ORGANIZATION

OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, March 26, 1929.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1929 and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the Mayor-elect. Hon. Charles O. Hopkins by retiring Mayor Hayford. Mayor Hopkins then assumed the duties of his office, and administered the oath of office to the following councilmenelect, viz:

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. Charles J. Jones, after which the Mayor delivered his inaugural address.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF

HON. CHARLES O. HOPKINS

March 26, 1929

Gentlemen of the City Council and Fellow Citizens:

It is with deep appreciation of the good will of the people of Laconia in electing me to the high and honorable position of Mayor of your City that I come before you.

In assuming this duty I am keenly aware of the great responsibility it involves, but with the hearty cooperation of you gentlemen of the Council and the Citizens as a whole I hope and expect that an economical and efficient government will be carried forward in the year that is before us.

The two years just closed under the efficient leadership of Mayor Hayford, I believe, are outstanding in their achievement of public improvement; our new Church Street Bridge and Church Street are monuments that will endure for many years to come; also our new lighting system and system of modern accounting are evidence of a high order of achievement. But we cannot dwell on the glories of the past, for there are still trails to blaze that are now unthought of. There are many needs and recommendations that have come to my mind, and that have been brought to my attention in the last few weeks, which we will consider later.

WARDS

You gentlemen of the Council have been elected from your several wards to serve your City for the year just

ahead. You doubtless have been asked and urged to present petitions for various wants of your constituents: With the ever increasing and just demand for a lower tax rate, you must urge your people to consider very carefully their needs before presenting their petitions. You are not only representatives of your several wards, but also of your city as a whole. In deciding upon the needs of your wards, let us consider them in the light of the greatest good of all; by so doing we may eliminate all ward lines, and spend the peoples' money where the most good may be accomplished and our honest endeavors be appreciated.

DEPARTMENTS

The Department of Public Works, one of the major departments under the efficient management of City Engineer French and his corps of able assistants, backed by the Board of Public Works and the City Council has achieved much in the way of Public improvements such as better streets, sidewalks, sanitary sewers, etc.; these are in constant need of repairs and extension as our city grows and expands. I therfore recommend a careful study of the reports and recommendations to be found on pages 128 to 139 of the 1929 City Report.

Our School Department has charge of that which, we believe next to the American Home is the greatest bulwark of our present civilization. With our fine well kept buildings and equipment under the very efficient management of the Board of Education cooperating with the Superintendent of Schools we believe their department will continue to fill the high place it has been able to reach, and will achieve even greater results. Our high school is to be commended for the work of the several departments. The Domestic Science and Mechanic Arts courses by the very

nature of the work, not only prepare boys and girls for some of the duties of life, but tend to keep them in school until they have reached a more mature age and realize the advantage and importance of a brighter education, thus many of them find their way into colleges and universities. With these advantages we have also our fine athletic field and athletic activities, which are aids in building healthy bodies and clearer and stronger minds. The School Department cooperating with all the other departments has placed our Schools on an equal plane with those of any City of our size and population, or even a higher one. All these advantages cost our taxpayers large sums of money, but we believe that the money is well spent, and I would recommend that we continue to aid in upholding the high standard of our schools by carrying out, to the best of our ability the recommendations of the School Department.

Our Police and Fire Departments are in excellent working condition. We trust that the fine spirit of cooperation will continue, and that the work for the coming year may be carried on under general maintenance appropriations.

Our Board of Health should be commended for the excellent work of enforcing the milk ordinance. Under the present management this board is giving the City one of the best health departments in many years. I would recommend that the Parks and Playgrounds be looked after, and whatever equipment and supervision may be needed to carry on this excellent work have your careful consideration.

SPECIAL RECOMMENDATIONS

There are but few recommendations that I would specify at this time. Your attention has already been called to the Report and Recommendations of the Board of Public

Works and the City Engineer, which covers some of the needs of that department. There are, however, two outstanding recommendations in that report that have to do with the interest of our High School; the completion of the surfacing of Messer street and the sidewalk on the east side of Union Avenue. The completion of Messer Street would relieve the traffic past the High School, and the sidewalk would obviate the necessity of the children crossing the street going to and from Lakeport.

I also recommend that the City accept state and federal aid in building and maintaining our highways.

I would recommend that a suitable garage for housing the motor equipment of the City be arranged for in the near future. Much of our equipment is housed in hired places, and it is impossible to keep the same in proper condition. With the rent and cost of maintenance that now have to be paid, we could support a well equipped garage, and hire an efficient mechanic the year round; then our equipment would be kept in condition ready for immediate use at all times. This might be brought about by the erection of a new fire station as has been suggested in the past and using the station we now have for a garage, which is ideally situated and finely equipped for that purpose. Owing to the narrow street in front of the present fire station and the length of the new hook and ladder truck, it is extremely dangerous getting out of the building to attend a fire. The outlet also approaches a very busy street intersection, which requires extreme care to avoid fatal results.

One of the outstanding needs of our City today is making preparation for an airport. With our continually growing summer population and the rapid strides which aviation is making we shall be taking a step backward unless we give this our earnest attention, and I would urge this matter upon your consideration.

I would recommend that a sufficient sum of money be appropriated to continue the audit until the new system of accounting is in perfect working order.

I would respectfully urge the Heads of Departments to have their budgets calling for appropriations itemized, and in the hands of the Mayor and Council as early as possible that the assessors may get their figures together and the Tax Collector render bills as early as possible, thus giving the City the benefit of the money that would be received from early taxpayers.

