four game schedule from the town of Hillsboro. In August all members were treated to a Red Sox — Oakland game at Fenway Park.

From November thru March the Henniker Community Center basketball team, directed by Joe Clement, continued its program for boys from the third grade thru the eighth grade. A nine team Merrimack Valley Basketball League provided the interest and competition during the season which resulted in the oldest team reaching the tournament finals.

The Henniker Community Center again this year did not utilize the "Center" for its activities; therefore, is returning control of this building to the town since other active groups have more of an interest in this facility. Hopefully the use of the grounds will still be available for our baseball programs.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN VISITING NURSE

For the Annual Report of the Town of Henniker, New Hampshire

Visits made September 1 — November 30, 1973 — 253

Payment received for the Town of Henniker — January 11, 1974 — \$1,144.31.

The Visiting Nurse Association of Concord began to service Henniker in September, 1973. They have provided skilled nursing care to anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharge from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between the nurses visits.

Special services such as Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy and nutrition guidance have been given by the special staff and consultants in order to assist with the rehabilitation of an acute or chronic illness.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of Home Health Aides are available to give physical care, do light housekeeping and assist with meal planning and preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition and sickness and accident prevention. Anyone in Henniker may request these services — doctor, family, pastors, friend or patient himself. Patients are also referred by clinics and other agencies. All calls are answered, but continuing care can be provided only under a doctor's order.

A call to the Visiting Nurse Association of Concord — Henniker number 428-3244 or in Concord 224-4093, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. is all that is necessary to start service or make inquiries. Saturday, Sunday, and Holiday calls are only made when there is serious illness. Fees may be scaled to those unable to pay the entire amount.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

It is the customary practice to utilize this space to report the activities of your Police Department for the previous year. However, I wish to take this opportunity to provide an insight into the Department, its manpower, equipment, obligations and problems.

In September of 1969 the Town of Henniker established the Police Department as a full-time organization consisting of one full-time Police Officer and six part-time (Special) officers. Since that time, in order to stay abreast of the ever changing community complexities, the Department has grown to its present strength of three full-time employees and six Special Officers. Through scheduling, the community is afforded twenty four hour protection each day throughout the year.

Each full-time officer performs a minimum of forty five hours per week on patrol. The Special Officers are utilized primarily as a support officer on weekends and as a substitute for days off, vacation, etc. for the permanent personnel. The combined total hours performed by the Special Officers averages twenty three hours per week. All members are required to attend weekly court sessions, in-service training classes and to assist the officer on duty in emergency situations. These extra duties are performed without salary.

Each of the full-time members have been certified, by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council, as qualified Police Officers i.e. have successfully fulfilled the necessary training and educational requirements established by the State of New Hampshire.

The training of the members, their salaries, insurance and pension contributions represents approximately 85% of the Departments yearly budget appropriation. Fortunately, partial funding for these expenses has been received. The Highway Safety Agency and the Governors Commission on Crime and Delinquency have rendered financial assistance over the past four years. Through this funding, the Towns financial support, of the Department, had been substantially reduced.

As the Department expanded the need for additional and/or improved equipment also expanded. Presently we are a well equipped organization. Our communications equipment, uniforms and firearms, office materials and investigative aides must be considered excellent. Through the continued generosity of a few members of the community we have been able to make these necessary purchases with little or no expense to the budget.

Since the inception of a full-time program, the Department has received in excess of 13,000 calls for services. These calls are placed through the Henniker Police Department number (428-3212) and then dispatched to the officer on duty on a twenty four hour basis. This dispatching service, which is provided by the Continental Telephone Company, located in Hillsboro, has proved to be a very reliable service. For this facet of operation the cost to the Department is approximately \$1,400.00 per year.

Due to the unique characteristic of our community, in that almost 50% of our population consist of young people in the 17-23 year age group, we therefore are faced with the various problems common to this group. Consequently a major portion of our efforts are devoted to dealing with these problems. The drug situation is of major concern throughout the community. The amount of man-hours required on a drug involved investigation can be staggering. It is encouraging to note however, from information possessed by this Department, the local involvement in drug experimentation has decreased from the peak years of 1971 and 1972.

A distressing trend noted during this past year, 1973, has been the sharp increase in Juvenile Offenses. (Juvenile — less than 17 years of age) Fourteen youths were petitioned to Juvenile Court as compared to five petitions during the previous year. The majority of these offenses involved Theft. Through the cooperation of all parents being knowledgeable as to the activities and whereabouts of the youngsters, hopefully we can portray a more pleasant juvenile report for the year 1974.

I wish to extend an invitation to all the members of the community to contact me concerning any suggestions and/or criticism regarding the Police Department. With your help and cooperation we hope to provide you with the best service possible.

It is our hope to merit your continued support.

THE HENNIKER RESCUE SQUAD

For the Year Ending December 31, 1973

The Henniker Rescue Squad marked 1973 as a year of real progress in meeting the emergency medical needs of the Town of Henniker. Over 688 volunteer hours were logged in emergency related calls; 2,500 volunteer hours have gone into the building project; and 325 hours were recorded in inservice training. Eighty-six calls were answered which is an increase of 23% over the previous year.