I should not be doing my full duty unless your attention was called to the proposed zoning ordinance which received so much criticism during last year's administration. I believe that this is a step forward in the future growth of building operation in our City, and when fully understood by our people will be regarded as a future benefit. I would recommend the careful consideration of this proposed ordinance.

IN CONCLUSION

I would again urge those who have petitions calling for the appropriation of money to consider carefully the need before presenting them, also to see that the petitions are in the hands of the City Clerk or the proper Councilman before the last Monday in May, for the Council cannot consider petitions calling for money after appropriations are once made.

Our aim is to serve you to the best of our ability. We ask your earnest cooperation that our fair City may continue to grow and attract those who may desire to locate with us, and that our own people may enjoy the best that can be had with the lowest possible tax rate. The aim of this Administration is to serve the public to the best of our ability, we ask the cooperation of all our fellow citizens.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7:30 p. m., at the City Clerk's office.

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine.

A RESOLUTION authorizing temporary loans to an amount not exceeding One Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars in anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That for the purpose of meeting current expenses of the City, the City Treasurer be and hereby is authorized and empowered to make temporary loans from time to time for the use of said City of sums not exceeding the aggregate amount of \$180,000.00, said loans being in the anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year and hereby expressly made payable therefrom, and to give for such loans subject to the written approval of the Committee on Finance, notes of the City, each note to become due and payable within one year from its date and no such note shall be valid unless authenticated by the certificate of the National Shawmut Bank of Boston, Massachusetts. Said notes shall be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and countersigned by the City Clerk, shall be registered in the books kept for that purpose in the offices of the City Treasurer and City Clerk respectively.

This resolution shall take effect upon its passage. Passed and approved April 1, 1929.

AN ORDINANCE designating certain highways in the City of Laconia as "Through Ways".

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

Section 1. Through Ways. The following highways in the City of Laconia are hereby designated as "through ways:"

Court Street, Pleasant Street, Church Street, Academy Street from the junction of Court Street to the Union Cemetery, Union Avenue from Main Street to and including Clark Avenue, Pine Street from Main Street to and including Highland Street, Main Street from Bowman Street to and including Oak Street, Elm Street from Union Avenue to the Laconia Country Club.

Section 2. Every vehicle approaching on one of the above designated through ways at the point of intersection with a way other than through way so as to arrive at such point at approximately the same instant as a vehicle approaching on such other way, shall as against such other vehicle have the right-of-way, and every vehicle immediately before entering or crossing a through way at its point of intersection with another way shall first come to a full stop, except when otherwise directed by a police or traffic officer or by a lawful traffic regulation, sign, device, or signal. No such designation of a through way shall be effective as to the regulation of traffic at such point of intersection until the Police Committee of the City Council shall have caused suitable warning signs or signals to be erected at or near such point. For the purpose of this ordinance, a way joining a through way at an angle, whether or not it crosses the same, shall be deemed to intersect and the term "point of intersection" shall be deemed to be the area embraced within a prolongation of the property line on either side of such ways.

Section 3. Signs. The Police Committee of the City Council shall have exclusive authority to designate and approve the types and locations of all signs erected under the foregoing section.

Section 4. Penalty. Any person who shall fail to stop before entering a through way where a stop signal, sign, or device has been installed in pursuance of this ordin-

ance shall be fined not exceeding twenty dollars for each such offense. Provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to vehicles of the Police or Fire Departments, to public or private ambulances, nor to vehicles of the State Motor Vehicle Department when in emergency service. But such exemption shall not relieve the driver of any such vehicle from the duty to use due care under the circumstances.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

Department Reports

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

It is the purpose of the board of education in this brief statement to call attention to certain results that have been obtained since the last report was made. The superintendent's report goes more into detail than our report and should be read carefully by the citizens. By reading the superintendent's report you will be able to gain some knowledge of our schools, and what they are doing.

The work on the Athletic Field is progressing. This year we completed a drain that will remove the surface water coming from a brook that runs onto the field. The filling is practically completed, and the field has been leveled off and by next fall should be in good condition. We hope that the appropriation for the coming year will be sufficient to cover the cost of the completion of the field and also the erection of a suitable fence around the field. In a year or two more the field will be done and I am sure that the citizens of Laconia will be very proud of this athletic field. In our opinion when completed we will have one of the best athletic fields among the High Schools in the State of New Hampshire.

The Mayor and City Council were very kind in the appropriation of one thousand dollars for the purchase of a lot of land owned by T. J. McIntyre. The property purchased adjoins the high school property and we believe will soon be required for school purposes.

We wish to thank the Mayor and City Council for their cooperation with us and we assure them that it is our earnest endeavor to give to Laconia the best schools possible. With that in mind the cost may not appear to be so great. I call your attention to the following figures sent to us by the New Hampshire State Board of Education. The cost per pupil of public elementary schools 1928-29 in New Hampshire. Among the cities Laconia is in eighth place with \$68.74, out of twelve cities. The Current Cost of Public Education per \$1,000 of Equalized Valuation 1928-29. We are fourth for the cities, and for the districts consisting of 244 we are in thirty-third place. The cost as given is \$6.53 per pupil cost of Public High Schools 1928-29. We are second among the cities \$152.09.

We intend every year to have a sufficient amount of money to keep all the buildings in good repair. This year the Gilford Avenue School Building was given two coats of paint on the exterior. At the High School all the rooms on the first floor were painted, and the corridors and gymnasium were painted.

Laconia High School took an active part in debating. In the interscholastic prize speaking contest under the auspices of New Hampshire University we won first prize among the High Schools of the State. We also obtained permanent possession of the Parker Cup by winning three times in interscholastic debating.

In the field of sports we feel that Mr. Kelley is doing a wonderful work, and I know that the citizens appreciate what he is doing by their fine attendance at the different games.

In all we take satisfaction in reporting that the Public Schools of Laconia are in a very satisfactory condition, and for this condition we are exceedingly grateful to every teacher in Laconia.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Laconia:

The City Report for the year 1910 shows that the average membership for the school year ending June, 1909, in the elementary schools was 783; in the high school, 169; a total of 952. During that school year there were 37 teachers employed.

During the school year 1918-19, ten years later, the average membership in the elementary schools was 925; in the high school, 227; a total of 1152, an increase in the ten-year period of 200.

During the school year that ended last June the average membership in the elementary schools was 1167; in the high school, 346; a total of 1513, an increase during this ten-year period of 361.

As was shown in last year's report there has been steady gain year by year, in the average membership.

The number of different pupils that have been registered this year up to January 20, in the elementary schools is 941; in the senior high school, 387; in the junior high school, 308, a total of 1636.

At the same time last year the registration had been elementary schools 954; senior high school, 368; junior high school, 304; a total of 1626.

While the total number of different pupils enrolled so far this year is greater than ever before, the actual registration on January 20 is 11 less than it was a year ago, 1519 pupils in all the schools as compared with 1530 in January, 1929.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

In the elementary schools this year there are the same number of teachers as last year, with only four changes in the staff.

Miss Evans, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, took the place of Miss Weymouth, who is spending a year abroad.

Miss McIntyre resigned her position at Gilford Avenue to accept one in Berlin, her home, and her place was taken by Miss Rena Young, who was at Harvard Street last year.

Miss Ramsay, who was at Harvard Street last year, resigned to accept a position at her home in Manchester.

The two new teachers at Harvard Street are Miss Foss and Miss Gingras, both graduates of Plymouth Normal School.

Miss Bell, another graduate of Plymouth Normal School, was elected to succeed Miss Oswell at Mechanic Street, who resigned to be married.

Very little repair work was needed on the elementary schools last summer outside the painting of the exterior of the Gilford Avenue building.

During the vacation the blackboards at the Mechanic Street and Washington Street buildings were resurfaced.

This work has been done at all of the elementary buildings during the past few years, and it has made a great improvement in the surface of the slate.

The usual small repairs on curtains, desks, etc., were taken care of during the summer vacation. It does not cost a large sum of money to make the necessary repairs each year to keep the school houses in good shape and is much more economical than it is to let things go until extensive repairs are necessary. This has been the policy of the School Board for several years with the result that the school buildings of Laconia are always in good repair, are c'ean, and the sanitary conditions are satisfactory.

During the fall the one-room buildings at the White Oaks and on the Parade Road were sold by the City Council, and the Bowman Street building was given over to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. At the present time there are no unused school buildings in the city.

There are two unused rooms at Washington Street, one at Batchelder Street, and one at Harvard Street, and it will be possible to make another room at Academy Street without any great expenditure, so that 125 more pupils can be accommodated at the elementary buildings when necessary.

The increase in enrollment has been rather surprising and has been continuous over a period of several years.

The attendance in the schools on the whole is very satisfactory, although during the year some of the schools have been more or less broken up by various children's epidemics.

There is practically no truancy in the elementary schools and very little tardiness.

There has been no change in textbooks during the past year but it is felt that a change should be made in the arithmetics for another year and a committee is already considering different textbooks.

The schools are well equipped and have a good supply of textbooks and material for the pupils' use with the result that good work is being done. Probably the everyday work of the schools of Laconia is not as spectacular as it is in many schools, but the standard of the work is maintained on a high plane. This same high standard applies to music and drawing, as well as to the fundamental subjects.

Drawings for the school calendars this year were made by pupils of the sixth grades, and have received many very favorable comments.

As I have pointed out in previous years some attention should be given to the playgrounds at the elementary buildings, especially at the Batchelder Street School.

Equipment for the school grounds should also be furnished. This is a splendid opportunity for any citizen or organization to do something worthwhile for the interests of the boys and girls in the elementary schools.

HIGH SCHOOL

There are five new teachers in the High School this year: Miss Stott replaces Miss Dolloff; Miss Aldrich takes the place of Miss Friend; Miss Sullivan has charge of physical work and athletics for the girls in place of Miss Moberg; Miss Gove takes the place of Miss Abbott teaching Latin; and Miss Munkittrick has all of the 8th-grade mathematics instead of its being divided among all of the teachers as in years past.

The graduating class last June was the largest in the history of the school and was the first class to graduate under the 6-6 plan of organization. It was an especially good class in every way, its scholarship and spirit being unusually fine.

As a graduating gift the class installed two motion picture machines and a booth in the auditorium.

Last year the Debating team won first place again in the state wide contest at the University and came into permanent possession of the Parker Cup, having won the cup three times.

One of the members, Bernard Sneirson, won a scholarship at the University and he also won first place in the Prize Speaking Contest, conducted annually by the University.

Ruth Gilman, a member of the last year's graduating class, was awarded a scholarship at Vesper George Art School in a New England Art Contest.

In the state wide scholarship contest conducted by the State Department of Education last May our school won first place in English grammar, second place in Mechanic Arts, and third place in Home Economics.