The Squad commenced the building phase of the fund drive for a new facility which is nearly complete (expected occupancy early January).

Through mutual cooperation and planning with the Henniker Fire Department dual assistance measures have been established to ensure fire and rescue coverage during automobile accidents and fire calls.

The Squad through the Town participated in plans to organize an ambulance district and was instrumental in its establishment. As a member of this newly formed Central New Hampshire Emergency Medical Service District, the Squad and Town became eligible for Federal Assistance. Through the District plan, the New Hampshire Ambulance Coordinating Board granted matching funds for the purchase of a new ambulance for two towns within the district (Center Barnstead and Henniker). An Article on this grant will be brought before the March 1974 Town Meeting.

The Squad has maintained its affiliations with the Emergency Medical Technician-Ambulance Association, the American Red Cross, the New Hampshire Heart Association, and its sponsorship of the Henniker Explorer Post 76. All of these activities and the service related thereto has been made available due to the generosity of the citizens of Henniker and surrounding communities. We THANK YOU for YOUR SUPPORT.

REPORT OF THE REFUSE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE — 1974

Item for Town Report as requested at the 1-23-74 Meeting of the C.R.R.D.P.B.

The Refuse Disposal Planning Committee representatives appointed by the Town Moderator in 1972 joined with eleven other communities to form the Capital Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board. The Board action in May was taken under N. H. RSA 53-B:3. The cooperating communities are Allenstown, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Dunbarton, Epsom, Henniker, Hopkinton, Loudon, Pembroke, Salisbury, and Warner.

In June, the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission received a \$40,000 Federal grant to plan a refuse disposal system to meet the needs of the cooperating communities according to New Hampshire law. The Refuse Planning Board works with the Regional Commission as the refuse planning operation. The 30 cents per capita solid waste assessment in 1973 was a condition of the Federal contract for all communities in the Disposal Planning Board. These funds are held in escrow to be used to further the disposal planning program with acquisition and site work as necessary. No further solid waste assessment is requested in 1974.

• To date, seven sites have been investigated under the engineering contract with the Anderson-Nichols Company to determine the capability of the sites to accept solid waste in landfill operations as required. In 1974, under the 24-month contract, the detailed engineering, operations requirements, costs, financial and legal data will be developed to be presented to member communities for final action in 1975.

REPORT OF TUCKER FREE LIBRARY

The single most important event for the library this year was the resignation of our respected librarians, John and Evelyn Hollis, based on their claim that they were old enough to retire. No one who knows them, or has seen them handle the library, believes that they are as old as they say they are, but there was nothing the Trustees could do but agree. Hordes of school children and their teachers came over one afternoon to tell them good-bye and present a gift to them and enjoy the refreshments served by the Friends of the Library, and the Trustees presented them with a color television set, but these were only minor indications of the gratitude felt by the Trustees and the town.

For eighteen years they worked faithfully to make our library the best possible, to serve the individual needs of the library patrons, and to encourage the use of the library by Henniker's children. It is largely due to their efforts that our summer reading and story hour programs have been so successful, and that every week almost a hundred school children visit the library. It is also due to them that our patrons have been supplied with the best of the newest books and that our collection covers such a wide range of subjects.

One of the conditions they made in connection with their retirement was that they would stay until the Trustees had found replacements with whom everyone would be satisfied. We feel that we lived up to their requirement in our new librarian, Carolyn Patenaude, and her assistant, Helene Dermon. They are continuing in the Hollis tradition of service, and adding some new touches of their own, such as jig-saw puzzles for both adults and children, waiting to be worked on in spare moments. If you haven't welcomed them yet to their new jobs, drop into the library one afternoon and say Hello.

This past year the library had a floor put in the stack room so that it could be used for the Annual Book and Food Sale of the Friends of the Library. This popular event draws more people every year and has more books donated, so you won't want to miss it next summer. You can donate books any time by phoning the library — if you can't bring them down, someone will pick them up.

The number of our patrons continues to increase, and we make greater efforts to please them — this year we have bought more phonograph records than before as more and more people have borrowed them.

New storage facilities were added to the Archives Room, which is now so full of material that it is bursting at the seams. Our Library inherited all of the Henniker material compiled during a lifetime of research by the late Francis Childs, and Willa Brigham and her team of workers have spent hundreds of hours catalogging and filing it. Many important gifts of valuable historical records and mementoes, besides the Childs collection, have been given to the room, and very soon the library will need to create new space for this sort of thing.

Last summer the children in the summer reading program were taken to Sturbridge Village in Massachusetts as a climax to their adventure with books, and the story hour ended with a special party for its younger members.

Please take the time to read the treasurer's report to see how library money was expended this year — the Trustees try to make sure that every penny is invested wisely and thanks to our capable treasurer, Kathy Patenaude, to tell you exactly where it went.