In the state wide music contest held in Laconia last May the high school won third place. Three members of the Orchestra participated in the concert in Boston by the All-New England High School Orchestra.

Mary Duggan, a member of the present senior class, was awarded third prize in a New England Health Play Contest.

In addition to these activities the athletic teams have had a good record and continue to show the same high standard of sportsmanship that has characterized our teams for several years. The expenses of the athletic teams, together with the maintenance of the athletic field, are large and deserve the support of the entire community.

The Glee Club and the Orchestra this year are both very large and are doing very satisfactory work.

There is no reason why any boy or girl cannot secure a thorough preparation for college or for a start of life's work in the high school. This preparation includes high scholastic standards as well as any extra curricular activities that a boy or girl may desire. In the extra curricular activities are included athletics for both boys and girls, debating, prize speaking, dramatics, art, and music, both vocal and instrumental.

The academic course gives a thorough preparation for a Liberal Arts college; the commercial course gives good training for office work, while the Home Economics course and the Mechanic Arts course provide training for girls and boys who wish to go to work after graduating, as well as for those who are planning on certain kinds of post-secondary training.

We believe that the high school furnishes an opportunity for the boys and girls of Laconia to complete a thorough and well rounded public school education.

During the summer further redecoration was done to the interior of the building and weather stripping of windows was completed. The condition of this building, as well as of the elementary school buildings, is always very good and receives favorable comments of visitors from time to time.

EVENING SCHOOLS

The evening schools are in session two nights a week from 7:15 to 9:15 for 20 weeks, and furnish an opportunity for boys and girls and men and women to obtain further training in the use of the English language, in commercial subjects, in domestic arts, and Mechanic Arts. We have tried without very good results to interest more people, especially those who are preparing to take out citizenship papers, in the English classes in the evening school.

Here is an opportunity for men and women to improve their use of oral and written English.

The boys and girls from the 7th and 8th grades of St. Joseph school again this year are attending the classes in Mechanic Arts and Sewing and Cooking, and for the most part are enthusiastic and are doing good work.

The commercial classes, especially the typewriting, have attracted large numbers.

The evening school provides an opportunity for further education to a good many and it should reach larger numbers than it does, although the enrollment this year has been 175.

IN GENERAL

The registers show that there were about 1200 visits by citizens to all of the schools last year. The schools belong to the people of Laconia and their work and conduct should be of interest to every parent and citizen of the city.

We would again express the wish that more people would visit our schools.

Everything connected with the schools, whether it be financial matters, or pertaining to the course of studies, health program, the sanitation and care of the buildings, should be of public interest.

In conclusion, the physical condition of the pupils is supervised as closely as well may be expected, considering the fact that one nurse is responsible for 2400 children.

Our buildings are kept clean and sanitary, and are well heated through the efforts of an efficient corps of janitors.

The teaching staff this year is adequate and is doing praiseworthy work.

All of these are factors in the success of the public schools of Laconia.

For this co-operation we are extremely grateful, as well as for the support and co-operation of the School Board.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council:

Following is a report of the fire department for the year 1929, just passed. We responded to forty-nine alarms from boxes, and one hundred and twenty eight calls over the telephone system.

Lakeport answered forty-eight still alarms and nineteen box alarms during 1929. The Weirs station responded to nine calls for fires.

We sent aid to Belmont, Alton and Meredith.

Our fire fighting equipment is in fairly good condition except the Ladder truck at the Lakeport station, which should be replaced when the City can afford to purchase a new ladder truck; until then our ladder truck at the Central Station will help at Lakeport if required.

We have just installed a new air compressor at the Central Station, making our fire alarm system complete, furnishing our own power for the air, and doing away with paying rent to the Laconia Car Co. for air.

The personnel of our companies is very efficient when you consider it as a volunteer force. One regular driver should be added, so as to relieve the other drivers when off duty, thus assuring quick response to fires night or day.

Owing to the fact that each regular man is off duty one day in seven, we can reduce the call force so the maintenance would be very small, by adding one more regular man. The regular driver at the Weirs is on duty as Policeman and Fireman and no time off.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Police Department, and to the employees of the Telephone Co. and the Public Service Co. for their efforts to insure the success of our Department.

LACONIA HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION

ANNUAL REPORT

This organization was formed under an act of the New Hampshire Legislature that provided for a membership of not over 25 members.

The officers elected at the annual meeting held in January of each year, consist of a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and a board of 9 trustees.

At the recent annual meeting reports from the superintendent and treasurer were presented. They are of much interest and importance to all friends of the hospital, showing as they do the tremendous growth of this institution from its small beginning where but 3 to 4 patients could be cared for, to its present size.

The past year a total of 1493 were treated. Out of this total admitted 1225 were discharged well. 15,494 days of service was rendered; 795 operations performed; 1430 outpatients.

A grand work is being done every day. If you have not read the report of Miss Lillian G. Williams, superintendent, published in our local papers, we ask you to read carefully her report that follows in this City of Laconia Annual Report.

After reading of the large number of patients who have been cared for and brought back to health and happiness and are able to resume their duties in the home, the shop, as tillers of the soil or wherever their vocation may require their services, you will be the better able to appreciate the grand work that is being done.

We recently enlarged our hospital to about double its former capacity, but in the past year it has at times been full and in the near future another addition will have to be provided if we are to care for those who will seek admission.

We shall need money for this purpose and a larger endowment must be provided if we are to maintain its present high standard of usefulness. If you have money and are able to help or if you are disposing of property by will, we sincerely hope you will generously remember the Laconia Hospital Association.

GENERAL REPORT

OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE LACONIA HOSPITAL

This is my fifth report as Superintendent of the Laconia Hospital for the year ending December 31, 1929.

There has been an increase in the activities of every department of the hospital, the number of patients admitted, the daily average, the number out-patients, and X-Rays, have exceeded any previous year. Two days in September we reached our capacity, of 62 patients, and in March for the first time since I have been Superintendent we were obliged to refuse to take in a patient for lack of a bed for an adult. This would indicate that we will have to expand if we would accommodate those seeking admission.

As recommended last year, quarters for isolation have been provided in a large room on the third floor of the hospital, a partition being put up in the hall making it possible to separate entirely from other rooms. The necessity for this was soon realized when a family of five children with pneumonia were segregated there. Later for five weeks we had a typhoid patient with nurse in isolation. These quarters proving very satisfactory. Another recommendation of last year was for new equipment in our laundry. This, too, has been realized, being installed in May, and is giving great satisfaction. I would also mention the putting in of a larger water main, to the hospital building and renewing water pipes in utility rooms, placing of wash bowls with running water in large wards on both floors, the latter being a decided convenience. Another improvement has been weather strips on windows most exposed.

Within the past two months the long coridors, small wards, and most of the private rooms have been repainted. At the suggestion of the President, the yard at the side of the hospital has been concreted. This will prove a great improvement especially during the muddy season.

A few of the many improvements made by our Janitor are: cement steps and runway at laundry, the building and wiring of an incubator cabinet for premature babies which has had several occupants, a much needed book case at the Nurses' Home, and various appliances for special fracture cases. Having had an unusual number of these, seven at one time, for several weeks, we have purchased a new Zimmer Fracture bed which is a great comfort to helpless patients.

The Hospital Aid—The various bands of this organization have generously supplied our requests for bedding, linen, dishes, etc.; the Aid having spent \$195.00 for supplies which Bands could not finance, and in addition have purchased for the hospital and Nurses' Home, chairs, rugs, and extra couch beds with mattresses at an expenditure of \$226.00.

The Baptist Church of Lakeport furnished a comfortable chair for the female ward. The Woman's Club, of Lakeport has replaced many of the furnishings of their room.

Training School—Eleven students have been admitted during the year. The class of seven students who entered training October first, are all high school graduates. The Training School Committee having decided to make this the requirement. At present we have a student body of twenty-one nurses. Our Instructress of last year returned to us this fall with added enthusiasm after a Summer's Course at Simmons College.

Through the courtesy of one of our local druggists a very instructive lecture on the manufacture of biological products was given by a representative of the Park Davis Drug Company.

This year we have added to our curriculum a course in Chemistry, which has been given at the Laconia High School, two evenings a week. Our Doctors have freely given of their time in lectures to nurses on subjects assigned them. The Staff meetings have been held at the hospital the second Tuesday of every month, analysis of hospital service has been given, one of the doctors having been assigned to conduct a clinic at each meeting.

I would acknowledge with gratitude the privilege of attending with our night supervisor, the meetings of American Hospital Association at Atlantic City; these were of real educational value.

I wish to express my appreciation to our Doctors, who have so willingly rendered services to nurses when ill, to the President of this Association, who has so faithfully responded to our request, often requiring much of his time: to Maher's Book Store for the copies of the Boston

Herald to greet patients each morning; to the Laconia Flower Store, for several donations of flowers and Christmas wreaths, and to the many friends of the hospital who have made donations throughout the year.

REPORT OF CITY MILK INSPECTOR

The activities of the milk inspection branch of the Health Department have continued throughout the year 1929 along the same lines as previously. Each year seems to show marked improvements in the sanitary conditions in the production and handling of our milk supply.

It is a source of much satisfaction to know that the appeal to diary men to make their plants and premises conform to sanitary requirements have met with hearty response generally and that a visit from the inspector is not applied to the same extent as formerly.

Os it is impossible to completely supervise the sanitary production and handling of every drop of milk, and with the knowledge that cows are subject to disease and accidents which affect the milk supply, also as there is no assurance that disease may not be transmitted from or through the milkers or others handling milk, the only certain safety lies

in perfect pasteurization of all milk. As soon as the public becomes aware of the possible dangers of a raw milk supply, pasteurization will be demanded.

No outbreak of milk borne diseases has been reported during the year but two cases of ropy milk have caused much trouble and were finally traced to infected water supply which was soon eliminated.

The milk supply shows marked improvement over the preceding years by the fact that only 6.81% of the samples tested were over the maximum bacterial count and in only two instances were the bacterial counts sufficiently high to warrant alarm.

Many of the producers installed new equipment this year which aids materially in the production of better milk but many of the diarymen produce such small quantities that first class equipment is economically impossible.

As usual we have been working in close touch with the State Board of Health.

REPORT OF HEALTH BOARD

It is to be noted that this year, while characterized by a pronounced increase in influenza incidence and a rather wide spread epidemic of measles, has on the whole been unusually free from the more severe forms of communicable diseases. The increase in the incidence of influenza represents our proportional share of the nation wide epidemic of the past winter and spring, while the epidemic of measles illustrates the recognized impossibility of controlling this disease unless all of the initial cases are immediately identified, reported and placed under complete control. This epidemic, starting as it did in the summer months while children were not under school observation, smoldered along, many mild cases not receiving medical attention and not being reported to the health authorities, until, when school opened in the fall there was an immediate and wide spread outbreak.