Anticipating that the energy shortage may bring more and more people to the library, we are buying more books and thinking about expanding the number of hours during which we are open. Please let us know how we can best serve you, and don't forget to tell newcomers in town about the library and invite them to use it.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

School opened this past September with an enrollment of three hundred and thirty-nine students in grades Kindergarten through twelve. Of the nineteen full time classroom teachers, seven were new to the system, three in the elementary and four in the junior-senior high school. In addition Kindergarten, due to the number of students, went from two sessions to a single session.

Positive things are happening in the school. Progress toward the goal of ungrading the Elementary School in language arts and math continues. This year Mrs. Sneed's class became a part of the program which now encompasses all levels except the fifth and sixth grades. With the help of Mrs. Merrill and Mrs. Sneed combined with the cooperation of the teachers new to the system, the program continues to function effectively. Presently, at the request of the School Board and under the direction of the Superintendent's Office, the Ungraded Program is undergoing a formal evaluation to help to determine objectively its strengths and weaknesses. A final note regarding the Ungraded Program concerns testing. This September standardized tests were administered to approximately half the children. Results generally were quite favorable. Using the grade equivalency, national percentiles and small town percentiles as criterea, all classes overall scored average or above average.

Another established program that continues to be effective is the Work Study Program. Again this year with the cooperation of New England College and local businesses, Mr. Blair is able to offer juniors and seniors meaningful work experience.

This past summer a committee of four teachers, a consultant and myself met to study changes in the junior-senior high school schedule. The result of this study produced a new master schedule which seems to be more advantageous to students and teachers. Not only is it more consistent with the goal of individualization but it also provides the following: 1)more scheduled time for junior high school students; 2) a badly needed preparation period for most teachers who are assigned five different preparations a day; 3) an opportunity for some teachers to use the team approach; 4) fewer students with unscheduled time.

In addition to the above advantages, the schedule gave impetus to the newly created Alternative Program. This program under the direction of Mr. Sidney is available to juniors and seniors who have a study hall during the final period of the day. In lieu of the study hall the student may participate in this program, which in essense allows the student under the supervision of Mr. Sidney to design his own learning experience.

Another important development this past fall is an inservice workshop that all teachers, except those in the Ungraded Program, have been attending. The purpose of the workshop is to familiarize teachers with the organization and techniques of individualized instruction.

Health instruction, heretofore a somewhat neglected area, is being organized by Miss York, the physical education teacher. Tentatively the plan for next year is to try to have a formal organized health course for high school students, a health course for seventh and eighth graders, and a health syllabus for elementary school teachers.

Beginning next September the State Department of Education is requiring that all schools provide some instruction in nutrition. Mrs. Jones, who is currently enrolled in the state sponsored course, is responsible for launching the program next fall in the elementary school.

The above are some of the major tasks that your school system has undertaken toward continuous progress of trying to meet the needs of the Henniker youth.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

An annual message is most difficult this year in this period of national duress with everyone atuned to the energy crisis, overall economic unrest, political chaos and the many socioeconomic pressures generated from these factors. Education in depth has become intrinsically more and more significant through the years to preserve individual identity and help to prepare all members of our society to be able to effectively cope with the pressures wrought.

We have seen educational strides in the district with sound efforts being made to broaden programs of studies and at the same time attempting to meet individual differences. Throughout the Supervisory Union the staff turnover has been higher than normal as has been the administrative change, but curricular improvement has been effected.

With some new programs, new approaches, greater interaction, and focusing on student individuality, the schools' administrators and teachers have worked hard in improving the educational process. Discussion is under way relative to vocational education and seeking outlets for students desirous of intensive programs. Additionally there has been far more concern manifested for children with learning handicaps, and additional staffing has been added to help correct deficiencies in language arts, assist slow learners, and assist in learning disabilities.

The proposed budget reflects the inflationary factors that have reached every facet of our economy. Wherein previously the fixed cost budget was computed using past performance criteria and standard rates, the recent energy crisis issues have grossly inflated here-to-fore stabilized prices and left us with many doubts and fears of under-budgeting. As we have all seen in our day to day living costs, no single area is exempted from increase and critical shortages exist with many products. Many legislative changes occurred as a result of the last legislative session. The majority of changes were procedural, but direct impact items include: (1) Each school board shall make a nutritious breakfast or lunch available to every pupil under its jurisdiction. Schools that have not previously had meals may make application for waiver, but no waiver may extend beyond September 30, 1979. (2) Nutrition education shall be integrated into the regular courses of instruction for grades K-12. (3) In addition to alcohol and drug education, instruction shall also be given on venereal diseases and their effect on the human system. (4) Districts not maintaining high schools must now pay full tuition of its students who attend high schools in other districts, (5) and of course, amendments or insertions for legal age of eighteen in the many statutes.

Although less emphasis has been forthcoming, the initial goals for implementation of local minimum standards to correct deficiencies have been largely or totally met at this juncture.

The voucher system has been discussed with each board and now some districts are making preparations for institution of this educational alternative project.

Through the years we have seen an ever expanding educational process and many ramifications have evidenced themselves, sometimes budgetarily, some with major problems in articulation, but in every instance we have packed more and more into a 180 day schedule.