The work of milk control has progressed, we think, satisfactorily, as outlined in that portion of our report compiled by Mr. Hunt. His recommendation of properly pasteurized, clean milk a sthe safest milk, meets with our hearty accord.

We believe that the time is ripe to give practical consideration to the problem of removing obnoxious waste from the bodies of water that we, as a city, have in the past been accustomed to pollute and recommend that a survey be made by a competent sanitary engineer with the purpose in view of arriving at the most economical satisfactory method of remedying this nuisance. We recommend, also, an appropriation to cover the expense of this survey, the amount to be determined by action of the City Council after due investigation of the expense involved.

It is apparent upon consideration that the amount of our appropriation (\$2600) is weefully insufficient to meet our needs. A glance at the figures below show be convincing. Our inevitable expenditures are:

which leaves a total of \$576 to pay the cost of the milk inspection work, aid to quarantined patients, burying of dead animals, stenographer's services and miscellaneous expenditures. When it is remembered that the average cost of the milk inspection work alone is well over \$700 a year, it can be appreciated that either a great many things must be left undone or we must regularly overdraw, by a considerable figure, the amount allowed us. We desire to call your attention to the fact that \$850 of our appropriation is by necessity devoted to the maintenance of the city dump privileges. Why this should be numbered among our functions we cannot understand and we recommend that the responsibility be transferred to the city department in charge of refuse disposal, where it logically belongs.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

I hereby submit my report for the year 1929.

During the past year, commencing May the 2nd, 1929, all parties applying for aid I have investigated and tried to find out if they were worthy cases, entitled to receive aid from the City. I found that the great majority of the men and women gave as their reason for appealing tor aid, the lack of employment. Some of these men are chopping wood on city property, so that helps to keep down the fuel bill.

We have on hand at the present time, about fifty cords of wood cut on land recently purchased from the Philbrook estate, also on land at the rear of the stone crusher we have thirty cords. This wood will be a great help next winter. The regular drivers at the station have delivered wood on their spare time, without any expense to the city.

I want to thank his Honor the Mayor for his advice and support, also the council, who all have tried to solve this problem. It is a work that requires lots of investigating to determine who are worthy poor. Again thanking you all for your splendid cooperation, I remain,

PARK COMMISSION

To the Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia:
Gentlemen:

The Park Commission is pleased to submit for your consideration its fifteenth annual report.

During the summer of 1929 the children attending Opechee Park enjoyed a most delightful as well as beneficial season under the efficient direction of Forrest J. Sanborn, assisted by Marjorie Sanborn. The average daily attendance was 200, with maximum of 400. Each day found nearly 100 taking advantage of the swimming instructions which resulted in 12 passing beginners' swimming examinations of the American Red Cross. Twenty-eight passed regular swimmers exams for A. R. C. pins, 5 qualified for Junior Life Saving and 2 for the Senior Life Saving Work.

The tennis courts are a great asset to the park and the opening week found 22 registered in special classes for beginners. During the summer tennis matches were played by not only the children but also by adults after playground hours and on Saturdays and Sundays.

Baseball came in for its share of interest and seven games were played in competition with outside parks with Opechee as champions, as was also the case in tennis matches between parks.

Each day at the park was planned with an eye to providing new activities and pleasures for those attending. Races, jumping, horseshoe tournaments, croquet, various stunts helped to keep all busy.

Miss Sanborn handled all small children and the girls most ably. Volley ball proved quite popular, six games being played in competition with outside playgrounds. Noonday picnics were always a happy event and every Wednesday was known as dinner day.

As the weather man was unusually favorable to us during the season it was unnecessary to plan many inside activities. During only two days of the entire nine week season was it impossible to remain outside on the grounds. The girls were given special instruction in bead working of designs and figures, painted vases and ornaments, also making tiny furniture of cigar boxes.

Many special events during the summer were of interest to parents and visitors. The always popular doll carriage parade in which appeared 30 prettily decorated vehicles. A candy sale helped out on some of the expenses A hunt for Chautauqua tickets was the crowning event of the Special Field Day, in which several youngsters were made happy by finding free tickets.

Three weenie roasts were enjoyed at Sandy Shore. Much of the apparatus at Opechee Park is in deplorable condition as well as the park itself and instead of being a spot of beauty and usefulness which it could easily be, it is rather the opposite. Nature herself has endowed Laconia with unusual advantages in affording such an excellent natural playground but interest seems to be lacking amongst the adult public.

The Leavitt Park Playground had a most successful season during the summer of 1929 under the direction of Mr. Donald McFarland and Miss Thelma Clow.

Previous to the opening of the playground we required Mr. McFarland to attend the three-day session of the Summer School for Playground Supervisors' held at Fitchburg. Mr. McFarland was accompanied to this school by Mr. Carl Smith and they gave to us a most comprehensive written

report of the activities and suggestions learned there. The expense of this trip was \$12.50 to the Park Commission.

The grounds at Leavitt Park have been given constant attention—the toboggan chute, which had almost become a menace to the safety of the children, was removed; several poplar trees have been removed because of the gypsy and browntail moth infection; the baseball diamond was kept up to its former high standard by work of the boys on the Lakeport Ball team and considerable progress has been made on filling and leveling the ground.

The most popular piece of equipment probably ever placed on our playground, was the Jungle Gym which was used constantly in playground hours and out, by old and young, all summer.

A carnival held on August 7th, netted 105.56. The success of this venture was due to the cooperation of parents and friends of playground children.

A system of merit badges for progress in different activities, regularity of attendance and general dependability stimulated the interest and aided in problems of discipline.

The average daily attendance was 106—the largest attendance being on July 2, and July 17; each day with 199—the smallest on August 14 (a cold rainy day) with only 29 being present.

The south end playground was under the direction of Miss Esma Ford and had a most successful season and a much larger atendance than in previous years.

As has been previously mentioned in this report, there seems to be a lack of adult interest in the manner of using playground equipment especially in the hours that no one is in charge of it.

This is not confined to our own playgrounds alone. All the reports coming to us from other localities have the same difficulties.

Your board would appreciate the cooperation of parents and guardians in trying to have the equipment used properly and not abused. This year considerable money will have to be expended to repair equipment wantonly damaged.

Your commission again calls your attention to the need of a suitable building for the accommodation of the patrons of the south end playground and suggest the usual appropriation for playground purposes.

The commission extend their thanks to the Mayor and Council for the interest they have taken in the Parks Playgrounds of our City.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

Laconia, N. H., Feb. 15, 1930.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We hereby submit the 20th Annual Report of the Department of Public Works, together with the detailed report and recommendations of the City Engineer and Superintendent of Streets and Sewers.

As will appear, the usual maintenance work and routine service has been carried on throughout the year, and all construction work authorized and provided for by appropriation, has been executed except that the Messer Street improvement was not completed owing to objections raised by property owners to construction upon lines of the street layout as determined by the City Engineer. It is hoped that a definite decision may soon be had in this case, in order that work may proceed early in the coming season.

In the matter of recommendations for special work, the ensuing year, we ask for your careful study of the City Engineer's report appended hereto: his recommendations have been considered and approved by the Board.

We would invite special consideration of the Weirs bridge project for which Trunk Line Bridge Aid would now be available; the selection of two or three locations for extensions of bituminous macadam pavements; additional sanitary sewers and surface drainage; gravel resurfacing and new snow plow equipment. We consider it necessary to provide for the widening of the pavement on Union Avenue from Casino Square to Messer Street, and from Elm Street to Stark Street, and it is also believed that the

proposed Elliott Street work should be carried out, eliminating certain conditions and greatly improving the approach to the Hospital, both as to grade and alignment. We recommend the following General Appropriations:—

BRIDGES

But little work was required on bridges during the past season and the cost of repairs and maintenance was small. This is due to the wise policy of building permanent structures to replace the wooden bridges of the past.

Since 1907 the city has built thirteen steel or concrete bridges. There remains only one wooden bridge, Mill St., which is good for some years to come.

As previously reported the bridge over the Weirs Channel is inadequate and should be attended to. As it is on the Daniel Webster highway it is a matter for the State Highway Department and the city to attend to jointly.

As the matter now stands the city is wholly responsible and pays all the cost of maintenance of this structure. The Fair Street bridge should be painted this coming summer.

DRAINS

Drains were constructed on Addison Street, Clark Avnue, Grant and Garfield Streets, New Salem Street, So.

The cost of maintaining 131,263 square yards exclusive of State Roads was \$4,020.10 or about three cents per square yard.

I recommend for consideration bituminous macadam pavements on the extension of Pleasant Street to Folsom Street, on Elliott Street, Harvard Street, Oak Street and Winter Street.

The pavement on Union Avenue from Casino Square to Messer Street and from Elm Street to Stark Street should be widened to include the area formerly occupied by Street Railway tracks.

Main and Garfield Streets.

I renew recommendations for drains on Endicott and Tower Streets at the Weirs and for a drain west of Leavitt Park at Lakeport covering Franklin, School, Bell and Washington Streets.

I recommend a drain on Garfield Street from Webster Street to Lincoln Street and on Centenary Avenue at the Weirs.

IMPROVEMENT OF COUNTRY ROADS

About \$7,500 was expended in surfacing streets and outside roads with gravel and I recommend an appropriation to continue this much needed improvement.

Some of the outside roads are called upon to carry much high speed auto traffic and as a consequence become quickly corrugated at certain seasons, especially in dry weather. If funds were available this condition could be improved by an application of either road oil or calcium chloride.

FORESTRY AND MOTH WORK

Due to the severe ice storm in December which broke down and injured many trees much additional expense was incurred in cutting and pruning trees.

The Browntail and Gypsy moth infestation, due to thorough suppression work last season, is much less serious than it was and but little trouble was experienced with moths except in certain localities where private owners did not clean their premises as they should.

PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT

The following equipment was purchased during the year. Ten ton tractor snow plow, truck blade snow plow, Ford truck, pair horses, roller repairs.

I recommend the exchange of our old two ton Concord truck for a four wheel drive truck with Frink_snow plow attachment, and the remodelling of our sprinkler and flusher to a road oil distributor, as our present horse drawn distributor is worn out. There is but little service at present for a water sprinkler and a motor road oil distributor would be an economy.

SANITARY SEWERS

Sanitary sewers were built on Sleeper Street, Cedar Street and on Prospect Street.

Sewers are needed on Sheridan Street, Stark Street, and St. Katherine Street and an extension to the sewer built last summer on Prospect Street.

Sewers are needed on Gilford Avenue, easterly from Highland Street and on Morrill Street.

The present system was flushed and cared for carefully as usual.

PLUMBING

This department issued permits for and tested 107 plumbing jobs for the year ending February 15, 1930.

ENGINEERING

This department made surveys, plans, estimates and attended to the lines and grades for all construction work undertaken.

GENERAL

All work provided for by appropriations was completed with the exception of the improving of that portion of Meser Street from the northerly railroad crossing to its junction with Union Avenue.

This work was held up by a dispute about street lines which was taken to the courts for action.

It is hoped that the matter can be settled so as to permit the completion of this piece of work early the coming season.

The department is still handicapped by the lack of a suitable garage and work shop although some of our storage requirements were taken care of by the erection of a storage building at the Messer Street Yard.

In consultation with the trustees of the Laconia Hospital the engineering department has made a plan and estimate for the improvement of Elliott Street to make a more suitable approach to the hospital. The present approach over Elliott Street, is narrow and has a very steep grade,

viz. 17% for a part of the distance and a blind corner at its junction with Union Avenue.

The hospital trustees have purchased the houses and land on the northerly side of Elliott Street and will remove the building so that the street may be widened, the grade reduced, the approach from Union Avenue greatly improved as well as the alignment of the whole street.

The carrying out of the proposed plan would reduce the 17% grade, now existing, to an 11% grade and would incidentally be of benefit to the abutting owners on the south side of Elliott Street.

LIBRARY REPORT

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

The Undersigned, Trustees of the Laconia Public Library, herewith transmit to you the annual report of Arthur W. Dinsmoor, Treasurer, showing the financial condition of the Library for the fascal year ending February 15, 1930, together with a table prepared by Miss Hazel J. Clark, Librarian, showing the circulation and registration during the same period.

During the year 1929, the circulation at the Gale Memorial Library reached a total of 64,243, an increase over the preceding year of 6,610.

The circulation at the Goss Reading Room was 10,603, an increase of 997 over 1928. Since 1923 there has been a total combined increase in circulation of 35,268, and there is no doubt that the annual appropriation of \$5,000.00 from the City has been the principal factor in bringing about this greatly increased patronage of our public library by permitting the purchase of new and up-to-date books.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

February 24, 1930

To the Honorable Charles O. Hopkins, Mayor, and the City Council:

Laconia, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:--

As per my appointment as Auditor for the City of Laconia, I have audited the financial accounts of the City of Laconia for the fiscal year ended Feb. 15, 1930.

The following Statements show the financial condition of the City as at Feb. 15, 1930, the appropriation accounts and the Excess and Deficiency, credits and debits during the year:

Exhibit I—Appropriation Accounts year ended Feb. 15, 1930 Exhibit II—Excess & Deficiency Account Exhibit III—Serial Debt as at Feb. 15, 1930. Exhibit IV—Balance Sheet as at Feb. 15, 1930.

The following items appearing in the balance sheet are commented upon as follows:

ASSETS

Cash \$70,900.32

This amount contains a certificate of deposit for \$20,000.00 the unexpended balance of pavement bonds. This cash balance was verified by the various bank statements and compared with records of the City Treasurer.

The Collector's records of unpaid taxes were examined and statements drawn therefrom and compared with the controlling account of the City Clerk's Ledger. The commitment of taxes for 1929 and additional taxes for prior years were examined. All abatements of taxes were supported by properly approved vouchers from the Assessors.

Property Sold City for Taxes

\$2,234.74

The amount was listed and found to be in agreement with controlling accounts in City Clerk's Ledger. The lists were recorded at the Belknap Registry of Deeds.

It was noted that under Property Sold to City for Taxes list 1912, an item of \$31.17 is still unpaid. It occurred to me that there has been ample time to adjust that case and would suggest that the matter be promptly settled.

It is also noted that the Taxes of 1927 and 1928 carried over as unpaid may be principally amounts to be adjusted by abatements and therefore not actual assets. I would suggest that this be passed upon by the Board of Assessors.

LIABILITIES

Motor Vehicles' Fees-1930

\$8,969.03

This was found to be in agreement with the City Treasurer. The amount of fees received for the year 1929 was found to be \$18.18 greater than reported from the office of John F. Griffin, Concord. The total amount of feets collected during fiscal year agreed with that of City Treasurer.

Leavitt Fund Receipts

\$1,112.80

The disbursements were fully vouched for.

This fund showed a net increase of \$468.61 over the balance at Feb. 15, 1929.

Miscellancous Liabilities

\$710.37

This account is composed chiefly of various items due individuals for damage claims.

Overlay for 1928 Abatements

\$683.76

This account represents the balance of an overlay provided as a reserve against 1928 Tax abatements. There is still an unpaid balance of 1928 Taxes for which this account will be used.

Unexpended Appropriations

\$70,775.54

Special drafts and Treasury Warrants, properly approved, verified all payments made during the year. The transfers at close of the year under consideration to balance off appropriation accounts were found approved by a vote of the Mayor and City Council.

School Department

The records of this department were reconciled with the City Clerk's ledger. It was noticed that several invoices were carried over from the end of school fiscal year. This was probably due to creditors sending invoices periodically through the year rather than when merchandise was delivered.

Excess of Current Assets over Current Liabilities \$12,409.41

Exhibit II of this report shows the credits that accrued and the debits arising from the account for the year under survey.

Serial Debt

The serial debt outstanding at Feb. 15, 1930 is detailed in Exhibit III of this report. The net increase of this debt for year was \$6,250.—New issue of Pavement Bonds was \$50,000.—and the serial payments totaled \$43,750.—The paid Bonds and coupons were examined and found to verify the footings in Treasurer's Book.
